BUSINESS WORLD SHOWS SPLENDID PROSPECTS 1924

Markets Settle Down to More Stable Basis as Year Comes to End

NEW YORK, Dec. 31.—As the year ends sentiment among business and financial leaders is cheerful, despite the fact that developments within the last 12 months have been some what disappointing.

Remarkably strong buying early in the year reached a climax in the spring. Since then production has fallen off slowly and forward buying has been suspended. The price advances and wage increases of the spring served to revive memories of 1920. A wave of caution and conservatism spread over the country. Speculative position were reduced and hand to mouth buying became the rule. In a word, the country expressed a mild slackening in activity after an upward movement which lasted for about two years.

Situation Favorable.
Bankers regard a recession of this kind as preferable to a sharp downward movement which follows a crisis and emphasized the favorable aspects of existing situation.

Employment is high, stocks of goods are moderate, credit is plentiful and speculative positions are small. Maintenance of a high rate of activity in the building industry is expected; automobile makers report a good demand; and buying of railroad equipment, while hardly likely to be as urgent as during the last year, appears to be moderately good.

In the steel industry the year-end is witnessing the usual shut-downs for repairs. Buying during December, however, was better than expected. Pig iron prices show further signs of having struck bottom, and steel prices remain firm. The trade is inclined to doubt whether production in 1924 will quite equal that during the past year, but expects, nevertheless, a year of good business.

Year of Progress.
Although wheat prices remain at an unprofitable level and certain classes of livestock growers still are in difficulties, the past year has been one of progress in the agricultural districts. Prices for most farm products have been adequate and the purchasing power of the farmer has risen, as evidenced in the large sales of the mail order houses. Wheat growers, furthermore, are coming to see the need for controlling their production and for diversifying the farming operations.

With regard to the foreign situation there is a general tendency to emphasize the importance of the reparations dispute. Occupation of the Ruhr is credited with having dislocated European business and with having slowed down international trade. Most of the foreign exchanges have depreciated.

The man, with the build and strength of a gorilla, declared he couldn't restrain himself when the impulse came on him to kill. He also confessed a murder attempt upon a trained nurse in the Tubercular Hospital near Philadelphia. Five other brutal murders of women in various sections of the country are laid at Denner's door by the police.

The divorce was granted on the grounds of neglect to provide and desertion and will become effective six months from today.

Many Cases In County Court

Tilden, II, as national single tennis champion; Jack Dempsey, heavyweight boxing king; and Johnny Weissmuller, all-around swimming star.

136 PERMITS FOR BUILDINGS ISSUED DURING PAST YEAR

Program Involves The Expenditure of Over Million Dollars

The past year has been one of the best not only in commercial lines in this city but one of the most progressive from the standpoint of building, the total expenditure being nearly \$1,300,000.

A survey compiled from reports of the city building inspector, D. D. Overton, show that 136 permits have been issued during the year for new buildings and repairs in the city proper at an estimated cost of approximately \$175,000. Besides these there are additions to the East Carolina Teachers' College, which is a state project, which will reach above the million dollar mark. There are also under construction just beyond the city limits a hospital and residences, not included in the permits, at an estimated cost of approximately \$100,000.

Bailey Will Comply Dawson's Request For Short Campaign

RALEIGH, Dec. 31.—Fosiah W. Bailey, prospective candidate for governor of North Carolina on the democratic ticket in 1924, will not announce his candidacy at present, he said this morning after reading the dispatch in the morning papers in which John G. Dawson, chairman of the state democratic executive committee, urged that prospective candidates make their campaign for nomination short as it would be for the best interest of the party in the state.

Mr. Bailey also made public a letter addressed to Mr. Dawson in which he acquiesced to Mr. Dawson's desire to postpone the announcement of his candidacy which he had been prepared to make public today.

"I have the utmost regard for Mr. Dawson's endeavors," said Mr. Bailey, "and I am sure that my friends in the state will consider my action prudent under the circumstances."

