PITT COUNTY POST AMERICAN LEGION IN SPLENDID MEET

Executive Committee Appointed and Other Business Heard

The Pitt County Post of the American Legion held the first meeting of the new year, at the Rotary Club last night. The session was featured by the appointing of an executive committee, reading of communications from members of other posts, committee reports, and plans for an extensive membership drive.

Mr. W. H. Rogers, the new post commander, presided. After a short devotional service the business session was entered into. Mr. J. H. Waldrop, treasurer of the Industrial Exposition recently held in this city, made a report on the success of the Exposition. A committee reported that a present had been sent to Miss Louisa Hubbard a former member and officer of the local post, who was recently married at her home in Virginia. Several communications from members of other posts were read, among them being a message from State Commander, Wiley C. Rodman, of Washington. A report was read on the boxes sent by the post to the boys at Oteen.

Post Commander W. H. Rogers, appointed the following executive committee, D. L. Turnage, K. R. Pace, J. H. Waldrop, C. F. Hardee and D. J. Whitchard.

The members present were glad to learn that National Commander John R. Quinn, will on February 22, visit North Carolina as the guest of the Clyde Bolling Post No. 55 of Winston-Salem. Every Legionnaire in the state is invited to hear him. The local post is planning to send a large delegation.

Dr. A. M. Schultz and J. H. Waldrop, reported that they are planning to secure a picture of the National convention held in San Francisco, which will be shown at an early date.

A request from Welfare Officer, K. T. Futrell, asking the Post to help in the community budget for the poor and needy was discussed and referred to the executive committee.

An extensive membership with a 100 per cent enrollment as its goal will be launched at an early date. The entire membership of the Post will be divided into squads with a captain, in an effort to secure the membership of every ex-service man in the county.

A most tempting luncheon was served which was thoroughly enjoyed by every one attending.

Coolidge Addresses Anti-Saloon Delegates

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—Soaked and under the cover of umbrellas the delegates here to celebrate the fourth anniversary of the enforcement of the Eighteenth Amendment and convention of Anti-Saloon League tramped to the White House where they were rewarded by a short address of President Coolidge who declared that there is no such thing as liberty without observance of the law. After the speech the delegation partly sheltered from the rain under the north portico of the executive mansion held a short song and prayer service.

MAN WHO CUT OFF CHILD'S HANDS SENTENCED FOR LIFE

MANCHESTER, Jan.—Sentences of imprisonment for life are rarely imposed on prisoners in England, except in cases where the sentence of death has been commuted. Justice Branson, however, did not hesitate imposing a life imprisonment sentence recently on a man who was charged with having cut off both hands of his step-daughter, four and one-half years old.

The story of the crime was described by the judge as the most horrible he had ever heard. During the hearing two women jurors fainted and there were tears in the judge's eyes.

Complete reports will be made at the meeting regarding the proposed ship line advocated by Governor Morrison.

Dukes Contribute To Guilford Endowment

HIGH POINT, Jan. 16.—Announcement has been made here by E. Elwood Cox, chairman of the board of trustees of Guilford College that J. E. Duke and B. N. Duke have each contributed \$25,000 to the endowment fund which is now being raised for the college.

The college now has an endowment fund of \$200,000 and a campaign is in progress to raise it to half a million, \$100,000 of this will be given to the Rockefeller Foundation and the balance must be raised locally, \$50,000 already has been obtained.

Unknown Parties Entered Winterville Stores Last Night

The store of B. D. Forrest Bros., and the Winterville Drug Store were entered last night by unknown parties who escaped with only a few articles of minor importance.

It is believed that the robbers were searching for money. The Drug Store was entered by the breaking of a window while the Forrest store was entered by the opening of the rear door. Nothing worthy of mention has been missed from the drug store and only about four or five dollars from the cash drawer of Forrest Bros.

BERLIN TRAIN RIDES CHEAPER AND MORE COMFORTABLE NOW

ZERLIN, Jan.—Since cold weather came in with a blast many Berliners have found it much cheaper to ride back and forth in the suburban trains than to sit at home in the evening. Holders of monthly tickets may ride as often as they care to on the government owned steam lines which run all about the city.

