OBREGON LEADER IS REPORTED SLAIN BY REBELS IN BATTLE

Both Sides Claim Advantage While Terms for Armistice Sought

SITUATION SUMMARY.
The status of the rebel forces in Mexico is still unclear owing to conditions and belated advices over the international boundary.

An important victory for the rebels is reported by the Mexican consul at New Orleans. Advices say that the city of Merida in the state of Yucatan has been taken by the rebels, but this apparently is of little value to the revolutionists as Yucatan is remote from the scene of Adolfo de la Huerta's drive against Mexico City.

The situation in sectors directly east of the capital is somewhat confused.

Official dispatches to the Mexican embassy said that the rebels forces had been driven from San Marcos, while the Obregonists lost 100 men in an unsuccessful attack on San Marcos after nine hours of fierce fighting.

One of those killed according to information was General Cavanazos, one of the Obregonists' strongest leaders. The correspondent of a Vera Cruz newspaper says that both sides are holding their positions while attempts proceed to arrange an armistice. Huerta was said to be in telegraphic communication with General Martiniz, federal commander.

Miss Alexander is wanted for passing worthless checks to the extent of \$500, the authorities declared.

It was while she sat at the switchboard of the fashionable club, she said, that she was "bitten by the society bug."

Among the persons she duped here was Mrs. Lockwood Honors, sister-in-law of the late Mrs. Potter Palmer, the authorities declared. Mrs. Honors is said to have given a dinner for her at the exclusive Casino Club. Others victimized by the girl, the authorities said, were Hugh Blythe, wealthy bachelor broker; Mrs. Everett Wrenn, Mrs. Richard Foy and Colonel Wildman.

STATE POULTRY NOW VALUED AT OVER 20 MILLION

RALEIGH, Dec. 19.—The value of poultry on the farms of North Carolina is now over \$20,000,000 according to an announcement made here today by the State college authorities in connection with the short courses to be offered farmers of the State next month.

Because of this large interest in the raising of chickens a special course in poultry raising will be among the courses offered from January 9 to 16, the time selected for the special courses in farming.

This course will be directed by Dr. B. F. Kaupp, Professor of Poultry, Science and poultry investigator for the State Experiment Station. Due to the number of women and boys interested in poultry raising, it is hoped that a large number of them will enroll for the course, the statement of the College asserted.

TOBACCO SEASON BEST FOR YEARS

Pre-Christmas Sales Total Nearly Thirty-Four Million Pounds

With close of the Greenville tobacco market today for the Christmas holidays, it was estimated that approximately 33,600,000 pounds of tobacco had been sold since the opening date.

It is generally agreed among growers and warehousemen that the season has been the best, judging from every view, point in the history of the local market. Prices have proved satisfactory to farmers because the average price here has been above Wilson and other places in the territory. This splendid facilities afforded by warehousemen for expeditious handling of the product and the fact that the Greenville market offers superior inducements is shown by the wide expansion in trade this year.

So far as can be ascertained there has not been a single complaint made by growers about the local market. Those from a distance were all especially pleased with the treatment received from warehousemen, prices for the product and the service and quality of goods offered by local merchants.

Promises Cleveland Like Sahara For the Convention Host

COLUMBUS, Dec. 19.—The state government of Ohio will make every effort to see that Cleveland is a hoche less city during the Republican national convention. This announcement was made today by the State Prohibition Commissioner B. F. McDonald, an appointee of Governor Donahay.

Because of Cleveland's proximity to the boundary line it is feared that bootleggers will attempt to flood the city with liquor a situation which caused Commissioner McDonald to give early notice of the rigid enforcement of the law.

Volstead Declares Home Brew Waning

ST. PAUL, MINN., Dec. 19.—Grown tired of making home brew, the American people are giving up their opposition to prohibition and will never permit a return of liquor, former Congressman Andrew J. Volstead told the Minnesota Law Enforcement Conference today.

Volstead declared that after an expected reaction of the public against prohibition sentiment is now swinging in the opposite direction.

