MEXICAN FEDERALS TAKE SAN MARCOS; ALMAZA OCCUPIED

Battle Lasted 16 Hours Before Rebels Forced to Retreat

Mexican government forces moving east of the capital have come into direct contact with the rebels column operating from Vera Cruz and fighting for possession of Apizoco 70 miles east of Mexico City, it is reported. The battle went all day yesterday it was stated, with no possible indication of the outcome. Rebel reinforcements were rushed to the scene from the coast.

Later advices from Mexico City say the rebels evacuated Puebla, south east of the capital last night. While not admitting it as true the rebels through Vera Cruz headquarters explained there was "a change in plan" whereby their forces from Puebla could be centered upon Apizoco "for purposes of consolidating railway communication."

Capture Supplies.
EL PASO, TEX., Dec. 18.—Federal troops have taken San Marcos the most important point between Vera Cruz and the Mexican capital, and are steadily advancing upon the sea coast stronghold of the rebels according to the Mexican consul at this place.

Fighting for possession of San Marcos lasted 16 hours before the rebels were forced to retreat, it was stated. The federalists captured immense amounts of ammunition, small arms a number of cannon and several trains used by rebels for transporting supplies.

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 18.—The rebels evacuated Puebla last night, the war department announced today.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—The revolutionary movement in Mexico has not operated to change the policy of the American government toward Mexico, it was announced at the White House today.

SPENDS NIGHT OF TERROR LISTENING TO MURDER PLANS

NEWPORT, R. I., Dec. 18.—After a night of terror in an undertaker's parlor while captors discussed the proposition of killing him, William Beatty, who was kidnapped last night, today made his way to this city. Beatty was liberated on the beach three miles from Newport.

The kidnapping is only one of many acts of violence that have been committed since the opening of warfare between bootleggers and "hijackers," Beatty told the police he was liberated only after he promised his captors he would in the future work for their interests instead of against them.

Beatty was snatched from the sidewalk almost in front of Newport police headquarters by six men in a big touring car.

Bank of Vanceboro Under Investigation

RALEIGH, Dec. 18.—Heavy withdrawals following the widespread circulation of reports that the institution was in financial difficulties and about to be merged with a New Bern bank caused the closing of the doors of the Bank of Vanceboro, according to an announcement from the Corporation Commission yesterday. Clarence Latham, chief State bank examiner has taken over the management of the bank.

No receiver has been appointed, and one will be named until a more thorough examination of the books of the bank is made.

Cutting U. S. Army To Peace Basis Finished

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—Basic plans of the war department for mobilization under the new three-in-one army scheme have been completed and distributed to the regular, National guard and reserve officers. Details as they apply to company and similar units will be worked out by these officers under the department's policy of decentralization.

Unit commanders are expected to plan for using local facilities to feed, shelter and train their men in the preliminary work of mobilization. These detailed plans must in turn be considered and fitted into the general scheme by regimental and divisional staffs and corps area commanders.

NEGRO WHO LET "SUN GO DOWN ON HEAD" SHOT, WHITE MAN KILLED

MARLOW, Okla., Dec. 18.—Marlow's unwritten law reflected by prominent sign: "Negro don't let the sun go down on your head," caused the death of A. W. Burch, prominent hotel owner and probably the fatal shooting of the first negro in years who stayed more than a day here.

They were the victims of an unmasked mob of 15 men who went to the hotel where the negro was employed as porter and shot both down when Burch attempted to persuade them from lynching the negro.

Last Saturday Burch brought Robert Jurnegan, the negro, to serve as porter in his hotel. A few hours later he received an anonymous letter ordering him to dismiss the porter at once and drive him from the city. He ignored the letter. The shooting followed. The assailants fled in disorder.

Churchmen in Split On Proposed Trial Pastor for Heresy

NEW YORK, Dec. 18.—While clergy and laymen of the Protestant Episcopal church awaited word from Bishop T. Manning of the New York diocese on the sermon of Rev. Dr. Leighton Park, who invited trial for heresy, Rev. Dr. Carl Reiland, rector of St. George's church, a leader of the modernists, challenged the fundamentalists "to dare" to bring Dr. Parks to trial.

Dr. Reiland declared no one would "dare bring to trial" either Dr. Parks or Bishop Lawrence, of Massachusetts, another leader of the modernist faction of the church.

3 Saved From Death By Naval Seaplane

PENSACOLA, FLA., Dec. 18.—Landing in the open gulf approximately 220 miles south of Mobile, Ala., this afternoon, a twin motored seaplane from the Pensacola naval air station rescued three men from one of the two navy eagle boats which have been adrift in the Gulf since late Friday. The wind was blowing about 18 miles an hour at the time of the rescue and the seas were fairly heavy.

