WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—Beginning Friday newspapers will receive the same treatment in the mails as letters and other first class matter under an order issued today by Postmaster-General New. The order said Mr. New will mean much to the American public. It is one of the most important and far reaching steps in history of the service. It will greatly benefit those who desire to have their newspapers placed before them as early as possible. The move will keep the population in closer touch with the several fields of activity. Under the new order newspapers will be made up in separate sacks and plainly marked "newspapers."

SPELLING CONTEST TO BE CONDUCTED AT TEACHERS MEET

RALEIGH, Jan. 30.—A spelling contest in which children from all over the state will participate will be held in this city during the annual meeting of the State Teachers Association from March 12 to 14. A preliminary contests will be held in each school district and the best speller in that district will its representative at the annual meeting. Much interest is already being manifested in the contest by the school children over the state, it was said, and already they have begun their preparations for the final contest.

Each district will be allowed two representatives, a boy and a girl. Prizes will be given the winners in the final contests as well as the winners in the district contests.

The State adopted book "The Mastery of Words" will be the source of the words that will be given the contestants. Each contestant will be charged a fee of fifty cents. This fee will accepted by the person in charge of the contest in each district but not until the time of the entrance of the child into the contest.

One hundred words will be given the contestants in the final try-out. Should this fail to produce a winner an additional fifty will be given, and if necessary an additional 25 will be used.

Cooper and Horace Cooper, officials of the defunct Commercial National Bank of this city and Clyde W. Lassiter patron of the bank, continued before a United States Grand Jury here today. The charges were brought out as a result of the closing of the bank here by United States Bank examiners on December 29, 1922.

Hearings of a number of civil actions in connection with the settlement of the affairs of the defunct bank are being held by Judge Connor pending the action of the grand jury.

PRESIDENT NAMES STRAWN, GREGORY SPECIAL COUNSEL

Former Attorney Gen- eral and Chicago Law- yer Represent Govt.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—President Coolidge last night announced the selection of Silas H. Strawn, of Chicago, Republican, and Thomas W. Gregory, of Austin, Texas, attorney general in the Wilson administration, as special counsel to prosecute the government's cases growing out of the naval oil inquiry.

Mr. Strawn is a former president of the Illinois Bar Association and of the Chicago Bar Association and is at present chairman of the committee on legal education of the American Bar Association. He conferred late yesterday with the President, who has known him for some time.

Mr. Gregory was Attorney General of the United States from August 1914 to March 1919. It was said at the White House that he would leave Austin for Washington today.

The attorneys are expected to confer upon the arrival of Mr. Gregory the latter part of the week, and in the light of evidence which has been produced through the Senate investigation and in other ways, determine what action shall be taken and in what form, especially as to bringing civil or criminal actions. The two will hold equal rank and to them will be left the selection of their legal staffs.

At the White House, where an announcement of the appointments was made orally, it was indicated Mr. Strawn and Mr. Gregory would serve under the resolution pending in congress and be paid from the funds therein provided for in a special resolution in case the resolutions are adopted. In such case, it was said Senate confirmation of the appointments would be asked.

BANDITS HOLD UP BANK; ARE CAPTURED BY POSSE

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., Jan. 30.—Two unmasked men early today held up the Farmers Bank, at Jasper, Tenn., and escaped with \$10,000. A posse overtook and captured the bandits at Whitwell, ten miles north of Chattanooga.

Ten to Stand Trial For Connection With Sale Surplus Lumber

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—John L. Phillips, of Georgia and nine others indicted in connection with the sale of surplus lumber from army cantonments and must stand trial the Supreme Court of District of Columbia held today in overruling demurrers from their indictments.

Corliss Griffis is Released From Prison By German Govt.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—Corliss Griffis, the American who attacked Grover Cleveland Bergdoll, has been released from prison by the German government the State Department was advised today. It was understood that the Berlin government's action was due to pressure of public sentiment in the United States.

VICTIM OF SOCIAL WHIRLWIND

In explaining the death of his daughter who on last Saturday committed suicide in her Boston home, W. P. G. Harding, former Governor of the Federal Reserve Bank said that a whirlwind of social life, dancing and cigarette smoking caused the final nervous breakdown which resulted in the girl's rash act. Miss Harding was 23 years of age and was a prominent figure in the social life of Washington, New York and Boston, and returned only last week from Washington where she had been spending sometime.

Shortage of \$74,940 Discovered in Peoples' Bank in Pennsylvania

HARRISBURG, Pa., Jan. 30.—Discovery of a shortage of \$74,940 in the funds of the Peoples Bank of McKeesport, Pa., was announced by the state banking department today. Peter G. Cameron, state secretary of banking announced that a warrant had been issued for James M. Baker, employee of the institution.

