GREENVILLE PAYS TRIBUTE MEMORY WOODROW WILSON

Hon. F. M. Wooten Delivers Address Memorial Baptist Church

Following out the request and the admonitions of the proclamation of Governor Cameron Morrison regarding the death of Woodrow Wilson, Greenville on yesterday paid tribute to the memory of the great statesman.

Special services were held in all the churches. In the Memorial Baptist church, Hon. F. M. Wooten delivered the following address on "Woodrow Wilson, as a servant of God."

"Points in the life, character and services of Honorable Woodrow Wilson, now deceased, characterizing him as a servant of God."

Honorable Woodrow Wilson was born of humble parents, among the great mass of common people. His father was a minister of the Gospel whose life was dedicated to the service of God. His son, Woodrow Wilson, imbibed of his father's characteristics which are recognized as particularly stressed by the Presbyterian Church, which denomination he served. Woodrow Wilson seems to have been guided by that great principle of election as understood and taught by his church. That is when Woodrow Wilson conceived a thing to be his duty, it was his conviction that he was elected by God to perform that duty and to this conviction he dedicated his life and died a martyr.

In this hour millions of people are assembled, like we are, within one week to the hour of his death to think on the life, character and service of this distinguished citizen of the world.

That we and all the people judge him, in the name of Christ, and hold his virtues in perpetual memory to guide mankind into better life, better characters and better services to God, is our duty and aim. In this statement we are mindful that we are commanded to "Judge not, lest ye be judged by that same judgment." To this commandment we humbly submit and by it we shall be guided. For if we are not fair and are unwilling to live according to the divine command, we should not judge.

Woodrow Wilson like Abraham of old was a friend of God. He served God with fidelity, and like Abraham he became a friend of the multitude. Abraham to mankind became Abraham the friend of the multitude. Woodrow Wilson served the world and became the father of the covenant of the League of Nations, the object of which is to serve God in the abolition of war, which object has been adopted under solemn obligation by fifty six of the Nations World. As truly as was Abraham the servant in serving the people in making known to them, their God, just so truly has Woodrow Wilson served in his various walks in life.

As truly as Joseph of old was burdened with crosses; sold in bondage, carried in slavery into a foreign country, survived the burdens of his crosses and saved the people who would have destroyed him, just so truly did Woodrow Wilson emerge from his humble birth in Staunton, Virginia, pass through his humble youth in North Carolina and walked the paths of service as a First Citizen of America, as a great teacher and leader of his people, ascend to the high place, chief magistrate of the United States of America, and emerged into the builder of the peace of the world.

As truly as Moses obeyed the will of God, subdued his own impulsive character, became the great law giver of the world, lead his own people out of bondage into national freedom and worship of God in the Promised Land, just so truly did Woodrow Wilson become the servant of God; submit himself to His guidance, go with his people as their commander in chief, into the greatest war of the world and out of the bonds of tyranny into personal freedom; into the great democracy established by Christ and into the Promised Land where the teachings of Christ may reign supreme.

And in likeness to the Supreme Prince of Peace Woodrow Wilson lived humbly, sincerely in honest service, strip of pomp and show

He was brought to Greenville and placed in jail. Every effort possible is being made to apprehend Fate Staton.

holding fast, always to the eternal principle of righteousness never compromising in any degree with forces of destruction. His disregard for pomp and show is evidenced by a photograph showing him standing between the King and Queen of Great Britain with one leg of his trousers turned up above his shoe top. His unwillingness to compromise with forces of destruction is evidenced by his order, as President of the United States, that the people of America may travel upon the high seas of the world without let or hindrance, in opposition the judgment of his great secretary of state advising expediency and against war. This devotion to principle, as an incident to his duties as a servant of God perhaps hermitted the destruction of the Lusitania upon the high seas together with the loss of scores of human lives.

Such are some of the points in the life, character and services of Honorable Woodrow Wilson as a Servant of God, who declared "I am ready, the machinery is broken," and with his forces no longer able to function, he was, in our vision:

"Taken by a white winged angel corp, To that far away home of the soul, Where no storms ever beat on its Peaceful shores while the years Eternity roll.

