ANOTHER LOAN TO FALL IS REVEALED BY JAMES ZEVELY

Attorney Says Sinclair Made Loan of \$25,000 In Liberty Bonds

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—Harry F. Sinclair, to whom Secretary of the Interior Albert B. Fall leased the Teapot Dome naval oil reserve, afterward loaned Fall \$25,000 worth of Liberty Bonds, and gave him \$10,000 for expenses on a trip to Russia, Sinclair's attorney, James W. Zevely, testified before the Senate investigation committee yesterday.

This brings the amount which Fall is known to have borrowed from men to whom he leased naval oil property to a total of \$135,000. E. L. Doheny, who leased the Elk Hills reserve from Fall, loaned him \$100,000.

This testimony, however, conflicts with that given Monday by G. D. Wahlberg, Sinclair's private secretary, who said the Liberty bonds were turned over to Zevely in October or November, 1922. Fall resigned from the Cabinet in March, 1923. Wahlberg will be called to the stand again tomorrow and asked to reconcile this discrepancy, if he can.

Two notes, one said to have been given by Fall for the \$100,000 loan and the other for the Liberty bonds, are all that now stand between Fall, Doheny and Sinclair and very grave charges. The notes, neither of which has yet been produced, are the only documentary proof that the money and bonds were loans and not gifts. A committee of the Senate is expected to determine its age.

Wahlberg testified Monday that 25,000 shares of Sinclair stock were turned over to Zevely at the same time the Liberty bonds were delivered to him. Zevely testified today that the stock was a personal loan to him from Sinclair. Zevely said he sold the stock for \$115,000, and used \$100,000 of the money in purchasing a house on Long Island, depositing the rest in the bank. Senator Walsh announced afterward that he probably would subpoena the bank records to corroborate Zevely's testimony.

Zevely is the man for whom the famous race horse Vev is named. He is a burly man and has an air of bluff, hearty good nature. But his memory failed him badly on several occasions. Admitting that he had conferred in New Orleans with Fall less than a week ago, he could give none of the conversation between them. He was sure, however, they had not discussed the false statement which Fall made to the committee about the source of the money he got from Doheny.

Jumps From Fire Escape Crushes Head And Breaks Neck

TARBORO, Jan. 26.—Rowland Allsbrook, 18 years old, jumped from the third story fire escape of the Masonic Temple here today. His head was crushed and his neck broken when he struck the pavement 30 feet below. Funeral services will take place in Scotland Neck Sunday afternoon.

CIVIL WAR SHELL EXPLODES, KILLING NINE-YEAR-OLD CHILD

SCOTLAND NECK, Jan. 26.—An explosion from an old Civil War bomb shell which was being used as an andiron in a building in the colored section here this afternoon resulted in the death of Arthur Smith nine-year-old child of John Henry Smith, colored. There were four persons in the building, which was used as a storage house for tobacco. The child, who was fatally injured, was sitting nearest the fireplace when the explosion occurred. He was rendered unconscious and died three hours later. Serious damage was done to the building and two other occupants, both colored, were slightly injured. No one thought that the bombshell contained an explosive, though there was a brass cap at the pointed end of it.

GREENVILLE TOBACCO BOARD TRADE, AND THE MERCHANTS ASSOCIATION ENTERTAINED BY ROTARY, KIWANIS

The Greenville Tobacco Board of Trade and the Greenville Merchants Association were entertained by the local Rotary and Kiwanis clubs last night in a joint meeting at the Rotary building.

Promptly at 6:30 Will Hooker called the meeting to order, with June Rose leading the group in singing America, after which Lee Sandler invoked Divine Blessing.

The supper, which had been so ably prepared under the direction of Dave Turner and Tom Hollingsworth was then enjoyed to the fullest. Tom and Dave are both artists when it comes to preparing a tempting meal. Will Hooker, president of the Kiwanis Club, stated the object of the meeting by saying it was for the purpose of ascertaining the wishes of those present as to the advisability of organizing a Greenville Chamber of Commerce.

