

NATION MOURNS DEATH OF WILSON

Stars And Stripes Throughout World At Half Mast Out Of Respect To Former President

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—Woodrow Wilson has found in eternity a haven from the storms and sorrows of a troubled world.

In the prayerful quiet of Sunday morning death folded him gently in its embrace and bore him to his maker. He passed from life while he slept peacefully with those whom he loved best close about him. His broken body weakened little by little until the last spark of vitality went out, but his spirit was supported to the last by his indomitable courage. During his last waking moments he told his loved ones that he knew the end had come and that he was ready to go.

The federal government has offered to do whatever is fitting to express the nation's reverence at the passing of a great leader. President Coolidge called yesterday "at the house of bereavement to express his regret and his readiness to be helpful. He has issued a proclamation of thirty days official mourning and over the White House, government departments, the nation's fighting ships at sea and the outposts of American diplomacy in foreign lands the Stars and Stripes was brought to half mast. Congress was today recessed out of respect for his memory and the whole machinery of government, as a tribute to his guidance of eight momentous years, will stand still on the day of the funeral.

May Rest in Washington.
The place of entombment has not been selected but it is probable that the body will be placed for awhile in a Washington cemetery, there to await the erection of a memorial to serve as his last earthly resting place to perpetuate fittingly in stone the memory of the days of crisis when the whole world hung upon his word.

CONGRESS ADOPTS RESOLUTIONS OF RESPECT

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4. — Congress passed today its bitter partisan debate that has held forth for the past recent days out of respect to former President Woodrow Wilson.

Both houses met at noon as usual but only that leaders in all shades of political opinions might pay tribute to the fallen chieftain and pass resolutions commensurate with his services to the nation.

Resolutions were adopted by both the House and Senate calling for committees to attend the funeral services and report what other steps Congress could in expressing the affection and sorrow of the nation.

The Senate adjourned until February 7 the day after the funeral. The House adjourned until tomorrow.

Proclaims Day Mourning For Fallen Leader

Morrison Asks People To Refrain Merriment Until After Funeral

RALEIGH, Feb. 3.—Calling upon the people of the Commonwealth to put aside any social diversion until after the last honors have been done to the memory of Woodrow Wilson, and summoning every citizen to silent memorial for an hour during the burial services, Governor Cameron Morrison proclaimed a day of sorrow for the passing of the War President.

Sorrow over the passing of the former President is widespread. The Governor and members of his Council and other State officials united in tribute to him and in expression of deepest grief at the passing of the outstanding figure in world of his generation. Governor Morrison said in his call to the people:

"Woodrow Wilson after a long illness died this morning at a quarter past 11 o'clock City of Washington. The hour of the funeral and interment has not been announced. It can be ascertained from the press later.

"As an expression of respect for the great ex-President, I ask that all business be suspended for thirty minutes during the funeral services and that our people refrain from all social merriment and festivity from now until after the funeral.

"He was our President, for eight years, and guided our country thru the great world conflagration. It broke his health and killed him. It was for his country and humanity that he labored, suffered and died.

"Announcement for a date and hour for State-wide memorial services will be made later."

CHARACTERISTICS OF WOODROW WILSON

Most Unusual Personality of Any Inhabitant of the White House

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—Woodrow Wilson was in many respects the most unusual personage that ever inhabited the White House. In some of his words and acts commanded admiration approaching worship while in others it aroused aversions that almost amounted to hatred.

Mr. Wilson, himself, acknowledged that he had a "single track" mind. His friends acknowledged he was reserved, critics said he was cold, and those most intimate with him acclaimed him the most delightful of associates.

His seclusion and scarcity of intimates was one of his outstanding characteristics. It was said that of his wide acquaintance he never called but two of the men by their first names, Cleveland H. Dodge and Cyrus H. McCormick. Even Colonel E. M. House, of Texas, supposed to be closer to Mr. Wilson than any other man ever reached the state where Wilson called him "Ed" or "Edward." Neither did he call him "Colonel" the complimentary title by Mr. House was most commonly known. Through all their intimacies until the final break Mr. Wilson always called him simple "House."

One enduring friendship Mr. Wilson made while in the White House was that with Rear Admiral Carey T. Grayson, who restored him to health when he came into the presidency a sick man, watched over him like he would have a new born babe and finally snatched him from the death-bed at the time of his breakdown and prolonged his life several years after he left the White House.