And so he dwells in the memory of mankind, crown with the azure of the world."

McAdoo Says His Candidacy Drew Him Into Scandal

WASHINGTON, Feb. 11.—In an atmosphere of political tension William G. McAdoo, former secretary of Treasury and now candidate for the Democratic nomination for president, faced the Senate oil investigating committee to explain his connection with the Doheny interests. At the outset he read a prepared statement which charged that had his name not been mentioned prominently in connection with high office that it would never have been brought in to the oil inquiry. He declared that he acted in good faith in accepting a retainer fee as counselor for the Doheny organization and on cross examination asserted that the present attack upon him is purely political.

"I conceive that the matter is wholly irrelevant to the subject," said Mr. McAdoo, "but I have been willing to come here to place the facts before you for such use and value as they may have in the pursuit of your investigation. Appearing at his own request, because the testimony by Doheny, in explaining his connection in the Mexican oil matter Mr. McAdoo declared that he had not been mentioned for high office, his services as a lawyer to the Doheny interests would never have been mentioned in connection with the oil lease investigation. He asserted that the faith of the people in its government was shaken because of developments in the oil inquiry and declared that the first and imperative duty of the hour is to uncover and bring public view, scorn and punishment every one who is guilty of betraying their public trust in this humiliating and dangerous affair.

It is a crime against the public, he declared, to drag innocent people into this affair to divert attention from those who are guilty of betraying the public interests. His statement was an elaboration of the letter that he recently sent to Chairman Lenroot dealing with his services with the Doheny companies. He declared that he had severed relations with the Doheny interests on February 2, the day after Mr. Doheny last appeared before the committee and revealed his connection as counsel.

"I have only advised Mr. Doheny regarding Mexican affairs," declared Mr. McAdoo.

"I think that I may say that if he had asked my advice about this matter he never would have gotten into this difficulty," he added. When asked if the \$100,000 that Mr. Doheny paid his law firm was brought in a satchel Mr. McAdoo replied that it was received in check form.

When the former secretary appeared in the committee room accompanied by David Rockwell, of Ohio, his manager in his campaign for the presidential nomination, he was greeted by a loud burst of applause which continued for a full minute or more. He smiled and bowed as he made his way to a seat to await the call of the committee. Many members of the House and Senate were mingled with the crowd.

"You will be sworn as all witnesses are," Chairman Lenroot said, after calling the former secretary to the stand. "Do you desire to make a statement to the committee?" asked the chairman after the oath had been administered. Seating himself under a battery of cameras Mr. McAdoo adjusted his glasses and in reply read his prepared statement. Questioned by Senator Walsh, McAdoo said that he had resigned as secretary of the Treasury December 16, 1918 and gave up the post of Director General of Railroads on Jan. 11, 1919. After three months of rest in California he entered the law firm of Cotton and Franklin according to an agreement previously made.

"When did you begin serving Mr. Doheny?" asked Senator Walsh.

"November 30, 1919," was the reply. Asked if there had been any arrangements, while still in the cabinet, to enter the services of Mr. Doheny, Mr. McAdoo replied that he had not met Doheny until he had retired from office.

McAdoo's Availability for Candidate Is Said To Be Very Doubtful

SAINT LOUIS, Feb. 11.—William G. McAdoo's association with the Doheny oil interests renders his "availability" as a presidential candidate doubtful, according to William H. Johnson, president of the International Association of Machinists.

Mr. Johnson presided over the opening session of a three-days' convention of the international conference, for political action, here today.