Officials attribute the increased night travel of late to the fact that many men and women find coal and gas or electricity too expensive these days and spend the evenings comfortably in heated, well lighted cars reading their favorite books.

Halo About Sun Creates Sensation In Mexico City

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 16.—Business of the entire city practically stopped for a short time around noon yesterday at the appearance of a vari-colored halo about the sun. The national colors of green, white and red were astonishingly vivid in the halo and caused great excitement among the superstitious classes who had not forgotten the excitement caused last week by the prophecy that Mexico City would be destroyed this week by an earthquake.

Funeral Services For Dr. H. G. Hill Held This Afternoon

MAXTON, Jan. 16.—The body of H. G. Hill, last active chaplain of the Confederate army and former moderator of the Southern Presbyterian General Assembly, today lay in state in the Presbyterian church here of which he was pastor for over 39 years. From 11 until 2 o'clock the body lay in front of the altar. Funeral services took place at 3 o'clock this afternoon.

Known Death Toll 30 From Japanese Quake

TOKIO, Jan. 16.—Reports received here from the country districts south west of Tokio, Yokohama and the Fujiyama mountain district have brought the known death toll of yesterday's earthquake to 30. Hundreds of houses, chiefly those already damaged by the earthquake of September 1, were shaken down or badly damaged by Tuesday morning's quake. Railway traffic and other communications suspended immediately following the shock have been restored.

Blue Laws Will Be Enforced Twin-City

WINSTON-SALEM, Jan. 16.—"Blue Laws" are being enforced at Winston-Salem, it is said. The city authorities have decided that the statutes must be enforced and as a result stores, soft drink stands have been notified to remain closed. Last Sunday one store was haled to court for remaining open.

Power Companies Are Now Preparing New Proposal for Shoals

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—The Southern Power Companies that recently submitted an offer to the government to develop power of the Muscle Shoals project are today preparing a new proposal in which they agree to undertake the manufacture of nitrate and fertilizer. The supplementary offer will be submitted within the next four or five days it was learned today.

It is the wish of the power companies that the offers for the development of power and the manufacture of nitrate and fertilizer be considered separately by the committee as each of the undertakings will be under different corporations created by the power companies. In this manner the power companies are making the government two complete proposals, one for power and the other for the manufacture of nitrate and fertilizer.

HAM-RAMSAY TO BEGIN MEETING IN GREENVILLE APRIL

Five Weeks' Services to Be Held in Forbes and Morton's Warehouse

All of the ministers of the churches and one laymen from each church met on Monday morning at the Chamber of Commerce rooms to meet with Mr. Ramsay, director of music and business manager of the Ham-Ramsay evangelistic party to hear from him some of the plans for the union meeting to be held in April. Mr. Ramsay came over from Washington with Mr. Gardner, rector of the Episcopal church, who was allowed to speak of the benefits of the meeting at Washington, which he did in very enthusiastic language.

Mr. Ramsay stated that the date for the meeting will be April 15th, to extend five weeks. He then spoke of the plans for the churches to use in preparation and during the meeting. The following committees are needed: Music, ushers, prayer meetings, nursery, publicity, finance, tabernacle. A general chairman for the whole campaign is also needed. He spoke of the saving to Greenville by securing the bench rests and electric globes that are now in use at Washington, and he was authorized to secure these for use here.

All of the churches will hold their regular morning services throughout the meeting with the exception of the last Sabbath. Two services will be held daily, one in the morning at 10, and the other at 7:30 p. m. All of the merchants will be asked to close their stores for the morning service for just one hour, 10-11. This is being done in Washington now, and it is hoped that this will be done from the start in Greenville to give the meeting the very best support.

Mr. Ramsay stated that the financial obligations will be taken care of in the very easiest possible way, and every expense saved where possible. The only persons needed for this work are a chairman and treasurer. Mr. Ramsay and Mr. Ham assume the responsibility for the raising of this fund. No high pressure methods are to be used, and the only offering for the party will be an entirely voluntary one.

