HOUSE INSURGENTS ATTEMPT COALITION TO OBTAIN DEMAND

Make Stand To Depose Old Guard Members Rules Committee

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—Attempt to form a coalition and depose from control of the powerful House committee on rules old guard republicans was made today by insurgents.

Today's meetings grew out of the refusal of the republican organization to give the demanded number of seats to the insurgents on the rules committee.

It had been the plan of the majority House leader Representative Longworth to submit the slate for approval today, but instead an adjournment was made until tomorrow.

Aldermen Clodfelter, Forbes and Hearne, were named a committee to make a thorough inquiry into the various plants operated under both systems in the state.

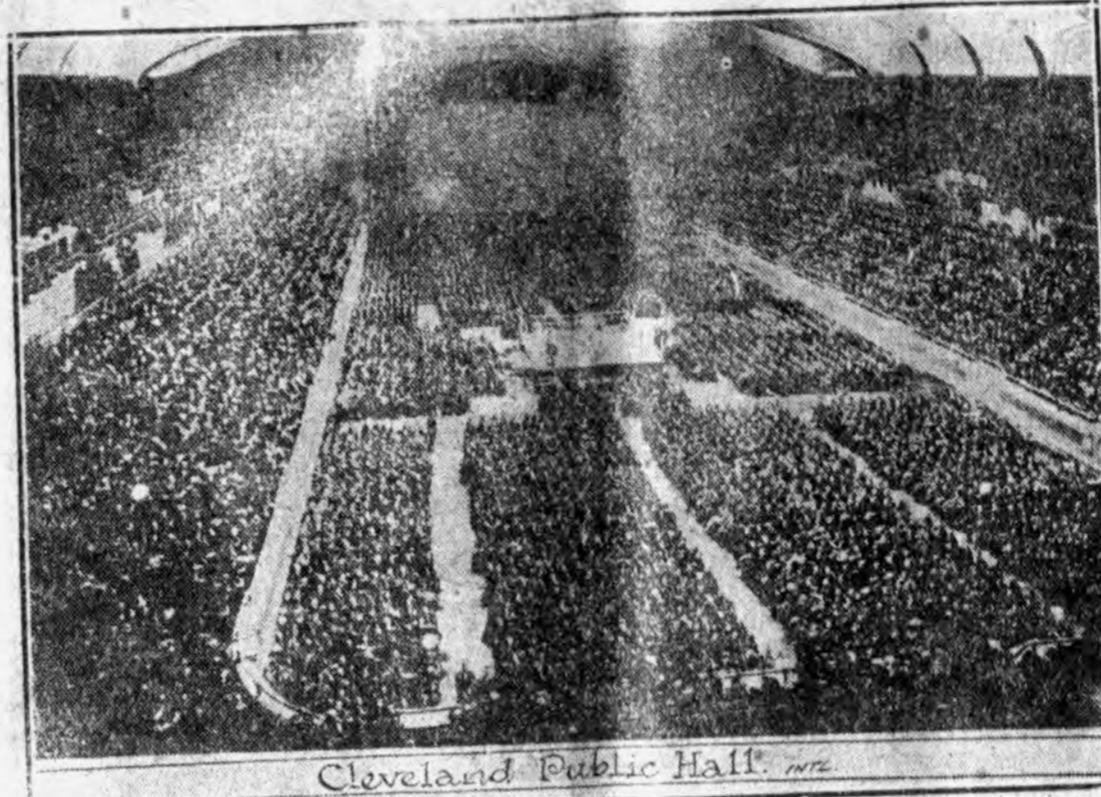
A joint meeting of the board and the Water & Light commission will be held next Thursday, Dec. 20, when the subject will be further discussed.

CHINESE BANDITS BURN CITY; 100 MEN AND WOMEN CAPTURED

SHANGHAI, Dec. 14.—Three thousand bandits captured and burned the city of Chaho Wednesday, looted the place and carried off the magistrate and took more than 100 men, women and children captives.

Many of the inhabitants escaped capture and possible death by fleeing from the city.

Other wanton outrages committed by the same band of brigands are filtering to this place constantly.

