SEVERAL CASES ARE GIVEN HEARING IN COUNTY COURT HERE

Docket Quickly Disposed of in Monday's Session of Court

TUT-ANKH-AMEN'S SACORPHAGUS IS OPENED TODAY

LUXOR, EGYPT, Feb. 12. — The lid of Tut-ankh-amen's sacrophagus was raised today. It is expected that the body of the king will be found within.

When the lid was raised there was revealed the most splendid gilded mummy case ever found in Egypt. It is about three metres long.

The mummy case bears an effigy in relief of the king wearing the "Nemes" or sacred head-dress as that of the Sphinx decorated with the head of a hawk and a serpent in pure gold set with lapis lazuli. The hands are crossed one bearing a crooked sceptre and the other a flail.

A pathetic touch is given the effigy by a little crescent of withered natural flower entwined about the gold headdress.

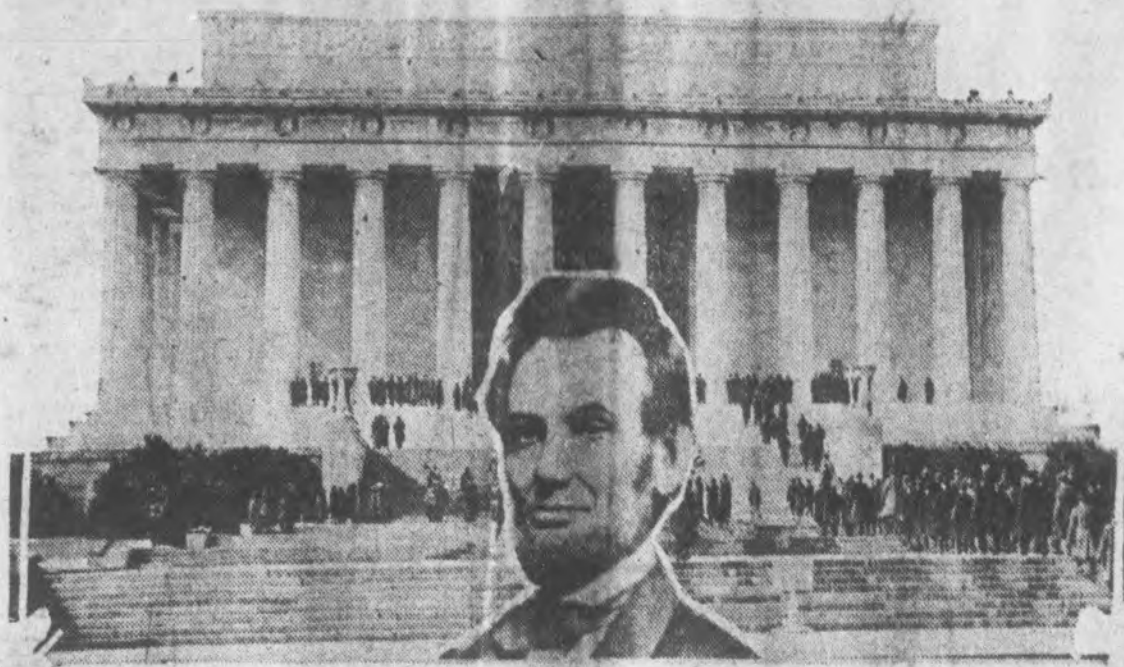
Civic Organizations Adopt Resolutions on National Defense

Coolidge Declines to Take Action On Denby's Dismissal

Senate Adopts Resolution Asking for Immediate Removal

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12. — President Coolidge was advised by the Senate yesterday to ask for the resignation of Edwin Denby as secretary of the Navy.

A resolution declaring the Secretary's retirement should be requested "immediately" was adopted, 47 to 34, and sent to the White House by special messenger within the hour.

Last night there was nothing to indicate clearly what the President's reply would be. White House officials who already have declared the question outside the province of Congress were silent. Mr. Denby sent word to inquirers that he would have nothing to say in the immediate future.

