## BETHEL ELECTRIC CURRENT TO START THIS AFTERNOON

### Lucy Williams Turns Over Switch At Local Plant At 4:30

The electric transmission line between Greenville and Bethel is practically completed and there is every indication that Bethel will begin to receive its electric power from the Greenville plant today. It is planned to turn on the current in Bethel this afternoon provided the line tests are satisfactory, stated Supt. Williams of the Water and Light Commission.

Little Miss Lucy Williams, daughter of Supt. Williams, will have the honor of throwing on the switch at the local plant at 4:30 this afternoon thereby transmitting light to our sister city.

Bethel will receive current at night only for the next week or ten days pending the completion of the local wiring in the town. After that time the citizens of Bethel will enjoy 24 hour service of the same high quality as is furnished to the consumers in Greenville.

### Gen. Butler Turns His Attention To Banditry in Phila.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 12.—With nearly 1,000 of the city's 1,200 saloons closed and every known disorderly and gambling house closed and bootleggers driven under cover as a result of the intensive campaign against vice, Brigadier Smedley D. Butler head of public safety in the city, today turned his attention to banditry. General Butler stated that he was satisfied that 80 per cent of the places where vice flourished before the drive had been wiped out.

In making his announcement General Butler said, "When we say we are going to turn our attention toward banditry we do not mean that we are going to relax our vigilance against vice. We have most of the saloons and dives closed and we are going to see that they stay closed."

### Cox Mill Road Opened For Travel During Day

The Cox Mill hard surfaced road was opened to the public for travel today. The road extends from this city to Cox Mill a distance of seven miles and will add greatly to the convenience of those in that section of the county. It also affords a much better road from this city to Vanceboro and New Bern than heretofore.

## LAST YEAR TOBACCO PRODUCTION MUCH GREATER THAN 1922

### Bright Belt Shows Increase of Over Hundred Million Pounds

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—Production of cigar types of tobacco last year totaled 195,788,000 pounds as compared to 175,001,000 pounds in 1922 the United States Department of Agriculture announced today. The production of cigar tobacco increased in all the tobacco growing states except Ohio, which showed a decrease.

The crop of all snuff and cigarette types jumped from 1,071,001,000 pounds in 1922 to 1,278,998,000 pounds in 1923.

The Burley crop alone showed a jump from 275,601,000 in 1922 to 326,708,000 in 1923.

The Old Belt including portions of North Carolina and Virginia produced 249,500,000 in 1923 compared to 209,708,000 in 1922.

The production in the bright area or new belt including portions of North Carolina, South Carolina and Georgia was 306,647,000 as compared to 199,060,000 in 1922.

### Dave Robertson Will Not Report To Atlanta Club

RICHMOND, Va., Jan. 12.—Dave Robertson, manager of the Richmond club of the Virginia League last season and recently traded to the Atlanta club of the Southern Association for Joe Guion, will not report to the "Crackers" according to a story published in the News Leader today.

The newspaper quotes the big league star as declaring in a telegram that he had never been notified of the deal and that he would not go to Atlanta anyway.

### Dr. Chas. E. Maddry To Speak at Baptist Church Tomorrow

### Gunboat Ordered To Scene of Killing

MANILA, P. I., Jan. 12.—The gunboat Sacramento has been ordered to the province of Surigao where a number of the constabulary have been killed recently by religious fanatics. The boat will proceed from port tomorrow morning.

### Bailey Announces His Candidacy For Governor Today

RALEIGH, Jan. 12.—Josiah W. Bailey, attorney of Raleigh, has definitely announced his decision to be a candidate for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination in the primaries to be held in June of this year, stating in a letter to J. G. Dawson, chairman of the state executive committee, that the platform upon which he would stand would be made public Wednesday January 17.

Mr. Bailey's letter to the state chairman was in answer to one addressed to him by Mr. Dawson that stated that the date when any prospective candidate may announce himself was something that was entirely within the discretion of the committee and not the slightest criticism would come from him.

Mr. Bailey in his reply asserted that he had reached his decision to announce his candidacy after mature consideration.

The two letters followed a statement last week by Chairman Dawson in which he declared that a short campaign would be to the best interest of the Democratic party in the state and urged all prospective candidates to withhold their formal announcements as long as possible.

## Corp. Commission Grants Rate Increase Southern Power Co.

RALEIGH, Jan. 12.—The State Corporation Commission today issued an order allowing the Southern Power Company to increase its present rate charges to those for which it petitioned the commission three years ago. The new rates will become effective February 1 of the present year. The order came as the last document in the petition which the company made some weeks ago for increased rates for electric power furnished to North Carolina mills and power companies.