Bare Knees Matter of Taste, Not Honor, Vassar Girls Assert

NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—Vassar College has decided to differentiate between matters of honor and matters of good taste.

It has decided that a girl's honor or lack of it is not involved in dashing bare-knees across a campus or wearing knickers in the dining room.

The honor system as developed at Vassar puts a girl on her honor not to cheat in examinations, lie on her week-end slips or sick excuses, or smoke with a student court for those who did or didn't.

But when all the small rules for quiet hours and proper dress for campus were made matters of honor and continued to be broken or ignored, some students contended the honor system was a failure.

File Against Hotel Property C. M. Moore

NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—A lien for more than \$1,000,000 was filed against C. M. Moore, today in federal court here, against the apartment and hotel property known as the Lee House, in Washington, D. C.

The filing of the lien automatically caused it to be entered on the judgment rule book.

Sub-Boat On Rocks Near Hell Gate, N. Y.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14.—The submarine S-268 is on the rocks, 25 miles east of Hell Gate, N. Y., but not in danger, the navy department was advised today.

NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—The busy Canadian bootleg market was thrown into confusion today at news of renewed activities of Hi-Jackers way-laying cargoes of Christmas liquor bound south, the evident tightening of the lines of prohibition agents near the border line and the presence of the great rum fleet off the Jersey coast.

The authorities have received within the past 48 hours confidential reports of a number of successful hold-ups by Hi-Jackers in which gun play figured. In some of these highway robberies the Hi-Jackers were reported to be Indians.

Man's Dream Leads Police To Spot Where Missing Bodies Buried

SPRING LAKE, MICH., Dec. 14.—The twice repeated dream of George Snyder, local contractor, led late yesterday to discovery of the bodies of Harry B. Proctor, 33, a Muskegon real estate dealer, and 14-year-old Edna Fullager, buried in the mud of Grand River, three blocks from the Proctor home here. They had been missing since October 30.

Impressed by his dream, Snyder made a sketch of the place where the automobile in which the two were last seen might be found. Thirty minutes after officers began to drag the river, the car was found and the bodies recovered shortly afterward.

Work of converting Forbes & Merton's warehouse into an attractive Exposition hall will begin early next Thursday morning. A staff of artisans will work constantly until the finishing touches are completed in ample time for the opening date, Christmas Eve.

'King' Counterfeiter Is Finally Captured

NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—The arrest by secret service agents of Philip Lieberman, described as the cleverest counterfeiter of modern times, has dammed the source of the bogus \$20 bills which have flooded the country for some time, the federal men said here.

Lieberman was trapped in a raid Tuesday. With him were taken Paul Adler, an old friend, in whose residence he was hiding, and Benjamin Bodolsky, whose home nearby also was raided. Printing presses, plates and whiskey stills were found in both places.

Bryan Says Taxation To Be Main Issue

NORFOLK, VA., Dec. 14.—Taxation will be the one dominating issue in the next Presidential campaign, according to William Jennings Bryan in an interview upon his arrival in Norfolk for a lecture engagement. He took issue with Secretary of the Treasury Mellon, in dictating that the Secretary is trying to sidestep the general principle in reduction of taxes to the general public.

REV. SPILLMAN AGAIN HEADS STATE BAPTISTS

GASTONIA, Dec. 14.—The Rev. B. W. Spillman, Kinston, today was unanimously re-elected president of the North Carolina Baptist State convention for the seventh time. At the closing session Jan. 17 was set aside as the date when all North Carolina Baptists will be called together in local churches for fasting and prayer.

It was agreed that \$1,000,000 be set aside for all denominational purposes exclusive of orphanages. All members will be canvassed to make up the state's share of the \$75,000,000 campaign which closes November 1924.

No invitation was accepted for next year's meeting. This matter was left to executive committee. The Rev. A. Paul Bagby of Wake Forest church will preach the convention's sermon with the Rev. W. D. Sprinx, Winston-Salem, alternate.

POOR HEALTH OF WOMEN IS BLAMED ON STYLE FOLLY

NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—"The modern woman should prepare for motherhood many years before her marriage," said Mrs. Helen Louise Johnson, home economics expert, when she addressed a meeting of the Institute of Arts and Sciences of Columbia University on the subject of "The Place of the Modern Woman in Business." "Styles ruin the health of the expectant mother," she said, and cited high heels as one of the many examples. She also attributed an indefinite number of idiot children to the old idea of the 18-inch waist.

