GRADY ADMITS HIS CONNECTION WITH THE KU KLUX KLAN

Says He Has Been Grand Dragon Since September 1922

RALEIGH, Jan. 21.—After more than a year's silence in the face of the assertion first made by Dr. Oscar Maywood that he was Grand Dragon of the Ku Klux Klan in North Carolina, Judge Henry A. Grady, in a statement made public yesterday admits that he has held that office since September, 1922 and reciting a portion of the oath of the organization declares that there is nothing in it incompatible with his oath as a judge of the Superior Court.

Judge Grady describes his relation to the Klan as identical to his relation with the Grand Lodge of Masons when he was Grand Master of the latter organization, and in elaboration of his views on the Klan, declares that he has always opposed the wearing of the robe and mask outside lodge rooms and to public demonstrations of any kind. He declares that the Klan is not fighting Jew, Catholic or Negro.

Thirty thousand members of the organization in North Carolina, Judge Grady says, desiring a known head for the Ku Klux Klan, impelled him to come into the open with the statement that he is not only a member but the ranking official, and personal representative of the Imperial Wizard of an invisible empire, one of the 48 such officials in the 48 states which form the Republic in which the Empire has its dominion.

Violators Prohibition Laws Appeals Case To Superior Court

WINSTON-SALEM, Jan. 21.—Attorney for Burton Charles and Rob Holt, who were convicted in the municipal court here of violating the prohibition law and sentenced to two years on the roads, have filed notice that they will appeal the case to the superior court. Bond under the appeal was fixed at \$1000 for Holt and \$5000 for Charles. Bond was also placed at \$500 for Holt in the case in which he was convicted and sentenced to twelve months on the roads for operating an automobile while intoxicated. Notice of appeal has also been filed in the case of Robah Dunnigar, who was sentenced to the road for six months for another charge.

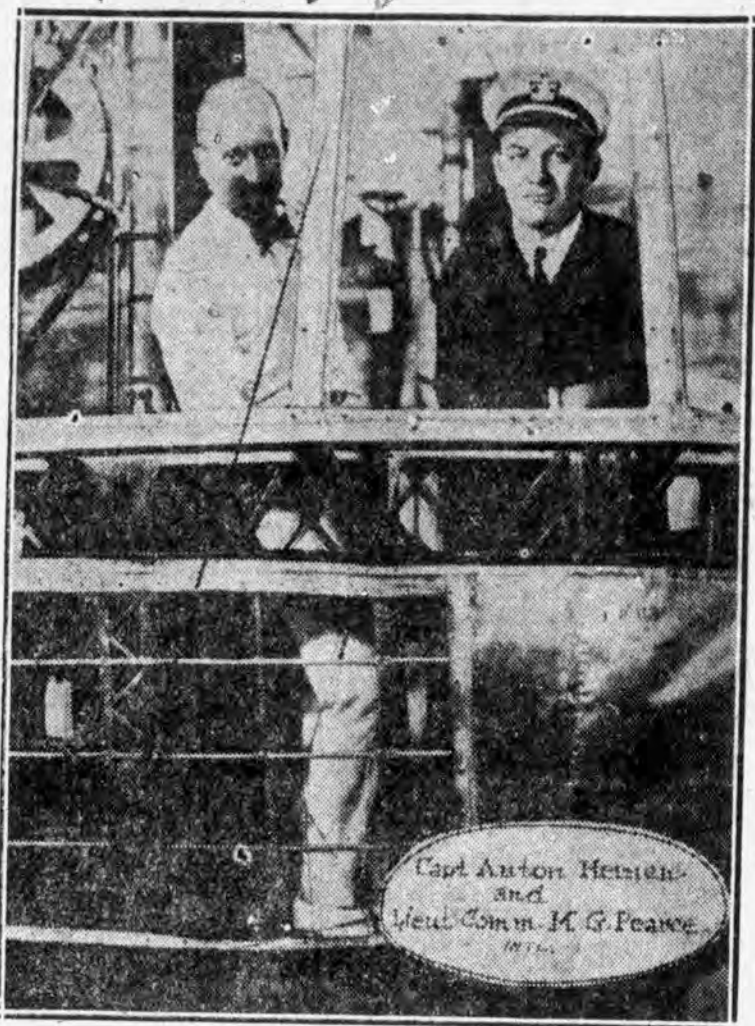

HEROES OF SHENANDOAH MISHAP.