After the meeting, a visit was made to the Forbes-Morton warehouse which will be used through the courtesy of the owners. The offices will be used by a nursery, where competent women will take care of the babies while the mothers attend the services. Mr. Ramsay made some suggestions with reference to the seating, and expressed the belief that the entire warehouse will be needed before the meeting is over. A choir loft will be built back of the pulpit to accommodate at least 200 people.

The ministers then escorted Mr. Ramsay and Mr. Gardner to the Proctor Hotel, where they were dining as the guest of the Ministerial Union. The ministers and two laymen from each church are called to meet in the Chamber of Commerce on Thursday morning at 10, to select the committees.

Cruiser Tacoma On Blanquillas Reef Asks Immediate Aid

GALVESTON, Texas, Jan. 16.—The United States light cruiser Tacoma is aground and in distress on Blanquillas reef 16 miles off Vera Cruz and is sending out distress calls according to advices received at the hydrographic office here. Wireless messages from the Tacoma appealing to the United States Consul at Vera Cruz for two strong tugs or steamers within two hours were intercepted by the naval station here.

The first message received at 6:29 was "Tacoma aground on Blanquillas reef near Vera Cruz. S. O. S. Need help immediately."

The second message addressed to the United States Consul at Vera Cruz read, "If two strong tugs or steamers come soon may be able to pull off reef. If two hours delay, may be too late."

Efforts are being made by the hydrographic office here to get in touch with the Tacoma. The Tacoma which has been patrolling Mexican waters since the recent revolutionary disturbances in Mexico left here Sunday morning for Vera Cruz.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—The light cruiser Richmond en route from New Orleans to Panama has been instructed to go to the assistance of the Tacoma which is aground on Blanquillas reef 16 miles off Vera Cruz. Whether or not the crew of the Tacoma are in danger was not apparent from the messages. Another rescue vessel will probably be dispatched to assist the distressed cruiser. The first calls for help from the Tacoma stated that the vessel struck the reef sometime during the night and was in need of immediate help.

STATE FORESTRY ASSOCIATION TO MEET IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, N. C., Jan. 16.—Plans are being made here for the convention of the North Carolina Forestry Association which will convene on February 20. The association is carrying forward a program for forestry preservation in North Carolina. Colonel R. R. Cotton of Bruce is president with Mrs. Edith Vanderbilt of Baltimore, vice-president, Prof. J. S. Helmes of Chapel Hill is secretary.

"THRIFT WEEK" BEGINS TOMORROW, JANUARY 17

NEW YORK, Jan. 16.—"Success and Happiness" has been approved as the watchword for the thrift campaign of the coming year. It is announced further by the National Committee that the Dallas plan is being adopted by other cities for the spread of thrift through the public schools. Under this plan contests are held and prizes awarded to pupils who devise slogans for use in the local campaigns.

Thrift Week will be observed from January 17, the birthday of Benjamin Franklin, to January 23.

INCOMPLETE RETURNS SHOW FUQUA LEADING GUBERNATORIAL RACE

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 16.—With returns in from nearly half the precincts in the counties in Henry L. Fuqua is continuing to lead in the race for governor. Reports from 621 of the 1,308 precincts gave Fuqua 48,793; Hewitt Bonenfant 37,172 and Hewy P. Long 27,447.

Mid-Winter Meeting Merchants Ass'n In Raleigh February 20

STATESVILLE, Jan. 16.—Wednesday, February 20, it has been announced here by J. Paul Leonard, executive secretary, has been agreed upon as the date for the mid-winter session of the North Carolina Merchants' Association. The meeting will be held at Raleigh.

A special effort, it is said, will be made to have present at the meeting hundreds of the newly obtained members of the Association secured during the recent campaign. All officers of local associations also are urged to be present.

LONDON EXPERIENCES EPIDEMIC FOGGY-DAY HOUSE BURGLARIES

LONDON, Jan.—There has been an epidemic of burglaries and house-breaking during these dismal foggy days, and something like \$500,000 worth of property has been lost in London during the past month. Police officials always have trouble at this time of the year because of shady race-gangs migrating up to town to "earn a living" during the winter months.

MANY AMERICANS OWN THEIR CASTLES IN SAXONY

DRESDEN, Jan.—Real estate in Saxony with the mark at low rates of exchange, has been tempting to foreign buyers, many of whom have embraced their opportunity.