Robert H. Wright, president of the Teachers College, was called on to outline the need of a Chamber of Commerce. To become boosters; to do intelligent advertising; to attract retail trade; to develop industry; to work for community welfare then we must have a live, aggressive Chamber of Commerce. "The towns that are forging their way towards the front today," continued the speaker, are the ones with live Chambers of Commerce. "It is up to Greenville to organize and go forward, or not organize and go backward."

J. B. James then submitted a budget, which had been prepared by a committee, in which it was definitely disclosed just how the amount asked for would be spent.

W. H. Dail, Jr., spoke about what Greenville could do relative to locating industries. Said he: "We have many natural advantages if we will but utilize them. This is no time to be inactive, but up and aggressive. I believe Greenville realizes that she should have a Chamber of Commerce and to strike now. Opportunity was afforded those present as to signing for membership, a large number responding immediately."

Among the others to take part in the discussion: Charlie Laughinghouse, Sam Currin and J. E. W. Cook, rector of St. Paul's Episcopal church.

"I am glad of the opportunity of becoming one of the charter members of the Greenville Chamber of Commerce," said Rector Cook. "I realize that membership in this organization will mean much to me, therefore, you business men should be the more forcibly impressed with its certain value."

Dave Turnage, at the request of Will Hooker, appointed the following committee to perfect plans for immediate membership solicitation and the perfection of the Greenville Chamber of Commerce: General chairman, W. H. Dail, Jr.; C. W. Shuff, representing the Tobacco Board of Trade; J. N. Hart, representing the Merchants Association; W. H. Woolard representing the Kiwanis Club; J. C. Gaskins representing the Rotary Club; J. B. James representing the Greenville Bar.

Chairman Dail stated that he would call the committee together the first of next week to map out plan of procedure.

Contributing, in a very large way toward the enjoyment of the even-

ing, was the Greenville orchestra. Their delightful selections were enjoyed immensely by the large gathering present.

Charlie Shuff, president of the Greenville Tobacco Board of Trade, spoke interestingly as to his views as to the value of the proposed organization and said he felt sure that the tobacco interests would be glad to be identified with the movement.

J. N. Hart, president of the Greenville Merchants Association, said the time had now come to boost Greenville and Greenville advantages and the proper medium was a Chamber of Commerce. Said he: "I feel that Greenville merchants will be glad of the opportunity of becoming members of this organization."

D. L. Turnage spoke as to the fine work that could be accomplished if all would get together, pull together and work together. "It is impossible for a great work to be undertaken and carried through to a successful conclusion unless there is that hearty co-operation. 'Now is the time for all forces to unite,'" continued Dave.

H. A. White spoke about the splendid location of Greenville and the many natural advantages she enjoys, but to really translate our potential possibilities and make them actual Greenville needs a Chamber of Commerce. "I am happy to say that I have confidence in Greenville, in Greenville, citizens and in this section," said the speaker. Further commenting: "Various organizations in our midst are working individually, but what we need, to have the maximum of achievement and accomplishment, is a Greenville Chamber of Commerce. Now is the time to work as a unit. Our entire interests demand this."

Former Head Schools Here Dies In S. C.

Was First Superintendent of Graded Schools of Greenville

Prof. W. Banks Dove, secretary of state for South Carolina, first superintendent of the Greenville Graded schools, died Wednesday night at Columbia, S. C., after an illness of several months.

Prof. Dove leaves a widow and two children. He was fifty-four years old.

Mr. Dove came to Greenville 21 years ago and was for several years head of the Greenville graded schools. He was held in high esteem here. Several pupils who attended school during his administration are now filling prominent places in the business world.

He has been secretary of State of South Carolina for the past six years and was one of the State's most popular officials.

COOLIDGE SEEKS ADVICE ON LEASES

To Ascertain If Leases Should Or Should Not Be Cancelled

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—While the senate oil committee was today seeking further light relating to former Secretary Fall and Harry F. Sinclair, President Coolidge asked the Interior department to submit to him expert advice as to the wisdom of the policy under which Sinclair and Doheny interests had secured leases from Fall for oil reservations in Wyoming and California.

