

Whirlwind Events Move In Plan Cancel Contracts In Naval Oil Reserves

Daugherty Is Requested to Resign; Walsh Denounces Secretary of Navy While Robinson Demands His Resignation

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—Both White House and Congressional branches of the government proceeded today with their plans to throw the whole Fall-Doheny-Sinclair oil lease muddle into the courts.

In another dramatic debate the Senate not only presented action for annulment of the contracts but heard renewed demands that Secretary Denby retire from the cabinet because of his connection with the leasing program.

When the cabinet assembled for its regular Tuesday session there were indications however that President Coolidge expected the Secretary of the Navy to retain his post. In this attitude the administration is supported by Republican leaders in the Senate.

The attack on Denby as well as the proposal to employ special counsel to prosecute the suits for annulment of the oil leases was talked over at a White House conference last when Senator Lodge and several others were present. The president was not ready today, however, to announce the names of those who had been chosen to conduct the prosecution.

Just before the Senate met today the investigating committee received the report of Fall's condition and declared that on tomorrow the committee would question the physicians who had attended Mr. Fall since his arrival in Washington, as to his condition. Mr. Fall's counsel declared today that he was threatened with a nervous breakdown and requested that his statement be taken in the sick room.

Walsh Resolution to Pass.
Immediately upon opening this morning the subject of debate in the Senate was the Walsh resolution which empowers the president to employ special counsel with instruction to proceed immediately, to cancel both the Doheny and Sinclair leases. Passage of the resolution before adjournment tonight is predicted by both sides in the chamber.

The House faced a somewhat different situation however in the resignation of Representative Robinson asking for the immediate removal of Secretary Denby and other naval officials who are believed to have had a hand in the leasing of the oil reserves. The Republican organization in the house is opposed to the measure but it is conceded that there is enough strength in the combination of Democrats and Insurgents Republicans combined to adopt the measure.

Request Daugherty Resign.
A resolution expressing the sense of the Senate that President Coolidge request the immediate resignation of Attorney General Daugherty was prepared today by Senator Wheeler, Democrat of Montana, and he said he would introduce it at the first opportunity. The resolution declared that the president had lost confidence in Mr. Daugherty as exemplified by employing outside counsel to prosecute the oil lease suits. The resolution also asserts that Mr. Daugherty has lost the confidence of the American people and the Department of Justice has fallen into disrepute.

COOLIDGE SAYS TWO GREAT ISSUES RESOLVE AROUND OIL LEASE CONTROVERSY
WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—President Coolidge when questioned by callers today relative to his attitude toward the Robinson resolution requesting the resignation of Secretary of Navy Denby, replied that it was a matter he did not care to discuss. The whole affair growing out of the oil lease controversy, said the president, had resolved itself into two major propositions for the government, first to determine whether there was criminal liability in connection with the leasing and second to determine whether the leases were legal and for the best interest of the government. All other details of the affair in his opinion he said were of lesser importance and would be worked out by the special counsel to be selected.

Selection of the counsel it was indicated today would be made as soon as the Senate adopted the Walsh resolution.

In the investigation into the Government oil land leases, made by ex-Secretary of the Interior Albert B. Fall, of New Mexico, to Harry F. Sinclair and Edward L. Doheny, Attorney-General H. M. Daugherty has been bitterly assailed for his failure to prosecute. The leases, though negotiated by Secretary Fall, were signed by Naval Secretary Edwin Denby, over the strong protest of a number of high naval officers, it is reported. Colonel J. W. Zevilly, Sinclair's attorney, admitted on the witness stand he had loaned Fall \$25,000 in Liberty bonds, given him by Sinclair for that purpose.

Sinclair To Delay His Appearance Before Committee

PARIS, Jan. 29.—Harry F. Sinclair today cabled Senator Lenroot and reiterated his statement that he would not testify further in the oil lease investigations until he had completed his European business trip. In his message Mr. Sinclair welcomes the judicial determination of these questions in the lawfully constituted courts of the country and at the earliest possible date. He added that having appeared before the committee five times and having been discharged that he feels justified in remaining in Europe until his business was finished. On the five occasions that I appeared before the investigating committee, said Mr. Sinclair, I have given every fact concerning the inquiries made and not until you told me that I was discharged did I come to Europe. I came to Europe on business and as soon as I can expedite same I will return. Neither I nor any member of my company have ever given Fall or any representative of the government any money or other consideration whatever in connection with the Teapot Dome lease and I again repeat that I have not done so.