"The present day lack of modesty is disastrous to motherhood," Mrs. Johnson asserted, and continued to deplore that the youth of the youth of the age now engages in "frank talk in which they openly boast of sex."

TRY TO ESTABLISH FOX INSANE WHEN HE KILLED COBURN

Witnesses Testify Klan Press Agent Often Showed Dementia

ATLANTA, Dec. 14.—Attempt was being made today by counsel for Philip E. Fox, former head of the publicity department of the Ku Klux Klan on trial here charged with the murder of William S. Coburn, attorney for the one of the factions of the Klan that Fox was insane at the time of the shooting Nov. 5, last.

Witnesses testified today that Fox had frequently showed signs of insanity while other swore that dementia ran in his family. His father it was declared was of a "moody mind" and his brother Arthur B. Fox had killed himself while in a fit of "violent insanity."

Had Dread of Insanity. Spearman Webb, of Denton, Texas, formerly associated with Fox in the newspaper business in Dallas, Texas, declared the defendant told him 12 years ago that he lived in constant dread of going insane.

"Some time before his marriage he was worried as to whether or not he should tell his fiancée of his physical condition. I advised him not to do so because I attached no importance to it," the witness declared.

Bradley H. Hogue, editor of the Dallas (Texas) Times-Herald, on which newspaper Fox is said to have climbed the ladder from reporter to managing editor, said he saw that Fox at the height of a brilliant newspaper career suffered a general breakdown in health.

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from Mexico seem to show that effervescence is the result of deep-seated quarrel that has its roots in the racial and social jealousies of the Mexican people. General Elias Calles, a favorite of the people and a leader of the radicalism in the republic corresponding to an American progressive, announced himself as a candidate to succeed President Obregon. What is called the co-operative party of Mexico, which includes the conservative elements and the socially elect, has nominated Adolfo de la Huerta.

Just why Senator de la Huerta left Mexico City so hurriedly and raised the flag of revolt in Vera Cruz is not certain. Reports coming from the capital declare that the conservative leader did not consider his life safe in Mexico City, particularly after he had been openly threatened by followers of the fiery Calles. At any rate de la Huerta who is known as one of the really able men of Mexico is now engaged in an uprising, which is opposed not only to federal troops, but by the forces of General Calles.

To the American citizen, the Mexican habit of deciding an election with bullets may seem a trifle crude, not to say unsatisfactory. The results are likely to be further revolt and upheavals, which will interfere with business, hold up public improvements and pyramid the national debt.

However, it is becoming clearer every year that Mexico is not the United States and that the American people are not of the same strain of blood. Hence, what happens south of the Rio Grande, although it may provoke great sympathy and scorn this side of the border, is obviously so much an affair of Mexico and the Mexicans that it may be left to settle itself without interference, providing no American in Mexico is subjected to undue annoyance.

X-RAY PHOTOGRAPHS USED BY SCIENTISTS TO STUDY MUMMIES

CHICAGO.—Pictures of mummies taken with the X ray disclose conditions existing in the bodies of ancient Peruvians and Egyptians which otherwise would escape our knowledge; unwrapping the mummy means its destruction for purposes of a curative study. Such pictures have been taken by D. C. Davies, director of the Field Museum of Natural History, co-operating with the Victor X-ray Corporation.

These pictures revealed also what had been buried with the body. For instance, various Peruvian mummy packs were found to contain ears of corn, pottery, vessels of clay containing shells, bits of metal, gourd vessels, beads, clay figurines and cut bone objects.

"In addition to the range of objects found in the bundles, we learn from the X-ray pictures something definite concerning the age, sex, and condition of the bony structure of the individual buried herein," said Mr. Davies. "We are able to discover the nature of caries received during his life, as well as to determine whether the deceased was afflicted from chronic rheumatism, tuberculosis of the bones, caries, arthritis, of various kinds, and other conditions of disease."