State Being Freed Of Tick, He Says

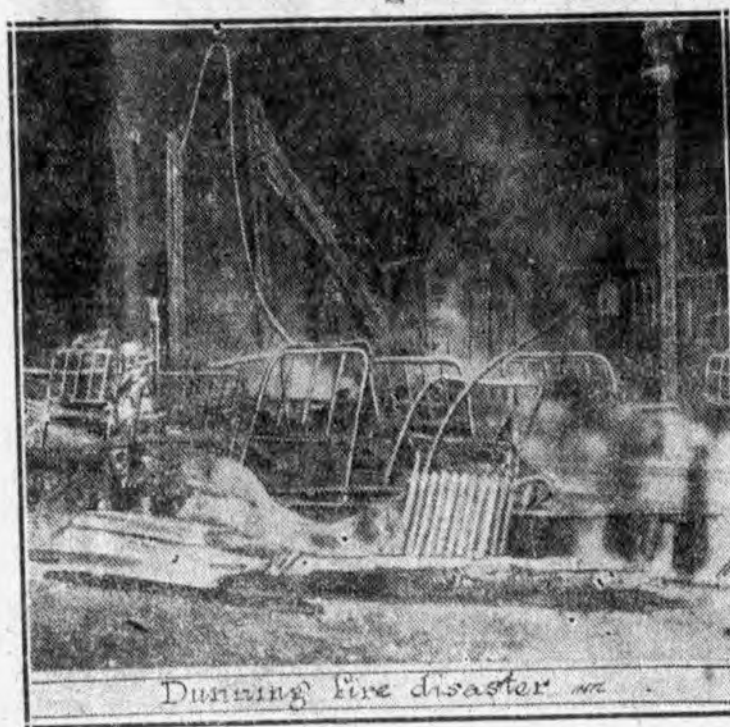
RALEIGH, Dec. 31.—"We are making good progress in eradicating the tick from eastern North Carolina under the zone plan legalized for us by the last General Assembly," said Dr. William Moore, chief of veterinary work for North Carolina State College and the State Department of Agriculture, in a statement issued Saturday. "On our recommendation the Secretary of the United States Department of Agriculture has released, Bertie, Camden, Gates, Hertford, Perquimans and portions of Dare and Beaufort counties from quarantine. This was made effective on and after December 31 by order No. 285 of bureau of animal industry and signed by Secretary Wallace.

"We will be ready to begin work in zone two beginning with the new year. Last year, at the height of our work in the first zone, we had about 75 men employed as inspectors, range riders and supervising veterinarians. The government furnished experienced veterinarians to supervise the work in each county and with the exception of a few herds of cattle on some local farms and some other wild or semi-wild animals in the swamps the first zone has about been cleaned up.

Besides cleaning up the tick in those counties released from quarantine, Dr. Moore said he and his co-workers had found it necessary also to clean up large areas that had been infested due to ticks coming back from infested counties. He said, however, that the tick will be pushed into the sea within three years if the people will co-operate in the movement. Fourteen counties infested with the tick remain in eastern North Carolina.

Farmers Who Study Made Best Yields During Past Year

RALEIGH, Dec. 31.—"If all the farmers of the state who grew corn, cotton, tobacco and wheat, and sweet potatoes last year had done as well as the two thousand or more farmers who attended short courses at the vocational agricultural high schools, they would have increased their income by nearly one hundred and three million dollars," declared Roy H. Thomas, state supervisor of agricultural education, Saturday in announcing plans of the agricultural high schools for the winter. Mr. Thomas asserted that the farmers of the state spent over two hundred and twenty million dollars annually for imported foods and feeds and the increased income which he asserted had been possible during the past year on the five crops would have cut down this bill for outside products by half.

"Last year," asserted Thomas, "over two thousand farmers in sixty counties stopped their work long enough to attend short courses at their agricultural high school in order to learn better methods of growing these crops. That the courses were well worth while is shown by the increased income of this group of farmers as compared with what the farmers of the state as a whole did. As a result of putting into practice what they learned, the short course farmers made 164 more bushels of corn which brought \$14.77 more per acre than the average for the state. The short course farmers made 195 pounds of cotton, 71 pounds of tobacco and 198 bushels more of potatoes to the acre than did the farmers as a whole.