The president asked the Interior Department to furnish at the earliest possible moment the report on the question of whether the leases protected the interests of the government.

This inquiry is separate from instructions given to the Department of Justice which is studying the evidence to determine whether or not there is proof of fraud in connection with the leases but both are directed toward the same end. The purpose is to ascertain whether or not the leases should be cancelled by the government.

Capital of Citizens Saving Bank Trust Increased \$50,000

NEW BERN, Jan. 26.—Decision to increase the capital stock and to change the name of the organization has been reached by the stockholders and directors of the Citizens' Saving Bank and Trust Co. The capital will be increased from \$25,000 to \$50,000. The name of the Bank will now be the Citizens' Bank and Trust Co. Officers and directors of the bank were also elected. They were W. H. Henderson, president; R. N. Scott, cashier; while the board of directors include officers and William Dunn, William Dunn, Jr., E. H. Meadows, W. M. Pinnix, T. A. Uzzell, H. G. Tolson, Owen Dunn and D. W. Hanks.

RADIO REPORTS STEAMER ABANDONED IN PACIFIC

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 26.—The S. S. Mary Harlock, a steel vessel of 3,249 net tons, has been abandoned 2,700 miles west of Honolulu the crew having been taken aboard the President Taft according to a radio message received here early this morning.

MINE EXPLOSION LATE YESTERDAY TAKES 30 LIVES

JOHNSON CITY, Ill., Jan. 26.—A checkup today definitely placed the number of dead in yesterday's mine explosion at 30 persons. Two others are reported missing and eight are confined in a hospital two of whom will not recover.

Illinois mine authorities, a coroner and officials of the Great-Clinch Coal Company, owners of the mine where the blast occurred, joined hands today in an effort to determine the cause of the explosion which is believed to have been from spontaneous combustion of coal damp and dust.

It was midnight before the mine rescue workers could penetrate the dense fumes to reach the imprisoned men caught in entrapments number 11 and 12 about a mile from the shaft on the 280 foot level. Of the 40 men working here 30 were taken out this morning. Five were resuscitated by use of the pulmotor and three were able to make their way to the top unassisted. Two were unaccounted for. Rescue workers found the bodies of the men strewn about the entrance and the clothing had burned away from several.

The first news of the explosion was brought to the surface by the mine engineer. There were approximately 450 men at work in the mine at the time of the explosion and most of them were hurriedly brought to the surface.

YOUNG AVIATOR KILLED IN FALL

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Jan. 26.—Lieutenant George R. Ruske was instantly killed today when his airplane, a Curtis Jenny training plane, fell several hundred feet in a spin crashing near Brooks field. Young Ruske had held his commission less than six months. His father is James S. Ruske, of Indiana.

Lincoln Confesses To Killing of Wife And Her Brother in Feb.

AURORA, Ill., Jan. 25.—Warren Lincoln today confessed the shooting and killing of his wife and her brother Byron, Schoup on February 10, 1923. He stated that he buried the bodies and that the heads would be found in the city dump in a concrete block which he had moulded around them.

He was taken to the city dump where under his direction diggers found the concrete block weighing several hundred pounds. Lincoln avowed in the arms of a detective as the block was unearthed. The block upon examination proved to contain the heads of Mrs. Lincoln and her brother.

Gastonia Woolen Mill Is the Newest Textile Corporation

GASTONIA, Jan. 26.—The Gastonia Woolen Mills is name under which the county's newest textile corporation will be operated. It was chartered to spin and weave woolen fabrics, for use as one of the foundations for rollers used in the spinning of yarns. The incorporators are John E. White, K. M. Glass and others. Resides the woolen fabric that will be manufactured the plant will also put out other fabrics and cloths for various purposes. The mill is located on Second and Linwood streets.

MEXICAN GUNBOAT PREPARING ATTACK REBEL STRONGHOLDS

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 26.—The departure of the Mexican gunboat Bravo for southern waters to attack the rebel forts at Progreso and Vera Cruz is imminent it was announced today. A trial trip was made on the Mississippi river today to test out the vessel's new engines. Marines to complete the complement of the vessel are due to arrive tonight via El Paso.

