WARRANTS ISSUED INDICTING THREE SALISBURY MEN

Defendants Norwood, Doughton and Jackson Are Implicated

SALISBURY, Jan. 31.—Warrants for the arrest of J. D. Norwood, former chairman of the State executive committee of the Democratic party and former chairman of the defunct Peoples National Bank, and for J. K. Doughton, former president of the bank, and M. L. Jackson, a former director, charging misappropriation of funds, are understood to be in the mails, having been returned in Federal court in Greensboro yesterday.

Mr. Norwood is understood to be in business in Birmingham, Ala., while Mr. Doughton is at his old home in Sparta. Mr. Jackson, a cotton mill man, was out of the city tonight, but was expected back tomorrow.

GREENSBORO, Jan. 31.—J. D. Norwood, former chairman of the state Democratic executive committee; J. K. Doughton and M. L. Jackson, all of Salisbury, were indicted here yesterday afternoon by the grand jury of the United States court, Western North Carolina Federal District, on charges of abstraction and misapplication of the funds of the People's National Bank of Salisbury, which failed last June 7th it became known last night.

Norwood was chairman of the board of directors of the bank; Doughton, its president, and Jackson, a director of the bank and of the Mecklenburg Mills Company, with the paper of which the bank was said to have been heavily loaded. The Mecklenburg Mills Company admitted insolvency a few days before the failure of the bank.

\$325,000 Is Involved.
The amount charged abstracted and misapplied from the funds of the bank is \$325,000. Norwood is indicted individually, and Norwood, Jackson and Doughton together. The individual indictment against Norwood contains two counts, and the one against the three 16, it is understood.

Throughout the counts runs the allegations that the money of the bank was used for the mills of the concern. The company operates the Mecklenburg Mills chain, comprising the Mecklenburg, at Charlotte; Newton, at Newton; Nance, in Montgomery county, and Clyde, at Newton.

Norwood was former president of the bank and at the time of its failure was chairman of the board of directors of it and president of the Mecklenburg Mills Company.

Anderson Indicted Third Degree Forgery Appeals Supreme Court

NEW YORK, Jan. 31.—William H. Anderson state superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League of New York, will appeal to Supreme Court from the indictment of third degree forgery it was announced today by his chief counsel former governor Charles S. Whitman.

Amendment to Lease Muscle Shoals Ford For Hundred Years

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—Henry Ford's offer for Muscle Shoals would place it under the Federal Water Power Act except that the lease would be for 100 years instead of 50 under an amendment to the McKenzie bill, authorized acceptance of the offer, presented at an executive session of the House Military committee today.

Daugherty Won't Conduct Oil Scandal Probe.



At his own request Attorney-General Harry M. Daugherty has been relieved of the civil and criminal actions that will follow the Senate's investigation into Naval oil lands, and President Coolidge will place the matter in the hands of other attorneys. Daugherty took this action after he had been bitterly assailed in the Senate.

Program Adopted Growing of Cotton Under Weevil Menace

RALEIGH, Jan. 31.—Acting upon recommendations made by O. B. Williams, chief of the division of Agronomy and Franklin Sherman, of the division of Entomology, agricultural workers of the State College and the department have adopted a program for the growing of cotton under boll weevil conditions this season, according to an announcement made at the Department of Agriculture today. This program consists in the main of good cultural methods including use of the warm soils on the farms, early preparation and planting frequent cultivation, use of better seed, better fertilization and thick spacing and for direct weevil control by the use of early poisoning to kill the first weevils after which dusting methods are to be used according to government instructions. This program is now being published for general distribution over the State by county agents and other extension workers of the State College. The Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce, it was announced, will also aid in this program.

As to the cultural methods recommended the extension workers say, "Plant the cotton on upland soils that well drained and fertilized; break the land and prepare the seed bed soon as possible to allow the plant bed to settle; give frequent cultivation as soon as the cotton is up; use standard varieties like the Cleveland and Big Boll; Mexican Big Boll, or the Edgcombe Cook; plant a bushel and a half of good seed to the acre and leave the stalks about eight inches apart in the rows; for the coastal, plain soils use a fertilizer analyzing 8 to 10 per cent phosphoric acid, 4 to 5 per cent ammonia, and 3 to 4 per cent of potash; for Piedmont soils use a fertilizer analyzing 10 to 12 per cent phosphoric acid, 3 to 4 per cent ammonia, and 2 per cent potash; use this fertilizer at the rate of 600 to 900 pounds per acre on fertile soils and apply the fertilizer at planting time or shortly thereafter."

In making the direct fight on the weevil, Professor Sherman recommends following the government method as outlined in extension circular 137, which is procurable on application.