Denby Declares He Has Nothing Regret In the Oil Scandal

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—Secretary Denby after today's cabinet meeting at which the oil lease investigation was discussed, declared that he had no intention whatsoever, of resigning as for the present at least. "I am so convinced" said Mr. Denby, "that I did the right thing that I would do the same again tomorrow regardless of consequences. I feel that I carried out the will of Congress and that my activities served the best interests of the people. Consequently I have nothing to regret and no reason to resign."

Assistant Secretary Roosevelt, whose name has been prominent in connection with the investigation, was declared this morning by Secretary Denby to be absolutely in the clear. "Colonel Roosevelt has nothing to be criticised for in connection with the transaction," said Mr. Denby. "I had full knowledge and accept full responsibility for the entire transaction and Roosevelt is in no wise responsible for the action taken."

Regarding the resolution calling for his resignation Mr. Denby said that he would like to see the senator who in the Senate would vote on a resolution to besmirch the character of any man without according him the opportunity of being heard.

"I want a record vote in the Senate on the Robinson resolution," said the secretary, "so I may determine what senators are willing to besmirch and defame the name of an American citizen guilty of no crime and who has never been charged, tried or convicted in any court."

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—Henry Ford today informed the House Military Committee that he thought it unnecessary for him or one of his representatives to appear before the committee to discuss his offer for Muscle Shoals. This information was contained in a telegram sent by the Detroit manufacturer to Chairman Kahn of the committee. Mr. Ford's telegram stated that he considered further hearings in the matter would only serve to delay action and unnecessarily consume the time of a busy and important committee of Congress as the committee was already in possession of the facts in connection with his proposal.

Skeleton Found In Woods Is Identified

York, S. C., Jan. 29.—A skeleton found in the woods near here several days ago has been identified as that of George V. Hamlin, whose home was somewhere in Virginia. Hamlin was an itinerant jeweler peddler and made his headquarters in Clover last July. He always appeared to be well supplied with money and authorities are proceeding on the theory that Hamlin was murdered.

Hill, trading as Waggoner and Hill, Winston-Salem merchants carrying an account with the bank.

MONDAY'S SESSION COUNTY COURT FEATURED WITH HEAVY DOCKET WHICH REQUIRED ENTIRE DAY

Yesterday's session of county court was featured with one of the heaviest dockets of several past sessions. The entire day was consumed with the hearing of the cases.

Fred Highsmith, charged with misappropriating funds, was bound over to Superior Court. Fred Jenkins, charged with assault with auto, on motion of defendant cause was transferred to Superior Court for trial by jury. Milton Lloyd charged with having wine for sale, was found guilty of manufacturing and fined \$50 and costs. Judgment was continued for 2 years upon good behavior.

Will Moore, jumping board bill, was found guilty and sentenced to 4 months in jail to be assigned to work on roads. Defendant appealed to superior court, under bond of \$250.

J. F. Powell, charged with failure to pay board, was bound over to superior court for trial by jury.

Peter Ross, larceny, case continued to February 4. Nathaniel Brown, was found guilty of assault with deadly weapon, and was sentenced to six months in jail to be assigned to work on county roads. Defendant appealed to superior court under \$200 bond.

Roland King, Jack King, were found guilty of larceny, and sentenced to 8 months county jail to be assigned to work on county roads.

E. T. Wooten, charged with receiving and possession liquor, defendant pleads guilty of possession and was fined \$50 and cost. Defendant was also required to deposit \$100 with clerk for his appearance as witness in superior court in April.

Sam Williams, charged with wine for sale, was found guilty of possession and fined \$50 and costs. In another case defendant plead guilty of manufacturing, and had judgment continued for 2 years upon good behavior and payment of costs.

Rufus Teel Is Shot to Death By Cy Allen

Rufus Teel, negro of the Ayden section was shot and instantly killed yesterday afternoon by Cyrus Allen, negro. Allen so far has evaded the officers who are making every effort to apprehend him.

Immediately after the killing Mr. S. G. Wilkerson held a coroner's inquest, the verdict of the jury being that Teel came to his death by a shot from a gun in the hands of Allen and recommended that he be held for first degree murder.