Mr. Cecil Satterthwaite, of Pactolus, passed through Greenville today on his way to Des Moines, Iowa. He will return in about ten days, after visiting several states west of the Mississippi river.

UNITED STATES WINNER FIRST OLYMPIC EVENT

CHAMONIX, France, Jan. 26.—The United States drew first blood in the 1924 Olympic games this morning when Charles Jettrow, of Lake Placid, N. Y., won the 500 metre speed skating race.

Jettrow defeated Gorman, of Canada by 15 feet. His time of 41 seconds flat was the best of any heat skated and under the rules he was declared winner of the event.

KU KLUX KLAN MAY ELIMINATE MARK

Measure Be Discussed At National Congress February 26

ATLANTA, Jan. 26.—Elimination of the mask and changes of the present form of government will be proposed when the Ku Klux Klansmen gather here on February 26 in response to a recent call for a national Klan congress according to a story appearing today in the Atlanta Constitution.

The meeting was called by Imperial Giant E. Y. Clark, says the news story, for the purpose of bringing about drastic reforms in the order or in event such cannot be accomplished to discuss ways and means for disbandment.

We are convinced that the mask has been abused and has put the order in disrepute and favor its immediate elimination, the paper quotes some officials of Nathan Bedford Forrest Klan number L. of Atlanta, as saying.

Funeral Lenin Will Take Place Sunday

MOSCOW, Jan. 26.—The funeral of Nikolai Lenin will be made an occasion of impressive tribute for their first Bolshevik premier by every part of the nation-wide domain when the body is lowered into its temporary mausoleum in Red Square at 4 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. There will be a five minutes cessation of all activity throughout the entire country. All trains and telegraphs will cease operations.

The only sound to break the silence will be that of the guns in their last salute to their deceased leader. One hundred guns will be fired in the larger towns, twenty-five in the smaller towns and rifles will be used in the villages where there is no artillery.

OFFICERS CAPTURE TWO MORE PRISONERS ESCAPED FROM CAMP

ASHEVILLE, Jan. 26.—Two more escaped convicts from the state prison camp near Marshall, Herbert Stewart serving 30 years for burglary, and James Whitlock serving 30 years for burning a barn at Mount Airy several years ago, were captured early this morning.

Nine of the 18 prisoners who escaped Thursday night by sawing their way through the walls of the improvised prison camp near Marshall had been recaptured this morning according to advices from Madison county. Word this morning said that it was understood that the camp included some of the most dangerous prisoners from the state penitentiary. The camp was established about two weeks ago.

MALE TEACHERS TO HAVE CHARGE OF VOCATIONAL TRAINING SCHOOLS NOW

ASHEVILLE, Jan. 26.—Under the plans of reorganization of the United States Veterans' Bureau vocational training schools at Waynesville the resignations of nine women teachers effective February 1 were requested. Under the plan of the organization in the fifth district male teachers will be used in the vocational training schools.

Claude Whichard Will Serve Sentence Not Longer Than Three Years; Willie Hines Given 12 Months

Claude Whichard, 22, who on October 25, of last year, shot and killed Joe King, was found guilty of manslaughter in yesterday's session of Pitt county superior court, and given a minimum sentence of 18 and a maximum of 3 years in penitentiary. Willie Hines, negro, who in December killed Mrs. Lina Flake Allen, when he ditched Mr. Allen's car, was found guilty of manslaughter and sentenced to 12 months. On good behavior, upon recommendation of the jury for mercy.

Hines was speeding on the Farmville road at the time of the killing of Mrs. Allen. Mr. Allen with his family was returning home when the car driven by Hines, according to Allen's evidence, ran against his car knocking it into a ditch. All the occupants of the car suffered minor injuries with the exception of Mrs. Allen, who was killed instantly, and a baby which was thrown clear of the car.