Castles, dwellings, bungalows and unimproved tracts of land have changed hands in large numbers. The market has been active since 1918. The foreign buyers include 343 Americans and more than 200 Swedes.

Saxon tax collectors are studying the situation with the idea that no state payments be overlooked.

DEMOCRATS TO HOLD CONVENTION IN NEW YORK CITY, JUNE 24

Secures National Gathering for First Time Since 1868

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—The Democratic party today squared itself for the 1924 campaign. The national committee having settled on New York as the place for its convention concluded the lesser details of business today and brought their meeting to an end.

Few changes in the convention rules were made the most important being the provision for four women delegates at large from each state with one half vote each in the convention.

Their work being completed the members of the committee were given an informal reception at the home for former president Woodrow Wilson. In a pouring rain a number of the members went to the Wilson residence, piled through the library and shook the hand of the former executive and Mrs. Wilson. A resolution was passed by the committee endorsing the policies of Mr. Wilson and also expressing hope for his speedy physical recovery.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—A novelty of more than a half century a National political convention in New York will be presented in the 1924 campaign. Historic Madison Square Garden will be the scene of this year's Democratic National convention.

New York was chosen yesterday by the Democratic National committee after a spectacular contest with Chicago, San Francisco and Saint Louis. The convention will open on June 24, probably one week after the Republican National convention at Cleveland ends.

Not since 1868, a lapse of 56 years has New York City had a national political gathering. It wins the Democratic gathering this year after much effort and the presentation of \$205,000 to the National Democratic committee. An equal offer was made by San Francisco but the committee voted against repeating its 1920 journey to the Pacific coast.

Sen. Walsh Charges That Fall Misled Senate Commission

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—Former Secretary Albert B. Fall was charged today by Senator Walsh, Democrat, of Montana, of misleading the Senate Public Loan Commission in its inquiry in the Tea Pot Dome investigation into the source from which he obtained funds for the enlargement and restocking of his ranch in New Mexico.

CHARLOTTE LEADS IN HIGH SCHOOL ENROLLMENT FOR YEAR

RALEIGH, Jan. 16.—Charlotte High School with an enrollment of 898 students in 1923, led all high schools of the state, according to an announcement by Dr. J. Henry Highsmith, director of High Schools for the Department of Public Instruction. The Queen City school also led in the number of graduates with 114 finishing the four year course, seventy-three of whom entered college.

Asheville High came second with an enrollment of 866,103 graduates and 61 college entrants. Greensboro ran third with 831 enrolled, with 80 graduated and 59 entered in college. Winston-Salem was next 706 enrolled, 67 graduates and 45 college entrants while Raleigh came last of the larger cities with 703 enrolled, 91 graduates and 65 matriculants at colleges.

LIVE STOCK BREEDERS WILL DISCUSS INDUSTRY

OMAHA, Jan.—All phases of the live stock industry, embracing range conditions, production, rail rates, the tariff as it affects America's meat supply, federal legislation and marketing, will be subjects for discussion at the twenty-seventh annual convention of the American National Live Stock association, which will be held here January 15-17.

HONEST TAXATION

The chief principle of taxation is that it shall be equitable; the chief object of taxation is to raise revenue. That the Democratic plan is equitable is shown by the fact that the greatest reductions are made to taxpayers least able to pay and that the lesser reductions are made to taxpayers most able to pay, and in a proper ratio of percentages.

In the matter of revenue, a computation based on income returns for 1921 will show that the Democratic plan will raise as much revenue as the Mellon plan, and probably more. Thus the Democratic tax plan meets both the chief requirements of an honest taxation policy; it is equitable and it produces the revenue.

ADMINISTRATION PROPAGANDA

If those who support the Mellon theory of internal taxation ever expect to make substantial headway, they must first readjust themselves and adopt a far more consistent and sound line of reasoning and of fact than have thus far been offered. A brief resume of the course of those supporting the Mellon idea since 1918, which includes most of the

Old Guard or special interest group of Republican National leaders who thus far have dominated their party and the government when under Republican control, reveals constant shifting and hedging in utter disregard of the fundamentals either of taxation or of business. If their varying views as put out to the country during the past five years had been offered by any other group, it would have been accused of bad faith.