According to testimony of Helen Allen, wife of Cyrus Allen, she and her husband had been separated since last October and Teel was boarding with her and her father. Yesterday she and Teel were sitting before the fire talking when the door opened and Allen walked in armed with a shot gun. Becoming frightened she rushed out of the house to join her father and as she reached the kitchen she heard the shooting. Returning a few minutes later she found Teel dead, but Allen had made his get-away.

LOCOMOTIVE MEN'S STRIKE IN GREAT BRITAIN OVER NOW

LONDON, Jan. 29.—The strike of locomotive men which has seriously interfered with railway traffic in Great Britain since it began on January 20, ended at 4 o'clock this morning when representatives of the association and railroad officials reached an agreement with the mediation committee of the Trades Union Congress.

Court to Hear Cooper Case Opens Today

WILMINGTON, Jan. 29.—United States District Court convened today in an adjourned session called primarily to consider the cases of Lieutenant Cooper, his son Horace Cooper, his brother Thomas E. Cooper officials of the defunct Commercial National Bank of this city and C. W. Lassiter, patron of the bank, who are charged with violations of the national banking laws.

Judge H. G. Connor who was delayed at his home in Wilson yesterday by the illness of his wife, arrived this morning and went immediately into conference with attorneys and several officials. The grand jury is already investigating the Commercial National Bank case passed on to them by the United States Commissioner after a hearing.

17,474 Bales Cotton Ginned in Iredell Co. Term Ending Jan. 16

STATESVILLE, Jan. 29.—The amount of cotton ginned in Iredell county during the term ended Jan. 16, 1924 is greater by 3408 bales than the amount ginned during the term ended Jan. 16, 1923, according to figures issued by E. E. Sherrill, Federal County Statistician. In the term ended Jan. 16, 1924 there were ginned in Iredell 17,474 bales of cotton while in the same period of 1923 there were ginned 14,066 bales, says the report.

Every Craven County School Represented At Annual Meeting

NEW BERN, Jan. 29.—Every school in Craven county was represented at the annual meeting of the county teachers association held here. In some cases the entire faculty of the school was present. Superintendent R. S. Proctor made speeches on two important issues. These were vocational education and the plan of county-wide organization of the school system on a higher accredited scale committees were appointed to discuss and study these problems in detail.

Sunday Crowds Barred

LONDON.—Because various religious bodies united in protest, the British Empire Exposition, to be held in the spring, will close its doors every Sunday. The argument advanced was that the exposition would be largely an entertainment. Gate receipts will be seriously affected, as Sundays were counted on to draw particularly large crowds.

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probably be increased 1 per cent. This, the league claims, would retard building of school houses, roads, drainage, sewers, water-works and municipal electric light plants, and right here is the nigger in the woodpile. The league is not so much worried about roads, school houses or sewers that might not be built as it is over the fact that if public bonds had to pay a little more interest due to the income from same being taxed, the public would not continue at its present reckless pace in issuing these securities at the rate of a billion or more dollars a year, hence it would be much more difficult for advocates of public ownership schemes to secure millions and hundreds of millions of dollars as they now propose for the development of hydro-electric and public utility properties.

It is estimated that the income from \$30,000,000 of tax-exempt bonds and public securities escapes taxation. To a large extent salaries paid to public officials are tax-exempt. The Public Ownership League advocates continuance of the tax-exempt bond and also an increase in amount of these securities now outstanding.

This nation is now supporting a vast horde of public servants holding political jobs. The program of the Public Ownership League if it could be successfully carried out, would create an enormous additional number of jobs for taxpayers to support and add billions more bonds to the public debt, the income from which would escape taxation. Public property pays no taxes. For every dollar invested in public-owned enterprises, which kill private industry, by just that much are tax-rolls reduced and additional taxes loaded on to remaining private property.

What has the United States to gain by such a program? It is contrary to every idea in our free and democratic form of government. It builds up a system of officialism and paternalism such as has wrecked Europe. Then why in the name of common sense break down the strongest government in the world with this socialistic program?

A statement from Washington says that former Secretary Fall is on the verge of a nervous breakdown. Such is usually the case with the prisoner at the bar.

VICTORY HIGHWAY ACROSS CONTINENT NEARS COMPLETION

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. — The Victory Highway, an unbroken route between New York and San Francisco, will be completed some time this year, according to an announcement by the California State Automobile Association.