Whichard, a nephew of King's, became angry with King when he interfered in a family quarrel between Whichard and his wife. Immediately after the quarrel in which it is alleged, Whichard attempted to strike his wife with a stick and was stopped by King, he left his home, returning a short while later armed with a gun. According to the evidence the door was fastened and Whichard fired through the window with the entire load entering King's back, death being instantaneous.

Japanese People Approve Wedding of Prince Regent

TOKIO, Jan. 26.—In accordance with the ancient customs the wedding of Prince Regent Hirohito and Princess Nagako, the eldest daughter of the Imperial Palace this morning with all the Shinto rites.

Tokio made the most of its first occasion for national rejoicing since the September earthquake and fire disaster. Tremendous crowds thronged the streets surrounding the palace to greet the prince and his bride as they proceeded by different routes to the palace for the ceremony.

Notwithstanding the controversy in which their betrothal was involved, the wedding today of Crown Prince Regent Mishi-No-Miya Hirohito and Princess Nagako generally will be regarded as one of the most popular in the history of the Japanese imperial family. The Japanese people have taken advantage of every opportunity to acclaim them since their betrothal first was announced. The Crown prince, because of his democratic manner and the great personal interest he has taken in the people of his country, is greatly beloved by them and when he becomes their full-fledged ruler undoubtedly he will be the most popular emperor ever to sit upon the imperial throne of Japan. He has ruled Japan as regent since November, 1921, when his father, Emperor Yoshihito, relinquished the reins of government because of his continued illness due to a complication of diseases.

The crown prince was born April 29, 1901, and therefore lacks about three months of being 23 years old. His bride is about two years his junior.

HENRY FORD TO APPEAR BEFORE THE COMMITTEE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—Henry Ford will be requested to appear before the House Military committee early next week to discuss his offer for Muscle Shoals.

The committee in executive session today instructed Chairman Kahn to telegraph the Detroit manufacturer that his presence was desired Monday or Tuesday and if he was unable to attend that the committee wanted to question one of his representatives as to details of his proposal.

"JUST POLITICS"

"The entire situation," said Harry F. Sinclair
at Plymouth, "is just politics."

In commenting on the assertion of Mr.
Sinclair the New York World says:

"No truer word was ever uttered. That
is exactly what the situation is. And the responsibility
for it rests with Mr. Sinclair and
his associates in and out of the Government
who from the beginning have handled the business
matter of leasing the Teapot Dome oil
reserve on a wholly political basis.

"It was just politics when Mr. Sinclair began
to gather about himself a staff of business
associates and a group of personal friends, all
of whom were either in politics or closely connected
with relatives who were. It was just politics
when Secretary Fall—after the Navy
Department had complacently turned over its
leasing rights to the Department of the Interior—
signed away the Wyoming oil reserve
in secret. It must have been just politics,
because if it had been just business the Secretary
of the Navy would have heeded geologists
and the negotiation would have been conducted
in the open. It was just politics for Mr.
Sinclair to have given support to the Republican
campaign that began in 1918 and terminated
with the great victory of 1920, and although
Mr. Sinclair testified that he had carried
politics to the point of contributing to
both parties in the latter year, Democratic
Chairman Hull was never able to find a record
of any financial aid rendered to the Democrats.

"To fight the devil with fire is an old adage,
and consequently those who disputed the wisdom
of the Teapot Dome lease and were concerned
and curious about the close personal
relations between Secretary Fall and Mr. Sinclair,
and particularly curious about the sudden
affluence of Secretary Fall, themselves

turned to politics. Senator Kendrick, in 1922,
a few days after the private transaction in
public lands between the Cabinet and Mr. Sinclair
leaked out, introduced a resolution to
investigate it. Senator La Follette later introduced
another. Under another resolution the Senate
committee is now endeavoring to obtain Mr. Fall's
version of where he got the \$100,000; to fathom the
inwardness of the minds of Mr. Sinclair's private
secretary and lawyers; and to trace certain accounts
on the books of the Hyva Corporation and certain
memoranda found in desks at the Capitol. All this
is just politics, for the simple reason that the
only way in a republic to protect the people is to
fight secret politics with open politics.

