L. C. GARRETT FOUND GUILTY IN SHOOTING THE REV. E. G. PIERCE

Court Fixes Sentence At Four Years For Part In Tragedy

CUMBERLAND COURTHOUSE, VA., Dec. 15.—Larkin C. Garrett was found guilty of voluntary manslaughter and his punishment fixed at four years in the state penitentiary today for his part in killing last June 5, the Rev. G. S. Pierce, Baptist preacher.

His brother, Robert O. Garrett, now has pending before the court a motion for a new trial and it was stated that a decision in this matter may be made today. Subsequently Judge White announced that he would continue the Robert Garrett case until the next term of court.

This decision was reached in view of a similar motion made in L. C. Garrett's case immediately after the verdict was returned.

The case went to the jury composed of citizens of Surrey county at 9:30 last night, and the jurors remained up until midnight to carry on their deliberations. Judge White instructed the jury that if a verdict was reached to hold it until this morning. However, it was 10:33 before it was announced that a decision had been reached.

Policies of Poincare Are Bitterly Assailed In Chamber Deputies

PARIS, Dec. 15.—A determined attack on Premier Poincare's policies was made in the Chamber of Deputies when M. Mandl, a member of the Clemenceau group, attempted to force the Premier into making a declaration concerning internal politics as a guide to the senatorial elections to be held early in January.

The interpellation of the deputy suffered the fate of all the others during the past two years. M. Poincare refused even to promise that he would make a declaration prior to the recess of Parliament, which, incidentally, was officially fixed for December 31. He insisted that internal politics should not come up for discussion before interpellations on the government's foreign policy had been answered.

Big Leagues Name April 15, Opening Date

CHICAGO, Dec. 15.—One of the final acts of the baseball magnates, who have spent the week here in business meetings and players' trades, was the agreement of the major league representatives on the opening date of April 15. Last year the leagues opened on different dates.

President Barney Dreyfuss, of the Pittsburgh Nationals, said that the opening date virtually was the only thing agreed upon, but that the task of the schedulers was to make each league next February was considerably smoothed by this agreement.

The Greenville basketball team is scheduled to meet the Winterville players in the Star warehouse next Monday evening at 8 o'clock.

Officers of Mexican Rebel Troops Killed

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—A statement issued by the Mexican embassy here said official advices from the Mexican reported that the general advance of Federal troops against General Estrada's revolutionary forces was underway. The advance forces under command of General Amaro and Amario started from Irapuato, the report said, adding that a definite engagement with the rebel forces was expected shortly.

Forces led by the rebel Generals Fernin Carpio and Magana, the advices said, had been defeated in Northern Ualisco while trying to effect a junction with the Estrada forces. General Carpio, his brother Mario Carpio, and General Magana being killed in the action.

Two Rich Men Guilty Violating Dry Laws

NEW CASTLE, PA., Dec. 15.—G. W. Lamproe and H. L. Haun, officers of a local brewery, both wealthy, were convicted here today after three trials on charges of conspiracy, manufacturing, transporting and selling intoxicating liquors.

Mother, Two Others Accused in Slaying of 7-Year-Old Youngster

CATSKILL, N. Y., Dec. 15.—Three indictments charging first degree murder in connection with the slaying of seven year-old Howard Rothenberg in Windham on August 29, one of them against the boy's mother, were returned this afternoon by the grand jury, which has conducted an extended investigation into the tragedy. In addition to Mrs. Charles Rothenberg, of Newark, N. J., mother of Howard, those indicted are Mrs. Esther Litt, of Brooklyn, his aunt, and Barisell Branaugh, son of the proprietor of the boarding house in which the Rothenbergs and Mrs. Litt were spending their vacation at the time of the murder.

LONDON, Dec. 15.—Up to late tonight no trace had been found of Lawrence B. Sperry, the American aviator, whose small airplane was found in the English Channel yesterday, three miles off Rye.