He departs from this to the extent recommended by the Association of Southern Agricultural Workers which calls for early dusting or poisoning by use of the sweetened mixture just when the squares begin to form. This may delay the heavy infestation which comes later, it was pointed out. Professor Sherman does not recommend the Florida method for North Carolina.

In all of the recommendations for weevil control this year, workers of the State College and the department urge those farmers in the cotton section to play safe by growing their food and feed crops. A "Live-at-Home" will be started on February 22 next, it was said, which will have for its purpose the stressing of this idea.

NINE INJURED IN ESCAPE DORMITORY FIRE TODAY

SPRINGFIELD, O., Jan. 31.—Nine students were injured, two fatally, in escaping from a dormitory fire at Wabash University today. The fire is said to have been of incendiary origin.

VOTES REDUCTION IN INCOME TAXES FOR THE PAST YEAR

Cut Might Be As High As 25 Per Cent Saving Payers \$225,000,000

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—Reductions of 1923 personal income taxes which are payable this year on the basis of the Democratic tax reduction plan to cut the normal rates to 2 per cent under \$5,000 and to 4 per cent under \$8,000 was proposed in a joint resolution presented to the House today by Representative Garner, Democrat of Texas.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—Income tax payers would receive a reduction in their 1923 taxes payable this year under a provision voted yesterday by Republican members of the House ways and means committee. The amount of reduction has not been determined, but Chairman Green, author of the proposal, said it might be as high as 25 per cent. It would apply to the taxes after they have been computed and to all personal income tax payers. Treasury experts estimated that a 25 per cent cut would mean a saving to taxpayers of \$225,000,000.

Mr. Green explained the reduction was aimed at immediate relief, where as application of the rates in both the Mellon and Garner plans would begin on this year's taxes.

The action was the first taken on new income rates which the Republican members of the committee decided today to write themselves and put through in committee by a majority vote.

Representative Hull, of Tennessee, a member of the committee and chairman of the Democratic National committee, announced tonight that Democratic members of the committee had intended to present a similar proposal, but in the form of a joint resolution which could have been taken before the House and Senate for independent action before March 15, when the first installments on last year's taxes are due.

Under the plan adopted today the reducing will be made a part of the revenue bill. If it is approved after March 15, Mr. Green said, provision will be made to allow refund on those taxes already paid.

Prior to the meeting of majority members, the full committee had considered further technical details of the revenue bill, but Chairman Green adjourned the committee subject to call when it reached the income rates, the heart of the tax revision program.

"Kid" Ellis Given 15 Months on Charge Abandoning Wife

GOLDSBORO, Jan. 31.—"Kid" Ellis, well known middleweight wrestler who makes his home in this city, was late yesterday sentenced by Judge Pittman in Superior court to serve 15 months on the roads having been convicted last week on the charge of abandoning his wife. Ellis gave notice of appeal and his bond was fixed at \$800.

Woodrow Wilson Is Again Ill

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—Woodrow Wilson has suffered digestive disorders during the past few days but is yielding to treatment and physicians do not regard his condition as serious. His daily automobile rides have been dispensed with for the present as a result of the attack but the former executive is able to be out of bed most of the time and to attend to his mail and other affairs. Dr. Greyson stated that he regarded the progress made to be satisfactory in view of the general condition of the patient.

NEGROES ARRESTED ERECTING STILL IN BETHEL TOWNSHIP

Three Boiler Still, 1500 Gallons Beer, 500 lbs. Sugar Captured

Willie Davis and Willie Young, negroes of the Bethel section, are in Pitt county jail awaiting trial next Monday, for erecting a still for operation in Bethel township.

The still a three steam boiler affair, was captured yesterday by Deputy Sheriffs Sam Whitehurst, Heber Savage and Thad Williams. The officers poured out 1500 gallons of beer, and destroyed eight 500 gallon beer vats. They also captured 500 pounds of sugar. The negroes were erecting the still preparatory to making of liquor when arrested.

The still was located in Bethel township near the hard surfaced road and if it had been completed it would have no doubt turned out a large quantity of whiskey.

On Saturday, of last week, officers Whitehurst, Savage and Williams captured a still in Bethel township back of the farm of Ollie Carson. The operators were warned and succeeded in making good their escape. Eight barrels of beer were poured out and 200 pounds of sugar captured. It was a steam plant of double capacity.

The Contest Between Trinity and Carolina Watched With Interest

DURHAM, Jan. 31.—When Trinity and Carolina lock horns over at Chapel Hill tonight, basketball fans throughout the State will be watching the outcome of the contest with much interest, for it has been conceded that one or the other of these two quint will be the baseball champions for North Carolina this season. Though having two games scheduled, the winner of this first game will have a pretty firm hand on State honors. Of course should the teams split games this season and go undefeated by any other State team, it would be logical to stage a third and deciding contest. But the victors tonight will at least be champions initiate.