"It is just politics for the President to send
a Department of Justice representative to the
hearings. It is just politics for the Attorney
General to promise to act if there is proof of
criminality. It is just politics for them to do this,
because politics brought the Administration into
this ugly net of ill-smelling rumor; and perhaps it
was not wholly without a sense of politics that Col.
Roosevelt, who as Assistant Secretary of the Navy
had approved the transfer of the lease from the Navy
Department to the Interior Department, took the
stand before the Senate committee last Monday,
both preceding and following his brother.

"If it were not for politics, if one set of
politicians was not alert to check the acts of another
set, the United States would be an easier place
for official favoritism, graft and pillage. So in this
instance, at least, give politics due praise. It has
put the spotlight on the Teapot Dome."

Had Mr. Anderson testified that the friend
who gave him the \$5,000 was named John Smith
instead of King he might have given authorities
a still harder job to locate the proper party.

Archery Expert Is
Confident in Flight
Of His Arrows Now

SHERIDAN, WYO.—E. W. (Bill)
Gollings, famed as Wyoming's "cow-
boy artist," plans to shoot big game
this year with bow and arrow, as
did the Indians who are the sub-
jects of some of his pictures.

The artist became interested in
archery a year ago and has become
so skilful that he can pull and shoot
a 55-pound bow, thus making things
interesting for a rabbit or grouse
within reasonable distance. With his
tipped arrows he is confident he will
be successful in his hunt for big game.

An arrow, shot unerringly and under
favorable conditions, will pass
entirely through the body of a large
animal, while in many cases a bullet
from a rifle will flatten out before
completely penetrating. Mr. Gollings
makes his bows of imported lemon
wood and flax strings. The ends are
tipped with cow horn. The arrows
he fashions from hardwood and
turkey winks, tipping them with
army rifle cartridges from which the
contents have been removed.

Heavy Words in Humble Mien.

MANILA.—Several missionaries
motoring, recently through Tondo,
a district of Manila in which many

small Filipino and Chinese stores are
located, noticed frequent signs on
which was written the word "dam-
nit." One of the women in the party
appeared somewhat surprised that the
Filipinos had adopted English pro-

fanity to such an extent as to use
it on signs. It was then explained that "dam-
nit," in the Tagalog dialect, means
clothing, and that the accent falls
on the last syllable.

During Next Summer

PARIS.—The Jaes Gordon Ben-
nett aviation trophy having become
the property of France, Commodore
Louis D. Bennett has offered a cup
to be raced for under similar condi-
tions.

The first contest will be the latter
part of June at Istres, near Mar-
seilles. The distance will be 300
kilometers over a course of 50 kilo-
meters. There will be no winner
unless a speed of 290 kilometers an
hour is attained. The first prize
will be 75,000 francs. It is hoped
here that Americans will participate.

Women Open World Headquarters.
LONDON.—A pavilion has been
erected in the grounds of the British
Empire Exhibition at Wembley
by the International Council of Women.
It will be the headquarters
of the world of women.

Millions of organized women will
be represented in the building, and
from week to week feminine hopes,
aspirations and ideas for the solution
of the world's most difficult prob-
lems will be considered.

AMERICAN ATHLETES TO RUN

LONDON.—Ten events, six of
them relays, have been suggested by
the championship committee of the
British Amateur Athletic Association
for the proposed Anglo-American
match to be held Saturday, July
19, 1924, in London, after the
athletes of the two countries have com-
pleted their sports at the Olympic
Games near Paris.

The suggested events are:
400 yard relay for teams of four,
each man running 100 yards.
One mile relay for teams of four,
each runner covering a quarter mile.
Two mile relay for teams of four,
each runner going half a mile.
Four mile relay for teams of four,
each runner covering a mile.
480 yards relay hurdles, for teams
of four, each man jumping a fourth
of the hurdles.
Steeplechase for teams of four.
One mile medley race—880 yards,
220 yards, 200 yards and 440 yards.
Three mile team race, six to run,
four to count, or four to run, three
to count.
High jump, aggregate total of a
team of four.
Long jump, aggregate total of a
team of four.