The increase was petitioned for over three years ago and again late in the fall of 1923. Reports state that the new rates which will be effective February 1, under the commission's order will be about 10 per cent higher than the present rate on most classes of power.

At the time that application for the increase was made in 1923, Mr. J. B. Duke, president of the power company, stated that at the present rate his concern would be unable to continue the development of North Carolina hydro-electric potential facilities. He added however, that whether or not the request was granted that what developments had been made in the state at that time would continue to operate at full blast.

Hearing on the petition of the power company was held early in December at which time only a small number of consumers were present to protest against the increase in rates. The power company after presenting its case through attorneys said that it did not care to file further briefs in the matter. Respondents were given opportunity to file their briefs with the commission and then the petition was taken under consideration.

Only one exception was made by the commission in granting the increase, that being that if after a reasonable period of experiment respondents were of the opinion that the rates produced more than a fair profit that the matter should be reheard by the commission.

## SUMTER TRAGEDY ENDS WITH DEATH MRS. LOUISE CHINA

### Woman Charged With Murder of Husband Dies Pneumonia

SUMTER, S. C., Jan. 12.—The murder case in connection with the death of Dr. Archie China, who was found dead in the bathroom of his home here on Monday morning, was brought to a close yesterday by the death from double pneumonia of Mrs. Louise Davis China who had confessed the shooting of her husband.

Mrs. China, a middle aged society leader of this city was found in an apparently unconscious condition in her home on last Monday morning and it was when the nurse who had been called went to the bathroom to get a wet towel with which to revive the patient that the body of Dr. China was found with the bullet wounds through the head.

Mrs. China remained in an unconscious condition throughout Monday and was moved to a local hospital. On the following day she confessed to her physician that she fired the shots that ended the life of her husband.

On Wednesday it was announced by physicians that the patient had developed double pneumonia and little hope was expressed for her recovery. The guards which had been placed at the door of her room were removed and relatives from Columbia were summoned.

Death came at 3:25 o'clock yesterday afternoon thus staying the hand of the law that had formally charged Mrs. China with murder.

## Thaw Suit Settled For Less Than \$100,000

CHICAGO, Jan. 12.—It was stated today that the suit of \$650,000 against Harry K. Thaw by Fred Gump, Jr., of Kansas City has been privately settled outside the court for less than \$100,000. The suit was the result of charges against Thaw that he had whipped Gump in a New York hotel in 1917 and had subjected him to gross and savage indignities.

So far as has been learned there has been no change in the attitude of Thaw's family in their opposition to his being released from the Pennsylvania hospital for mental and nervous treatment.

## Fiume Is Question Settled Says Papers

ROME, Jan. 12.—Today's newspapers published telegrams from Belgrade asserting that the Fiume question had been settled by the annexation of Fiume to Italy and of Porto Baros Delta to Jugos Slavia with both ports having a common administration.

## Couzens Challenges Mellon To Debate On Tax Reduction

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—Secretary Mellon was challenged today by Senator Couzens of Michigan, for a joint debate on the question of the necessity of reduction of income and surtaxes from 50 to 25 per cent and stopping the issuance of tax exempt securities as a means of diverting capital to productive enterprises.

Meanwhile the House Ways and Means Committee is pushing forward in its work on certain features of the Mellon bill in an effort to be ready to open public hearings on the question Monday.

## THIEVES GET STOCKING CONTAINING \$2,000

MILTON, N. C., Jan. 12.—Two thousand dollars, of which seven hundred was in gold and the balance in bills and currency, was stolen from the Cherokee Indian doctor Ernest Jones this week. The seven hundred gold coins, according to Dr. Jones, was a heritage from his wife which he had never used but kept in a stocking while the balance was the full proceeds of some tobacco which he had grown this season. No clue to the robbers has been found.

## SLIM RETURNS DISCOURAGE PLAYWRITING IN GERMANY

HAMBURG.—Alfred Brust, playwright, is not over-enthusiastic about earning a living in Germany by writing for the stage. His "south seas," recently put on in this city, yielded him in royalties a sum in paper marks equal to five gold pfennigs, or one and a quarter cents. Brust bought a postage stamp and sent it to the theatrical agency which had put on his play, with his thanks for the manner in which the product of his imagination had been handled.

