SOUTH CELEBRATES 117TH ANNIVERSARY BIRTH ROBERT E. LEE

Unveil Sculptured Head of Great Leader On Stone Mountain

STONE MOUNTAIN, GA., Jan. 19.—The sculptured head of Lee, his kindly features glistening in the granite side of Stone Mountain, was unveiled here today, the 117th anniversary of his birth.

Standing at the foot of the mountain amid hundreds of worshippers at the initial figure of the shrine, Mrs. Helen Plane, of Atlanta, a sweet and charming figure of the Old South, pressed, with fingers a tremble, a button that sent an electric signal to the men on the scaffold 300 feet up the side of the mountain steep. Then the rugged hands that toiled for months in the carving, drew aside the silken folds of the two Confederate flags and revealed the face of General Lee. There could be seen around it the outlines of the panorama that in years to come will portray Jackson, and Davis and the men who followed them. To come later, too, are the full figure of Lee and his faithful charger, Traveler. The Chieftain will be in the saddle looking out over the almost infinite expanse of green that is the vista from this point. But today's ceremony carried the full solemnity and brought quick pulse beats to those who participated and looked on, for it was the first definite attainment for the sponsors of the shrine.

There were present the governor of six southern states, come here for the occasion, and countless numbers of daughters of the Confederacy, whose heritage is keep alive the reverence for the men who fell during the fiery years of '61 to '65. Scattered among them and in contrast that now gripped the soul and again brought a feeling of pride, were the hundreds of age-burdened veterans of the great struggle and the bright faced little girls just starting on the pathway of life. These little girls were the Children of the Confederacy, who had left their play to come and pay homage to their illustrious grandfathers.

They are the Daughters of the Confederacy of tomorrow and already are well familiar with the story that they are to pass on and to help perpetuate.

The exercises began at 2:30 with a steady pilgrimage of hundreds of people that began well before noon. An asphalt road that winds a pleasant course into Atlanta from the mountain, bore heavy traffic. The visiting governors came from the city in cars furnished by their hosts.

There were Governor Cameron Morrison, of North Carolina; Governor E. Lee Trinkle, of Virginia; Governor Cary A. Hardee, of Florida; Governor Austin Peay, of Tennessee; Governor Thomas McLeod, of South Carolina, and Governor William W. Brandon, of Alabama, who with Governor Clifford Walker, of Georgia occupied a specially constructed platform for that purpose. Governor Walker was attended by his military staff whose full dress uniforms contrasted with the ever fading color of gray of the veterans now at the ebb of life. Military, in its organization, too, figured in the occasion by the presence of the "Old Guard" of Atlanta.

MEXICAN TROOPS WILL BE ALLOWED TO ENTER TEXAS

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Jan. 19.—Acting-Governor T. W. Davidson today acquiesced to the request of the Obregon Mexican government by reversing his decision yesterday not to allow Mexican Federal troops to be transported through the state of Texas. His action today came as the result of an urgent request from Secretary of State Hughes. In a message to Secretary Hughes today the acting governor stated that 2,000 Mexican troops would be allowed to enter Texas at El Paso provided that the American government assume responsibility for any damage that may result.

The Obregon government modified its request by asking that it troops be allowed to enter the United States near El Paso and re-enter Mexico at that point instead of via Loredo as previously requested.

Asks Mellon Tell Personal Benefit From Reductions

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—Secretary Mellon was challenged today by Senator Couzens, Republican of Michigan, to inform the country how much he would benefit personally from the reduction in income surtaxes under his present plan. "So long as you have entered into the record of my securities," said Mr. Couzens, "Will you tell us of your securities and how much you will benefit by a reduction in surtaxes as proposed by you?"

The Michigan senator's letter was a part of a long series of communications exchanged with Mr. Mellon made public by while the Ways and Means committee was winding up its week of hearings on the Mellon plan and preparing to be in the first actual consideration of various changes in the tax levies.

Mr. Couzens denied the statement that all his capital was now in tax exempt securities. He declared that he had millions of dollars invested in buildings and building operations and other taxable property. "Are such operations not more productive than distilleries," he said.