GREENSBORO, Dec. 31.—B. S. Robinson, one of the best known cotton men of this section, died Sunday night at 11:29 o'clock in a Norfolk, Va., hospital, where he had been undergoing treatment.

Work Consolidated At State College Headed DeForest

RALEIGH, Dec. 31.—Due to a change in the method of administering livestock disease control the United States Department of Agriculture has consolidated its work in hog cholera control with that of tuberculosis eradication, according to an announcement made here today by State College authorities. The combined office will be headed by Dr. A. J. DeForest the change becoming effective this week.

Dr. DeForest stated today that he intended to co-operate in every way with the state officials of the department of agriculture and state college in the conduct of his office. He comes to North Carolina for this particular work well-trained, having for more than 16 years served with the Federal Bureau of Animal Husbandry and during the last five years has been livestock commissioner of Vermont. He is a native of Ohio and was educated at Ohio State University. Much of his time since 1907 has been spent in the middle and western states where he became thoroughly familiar with the handling of diseased livestock as well as preventive methods.

LAWRENCE GATLING DOUBLE MURDERER IS STILL AT LARGE

Witnesses Tell Story of Killing of Wife, Friend of Raleigh Man

RALEIGH, Dec. 31.—No trace of Lawrence Gatling, who on Saturday night is alleged to have shot and killed his wife and Owen Stevens, had been found at noon today according to information made public by the police department. Police in all the nearby towns have been informed of the tragedy and are on the lookout of Gatling.

Gatling, according to stories of eye-witnesses to the double tragedy, returned to his house in Hayes-Barton suburb where his wife was staying Saturday night and found Stevens who had gone there it was said to advise Mrs. Gatling that her husband had returned to Raleigh in company with a young woman. Gatling drew his revolver and emptied the contents into Steven's body killing him immediately. He then re-loaded his gun and turned upon Mrs. Gatling who was leaving the house. The first shot wounded her and she fell on the sidewalk and Gatling fired several other shots at her as she lay there.

The coroner of Wake county is making a thorough investigation of the tragedy today and officials are making every effort to locate and apprehend Gatling.

Chinese Bandits Capture One, Wound Two Missionaries

PEKIN, CHINA, Dec. 31.—Followers of a notorious bandit leader Lao Yao Jen captured an American missionary Mrs. Juliana Kilen and wounded two other missionaries Prof. Bernard H. Hoff and Mrs. Hoff in a raid upon the town of Tsao Yang in north Supeh province according to advices received here today. The American legation has taken active steps to bring about the capture of the bandits and liberate Mrs. Kilen. The Chinese government has offered a bounty for the capture of the bandit leader dead or alive. Mrs. Kilen is 50 years old and her home is in North Field, Minn. Prof. and Mrs. Hoff were married here last August. They were former residents of North Dakota.

The three missionaries were representatives of the church of Lutheran Brethren in the United States.

Peake Back In Penitentiary Today

RALEIGH, Dec. 31.—J. L. Peake, who was convicted of second degree murder in Winston-Salem in connection with the killing of H. B. Ashburn on the night of December 7, 1921 and escaped from the state prison farm at Caledonia several months ago, is today back in the state penitentiary here. Peake was arrested a few days ago in Athens, Tenn., and was brought to Raleigh by Warden Sam Busbee and a prison attache last night. He had served one year of a thirty year sentence when he escaped.

Mrs. Ayldett Dies In Elizabeth City

ELIZABETH CITY, Dec. 31.—Mrs. E. F. Ayldett, age 61, died suddenly at her home here early today. Death was caused by heart trouble. The attack occurred last night shortly after she had retired after returning from church services. Prior to her marriage 40 years ago she was Miss Ettie Briggs, of Raleigh.