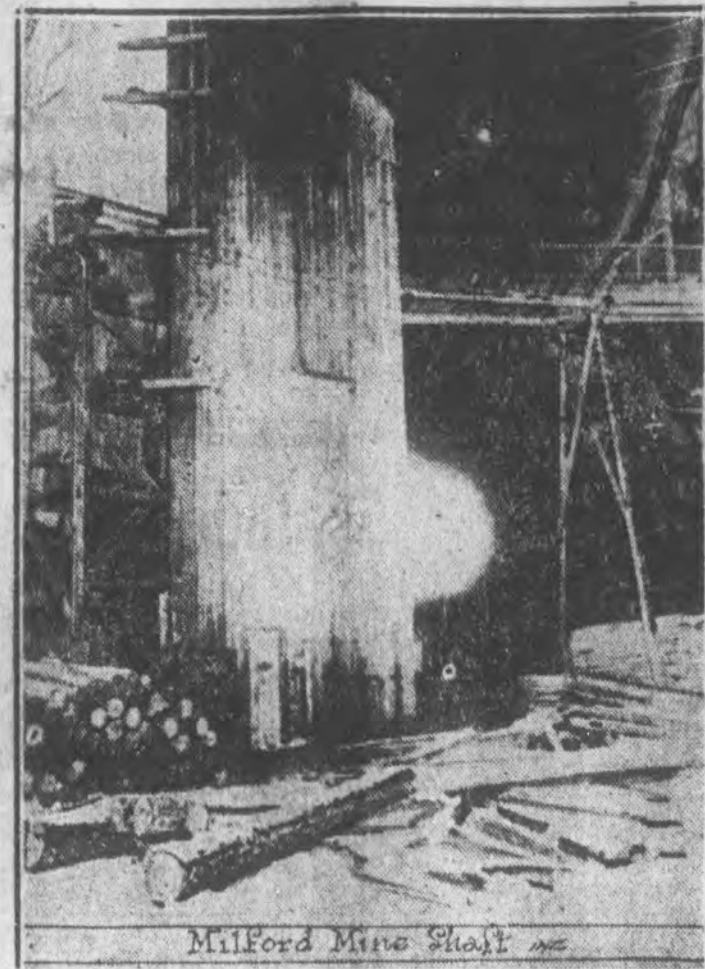
Mrs. Asa G. Candler Arrested in Raid, Must Appear Court

AYDLETT ENTERS CONGRESS FIELD Progress, Main Plank in Platform of Elizabeth City Candidate

ELIZABETH CITY, Feb. 11.—E. F. Aydtlett, who several weeks ago admitted that he would be a candidate for Congress to represent the first North Carolina Congressional district, made formal announcement of his candidacy to a local newspaper today.

Progress, but progress, on lines of business economy rather than of extravagance, seems to be the main plank in Mr. Aydtlett's platform. He has been a life-long Democrat and has always been regarded as a progressive Democrat, but declares that at this time he stands for tax reduction and for economy in the administration of the affairs of government.

E. F. Aydtlett has been an influential citizen of Elizabeth City since 1881, when he came to Elizabeth City from Camden and became junior member of the firm of Grandy and Aydtlett.

Devoting himself to the practice of his profession with an indefatigable zeal, by application and natural endowment he gradually built up a large practice and won a reputation as a lawyer second to none in this district; and few are the important cases today, in Federal or State courts, in which he does not appear on one side or the other.

In all these years E. F. Aydtlett has been active in politics and in the public life of the city. In every campaign for the last 30 years he has been an active Democrat, working for his friends with the same resourcefulness and enthusiasm that has characterized his fights for his clients in the courts. During this period the only public offices that he has ever held has been that of United States District Attorney, and that was his for a very brief time, as his appointment came only ten months before the Democratic defeat of 1920.

NEW YORK, Feb. 11.—Corliss Hooen Griffis, of Hamilton, Ohio, who was recently released from prison in Moshach, Germany, after serving part of his sentence for complicity in a plot to kidnap Grover Cleveland Bergdoll, American draft evader, arrived home this morning on board the Albert Bollin. He was given a reception in the city hall.

Two Prison Officers Killed Others Are Wounded in Riot

PITTSBURGH, PA., Feb. 11.—Prison officers were shot to death and a number of convicts wounded more or less seriously in a riot at the Western penitentiary near here this morning.

After an hour fighting in which riot guns, tear gas bombs, clubs and bricks were used, the prison authorities assisted by county and city police and detective forces, were successful in quelling the uprising. The trouble began when the convicts used explosives in an effort to dynamite their way to freedom. An explosion shattered the big gates at the main entrance of the institution at 9:40 this morning and immediately a riot call was sounded summoning the aid of city and county authorities. Warden J. M. Egan reported that the trouble was the outcome of a plot born in the minds of four or five bad men who had been transferred from the Eastern penitentiary over to the Western for disciplining. He said that he believed that the plot was engineered by a quartette of convicts who called themselves the "four horsemen" and that they received outside aid. Many of the convicts were found to be armed. According to officials none are known to have escaped.

