SOUTH LEADS IN THE SEVENTH RED CROSS ROLL CALL

Local Chapter Thanks Public For Liberal Contributions

Mr. H. E. Austin, the in-coming chairman of the Pitt County Chapter of the American Red Cross and Miss Jane Moxley, the executive secretary in speaking of the recent Roll Call in Pitt county, made this statement: "We want to express our deep appreciation for the contributions made. It is this fine spirit that will make possible Red Cross Work in all of its activities in Pitt county this year."

Southern Division Makes Statement. Nation-wide reports from the Seventh Roll Call of the American Red Cross give the South the lead over every other section of the country in percentage of its quota obtained, according to a message today from National Headquarters in Washington. The report in part states that, "the fact of outstanding interest in the data obtained is that the Southern Division is the first in the country to exceed its membership of last year, although many chapters who have secured members are yet to be heard from." With a quota of 250,000 members, reports from only 406 of the 600 chapters in the division putting on a campaign for members show an enrollment of approximately 200,000. Final reports are confidently expected to bring the membership past the goal set.

"The Roll Call, of course, is only a means to an end," said Joseph C. Logan, Southern Division Manager in commenting on the returns. "This increased enrollment will give added strength to the organization for the relief of suffering wherever it exists, and all who have helped make this possible, either through personal service or membership have full reason to feel gratified."

\$230,000 Building To Be Erected In Asheville In Future

ASHEVILLE, Jan. 23. — A new building to be known as the Medical Building will be erected here in the near future. Plans for the building will be eight stories high and have 127 rooms for offices with 32,000 square feet of office space, have already been drawn up. The structure will be located on the southwest corner of North Market and Walnut Street. Its estimated value is \$250,000. The first floor of the new building will be occupied by a bank, drug store and shops. The Mutual Securities Co., is financing the enterprise.

Anglo-American Rum Treaty Signed Today

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23. — The new rum treaty between America and Great Britain was signed at the State Department today. Secretary Hughes signed for the United States and the retiring British Ambassador affixed the signature for his government.

The treaty extends the American right to search beyond the three mile limit and in return permits British vessels to bring ship's stores of liquor into American ports under seal.

Although the treaty will have to be ratified by the senate before it is to become effective it is thought that pending this formal approval each government will show a more lenient attitude toward each other regarding the liquor question which up until now has been a great disturbing element between the two countries.

Indian Guide Sues Mrs. Stillman.

Republicans Offer Compromise Tax Bill

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23. — Republican members of the House Ways and Means Committee offered today to compromise with the Democrats on the Mellon tax reduction bill and form a non-partisan measure to be presented to the house. Representatives Garner, Democrat of Texas and member of the committee to whom the offer was made, did not definitely commit the minority members to a compromise.

De La Huerta Forces Have Decided to Raise Blocade of Tampico

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23. — The De La Huerta revolutionists in Mexico are preparing plans to raise their blockade of the port of Tampico and substitute a policy of warning foreign commercial craft that enter the zone of bombardment there that they do so at their own risk.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23. — Mexican revolutionary leaders have advised Consul Wood at Vera Cruz of their decision to raise the blockade from the port of Tampico.

Consul Wood's report to the State Department today announcing the decision did not state definitely whether the revolutionary decision meant a permanent lifting of the blockade or whether it was to be of a temporary nature as previously reported. He has been asked by the department for further information regarding the matter.

If Consul Wood's reply shows conclusively that the De La Huerta forces have abandoned the blockade permanently orders for withdrawal of the cruiser Richmond now patrolling Mexican waters to protect American interests.

New British Ministry Takes Office Today

LONDON, Jan. 23. — The Labor Ministry headed by J. Ramsey MacDonald formally took office at noon today. Members of the Baldwin government paid a visit to Buckingham Palace shortly before noon following a little later by Prime Minister MacDonald and his associates. Upon arrival the new ministry was received at the palace and received their different fields of office.