Dawes Center of Ferman Interest

BERLIN, Jan. 29.—The first expert reparations committee under its American chairman, Brigadier General Charles G. Dawes reached Berlin from Paris tonight. There was no official reception at the railway station when the delegates alighted from the regular express, and the committee men immediately motored to their hotel.

Germany's hopes of reaching a tolerable and final solution of her reparations problem center in the forthcoming discussion here of the committee, and the second body of experts, expected from Paris shortly with Germany's official spokesmen.

No program for the deliberations to be carried out in Berlin by General Dawes' committee has been agreed upon, although in official quarters it is assumed that further discussion of the projected Bank of Emission will constitute the first topic on its agenda.

Aside from expressing gratification over the impending assay of Germany's financial and economic assets by a body of non-political experts and stressing the wish that the forthcoming investigation be as comprehensive and rigorous as possible, official quarters refrained from venturing any prediction as to the ultimate results of the inspection about to be undertaken by the two expert committees.

Modern Footwear Ousts Old Style Shoe of Satin

PEKING, Jan. 30.—The encroachment of western civilization has revolutionized the shoe-making industry in Peking, according to the "Chinese Economic Bulletin." When official shoes made of satin were in vogue among the well-to-do and the poorer classes wore shoes made out of cotton cloth, the business was prosperous; but now the old-style shoes have been discarded for foreign-style leather shoes which are imported, or made by another class of artisans from Shanghai or other treaty ports. For this reason Peking shoemakers are engaged almost entirely in making cheap footwear for the poorer classes.

Another industry affected in baking. Owing to a liking for foreign-style pastries, the business of Chinese bakeries is falling off. Bread is being used more and more. A few years ago, it is said, there were in Peking more than 400 bakeries turning out Chinese food, whereas today there are only 127.

Resume Diplomatic Relations After Lapse of 3 Years

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—Diplomatic relations between the United States and Greece have been resumed after a lapse since 1920 when Constantine ascended the throne vacated by the death of Alexander, establishing a regime regarded by the United States as being based upon military power and without confirmation or election. The new regime has already received recognition by a number of powers the recognition by the United States being preceded two weeks by that of Great Britain.

Man Kills Wife and Then Takes Own Life

AKRON, Jan. 29.—Pursuing his wife, Mrs. Bertha E. Funk, 35, into a drug store in the heart of Akron's fashionable West Side residence district, George R. Funk, 38, shot her through the heart and then killed himself with the same weapon tonight. Half a dozen customers and clerks witnessed the double killing. The Funks were widely known here. The shooting is thought to have followed a quarrel over a divorce action started last Saturday by Mrs. Funk.

Funk, a traveling salesman, had been living in Shelby since he and his wife separated. Tonight, according to the police, he called on Mrs. Funk, who was living with her parents, and persuaded her to accompany him on an automobile drive.

When near the drug store she is reported to have jumped from the machine, and with her husband following, screamed for help as she ran into the pharmacy.

The bodies were taken to a morgue.

President Confers With Newly Formed Special Counsel; Strawn Begins Collection Of Evidence.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—The government's first official action toward prosecution of the naval oil cases was taken today. While the Senate still debated the Walsh resolution, President Coolidge conferred at length with Silas H. Strawn, who with Thomas W. Gregory, will act as special counsel for the government. Immediately following his conference with the president, Strawn began the collection of evidence.

Just before the Senate renewed its floor discussion, the oil investigation committee heard four physicians testify that the present condition of former secretary Fall would not warrant his appearance at a public hearing. The committee then decided to send a medical committee of its own to examine him.

E. L. Doherty reappeared at the committee room during the morning session and requested that the committee hear him, but adjournment until Friday was taken without his being put upon the stand. Mr. Doherty did not announce the purpose of his return to Washington.

Beside the Walsh resolution which is expected to pass the Senate today, the Senate has on its waiting list a resolution asking for the removal of Secretary Doherty and Attorney General Daugherty; one proposing the reassertion of title to oil lands in California held by the Standard Oil Company, and one for the appropriation of \$100,000 for court prosecution amended by the committee to provide that the special counsel employed be confirmed by the Senate.

PHYSICIANS DECLARE FALL NOT ABLE TO APPEAR BEFORE COMMITTEE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—Physicians attending Albert B. Fall today told the Senate oil investigating committee that the former Interior Secretary was in no condition to appear before the committee to testify. The hearing was conducted behind closed doors and the details were not divulged. It was learned however that the doctors related how Mr. Fall had remained in his room since his arrival in Washington last Thursday night and has shown little, if any, improvement from day to day. Doctors stated that he was now on the verge of a nervous collapse and that his appearance before the committee was inadvisable.