Trinity has had two hard workouts under Coach Burbage since the victory over State College Monday. And the team seems to be in first-class shape and anxious for the fray. The Blue Devils and the "Wonder Team" seemed to be fairly evenly matched and neither has been defeated this season. The Methodists have won ten straight victories while Carolina has registered seven. A tug of war is in prospect.

Gymnasium Classes Formed At Trinity

DURHAM, N. C., Jan. 31.—It was reported from Trinity a few days ago that over nine tenths of the students were taking part in some form of athletics. Now comes the report that Trinity professors have formed gymnasium classes to meet Tuesday and Thursday night of every week. So it appears that the vote on physical exercise at Trinity is practically unanimous.

"Cap" Card, director of the gymnasium, will have charge of the proficiency class one night of each week and Hermann Steiner, head of the department of physical education, the other night. The classes will start next Tuesday night. Already twenty-three professors have signed up for the setting-up exercises to be given them along with such games as basketball, handball, and the like; and it is expected that many more will follow suit.

Charters Granted By Secretary State

RALEIGH, Jan. 31.—Dr. Chase, president of the North Carolina University, has denied that he requested Professor Thorndike Saville to go to Washington and appear before the House Military affairs committee in the interest on the Muscle Shoals project. He said that he only sanctioned Prof. Saville going when told that he Saville had been asked to appear.

15 KILLED IN EXPLOSION IN HOME.



An explosion caused by gas let loose 200 pounds of dynamite in a two-family frame house in Cumberland Flats, near Pawtucket, R. I., totally destroying it and killing the thirteen members of the family of Adolard Hamel, in addition to Michael Conway and Miss Apolline Dan-cour, the latter a boarder in the Hamel household. Hamel, a wood-chopper, used the dynamite in "lasting away stumps of trees.

WALTER GRAHAM DIES IN CHARLOTTE

Dies in Hospital a Few Hours After Arriving There Tuesday

CHARLOTTE, Jan. 31.—Walter R. Graham, of Fountain, N. C., died at the Presbyterian hospital Tuesday at 10:30 o'clock. He came to the hospital Tuesday to take treatment for heart trouble.

The funeral services were conducted at 3:30 o'clock Wednesday afternoon at the home of his brother, R. E. L. Graham, 801 North Church street, by Dr. Luther Little, pastor of the First Baptist church, and Dr. A. A. McGeachy, pastor of the Second Presbyterian church. The remains were carried to Rockingham, where a funeral service at the Presbyterian church was followed by interment in the cemetery.

The deceased was 47 years old and at the time of his death was vice president and cashier of the Bank of Fountain, in Pitt county, where he had resided for 10 years.

News of Mr. Graham's death was received with keen regret by people of Fountain township, where he has been living for quite a number of years. He was popular as a banker and was held in high esteem by people in business, social and religious circles. He possessed highest traits of character and was well known in Greenville having been a visitor here on several occasions.

In his death the bank of Fountain has suffered a distinct loss.

Mrs. Connor's Death Halts Court's Term Hearing Concade

WILSON, Jan. 31.—Mrs. Henry G. Connor, 70, wife of Henry G. Connor, judge of the United States District court of the Eastern District of North Carolina died here last night following an illness of many months. Judge Connor was en route from Wilmington to her bedside when the end came.

Following Judge Connor's arrival here shortly after eleven o'clock last night, it was announced at the Connor residence that Mrs. Connor would be buried from St. Timothy's Episcopal Church this afternoon at 4:30 o'clock, with interment at Maplewood Cemetery. Her six sons, it was said, will act as pallbearers.

WILMINGTON, Jan. 31.—With the grand jury not ready to act after considering five indictments against Lieut. Gov. W. B. Cooper and three other defendants since Tuesday at noon, the United States District court today was ordered adjourned from day to day. Every indication is that the actual trial will not begin until Monday although Judge Connor will probably return this week and receive the report of the grand jury.

Judge Henry Groves Connor, who is presiding, left last night for his home in Wilson in response to a summons to the bedside of his wife, who has been hopelessly ill since Saturday, January 19th, and whose death occurred last night at 7 o'clock before he reached her bedside.

Statistics Show Value and Number Horses Decreased Since War

RALEIGH, Jan. 31.—The value and number of horses has decreased since the World War, according to a statement issued by F. J. Parker, State Agricultural Statistician, here yesterday. In the South they are not as useful as mules, it was said. It appears that the decrease has been about 2 per cent during 1923, leaving a total for the state of approximately 163,000 heads, with an average value of 103 dollars for those over two years old, says the statement. The number listed for taxation in 1922 was approximately 178,000 for the State as a whole.