Prime Minister MacDonald is wasting no time in beginning work on the formation of the new government. A cabinet meeting has been called for this afternoon at which time the policy to be presented to Parliament when it reassembles will be prepared.

ENROLLMENT OF CITY SCHOOLS REACHES THE 2000 MARK

1279 White Children Enrolled; Capacity of Buildings Overtaxed

The enrollment of the Greenville City schools to date is over two thousand children. Of this number 1279 are white and the remainder are colored. The capacity of the buildings is more than taxed to take care of this situation. In order to handle the situation in white schools it was necessary this week for another grade to be formed at the Evans Street School. And since there was no room in the Evans Street building, it was necessary to place the grade in one of the basement rooms of the High School. This is a fourth grade and they are now being taught in what was formerly the sewing room of the Domestic Science Department. The sewing is now being done in another room. The High School building is now more than strained to take care of its own pupils to say nothing of the additional ones from the grammar grades that have been placed in it. The High School has reached an enrollment of 330. The Evans Street School has enrolled so far 691 pupils. The Model School has enrolled 218 and the Cotton Mill School 45. All these figures indicate clearly that Greenville is growing in population. Judging by school figures it would seem that folks are always moving into Greenville, but very few moving away. The school buildings that Greenville now were built for the city when the total white school enrollment was not more than eight hundred. The Evans Street School is supposed to take care of 300 rather than the 700 it is now handling. The high school building was built for 225 instead of the 375 it is now handling. Under such crowded conditions it is a known fact that the best interests of the child cannot be always thought of. The supply of light in a lot of the rooms is not sufficient. Ventilation in a lot of rooms is very poor. Playground space is too limited, and the physical development of the child is greatly hindered. Any citizen of the town only has to go to any of the schools while they are in session in order to realize that the above statements are all correct, and that something ought to be done in order to take care of the future enrollment of the schools. There will be at least one hundred more children to go to school next year, even if no one else moves into Greenville. This is brought about by virtue of the fact that there are always about 130 beginners every year. It is the desire of the school authorities that the Greenville public visit the schools at any and all times.

King Convicted On Charge of Burning Tobacco Pack House

GREENSBORO, Jan. 23. — Joe King has just been convicted in the Superior Court on a charge of burning a tobacco pack house last October and sentenced by Judge G. W. Connor to serve from two to five years in the state prison, according to W. A. Scott, state deputy fire marshal and investigator. Inspector Scott was assigned to the case and revealed valuable information for the state. It was said. King was said to have fired the pack house which had an estimated \$4,000 store of tobacco in it, following payment with Alex Katespein, owner of the house, about a bill that King is said to have owed the latter.

THREE MEN KILLED WHEN ENGINE BOILER EXPLODES

PITTSBURGH, Jan. 23. — The boiler of an Erie railroad engine, heading the morning express from Pittsburgh to Cleveland over the Pittsburgh and Lake Erie railroad, exploded at Aliquippa, Pa., 23 miles west of this city, today while the train was running at a speed of 40 miles per hour. Engineer George Clark, fireman I. L. Kuechler and J. R. Meade, road foreman of the engine were killed.

FOUR DIE IN WRECK CRUISER TACOMA

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23. — Four lives were lost in the final wrecking of the cruiser Tacoma which for the past week has been stranded on Blanquitas reef off Vera Cruz.

The dead are Captain Herbert G. Sparrow, Edward E. Haxter, radioman 2nd class, Homer Harry Lusier, radioman 1st class, and Solomon Sivin, radioman 3rd class. The remaining of forty-eight men who had stayed on the ill fated vessel with Captain Sparrow are now on board a naval tug in Vera Cruz harbor.

The bodies of five dead are still aboard the cruiser but an effort will be made today to remove them.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22. — Death of Captain Hubert G. Sparrow, of the wrecked Cruiser Tacoma, at Vera Cruz, and two radio operators of the ship, due to an accident aboard the Tacoma during a hurricane was reported to the state department tonight in a cable message from Consul Wood at Vera Cruz.