Whipping Post and Branding Iron Urged Men Who Beat Wives

NEW YORK, Dec. 15.—The whipping post or branding irons for wife-beaters was advocated today by Magistrate McAndrews, in imposing a sentence of 60 days in the workhouse on Hyman Levine for beating his wife.

"If I had my way," he said, "I would have you tied to a whipping post in the middle of the street while half a dozen strong men lashed you back or else I would have you branded so that all decent men who met you on the street would shun you."

New Social Secretary Named White House

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—Much has been said and considerable has been written within recent months about the increased work of the President, but little or nothing has been heard about the increasing duties of the President's wife. An indication that the First Lady of the Land is having to share her part of the burden of the office was seen today in the announcement that Mrs. Coolidge had employed an assistant social secretary.

Mrs. Mary Randolph, who assisted Mrs. Coolidge when Mr. Coolidge was vice-president, has been engaged as assistant to Miss Laura Harlan as social secretary.

Death Sentence Of Dalton Commuted

RALEIGH, Dec. 15.—The death sentence of Jerry Dalton, convicted in Buncombe county of killing his sweetheart and a young man was commuted by Governor Morrison today to imprisonment in the state penitentiary from 20 to 30 years.

Dalton received a number of respite and his execution was set for Jan. 22 of next year.

BOOTLEGGERS ARE HAMPERED BY GALE

Rough Weather Puts Crimp Into Holiday Delivery of Liquor

HIGHLANDS, N. J., Dec. 15.—Icy gales kicked up such a sea along the Jersey coast today that all but seven of the Christmas rum squadrons of twenty vessels weighed anchor and withdrew to the open sea to ride out the storm.

The weather and the heavily reinforced federal, state and county staffs of prohibition agents, at sea and ashore, threatened to send glimmering the rum runners' last hope of smuggling through to the big cities the thousands of cases of whiskey and wine the rum fleet carries.

Not a bottle fisherman ventured out to the fleet. Their speedy craft, including those newly launched in the last few days in the hope of garnering some of the Christmas trade harvest, rode safely at anchor in the camouflaged liquor landing havens that abound in this and nearby coast towns.

STOKES POSTOFFICE ROBBED, STORES ENTERED; THIEVES ROUTED BY CLERK

The postoffice at Stokes, was entered Thursday night, the safe broken open with a sledge hammer and \$125 taken. The burglars then visited the store of G. W. Stokes, and selected a few articles. Subsequently the store of J. L. Perkins was entered. W. Overton, who was sleeping in a room over the store was aroused by the noise of the robbers. He quickly reached for his gun and opened fire.

The thieves, however, escaped. Nothing was missing from the Perkins store, it was stated, the burglars evidently being frightened before their operations were completed.

There is no clue to the identity of the men. The matter has been reported to the postal authorities and inspectors will make an immediate investigation.

FEDERAL EXPERTS CONTINUE BATTLE TO CHECK SPREAD OF BOLL WEEVIL

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—The inside work of what is going on in the battle against insects which destroy crops is detailed to the annual report of Dr. L. O. Howard, chief of the bureau of entomology to the secretary of agriculture. Scores of those, enemies are continually being investigated, according to the report, and every now and again a new one makes his appearance, sometimes threatening an important industry in some section and the scientists are immediately sent to the scene to combat its ravages.

Nationally, reads a statement issued summarizing some of the important facts of the report "the cotton boll weevil stands out as the insect which has created the greatest economic disturbance of recent years." Tests conducted on more than 1,000 farms scattered throughout the cotton belt have shown that by proper dusting of the fields with calcium arsenate 96 percent of the farmers were enabled to control the weevil so as to make the crop profitable, the average increase being 339 pounds of seed cotton to the acre at a cost of \$4.00.

Many experiments were carried in trying out other methods and equipment, including the use of airplanes for dusting.

For dusting. All but 4.01 percent of the cotton crop is now produced in territory infested with the boll weevil.

