DELIVERS ADDRESS
ON KIWANIS IDEALS

Kiwanians Observe 9th
Anniversary in Most
Appropriate Exercises

In a most enthusiastic meeting at the Rotary building last night the Kiwanis Club of Greenville observed its ninth anniversary.

The program was under the direction of the educational committee, Herbert White in charge.

There were several features of interest on the program, but the item of chief interest was an address by Rev. James E. W. Cook, on "Kiwanis Ideals." This address was most enthusiastically received, and by unanimous vote it was requested that the address be published in order that the people at large might know more about the ideals of Kiwanis.

The address of Mr. Cook follows:

In the course of his address Mr. Cook said: "It is good to be strong physically, that is why Kiwanians build playgrounds for boys; encourage sports for girls; give food to the under-nourished, hospital aid to the sick, and the pleasure of life to the under-privileged. It is better to be strong mentally: that is why Kiwanians support the Public Schools and colleges, and in every way advance the educational interests of the nation.

It is best to be strong spiritually; that is why Kiwanians are truly religious, and base their theory for the brotherhood of man on their firm belief in the Fatherhood of God. Kiwanis is not a sect, nor a denomination, however."

The speaker denounced denominations when they are used to separate Christians and to encourage religious jealousy and antagonism.

"The ideals of Kiwanis focus and meet in the glorious ideal of a state whose citizenship is physically fit, mentally sound, spiritually strong. The ideal Kiwanian citizen will rise superior to party spirit. He may, of course, belong to a party; but he will not sink to a mere partisan." Mr. Cook paid a tribute to the late Woodrow Wilson as being bigger than his party, bigger than all parties. But for most of us, the description of Edmund Burke is too true:

"Who, meant for the universe, narrowed his mind,
And to party gave up what was meant for mankind."

"Whenever we fail to do justice to an opponent or to one whom we dislike; whenever we snatch up a vehement opinion with wrath and clamor; whenever we join in the blind cry against unpopular names; whenever we repeat the shameful innuendo or the biting jest, we may stand very high in the world, but we are not ideal Kiwanians or ideal in any way. The true Kiwanian will credit his opponents with intellects as keen, with motives as honorable, with hearts as upright as his own. Next to this candor, I place a stainless integrity. Yet even now, to our nation's shame, some of our leaders are hiding the graft with which they have dishonestly enriched themselves and are trying to defeat a delayed justice. The revelations of how men entrusted with the sacred duty of national office, have unblushingly sold their influence for gain, is a saddening spectacle to every true patriot today. No golden apple however glittering will stay or seduce the ideal Kiwanian from the swift, straight race of life, or from the narrow wicket-gate of duty. The moment, be it in great things or be it in little things, you sell but one scrap of your integrity, the crown will have fallen from your head.

"When faith is lost, when honor dies,
The man is dead."

The ideal Kiwanian will be morally courageous though he suffer for it. These qualities will need to be fortified with a vast faith in human nature, and with an immense faith in God.

In some form or other, the ideal Kiwanian citizen must be the philanthropist, the Christian, the religious man. There is no other ideal attainable. The only true diplomacy for a statesman is perfect truthfulness. The only international law is perfect honesty. The only noble service is based on faith in God and love

Cathedral of St. Peter and St. Paul

Although no definite plans have been made as to the permanent resting place of Woodrow Wilson, whose body has been placed temporarily in the crypt of the Bethlehem Chapel in the uncompleted Cathedral of St. Peter and Paul, on Mount St. Albans, Washington, it is believed the body will eventually be placed forever in the Chapel of the Resurrection, immediately under the immense tower of the Cathedral, which was designed as an American Westminster Abbey. Here is the architect's drawing, showing how the Cathedral will appear when completed. It will be taller than the Washington monument and larger than St. Paul's, in London.

Herrin, Ill. Is Scene
Of Battle Between
Wet - Dry Forces

HERRIN, ILL., Feb. 9.—Herrin, which was the scene of the miners' riot of 1922, was taken over by troops today as a result of a near riot last night between the "wets" and "drys" in which a constable was killed and a deputy sheriff seriously wounded.

