ABERDEEN CHIEF POLICE KILLED BY NEGRO YESTERDAY

Slayer of Police Officer Is Killed By Deputy M. B. Genes

ABERDEEN, N. C., Jan. 11.—W. C. Page of the Aberdeen police department, was shot and instantly killed here yesterday by a one-armed negro believed to be Henry Howard, of Danville, Va., who the police chief had just arrested as a suspect in connection with recent robberies at Raeford, N. C. Grabbing up a revolver which he said fell from out of Chief Page's pockets as he slumped over dead in the front seat of an automobile in which the prisoner was being taken to jail, M. B. Genes, who was accompanying the police chief as driver of the automobile, fired on the negro and instantly killed him.

Chief Page, Genes said, did not search the negro when he was taken into custody. He was placed in the rear seat of the automobile. The prisoner commanded that the automobile be stopped, drew the pistol from a pocket and fired four bullets into Chief Page, according to Genes, who thereupon seized the pistol which opportunely fell from the police chief's pocket and fired at the negro.

Convicts Reported In State Rebellion At Coal Mines Now

MONTEVALLO, ALA., Jan. 11.—150 state convicts are reported to be in a state of rebellion at the Thomas-Weller Mining Company's coal mine near here. The reports are to the effects that yesterday the convicts caused considerable damage to the machinery and trucks by the use of dynamite. Company officials admit that the damage has been done by the convicts.

State officials have refused to discuss the mutiny which has been reported to the state board for the supervision of convicts at Montgomery.

Asbell Succeeds Norris As Head Of Local Cotton Mill

Mr. J. A. Asbell, of Langley, South Carolina, arrived yesterday to assume management of the Greenville Cotton Mills succeeding Mr. W. H. Norris, recently resigned.

Mr. Norris has been superintendent of the mills here since establishment about 10 years ago and the concern has shown steady growth under his management.

Mr. Asbell was formerly superintendent of the Langley Mills in Langley, S. C., and is an expert in his line.

Senator Watson Not Be Candidate

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—Senator James E. Watson will not be a candidate for the Republican presidential nomination.

This announcement leaves the way clear for President Coolidge to enter the Indiana presidential primary.

Senator Watson issued only this statement:

"I have concluded not to be a candidate for the Republican nomination for president."

NINE PERSONS HURT IN TRAIN WRECK IN ALABAMA

HUNTSVILLE, Ala., Jan. 11.—Nine persons were injured, one seriously, in a wreck of Southern Railway Memphis Special number 26 east bound for New York early today near Chase, Ala., six miles from this city.

D. L. Thorne is in a Huntsville hospital, suffering from a sprained back and probably internal injuries while the other injured were able to continue their journey. Four cars were reported to be in a ditch.

Co-Ops Make Third Payment 1922 Crop

RALEIGH, Jan. 11.—The North Carolina Tobacco Growers Association yesterday mailed out checks for \$4,000,000 to 50,000 farmers in the "Old Belt," which comprises a part of Western North Carolina and Virginia, as the third payment on the 1922 crop. With this payment, officers of the association stated, the farmers have received 100 per cent of the bankers value placed upon the 1922 crop. It was stated that the association still had on hand several million pounds of the 1922 crop.

Fine Record With Hampshire Hogs Made in the County

A very fine record with Hampshire hogs has just recently been brought to light on the farm of Dr. W. W. Dawson, chairman of the Pitt County Commissioners and G. T. Gardner, cashier of the Bank of Grifton.

These Pitt county men started with a lot of 18 pigs on the 19th of March, 1923, and they were killed on December 19th, which gave them a growing period of 9 months. The gross weight of this lot of Hampshire was 4307 pounds, with a net weight of 3618 pounds. It will be seen that only 16 per cent was lost in dressing this lot of hogs, which, in the light of the usual shrinkage, is considered excellent.

These hogs had permanent pastures during the spring and summer and had access to the bean fields during the fall.

"What do you expect to do another year with your hampshires," was the question put to Mr. Gardner. Said he: "I am going to enlarge and not only continue to raise for the general market, but will also sell registered pigs."

Further commenting on this project to H. L. Smith, Secretary of the Pitt County Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Gardner said: "This is one of the direct results of the Pitt county automobile tour through some of the southern states during the summer of 1922."