"The old saying that the two toughest things in the South are the mules and cotton, is probably true," said Mr. Parker. "This accounts for the gradual replacing of farm work by horses with mules. There has probably been no decrease in the estimated 260,000 mules on farms the first of this year. The number taxed in the state in 1922 was 272,000, while the total number of work stock enumerated in the Farm Census for last June was 260,000 mules were reported to average \$130 each for this month."

Baker In Attempt To Steal Auto Is Arrested by Jones

Frank Baker, 18, young white man is in jail in default of bond, for trying to steal the Oldsmobile Coupe belonging to Mr. Roy Batchelor, which was left parked on Washington street last night.

Mr. Batchelor before attending the show at White's theatre, had locked his motor, leaving the car only a short distance from the theatre. Baker in his attempt to start the car was stopped by Chief Jones, who happened to be passing at the time. He was immediately recognized by the officer and placed in jail.

American Legion Athletic Programs To Begin Friday

SALISBURY, Jan. 31.—The ruling of Judge Stack in Charlotte that declared that it was illegal in the North Carolina to box for money is not casting any shadows over the American Legion here as the result of stopping its proposed boxing matches. The legion has now set upon the plan of holding athletic programs and will start Friday night. The program will consist of physical culture cases, wrestling matches and purely amateur boxing bouts. The boxing laws ban only professional bouts it was said, and the cards of the Legion will not list anyone who is anyway professional or accepts money for boxing.

Baptist Women to Meet in Goldsboro

GOLDSBORO, Jan. 31.—The Women's Missionary Union of the State Baptist Church will be held in this city at the First Baptist church on April 1-2-3, according to announcements received here. Mrs. W. N. Jones, of Raleigh, who is the president of the Union will preside. It is estimated that between 500 and 600 women will be here for the meeting.

COOLIDGE CONFERS WITH DEMOCRATIC LEADERS TODAY

Rumors Involving Retirement of Denby and Daugherty Continue

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—Both Democratic and Republican leaders in the Senate were in conference with President Coolidge just before the debate on the Walsh oil lease annulment resolution was resumed by the Senate this morning.

After the ranking Senators of the Republican organization in the Senate had paid a call to the White House, the president summoned Senators Walsh, Democrat of Montana, and Robinson, Democrat of Arkansas. Senator Walsh has been a dominant figure in the oil lease investigation and it was Senator Robinson who introduced the resolution calling for the immediate removal of Secretary Denby. White House officials said that the president desired to discuss with the two Democratic leaders the whole question of the investigations as made by the Senate committee and as to the contemplated action by the executive branch of the government. The conference was the first that the president has had with Democratic leaders since the oil lease inquiry has assumed its present major proportions.

Silas H. Strawn, one of the special counsel selected by the president, to prosecute the oil suits, arrived at the White House almost simultaneously with the two Democratic Senators but he did not go into the conference with them and the president. Arrangements were being made in the meantime for a conference between Strawn and J. Crawford Biggs, a Raleigh attorney said to have been intimately acquainted with the oil land policies carried out by Secretary Daniels under the Wilson administration.

Before the House Naval committee this morning discussing the disposal of oil royalties under the Doheny and Sinclair leases a debate developed over the Daniels policies with Republican members of the committee declaring that the door for the Fall contracts was originally opened by the former Democratic secretary.

The Senate oil committee held no session today but three physicians selected by the committee went to the apartment occupied by the former Interior secretary to determine whether or not his condition would permit his appearing before the committee when hearings are resumed tomorrow.

In the midst of all this rumors of cabinet changes involving the retirement of Secretary Denby and Attorney-General Daugherty, continue to fly thick and fast. Secretary Slemm, however, flatly denied the story that the two cabinet members had placed their resignations before the president.

A move to attach the resolution of Senator Robinson, of Arkansas, calling for the removal of Secretary Denby, was started immediately after the Senate convened today.

COOLIDGE CONFERS WITH WALSH ON OIL LEASES

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—President Coolidge conferred today with Senator Walsh, with respect to the naval oil leases. Mr. Walsh went to the White House on an invitation from the executive. So far as is known this is the first time that the Montana Senator has been consulted about the affair by President Coolidge.

Wilson Boasting Good Record in the Mayor's Court

WILSON, Jan. 31.—This city is boasting its good record among the courts of the municipality. There were no cases on the docket for the mayor's court when it was called today. Therefore the mayor immediately adjourned court.

Hickory Man Given Masonic Honor

HICKORY, Jan. 31.—R. Johnson Suttley, former master of Hickory lodge of Masons No. 343 and for many years active in Masonry, has been appointed deputy grand master of the 36th Masonic District by Grand Master Legard Everett of Rockingham.