The trouble is a result of the wholesale dry raids that have been conducted in this (Williamson) county recently by reputed members of the Ku Klux Klan led by S. Graham Young paid employee of the Klan. A meeting of the Knights of the Flaming Circle, an anti-klan organization, was in session when a crowd stormed the hall and the shooting followed.

Caesar Cagiel, who had been issuing the warrants under which the "drys" conducted the raids, was shot dead. John Layman, deputy sheriff, who with Sheriff Galligan went to the anti-klan meeting to remonstrate with the conferees to disperse and go to their homes in the interest of peace, was shot. He was taken to a local hospital by Mayor C. E. Adderson and Ora Thomas, an anti-klanman, and the trio is being guarded at the hospital by National Guardsmen.

Immediately a crowd gathered outside the hospital and began firing into the institution. Persons on the inside of the hospital responded to the fire and a miniature battle waged for a short while.

The first guardsmen arrived from Carbondale at 4 a. m. and the "drys" then established headquarters at the city hall several blocks from the hospital. Guardsmen are patrolling the hospital to protect the mayor, Layman and Thomas.

Five companies of troops had arrived this forenoon.

The crowd that visited the meeting hall of the anti-klanmen was headed by three of the four police of Herrin and when shouts of "Lynch Them" and "String 'em up" were heard Sheriff Galligan commandeered an automobile and rushed the trio to Murphysboro to protect them. The three officers are Chief of Police John Ford and Policemen Harold Crane and Sim Stephens.

Before the arrival of the troops the raiders armed with

revolvers and shot gun, patrolled the streets of Herrin, denying anyone considered "suspicious looking" to pass. Those who were unable to give the Klan pass word were searched for weapons.

Before the attack upon the hospital the mob shot out the street lights so that those on the inside of the institution could not see where to aim. A number of patients of the hospital were panic stricken and are reported today to be highly nervous. A number of windows of the hospital were shot out and the building showed other battle scars such as bullet punctured drain pipes and marred walls.

Just as the trouble in Herrin was at its height, Leonard Stearns, deputy circuit clerk, son of Cyclops Sam Stearns, was fired upon while riding in his automobile in Marion, the county seat. The bullet grazed his back but he was not seriously injured. He is the Klan candidate for the office of circuit clerk. The automobile owned by John Whiteside, also admitted member of the Klan was fired upon at the same time.

Sheriff Galligan, enroute to Murphysboro, was placed under arrest at Carbondale in connection with Cagiel's death.

MARION, ILL., Feb. 9.—The Ku Klux Klan was in complete control of Herrin at 2:30 o'clock this morning and was allowing no one in or out of the city that was not a klanman. They are reported as parading back and forth on the main streets armed with firearms of all kinds. They have established headquarters at the city hall which is the center of agitation. The trouble which started last night was said to have been caused by the disappearance of three members of the Herrin police force who klanmen allege were spirited away by the sheriff's officers.

SPRINGFIELD, ILL., Feb. 9.—Fifteen companies of Illinois National Guard, five of which are already in Williamson county, are available for duty in case of further trouble. Adjutant-General Black announced here this morning.

Effort to Be Made
To Keep Anderson
From Sing Sing

GLOVERSVILLE, N. Y., Feb. 9.—The resignation of William H. Anderson as state superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League was accepted at a meeting of the board of directors in New York City last Tuesday. This announcement was made today by Rev. William C. Spicer, vice president of the league and pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Gloversville.

A stiff fight, it was asserted today, will be made to keep W. H. Anderson from going to Sing Sing prison to which was sentenced yesterday by Supreme Court Justice Tomkins for falsifying the books of the organization.

Arguments will be heard next Friday by Supreme Court Justice Wagoner for a certificate of reasonable doubt. The move for the certificate is the first step toward an appeal.

Should Justice Wagoner refuse the certificate Anderson, it was understood, would have to go to Sing Sing without delay to begin his term of between one and two years. The minimum time Anderson would serve is nine months and 20 days on provision that good behavior brings commutation.

Unless the verdict is reversed Anderson will lose his citizenship and be a felon under the law.