EX-SERVICE MEN TO HOLD MASS MEETING IN COURT HOUSE

Wiley C. Rodman, State Commander to Make Address on the Bonus

The Pitt County Post of the American Legion has called for a mass meeting of all ex-service men in Pitt county at the court house Wednesday night, February 13, 1924.

The object of this meeting is to discuss the prospects and objects of the Adjusted Compensation bill that is before congress and to get an expression from the men who were in service and the public in general as to their opinion of this bill. The public is cordially invited to attend. The program committee in charge of this meeting has arranged a very fine and interesting program for the evening.

Col. Wiley C. Rodman, state commander of the American Legion has been secured to make an address and all who have heard him know that his talk will be worth while. This is the first opportunity that the people of this community have had to have the state commander of the Legion address them. It is hoped that a large number of citizens in addition to the ex-service men will be present.

The gallery will be reserved for the colored people. In addition to the address by Commander Rodman there will be a short memorial service for the late ex-president, Woodrow Wilson and several talks by some of the ex-service men.

The Pitt County Post of the American Legion is now in the midst of their annual membership campaign. In order that this campaign might be more effective the post has been divided into four teams and these teams are making a house-to-house call which will bring the membership campaign to its end with the regular monthly meeting of the post February 19, 1924. It is hoped by that time that the post will have a membership of 200 members.

Every ex-service man in Pitt county is urged to get in touch with some member of one of these teams and give him his membership. Membership in the Legion carries with it not only the fellowship and pleasure of meeting with the other comrades at the regular meeting nights but in addition to this each member of the Legion gets the American Legion Weekly, for a year, he gets the opportunity to be of service to his disabled buddies and he keeps fresh and dear the memories of those buddies who have died that he might live in peace and prosperity. Comrade if you have not joined the Legion and do not know what it is doing join up for a year and see how much you get out of it. 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WHAT WILL HE DO?

President Coolidge is not likely to be strong enough to force western Republicans to vote for Secretary Mellon's proposal that the higher surtaxes be reduced from maximum of 50 to a maximum of 25 per cent. Revolt in Congress, and a more or less general repudiation of Mr. Coolidge in the West would be the result of his attempt to coerce western Senators and Representatives.

Whatever the eventuality may be in respect to tax reduction it will be known to the country before the Republican convention meets. Congress has definitely decided that the present session shall close not later than the first week in June. Members want to go to the convention of their respective parties and then return home to safeguard their political future. Congressmen from the West know that they dare not, out of self-interest or deference to the wishes of their constituents, cut the taxes of the millionaires while thousands of farmers in their bailiwicks are bankrupt and burdened with debts.

If President Coolidge should veto any tax bill which failed to reduce the higher surtaxes to a maximum of 25 per cent., as Secretary Mellon urges, it would mean, say close observers, that he would be disavowed by Republican candidates who wanted to save the party, just as his predecessor was disavowed by the Republicans of Minnesota last year when they were put to a choice between supporting him and his policies or electing Mangus Johnson.

It is already foreseen that when President Coolidge becomes aware that his insistence on Secretary Mellon's scheme or none is about to lead to his own political undoing he will welcome a chance to compromise and sign a Democratic tax measure—the only sort that has any prospect of passing.

Secretary Mellon is not a candidate for the presidency and Calvin Coolidge is. Moreover, this is a Democratic year.

The Republican newspapers which—at least in cities of large financial interests—are following Chairman Green of the House Ways and Means Committee for his letter upon the Mellon surtax rate are taking a narrow view of the situation. Mr. Green is justified.

It is easy enough for Mr. Mellon in the Treasury Department, or for Mr. Coolidge in the White House, with its traditions of deference, to say that the Administration Tax Bill should go as it is planned. But Mr. Green happens to be charged with the duty of securing the passage of a Tax Bill in the House, and it is his duty to sense the atmosphere of that body and determine what can and what cannot be accomplished there. And, considering how narrow is the nominal majority of the Republicans and how ready the bloc of discontent is to make trouble, his judgment is probably sound.