Mrs. Rupert Hughes Kills Self, Report

LOS ANGELES, CALI., Dec. 15.—Mrs. Adelaide Manola Hughes, 39, wife of Major Rupert Hughes, author, was found dead at Haipeng, China, today, under circumstances indicating suicide, according to a cablegram received by her husband here late tonight.

Walton Wants High Court to Review Case

NEW YORK, Dec. 15.—Counsel representing former Governor Walton, of Oklahoma, recently deposed in impeachment proceedings before the Oklahoma State Legislature sitting as a court, have approached a New York law firm with a view of seeking a review of the impeachment trial before the Supreme court of the United States, it became known today.

WOMAN WANTED AS ACCESSORY COBURN KILLING IS ARRESTED

Nurse With Klan Editor Just Before Shooting, Is Charge

ATLANTA, Dec. 15.—Mrs. Margaret Weaver, trained nurse, who is said to be formerly of Cleveland, Ohio, indicted here as an accessory before the fact in connection with the slaying of W. S. Coburn by Philip E. Fox, is under arrest in Thomasville, Ky., it was announced today at the trial by Solicitor General J. A. Boykin. The latter declined to discuss Mrs. Weaver's case, but from association, counsel it was ascertained that the woman was into custody.

At the same time it was announced that an officer was entraining for the Kentucky town to bring Mrs. Weaver back to Atlanta to testify during the trial.

Mrs. Weaver is charged in the indictment with having accompanied Fox in an automobile to the office building in which Coburn's office was located a few minutes before the Klan editor shot and killed the Klan attorney.

The state indicated that Mrs. Weaver waited for Fox to return, but he was arrested as he attempted to escape from the building. She left Atlanta immediately after the shooting, it was stated.

All War Prisoners Ordered Released By Pres. Coolidge

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—President Coolidge today ordered the release of all person imprisoned for violation of war time laws.

The action was taken upon the recommendation of a special committee appointed to investigate the matter and upon the advice of the department of justice. The latter branch of the government immediately began preparation of the necessary warrants. The prisoners will be released as soon as the warrants can be sent to the federal prisons in which they are confined.

Declines Job As Envoy to Mexico

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—R. B. Greger, Brownsville, Tex., has declined for the present, the offer as ambassador to Mexico. This announcement was made at the White House today. Greger, it was stated prefers to retain his identity with republican politics in Texas.

John Speight Buys Nana Brown Farm

There was a large attendance at the sale of Nana Brown Farm, which was bought by John Speight for \$10,424.06.

The sale was conducted by N. O. Warren, Greenville real estate operator.

Texas Looks Forward Winter Polo - Playing

SAN ANTONIO, Tex.—Polo teams from four colleges and more than a dozen civilian and army quintets will make up the field of the annual winter polo tournament, starting here December 23 and continuing through out the Christmas holidays. It is the first time the three branches will compete as a group, the various classes heretofore holding individual tournaments.

Civilian teams from Detroit, St. Louis, Dallas, Kansas City and Des Moines are expected, while the host of the cavalry polo fours along the Mexican border will battle with the one civilian and the seven army teams which are located in San Antonio.

Hindu-Muslim Unity India's Big Problem Declares Educator

CALCUTTA.—Sir Rajendranath Tagore, poet and educator, has condemned the proposed wrecking of the legislative councils, and questioned the possibility of any adequate self-government in India on account of the difficulties between Hindus and Mohammedans. He advocated the building up of new and independent institutions instead of trying to wreck those now in existence, and held the regeneration of rural life to be more important than national reform.

The one problem of the day, said the poet, was the question of Hindu-Muslim unity. He considered that the leaders of the country had not yet been able to arrive at any practical or permanent solution of this problem, and was thoroughly convinced that until the question has been effectively solved all efforts to establish self-government will be wasted. He stated emphatically that he was not one of those who thought freedom from foreign rule would immediately solve all India's difficulties.