The principal barrier, a detour that balked many tourists, was in western Utah, and the Utah highway commission has just signed contracts for the removal of this by the construction of the last link in the Wendover cut-off, which will be ready by the opening of the 1924 tourist season. The Utah-Nevada-California Highway Association arranged the financing of the Wendover cut-off, in cooperation with the California Automobile Association.

The cut-off is about 40 miles long, and 6.17 miles of it is a difficult piece of construction through a salt marsh. Grading of the marsh in preparation for the highway virtually is completed.

The organizations interested raised \$50,000 to assist the State of Utah, which also was able to procure substantial aid from the federal government. The California Automobile Association previously had logged the Victory Highway as far east as Kansas City with its yellow-diamond markers.

EXPERTS STUDYING RUBBER INDUSTRY IN PHILIPPINES

MANILA.—Members of the mission sent by the United States department of agriculture to study the question of rubber production in the Philippines, methods of planting, labor problems and the feasibility of extending plantation work to various sections of the archipelago, have begun their investigations on the island of Basilan.

After studying the methods employed on the few small Basilan plantations the party will proceed to Cotabato province, where rubber also is grown in small quantities.

The mission expects to finish all the field work early next year and then return to Manila, where the data collected will be compiled.

BERLIN.—Building construction in Berlin during 1923 fell far be-

low the record of 1922. In the last quarter it was only 43 percent of the amount for the corresponding period of 1922.

NORMA TALMADGE WITHIN THE LAW

BRITISH COTTON MEN HAVE WORST YEAR IN HISTORY OF BUSINESS

MANCHESTER, Jan.—The serious state of the cotton trade in England was mentioned by Sir Charles Macara, a former chairman of the committee of the International Federation of Master Cotton Spinners and Manufacturers Association, in an address to the Provisional Emergency Cotton Committee here.

He stated that for more than three years a large number of mills had shown no return whatever to those who had invested their money in them, and extra capital was being called up, only to be dissipated owing to the inactivity and want of unanimity among those who controlled the employers' organization. The effect both on Lancashire and the country generally was most disastrous. This was shown in the revenue returns just issued, it being stated that there was up to the present a deficiency of \$250,000,000.

Unless this great loss was stopped by getting the cotton trade on a profitable basis again, he concluded, it was difficult to see how the deficiency could be made good before the end of the present financial year.

Shareholders in cotton mill companies have never experienced such a disastrous year as the one just closed, it is asserted. Only 30 of a total of 319 companies have been able to make a return on their capital. The total paid up share capital of the 319 companies controlling 33,000,000 spindles, was more than \$242,000,000 and during the year they distributed \$4,120,189 in dividends, or about 1.7 per cent on the total called up capital, against 2.7 per cent last year. Sixty-five companies paid 4.48 per cent against 8.35, but 170 firms have now worked two years without paying any dividends whatever. During the year 28 companies have made calls on their members for a portion of the uncalled capital.

Germans in Ruhr Start Feeding Their Hungry

DUSSELDORF.—Unemployment in the occupied area of the Ruhr, which persists to an extraordinary degree despite the agreements between the French authorities and German industrialists, has had the effect of stimulating a feeling of responsibility for feeding the hungry among well-to-do Germans who heretofore have had the reputation of being more or less indifferent to suffering.

Within the last two months the better class families, realizing that

the municipal authorities were practically helpless to cope with the spectre of hunger, have responded generously, with the result that most of the penniless unemployed are receiving at least one substantial meal a day.

LONDON HOSPITAL GETS LARGE ENDOWMENT FUND

London, Jan.—The London Hospital, which provides free treatment to the poor of the East End, begins the new year with an endowment fund of \$800,000 all contributed within the past six weeks. In November a benefactor who has remained anonymous promised to double every contribution sent in before the close of 1923 up to a total of \$400,000. At 5 p. m. on December 31 the last contribution of the amount had come in from volunteer contributors.

Sir Harry Mallaby-Deeley then offered to double every contribution in excess of \$400,000 up to \$1,000,000.

Nearly 40 England's hospitals are supported entirely by voluntary contributions.

CRIME WAVE FILLS BERLIN PRISON TO OVERCROWDING

BERLIN, Jan.—There are more than 100,000 persons in the prisons of Prussia alone. The ten big prisons of Berlin are all filled to overflowing as a result of the influx of prisoners from the occupied area. The French and Belgians have been using the prisons in the Ruhr and Rhineland for their soldiers and civilians.