GREENVILLE IS ASKED TO VOTE ON PEACE PLAN

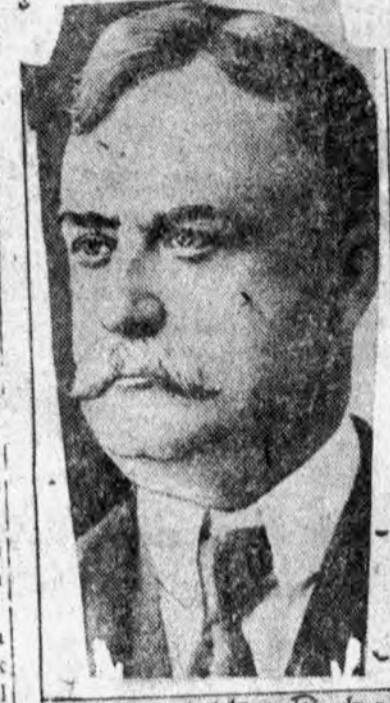

The Tucker's are reported to be enjoying the winter sports at Southern Pines, N. C. Young Tucker and Mrs. Simpson, wealthy widow were married in this state Oct. 2. When application was made for a marriage license Tucker gave his age as 21 and Mrs. Simpson, as 46, it is alleged.

SOUTHERN PINES, Dec. 19.—Mrs. Burton Tucker and her youthful husband slipped out of a local hotel here early today, according to a clerk of one of the leading houses where the couple it was stated, had been registered.

The clerk declared he did not know whether the Tuckers were leaving Southern Pines, and could give no information concerning their movements.

PERSONALITY WINS RICHES; BRAINS DO NOT, HE DECLARES

ANN ARBOR, MICH., Dec. 19.—Personally outweighs brains in the battle for dollars, according to Adelbert Ford, instructor in psychology at the University of Michigan. Professor Ford today announced statistics gathered from the graduating class of 1912.

Phi Beta Kappa fraternity members prominent for their scholastic ability, have acquired an average income of \$3,000 a year during the ten-year period since graduation. They sank lowest in earnings.

The men of Michigan, the highest campus honorary society, which selects men according to their campus prominence, now are drawing average annual incomes of more than \$10,000. These men, Professor Ford said, are the "mixers." Graduates who are prominent in athletics have incomes averaging \$6,400 a year.

Members Are United In Making Benefit Exposition Big Success

These recently elected officers of the Pitt County Legion Post were installed at a meeting of the body last night in the Rotary building: Commander W. H. Rogers; First Vice-Commander Dr. A. M. Schultz; Second Vice-Commander, W. T. Acree; Bethel; Third Vice-Commander C. L. Everett; Grimesland; Adjutant G. C. Moore; Finance Officer L. G. Conleton; Service Officer A. D. Corry; Chaplain S. L. Brdgers.

J. H. Waldrop, retiring commander, thanked every member of post for the unstinted support which had been given during his administration. He took occasion to score the Mellon plan of proposed income tax reduction as an argument against the soldiers' bonus. He offered statistics to show that the millions of income tax payers would not be relieved under the proposed plan and that approximately only 500,000 would receive any benefit. It was no excuse or apology for not recognizing the claims of former service men for compensation relief as originally volunteered by congress, he declared. His remarks were warmly applauded.

Rogers Takes Reins.
Commander Rogers, expressing appreciation of the honor which had been conferred by the Post, said that he knew in advance that he would be supported during his administration with same zeal and devotion which had characterized the body since its organization. He pointed out several important undertakings before the Post among them a concerted campaign for additional members.

Dr. C. O'H. Laughinghouse, reading a letter from Miss Louisa Hubbard former county Red Cross official, and a member of the body in which she stated her disgust at President Coolidge's dismissal of the bonus agitation with the brief sentence "I am against the Soldiers' bonus."

Enthusiasm was manifested in the Industrial Exposition in which the Post is sponsoring to be held here Dec. 24-31, in Forbes & Morton's warehouse. It was reported by several members that demand for tickets was growing apace and that the prospect for the success of the event indicated it would be the greatest achievement ever staged by a Legion unit in the state.

Members were requested to contribute funds collected for the sale of tickets to J. H. Waldrop, as soon as possible, Commander Rogers asked today.

CHRISTMAS CASH IS OBTAINED BY FINING SPEEDER

CHICAGO, Dec. 19.—The annual Christmas tree for wards of the municipal court of domestic relations under the auspices of Clerk James Kearns and Judge William A. Mearns, it was learned today, has developed a lucrative source of Christmas funds.