"The Mohammedans," he continued, "are united in all religious matters, and have a democratic organization. I cannot understand why they wish to come to terms with the Hindus who are demoralized with internal divisions and dissensions and full of the false pride of religious aristocracy. The Mohammedans have strength in them and are conscious of it. They know that the Hindus are weak. I cannot expect the Mohammedans to rise above their nature and determine their relations with the Hindus in a spirit of broadmindedness."

High Food Prices Drive Russians Fro Germany

MUNICH.—Russians who have been refugees in Germany for several years are now returning to Russia in considerable numbers because of the high cost of living in Germany. Reports of low foodcosts in Russia are attracting many Russians who fled before the Bolsheviks, but are now willing to accept the new political regime in their homeland in preference to life in Central Europe where they are not able to buy bread with their slight earnings.

There is also a movement of Russians toward Italy, but the Italian Fascists are discouraging the movement of foreigners, especially Russians, into Italy.

Japan's Shore Line Increased by Quake

TOKIO.—Japan's area has been considerably extended as a result of the earthquake. There has been a marked change in the shore line of the Miura and Izu peninsulas which form Sagami Bay, the center of the disturbance.

According to experts the bay is many fathoms deeper and along the shores, rocks heretofore immersed are showing, forming small islands, while residence is built on the sea-shore have considerable stretches of land between them and the sea which, when reclaimed, will be of great value.

METAL GLANDS GIVE AGED LOCOMOTIVES NEW POWER

SAN FRANCISCO.—Locomotives, while not subject to gland transplanting, can be rejuvenated, according to an announcement by the Southern Pacific Company.

The railroad's authority for the statement that weak and decrepit locomotives can be catalized, energized and otherwise made over into hard-working haulers, of trains.

"Some of these engines are being operated with greater efficiency than when they were new," said George McCormick, superintendent of motive power for the railroad.

Various new appliances and parts are "grafted" on the old engines. They are overhauled from tender to cow-catcher.

Would Restore Ancient Castle.

Buffalo, Pioneer residents of the Niagara frontier have united in an appeal to the war department for the preservation of "The Castle," an ancient building at Fort Niagara, erected by the French in 1725.

From a big front room on the first floor of "The Castle" St. William Johnson is said to have exercised his power over the Indians of the Iroquois country. The second floor is believed to have housed one of the first permanent Catholic chapels in the American wilderness.

Austria Raises Freight Rates.

VIENNA.—In an effort to meet the railway deficit, Austria has increased freight rates 10 percent. Even with the increase the rates are far below pre-war times. Advances in passenger rates are under consideration.

Progressives in Fight on Senator Cummins.

The work of organizing the United States Senate was delayed by the fight of the Progressive element of the Republican Party in opposing United States Senator Albert B. Cummins, of Iowa, for the chairmanship of the powerful Interstate Commerce Commission, which will dominate railroad legislation.

To Give Drama in Esperanto.

VIENNA.—"Iphigenia" is to be the play which will be offered in Esperanto for the entertainment of visitors to the Sixteenth Esperanto congress which is to be held in Vienna in the fall of 1924.

Aviators Brave Death To Picture Volcano

HILO, Island of Hawaii.—Airplane photographs of the fire-pit of an active volcano were taken recently by United States army pilots, who successfully performed this daring feat over Kilauea, the largest continuously active volcano in the world.

A group of four planes did the work. In a sudden descent directly over the inner crater they went down to within a few hundred feet of the roaring inferno of lava within the scorching walls.

Heavily buffeted by the up-rush of super-heated air and gas fumes arising from the pit, the aviators drove their planes straight ahead, while the daring photographers leaning far outboard, took a series of rapid-fire photographs of the tumultuous molten lava directly beneath them, according to witnesses of the feat. A series of unusually graphic views was taken.

ALL SLIVEN AWAITS REPORT FROM VILLAGE GOLD SEEKER

SLIVEN, Bulgaria.—A brace of Turkish chickens recently brought some gold nuggets into Sliven in their gullets, since which time the townspeople have been thinking far more of prospecting than of their age old industry of spinning woolen cloth.