"Thirty-three years ago I lost my left arm, and but for that could have done much better for them. I am known as a pretty shrewd horse trader and I can make a living for wife and children. The Lord has been good to me."

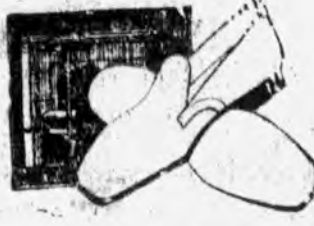

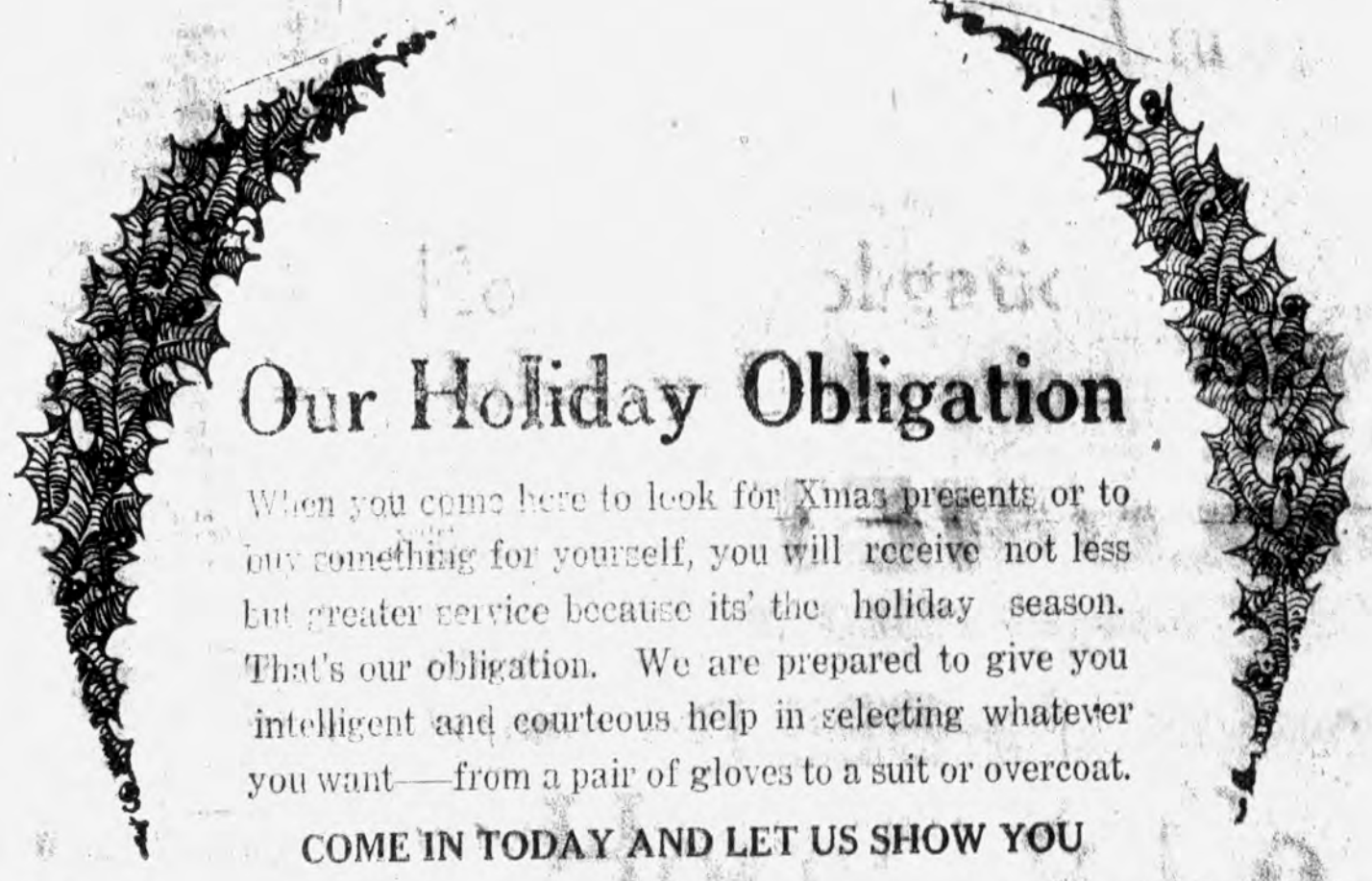

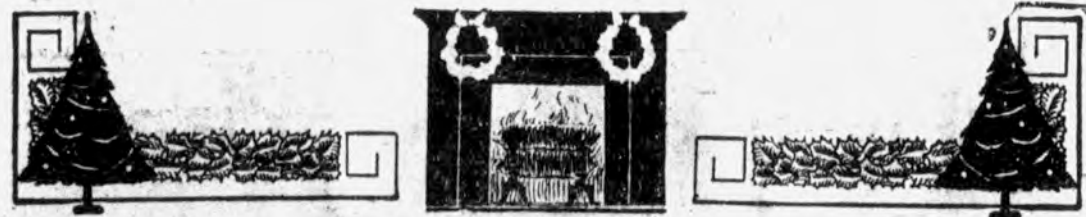

Cement Combine Is Dissolved By Order N. Y. Federal Court

NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—Federal Judge Knox today signed a decree dissolving the Cement Manufacturers' Protective association.

In October 23 Judge Knox ordered dissolution of the association on the ground that it operated in violation of the Sherman Anti-Trust law. His decision was reached after extended litigation by the government. In his order the judge extended the dissolution to include all the corporate and individual members of the association.

He also ordered the association to discontinue the practice of interchanging statistics regarding production and granted all other decrees sought by the government.

Deficits Cause Breslau to Abandon Street Cars

BRESLAU.—Unable to bear the deficit piled up daily by the numerous lines, Breslau has suspended street car operation. The situation resulted from the depressed financial and commercial conditions. Recently street car fares were insufficient to even pay the wages of employes, and there was little chance of increasing fares because the mark's decline was swifter than the time needed to put increased fares into effect.

Similar steps have been taken in many smaller cities, but Breslau is the first great metropolitan city to abandon its railways.