President Turns Down Request.

Pres. Coolidge answered Senate request for the resignation of Edwin Denby as Secretary of the Navy with the statement last night that: "No official recognition can be given to the passage of the Senate resolution relative to their opinion concerning members of the Cabinet or other officers under executive control."

The executive declared he did not propose to sacrifice "any innocent man for my own welfare," nor retain in office "any unfit man for my own welfare."

"As soon as special counsel can advise me as to the legality of these leases and assemble for me the pertinent facts in the various transactions," the President added, "I shall take such action as seems essential for the full protection of the public interest. I shall not hesitate to call for the resignation of any various transactions," the present matter in any way warrants such action upon my part."

Committee Resumes Hearings

Having placed on file at the White House its unavailing demand for the immediate resignation of Secretary of Navy Denby, the Senate today turned its inquisitorial spot light once more upon the affairs of former Secretary of Interior Albert B. Fall.

Before the committee a succession of witnesses were questioned as to financial transactions in the Southwest in an effort by committee members to delve further into Mr. Fall's connection and association with that period of his career which recently has come so prominently under public scrutiny.

Plans Being Made For the Erection of \$50,000 School

ASHEVILLE, Feb. 12. — Plans for erecting the \$50,000 school, about a mile from Fairview Township, are well under way. The purchase of eight and one half acres of land on the state highway has been made by the Fairview school district.

The grounds were bought from Frank Shuford, at the rate of \$625 per acre. The Fairview School committee met Thursday to discuss plans with the board of education.

The plans of the committee are to have the school completed by the next fall term which begins next September.

CAPITAL HONORS LINCOLN'S BIRTH

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12. — The capital celebration of the birth of Abraham Lincoln centered today in the memorial program in the House and the departure of President Coolidge for New York to address the Lincoln birthday dinner of the National Republican Club. The Senate was recessed in observance of the day and a number of its members took part in the various exercises arranged by schools and patriotic and other organizations.

Calling upon the influence of America and the spirit of Abraham Lincoln "to lead the nations of the world from their hatred of the past and selfishness of the present to the dawn of a brighter day," Representative Rathbone, of Illinois, the memorial speaker in the House described the Washington Arms conference as "epoch making" and suggested that "further bounds be set to the insanity of nations in piling ever higher and higher the expense of armament." "Just as Abraham Lincoln has, more than any other man, set the moral standard of men," he declared, "so we hope and believe that America, more than any other land, will fix the moral standard of all nations."

TWO DEAD, ONE MAY DIE RESULT CROSSING WRECK

LINCOLNTON, Feb. 12. — Austin Grigg, of Cherryville, died in a hospital here yesterday from injuries received Sunday when the automobile in which he was riding was struck by a Seaboard Air Line train near Cherryville.

Mamie Swink is in the hospital here with a fractured spine and is not expected to live. Mrs. Bolick, of Buffalo, was instantly killed by the accident. Two other men occupants of the machine escaped unhurt.

State Merchants Association to Meet in Raleigh Feb. 20

RALEIGH, Feb. 12. — Plans for the meeting of the State Merchants' Association here on February 20 were discussed at the first meeting of the new directors of the local Merchants Association when Josephus Daniels, Jr., president of the local association announced his appointments of committees for the arrangement of the state meeting. There were 14 committees with a large membership headed by William Pearlstein.

The committees plan to make this state meeting the largest and most successful gathering that the State Merchants' Association has ever had. Many unique affairs are to be arranged and several different days will be set aside for the demonstration of idea advantage for the merchant to use in his business.

"Dollar Day," "Fashion Show," "Fall Festival," other plans will be among the features of the meeting.

SIMMONS TO GET \$146,000 TO PULL OUT FROM K. K. K.