The birds were carried to the market place by a Turkish peasant, since eagerly sought, and sold to Ivan Manoloff. Preparing them for the pot Ivan found the nuggets which, after his excitement abated, he sold to the local goldsmith for 400.

Bogus Royalty Finds It Easy to Fool Germans

BERLIN.—Democratic Germany has not ceased to worship at the throne of royalty and because of this bogus princes with hyphenated and unpronounceable names often flimflam the German public.

A make-believe prince with a sense of humor and taste for expensive automobiles and high living recently lived high in a number of German cities at the expense of exclusive hotels and garages which cater to the high-born by assuming the title Prince Hanshorst von Isenburg-Bierstein. His name varied from time to time.

Plan to Fill Danube With Barges.

VIENNA.—All the romance is being wrung from the historic old Blue Danube made famous by song, music and story almost everywhere. Prosaic Danube boatmen who care but little about waltzing are looking forward to next summer which promises to be the busiest in a transportation way in the river's history.

AMERICANS WILL PLAY GOLF TOURNAMENT FOR BERMUDA TITLE

HAMILTON, Bermuda.—Bermuda's annual amateur golf championship tournament will start January 14 on the course of the Riddell's Bay Golf and Country Club. Bobby Jones, American open champion, Francis Quinitt of Boston, and Jess Sweetser of New York, are among the expected American entrants. Several Canadian golfers also will participate.

Soviet Goods Shown in Berlin.

BERLIN.—A permanent exhibition of Russian products has been opened in the rooms of the commercial mission of the soviet republic in this city. Exhibits are made of goods which buyers may obtain from stores in Germany or from Russia direct. The display consists chiefly of raw materials and popular handiwork.