They never quarreled although their friendship was a most intimate one. Wilson had a way of thinking things out for himself and making his own decisions. When working through crucial moments he invariably shut himself up in his study and worked it out on his own typewriter. He called for information when working toward a decision but he always preferred to have it in written form. He wanted cold facts untinted by the personality of the purveyor.

When Mr. Wilson got mad, and at times he did get mad the same as other men, it was his favorite trick to jam his hat on and walk around the block to "cool off."

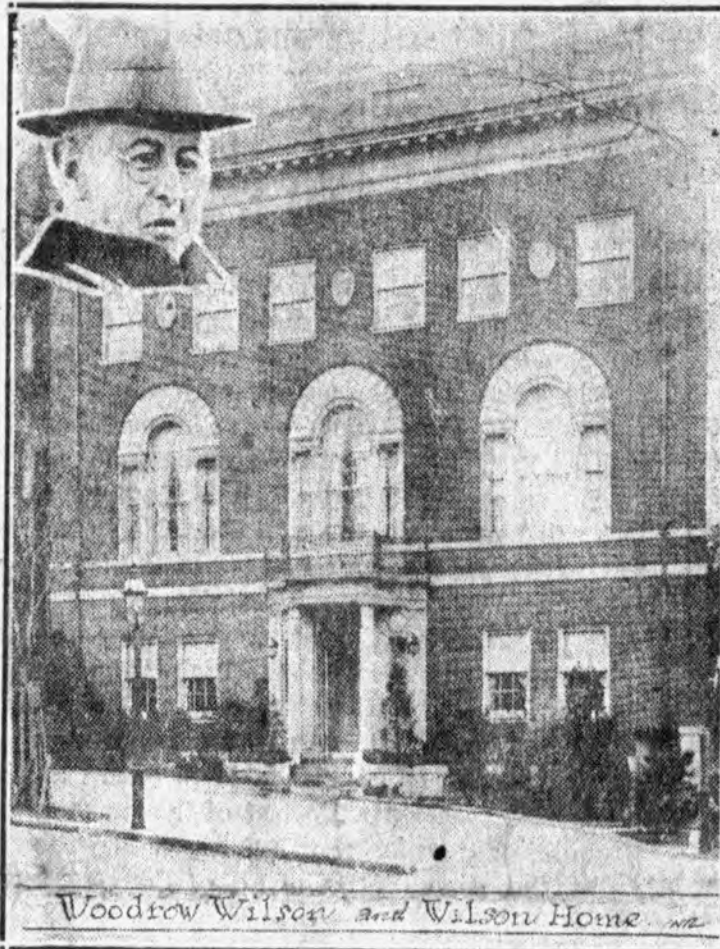
This he did when he heard that the Germans had torpedoed the Lusitania. He came back to his study full master of his emotions and penned the historical note to the German government that meant war.

He read it to cabinet officials after it was well on its way over the cables to Berlin. This was typical of Mr. Wilson's way. Having decided a course of action he wanted no advice. Cabinet meetings were often described by those who chafed under the restraint as "A morning in the school room with the school master at the head of the table."

It was said that Woodrow Wilson's seclusion in the White House was in part due to misinformation he got about Washington and its atmosphere before he took office. Somebody, so the story goes, informed him before he took office that there was a ring of politicians, bankers, etc., in Washington who profited most by prestige of their association at the White House. Wilson, it was said, made up his mind to have none of their company. No bankers, railroad presidents or manufacturers were received by him when he was

Time Only Can Tell Political Effect Of Wilson's Death

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4. — What political effect the passing of former President Woodrow Wilson will have is a question that only time can answer.

From his place of retirement he has kept a keen eye upon the fortunes of his party over which he at one time held undisputed leadership and almost dictatorial control.

He had been known to say that in the 1924 election he looked for a victory of the Democratic principles which went into eclipse behind the cloud of 1920. He had never revealed to anyone, however, how far he might be prepared to go in reasserting a claim to a place in the party councils. There was no truth in the widely circulated reports that the former president might again become a candidate for nomination. If he had any preference among those seeking to inherit the leadership he kept it from his closest friends. He did plan, however, to make a definite effort to align the party solidly behind the policies which he believed, until his dying day, constituted the permanent issues before the countries of the world.