Captain Anton Heinen, German expert on dirigibles, and Lieutenant Maurice G. Pearce, U. S. N., were the outstanding heroes of the mishap to the dirigible Shenandoah. Commander Pearce was active commander of the ship when she broke loose from her mooring mast, but Captain Heinen, because of his greater knowledge, was tacitly given command. Within three minutes they had emptied the ballast, started her engines, and had her under control. "How that Boche did bark out orders," remarked an enlisted man—and he didn't use the term "Boche" with any venom. With the men Captain Heinen is a hero and a man—and they don't care if he was their late enemy, for he brought them back safely and saved their beloved ship.

SUPT. OF CASWELL TRAINING SCHOOL GIVEN VACATION

KINSTON, Jan. 21.—Dr. Charles B. McNairy, superintendent of the Caswell Training School, has been granted a leave of absence from the institution and has started south on his vacation. He will visit points in South Carolina and Florida. Dr. McNairy, who was formerly a practicing physician at Lenoir, has been in charge of the school a number of years. He is recognized as one of the foremost eugenicists in the United States and last year headed an international organization of prominent eugenicists, and psychiatrists.

Engineers, Firemen Of British Lines Strike Yesterday

LONDON, Jan. 21.—A strike of the railway engineers, comprising engineers and firemen, started at midnight Saturday. The announcement of the strike was made at the headquarters of the organization.

The strike was called without the support of the National Union of Railwaymen and the railway clerk's organization, the members of which will continue at work unless coercion is employed to force them to take the strikers' places.

State headquarters of the association issued a statement this morning that the men were coming out solidly and standing together splendidly. Apparently some traffic was moved after midnight but it seems that the strike order will no doubt be obeyed by practically all the 59,000 members of the organization.

U. S. NAVAL TUG TAKES REFUGEE IN VERA CRUZ HARBOR FROM HURRICANE

PORT ARTHUR, TEXAS, Jan. 21. The United States naval tug Bay Spring has taken refuge in Vera Cruz harbor from what was described as the worst hurricane in years, according to a message by wireless from the Mexican port. The radio message broadcast from Vera Cruz and signed by Marino Fernandez said that De La Huerta authorities permitted the vessel to enter the harbor after wireless communication which stated that it was in danger of foundering if it remained on the outside.

Gasoline Tax Helps Roads.

RENO, Nevada.—A tax on gasoline, effective in Nevada for less than a year, has netted the state more than \$110,000.

Aggregate sales at the last report were 5,271,861 gallons. Funds collected by the state are divided between the state and counties for use in highway improvement.

Three Found Dead; Believed To Have Frozen To Death

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Jan. 21.—Two young women and a youth were found dead near the Vilonia pike eight miles east of Conway today when another member of the automobile party Fred Warlock staggered to the main highway and hailed a passing car. Warlock appeared in a dazed condition from cold and exposure.

The dead are Miss Annie Bailey, of North Little Rock, Miss Dorcy Woods, student of a business college here, and Ernest Mann, of Little Rock. The parties are believed to have frozen to death.

SUPREME COURT SETS ASIDE RECENT RULING COMMERCE COMMISSION

Washington, Jan. 21.—The order of the Interstate Commerce Commission requiring railroads to issue interchangeable mileage tickets under the act of 1921 was set aside by the Supreme court today in a case brought by the government against railroads east of the Mississippi and north of the Ohio and Potomac rivers.

The court took the position that the order of the commission could not be enforced because it was issued without a proper hearing on same. However it does not affect the power of the commission in ordering the roads to issue mileage books after a proper hearing.

STEAMER AURORA IS DESTROYED BY FIRE EARLY THIS MORNING

CITY POINT, Va., Jan. 21.—The steamship Aurora plying between Richmond and Petersburg, with its cargo of freight was destroyed by fire early today.

Forace Furman, manager of the Furman Line, which operated the vessel, and the crew of twelve, narrowly escaped death by taking to the life boats. The origin of the fire is undetermined.

Seven Firemen Drowned In Oil While Fighting A Refining Plant Fire Today

PITTSBURG, Pa., Jan. 21.—Seven men were drowned in oil, two captains and five hosemen of a local fire company, while fighting a fire at the Butler street plant of the Atlantic Refining Company early today. The bodies of the victims were recovered after the fire had been brought under control.

The cause of the fire is undetermined and the monetary loss unestimated.

The dead are, Captain Edward Jones, Captain Rudolph Briska and hosemen Patrick, Abbott, Robert Smith, John Markham, Samuel Bollinger and Harry Frazier. A number of other firemen were also injured.

The fire broke out in a tank containing 10,000 gallons of oil shortly after 7 o'clock this morning. Several fire companies answered the alarm and hose lines for four or five blocks were

spread in each direction of the residential section surrounding the refinery.

