In Miss Moxley, Greenville will have a secretary who has had intensive training and wide experience in social work and community organization. After completing a special course in Public Welfare at the University of North Carolina, Miss Moxley was engaged for some time by the State Department of Child Welfare to assist in making a comprehensive survey of the city. She has also had actual experience as assistant for some time to a prominent New Jersey physician.

Red Cross work is not new to Miss Moxley, who for some time was connected with the Durham Chapter, where her activities received high commendation by officials of that city. She comes to Greenville with excellent recommendations and an enviable record of efficient service which speaks well for the future of Red Cross work in this community.

Miss Moxley will have her office in the Chamber of Commerce rooms and will make her home at the Vines House.

REAL ESTATE BOARDS MEET IN CONFAB AT AUGUSTA

AUGUSTA, Ga., Jan. 17.—The mid-winter session of the National Association of Real Estate Boards, convening in Augusta today, through 18-19 has on its program the study of an undertaking by the organized realtors of the United States which they say is so related to the fundamental matters of public policy and basic business conditions as to be characterized as industrial statesmanship. Delegates from 495 real estate boards from all sections of the country are expected to attend.

The principal work of the conference, according to the program will be centered in the formulation of public policies on questions affecting real estate interests and the ownership of real property. The conference, as outlined in its program, will go into every phase of real estate dealing as it is related to the growth of cities, the development of property values, and the spread of home ownership and the safety of investment.

DISCOVERY CHANGE ASPECT WAR AGAINST TUBERCULOSIS

TOTNES, Devonshire.—Referring to Dr. Dreyer's discovery of a method of combating tubercle bacilli in man and beast, Lord Milford of Flete said "the really effective vaccine is in view." He added that there had been astonishing results with selected human cases.

It is stated that the effect of Dr. Dreyer's discovery is to strip the coating of protective fat from certain bacilli and thus lay them open to attack of blood cells into which vaccine has been injected. The entire aspect of mankind's war on consumption, it is claimed, has been changed by Dr. Dreyer's discovery.

Irish Free State Abolishes Several Units of Its Army

DUBLIN.—With the intention of ultimately reducing the cost of the Free State army from \$55,000,000 to \$20,000,000, the salvage corps and nine infantry battalions have been disbanded, and the corps and service branch and the administration branch of the department of the chief of staff have been abolished and their duties placed upon the general staff.

A military customs brigade, which will assist customs officers on the northern border and patrol the roads has been approved.

London to Cairo in One Day.

LONDON.—To Cairo in one day, and to India in four days, is the aim of the new Imperial Transport Company. The company, says the Evening News, seeks tenders for planes with twin or triple engines, capable of cruising at 105 miles per hour with a top speed of 125 miles and being able to fly 1,000 miles without a stop.

Australia to Sink Dreadnaught

MELBOURNE.—The dreadnaught "Australia," which is to be destroyed under the Washington treaty, will probably be sunk outside Sydney Harbor when the British Cruiser squadron visits Australia.

It is expected that the squadron will reach western Australia late in February, and will visit other Australian ports between then and the end of April.

WOMAN SWEARS IN COURT BECAUSE JURY SMOKE CHEAP CIGARS AND SPIT ON FLOOR

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 17.—Mrs. Louis Palmer Weber, Oregon society and club woman, was today excused from the January jury panel because she swore profusely in the circuit court room according to attaches of the court and Mrs. Weber's own admission. She was excused at her own request.

"I make no denial that I swore," Mrs. Weber declared to Judge Tazewell. "I swore like a parrot and there was justification for it. If men on the jury are to be allowed to smoke the cheapest cigars that they can buy, fouling the air and then spit all over the place there was no harm in my swearing."

From the present outlook it is now thought that the receipts for the year will reach close to forty million pounds.

CHARLOTTE, Jan. 17.—The state court and shipping commission met here at 10:30 o'clock this morning to start the work of drawing up the report to be submitted to Governor Cameron Morrison. Completion of the report at this meeting is very doubtful. There will be another session here tomorrow but it was stated that this morning that still another meeting would be required before the report could be completed and that it would probably be some time before the report was available.