The bill as reported borrows Gov. Smith's plan of a flat 25-per-cent. reduction of the tax upon last year's income payable this year. It does not discriminate between earned and unearned incomes below \$5,000. It empowers the President to name the Board of Tax Appeals and it wipes out a number of nuisance taxes. It is a good bill as it stands, but a bill which stands a better chance of passage will be for that reason a better bill. The one thing that must not happen is deadlock. Tax reduction is feasible. The people are entitled to it. They demand it.

Mr. Green's difference with the Secretary is chiefly upon the surtax rate. "The man with immense wealth," he says, "who will evade taxes at 35 per cent. will do so at 25 per cent." The form of the statement lacks in courtesy. Whether in Washington or in the States, bonds have been made tax-free for the express purpose of inviting purchase, and wealthy men are not fairly subject to criticism for doing what their Government invites and intends them to do.

What should in fairness be said is that, even with surtax rates rising at the top to 50 per cent., by no means all very wealthy men have fully availed themselves of a legitimate opportunity to avoid income taxation by shifting their investments. Mr. Green may be right in thinking that the 35-per-cent. top rate is fiscally prudent. He is undoubtedly right in thinking it politically prudent to raise Mr. Mellon's surtax schedule.

Upon the Administration and the Opposition alike we would urge the issue not of this or that rate but of Tax Reduction. Excess taxation tempts to needless expenditure, which is waste. Taxation can be cut and it must be cut at this session of Congress. If a compromise upon surtax rates—between the two parties, or between the differing factions of the Republican Party, or for a combination of these reasons—then compromise is wise and statesmanlike. The way to reduce taxation is to reduce it; not to quarrel about rates and then whine before the people on the stump during the campaign because action has been blocked by the folly of the complainants themselves.—N. Y. World.

GERMAN BIRTH RATE DECLINED STEADILY DURING LAST 5 YRS.

BERLIN, Feb.—Judging from vital statistics the idea of birth control would appear, to a limited extent, to have been adopted in Germany. Particularly does this seem to be the case in Berlin and other cities where, for several years, the birth rate has fallen below the death rate, while it is only in the rural and outlying industrial districts that the tendency to bring forth children has returned to anything like normalcy.

The "thoughtless production" of children so characteristic of the German and other European nations some years ago is gradually disappearing, in the opinion of Professor Heinrich Silbergleit, who contends that people living in the cities do not care to have their social activities handicapped by large families.

This change has come about gradually. Where the birth rate in the last decade of the 19th century, was as high as 36 to every thousand of population, it has been reduced to 23, or even less, due to various circumstances and the economic conditions prevailing in Germany since the end of the war.

Lectures on hygiene, moving pictures and other propaganda designed to teach the benefits of rearing smaller families, avers Prof. Silbergleit, have resulted in an increasing tendency even among the middle classes to restrict the number of children in many cases by one-half. Uncertainty of the food supply, particularly in the industrial areas, also has had much to do with this change, which is in direct contrast to the idea prevailing prior to the world war, for then the majority of the German families appeared to plan to have as many children as possible.

In 1913-14 the average birth rate in Germany was 26 to every thousand of population. This added 800,000 babies a year to the empire. But the rate began to decrease almost as soon as hostilities opened, and during the war the surplus of deaths, including those killed in battle, over the newly born increased from one in a thousand in 1915 to ten in every thousand when the fighting was at its height in 1918.

The first year after the war the birth rate again began to show an increase, and it reached its maximum in 1920 with 26 a thousand. But the years since have averaged about 23, or less, with the cities month by month gradually falling below this rate.

Professor Silbergleit estimates the population of Germany today, minus Upper Silesia and other territory lost as an outcome of the war, at 63,000,000.

MISS BRANDSTROM EXPENDS MONEY RAISED IN AMERICA
STOCKHOLM.—Miss Elsa Brandstrom, called "the Angel of Siberia," has begun the investment of the \$100,000 which she raised by her popular lectures in the United States last year in the cause of the widows and children of central European war prisoners in Russia.