The message gave no details but said that Captain Sparrow and the two operators lost their lives while in the performance of their duties.

Consul Wood's message which was sent from Vera Cruz at 2 p. m. today was made public by the Navy Department as follows:

"I am profoundly distressed to announce the death of the captain of the U. S. S. Tacoma and also of two radio operators through an accident on the ship during a hurricane while in performance of duty. Particulars will follow."

Fall Is En Route to Washington to Appear Before Committee

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 23. — Albert B. Fall, former secretary of Interior, and J. W. Zevely, personal friend of Harry F. Sinclair, oil magnate, left here at 7:38 this morning over the Louisville and Nashville railway for Washington to comply with subpoenas ordering them to appear before the senatorial committee investigating the Teapot Dome oil lease.

E. L. Doheny, president of the Mexican Petroleum Corporation and his party left last night at 8:10 for Washington it was learned today.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23. — While the Senate Teapot Dome investigating committee is awaiting the return of former Secretary of Interior Albert B. Fall to Washington, discussion of the sensational testimony already given in the Wyoming oil lease inquiry raged throughout official Washington and may result in considerable debate in the Senate. Senator Caraway, who has already openly attacked the official action of the former secretary, today urged immediate cancellation of the oil lease.

Mr. Fall will face the investigating committee on Friday having announced last night in New Orleans that he would leave today for Washington in response to a summons.

The committee's purpose in recalling the former secretary is to insist that he explain the source of \$110,000 which he has already been testified that he carried to El Paso with him to purchase additions to his New Mexico ranch.

UNDERWOOD URGES SEVEN - YEAR TERM FOR U. S. PRESIDENT

Delivers Address Before Akron Chamber Commerce Today

AKRON, O., Jan. 24. — A six or seven year term for presidents, with a provision making the executive ineligible for reelection was advocated and the bureaucracy, officialism or functionalism as it exists in the United States government today, was attacked by U. S. Senator Oscar W. Underwood in his second speech of his campaign for the Democratic Presidential nomination, made here today before the Akron Chamber of Commerce.

"Change the system of four year terms," said Senator Underwood. "Make the term six or seven years and make the executive ineligible for reelection and you will have removed all temptation to further personal ambition, you will have taken out of the sphere of partisanship the one man in the country who should stand above and beyond it, and you will have purified the very air of politics itself, by giving it worthier motives and loftier ideals."

In speaking of bureaucracy, Senator Underwood said much time has been lost but it is still not too late to "strangle this detestable thing which attacks and eats into the very vitals of government."

"In the United States the evil was peace, bread and war fed" said the Senator. "War and the after-war nourishment has grown it into a monster."

Before launching into his two leading discussions the Alabama Senator paid high tribute to Akron and its industries and then touched lightly on the foreign policy of this country.

"Should some new catastrophe overtake unhappy Europe I am clear in my mind," he said "that the United States would be irresistibly drawn into the maelstrom ere the conflict ended."

"We talk about the foreign policy or the lack of it! I tell you that this country's foreign policy is already hewn out for it by an inexorable logic of events, and that our destiny henceforth is unalterably interwoven with the destinies of our sister nations overseas. It is the lack of vision to see this of which I have complained; for it is of this blindness, and this alone, that a selfish policy of inaction and aloofness is born."

In presenting his argument for a single term of either six or seven years for presidents, Senator Underwood gave a brief history of the question as it was discussed in the first Federal Convention when propositions ranging from a term of three years with possible re-election to seven years without re-eligibility, were thoroughly discussed. He went on to show that once the states in convention decided that the presidential term should be seven years and that he should be ineligible for re-election. He told that Washington could have had a term but refused it and that Thomas Jefferson did likewise and gave as his reason that "if some termination to the services of the Chief Magistrate be not fixed by the constitution, or supplied by practice his office, nominally for years, will in fact become for life."