The purpose of this hearing was to enable the committee to decide whether to call Mr. Fall before it or to appoint a sub-committee to examine him in his sick room as suggested by his counsel.

AMERICAN COLLEGE OF SURGEONS WILL MEET IN WINSTON-SALEM

WINSTON-SALEM, Jan. 30.—Surgeon M. W. Ireland, of the United States Army, and James T. Case, of Battle Creek, Mich., will be among the principal speakers at the district meeting of the fellows of the American College of Surgeons, embracing North Carolina and South Carolina which will be held here February 4 and 5.

Dr. A. K. Crowell, of Charlotte, chairman of the credentials committee, will preside over the sessions. Dr. W. W. Long, of Greensboro, is secretary of the organization.

FINDS 26 GALLON LIQUOR STILL IN A THICKET, DURHAM

DURHAM, Jan. 30.—Deputy Will Hill, West Durham, found a 26 gallon liquor still in a thicket near the old Oxford road several days ago. The still had apparently been abandoned for some time.

The Fall scandal is the natural heritage of the recent Republican political philosophy of materialism. From the moment that Woodrow Wilson was elected President a second time the leaders of the Republican Party dedicated themselves solely to achieving victory, by whatever means. They gained that victory in 1920 at the expense of national honor and party consistency. The round-robin sent to President Wilson in Paris in 1919, the malignant pursuit of the President to the doors of his sick room, the deliberately deceptive plank on foreign policy in the platform of 1920 and the spectacle of the two party wings moving in opposite directions in the campaign of that year—all these were the price of victory.

Having imbued the country, through the use of skillful propaganda and vast sums of money, with a determination to effect a change at Washington, the Republican political leaders accomplished the change in a crash of idealism and a triumph of materialism such as the country had never before known. The United States surrendered the spiritual world leadership which its great part in the war and the peace had given it; Europe and the League were deserted; a separate peace with Germany was made, and the new Administration entered upon its task in an atmosphere of selfishness and revenge.

To help accomplish the defeat of all that Woodrow Wilson had stood for great sums of money were needed, and these were sup-

plied by men of wealth, representing industries which knew exactly what they wanted. Racial groups in America, which the mixed allegiances of the war had embittered, were played upon craftily and induced to vote as hyphenated classes instead of as Americans. The common cause of humanity was made the butt of sneers, and every nation for itself was the motto of the victors, followed closely by the philosophy of every man for himself.

No sooner had congress assembled than the payment of the selfish interests began in the passage of the plundering Tariff Bill. As the processes of government were used to pay party debts, and leaders to whom the party and the Nation had looked for moral strength sat silent while their campaign pledges were being broken—witness the League proclamation of the Thirty-one—it was not strange that a thoroughly practical viewpoint should have invaded the Administration itself, and Cabinet Ministers, seeking all about them the fruits of dishonor ripe for plucking, should have forsaken ethics and even caution to join the scramble for personal gain.

Into such an atmosphere as this the private financial necessities of the Secretary of the Interior, Albert B. Fall, projected themselves in November, 1921; and he solicited and accepted from a man whom he was in a position to reward with Government favor a loan of \$100,000. Utter recklessness had not, however, kept pace with a sacrifice of official ideals, for the money was delivered in cash and carried from New York to Washington, by hand in a satchel. A few weeks later the oil magnate Doheny, from whom Secretary Fall had solicited and obtained the loan, was awarded, without the necessity of competitive bidding, a Golconda of Government oil reserves.

And the other oil magnate, Sinclair, to whom Fall transferred the rest of the naval reserve, also loaned or gave money through his attorney to the desperate politician and sent word to Fall that there was more where the first money came from. Only after repeated evasions and lies have these ugly truths been brought to light and justifiable suspicion been cast not only on these donations at the cost of the public domain and the national defense, but on every act with which Fall and others in the Cabinet had any official connection.

The evil political growth of Republican policy has yielded its first rotten fruitage. And the harvest has only begun.—N. Y. World

ENGLAND AND WALES SHOW BIG DECREASE IN CULTIVATED LAND

LONDON.—Although the land under cultivation in England and Wales during 1923 showed a decrease of 129,000 acres there are still as many acres being cultivated as before the war, according to the 1923 report of the Board of Agriculture.