Shortly before 9 o'clock the captains and hosemen were seen on a ladder above the tank adjacent to the one that was burning. The oil in this tank was being drawn off when the ladder broke and the entire occupants fell into the tank. Chemical extinguishers automatically released by the heat of the fire in the nearby tank covered the oil and the fumes arising from it are believed to have overcome the struggling firemen. They sank almost instantly to the bottom of the tank and their bodies were later recovered thru the man hole at the bottom of the tank.

Other firemen suffered severely from exposure to the temperature of two degrees below zero and many were injured by falls from the icy tops of tanks to which they had climbed.

BLOCAGE TAMPICO POSTPONED SAYS ADMIRAL'S REPORT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—The rebel blockade of the port of Tampico has been postponed until the end of the present month Rear-Admiral McGruder reported to the Navy Department today after his arrival off that port aboard his flagship the cruiser Richmond.

Announcement of the receipt of the message said that Admiral McGruder did not indicate the source of his information. His message served however to relieve the tension in Washington in connection with the Tampico situation.

The cruiser Omaha and six destroyers, accompanied by the repair-ship Prometheus, are hurrying northward from Canal Zone waters to add by strength of numbers to the determination that American commerce is to be protected in southern waters.

Senate Committee Exchanges Views On International Peace

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—The senate committee for two hours today exchanged views on international peace. Edward W. Bok, donor of the \$100,000 prize in the contest for the best plan setting forth America's position with regard to world peace and the league of nations, was the main witness.

Senators Moses, of New Hampshire and Reed, of Missouri, led the questioning. As the questioning progressed, Mr. Bok assumed the role of inquisitor. Many questions put to him and many fired in return to members of the committee remained unanswered. The witness declared that every cent of the expense connected with the contest was defrayed by him but when pressed as to the total amount he replied that he considered that his own personal affair. Mr. Bok will again take the stand when the hearing is resumed tomorrow.

Walton Not Allowed Review Impeachment Proceedings by Court

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21.—Supreme court today declined to permit former governor John C. Walton to bring up for review, direct from the legislature, the impeachment proceedings which resulted in his removal from office.

1,584,254 Pounds of Tobacco Sold In Wilson Last Week

WILSON, Jan. 21.—Tobacco sales on the Wilson market for the week ending January 17 were totaled in pounds at 1,584,254 as compared with sales of the week before of 674,196 pounds, according to a statement issued H. B. Johnson, supervisor of sales of the Wilson Tobacco Board of Trade. The figures also show higher average prices paid during the week ended January 17. An average of \$20.46 per hundred pounds was paid during the week just lodged against an average of \$18.70 hundred pounds during the week before.

Mexican Troops Pass Through Texas Today

EL PASO, TEXAS, Jan. 21.—A special train carrying approximately 1,500 Mexican Federal troops passed through El Paso at 6:45 this morning and was immediately routed to Jarez. Special guards of United troops and El Paso police accompanied the train through the lower part of the city.

The troops came from western Mexico via Naco, Arizona, and their destination is understood to be the interior of Mexico.

SUPERIOR COURT CONVENES HERE DURING THIS WEEK

Criminal Term Begins With Smallest Calendar of Several Terms

Pitt County Superior Court for the trial of criminal cases convened this morning with Judge Frank Daniels presiding. The calendar contains only about thirty cases, the smallest number of years. All are of more or less importance and it is expected that the term will prove to be very successful.

Montreat Hotel Destroyed By Fire With \$65,000 Loss

ASHEVILLE, Jan. 21.—Montreat hotel, serving as a dormitory of the Montreat Normal School and located on the Presbyterian assembly grounds was entirely destroyed by fire this morning with a loss of \$65,000.

The 75 girl students and 10 teachers escaped without injury though they were driven out of doors into near zero weather. They lost practically all of their effects as the building was in flames when discovered at 8:45 o'clock this morning.

State Fires During Last Month Total Close to \$1,305,000

RALEIGH, Jan. 21.—While it is impossible to give exact figures yet of the North Carolina fire loss for December, Commissioner Wade, announced Saturday, that the total will be approximately \$1,305,000 against \$3,116,703 for December of 1922. There were 160 fires during December, but the great loss was the result of only three fire at Charlotte, with \$507,750, Mebane, \$524,700 and Elizabeth City with \$82,500 aggregating \$1,114,950, it was stated. Sixteen other fires each having a loss of over \$5000 run the total up to \$1,223,500. This leaves a total for the entire loss of the other 141 fires of only \$121,000.

The value of the property at risk during the months fires was given as \$4,442,100 and the insurance involved at \$3,146,000.