STREET SKATING.

It is to be regretted that we have no public playgrounds for our children, thereby forcing them to use the streets for recreational purposes. One dangerous form of amusement, however, in which a large number of children of this city are indulging should be stopped. That of skating on busy streets and trailing automobiles and other vehicles. If skating is to be allowed on public thoroughfares let it be confined to the sidewalks rather than risk the lives of the children who wind in and out among the traffic on the street and never see the danger until it is too late. Parents should warn their children of the dangers of this practice and exert every effort to put a stop to it.

SELECTIVE IMMIGRATION

That numerical limitation and careful selection of immigrants is a necessity on eugenic, as well as on economic, grounds is stated in a report of the Committee on Selective Immigration of the Eugenics Committee of the United States, which has been made public by its chairman, Professor Irving Fisher.

The report says, in part:

"Immigration is a long-time investment in family stocks rather than a short-time investment in productive labor. A conviction that the census of 1890 should be used as the basis of any percentage law has been growing rapidly. Since there were fewer southeastern Europeans here in 1890 than in 1910, this provision would decidedly cut down the number of such immigrants. Immigrants from northwestern Europe furnish us with the best material for American citizenship. They have higher living standards than other immigrants, average higher in intelligence, are better educated, more skilled, and better able to understand our form of government. A percentage limitation based on the 1890 census is sound American policy based on historical facts.

stand our form of government. A percentage limitation based on the 1890 census is sound American policy based on historical facts.

"It is not a question of racial superiority of northwestern Europeans or of racial inferiority of southeastern Europeans. It is simply a question as to which of these two groups of aliens as a whole is best fitted by tradition, political background, customs, social organization, education, and habits of thought to adjust itself to American institutions."

Experts have told us that had mental tests been in operation, and had the "inferior" and "very inferior" immigrants been refused admission to the United States, over 60,000,000 aliens now living in the country, free to vote, and to become fathers and mothers of future Americans, would never have been admitted. It is high time for the American people to put a stop to such degradation of American citizenship.

THE FUTURE OF RADIO.

G. Francis Jenkins of Washington, predicts as a development in the near future the sending of photographs by radio so that they will be reproduced in the receiving end as clearly as "cuts" now printed in newspapers and magazines.

The use of radio is still in its infancy, but new and marvelous uses to which it may be put are crowding hard and fast on the wings of time, and the end is not yet.

FEDERAL GOVERNMENT PAYS LOW FOR OFFICES

Washington, Jan. 31.—Office space required by the government's executive departments in Washington aggregate 13,574,920 square feet, or almost 214 acres, distributed in more than 200 buildings. In addition, the Capital and the Senate and House of Representatives office buildings used by Congress total about 2,000,000 square feet.

In making the report of the Public Buildings Commission to the Senate, Senator Smoot recently urged adoption of a program to expend \$50,000,000 over a period of ten years for public buildings in Washington which, he said, would dispense with the need for renting buildings here and provide for the needs of the government for the next 20 years.

The government now pays almost \$600,000 a year for buildings rented in Washington, paying for ordinary space at the rate of \$1.50 a square foot. The Interstate Commerce Commission occupies an entire building on which \$72,638 a year rental is paid for 196,272 square feet. The Department of Commerce occupies another containing 182,954 square feet of space for which \$65,954 yearly rental is paid. The Department of Justice pays \$75,600 a year for an entire building containing 70,070 square feet of office space whose owners each month impose the government to vacate, stating they have an opportunity to rent the building for \$225,000 a year. The government's contract has expired, but the owners have not begun legal proceedings to oust the Department of Justice.

The Navy Department building contains more space than any other in Washington, with a total of 923,316 square feet, and it houses 2,632 employees. The building of the Bureau of Engraving and Printing with 481,420 square feet, houses 4,939 employees. Rental of all office space occupied by the government at Washington, at the rate now being paid for ordinary office space in the city, would mean a year rent bill of approximately \$22,000,000.

THOUSAND CITIES REPORT ACTIVE WINTER BUILDING

CHICAGO, Jan. 31.—Winter building construction is going steadily forward, it is shown in reports from nearly a thousand cities and towns to the Indiana Limestone Quarrymen's association.

Leaders in the construction industry generally declare that the winter building movement has proved a success from an economic viewpoint and that it has gone far in eliminating seasonal unemployment.

"Many cities have swung into a new phase of development, in the opinion of construction experts, who base their views on the tremendous activity in office building construction during the last 12 months," said the report. "This activity has been particularly marked in Chicago, Detroit, Cleveland, Boston and Atlanta, and promises to continue generally. Reports show building construction is being encouraged in the hope of gradually bringing the nation's building program up to meet existing demands."