## CHANGE IN MELLON PLAN IS DISCUSSED BY REPUBLICANS

### Garner Declares Failure to Get Majority Alarms G. O. P.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 12.—Realizing that modifications might have to be made in the Mellon tax bill if it is to command a majority in the House Republican members of the Ways and Means committee discussed the question yesterday with Representative Longworth, the party leader.

The conference lasted several hours, but those who participated declined to disclose what had transpired other than to say that the discussion had been general and related solely to procedure. Proposed changes in tax rates, it was said, were not considered, and no decisions were reached.

**Says G. O. P. Alarmed.**

Representative Garner, of Texas, ranking Democrat on the committee, who has a substitute for the Mellon plan, declared he was convinced that the Republicans were alarmed and were seeking to determine whether they will take a licking in the committee or on the floor.

Mr. Garner said he had reliable information that between 60 and 70 Republican members of the House were ready to swing away from the administration plan to the support of the Democratic proposal, which he pointed out, provides a greater cut in the normal tax rates and a smaller reduction in surtaxes than has been proposed by the Treasury Secretary and calls for increased tax exemption.

**Must Compromise.**

Mr. Longworth, who has called for to have the Ways and Means committee report a tax bill by February 11, has expressed the opinion that there must be compromises to meet the demands of the various elements of the Republican party. Some of the party leaders, among them a number of committee members, are of the same belief, although some have taken the position that the essential provisions of the Treasury draft should not be disturbed.

Conferences "for the purpose of being helpful" are to be held by President Coolidge with Senate and House Republican leaders during Congressional consideration of the tax legislation.

The executive held one of these conferences yesterday with Chairman Smoot, of the Senate finance committee, who reported on Senate sentiment for the Mellon tax reduction plan and against soldier bonus legislation. The nature of Senator Smoot's report was not disclosed, but it was indicated Mr. Coolidge regarded it as encouraging.

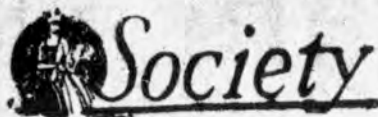

## WHITE MEN THRIVE IN TROPICAL LANDS NORTH AUSTRALIA

SYDNEY, N. S. W.—Medical opinion has done something toward settling the controversy that has raged around the question of whether the northern portions of the Australian continent are suitable for settlement by the white race. The discussion was apropos of the Australian white policy, under which all colored races are excluded except persons who were domiciled here prior to the legislation, and a few admitted under special trade agreements.

Advocates of the introduction of cheap colored labor on an indenture system, or contracts for periods of years, have contended that northern Australia, being tropical, afforded a climate for which white men were constitutionally unfitted. To exclude races able to develop this territory was, they argued, a dog-in-the-manger policy. But medical opinion now says white people not only can live in the tropical north, but thrive there.

A recent pamphlet issued by the Commonwealth Health department stated that after a generation's trial it fairly could be said that white men could work in the tropical areas of Australia without the labor of colored races.

In this tropical life, it was added, the British were holding their own with the other white races.

"As workers in the sugar belt," stated the pamphlet, "the British have proved that in speed and endurance they are the equal of any other race."

In the centers of population as Townsville, men of British nationality predominate overwhelmingly. In the tropical sugar districts northward, there are numbers of Italians and smaller numbers of Greeks, Spaniards, Russian, Maltese and other nationalities. The Eastern races are represented chiefly by Chinese, once present in considerable numbers, and in lesser degree by Japanese and by natives of India.

## Pre-War Gold Standard Urged By This Banker

EDINBURGH.—Addressing the Bankers' Institute here recently, Sir Charles Addis, a director of the bank of England and chairman of the Hong Kong and Shanghai Bank, made a strong plea for return of the gold standard as existing before the war. Upon the issue of the conflict which swung round this project, he said, might depend whether Great Britain was to regain her former supremacy as the financial center of the world, or was to sink to the level of a second-class power.

After reviewing the pre-war standard system Sir Charles said the conditions precedent to its restoration were a cessation of government borrowing, the effective use of the Bank of England's rate-of-discount and the legal limitation of fiduciary note issues. It could not be too widely known, he said, that such was the official British monetary policy. Dealing with the charge that the official monetary policy was a main cause of the existing trade depression and unemployment and an impediment to recovery, he asked "Has any substantial relation of the nature of cause and effect been established between the currency policy and trade depression?"

Sir Charles said the present trade depression had been intensified and extended by the war, but it would be wrong to regard it as altogether abnormal. It seemed to him fantastic, he said, to single out the policy of deflation as the principal cause of unemployment.