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DEFENDING MOTHERS-IN-LAW

On far flung lines the mothers-in-law are being attacked. Not that such an attack is anything new. Even the ancient left records of the fray. However, it seems to have broken out again with renewed vigor in many important places at once, which makes it worthy of comment.

Cable advices tell us that Premier Mussolini of Italy has found a way to vent his long standing hatred of a particular mother-in-law by refusing all mothers-in-law of legislators free transportation on railways.

A New York judge the other day ruled that the mother-in-law is no JOKE at ALL, but a DEADLY SERIOUS matter, and an aid organization has reported that the greater part of the thousands of cases that it handled during the last year were due to mother-in-law interference in marital life.

The trouble is that all argument and reasoning against mothers-in-law is negative. Reports are not received of the number of cases in which mothers-in-law have been parties to happy marriages or those instances where they have preserved happiness when other elements threatened to destroy it. It is not doubtful if such statistics were available a large number of mothers-in-law would not be known to be such marplots as they are pictured. But whatever the accusations against moth-

ers-in-law and however just or unjust they may be, the burning question is "what are we going to do about it?"

We cannot all wait to marry orphans, and hence mothers-in-law are necessary to the biological processes that result in wives, how can we escape the blessing without the bane? It appears to be a matter of adjustment. Nor is it meant to be implied that mothers-in-law are a necessary evil. On the other hand in the vast majority of instances they are a necessary good.

Mussolini, for instance, gained his enmity against his mother-in-law because she chased him from the house with a broom when she found he was enamored of her daughter. Possibly she had a good reason. She explained that she did not like "rebels" and was not going to have any of that class hanging around her daughter.

The stand is taken by an Aid Society that it is usually the mother of the wife that causes the trouble. That is another instance of negative reasoning for figures are not given to present positive proof that mothers of husbands have not been at least equally to blame. Hence it is merely an unsupported assertion.

It must be remembered that many instances of unpleasant husbands may be recalled, notably Bluebeard, Cain, Henry VIII, more recently M. Landru, executed in France a little more than a year ago for wholesale killing of women he married. If Jezebel and Deliah are to be excused on the grounds of mother-in-law interference or influence, why not expect the male rascals?

MONARCHISTS HOPES SEEM DEAD AMONG AUSTRIAN NOBILITY

VIENNA.—The utter failure of the Ludendorff-Hitler group in Bavaria to react on monarchist elements here, is looked upon as denoting a steadily decreasing reactionary feeling in Austria.

Indeed, many close foreign observers here are now inclined to look upon monarchism as an old theory. Apparently it is going through the same stages in Austria that it has in other countries where republics have succeeded crowns, and if this is to only sporadic upheavals and occasional plots and demonstrations are to be looked for.

In Austria, at least, there always will be a moderately strong monarchist element, but the men who compose it are not of the type to seek banishment and the probable loss of their remaining estates, in a mad endeavor to put some one on a throne.

The members of the young Austrian nobility did not flock to Munich the other night when the great Ludendorff and his right hand man Hitler, former Austrian house painter's assistant, sent out their call for royalists to rally. Even the fiery Oberlanders, these armed irregulars of the Tyrol and Salzburg, failed to rush the border as duly advertised.

Five years of a republic, even though years of vicissitude and uncertainty, have permitted the memory of the Emperor's splendor to fade; the mass of the people are becoming either used to or educated in republican principles, and the workmen's organizations have established themselves strongly. The forces of time and events work against a restoration, and the open royalists are broadly confined to the aristocracy, the old bureaucracy which fed off the Empire, and the church.