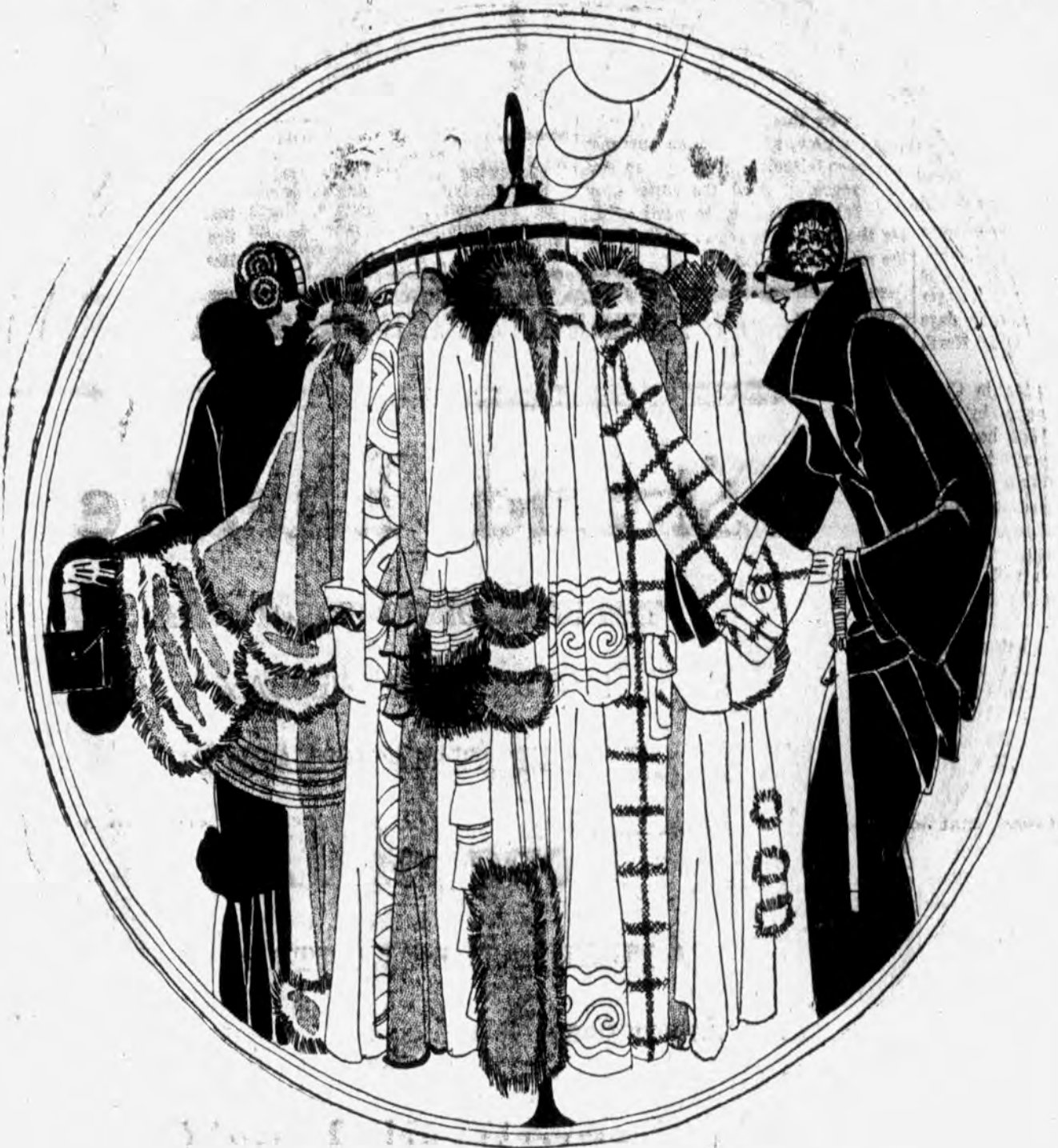

GERMAN TRAINS CURTAILED
AND INNS WITHOUT FOOD

HAMBURG—Train travel in Germany during the coming winter is not promising of either comfort or dependability. There are not so many fast trains as formerly between the big cities; there have been other curtailments, and there are fewer sleep-

ing cars.

Outside the great cities the hotel accommodations also are far below those of normal times. There is little motor touring, and few foreign tourists are visiting the remoter places of interest. Consequently hotels which once were acceptable are now very unsatisfactory.

HEIGHTS GERMAN EXCHANGE
BAFFLE HUMAN IMAGINATION

BERLIN—Before the war the wealth of the entire world was estimated at about three trillion gold marks. That number of gold marks, at the rate of early November, was worth only about two dollars. A box of matches today costs more paper marks than there were gold marks in the greatest fortune in Germany before the war. The fortunes of Bertha Krupp, the Prince of Henckel-Donnersmarck and the Duke of Oldenburg were variously estimated at from one to three hundred million gold marks, but a beggar would scarcely accept that number of paper marks today.

HAWKERS OF GERMAN MONEY
DRIVEN FROM PARIS STREETS

PARIS—German bank notes, mostly in millions and billions, have been driven off the streets of Paris by the police. They were sold chiefly as souvenirs or given as premiums, but the city authorities discovered a wartime law forbidding traffic in foreign monies except under license, and they have applied it.

Just why this law should have been dug up now, after German currency had been circulating widely for several years, puzzled the curious, as they felt it to be quite worth while for the French to see to what depths the mark had fallen.