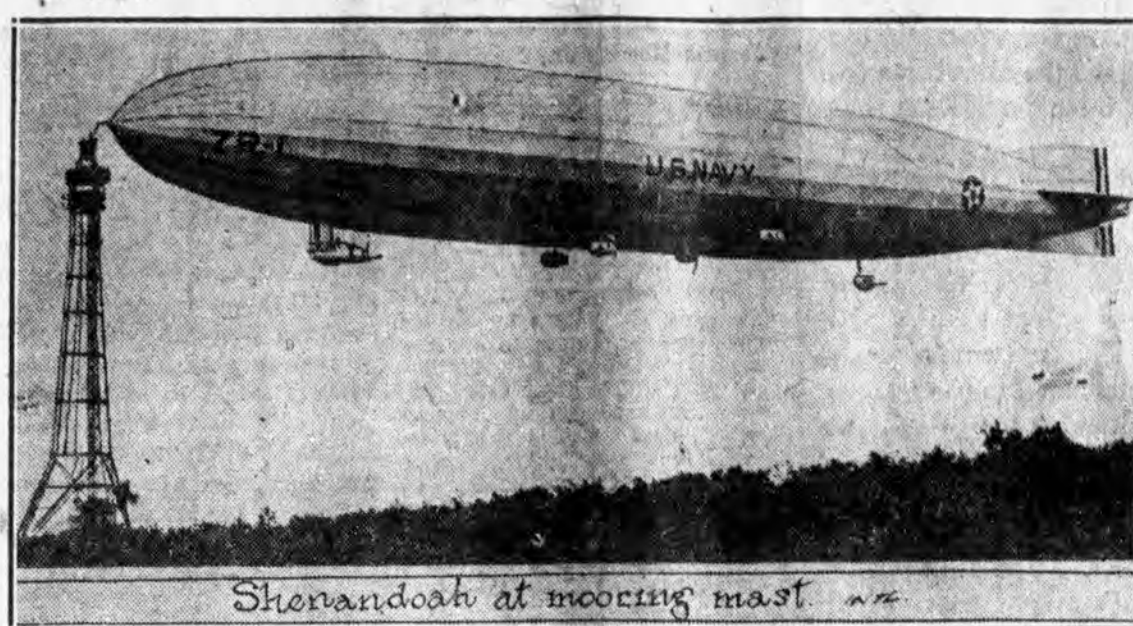
Rev. Lehard W. Smith was elected General chairman, and Rev. W. S. Harden was elected general secretary of the whole organization.

Will Be Held in Connection With East Carolina Exposition

Miss Ollie B. Jackson, a native of Kentucky, is now at Kinston from which place she will direct a mammoth pageant, Eastern Carolina in Action.

Miss Jackson was in Greenville this morning for the purpose of conferring with representatives from the women's clubs and both Rotary and Kiwanis.

Miss Jackson is unusually fitted for this line of work and has personally directed some of the biggest pageants in the country. Last year in Macon, Ga., she directed the big centennial pageant, which ran for three days without any repetition and in which over 6000 people participated. Also at High Point during last year the "Pageant of Progress" was successfully conducted with over 2000 people participating.

Miss Jackson will co-operate with the various towns and counties that agree to come in, to the fullest and will lend valuable aid toward making a real success of the undertaking.

The Exposition, which is being planned by the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce, will be held in one of the large tobacco warehouses of Kinston April 7-12.

Hull Favors Offer Southern Power Cos. For Muscle Shoals

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—The proposal of the group of several southern power companies for the operation of the Muscle Shoals plants for a period of years at a rent of \$100,000,000 was described as the best offer that the government has received for the Muscle Shoals project, in a statement by Representative Hull, Republican of Iowa, who initiated the correspondence with the Federal Power Commission which resulted in the bid being made. The offer brings out for the first time the actual facts of the large money value to the people of the United States of the water rights and privileges at Muscle Shoals, said Mr. Hull and he expressed hope that the Secretary of War would immediately transmit it to congress for action. The proposal, he said, clears the way for the production of a constant supply of cheap fertilizer for the benefit of the farmers of the country if Congress accepts it and the hydro-electric energies of the south's greatest water power will be equitably distributed over the entire south where it rightfully belongs.