Courts are unable to care for the criminal cases on their schedules and the wave of criminality is placing a burden on the already overloaded government budget which is a serious handicap. Many criminals who should be imprisoned are merely fined because of the emergency and many others must be paroled temporarily until there is space in the prison for them.

COLLEGE COURSE IN FISHERIES AT UNIVERSITY OF WASHINGTON

Seattle, Wash., Jan.—Thirty-six students, attached to the University of Washington, are enrolled in what is believed to be the only college of fisheries outside of Japan.

For first-hand study of the propagation, capture, handling and marketing of fish the fisheries college of the University of Washington has access to the fisheries of Puget Sound and Alaska, both notable for salmon, where there are many fishing vessels, canneries, cold-storage plants and fertilizer factories. In Washington the counties, the state and the federal government operate numerous hatcheries where salmon and trout are propagated. The halibut industry centers in British Columbia, northern Washington and southeastern Alaska.

GUESTS AT GERMAN PARTIES BRING THEIR REFRESHMENTS

LEIPZIG.—"Bring your own refreshments" parties, popular in Russia during the famine, have become quite the fad among the German middle classes who do not feel able to serve food and drink whenever

friends have been invited to their homes for in evening of entertainment.

The housewives adopted the practice of requesting guests to bring their own sandwiches when food became so expensive some time ago, and assert that the Russian system has worked splendidly, that everyone has a good time and that if a guest does not get enough to eat, it is his own fault.

PURVEYORS OF PLEASURE FEED HUNGRY CHILDREN

BERLIN.—The military dictator of Berlin recently announced his intention of compelling the proprietors of cabarets, night restaurants and dance halls to do their share toward relieving distress among the poor of the city.

Convinced that the dictator meant business, one cafe owner already has begun by feeding free every morning 30 needy school children, and a number of others are about to adopt similar measures.

Five thousand children in the public schools are now being provided with a plate of soup each morning through funds raised by teachers and patrons of schools.

WIDOWS WITH FLATS HAVE CALL OVER FRAULEINS IN GERMANY

BERLIN.—Sweet young frauleins without a dowry have no chance against the widow with a furnished flat, asserts Fraulein Doris Bittner in the Berliner Mittheilung. She says matrimony in Germany has degenerated into a mere exchange of financial references and an inspection of the home the woman can offer.

"The marrying game in Germany has become a parody on love," declares Fraulein Bittner. "But it is a tragic parody after all. It is a pity to see the young man flee from his natural comrade in life and rush into the arms of the widow with the furnished flat."

Former Official Turns Thief.

MUNICH.—Emil Pielmeier, minister of war during the Communist uprising in Munich early in 1918, was arrested recently on a charge of stealing bicycles. The police said Pielmeier had been following the practice for months.

Most of the other insurrection cabinet members, including Kurt Eisner, the leader, were shot by government troops.

EXPERT CONSTANTLY STUDYING PREVENT DESTRUCTIVE FIRES

NEW YORK, Jan.—Fire prevention is the subject which perhaps more than any other interests the Underwriters' Laboratories, with work shops in Chicago, New York and San Francisco where tests to secure dependable data on all kinds of fire resisting materials constantly are being made. The recent experience of the city of Berkeley, Cal., with a destructive fire drew attention again to fire resistive roofs. By means of specially designed furnaces roofing materials were once more subjected to the same exposure to fire and wind that they would meet in actual emergency, and the tests showed that there need never be such a thing as a roof fire.

The Laboratories, operated for service under the auspices of the insurance companies, headed by the National Board of Fire Underwriters, have had a busy year. Originally they consisted of two men working in one room. They now have three large plants and employ nearly 200 engineers.

Many facts of vital importance have been brought out in the tests of fire doors, fire windows and shutters and building materials used in walls, floors and partitions. These are compelled to withstand flames at a temperature up to 1700 degrees for periods varying from 45 minutes to an hour, and in some cases even longer. Safes are heated to 1700 degrees for an hour. They are then hoisted 50 feet and dropped on a pile of brick, reheated for another hour, and when opened must show no damage to their contents.

There has been a notable increase in the number and variety of electrical apparatus, submitted to the Laboratories, and the small percentage of electrical fires as compared with those from all other causes, is said, according to the annual report of the association, to be largely due to Underwriters' Laboratories' inspection and test.

In the automobile field the Laboratories' tests have included gasoline tanks, fuel feed systems, carburetors, gauges, generators, starting motors,

The aim of the Laboratories is to establish a minimum standard of safe practice in the case of each device or material examined. The result of their investigations is public property.