GATLING ARRESTED
IN FLORIDA FOR
DOUBLE MURDER

Denies Killing Wife and
Stevens in Raleigh on
December 30

RALEIGH, Jan. 9.—Raleigh police yesterday received word by telephone and telegraph that a man believed to be Lawrence Gatling, wanted here for the slaying on the night of December 30 of his wife, Mrs. Helen Gatling, and Owen Stevens, at her home on Fairview Road, in Hayes-Baron, was arrested by deputy sheriffs at a farm garage nine miles from Jacksonville, Fla., yesterday afternoon. The man is being held there for the local police. Captain Nat Warren and Deputy Sheriff J. E. Lowe armed with requisition papers, will leave this afternoon to bring the man back to this city.

Chief Glenn, of Raleigh, on whose information the slayer was arrested, will receive the reward of \$400 offered by the State of North Carolina for the apprehension of the man if he proves to be Gatling.

First word of the arrest was received here yesterday afternoon when a message by telephone notified Chief Glenn that a man believed to be the double slayer had been arrested. An hour later a telegram was received which stated that the authorities in Jacksonville believed that the man was unquestionably Gatling, but that he would not talk. Another telegram followed which declared that the man admitted he was Gatling.

Florida officers said last night that the man admitted he was Gatling, but that he denied the murder charge. According to the deputies, he ran when they drove up to the garage in an automobile, but stopped after being leveled on Jan. 8. He was unarmed except for a hunting knife and had \$795 on his person.

Newspaper Man
Testifies Giving Oil
Inquiry New Turn

WASHINGTON, Feb. 9.—A new turn was taken yesterday in the Senate oil investigation with testimony of Frederick G. Bonfils, publisher of the Denver (Colorado) Post, that Harry F. Sinclair had entered into a contract to pay him and his associates \$1,000,000 in settlement of claims growing out of rights asserted in the Teapot Dome Naval Oil Reserve. Senator Walsh, Democrat, Montana, has told the Senate that every vestige of these rights had been denied by the federal government.

According to Mr. Bonfils' testimony, the contract was entered into in Kansas City after he had sent a reporter of his paper to the home of Albert B. Fall, in New Mexico, to investigate rumors regarding the leasing of Teapot Dome to Mr. Sinclair by Mr. Fall as secretary of the Interior, and after the publication of one article in the Denver Post attacking the lease by "analysis and theory." The contract was signed, he said, after two conferences between Mr. Sinclair and Mr. Bonfils, his partner, H. H. Tammens, John Leo Stack, a Denver oil man, and H. H. Schwartz, their attorney.

The opening up of this unexpected line of investigation made it necessary for the committee to defer until next Monday the hearing of William G. McAdoo, former Secretary of the Treasury, which Mr. McAdoo has requested in a letter sent to Chairman Lenroot last night and read into the committee record today. The committee first decided to hear him today, but changed its decision when it was found that the examination of Mr. Bonfils could not be completed today.

NEW SOUTHERN EXPOSITION REPLIES REPLIES UPON OWN ATTACK

In every part of the South far-sighted men are emphasizing the need of national advertising. The story must be told to the whole country. It must be intensively narrated. The undertaking is too vast to tolerate scattered effort. Every shot must go home.

Seeing this need of publicity for the South in contrast with a long period of apparent inertia, we are apt to overlook certain points in the history of achievement to which a present prosperity is definitely related. A generation ago the South began to "lose money" on expositions. They were the expositions at Atlanta; at Charlotte; at New Orleans; at Jamestown, and elsewhere. Through more than three decades the South sought by means of these displays to win attention, to attract visitors to view its resources, products and labors. Afterwards there was always head-shaking over the budget and doubt in the absence of visible return. But who can deny that the vibrant South of today was hastened in realization by these audacious prophecies of hope?

The next Southern Exposition is to follow an old principle with a new form of attack. It will be held, not in any Southern city, but in the nation's metropolis. In nature it will be invasion as well as invitation, purposeful rather than passive. The old-fashioned Southern exposition had the color of a plea; the new will be keen-edged business. Instead of making appeal, the South is to declare itself present as equal competitor in the world's great-

est and busiest mart.
The Southern Exposition will be held at the Grand Central Palace, in New York, in January, 1925. The states south of the Potomac and Ohio rivers will use between them 100,000 square feet as their show-rooms. In them will be examples of and index to the best in products, manufactures, activities, life, advantages, resources. New York and the world will be put on notice that the South has come to town, not to buy, but to sell, not to ask but to demand, not to seek favor but to take place.