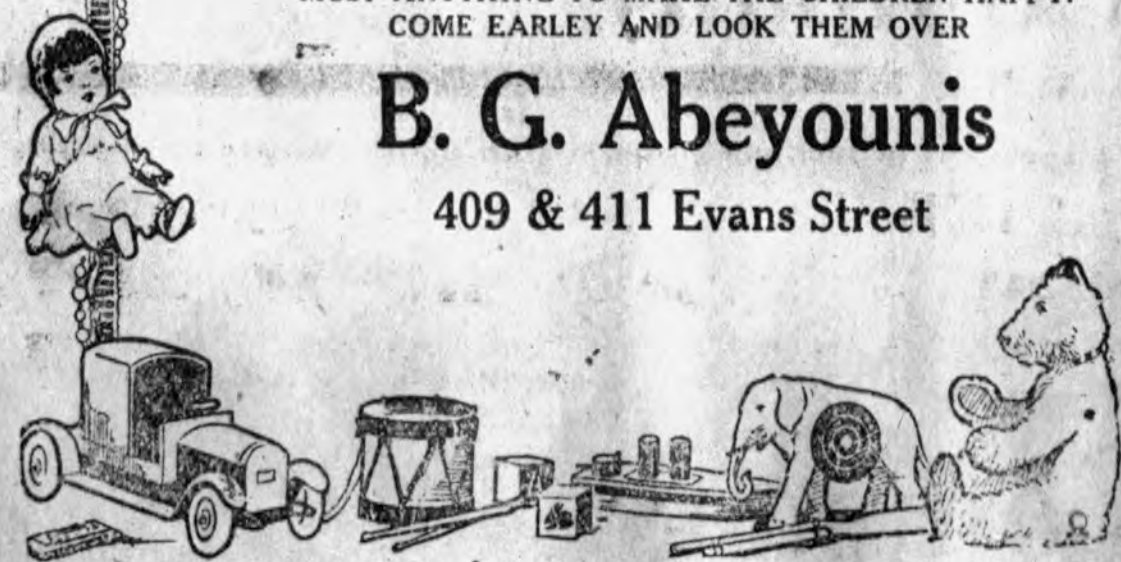

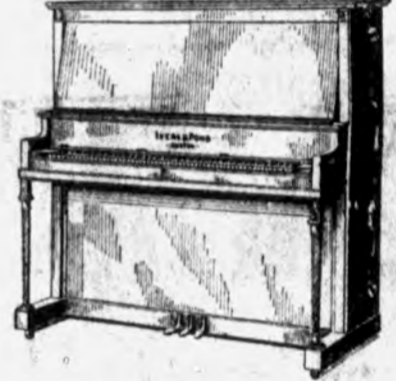

NEW YORK FOREVER CALLING FOR MORE TRANSIT FACILITIES

NEW YORK—Completion of the huge Hudson River vehicular tunnel, to connect the island of Manhattan with New Jersey, will add the twenty-third underground artery to the great network of subaqueous passageways that radiate from teeming New York and which are as necessary to its swarming life as are the arteries in a man's body.

The underground tubes and tunnels, however, are only a part of the city's blood system, for in addition there are 15 bridges. These tunnels and bridges cannot be equalled by any city in the world.

The bridges are of a total approximate length of 11 miles and the tunnels and tubes each average about three-fourths of a mile. Combined they carry 64 railroad, subway, elevated and surface, car tracks, spreading in all directions from Manhattan. In addition there are roadways for vehicular traffic on virtually all the bridges.

Leading all other underground passageways in size will be the new Hudson River vehicular tunnel, which is expected to be ready for use in 1926 at a cost of more than \$20,000,000. Each of its twin tubes will measure 30 feet in diameter. It will be 9,250 feet long, and more than 3,000 feet under the river. To carry off the poisonous exhaust gas from pleasure cars and trucks, a marvelous ventilating system is being installed.

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE ISSUANCE OF \$50,000.00 STREET PAVING BONDS, AND PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT OF PRINCIPAL AND INTEREST THEREOF.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Greenville, North Carolina, as follows:

Section 1—That the Town of Greenville, pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act, as amended, issue its bonds for the purpose of enlarging and extending the street paving of said town.

Section 2—That the maximum aggregate amount of said bonds shall be \$50,000.00.

Section 3—That a tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of the bonds be annually levied and collected.

Section 4—That a statement of the debt of the municipality has been filed with the clerk, pursuant to said Act, and is open to public inspection.

Section 5—That the assessed valuation of property subject to taxation by the Municipality for the fiscal year 1923, as shown by said statement, is \$8,751,426.00.

Section 6—That the amount of the net debt of the Municipality outstanding, authorized or to be authorized, as shown by said statement, including this issue, is \$552,532.03.

Section 7—That this ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its first publication, unless, in the meantime a petition for its submission to the voters is filed under the Municipal Finance Act, and in such event it shall take effect when approved by the voters of the Town of Greenville at an election as provided under said act.

The foregoing ordinance was passed on the 6th day of December, 1923, at 10:05 p. m. and was first published on the 15th day of December, 1923. Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said ordinance must be commenced before thirty (30) days after its first publication.