The acreage of wheat in 1923, the report says, was 1,740,000 acres, or practically the same as the average of the ten years immediately before the war. The very low prices realized for the large crop of potatoes grown in 1922, led to the planting of 95,000 acres less in the past year but the total was larger than in any year before the war.

The total number of fruit trees returned was 21,638,000, of which 1,405,200 are apple trees, 4,642,000 plums, 1,757,000 pears and 767,000 cherries.

The sugar beet acreage was 16,900, just double that of the previous year.

Dealing with the question of live stock the report points out that the number of cattle—5,823,000—was 100,000 greater than in the previous years and adds that the additions of the past two years have brought the cattle herds back to the pre-war level. The total number of sheep reared shows an increase of 1,000,000 bushels of seed a month.

398,000, the number now being 13,835,000, the pig population increased by 313,000 to 2,612,000, the largest number recorded since 1911.

The worst feature of the report was the slump in the number of persons employed on the land, there being a decrease of 97,000. Nearly 60,000 of these workers were in regular employment, the remainder being only casuals.

Flax Growing Appeals To Northwest Farmers

MINNEAPOLIS.—In the midst of a territory now being grown large measure to flax, Minneapolis has risen to the largest production city of flaxseed oil and meal in the United States, with the possible exception of New York.

Since September 1, 1923, up to the first of the year more than 5,000,000 bushels of flax were unloaded at the flaxseed mills here, comprising the bulk of the last northwest crop, and from which about 100,000 tons of meal will be manufactured, according to reliable reports.

With University of Minnesota agricultural officials pointing out to northwest farmers the attractiveness of raising flax, with tariff protection of 40 cents a bushel, short haul to market, and consumption twice the production, the favorable situation was recognized and portions of the 100,000 greater than in the previous years and adds that the additions of the past two years have brought the cattle herds back to the pre-war level. LOVE FOR WORK LOST DURING WAR PIANO MAKERS' GERMANY

STUTTGART.—Germany's piano industry has been thrown all out of harmony by the upset conditions prevailing in the country. The output is only about half of what it used to be, chiefly it is claimed, because of a lack of conscientious workmen. There are plenty of craftsmen to be had, it seems, but since the war there has been a dearth of good piano makers who think more of their work than the financial rewards. To make perfect pianos, it is asserted by manufacturing firms, the workmen must be conscientious and absolutely in love with their task.

Concentration is also an essential, it is explained, and but few of the piano makers who went to the front and for months or years led sort of a roving, miss and hit existence, have ever been quite the same since they came back.

About half of the German made pianos are exported, these going chiefly to Holland, England, Japan, Chile and other South American countries. Comparatively few are sent to the United States owing to a high protective tariff. The principal buyers of pianos in Germany, since the paper mark started its downward course, have been the peasants who took this means of obtaining a long desired permanent household ornament with some of the currency which was so rapidly losing its value.

Various individuals have taken a "flier" in pianos at times when they had a lot of paper marks on hand with the idea of realizing at some future date when, they hope, they might be able to dispose of the instruments upon a gold basis.

AMERICAN LEGION NOW CONDUCTING CAMPAIGN RECRUITS

FAYETTEVILLE, Jan. 30.—The American Legion is conducting a "recruiting campaign" here for new members to that organization. The membership drive is under the direction of the Cumberland Post No. 363. This post is the main post of the country it was said. The real purpose in conducting the membership now, it was said, is to secure more support for the plan of the American Legion to carry on the work of caring for the disabled veterans, continuing vocational education and the complete Americanization of all those living in this country.