Senator Underwood said that Andrew Jackson not only refused a third term but even advocated a limit be inserted in the constitution. He said in the time of Grant the house passed a resolution by a vote of 234 to 12, endorsing the precedent established by Washington. Senator Underwood quoted Benjamin Harrison and Woodrow Wilson, as having criticised the present presidential term arrangement.

CORDEAL, GA., Jan. 23. — One man was shot and almost instantly killed, another seriously wounded and a third slightly wounded today when a negro for whom a posse was searching was surrounded at a saw mill on Flint river. The negro after opening fire on the posse made his escape.

Will Question Her on Peace Plan.



Miss Esther Everett Lape, member in charge of the Bok Peace Plan Award, has been summoned to appear before a United States Senate Committee that will investigate the motive behind the Bok award of \$100,000 for a plan whereby America may aid in the peace of the world. Miss Lape was Publicity Manager in Gifford Pinchot's campaign for Governor of Pennsylvania in 1922 and before that was prominent as a writer, teacher and propagandist.

MOTHER AND 4 DAUGHTERS ARE BURNED TO DEATH

POTTSVILLE, Pa., Jan. 23. — A mother and her four daughters, ranging in ages from one to sixteen years, were burned to death in a fire at Middleport, about five miles from here, early today when their home was almost completely destroyed. The husband and father was severely burned in attempting to rescue them.

President of Clemson College Died Last Night in Washington

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23. — Dr. W. M. Riggs, president of Clemson College, South Carolina, died at a hotel here last night. He came to Washington to appear before a congressional committee in connection with agricultural matters in which his college was vitally interested.

He became ill during the recent severe weather and failed to rally. His widow is expected to arrive in Washington today. She will return to Clemson College with the body tonight.

9,946,462 Bales Cotton Ginned Prior to Jan. 18

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23. — Cotton ginned prior to January 18 totaled 9,946,462 running bales including 235,891 round bales counted as half bales; 20,181 bales American-Egyptian and 781 bales Sea Island the census bureau announced today.

Ginnings to that date last year were 9,648,261 running bales including 168,428 round bales counted as half bales; 30,827 bales of American-Egyptian and 5,074 bales of Sea Island.

OFFER TO MANUFACTURE FERTILIZER AT MUSCLE SHOALS PRESENTED TODAY

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23. — An offer of the Union Carbide Company to manufacture fertilizer at the Muscle Shoals plant was transmitted to congress today by Secretary Weeks.

Democratic Candidate For Governor Favors Better Education, Good Roads, Human Welfare and Better Health Measures

Speaking in the Pitt County court house today, to several hundred Democratic friends who had requested him to appear here, J. W. Bailey candidate for governor, declared the way to maintain and to increase the rate of progress in the State of North Carolina lay in three measures — one being a fair adjustment of the tax burden; another being the securing of just freight rates for the state; and the other being agricultural redemption. He further declared that the State had been thinking politically but now was the time that it should think along industrial and agricultural lines and that all program was founded upon moral consideration.

Mr. Bailey told his hearers that he proposed to set up an absolutely constructive program, one that he said would bring great progress to the state without increasing the expense.

"Whenever we get our farmers on a sound basis; whenever we get our shippers and consumers justice in freight rates; and whenever we get the tax burden adjusted, we will have laid a foundation for such progress as this state never knew before," declared the speaker, "we can bring about each one of these without increasing the taxes."

For five years the volume of taxes has increased in this state at an alarming rate, it was said by the speaker, and he continued that it was safe to say that the average of farming land is paying from three to ten times as much taxes as he was in 1918. Every year there is an increase, he said.

Small homes and tenements in the cities were said to have fared most badly, and were the taxes on them were declared to have been increased in every year since 1919. The speaker said that there was no assurance that the taxes would not be increased in the years 1924, 1925, 1926 and so on unless tax-payers rose up and put an end to it.