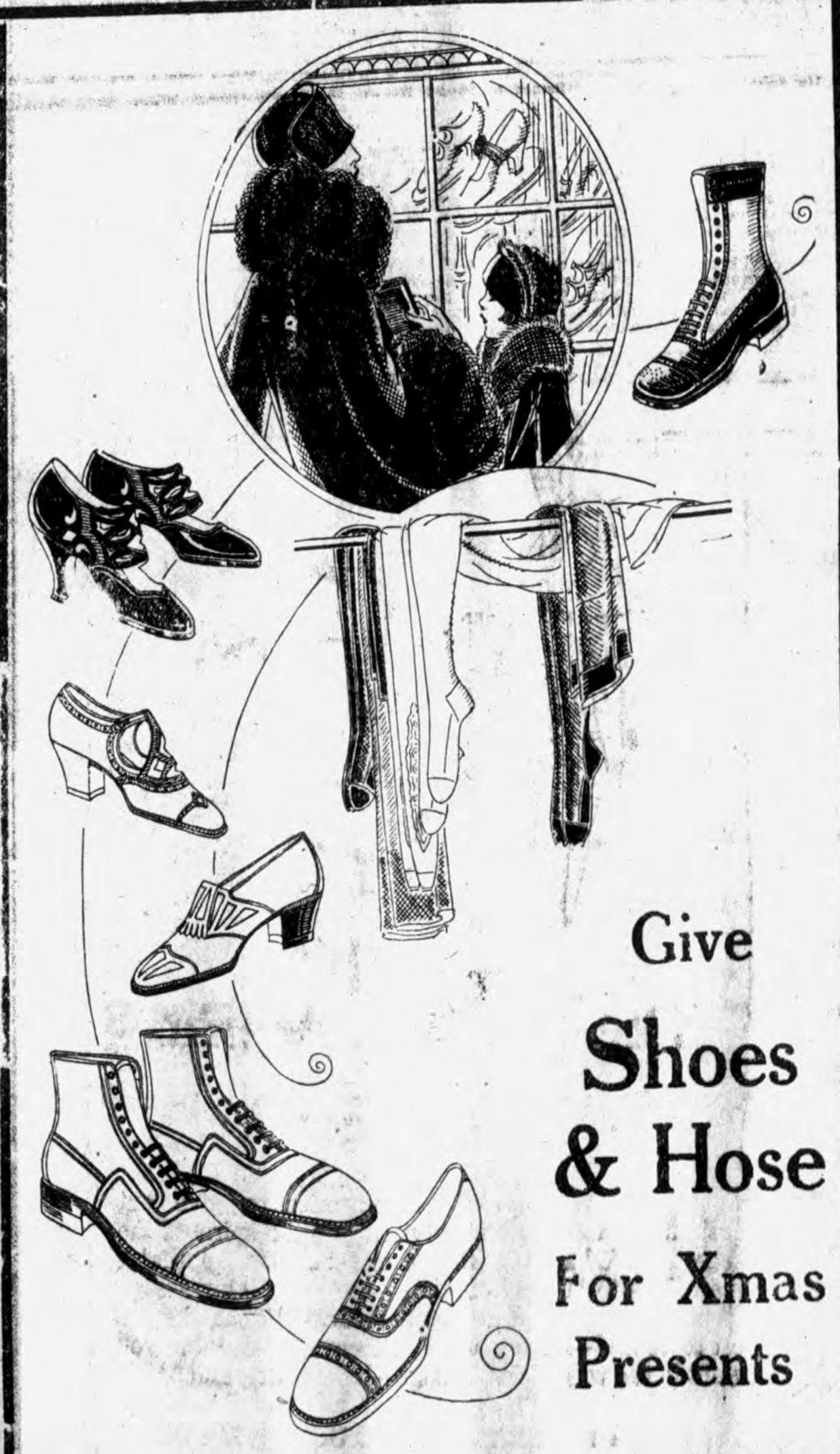

ROAST BEEF DINNERS AND HOME, YULETIDE DREAMS OF BRITONS

LONDON. — Just as the Yankee living in foreign lands day dreams, as Christmas approaches, of turkey dinners that are not to be for him, so the Englishman far from home, hungers for roast beef. Most of these alien dreams go unfulfilled, the dreamers contenting themselves with the thought that one of these Christmases they will return to the old family fireplace or radiator, and eat to their heart's content. But there are other exiles, fortunate of place and pocketbook, who can obey the annual impulse to go home for Christmas. Their numbers seem on the increase.

The British Isles are the local point for numbers of Englishmen and Scotsmen who hit the homeward trail from Canada, from India, and South Africa and the other overseas parcels of Empire as the Yuletide comes nigh. This year the homecoming Britons are so numerous that special excursion ships are being run up from South Africa to accommodate them. Three such steamships will arrive at English ports just a few days before Christmas.

Modified Order Permits Broadcasting Germany

BERLIN. — Listening-in is expensive in Germany. The government doesn't permit anyone to have a machine for receiving wireless, who does not pay a fee of 25 gold marks and obtain a permit from the police. The receiving machines now on sale in German shops average in price from 300 to 400 gold marks.