NEW YORK, Jan. 17.—Edward G. Riggs, for many years political signation in 1913 has been in charge of the publicity for the New York, New Haven and Hartford railroad, died at his home in Brooklyn early today. He was 68 years old.

LOCAL POST OFFICE GAINS IN BUSINESS DURING PAST YEAR

Report For Three Year Period Shows An In- crease Over \$5,000

The receipts of the local postoffice for the year ending December 31, 1923 were \$34,557.38 a gain of \$1,482.99 over the previous year and \$5,010.64 for the year ending December 31, 1921. While the above figures represent only the postal receipts of the office the gross receipts covering all departments amounted to \$248,490.14 divided as follows:

Postal receipts and box rents \$34,557.38; money orders issued and fees on same \$128,987.26; war savings certificates \$66,647.50; treasury savings certificates \$19,298.00.

The general operating expenses of the office for the year were \$24,327.46.

Cruiser Tacoma Has Three Compartments Flooded, Says Report

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—The cruiser Tacoma, aground on Blanco reef off Vera Cruz has three compartments flooded according to wireless messages from the ship received by the navy department today. Tugs are standing by and hope is entertained that the craft can be towed into deeper water as soon and the heavy sea subsides.

No fear is entertained for the safety of the officers and crew of the stricken vessel which was thrown on the reef during a storm Tuesday night.

New York Suffers Worst Storm in Years

NEW YORK, Jan. 17.—One of the most severe January wind and rain storms that has struck New York for many years subsided today having caused indirectly five deaths and considerable property loss and damage to small shipping in the harbor and along the Jersey coast. Two unknown ships have been reported in distress off the coast. Several persons are reported missing as the result of the sinking of a barge.

A number of accidents attributed to whiskey, have the county and the officers are determined to keep their work up until this section is given a thorough "clean up."

The southern edge of Pavlov volcano was said to have blown off. Belkofsky is on the Alaskan peninsula and Saint Pauls is one of the Prebillo Islands.

Boll Weevil Meeting To Be Held Here On Thursday, Jan. 24th

Mr. R. B. Reeves, county agent has sent the following letter to the farmers throughout the county inviting them to attend a Boll Weevil meeting which will be held here on Jan. 24.

"On January 24, there will be a Boll Weevil meeting in Greenville. This meeting will be held in the High School auditorium and will be called at 10:30 a. m. We will have with us at this time, Mr. C. A. Whitte of the Soil Improvement committee, Atlanta, Ga.; Mr. J. O. Taylor, boll weevil expert for the F. S. Royster Guano Co., and former government agent in charge of the U. S. Boll Weevil Experiment Station at Tallulah, La.; and Mr. W. B. Mabe, Extension Entomologist who had charge of the Boll Weevil work at Dunn for the past season. There is a possibility that Dr. Pate or Dr. Winters of the Agronomy Division will also be present. All of these speakers are men of note along this particular line and we should consider it a great opportunity to have them advise us at so critical a time.

The boll weevil infestation in Pitt county last year was very slight, but this was due mainly to weather conditions. We cannot hope for these same conditions this coming season and should bestir ourselves now to take every precaution and measure possible to wage war on this formidable pest.

Please let me call your attention to the fact that Permanent Pastures of Carpet Grass, Dallas Grass, and Lespedeza should be seeded during the months of February and March. Land that is too low to cultivate for the average crop is ideal pasture land."

LONDON, Jan. 17.—A strike of British locomotive men, who refuse to accept the wage reduction authorized by the railway board, will begin Sunday night according to announcement made here today.

Vanceboro Suffers \$1000 Fire Loss

NEW BERN, Jan. 16.—The Grist mill of L. E. Smith was destroyed at Vanceboro late yesterday afternoon by a fire which became so threatening that officials of Craven town called on the New Bern fire department for assistance. Chief Oscar Street of the local fire department, responded and with one of the city's big trucks was headed for Vanceboro as when intercepted at Erul by a message that the blaze had been controlled. The damage is estimated at \$1,000.