EDUCATION BY RADIO PLAN OF UNIVERSITIES

BERKELEY, Cal.—Establishment of possible "air universities," or classes taught by radio, will be discussed at the meeting of the National University Extension Association at Madison, Wis., beginning April 24, it is announced here by Allen G. Smith, chairman of the University of California's extension division.

Mr. Smith, a member of the association's educational radio broadcasting committee, is gathering statistics on this phase of broadcasting. The committee will submit recommendations to the association.

Eighty licenses to broadcast have been granted to educational institutions.

SWISS OBJECTS TO SERVING LEFT-OVERS TABLE D'HOTE

GENEVA.—The abolition of table d'hôte service in all hotels "throughout Switzerland and other countries" is advocated in an anonymous letter published in the current issue of the Swiss Hotel Review.

"It is not fair or just," writes the contributor, "to impose upon guests the left-overs of a dish that has passed around several times from table to table, especially mutilated fish." The writer also declares guests do not want to be ordered to the table for a meal "at a certain hour by the clock."

PUBLISHERS IN INDIANA CITY NOMINATIONS FOR GOVERNOR

INDIANAPOLIS.—Two newspaper publishers, of the same city, are seeking the nomination of their respective parties for governor of Indiana. They are Edward C. Toner, publisher of The Anderson Herald, who is a candidate for the republican nomination, and Dale J. Crittenger, publisher of The Anderson Bulletin, who has announced himself as a candidate for the democratic nomination for governor.

Both are graduates of Indiana University—Crittenger in the class of 1878 and Toner in the class of 1895. They will enter the state primary to be held in Indiana on May 6.

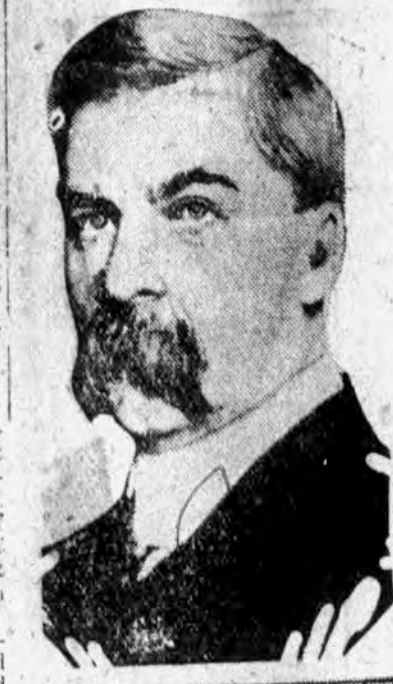

THIS STATE MAKES SPLENDID RECORD HOSPITAL SERVICE

Second On List of States Being Headed Only By New Jersey

RALEIGH, Jan. 29.—The State of North Carolina made one of the best records of any state in the Union in respect to its hospitals in the year 1922, according to reports received here from the United States Department of Commerce.

The report shows North Carolina as being second on a list of widely distributed states, being headed only by New Jersey. There were 11 states in the report including Carolina, Michigan, Detroit, Mississippi, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New Mexico, North Dakota and Rhode Island.

The report for North Carolina was as follows:

Total hospitals giving data, 97; total number of beds 5,592, total number of patients entered during the year 60,790, total days' treatment during the year 1,214,260. There were 66, general hospitals reporting a total of 2,836 beds, 49,917 patients, and 547,458 total days' treatment. Special hospitals numbered 27 with 1,139 beds, 5,462 patients and 288,340 total days' treatment. There were also reported 5 Federal hospitals with 1,617 beds, 5,410 patients, and 378,452 total days' treatment.

This record was surpassed in this group of state by the state of New Jersey only. New Jersey reported 110 hospitals, 11,342 beds; 157,566 patients and 2,598,050 total days' treatment during the year. In comparison to population and the conditions under which they exist, the hospitals of North Carolina were said to have equalled those of any state in all records.

"Colorado," a state famed for its hospitals and its great number of treatments given each year fell short of the record of North Carolina by a good margin. If the city of Denver is left out. This would be appropriately fair, it was said, due to the fact that the cities of most of the other states in the list and especially those of New Jersey and Colorado, are considerably larger than those of North Carolina. This was pointed out as being one of the points as it is usually the cities that give the most support to the hospitals of all kinds.