Of the 160 fires, 87 were in urban and 11 in rural dwellings with a total damages of \$84,500, value of the property \$412,000 and insurance at \$205,000, it was estimated.

There were only seven fires in the state on Christmas day, it was declared and with one exception all were in dwellings resulting from roof fires with small damages. The one exception was in a pile of fireworks stored in a theater at Madison, which ignited and caused damages of \$600 to the building. The worst dwelling fire was said to be that of Harry Skinner, of Greenville which occurred on the 26th and caused a loss of \$24,000.

Commissioner Wade has inaugurated an honor roll. On this he keeps a record of all the towns and cities of the state that report each month that there have been no damages from fire during that month. Few of the big towns are on the list for December. The honor roll for that month includes Washington, Hickory, Benson, Aberdeen, Granite Falls, Wadesboro, Mt. Olive, Rockingham, Robersonville, Cherryville, Creedmore, Zebulon, Randleman, Fairmont, Marion, Mooresville, Leaksville, Ansonville, Bailey, Bakersville, Wake Forest, Lumber Bridge, Kernersville, Southern Pines, Tryon, Burnsville, Huntersville, Littleton, Kenley, Forest City, and counties of Ashe, Granville and Union.

The losses for the year 1923 are estimated at \$7,175,000 as compared with \$9,235,931 for 1922.

TAXES AND TARIFF

An illustration of the enormity of the tariff tax can be shown by taking the one item of sugar alone. The tariff on sugar and the profiteering and speculation therein made possible by the tariff cost the housewives of America in 1923 nearly as large a sum as the total tax reduction proposed by the Mellon plan. Therefore, Democrats argue that it is bad faith on the part of the Republicans to declare for income tax relief for a comparatively few while opposing any tax relief through a reduction of the tariff to the entire body of the American people.

Democrats favor income tax reduction and they favor tariff tax reduction to the limit consistent with the needs of the government for revenue. Democratic leadership is disposed to give impartial consideration to income tax reduction and adopt any and all of the sound features of the Mellon plan, but at the same time they realize that any general tax relief proposal that does not include the tariff is intended to deceive the great majority of the people.

The Mellon plan offers substantial relief only to 525,000 surtax payers and to only 50,000 or 60,000 surtax payers on incomes from capital invested in excess of \$15,000 to \$20,000. These same 50,000 to 60,000 surtax payers received from the last Congress a reduction in their taxes of \$511,500,000. Any further reduction to this class of taxpayers is a matter for economists to deal with, and it promises to be so dealt with unless the extremist among the Mellon plan propagandists make it impossible.

If you're not having a lot of fun out of life you're missing something, and you might as well know it.

ON WITH THE HUNT

When Senator Moses and his fellow-committeemen set out on the trail of the malign influences favoring the Bok peace plan they are going to have a grand time. They have discovered another plot, and they intend to run the evil-doers to earth, dig them out and nail their hides to the barn door. It was Senator Reed of Missouri who organized the hunt with his littel resolution. He is after big game, but the Senate has licensed the committee to take anything that comes its way. If it finds the track of any associations or persons that have advocated the League of Nations or the world court, or tax reduction or opposition to the bonus, or have sought to "control public opinion and the action of Congress upon legislative matters through propaganda or by the use of money, by advertising or by the control of publicity," it will never stop until it brings them home.

It is hard to see where Senator Moses will begin. There is so much to be done. The newspapers are full of the Bok peace plan, tax reduction and the bonus. They are talking about wherever people come together. Everybody is doing it; everybody is a propagandist fit to be brought down at sight by the Senate sharpshooters.

To be sure, Mr. Bok's name is attached to the latest peace plan but thousands of persons are discussing it and voting for it. President Coolidge's name is attached to the world court plan, the Mellon tax-reduction plan and opposition to the bonus, and his message to Congress has been widely circulated, printed by the Government printer, franked through the mails and laid aside for reference in innumerable homes and private offices. Mr. Mellon not only launched his proposal for reducing taxes by publishing it in a letter to Representative Greene but he has addressed letters to Senators and others for publication. They are all propagandists in the first degree, and they have armies of imitators.

But what are Senators Moses, Reed & Co. going to do about it? If all agitation for or against public measures is propaganda to be summarily stamped out, Congress will have to abolish all printing presses, all public and private gatherings, all means of communication, and to impose upon 100,000,000 people the rule of silence. Let the legislative order go out that all discussion shall cease, on pain of instant punishment, of all public measures, beginning with the White House and the Treasury Department. Then the Senate may deliberate undisturbed by outside voices, uninfluenced by publicity, obedient only to the stern dictates of its conscience, and a great silence will brood over the world.