ATLANTA, Feb. 12. — Settlement of all differences between William Joseph Simmons emperor and founder of the Ku Klux Klan and Dr. Hiram W. Evans, Imperial Wizard of the order, for a consideration of \$146,000 paid to Colonel Simmons is reported by close friends of the two men according to a story appearing today in the Atlanta Journal.

According to those close to Simmons and Evans, the story says, the terms of the compromise are substantially as follows:

1. Colonel Simmons sold his contract with the klan for \$96,000 constituting eight years services at the rate of \$1,000 per month according to the terms of a permanent agreement with the order.

2. Colonel Simmons also received \$50,000 for his rights in the Knights of Kamelia an order similar to the klan which he founded recently.

Simmons is said to be in Jacksonville, Fla., attending a conference and during his absence no definite announcement could be obtained as to his part in the transaction the story declares.

New Prime Minister Makes First Speech in House Commons

LONDON, Feb. 12. — Ramsey MacDonald, Great Britain's new labor prime minister rising at 4:15 this afternoon for his first speech in the House of Commons since he became head of the government called attention to the fact that no party had a majority. This new condition he said would necessitate alterations in the habits of the members as individuals because they would have to vote more or less upon their own personal responsibility and not rely merely upon party politics.

Mr. MacDonald thanked the "calm and sane-minded" business men who had warned investors not to "make fools" of themselves because of the advent of a labor government. He appealed to his country to keep steady. The labor government, Mr. MacDonald declared, was not going out of office as the result of any snap division, and that when it did go out it would be the result of a definite and substantial issue.

It is expected that his speech will consume approximately an hour and half.

Defense In Cooper Trial Take Stand This Afternoon

WILMINGTON, Feb. 12. — Testimony of technical character filed today's session of the trial in United States District court of Lt. Gov. W. B. Cooper and his brother, Thomas E. Cooper, H. R. Tull, government investigator was again on the stand. Mr. Tull pointed out to the jury entries of irregularity in the bank ledger and other records made in connection with the transactions by which the Coopers were indicted upon charges of conspiracy.

Thomas E. Cooper will be the first witness for the defense, it was announced, and will be followed by his brother, Lieutenant Governor W. B. Cooper. It was said that the testimony of these two would be virtually the only testimony offered by the defense.

It was indicated at noon today that Thomas E. Cooper would probably take the stand sometime during the afternoon as the government expected to conclude its testimony with that of Tull.

Albert Irby To Play With Greensboro During Next Season

SALISBURY, Feb. 12. — Albert "RED" Irby, outfielder will play with the Greensboro Club of the Piedmont League, next season. He was gotten from the Scranton Club of the New York-Pennsylvania circuit. The patriots paid a good sum for the gardner. Scranton wanted the backstopper and Greensboro wanted the fielder.

MARTIN ANNOUNCES CANDIDACY CONGRESS FROM FIRST DISTRICT

Washington Co. Man Has Had Great Deal Legislative Experience

PLYMOUTH, N. C., Feb. 12. — Yielding to the urgent desire of his friends and to his own ambition to serve the people of the First North Carolina district in Congress, the Hon. Van B. Martin, of Plymouth, has announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination to Congress, following the withdrawal of the Hon. Hallett Ward. This announcement Mr. Martin has made after an enthusiastic meeting of his Washington county friends, called together to lay plans for a thorough campaign.

Mr. Martin has had a great deal of legislative experience, which his followers believe has fitted him for the larger sphere of usefulness to which he now aspires. First elected to the state senate in the year 1908, when he was yet a very young man, he has served in one branch or other of the state legislature almost continuously since, having been a member of the House in 1923. His influence in this body has been state-wide, having been widely recognized as one of the strongest men and most skillful debaters there. He has sponsored and strongly supported state-wide measures that have become the foundation of North Carolina's present pre-eminence. As the author of the state-wide stock law he has laid the state under obligations to him.

Washington county has repeatedly honored Mr. Martin, electing him to every office to which he aspired, and to some which he accepted from a sense of duty. For four years he was county solicitor for one year superintendent of schools, and for several years mayor of the town of Plymouth. That these, his home people, are now supporting him for Congress is an evidence of their appreciation of the service he has rendered.