How the fire originated could not be learned, but it gained headway rapidly and but for the splendid work of a bucket brigade of approximately 300 men, women and boys there might have been a disastrous blaze. The grist mill was completely destroyed and at times it looked as if an adjoining building was doomed, reports reaching here stated in which event, it was stated, only the aid of modern equipment and experienced firemen could have saved the greater part of the business district from destruction.

SHENNANDOAH SAFE IN HARBOR AFTER FIGHT WITH STORM

World's Largest Airship Battles For 7 Hours With Elements

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—Naval officials who had doubts about the giant naval dirigible Shenandoah's ability to withstand the projected polar flight appeared to be convinced today after the crafts wonderful performance last night in riding out the gale that tore it from its mooring tower at Lakehurst, N. J.

LAKEHURST, N. J., Jan. 17.—The Shenandoah, largest air ship in the world and pride of the United States Navy, poked her nose into her hangar here at 4:25 this morning after the most remarkable flight ever accomplished by a craft of her type. The flight was made against the most stubborn elements at times having to fight against a 72 mile an hour gale.

The giant dirigible was torn from her mooring tower at 6:25 last night by a gale that swept her as far as Staten Island, New York, before her head could be turned into the teeth of the storm and the homeward journey begun.

Crew Enjoy Flight.

Not a man of the crew of 22 was injured and not a man was downhearted. Each declared that it was the finest trip he had ever made and was loud in his praise of the navy's pride. The crew talked of the flight as it was a big joke and won the envy of their fellow mates who had watched the giant craft drift away into darkness.

The big ship lay in her hangar this morning like a naughty school boy whose truancy had brought him ill luck, with a battered nose and severely scratched. Inspection showed the front gas bags collapsed and other minor injuries to the craft.

Captain Praises Craft.

Captain Heinan, who saw the Shenandoah built and who has tried out over a hundred air ships on their maiden voyage, said after landing that without a doubt the Shenandoah was the strongest craft that had ever been made. "I do not believe any other ship which I have flown would have successfully gone through the gale as she did last night," he declared. He further stated that he was confident that the craft would be successful in the proposed polar flight next summer for it was not likely that such a storm as that of last night would be encountered and in event such should happen the large ship was capable of quickly running around it.

Captain Heinan voiced his praise of Lieutenant-Commander Mayer who acted as instruction officer while the ship was in the air last night. His duty called him to every part of the monster dirigible, said Captain Heinan, and he never once faltered although he was forced to walk the narrow gangways over the ship as it wallowed and careened in its battle with the storm.

SHIRLEY GOES UP TO BIG LEAGUE

NORFOLK, Va., Jan. 17.—"Mule" Shirley's sale by the Norfolk Club to the Washington team, American League, in part payment for Pitcher Brillheart, was announced here last night.

The University of North Carolina star first baseman, who was signed by Norfolk last spring but refused to report because he had another year in college, is regarded as the best first-sacker in this section of college circles and manager Winn Clark was anxious to get him here last year.

Pitcher Brillheart who comes here under an optional agreement, is expected to materially strengthen the Norfolk hurling staff this year. He is a youthful flinger and attracted attention in Tennessee before he even donned long trousers.

OUR VOLUNTEER FIRE COMPANY

If told that the citizens of Greenville were possessed of selfishness and ingratitude no doubt the majority would be quick to contradict the statement, yet that same majority is too busily engaged with their own personal affairs to give a thought to being of service to the community and prefer to let George do it. Those same citizens can always find time, however, to pause long enough to criticize the effort made by the public servant.

When the fire alarm sounds hundreds drop what they are doing and rush madly to the scene of the blaze, not to lend a helping hand, but to criticize the fire company which is composed of men who have volunteered their services and willingly risk their lives to save the life and property of others. Last year, although there were twice the number of fires in this city as in the previous year, the total losses were \$84,748 less, due principally to the work of our fire department. The compensation of each fireman for this great service was approximately \$25 for the year plus the jeers and criticism of the citizen who thinks that he knows how it could best be done, but who never lends a hand.