"Cost of new Chicago buildings in the last 12 months totals \$331,852,354, with every prospect of the figures being surpassed in the next 12 months."

WAR-MADE AUSTRIAN MILLIONAIRE WOULD FINANCE UNIVERSITY

VIENNA, Jan. 31.—Commonly reputed to be the richest man in Austria, Samuel Bosel has offered to finance the University of Vienna un-

til conditions permit it to balance its affairs. It is estimated the initial phases of his undertaking will amount to \$2,000,000 a year, yet up to 1915 Bosel was selling haberdashery as a clerk in a small shop on the Quay.

His rise illustrates the paradoxical conditions that have prevailed in this country since the war. On the one hand has been a bankrupt government, the mass of the people in want up to recent months, and aid of every kind pouring in from other lands. On the other there have been accumulated fortunes vast even in America, and Bosel is said to lead them.

In 1915 he got into the war supply contract game and when the armistice came he was said to be the king of army contractors, holding a monopoly in certain branches of supplies. After the war he entered finance and is now one of Austria's greatest bankers.

Recently he bought the parked triangle adjoining the Balplatz, or Foreign Office, which visitors will recall as affording the much painted view of the famous Minoriten church. The price he paid the government is not stated but it is probably the most valuable plot in the city. On it he will build a magnificent residence and has also offered to build for the government a hall of archives.

His offer to finance the university, however, has caused some political agitation, for Bosel is a Jew, and the reactionary press pretends to see in it a plan to defeat the anti-Jew agitation on the part of the Christian student body for the institution of the numerus clausus, or limitation of Jewish attendance and faculty members.

FIJIANS ESTABLISH
FIRE WALKING SHOW
ON BUSINESS BASIS

SUVA, Fiji Islands, Jan.—Commercialism has invaded even this remote region. The natives at a recent ceremonial not only set up booths for the sale of refreshments, but charged visitors three shillings each for the privilege of watching the event.

The occasion was a "fire walking" and the shrewdness which has lately become a characteristic of the Fijians was evinced in that the tourists who came to view the event were permitted to travel many miles to this island, and then climb a difficult hill nearly all the way to a natural amphitheatre before the demand for payment was made.

The "fire walking" itself is an interesting ceremony performed by natives. Little is known in explanation of the fact that their feet apparently are impervious to great heat. So far as observers have been able to ascertain, the performers walk barefoot and unharmed on stones which are virtually red hot, having been heated for hours in a fire pit. Afterward coals, brush and bits of wood are thrown over the rocks, the heat of the latter being evidenced by the smoke of flame which immediately bursts forth.

The native version of the origin of the ceremony is that in the distant past a Fijian traveling in the bush met an elf, whom he suspected of being an evil spirit. The native captured this supernatural creature and threatened him. To save himself the elf offered as a gift any power the native chose. The Fijian chose and was granted the ability to handle or walk through fire unharmed, which power has descended to members of his family even to this day.

SAYS JAVA SUPPORTS 30,000,000 PEOPLE IN EASY COMFORT

BERKELEY, Cal. — Land settlement and colonization schemes in Australia, Palestine and elsewhere have occupied in recent months the attention of Dr. Elwood Mead, professor of rural institutions at the University of California, who has just returned from a tour that took him to many parts of the world.

Dr. Mead is preparing a detailed report of the Zionist movement in Palestine. He made a verbal report to those in charge of the plan in London, and discussed the affairs of the Jewish Colonization Association with Baron Rothschild in Paris.

"Palestine and Mesopotamia are the only countries I know of that gained by the war," commented Dr. Mead. "Under the British mandate they have become the scene of all manner of new enterprises. They promise to regain their importance as trade routes."

Zionist movement has attracted attention to Palestine and there millions in money and thousands of settlers. But there are other important factors. British administration is one. Farm villages are protected against Bedouin robbers. Arabs are being used as gendarmes. Plans are under way for draining the marshes and reforesting the hillsides.

"Palestine gained two important new railroads as a result of the war. The Germans built south from Haifa and the British built north from the canal to Jaffa and Jerusalem."

"Since the British mandate a young Zionist named Ruthenberg has secured a 99-year franchise from the British government for the development of water power from the River Jordan, below the Sea of Galilee. He is at work on a project to develop 100,000 horsepower for the cities of Tiberias, Haifa, Jaffa and Jerusalem."

"The Jewish Colonization Association began its work before the Zionist movement took shape. It is Baron Edmond Rothschild's pet philanthropy. There are 40 flourishing colonies. Baron Rothschild asked me to go home and say that if any American Jew wished to spend \$50,000 or \$100,000 to establish a colony that would bear his name, the Jewish Colonization Association could be relied upon to carry the project through. Near Jerusalem, on the elevated ridge where David met Goliath, I saw a dozen handsome new homes going up."