Miss Brandstrom has established a children's home at the castle of Neusorge, near Mittweide, in Saxony where the children can be brought up in cheerful surroundings and under the best of care. The institution is to be individual and practical, including such things as household management and gardening.

National Conference for Disabled Civilians Be Held February 4

RALEIGH, Feb. 2.—The National Conference on Vocational Rehabilitation of Disabled Civilians to be held in Washington February 4 to 5 will be well attended by Representatives of the State Department of Public Instruction, according to an announcement made in that office today. The purpose of the national conference is to bring together the heads of the various states' civilian rehabilitation departments and to exchange ideas of conducting the departments the main purpose however being to organize their forces for the appeal to Congress to continue the appropriation of the Congress of 1920 for aiding the states in carrying on the work of rehabilitating disabled civilians.

Those who will represent the department from the State of North Carolina are T. E. Browne, director of Vocational Education of the department of Public Welfare; H. L. Stanton, Homer L. Stanton, Supervisor of Industrial Rehabilitation, Paul Ransom, Assistant Supervisor of Industrial Rehabilitation; A. T. Allen, director of the State department of Public Instruction, and H. C. Corpening also of the department of Public Instruction.

In 1920 Congress passed the Civilian Rehabilitation Act which provided for funds to be distributed among the states that have civilian rehabilitation services, there are now 36 such states, it was stated. This appropriation was for only four years, and was thought at that time to be a trial act to see if such a plan was advisable. The appropriation expires in June of this year and unless Congress makes another such appropriation, the states will have to operate their departments of civilian rehabilitation entirely at their expense, it was pointed out. It was further declared that while the states were giving as liberally as possible to this department, the failure of Congress to provide for such assistance would greatly handicap the work of the various states.

It is to this end that the conference was especially called. For some time the workers of the department have been soliciting the support and promise of the support of the bill now before Congress to make an annual appropriation for the carrying on of this work in various states. It is felt that by Congress making this appropriation with same condition as before, that is that each state must also put in its ratio for the maintenance of such a department, that the other states that at present have no department of civilian rehabilitation, will soon establish such.

LONDON.—Lady Isabella Howard who, as wife of Sir Esme William Howard, the newly appointed British Ambassador at Washington, succeeds Lady Geddes at the national capital, belongs to an Italian family that holds an old Scottish peerage. Lady Howard fell back on her Scottish title when she became the wife of Sir Esme Howard. Her brother is Prince Giustiniani-Baudini who with his wife was recently the victim of an attack by disloyal servants. Lady Howard is described as dignified, kindly and sensible, which characteristics made her very popular in Madrid society where she was a particular favorite with the king and queen of Spain.

Fall's Ranch Manager Under Surveillance.



It is reported in Washington that J. T. Johnson, manager of the Three Rivers, N. M., ranch of ex-Secretary of the Interior Albert B. Fall, is under constant surveillance. He had been summoned to Washington to be questioned about the statement of Archie Roosevelt, son of the late President, that he received checks for \$68,000 from a representative of Harry F. Sinclair, oil magnate, and also about Fall's expenditures on his ranch after a long period of apparent penury.

Bok, of Philadelphia, for the best plan for America to assist in maintaining world peace. He has received \$50,000 and will receive the other \$50,000 when a national referendum approves his plan. The World Court League was founded with the millions left by Edward Glinn, of Boston, multi-millionaire publisher, to be devoted to world peace.

Names Mr. Harding in Oil Scandal.



United States Senator George W. Norris, Republican of Nebraska, astonished his party leaders by declaring on the floor of the Senate that the blame for the Teapot Dome oil leasing scandal rested on the late President Warren G. Harding for signing over to Secretary Fall, of the Interior Department, the right to dispose of naval oil lands.

WILMINGTON, N. C., Feb. 10.—Ken Burrisim of Wilmington, will meet Barry Avera, of Atlanta, in eight round bout here next Thursday night in the Academy of Music according to an announcement made by Porter Davis, manager for Burrisim, and who is promoting the fight. This will be the first that Burrisim had since his bout with Battling Budd of Atlanta, here a few weeks ago.