Such criticism of the guardians of our property is unjust and a word of praise for the valiant service rendered by our volunteer fire company would be far more appropriate.

The fact that Greenville is enjoying a steady growth is evidenced by the continued increase in receipts of the local postoffice as shown in the comparative report for the past three years published in this issue.

SOUTH LOSES \$1,500,000,000

Facts which demonstrate what a heavy handicap the republican profiteers' tariff imposes on agriculture and general business in the southern states have recently been gathered by the Fair Tariff League, a protectionist organization. These facts are expected to prove an antidote to the propaganda being spread through the south by the Southern Tariff Association, which many democrats regard as a sort of auxiliary to the republican National Committee and the Federal machine.

An analysis made by the Fair Tariff League discloses that the south as a whole loses from \$1,200,000,000 to \$1,500,000,000 on the republican tariff. Of this immense loss from \$500,000,000 to \$700,000,000 is borne by the southern farmers. Every man, woman and child in the south loses an average of \$50 a year through the increase in the cost of living, directly and wholly chargeable to the Fordney-McCumber law. Texas alone pays \$176,107,028 more in tariff taxes annually than the state receives in benefits.

H. E. Miles, chairman of the Fair Tariff League, says of the propaganda conducted by the Southern Tariff Association:

"This Association wants the south to close its eyes to its annual loss of more than 2 billion dollars in sheer graft misnamed protection, and to give its attention to obtaining duties on peanuts and vegetable oils—duties of so little value that they can scarcely be estimated.

"Innumerable manufacturers, including all in the south, except the Birmingham steel interests, are victimized like the farmers by the tariff, and are opposed to excessive rates. The makers of agricultural implements, for instance, have to pay \$50,000,000 too much for their steel, adding \$100,000,000 to the price of implements at retail. They can't absorb this additional \$100,000,000 and they can't pass it along as all manufacturers can and must. Manufacturers of clothing and manufacturers of implements.

"Farmers want robber rates reduced and made honest rates. They want consumers protected."

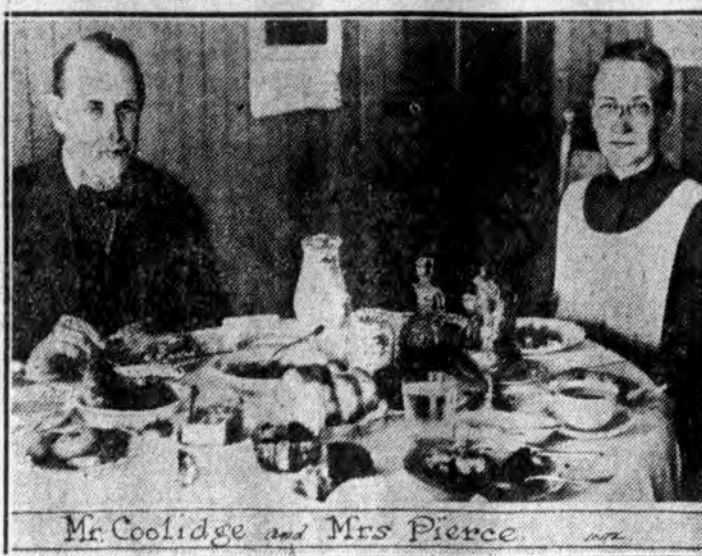

CURRENCY PROBLEM DRIVE MANY TOURIST FROM GERMANY NOW

BERLIN.—Tourist traffic in Berlin continues to decline because of the high prices and the unsettled money condition. Stranded tourists who have experienced the annoyance and red tape of present conditions are believed to have warned other travelers against entering the money trap.

The condition in Germany today is much the same that travelers faced in Central Europe at the outbreak of the war. Gold was the only medium which was acceptable then. Gold is not wanted now, but American paper money and English pounds, in small denominations, are in great demand, bring better rates and relieve the tourist of endless red tape and annoyance.