REVISED PLAN TAX REDUCTION SLIGHT SAVING

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—Substantial relief would be afforded by the Mellon tax reduction plan to only 525,000 individual income surtax payers, Representative Garner, of ranking Democrat on the House Ways and Means Committee, declared in a statement. He asserted, however, that "most of the administrative amendments embraced in Secretary Mellon's tax recommendations and several others not included should have early and favorable consideration."

Commenting on the benefits to be derived, Mr. Garner said "Congress could repeat the entire income taxes of the 6,136,000 with incomes of \$5,000 or less, which would involve a loss of only \$92,790,000 thereby leaving the 525,000 large income surtax payers as the chief beneficiaries of the plan."

France Deaf to Loan Plea of Germany

PARIS, Dec. 18.—Germany's request for authority to pledge the resources of the Reich as guarantee for a loan of from \$50,000,000 to \$70,000,000 with which to buy grain and fats abroad was delivered in written form to the reparations commission today.

It received little support in French official circles where it was declared there was no conclusive evidence that food was lacking in Germany. It was remarked that the manifest L-moa-c fth-cmfw ydrhs emfwtions in Germany had been provoked not by a dearth of eatables but by the inability of a great proportion of the population to pay the price demanded by the holders of foodstuffs.

Judge Easy Romance; Finds He Was Deceived

NEW YORK, Dec. 18.—Charles Shafton 23, appeared in court to answer to a charge of driving without a license. Lillian McGovern, 22, was with him.

"Miss McGovern and I were discussing plans for our wedding when we were arrested," said Shafton.

Magistrate Fish gave Shafton a suspended sentence as a wedding present. The prisoners left arm in arm. Magistrate Fish smiled benignly, but his face had a different expression 10 minutes later when the police informed him that the young woman was readily Lillian McGovern and that her husband is alive.

Athens, Dec. 18.—King George and his queen will leave today for Roumania, it was announced today.

The departure of the nominal ruler was decided after he had been informed last night in writing that it was advisable that he leave the country until the national assembly had decided on a regime best suitable to the country. King George reserved his reply until today.

The assembly will meet shortly to consider the best government policy based on the elections. In an official statement issued today it was stated, "it was deemed advisable for the King to leave Greece until final decision is reached regarding the regime"

HER LOVE DREAMS SHATTERED WHEN LOVER ARRESTED

ATLANTA, GA., Dec. 18.—The story of an 18-year-old girl's love dream that was suddenly shattered was related to Federal officers by Cora Bell Smith, at the preliminary trial of her lover, P. J. Conrad, on a charge of violating the Mann act before United States Commissioner W. Celiquitt Carter.

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WASTE OF HUMAN LIFE GROWS

During 1922, 11,666 deaths resulted from accidents caused by automobiles and other motor vehicles, says a report of the Department of Commerce.

These figures are appalling and especially so when compared with smaller death rates in other years. The fatal increase in fatal motor accidents is out of proportion to the growth in the use of motor cars, and is indicative of but one thing; THAT HUMAN CARELESSNESS OF HUMAN LIFE IS ON THE INCREASE.

The worst of it is that there seems to be no effective way to stop this wholesale slaughter. We are shocked beyond expression at sudden catastrophies that at one blow remove smaller numbers of humans, but we have grown calloused to this cumulative killing.

Nor is all this caused entirely by recklessness. Much of it is, of course, but there are other causes to be studied carefully and rem-

edied much labor.

It is not altogether a matter of speeding, for an automobile may be driven as carefully at high speed as at low, providing the driver has it under control and is expert in management. The average driver has enough consideration for his own life, if not for that of others to be careful. The speed limit fixed by law is reasonable and allows progress swift enough for all ordinary needs.

But the HARVEST OF DEATH is caused, not by the ordinary drivers, but by those exceptions who overstep all boundaries and sense of law and pursue a thoughtless, selfish course of destruction.

THIS CLASS MUST BE CURBED AT WHATEVER COST.

The great increase in the use of automobiles and the constant influx into the highways and streets of still more cars, some new—many too dilapidated to be operated with safety, suggest that a judicious weeding out of irresponsible, unfit and deliberately criminal drivers will accomplish results in lessing this frighted death rate from automobile accidents and will also relieve a congestion that is productive of accidents.

Continued study of the traffic and automobile indicates that a more complete registration of human fitness to drive and personal inspection of applicants for licenses to operate motor cars will have to be enforced before there is hope of diminution of the death rate as disclosed by figures of federal investigators.