In addition to his survey for the Zionists, Dr. Mead was commissioned by the government of New South Wales to investigate an ambitious scheme of the British empire for relieving the strain of unemployment in England by settling Englishmen on irrigated lands in Australia.

While Dr. Mead's report on the Australian colonization plan has not been made public, his inquiry was said to have developed that it would cost England and Australia jointly something like \$5,000 for every Englishman placed on an Australian land. Dr. Mead also announced to the government of New South Wales that the settlers were likely to fail unless they had about \$1,500 each to invest in the scheme.

Dr. Mead did not consider feasible the execution of a contract entered into between England and Australia whereby England was to send out 6,000 settlers, with the expense divided among England, the Australian commonwealth and the state of New South Wales. He said that London and Sydney were negotiating to amend the contract, in view of the suggestion that colonists would face a dangerous situation unless they were provided with funds to begin their experiment.

Dr. Mead visited the Dutch East Indies as the guest of the Dutch government. On the island of Java he said he got new pointers about intensive farming. There, he declared, he found more than 30,000,000 persons living in comfort on an island the size of New York state. He came away with the conviction that the tropics were due for a development likely to change public opinion about the backwardness of its people and the supremacy of the northerners."

FEDERATION MUSIC CLUBS URGES BETTER SINGING ENSEMBLE

PEORIA, Ill., Jan.—Music memory contests in connection with the publication of a new hymn book for Sunday School use and plans to obtain the cooperation of Camp Fire Girl groups in developing better ensemble singing, are new ventures of the National Federation of Music Clubs, it is announced by Helen Harrison Mills, national chairman of publicity here.

The hymnal was declared to be the first of its kind ever undertaken as it not only contains the select of old hymns but a great many new ones calculated to appeal to modern youth. Each hymn is accompanied by a short story of the composer and the circumstances under which it was written. Upon these hymns, with words, music and stories, is based the music memory contest to be held in the Sunday Schools.

"Music clubs as well as Sunday Schools should use these hymns for community singing, because the Christian hymn book serves as a perpetual witness and promoter of Christian unity and it is the theology of the heart that unites men," declared Mrs. Grace W. Mabey, chairman of the church music department. "We find that older people also are as greatly interested in these hymns as the younger."

To encourage small singing groups and to raise the standard of singing generally, this year has been made "Music Year" by the National Board of Camp Fire Directors, and the Federation has asked the various groups of girls to solicit the advice of the music clubs in their localities in giving an artist concert for all to hear and profit by and to prepare themselves to render songs in a musicianly manner.

Tisitor Finds No Virtue In Many Storied Bldgs.

LONDON.—Raymond Unwin, expert on city planning to the British health ministry, finds much to condemn in American skyscrapers. He acquired his impressions during a recent tour of the United States.

"Piling more buildings on top of what you have, and boring more subways or erecting more elevated tracks to pour their additional multitudes into the already swollen torrent in streets, looks like sheer madness to a town planner," Mr. Unwin says. "With every additional story the effective floor area is reduced by the space demands of elevators, and every story tends to darken the rooms below. The number of dark rooms in New York, in which artificial light must be used, is far greater than in London."

The day population of London is 614 to the acre, according to Mr. Unwin, and that of the loop area of Chicago 2,830 to the acre.

WINTER POSTPONES WORK WASHINGTON MEMORIAL

ALEXANDRIA, Va.—Work on the George Washington Masonic National Memorial Temple has been discontinued for the winter and will be resumed early in the spring.

The next step in connection with the construction of the temple will be the erection of 57 stone columns. It will be three months before the quarries can deliver these from the New Hampshire quarries, and it will require three years, it is estimated, before they can complete all of the stone which will be required for the next story of the structure, which will be 37 feet above the present level.

A slight change is contemplated and probably will be made in the shape of a tower, and in the event this is done, the top will be pyramidal, instead of hipped. If the change is made it will mean that the height of the temple will be increased 45 feet which will bring the total up to 250 feet.

How to Free Wires From Ice

Bloomburg, Pa., Jan.—A new means of ridding electric power wires of accumulations of sleet and snow has been tried out successfully by a power company operating in this section.

A scheme of charging the wires and making them hot enough to melt the ice and snow was worked out, and whenever the sleet forms on the wires a message if broadcast from the headquarters of the company to all managers of sub-stations telling them to charge the wires. Radio equipment has been installed in all the sub-stations so that the company can get all stations at once.

GEORGIA WOMAN SENTENCED TO HANG.