Asserting that his mind was open for the best proposition for the disposition of the government's vast interest, he outlined three essentials to entitle any proposition to consideration-protection at all times of the government interest in national preparedness, the Farmers' interest in the conservation of soil from the production of nitrate and must provide for the completion of Dam No. 3 within a reasonable time so that river transportation on the Tennessee river may be inaugurated. When the government secures these three essentials, he said, then it should accept the best offer.

FORD NOTIFIES KAHN OFFER FOR MUSCLE SHOALS STILL STANDS

Washington, Jan. 19.—Henry Ford notified chairman Kahn of the House Military Committee today that his offer for Muscle Shoals stands.

The McKenzie bill authorizing the acceptance of his bid, said the Detroit manufacturer, would be satisfactory if the Madden amendment providing for replacement of the Georgas steam plant was adopted. He suggested, however several other amendments, which Mr. Kahn assured him would be given every consideration by the committee when it reopens its hearing on next Tuesday.

SHERWOOD ASSAILS ANTI-SALOON CROWD

Charges Upshaw Show One Benefit Because of Prohibition

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—Flourishing an empty flask and assailing the activities of the Anti-Saloon League and Representative Upshaw, Democrat of Georgia, Representative Sherwood, Democrat of Ohio, 88 years old veteran of the House told his colleagues today that up to 1924 prohibition enforcement officers had failed in the enforcement of prohibition and also charged that the use of narcotics had increased since enactment of the dry laws.

He insisted that prohibition had failed to prohibit although it had cost the taxpayers a thousand million dollars in the past few years. Since the adoption of the Volstead act he declared that there had been a steady increase in booze drinking by young men and women.

He charged Representative Upshaw with "sky rocket" oratory and said that his Georgia colleague had failed to point out a single benefit either to the individual or the state because of prohibition. He boldly attributed that such required the gab of a curmudgeon and the audacity of a Chinese bandit and characterized Mr. Upshaw the reincarnation of the old Puritans of the seventeenth century who hung quakers in Connecticut and burned witches in Massachusetts.

If the Anti-Saloon League induces Congress to amend the Volstead act by adding the twelve amendments suggested by the gentleman from Georgia it will be the end of personal liberty in the United States declared Mr. Sherwood.

The dead are Roy H. Wood, a farmer, and John Daniel, negro. Kibbie Daniel, another negro, occupant of the car was badly bruised. Wood was driving the car at the time of the accident.

Polar Flight to Explore Arctic Lands With View Of Annexation to U. S.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—The prime purpose of the Shenandoah's proposed polar flight, Secretary Denby told members of the House Naval committee today, is for the exploration of the arctic region with the view of annexation of land to the United States. "The unexplored region," declared the secretary contains a million square miles of land adjacent to that of the United States that this country cannot afford to permit to fall into the hands of another power. If the flights is not made this summer," said Mr. Denby, "the arctic region will be photographed and mapped by another power within a year. The flight is not for the purpose of discovering the North Pole," he said, "for we don't question the feat of Peary. We want to explore the region and the Shenandoah is fitted to do it."

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THE DEMOCRATIC PLAN

It is obvious to every intelligent observer of Congressional affairs in Washington that the Mellon bill with its 50 per cent cut in the highest surtax rate cannot pass this Congress. It could not pass if the Democrats had no plan. There are practically enough Republicans opposed to that feature to prevent its passage. The Frear-LaFollette plan goes to the other extreme. The only feasible scientific plan of equitable tax reduction is the Democratic plan and it is the only one that can be passed. With the Mellon plan eliminated, the defeat of the Democratic plan would leave only the Frear-LaFollette plan.

When it is considered that the proposed beneficiaries under the Mellon plan were relieved by the last Congress of \$11,500,000 in taxes by the reduction of the surtax rate 15 per cent, and the repeal of the excess profits taxes, it would seem a part of wisdom to accept the Democratic plan, which reduces the higher taxes 8 per cent and does full justice to all other taxpayers.

NO MEXICAN BLOCADER

The proclamation by the self-named Huerta Government at Vera Cruz of a blockade of Tampico and other Mexican ports has drawn from our State Department a prompt and proper rejoinder. The alleged blockade will not be admitted as legal by the American Government, nor will it be allowed to apply to American ships. The reasons assigned, so far as they have been reported in the press, are to the effect that Americans have nothing to do with the civil strife in Mexico, and therefore must not be hindered in the pursuit of their lawful business on Mexican territory.