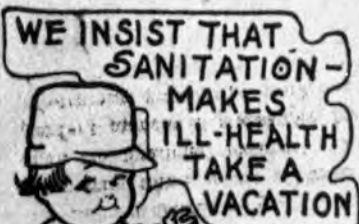
Bulgarian Women Make Demands

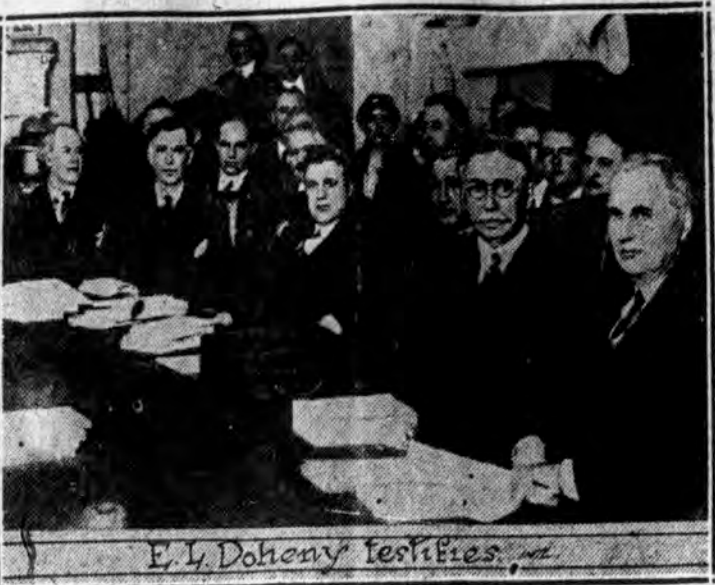

Sweden Seeks Reduction in National Defense Cost Now

STOCKHOLM, Jan.—Swedish politicians are busily engaged in the solution of the problem of national defense, which is the weightiest before the country. The problem has assumed such importance that political leaders have been touring the country speaking on the subject, and expounding their various methods for reducing the cost without reducing the safety of the national defense.

The Socialist and Liberal parties advocate curtailing the period of training, the Socialists asking a reduction from 280 to 150 days, and the Liberals to 200 days.

The cabinet recently decided upon a new uniform for the army of an olive drab color, in the place of the present gray, and cut somewhat after the American army uniform. A helmet for field use of the Franco-British type will be substituted for the Boer hat.

CHARACTER OF EARLY WEST RIDES TO HIS LAST ROUND-UP

Sheridan, Wyo., Jan.—With the death at Buffalo, Wyo., recently of J. C. (Hardwinter) Davis, passed the man at whose invitation Owen Wister came to Wyoming and wrote "The Virginian." Davis rode the ranges of Wyoming and Montana with Theodore Roosevelt and later visited him in the White House. "Hardwinter" also built the Sahara irrigation project in northern Wyoming, and was the first man to prospect for oil in the now famous Salt Creek field.

Davis and Owen Wister were said to have been boyhood chums. He was born at Mulford, Del., in 1867, and served in the lower house of the first Wyoming legislature.

POLICE SEARCHING FOR NEGRO CHARGED WITH SHOOTING WIFE

WILSON, Jan. 30.—Local police are looking for Johnny Hill, negro, charged with shooting his wife at their home here last Saturday night. Hill is alleged to have used a shotgun, inflicting wounds in his wife's arm which probably will result in the amputation of the member. The shooting is said to have followed a quarrel.

SAN FRANCISCO'S FIRST SUBWAY IS FOR VEHICLES

San Francisco Jan.—To save seconds for a daily army of 170,000 commuters, as well as to speed up street cars and vehicular traffic at the great Ferry building, San Francisco is building its first subway.

The subway is for vehicles only. It will be 900 feet long, 23 feet in width, and will cost \$340,000. The north and south vehicular travel now counts from 600 to 1000 automobiles and teams an hour. In one rush hour of traffic during the evening more than 300 street cars swing round the Ferry loop.

Films Aid German Farmers

Koenigsberg, Germany, Jan.—Young pigs, handled scientifically, can be made to take on weight at the rate of two pounds a day, according to government experts.

A film showing how this is done, as well as illustrating the best methods of feeding stock and poultry, has been shown this winter to the farmers of east Prussia.

When Winter Comes Philippines Play Ball

MANILA.—The baseball season in the Philippines is now in full swing, and close observers declare that greater interest has been shown in the game than for many years.

The amateur championship of the islands will be decided during the third week in February when the annual carnival is held in Manila. By a process of elimination among the various leagues, not only in Manila but in the outlying provinces, the number of teams will be narrowed down so that the series of games which will decide the championship can be played off in one week.

Students Freely Criticize Ministry As Profession

CHICAGO, Jan. 30.—Ministers today are expected to understand human nature be human themselves and consider themselves lost "if they show any evidence of isolation or reserve," according to college student criticism of the ministry as a profession, solicited and corajled by Evans A. Worthley of the Commission on Life Service of the Methodist Episcopal church.

The ministry in general "has too many men who are narrow-minded, unprogressive and not sufficiently educated," Mr. Worthley said, was a typical answer to his questionnaire. Others asserted that ministers are "not meeting present-day problems with present day thinking and that they 'overlook the possibilities for service in the social and industrial fields of today.'"

In reply to the question "How can the ministry become more efficient?" the general declaration was for "emphasizing the practical rather than the sentimental side of Christianity," said Mr. Worthley. Other advice was for the ministers to interest young people, co-operate with his laymen, preach more straight-forward facts, and get a broader grasp of sociology.

Fewer and better preachers was an idea expressed by many college students who believe that a higher type of man with a better income and a better education could accomplish more.