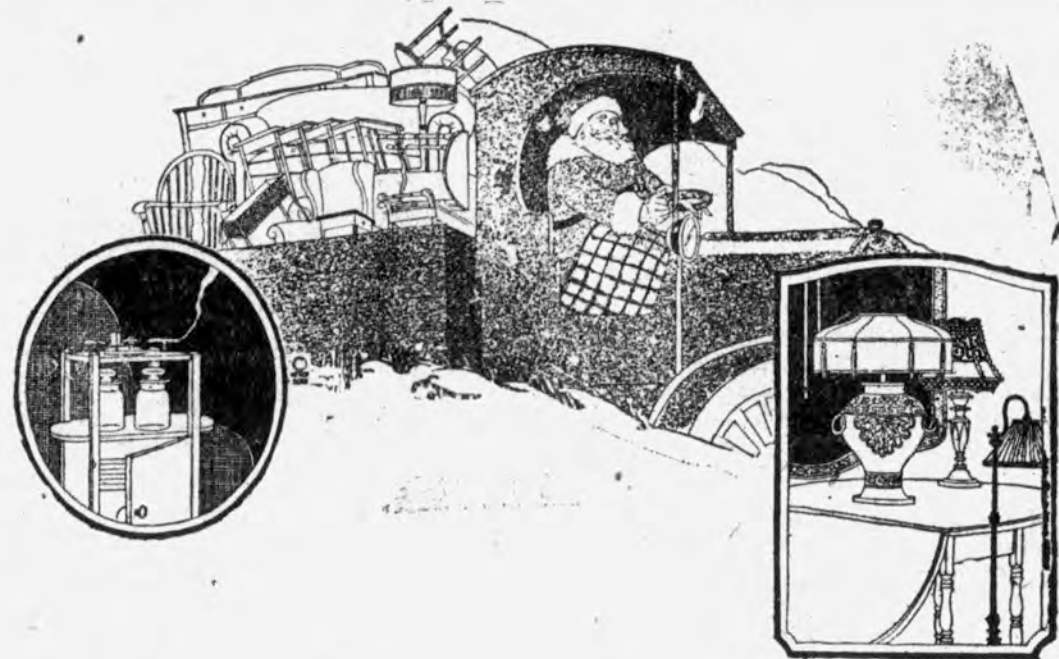

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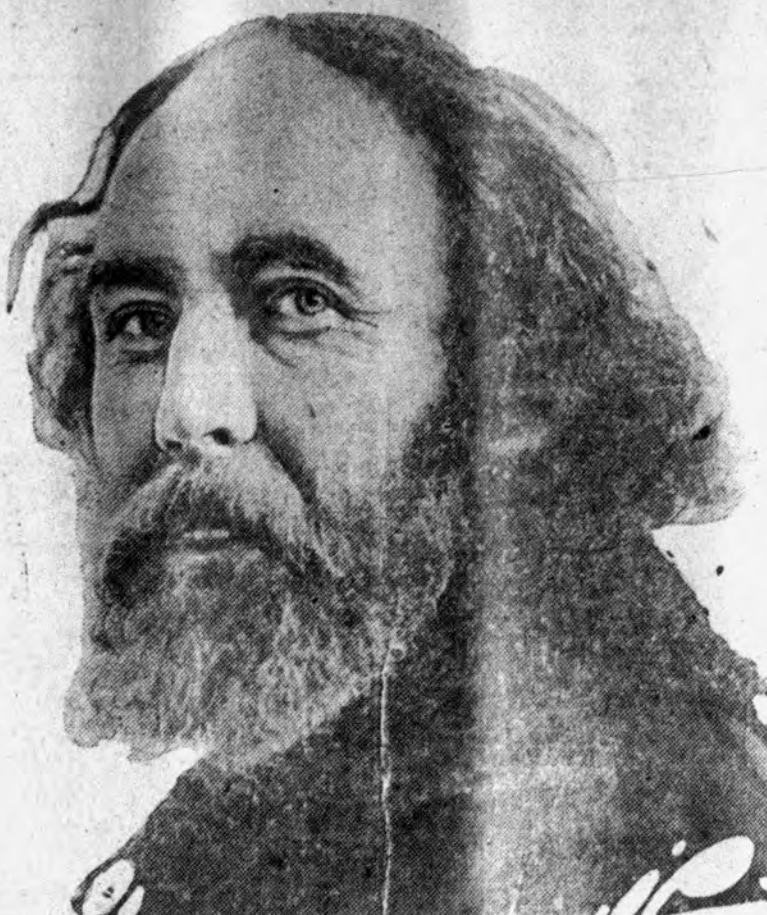