General Booth Sees Evil in Dole to the Unemployed Now

LONDON, Jan.—In a report on the social work of the Salvation Army, General Booth refers to the effects of the "dole" on the unemployed. "I am led sometimes," he said, "to wonder whether what is called the dole—the indiscriminate distribution of money for which no labor is required in return—is not almost, if not quite, as great a misfortune as unemployment."

Speaking of the moral decline, the mischievous influence over all alike which springs from the evil of this thing, he added: "For once at least we see how a remedy may be far worse than a disease. The steady receipt of money for which no equivalent in work is rendered, makes against everything that is good in the receiver's life. The innate ill of idleness are increased. That which is more or less a material misfortune is turned into a moral disaster. I do not hesitate to say that tens of thousands of people in these islands have learned, or are learning at this very time, to live without work and for the young people especially, this is a most disastrous experience."

USE WASTE PAPER PROFITABLY IN CONSTRUCTION OF HOUSES

Stockholm, Jan.—A new building material made from waste paper and designed for ceiling and wall linings has been perfected by a Swedish engineer, and production on a large scale will soon be undertaken.

The raw materials are ordinary waste paper such as accumulates in cities, clay and sulphate lye, the cheapness of which warrants an inexpensive finished product. The covering is said to be fire-proof and durable; can be applied by unskilled labor, will take paper, paint or stain, and can even be polished. It is a good non-conductor, and does not respond to changes in temperature.

Business of December Last Compared With That of Year Ago

RICHMOND, Va., Jan. 31.—Business in the Fifth Federal Reserve District was not exceptionally good during the month of December last, but it was to the acreage of the season and compared favorably, on the whole, with December of 1922 despite the fact that at that time there was a boom on throughout the country, according to the monthly review of business issued by the Federal Reserve Bank. Business men of all classes, it was declared, are buying more cautiously now than they did but they are apparently buying all that they need, and therefore a fairly large volume of trade is going on. The review of the business and agricultural conditions in this, the Fifth Federal Reserve District follows:

"Condition reports of members banks in leading cities in the Fifth Federal Reserve District show some increase in loans and rediscounts outstanding in comparison with January 1922, but indicate continued ability on the part of the banks to care for all legitimate needs of their customers. Deposits show a substantial increase during the past month and are larger than they were a year ago. The Reserve Bank's ratio of cash to deposit and liabilities combined is approximately the same as at this time last year. Debits to individual accounts show a larger total for the four weeks ending January 9, 1924 than for the corresponding period ending January 10, 1923, and debits for the year 1923 considerably exceed those of 1922. Business failures were fewer in the Fifth District in December than they were in December 1922 and during the entire year the District made a better record than the national average. Labor continues to be fully

and profitably employed, and the reports of the various industries indicate that the supply and demand will remain fairly balanced for at least the next few months. Coal is plentiful and soft coal is much cheaper than it was during 1922-1923. Textile mills are suffering from scarcity of orders but that mills in the Fifth District have not materially curtailed their operations.

Cleveland Will Altar Hall For the G. O. P. Gathering

CLEVELAND.—Bids will be requested soon by the Cleveland convention executive committee for the work to be done in the public hall basement to meet the requirements of the Republican national committee for the national convention here next June.

Blueprints received by the convention committee's executive body from General Coleman Du Pont, chairman of the national committee's arrangement committee, show what changes are to be made in the basement of the hall to meet the convention needs.

There is to be one large room where the national committee will hold its sessions and hear contests for delegate seats.

Another room will be provided for meetings of sub-committees. There are to be offices for the national chairman, the secretary of the national committee and the sergeant-at-arms.

There will be a lounge in the basement, also a convention post office, restaurant, a telephone room, quarters for the press associations, four Cleveland newspapers and telegraph offices.

Plans for the work to be done in the main auditorium of the building in which the convention sessions will be held have not yet been received from the national committee.

Campaign \$600,000 Davidson College Officially Closed

CHARLOTTE, Jan. 31.—The campaign that has been conducted for the last 18 months for \$600,000 for Davidson college has been officially closed, according to Malcolm Lockhart of Atlanta who directed the campaign in North Carolina, and Georgia. The campaign was conducted under the auspices of the executive committee of Christian Education of the Southern Presbyterian Church. The amount sought was exceeded by \$75,000.

Of the total amount subscribed \$265,000 came from North Carolina Presbyterians, \$125,000 from the alumni of Davidson, \$110,000 from

Georgia Presbyterians, and \$100,000 from Charlotte and Mecklenburg counties Presbyterians, according to Mr. Lockhart. Two hundred thousand dollars of the amount collected will go to the endowment fund and \$400,000 to rebuild the Chambers Building that was burned about two years ago.