Tourists have had an extremely difficult time with their letters of credit and travelers' checks in Germany during the financial crisis. Shortage of paper marks and the inability or unwillingness of banks to issue foreign money on checks and letters of credit, even when government permission for such transactions was obtained, have been very discouraging to strangers who do not speak German.

Although various agencies which issue travelers' checks accept dollars, pounds and other stable money and issue the checks so that many travelers understand they are to have the same sort of money paid to them that they gave to the agencies, practically all checks contain a statement that the value of the check will be issued in the currency of the country in which payment is made. Payments were made in Germany at official rates, which were in some cases only half the "black bourse" rate in which prices were fixed. Consequently travelers found their dollars and pounds dwindled almost to nothing when they passed through regular channels.

Under present regulations banks will not pay out foreign money on checks without a government order, which involves considerable red tape. Also the banks charge at least two percent for paying dollars or pounds, and the same charge is made by agencies which have issued travelers' checks abroad for stable currency.

Norwegian Torpedo Boat Runs Smugglers

CHRISTIANIA.—The Norwegian torpedo boat, Orm, recently broke up a rum row just beyond the three-mile limit off Hvaler and captured one of the principal offenders after it had defied the torpedo boat and then had been disabled by a shot from the Orm. When discovered by the Orm the rum row fleet was surrounded by a host of small motor-boats and apparently was carrying on a brisk business.

The smugglers and their customers made a hurried start toward Swedish territorial waters upon the arrival of the Orm, but the latter pursued at full speed and directed its attention in trying to separate a large Danish craft from the others.

Warning shots were sent across the bow of the fugitive craft, but no attention was paid to them and the commander of the Orm directed his gunner to hole the smuggler in the bow, which he did on the first shot. The smuggler then surrendered and was boarded by a party from the Orm. Fourteen thousand liters of liquor were found on the rum runner.

AMERICAN TICTURES IN BRAZIL PROVE AID PAN-AMERICANISM

RIO DE JANEIRO.—American motion pictures reign supreme in Brazil. In spite of repeated efforts of the local theater owners to substitute European productions, which can be obtained at about one-half the cost, the public absolutely refuses to give up its American favorites who leaped into popularity here during the world war.

Statistics obtained from the official censorship show a steady increase in both the number and percentage of American films screened in the Brazilian theaters. In 1921 the total number of films imported was 1,295, of which 923 came from the United States. In 1922 the total was 1,341, of which the American share was 1,058. In the first 6 months of 1923 the total was 712, of which 588 came from the United States.

One of the most experienced motion picture men in Brazil told the Associated Press that American films have done more to create practical Pan-Americanism than all other factors combined. He said that the Brazilians now know more about the United States and the Americans than they do about any other country or people, perhaps including their own, all due to the unconscious propaganda effect of the American films.

Motion picture men declare that one of the most attractive features of the American films in the eyes of the public is the fact that they point a moral. The statistics show that in 1922 only 4 percent of American films were altered by the censors, while 50 to 60 percent of the films from some European sources were cut by the censors.

ONE RAILWAY MISHAP IN YEAR IN BRITAIN

LONDON, Jan. 16.—There was only one railway accident in England involving loss of life during 1922, according to the Railway Gazette. This was at Diggle, in July, when two passengers were killed.

Since the beginning of the present century there have been two years—1901 and 1908—without a single fatality to passengers.

In only three years have more than five people been killed, and in twenty-three years the number of deaths totals only 73.

British to Experiment With Aero Engine Using Crude Oil

LONDON, Jan.—Experiments are shortly to be made, and big developments expected, in the semi-diesel type of aero engine which burns crude oil. Tests were made recently with a 600 horsepower engine with

six cylinders which ran on crude oil, and now another crude-oil engine is in the experimental design stage at Shoreham.

The Air Ministry is anxious to develop this type, and the newly formed \$5,000,000 Air Transport Company has the same object in view.