Until the middle of October the government regarded broadcasting with such suspicion that it was prohibited for amusement purposes, and the public was not permitted to have receivers.

For some time the Postoffice Department which controls wireless operations has had considerable income from a service called "Blitzfunk" which was supplied to banks and commercial concerns throughout the republic, and the desire to retain this income has apparently interfered with general permission to establish receiving stations.

BERLIN. — A portrait ad statue of Pope Pius XI recently have been completed. The former was painted by Ernest H. Semler, the Berlin artist, while the statue is the work of Prof. Theodor Georgi of Munich.

Columbia Students turn to Variety of Jobs to Get Money

NEW YORK—Columbia University this year has provided jobs for 2,257 students, of whom 777 are women, according to a report of Miss Ethel A. Breed, in charge of the Appointments Office. The records showed that men students earned money in 72 different ways, including those listed as miscellaneous. Women students earned money in 41 ways. One man underwent blood transfusion, one acted as life-guard, 11 were pullman conductors, two were models, 144 were waiters, one was a furnace man, 20 did manual labor, 90 occupied clerical positions, 12 were employed by a detective agency as plain clothes men, 32 were paymasters, 145 were proctors, 30 were translators, and two were impres.

STRANDED RUSSIANS AWAIT CHANCE TO ENTER AMERICA

CHERBOURG, France.—A numerous body of Russian refugees, headed for the United States, has come as far as this French seaport only to find the emigration quota full, and no immediate hope of entering the land of promise. The band, upon leaving Russia, went to Poland and stayed several months until compelled by the authorities to move on. Constantinople was the next stopping place, but there also they were regarded as undesirable, and sent away. Now, to the number of 200, they have reached Cherbourg and some of them are planning to try to hold out until next June, when new quotas will be operative. In the meantime they are receiving charity.

HIGH COST CAUSE FOREIGNERS TO QUIT GERMAN UNIVERSITIES

BERLIN.—Foreign students are deserting German universities because of the high cost of living in this country. Outsiders must pay more than twice as much for tuition fees as Germans, but the unusual advance in living cost, has been the chief factor in reducing the number of non-Germans in all the universities of the four republic.

Art Treasures France Need Better Protection

PARIS—The recent theft of two rare Gobelin tapestries from the Versailles palace has alarmed government authorities. The curators have not funds enough to police in daily efficient fashion the palaces and museums where art treasures worth billions of francs are kept, but several short-cuts to safety have been proposed.

The first precaution was an order forbidding guards and guides to tell visitors of the great value of the treasures exhibited. "That would be tempting the devil," the curator at Versailles said.

Fixed Customs Disliked by Portuguese President

LISBON—Sanhor Teixeira Gomes, the seventh president of the Portuguese republic, is attracting much attention from the people because of the democratic way in which he goes about his business. He is reported to have said that he does not wish to see his electors from behind the closed windows of his automobile; that he wants to be a president who thinks talks and walks abroad like anyone else.

Homeless Men Scorn Old Time Lodgings

CHICAGO.—The once-famous "flip-house" has suffered a noticeable loss in patronage, for homeless men, even in their periods of unemployment, now demand a hostelry of higher grade, according to the Rev. Dennis J. Dunne, chancellor of the Catholic archdiocese of Chicago.

These men, say, Father Dunne are choosing in increased numbers the lodging houses where baths and the fumigation of clothing are entrance requirements. The change has come about since the enactment of prohibition, according to the chancellor. "Homeless men are saving their money now," explains Father Dunne. "It is surprising how well some of them are living."

URGES PEDESTRIANS TO WALK ON LEFT HAND SIDE OF ROAD

HARRISBURG.—In an effort to reduce the number of accidents to pedestrians on the public highways of this state, the Pennsylvania Motor Federation is urging publicity for the recommendation of the American Automobile Association that persons on the highway, especially at night, face the traffic by walking on the left hand side of the road.

The national association has reached the conclusion, after a study of the situation, that most of the cases when automobiles strike pedestrians at night are due to the driver being partially blinded by the headlights of approaching cars and swinging to the right, failing to see pedestrians.

LONDON PRODUCERS SEEK TO POPULARIZE BRITISH MADE FILMS

LONDON.—The British used to smile at the American custom of picking seven days out of the calendar to stir up interest in sundry things, Fire Prevention Week, Better Babies Week, Whatnot Week. But now the British are acquiring the habit themselves. Or perhaps it is being thrust upon them by press-agents and go-getters and the lively worshippers of the verb "to sell."