Expert opinion endorses the plan for such an exposition, as novel and effective advertising of the highest grade. But important and successful as it may be in concrete results, its greater significance lies in the new thought, spirit and confidence of which it is born—in the full harvest for which the old expositions that bankrupted their too sanguine promoters sowed the fertile seed.—Natural Resources

NOT AFRAID OF WALL STREET

Democratic leaders everywhere are pleased with the interest, harmony, and activity that have followed the recent meeting of Democratic National Committee in Washington. Their satisfaction is in inverse ratio to the disappointment which was experienced by officials of the Coolidge administration and other Republicans at the absence of a quarrel or conflict among the Democrats.

Republicans in the Administration and in Congress were counting on a split in the Democratic ranks as a result of the selection of New York as the place of the next Democratic national convention. Partisan Republican newspapers had published a good many forecasts of such a cleavage if New York were chosen, but Democrats have ungraciously refused to fulfill these predictions for the accommodation of their enemies.

Democratic leaders are not afraid of the cry of "Wall Street" because of their selection of New York. They point out that few voters would be deceived by such talk in view of the close connection between the Republican party and the element of Big Business whose habitat is Wall Street. Moreover, the Democrats say Wall Street is not likely to forsake its allegiance to the Republican party which has been so useful these many years. Wall Street is not grateful, perhaps, but it knows where to go for favors—and that isn't to the Democrats.

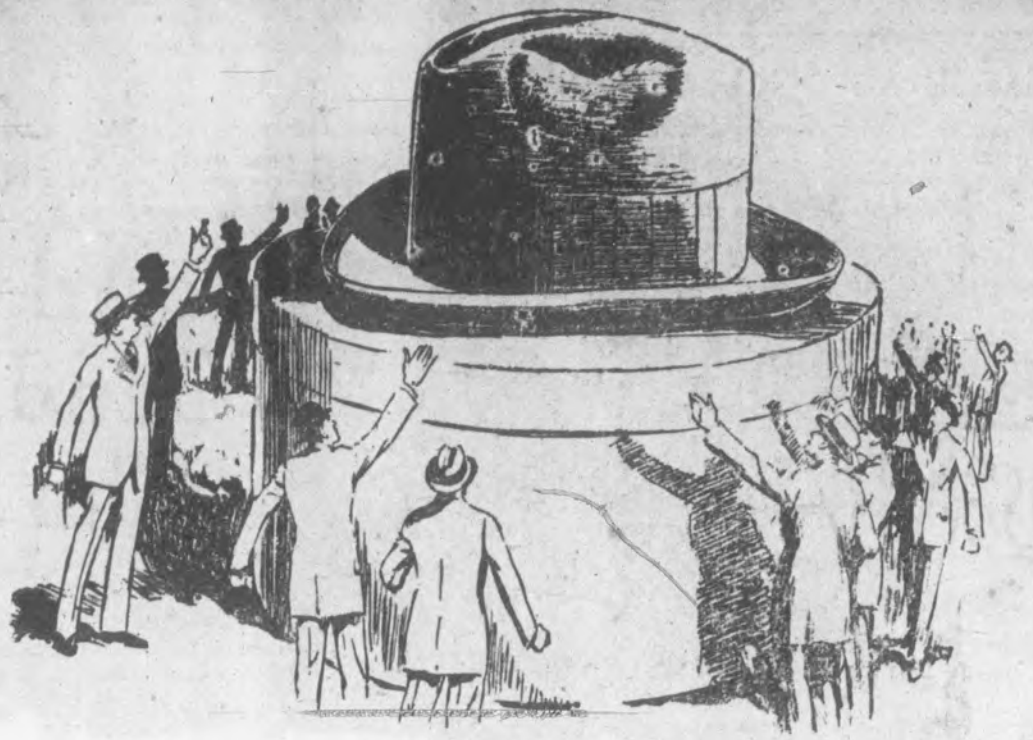