GREENSBORO, Jan. 11.—An investigation is being conducted here by E. D. Kuykendall, city prosecuting attorney, to determine what stores of Greensboro conducted prize lotteries during the Christmas season, this being against the law according to a recent ruling by Attorney General Manning. One warrant already has been issued with indications that others will follow.

CREW RECUED AT SEA FROM SINKING VESSEL

BOSTON, Jan. 11.—The rescue of the crew of the British schooner Margaret G. of Bridgetown, Barbadoes, was reported in a wireless message received today from the United Fruit Company steamer Esparta. The schooner, the message said, was water-logged and abandoned in latitude 24 north, longitude 80 west, or 18 miles east of Key West. She was bound from Mobile to Gibara, Cuba.

Florida Officers Capture Bill Ashley Leader of Outlaws

WEST PALM BEACH, FLA., Jan. 11.—Bill Ashley, one of the leaders of the Ashley band of outlaws, was captured in the Florida everglades near Gomez station early today according to a telephone report received at the sheriff's office here about ten o'clock this morning. The apprehension of John Ashley is expected to follow as the two brothers are known to have been together.

Only meagre details of the capture were reported here and it is not yet known whether the outlaw voluntarily surrendered or was taken after a battle with the officers. The sheriff and his deputies began closing in on John and Bill early this morning after it was learned that the two desperados were heavily armed and no doubt prepared to make a last stand.

Brigadier Butler Well Pleased With Clean-Up Campaign

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 11.—Before leaving for his home early today snatched a few hours sleep, Brigadier Butler expressed his satisfaction at conditions as found at the end of the fourth day of his campaign to rid the city of vice and crime.

He stated that it was his belief that most of the lawbreakers had been run out of the city but that the biggest job was to keep them out.

No time was lost yesterday in filling the vacancies resulting from the suspension of six lieutenants and two sergeants owing to failure to clean up their districts within the prescribed 48 hours. These replacements, said General Butler, have been given a like period of 48 hours to clean up the district and unless results are shown they will go as those before.

While General Butler was busy engaged yesterday in shaking up the personnel of his forces raids were being conducted on questionable establishments in various parts of the city.

Girls' Basket Ball Team Will Play Tarboro Tonight

The girls' basket ball team of the High School begins its season Friday night with a game with Tarboro. Followers of the game are looking toward this game with interest, not only, because the game will indicate the strength of the present team, but also because of the fact that the new rules as adopted by the State of North Carolina will be used.

In May 1923, the Conference on Athletics and Physical Education for Women and Girls met in Washington, at which time new standards were formulated. The new rules as worked out by the committee and adopted by the State chairman call for six players, three of whom are guards and three forwards, one of the guards acting as a center in case of a toss. The court is divided into two divisions. The new rules provide a clause which reads, "a goal from the field shall count two points, except for a two-hand overhead shot, when the basket if made, shall score but one point." Practically all the technical fouls are changed.

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 11.—The Mexican revolution has been crowded out of the minds of the people since the front pages of the newspapers for the past few days have given spread to a prophecy of a British prognosticator that Mexico City will be destroyed by an earthquake and volcanic eruption tomorrow.

As a result of this warning fear has gripped the minds of the ignorant and superstitious classes and the churches have been crowded. Many are preparing to leave the city on short notice in order to escape the falling buildings.

MUCH DAMAGE DONE BY CYCLONE IN BIRMINGHAM

BIRMINGHAM, ALA., Jan. 11.—The Concrete Steel Company plant was partly demolished and a dozen homes were damaged and much property loss was caused by high winds which struck the south side of the city at 4 o'clock this afternoon. The storm assumed the intensity of a cyclone in several seconds. Trees were felled and wires were split. A steel tower used in the building of an apartment house at the corner of Sycamore street and Highland avenue was blown over. The damage is estimated at \$20,000.

STRIBLING AND GREB MAY STAGE BOUT AT FORT BRAGG

FAYETTEVILLE, Jan. 11.—Plans are being formulated and definite offers will be made by Lieut. Frederick E. Coyne to Young Stribling, Georgia pugilist, and Harry Greb, to stage a bout at Fort Bragg about the middle of February. Lieut. Coyne states that his plans have not passed the embryonic stage as yet but that if he can get the two boxers to agree the match probably will take place.