The Mellon propagandists just now are offering as their stock phrase the idea that surtaxes must be cut in half in order to permit capital to enter industry and produce prosperity. This same group during 1919, when internal taxes embraced higher surtax rates than at present and an excess profits tax in addition, were of an entirely different opinion than at present. They then directed their Republican Congress to announce that these high tax rates would not be touched for two years, or until 1921. Under their then theory, capital was not impeded in its constant flow into industry. The Mellon propagandists today are directly at odds with the views and attitude of the same identical group during 1919 and 1920. They were either in bad faith then or the Mellon propagandists are not entirely frank with the country now.

Now comes the report that the German government will not be grieved if Grover Cleveland Bergdoll leaves the country. Even the Germans are too decent to tolerate some people.

There were forty fires in Greenville during 1923 most of which were caused by carelessness. People would not carelessly leave their cash money laying around to invite burglars yet they will not exercise good judgment to prevent fires which cost many times more the amount that is taken by burglars each year. It should be remembered that your carelessness endangers your own life and property and that of your neighbor and such carelessness is criminal.

GASTON COUNTY SPENDS QUARTER MILLION FOR ERECTION OF SCHOOLS

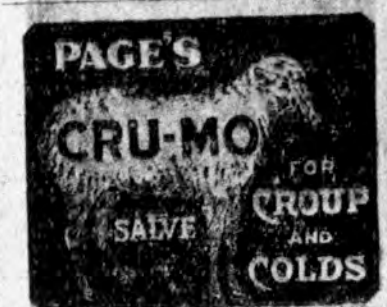

WAYWARD CHILDREN RECORDS SHOW VAL. PROBATION COURTS

NEW YORK.—Greater progress in the developing of juvenile courts has been made during the past five years than during any ten preceding years, according to a National Probation Association report which says that about 200,000 children under 18 years of age passed through the courts of the United States during 1923.

In the juvenile courts, where probation officers are employed, more than 75 percent of the children were placed on probation and given an opportunity under proper supervision to prove that they were not basically bad and eighty percent of those placed on probation made good.

"In every state of the Union today," says the report, "probation is authorized by law as a method of the treatment in the courts. In some of the states, however, its use is greatly limited, the principal limitation, which applies in thirteen states, is to the cases of children only. All but two states in the Union, Maine and Wyoming, provide for specially organized juvenile courts with probation work as a cornerstone. No state has a complete system and in many states this system is limited to a few large cities."

New York has extended the juvenile court to all counties by recent legislation while Arkansas and California have extended the age limit to 21. Twenty states now have the 18-year age limit.

"The present crime wave and the many similar waves which have preceded it are ample proof that the prison and reformatory system is an inadequate cure for crime," the report declares. "A nation-wide survey just completed reveals the fact that there are but 2,694 probation officers in all the courts of the United States. Of all the courts in the country dealing with children, less than half as yet employ probation officers."

FIGHTING WEEVIL BY DUSTING METHOD SHOWS GOOD RESULTS

RALEIGH, Jan. 24.—With the 31 pounds. In this last case only view of reviewing the boll weevil control work done in the past six months, the lessons learned may be applied to the future. State College and the Department of Agriculture specialists in charge of this work are collecting all available data on dusting cotton with calcium arsenate, according to a statement issued here tonight by Professor Franklin Sherman, chief of the division in charge of the work. Only those cases are being used for informative purposes, according to the statement, where it was evident that records were carefully kept and a fair test made to determine a comparison between cotton dusted and that not dusted.