Permits to Operate Granted Recently Secretary of State

RALEIGH, Dec. 31.—The Carolina Light and Power Company has been granted permission by the Secretary of State to amend its charter to allow its capital stock to be changed from par value to no par value stock and increased from \$8,500,000 to \$12,000,000. Other permits to operate granted by the secretary of state are as follows: Cooke Chevrolet Company of Wadesboro to buy and sell motor vehicles with a capital stock of \$100,000 subscribed by L. D. Robinson, Jr., E. M. Cook, and J. L. Register, all of Wadesboro; the Ko-Mo-Supply Company of Charlotte to change its name to Glasgow-Stewart and Company and to increase its capital stock from \$100,000 to \$300,000.

Federals, Rebels Clash at Camaga

BROWNSVILLE, TEXAS, Dec. 31.—Telephone reports from American army officers at Ring Gold brought reports of fighting between the federal troops and rebels at Camaga Matamoros. The town is garrisoned by a small detachment of federal troops from Matamoros. No reports of the results of the battle have been received up until noon but the American officers stated that heavy firing took place early in the day.

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HENRY FORD

Henry Ford, who as candidate for President presented "a fascinating and terrifying possibility," represented in the minds of the masses somewhat of a nebulous mystery. His success as a politician depends largely upon remaining nebulous. For this reason, he announced that he would not sign any platform, he would tend to become a reality and lose his heroic, idealistic position. The indefinite underlined element in Ford was his largest asset. Of course, he was a good business man and mechanic when it came to the automobile business. But the nation is not looking for simply a business manager and master mechanic. In this, we are overlooking the contention that Ford is primarily an inventor-mechanic, and that his business affairs have been in the hands of business experts in his employ. We do know he is especially fond of system and economy, and that he has been successful in picking his departmental managers.

If the principal business of Washington were manufacture and distribution of a cheap type of automobile, we do not know of a better man to be elected to the job. But the Amer-

ican Government is a delicately constructed machine of vast proportions and innumerable details of a nature that Mr. Ford knows little about. Admittedly, he lacks the background that a decent knowledge of and consistent respect for American history and tradition would supply. They say that when Mr. Ford is left alone, he has some good thoughts; but Presidents, of all men, are never left alone. From morning until night, somebody is whispering something in their ear. A thousand theories are suggested, and a man of piercing insight and superior knowledge is necessary for selection of that theory which can be translated into practice without blowing up the machinery of government. Mr. Ford would not have time to ascertain the working theory through experimentation, as he did with reference to the automobile.

Once Mr. Ford signed a platform, once he made his position plain in regard to foreign affairs, prohibition and numerous other matters, he would then be classed and catalogued—and stand still less chance of securing the nomination of either the Democratic or Republican Conventions. His strength lay very largely in the fact that he had been rated as non-party and non-partisan. Conventions do not nominate that kind of a man. He must be a party man—one who will give some promise of building up and sustaining party machinery. Mr. Ford has good enough sense to see this. And he knew that for him to commit himself would destroy the popular vision.

As to Mr. Ford's sudden announcement that he favors Mr. Coolidge for the Presidency, about the only effect and significance of this as one sees it is that Mr. Ford definitely makes clear he is not a candidate himself. As popular as Mr. Ford has been as a candidate, his swing to Mr. Coolidge will not be an asset for Coolidge. It may even be a liability.

When it comes to one man directing the vote of the masses, a man of Mr. Wilson's type is necessary—a deep, earnest student of affairs and government. Mr. Ford is not that type.

He has said he is a poor politician. Outside of the question of Muscle Shoals, he manifestly is.

She can be as independent, as assertive as the modern woman who flaunts her independence to the nauseous eyes of the male, and yet she need not lose any of the soft clingingness, and feminine gentleness—things which are a natural inheritance and power of womankind."

But if the modern woman, as she paints herself to be, is a fore-runner of future woman-kind, then civilization is safe—men won't fight over her. Yet, if I may be allowed this heresy, I had rather empires would still rise and fall because of a woman's sweet smile and the light in her eyes. Civilization won't be safe but who cares—life is short and stupid, so let's make it interesting, if we can."