"The United States government is proposing reduction in taxes of \$350,000,000 but North Carolina is not proposing a reduction. On the (Continued on page 4)

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ADVANTAGES OF THE DEMOCRATIC PLAN

The chief advantages of the Democratic bill over the Mellon bill are shown by the following analysis:

There were 6,662,000 income taxpayers in 1921. Of these the Democratic proposal benefits 6,650,000 more than the Mellon plan. The remaining 12,000 are benefitted more by the Mellon plan than by the Democratic, although the 12,000 are given substantial relief by the Democratic plan.

Every taxpayer with an income up to \$50,000 is given a larger percentage of reduction by the Democratic plan than by the Mellon plan. Every taxpayer with an income above \$50,000 is given substantial reduction by the Democratic plan.

Single persons are given an exemption of \$2,000 instead of \$1,000 as under the present law and married persons or heads of families are given \$3,000 exemption instead of \$2,500 as under the present law. These provisions relieve 2,400,000 single and married persons from making returns as at present, but who pay no tax, and 1,646,000 persons with incomes to \$1,000 to \$2,000 are relieved both from making returns and paying taxes. The Mellon plan does not contain these provisions.

On incomes up to \$10,000 the normal rates are cut in half and above that are reduced 25 per cent. The Mellon plan grants no additional exemption and reduces normal rates only 25 per cent.

The surtax rates at \$12,000 under the Democratic plan instead of \$6,000 under the present law and \$10,000 under the Mellon plan.

The higher surtax rates are cut from 50 per cent to 44 per cent on incomes above \$94,000. The Mellon plan would cut this rate

from 50 per cent to 25 per cent above \$100,000. It is pointed out that the surtax rate was reduced by the last Congress from 65 per cent to 50 per cent for the exclusive benefit of taxpayers with incomes above \$200,000.

In the last Congress when Secretary Mellon attempted to have the higher surtax rate reduced to 25 per cent, as he is now proposing, President Harding in a letter offered to compromise on 40 per cent, only 4 per cent less than the present Democratic plan.

The Democratic plan gives 33 1-3 per cent reduction on earned incomes as compared with unearned incomes; the Mellon plan gives only 25 per cent reduction, but in this respect the Mellon plan does a great injustice to a large class of taxpayers who earn their incomes by combining personal service with capital investment, because it excludes this class from the benefit of the proposed 25 per cent reduction. This would exclude farmers, small merchants, tradesmen of all kinds, plumbers, insurance agents and many editors and publishers, especially publishers of the smaller dailies and weekly papers. The Democratic 33 1-3 per cent reduction on earned incomes specifically includes this large number of taxpayers, many of whom pay both normal and surtaxes.

MR. DENBY ANNEXES THE NORTH POLE
In commenting on Mr. Denby's explanation of the purposes of the proposed Polar flight by the Shenandoah the Editor of the New York World says:

Secretary Denby announces that the real purpose of the Shenandoah's flight to the North Pole is to annex to the United States a lot of land in that forbidding quarter of the globe. "This area is certain," he says, "to be of high strategic value if we look forward to warfare and commerce in the future."

All these years we have gone along in the comforting belief that with the Panama Canal, with Hawaii and little Guam and the Philippine Archipelago, and with Porto Rico and the Virgin islands and whatever territory the marines might occupy, we were in a fairly secure position. But we were mistaken. We need the North Pole to strengthen our defenses.

After the Shenandoah expedition has annexed the North Pole and adjacent ice-fields we shall have to annex other ice-fields and cover them with long-range guns to protect the North Pole. Then we shall need whole chains of icebergs as keys and bases for our flying fleets. And to protect the keys and bases established at fixed intervals we shall need no end of ice cruisers and destroyers.

We have advanced into the tropics and barely finished conquering yellow fever and the deadly mosquito. And now we must annex the North Pole and learn to fight scurvy and the household pests of the country. It looks almost as though the job would never be done.