Naval Aviators Return
From 11,000 Mile Flight

SAN DOMINGO CITY, W. I.—
What is thought to be the longest
flight ever undertaken by American
aviators came to a successful close
here recently when two navy air-
planes alighted at the local aviation
field. The machines were piloted
by Lieut. Ford O. Rogers and Lieut.
Horace D. Palmer, of the Marine
Corps, with Sergeant Benjamin F.
Belcher and Sergeant Peter P. Tolu-
skiak as mechanics. They had covered
10,953 miles without a forced
landing since Sept. 19 last, when they
started on a trip which took them
as far as San Francisco.

The objective was the internation-
al air meet at St. Louis. The first
leg was to Havana. The take-off
here was at 6:15 a. m., and the avi-
ators were calling on the American
Ambassador to Cuba at 3 o'clock of
the same day. Washington was
reached some 90 hours after the de-
parture from this city. St. Louis, El
Paso, San Diego and San Francisco
were visited on the way out, and the
return trip took in Salt Lake
City, Omaha and Washington again.
The long flight carried the flyers
over the ocean, lakes, deserts, plains
and mountain passes. Speed was not
an object. The trip was undertaken
to demonstrate the mobility of the
aviation squadron stationed on this
West Indian island.

Doubt Quakeproof Buildings.

TOKIO.—News that the American
government proposes to erect an
"earthquake-proof building" in
Tokio has aroused considerable in-
terest here, where the question what
buildings are quake-proof is being
continually asked. Old buildings,
which many thought would go at any
time, stood after the big shock of
September 1. Some modern buildings
which were said to be proof against
the worst shake either collapsed or
were badly damaged, and in some
cases construction companies which
guaranteed their buildings earth-
quake proof are being called upon
to replace them.

AMERICAN FILM GIVES GERMAN
GLAZIERS IDEA TO GET WORK

Munich, Jan.—Charlie Chaplin
and Jackie Coogan, American motion
picture stars, are said to have fur-
nished the idea for providing work for
glaziers. Their picture, "The Kid,"
in which Jackie engages in a whole-
sale smashing of windows, is now be-
ing shown throughout the German
republic.

A glass worker recently arrested at
Reichshall, Bavaria, was charged
with breaking many windows in many
offices and shops, and admitted he
smashed the windows to create em-
ployment for glaziers. Newspapers
assert the man got the idea from
"The Kid."

30,000 MOTORISTS IN YEAR
TRAVERSE CUSTER HIGHWAY

SHERIDAN, Wyo.—Thirty thou-
sand automobiles, representing every
state in the union and various parts
of Canada, traveled during the last
year over the Custer Battlefield high-
way, which extends from Sioux Falls,
S. D. to Glacier national park in
Montana. It is announced by W. D.
Fisher, secretary of the Custer Bat-
tlefield Highway Association. This
is an increase of 1,000 cars over
1920.

The association is planning to ex-
tend the highway from Glacier Park
to Portland, Ore., and from Sioux
Falls to St. Louis or Chicago.

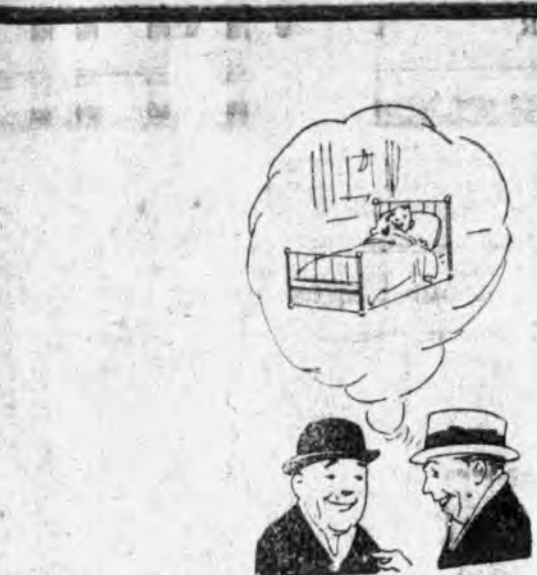