BODY MISSING AMERICAN AVIATOR REPORTED FOUND

LONDON, Jan. 11.—A body believed to be that of Lawrence B. Sperry, American aviator who has been missing since December 13, was found today at a place called the Gap, near Rye in Sussex. The body which was lying on the shore when discovered has not yet been definitely identified but the garments are said to correspond with those worn by him.

An agent of the Sperry Company went to the Sussex shore to view the body and reported that he was unable to identify it as that of Lawrence B. Sperry, American aviator missing since early in December.

Negroes Hold Up Bank Teller And Escape With \$44,500

KANSAS CITY, MO., Jan. 11.—Several negroes held up the teller of a main street bank at the door of the bank shortly before noon today and escaped with \$44,500.

Oil Companies Have No Intention Complying De La Huerta Mandate

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—American oil companies with property in the Tuxpan district have no present intention of complying with the mandate of Adolphus De La Huerta, leader of Mexican revolutionary forces, that the companies lend him 20,000 pesos or approximately \$10,000 each, spokesmen for the companies announced today.

120 Women Granted Nurse Certificates

GREENSBORO, Jan. 11.—Each of the 120 young women who took the trained nurse's examination here early in December were granted certificates according to a report made here today by Mrs. Z. V. Coyers, secretary of the state board of examiners. The result of these examinations established a new record according to statements made by the board.

The 120 applicants represented hospitals in the various states from New York to Florida.

Lent Suspended From Duty Today Pending Investigation

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—W. F. Lent district manager of the Veterans Bureau in New York was suspended from duty by Director-General Hines today pending investigation of charges that liquor parties have been held in the New York officers and that on one occasion liquor was carried to a dinner party in a hotel in a Veterans Bureau ambulance.

Edward Olmstead, who has been associated with John F. Oryan in his investigations for the Senate Veterans Bureau Committee, has been sent to New York to take charge of the office there. Lent will not be removed from the service until a complete investigation into the charges has been made.

ENTERS SUIT AGAINST CHEMICAL COMPANY FOR DEATH OF BULLOCK

GREENSBORO, Jan. 11.—Lizzie Bullock, administratrix of the estate of William Bullock, has commenced suit against the American Agricultural Chemical Company for \$25,000 damages for the death of William Bullock who it is alleged was killed in November when a pile of acid fell on him. The complaint alleges that the man was forced to work under dangerous conditions and as a result was killed.

POLITICS VS. TAX REDUCTION

The stage has now been reached when each of the three groups in Congress has its tax-reduction bill. The administration has its program as outlined by Secretary Mellon, Mr. Garner has introduced a substitute because the Mellon program is not acceptable as a whole to the Democrats and the Insurgents through Mr. Frear comes up with still another plan because neither of the other two are acceptable to his group, and the public in the meantime is waiting and wondering when a tax reduction will become a reality.

The main fear for the tax reduction legislation, as we see it, is the fact that this is a presidential campaign year and each party fearing lest it add prestige to the other is hold-

ing out while the masses suffer the consequences. But for the fact that 1919 was a presidential year no doubt the Republicans would have accepted the Wilson administration tax reduction program with amendments and the present Congress could take one of the programs now before it and amend it so as to be acceptable to all parties and thereby give relief to the people who are now staggering under an excessive tax burden were it not for politics which unfortunately seem to take priority over the needs of the country.

Not until our lawmakers realize that they were sent to Washington to legislate in the interest of all the American people instead of to block legislation can we hope for relief for so long as politics holds both ends of the twist the public which occupies the center may expect to be strangled.

Reports of the North Carolina Department of Agriculture show that calcium arsenate dusting to kill the boll weevil last year resulted in an increase of as high as 454 pounds of seed cotton to the acre in some of the best. The method of dusting is discussed in circular number 137 which the department is distributing free of charge to all those who write for them. Farmers should avail themselves of this opportunity to gain information which will prove of great value to them.

If the condition of our banks is a barometer to the condition of our county, we are better off than we have been in years judging from the statements recently published.

Now that there are enough Muscle Shoals propositions for each group in Congress to select its preference it seems that it is about time for the arguments to begin.

ments in Australia to relieve the monotony of isolated life, inevitable in a land of such vast distances, are the traveling libraries instituted by Western Australia, according to reports just made public.