**PROVE RICH FIELD
ARCHAEOLOGISTS**

MANILA. — Results of the first year of systematic archeological research in the Philippine Islands now are being classified by Carl E. Guthe, a scientist sent out by the University of Michigan, at his island home, Cebu. The discoveries, which include Chinese as well as native Philippine relics, date back in some instances as much as 2,300 years, scientists believe, and are expected to clarify many points in insular history which have been beclouded by doubt.

During the last 12 months the scientist explored caves and ancient burial places on three islands—Buhol, Samar and Cebu. Beside various native skulls and artifacts, he found in them specimens of Chinese arts and handicrafts of the Tang, Sung and Ming dynasties which scientists believe corroborate previous suppositions that for many hundreds of years the Philippines were visited by a succession of Chinese traders whose influence affected the social customs and probably the religion of the na-

tives.

The period of this influence is estimated at 1,000 years, the Tang dynasty having flourished in the seventh century and the Ming continuing until the middle of the seventeenth. There are evidences that Chinese civilization during this time several times flowed over the native culture and was swept back, only to advance again.

**School Children Help
Stop Motor Accidents**

SAN FRANCISCO.—One thousand public school boys of San Francisco, from 12 to 18 years old, have been organized into a traffic reserve force. Like the regular traffic policemen they are posted on the corners surrounding schools, where they regulate the progress of automobiles and see that their fellow students cross the streets safely. They study the city ordinances and are drilled in signals by traffic officers of the police department.

**PROHIBITION U. S. CRITISED
LETTER OF BRITISH BISHOP**

PLYMOUTH.—The Rev. Lord William Gascoyne-Cecil, Bishop of Exeter, in a pastoral letter says America has antipathized men of moderate opinion, and there seems to be a danger that its total prohibition will in the end be far less successful than this country's practical prohibition

of spirits among the working classes by a heavy tax.

"Still I deeply regret," he continues, "that Englishmen have been found to assist in breaking American laws."

**"Wets" Win Election
By Increased Margin**

SYDNEY, N. S. W.—The overwhelming victory of the "wets" in the recent election at Queensland, will result in the voters in favor of continuing more than doubled their majority over the election of 1920, is directly attributed to the fact that the liquor trade, or public houses, voluntarily consented to a curtailment of hours in which their places of business were kept open.

Until recent amending legislation was passed the bars kept open from 6 a. m. until 11 p. m. There were three issues in the election—abolition, state control and continuance. The campaign was unprecedentedly bitter

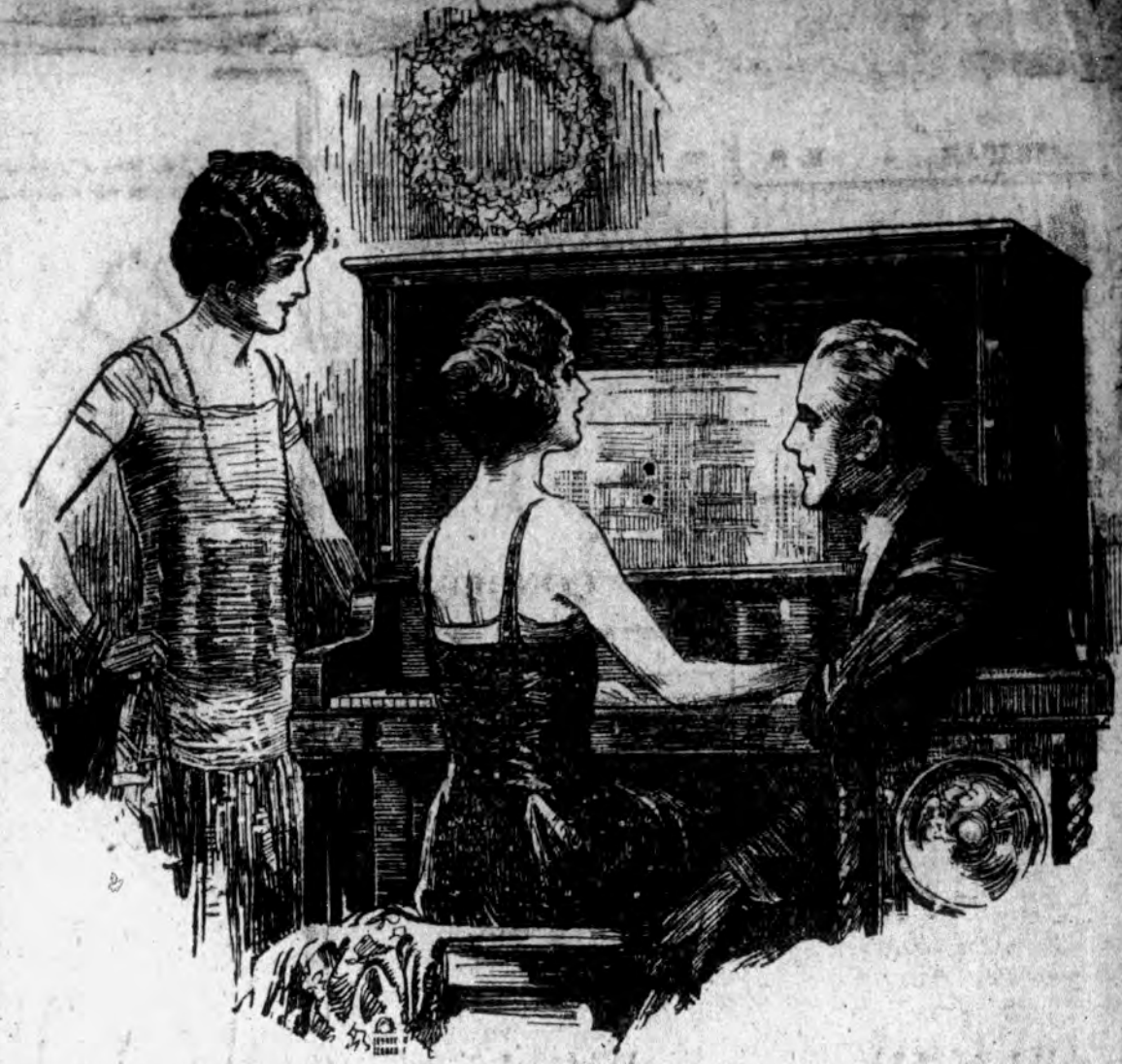
because, under the recently amended legislation, it was the last poll that would have prohibition as an issue.