"From our own workers," said Prof. Sherman in his statement "and from others who were co-operating in following the standard dusting method in North Carolina, we have records of ten tests conducted in seven counties in 1923. An average of five treatments were given and the average gain by dusting was 210 pounds of cotton per acre. The results for 1923 are not yet in. Many other growers dusted who did not keep yield records and still others dusted only partially. In many fields the infestation did not reach the point where dusting would pay during 1923. Our records are for the cases we considered as fair tests and they show a profitable average gain. The highest gain yet recorded for 1923 is 154 pounds seed cotton per acre, and the lowest was

THE GERMAN GOV. WOULD NOT GRIEVE IF BERGDOLL MOVES

MOSBACH, Baden.—Several of their acquaintances, some of the German government officials as well as representatives of the state of Baden have intimated that Berlin would breathe at least a slight sigh of relief if Grove-Cleveland Bergdoll would find it convenient to pack his trunk and move somewhere beyond the boundary lines of Germany. Bergdoll, under sentence by a United States army court martial to five years imprisonment for draft evasion during the war, lives at his uncle's hotel in Eberbach, Baden, about 20 miles from here, where he took up residence nearly three years ago when he escaped from America.

Bergdoll, who appeared recently as principal witness for the state in the trial of Corliss H. Griffin, of Hamilton, Ohio, who was accused of having violated German laws in an attempt to secret Bergdoll out of the country, at one time considered applying for German citizenship, but no formal application was ever made. Bergdoll's relatives in America, it is said, advised against any such procedure on the ground that it would complicate the situation, and might give United States government officials an additional lever to hold onto Bergdoll's Philadelphia property which was seized after his escape.

The status of Bergdoll in Germany, according to Berlin foreign office representatives at the trial, is that of any other foreign political offender and regular in every respect, and on this account he is entitled to certain protection under the German laws. Germany has no treaty with any of the powers which would provide for the exchange of political offenders. It was pointed out by the foreign office representatives that soon after the outbreak of war in 1914, many Germans desiring to escape military service, fled to Switzerland, Sweden, and other nearby countries, and that Germany has never made any endeavor to have them returned.

Aviator Sets Low Fuel Record London To Brussels Flight

LONDON, Jan.—At a cost of seven shillings and three pence for petrol and oil, Alan Cobham recently flew from London to Brussels in a light airplane fitted with a six horsepower engine, which competed in the light air plane competition at Lympne in October.

Starting from Croydon, the airman had to descend at Lympne owing to fog, but the weather cleared later. He said that after the restart it took him 20 minutes to reach the French side, and despite heavy rain the machine behaved splendidly. Brussels being reached after a flight of four hours and five minutes.

It is said that an ordinary plane carrying nine passengers would require 65 gallons of petrol and more than two gallons of oil costing near five and one-half pounds sterling. The engine Cobham used consumes one gallon of petrol hourly at a cost of eighteen pence, and fifteen pennyworth of oil.

Japanese Priests Decide Upon Revolutionary Policy, Says Report

TOKIO.—The priests of the Howanji temples in Tokio and Kioto have adopted a revolutionary policy, deciding that in future their services will be given to the living instead of to the dead.

From days immemorial the first duty of the priests of these temples has been to care for the dead and to preside at funeral services. Hereafter, however, they will devote themselves to the social welfare of the people.

This is a significant change in the Buddhist policy in Japan and may revolutionize, in the opinion of people here, the whole world of Buddhism.

Shopping Under One Roof Soft Coal Miners Can Buy Haircut Or An Automobile



Whether it is a paper of pins or an automobile, a sport suit or a can of peaches, the miner's wife who is fortunate enough to live within shopping distance of a "company store," can have all of her needs supplied without the waste of energy which the average city woman spends on a shopping tour. Far from being denied the luxuries enjoyed by the shopper with a dozen shops on her list, the woman who makes her home in the bituminous coal fields, not only has these comforts at less cost, but also has the added advantage of being able to secure everything under one roof.

A recent investigation of the coal fields, made by the National Coal Association, revealed the fact that the company store was patronized by many women who did not

belong to miners' families but who lived in adjacent communities and wished to take advantage of nationally advertised brands of goods not carried by non-company stores. The "company store" is a credit store where persons living in remote coal mining districts may obtain their wants at a minimum price. Orders are taken for automobiles; shoes are fitted; the latest styles in suits and millinery are displayed and in addition, it is possible to buy fresh bread and pastry, household utensils, garden seed, toilet goods, furniture, staple drugs, trunks, sewing machines and what not.

The same circumstances that make it necessary for mining companies to provide housing, schools and churches for their employees, are responsible for the company store.