The custom slipped into England by the back door, or maybe underneath. The first "week" was set aside for the purpose of getting people to annihilate a few millions of the rats which infest these isles. Hardly anyone got excited over "Rat Week," but now that the cinema manufacturers have instituted "Great British Film Week," and adorned it with appearances of the Prince of Wales and Princess Mary (themselves, not a movie), the public is responding.

It seems that only 15 percent of all the films shown in Britain are of British make; the rest come from America. And in the colonies and dominions of the British Empire, the Yankee movies are even more popular only two or three per cent of the reels being British products. The British National Film League opened its "week" by inviting the Prince of Wales to luncheon, and the prince in a speech recounted what he called the "good points" of the movies.

Christmas Seal Buying Is Urged

Since only a few days are left to buy Christmas seals to aid in the campaign to stamp out tuberculosis, the purchase liberally. The seals are on sale at all of the drug stores. Funds derived from the sale of seals are devoted entirely to control the spread of the disease.

The dead are Percy Back, 17, and Michael Zambito, 18, both of this city.

If the "drunk" fails to show himself at a single service for a period of ten days away from Durham,

he's to be arrested and given a fine or jail sentence in the discretion of the recorder.

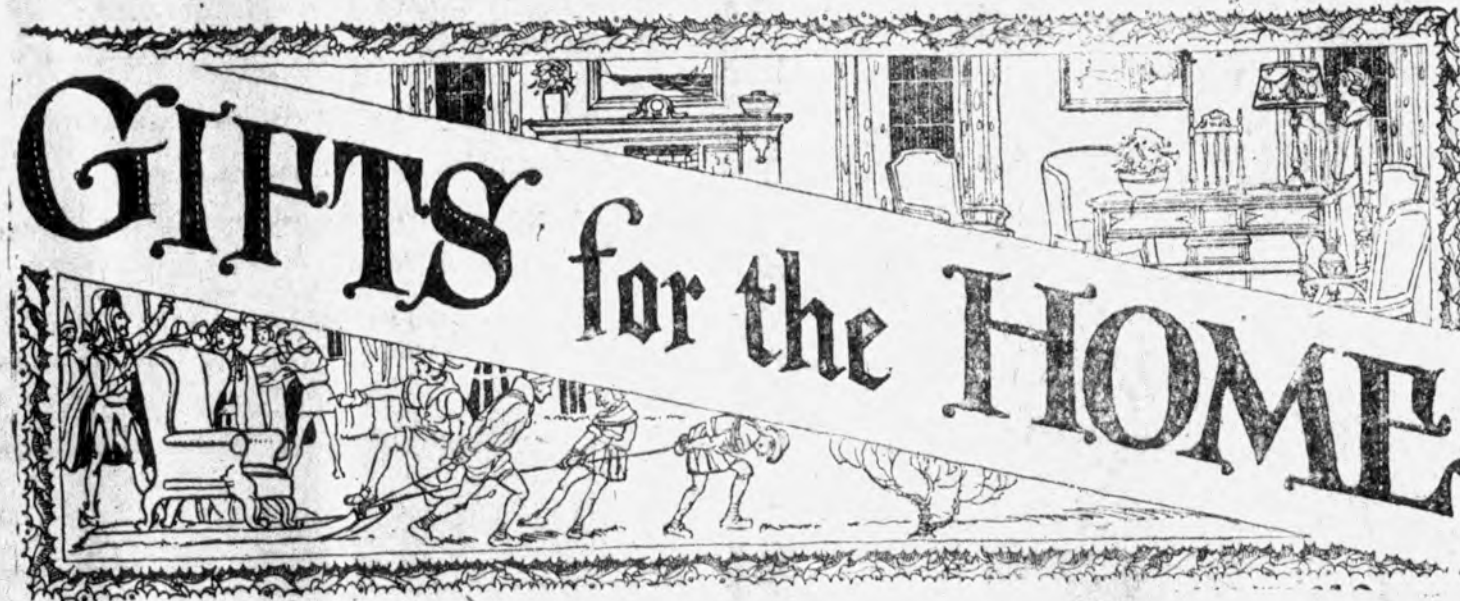