Under the scheme a case of books mostly fiction—is sent out to institutions which are set up in small settlements and become the center of exchange. Most of these are centrally situated, but often, the people travel long distances for the volumes.

Each case, containing approximately 50 books, is called a library. In some instances they must be transported many miles on camel's backs. The case remains at the station until the books have gone the rounds of the entire district. Then the library makes another journey to some other center and a fresh one arrives. About 300 of these libraries now are working around a circuit in the western state.

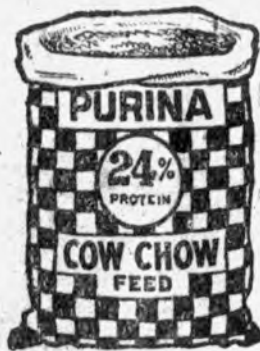

SCIENTIST CLAIMS HE CHANGED BABY MALE FROG INTO A FEMALE

KOENIGSBERG, East Prussia.—Roosters may some day be transformed into hens and thus help increase the egg supply if promises of scientists are fulfilled. The promises are held out after several years of experiments with bugs, rats, guinea pigs and frogs.

The trick of developing a regulation, sure-enough female toad from a youngster who started out in the world as a male has actually been accomplished, it was announced here, and further experiments are being carried on with the view of bringing about perfection in these newest of freaks of nature. The discovery, announced by Professor Harms, of Koenigsberg, has attracted much attention in the scientific world, particularly among other experimenters who have been working for years on this particular sex problem.

Since Prof. Harms let the world know of his successes, with the humble toad, scientists from various parts of Europe have been flocking to his work room here to hear the details of the transformation. The trick, it is said, is quite simple, after once nature's ways have been uncovered.

Other scientists, including Professor Steinach, of Vienna, who claims successes with gland operations on human beings, and Professors Hands and Schultz, have been experimenting along the same lines for years, principally with guinea pigs, rats and mice, and while they nearly reached their goal on several occasions, Old Dame Nature refused to be outdone by up-to-date scientists and held onto her secrets of the ages. Other scientists, spurred on by Prof. Harms' discovery, have started anew their experiments with roosters.

Man and Lightning Equally To Blame For Forest Fires

Lightning share equal responsibility in the fact that forest fires in California were more destructive during the past year than in any other state, according to a report issued by the United States forest service here.

More fires were started in national forests of California than in any year since 1917. In a total of 1,367 fires nearly 50 percent were attributed to lightning, the rest to human carelessness. And of the man-caused fires, tobacco smokers started 358, or 50 percent, and campers 117, or 16 percent. Railroads,

brush-burners, lumbering and incendiaries accounted for the rest. Eighty-six percent of all the California fires in national forests were extinguished by forest rangers and their co-operators before more than 10 acres had been covered by flames. Forest officers obtained convictions against 120 violators of state and federal fire laws.

"The 'tailor-made' cigarette and the unextinguished match continue to be the greatest enemies of our forests," said District Forester Paul G. Redington. "It is surprising also to note the number of fires started by careless campers."

"The forest service would regret exceedingly to have to issue orders restricting the public use of our national forests, which cover the greater part of the mountain regions of the state and constitute a most popular playground. But if such action is taken, the public will have only itself to blame. One thing is certain, we have to reduce the number of man-caused fires, and if educational methods fail to produce the desired results, the government is prepared to take more stringent measures."

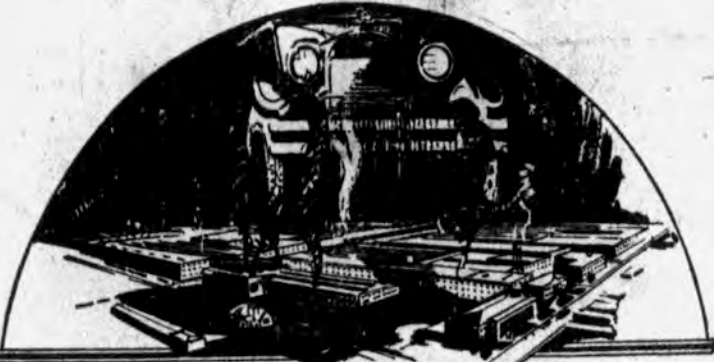