ANCHORAGE, Alaska.—Joe Wilson, 30 years old, and his son, aged 12, showed up in Seward recently with 120 ounces of placer gold which they had taken out in 12 days at 3,000 feet, 20 miles from Seward on the Alaska railroad.

About three months ago they took a decision which has remained strictly secret. They notified the various nations with whom they have trade relations that the title of their government was changed from that of the Russian Soviet Republic to the "Union of Socialist Soviet Republic," contracted after Russian fashion to U. S. S. R. The word "Russia" was dropped completely.

At the same time the emblems upon their official not paper, the crossed hammer and sickle, were now surrounded by a semi-circle of labels bearing the names of the various parts of the country and its adjacent territories, where "independent" local Soviet Governments have been formed, such as "Ukraine," "Azerbaijan," and so on. But not only these, for the name "Bulgaria" was tentatively added, the name of an entirely independent State!

MEN RUSH FOR GOLD WHEN WARM WINDS MELT ALASKAN ICE

ANCHORAGE.—Phenomenal weather in the late autumn, which took the form of warm cinnock winds in the higher regions, has resulted in a stampede of prospectors to adjacent hills where they have staked many claims to be worked for placer gold in the spring.

The warm winds uncovered immense deposits of gravel, which were swept down to the rivers, leaving a new terrain exposed. Prospectors report staking at great depths which were locked in perpetual ice. They believe that nature thus has left open rich auriferous gravels hitherto sealed.

On the west side of Turnagain Arm an avalanche 100 feet wide and a mile long rushed down a mountain, uprooting immense trees and cutting deep into the soil. Three ledges rich quartz were revealed. The creeks of that region had given up placer gold in the past, and the news of the big slide sent every unattached man with an outfit into the mountainous region above the Arm. Claims were staked, and since winter was closing in, the prospectors left to return at the first thawing of spring.

The chinooks prolonged the open season in the hills a month or more; it is predicted that this will result in an unusually early spring, as the usual early freeze-up was lacking and the blankets of snow prevented deep freezing later.

Hawaii's Alien School Act May Go To Court

HONOLULU.—All the points at issue in the present legal controversy over the right of the territory to regulate or limit the activities of alien language schools in Hawaii may be presented to the United States supreme court for final decision in the near future, it has been indicated by territorial attorney general John A. Mathewman.

The principal question involved is whether the territory has the right to close, either in whole or part, a foreign language school.

SHRINKING MARK MAY CLOSE GERMAN LIBRARY FOR BLIND LEIPSIG.—Germany's largest library for the blind must close its doors if private subscriptions are not immediately received to carry on the work. This library has been serving blind persons all over Europe and is said to have more readers than any similar institution in the world.

There are 2,300 readers who patronize it in Germany alone and it sends books to 990 cities and villages in various parts of Europe.

SUPPOSED STUDIO COPY PROVE TITIAN EXPERIMENTAL WORK

LONDON.—Titian's painting "Venus and Adonis" in the National Gallery here, has been considered to be only a studio repetition of one at Madrid, but in the course of renovating operations the discovery has been made that the painting is a first experimental version of the subject by the master himself.