The result was that when Mr. Wilson moved his family, his wife and three daughters, to the White House he shunned the formal state parlor of the first floor leaving them to the tourists and installed his family and effects including the sewing machine on the second floor of the White House, where the Wilsons recreated their old home at Princeton. Will Be Entombed Temporarily in Washington Pending Decision on Final Resting Place

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—Funeral services for former President Woodrow Wilson to be held Wednesday will be private in the sense that there will be no great state ceremonies.

A large numbers of close friends and former associates will be designated as active and honorary pall bearers among them Bernard Baruch, Vance McCormick, Cleveland H. Dodge, Cyrus McCormick, some members of Wilson's war time cabinet and others associated with him during his stay in the White House.

Tentative plans for the funeral of Woodrow Wilson were announced today by Dr. Carey T. Grayson providing for a brief service at the residence at 3 p. m. on Wednesday. This service will be followed by another service at 3:30 in Bethlehem Chapel Cathedral at Mount Saint Albans where the body will be placed in a vault until arrangements for the final resting place are completed.

It was decided not to hold a state funeral as proposed by some nor to let the body lie in state in the Capitol.

Funeral services will be conducted at the home and chapel by Rev. James H. Taylor, pastor of Central Presbyterian church where Mr. Wilson worshipped, Rev. Sylvester Beech, of Princeton, Mr. Wilson's former pastor, and Bishop Freeman, of Washington.

Many men have lived and died in the past fifty years, but never has the world felt the death of one as keenly as it feels the death of Woodrow Wilson, the twenty-eighth President of the United States.

Time alone will enable us to place him where he rightly belongs, but it is our firm belief that as he recedes into history so will he rise into the heights of fame, and that it will one day be realized that among the galaxy of our nation's heroes Woodrow Wilson stands second to none.

The path he blazed for our country to fol-

low will yet be found to be the only path that will lead to international peace and security; and to follow it is our national duty to God and to the world.

So, as the nations mourn his departure into the vast unseen, we lay this frail but fragrant blossom as a loving tribute on his bier, with the assurance that Wilson "though dead yet speaketh"—with an ever increasing influence.

God grant that the spirit of this great martyr may enter us and make us also great.

Under the table each of these diplomats has a keg of powder, a revolver, bowie knife or some other instrument of warfare with which he hopes to gain an advantage over his neighbor.

General Dawes silently watching from his stool, says: "Gentlemen, while I am here, we will play all the cards on the table." Consternation appears on the faces of the diplomats as Dawes makes his statement. For five years jealousy, intrigue, personal ambition and greed have dominated in place of an honest desire to settle the reparations tangle.

The only aim of the American members on the Reparations Commission is to secure an early and peaceful settlement of the financial troubles of Germany which are upsetting the industrial rehabilitation of all of Europe today.

"Diplomatic poker players" in Europe are not going to put over any slight-of-hand tricks on "Hell and Maria" Dawes or O. D. Young while these gentlemen act as representatives for the United States on Reparations Commission.

The American members of the Commission are paying their own expenses and are living illustration of "shirt sleeve diplomacy" which will appeal to every red blooded American and give new hope to millions of befogged and befuddled European citizens.

Requesting the audience to rise, the Bishop amid profound silence and intense interest paid a loving tribute to the late President Wilson and offered a touching prayer for his widow and family.

The sermon was a masterpiece of eloquence and power. At its close nine candidates received the Sacrament of Confirmation by the laying on of the Bishop's hands and prayer.

Taken all together, Sunday was a red-letter day for the people of St. Paul's.

How far should the law take cognizance of circumstantial evidence? This is a question that has caused endless discussion for years and will continue to cause discussion. The opposition to it in some states is so great, that the courts will not hang a man for murder when he is convicted on circumstantial evidence. His crime should be proved beyond a peradventure of a doubt. Why, then, should any person be convicted of any crime on circumstantial evidence?

One of the finest examples of what circumstances can do to degrade the fair name of a woman is portrayed in "Slander the Woman," Allen Holubar's new First National production starring Dorothy Phillips, which comes to the Strand today and Tuesday.