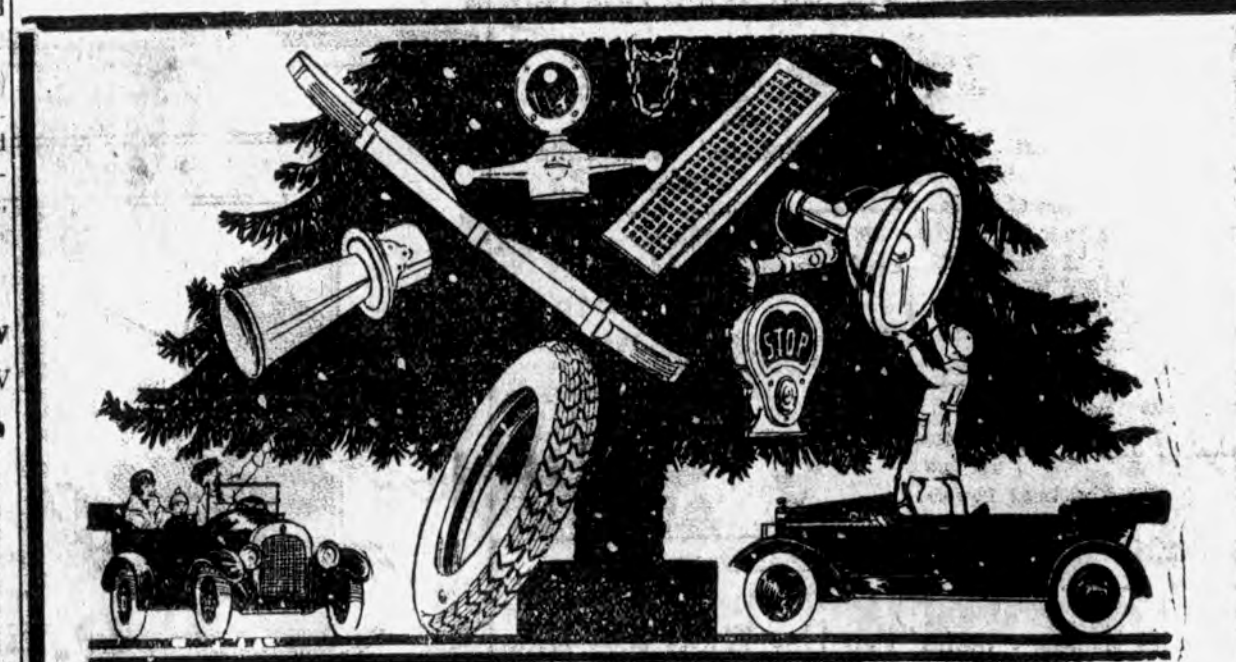

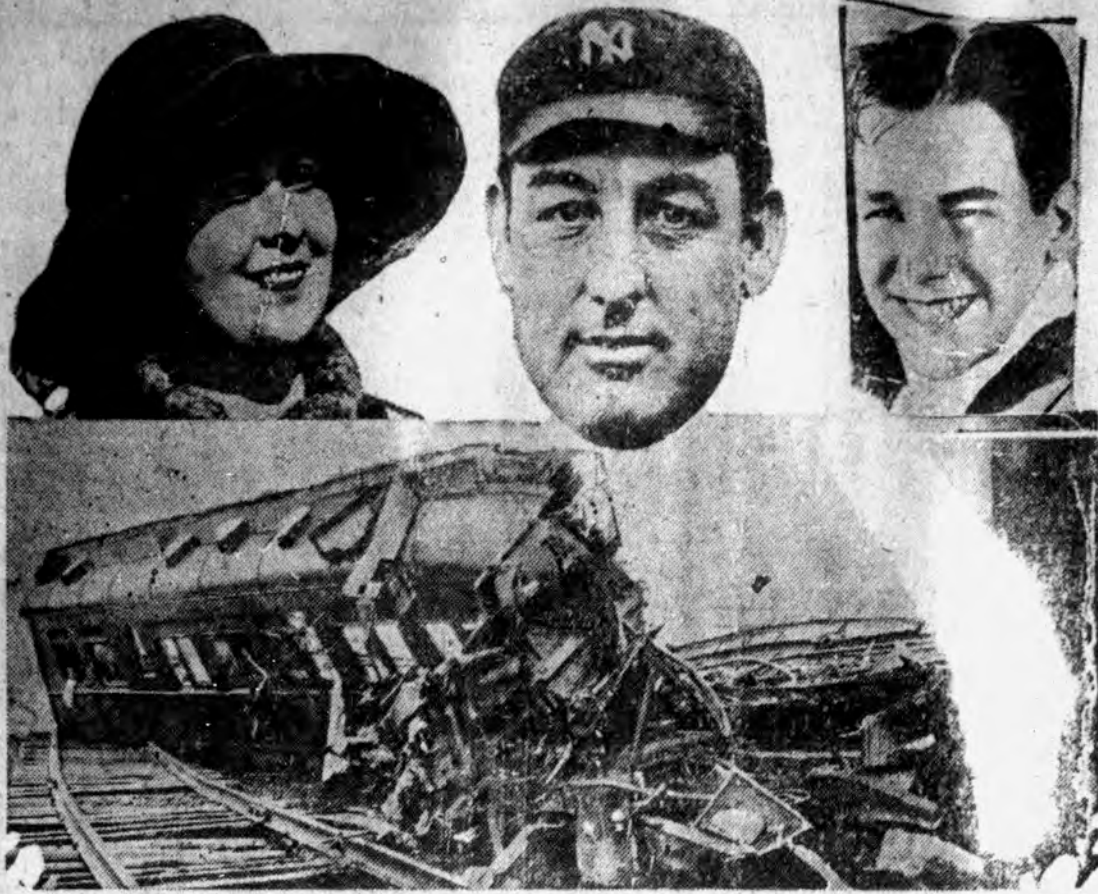

Here is the first picture of the fatal wreck of the Twentieth Century Limited, the New York Central's crack train, near Forsyth, N. Y., 30 miles from Erie, Pa. Among the dead was William E. ("Wild Bill") Donovan, of Philadelphia, manager of the New Haven baseball team and former manager of the New York Yankees. Another was Mrs. Carl D. 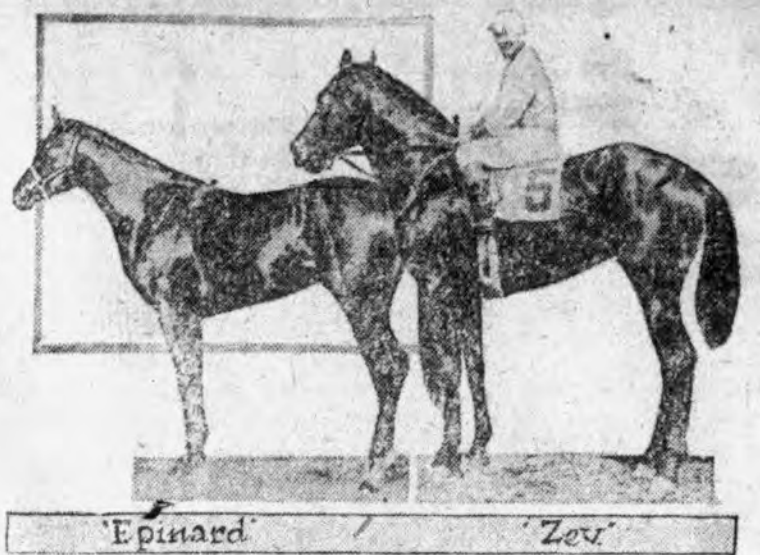

Them From Germany Rural Germany Hard Hit By Breakdown

KOTTBUS. — Rural Germany is suffering the same sort of disorganization and demoralization that is going on in the great cities and industrial centers. This city of 40,000 persons is located in the center of a comparatively fertile agricultural region 40 miles from Berlin. Still the markets afford very little in the way of foodstuffs.

There are no eggs, no milk, no fruit and very few vegetables of any sort to be had in the shops and markets. Farmers refuse to bring their products to town. They cannot buy anything they need with paper money and prefer to eat their products rather than sell them for paper which is practically worthless to them.

Tulsa Looks Forward To Plenty of Water

TULSA, Okla.—A construction project designed to carry mountain water to Tulsa from a source 60 miles away in Spavinaw hills is today nearing completion.

A pipe line five feet in diameter will carry the fluid to a community of more than 100,000 people at the rate of 25,000,000 gallons a day. The building program, under way since January, 1923, constitutes one of the largest engineering projects in the United States. The new system, including a city storage reservoir for emergency supplies, will cost approximately \$7,000,000, and is expected to be completed in the spring of 1924. It will give Tulsa its first hydrant drinking water.

Health Service To Make Study Common Colds

WASHINGTON.—A detailed study of common colds is to be made by the Public Health Service in co-operation with a number of the country's leading universities. Dr. Hugh S. Cumming, surgeon general, says colds, influenza and similar conditions are responsible for a great deal of suffering, loss of time, disability and not inconsiderable number of deaths.

He says there are few, if any, individuals who do not suffer from some acute respiratory condition at least once a year, losing from a day to a week or more as a result, and some attacks develop into more serious conditions, at times even a latent pulmonary tuberculosis being lighted up.