The probability is, however, that Secretary Hughes in his communication to the revolutionary junta at Vera Cruz went much further than this, and based his repudiation of the

blockade upon well-recognized principles of international law. In the first place, not even the belligerency of the Huerta faction has been recognized by any nation. An irresponsible band on the Pacific Coast might next proclaim a blockade of Acapulco. Such deliverances can have no binding force either at home or abroad. But the chief and conclusive reason for rejecting the Huerta blockade out of hand is that it is not and cannot be made effective. That is the true test of a legal blockade, and to imagine that the Huertistas can meet it with the two or three gunboats at their disposal is absurd.

FRENCH "LOANS" SMALL NATIONS

Senator Borah's fondness for peppering his remarks with misinformation is once more manifest in his diatribe against France. He rolls forth imposing figures (without mentioning they are in depreciated paper francs) to show that France, although too poor, or, as he prefers to put it, too unwilling to pay us, is nevertheless lending vast sums to the small nations of Europe.

If the Senator had looked beneath the surface, he would have discovered that these transactions do not represent any transfer of funds, or even the opening of credits. They are merely bookkeeping records of the fact that France has turned over to various countries surplus war material (part of which she bought from us) which had no value for her, and which would otherwise have rotted away. France found herself after the war with stacks of war supplies. They included everything from guns and ammunition to field kitchens, ambulances, locomotives, clothing and innumerable articles which go to make up the equipment of the soldier. The best of this material she put aside for her own purposes. But much remained unusable. Her neighbors, or, to be more precise, Germany's and Hungary's neighbors, wanted parts of this surplus, and could use it to fill out their military needs. By turning the material over to them she obtained claims upon these nations. They amount all told to 1,350 million francs, divided among Poland, Czechoslovakia, Yugoslavia and Rumania. These sums appear as credit entries on the books of France. Even supposing that she should never realize upon them, they do not represent a cash advance, and would still leave her with the political advantage of having helped her friends in a common cause.

Senator Borah should be able to see that this is very different from opening large credits or making heavy advances in funds. It is simply turning an asset of no present value into one of potential value—transforming material which France could not use into a debt by which she hopes to be able to profit. Not only is it not indicative of a desire on the part of France to evade her obligations, but it shows a desire to attempt to use to the best advantage all her possible sources of revenue.

Sex Equality in Office Aim Australian Women

SYDNEY, N. S. W.—Equality of sex in the matter of eligibility for public office is the aim of a movement inaugurated by Mrs. Cowan, the first and thus far the only woman member of the Australian parliament. With this object in view she introduced a bill at the second reading of which she insisted there was no reason why women should not be ministers of the crown. "If this were permissible," she said, "we should never again see the ludicrous anomaly which presented itself in New South Wales a year

ago, when a man held the office of minister of motherhood."

Mrs. Cowan's bill provides that no person shall be disqualified by sex or marriage from the exercise of any public function, or from being appointed to any civil or judicial office, from practicing law, or from entering or carrying on any other civil profession.

Women must have a wider avenue of employment, she said, "because young men are not marrying in these days."

Gun Makers to Become Farmers

Ingolstadt, on the Danube, Jan. 18.—Some of the gunmakers of Ingolstadt are planning to migrate to Brazil to become soil tillers. Until the end of the war the making of cannon, munitions and other army supplies was the principal industry here. In all 55 families have made arrangements to leave early this year for Brazil, where they are to establish a German farming colony with the aid of the Brazilian government.