BERLIN.—Dr. Eugenie Schwartz, manager of the dining room for brain workers which Austrian women are maintaining in an old imperial castle in Berlin, receives many interesting letters from persons who want to help German students.

Philippine Legislature Looking For A Home

MANILA.—The insular legislature is house hunting. An imposing edifice has been started for its use but the contractor ran out of funds and the legislative home, pending the sale of building bonds to finance further construction, remains an uninhabitable pile of gray concrete and rusty iron.

In the meantime the legislature has been renting a spacious building which belongs to the City of Manila. This building rejoices in the title of "The Ayuntamiento" and the City of Manila heretofore has collected an annual rent of one million pesos from the insular government. But last year the legislature voted to give the city only \$25,000 as rent for the building.

Now the city authorities say the city treasury is hard up also. The city wants the million pesos rent, including back rent, or it wants possession of the building. The city proposes to turn the Ayuntamiento into a school building and cut down the city's annual rents for school buildings scattered about the city.

The legislature hasn't the million pesos, and it has no place to go if ejected. And there the matters rests.

other hand, we are being told that those who stand for tax reduction are opposed to progress, I deny it. I am here to maintain four propositions as follows: Land is over taxed, especially farms and small homes; stop the steady increase of burdens of taxation; our progress will be arrested unless the increasing of taxes be stopped, and make a just distribution of taxes.

Mr. Bailey said that it had been proclaimed that taxes could not be reduced. To this he replied that they could be reduced and that they could at least be held down to their present rate instead of continuing to increase them.

While the speaker said that he did not wish to increase the taxes of anyone, he said that the farmers and the owners of small houses must be relieved and if to this it was necessary to increase the tax on incomes, inheritances, and franchises that he would advocate such.

The policy of the gubernatorial candidate was given as follows:
"I am for public education in full measure. We must provide adequate education for our boys and girls.

"I am for good roads. Every man in possession of his senses is for good roads. I consider the State morally bound to finish its road program as protected and they maintain the road it has taken over.

"I am for progressive constructive public service in education, roads, human welfare, charities, health measures.

"We will see how far we may reduce the burden by sound economy. If sound economy is not sufficient, then we will set about to shift the burden. Land must be relieved. It is unjust, and morally wrong to make land ownership and home ownership difficult. It is wrong to put upon the land the entire burden of the taxes that support the counties, cities, and towns, the schools and the public roads (except State Highway). Nevertheless, it is being done."

Mr. Bailey claimed that personal property as source of taxation was a "vanishing quantity." The last legislature, he said, distinguished itself by striking \$100,000,000 from its books by one act.

In pointing out the unfairness of the present system of taxation, Mr. Bailey said that the \$300 exemption on personal taxes but that it meant little when it was compared with the fact that the small man could not convert his horses, cow, of the like into securities as does the man who converts large amounts of money into tax exempt securities and bonds.

"North Carolina has three great tasks," Mr. Bailey. "If she will accomplish these, we will have made some progress that will put this state at the forefront in a way that will amaze the most optimistic. These tasks are simple to see.
"First get the tax burden adjusted and quit increasing taxes. Deliver our people from the unjust freight rates that they are paying and we

can do this for the state is greater than the railroad. Institute a public policy that will stop short of nothing less than agricultural redemption—we must have sure and just returns from honest toil. We must bring our farmers abreast of our industrial development. The entire United States must give attention to agricultural relief. Senator Brookhart said in a speech in the Senate last week that 1,890,000 American farmers had gone broke since 1920."

Mr. Bailey said that he agreed with President Chase of the State University, that what was needed was a well balanced progress and a well balanced Commonwealth. He further stated that such would be his goal and that such was the real theme of his campaign.

Referring to the "oil machine" that he said was fighting those advocated such reforms, he said that it was only "an incident" of the campaign. He said that the old machine forgot nothing and learned nothing and that it had chosen to stand in the way. The speaker concluded by saying the machine is dying a natural death and that at the rate it is going it cannot last much longer.