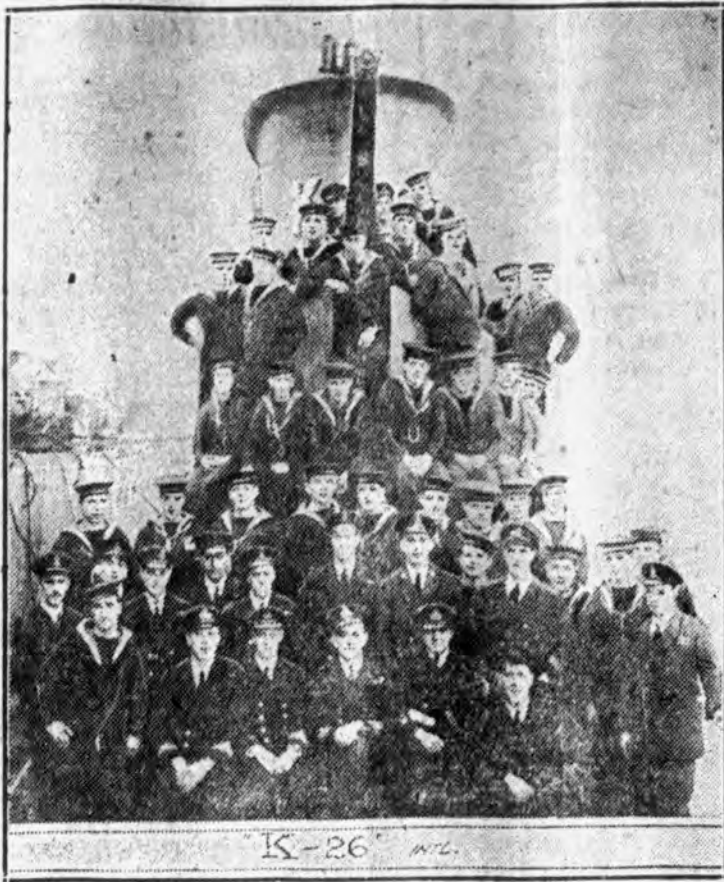

GREAT INTEREST IN HAM MEETINGS

WASHINGTON, N. C., Jan. 19.—Despite a torrential downpour of rain just at the hour of service the other day an audience conservatively estimated at 3,500 men assembled at the Ham Ramsey Tabernacle here to hear Evangelist M. F. Ham's powerful and effective discourse to men only on "The Seventh Commandment." This was the largest gathering of men and boys ever assembled here within the memory of some of the oldest citizens and is indicative of the tremendous grip which the evangelist has secured on this city. The boys from the city schools and from nearby rural schools were dismissed to attend the service and hundreds of men came from nearby communities to attend the services. In the afternoon Mr. Ham spoke to over 2,500 women who braved a veritable tempest of wind and rain to hear his special message to women only on "The Woman of God and the Woman of the World." The final week of the greatest religious campaign ever known in this section was inaugurated Tuesday morning with practically the entire white population of the city in attendance upon the morning service when Mr. Ham delivered his widely known and powerful philippic against the liquor traffic in both its legal and illegal forms. Speaking on the subject "Get On the Water Wagon" the evangelist delivered one of the most effective and unusual efforts ever heard here. The stores, banks, pharmacies, business and professional offices were all closed and their entire forces at the Tabernacle. The schools of the city from the chart class to the high school and the student body of the Washington Collegiate Institute were present in full force. Many of the nearby rural schools were closed and the entire country roundabout was practically deserted as the throng moved toward the big gospel barn to hear this remarkable prophet of God whose burning messages have wrought miraculous transformations in entire cities throughout North Carolina and the South.

CHICAGO'S BUSINESS BLOCKS COST MORE THAN IN ANY CITY

CHICAGO, Jan.—"Spotless Town" in America is St. Paul, Minn., according to a survey completed here by the National Association of Building Owners and Managers. The survey, compiled in the annual accounting and exchange report of the association, covering an analysis of operating expenses, rental income and investment factors in office buildings in the principal cities of the United States, also revealed that Pittsburgh, building managers have a harder time keeping their buildings clean than in any other city.

For St. Paul the report showed that it required only 47 working days a year to keep each 1,000 feet of office building space in order and to provide elevator service, heat, janitor service and repairs. In Pittsburgh 182 days a year were required for each 1,000 square feet of office space. The national capital, Washington, was next with a requirement of 166 days of labor for each 1,000 square feet of space.

In point of cost Pittsburgh was highest with a charge of 59.8 cents for a square foot, and Chicago next highest with a charge of 51 cents a square foot.

An extensive analysis of the investment feature of office buildings also was made in the report, showing that the land under Chicago office buildings was rated at a higher value a square foot than the land in any other city, as well as having the most expensive buildings. From the standpoint of efficiency and of construction, Seattle topped the list with an average for the 14 buildings reporting from the city of 78.8 per cent of the lot area actually used.