Mr. Martin, a native of Northampton county, this state, came to Plymouth as a young man in 1900 to take up the practice of law, and has been for a number of years the leader of the bar here.

The people of Plymouth and Washington county, in offering Mr. Martin to the other counties of the district as a strong candidate, an able debater, a proved legislator and a staunch Democrat, believe that they are performing a real service in promoting able government.

Bids Being Made New Coast Guard Station Body Island

ELIZABETH CITY, Feb. 12. — Bids are being asked for the construction of a new up-to-date Coast Guard station at body Island. The building will extend from sea to sound. It will be four stories high, made of concrete and wood.

The building will have its own electric light plan sewerage system, plumbing and hot and cold water. The estimated will be about \$30,000. Every comfort of home will be provided and are going to have bath-rooms to about every two or three rooms. It will probably begin about the middle of April and end about Sept. 1.

Grand Masters of 39th District to Meet Asheville, April 25

ASHEVILLE, Feb. 12. — The Grand Masters in the Masonic Lodges of the thirty-ninth district will hold a conference in the Asheville Masonic Temple on April 25 next. Deputy Grand Master Clinton G. Ward, of Biltmore, will preside at the meeting. The principal speaker will be W. C. Wicker, of Elon, educational secretary of the North Carolina Grand Lodge.

Nichols, Lodge No. 650, and Mount Herman Lodge No. 118 of Asheville, Blackmer, of Weaverville, and Vance of Stockville; Center, of Jupiter, and Biltmore of Biltmore; Hominy, of Chandler; Barnardsville, of Barnardsville; Ottolay, of Fairview; Swannanoa of Swannanoa.

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WHAT HAS JOHNSON DONE?

Promoters of Senator Hiram Johnson's campaign are capitalizing the Teapot Dome oil scandal in his behalf and are expected to spread the bad news still further. George Henry Payne, eastern seneschal of Johnson's forces, is telling reporters wherever he goes that "the Republicans cannot afford to nominate President Coolidge because of the Teapot Dome oil lease."

Mr. Payne has told that story in Chicago and New York and places in-between those extremes of the "Coolidge territory." It is confidently expected that he will tell it also in Gath and Askalon and in any other communities where there are votes to be had.

It is in no wise owing to Senator Johnson that there was an investigation of the leasing of Teapot Dome to Harry F. Sinclair. Johnson is not recorded as having given any assistance by word or act to the inquiry, although he is a survivor of the campaign of 1912 during which conservation of the country's natural resources was an important issue. Johnson has been almost as silent on the subject of Teapot Dome—until it looked like it might explode and wreck Coolidge—as he was on the subject of Newberry's election.

Teapot Dome, by the way, may not contain much oil, as the lessees contend it does not but it may prove to hold enough to start a political conflagration of the first magnitude.

THE WHITE MAN'S BURDEN

Public ownership of public utilities and operation of the same without profit is a beautiful dream, but few people stop to think what it might mean.

The cities have their hands full now managing, financing, taxing themselves and raising money to handle all that is expected of

them under present conditions.

They must pave streets, build sewers, maintain parks, clean streets, conduct public schools, employ police and fire departments, and support hospitals and jails.

Add to this the management of street railroads, telephone systems, gas plants, electric lighting, children's playgrounds, municipal dance halls, public auditoriums, golf links and numerous other things proposed, and you double the taxpayer's burdens.

The payrolls and financing of all public utility enterprises would exhaust the credit and taxing power of municipalities.

Is not the present system of using both private and public credit private and public enterprise under sound public regulation a better system, and does it not lead to a maximum of community development?

If it were all loaded upon the general taxpayer, would it not be a staggering burden and destroy enterprise and initiative?

Warwicks of President Coolidge's campaign for the Republican nomination will have to turn away from Wisconsin to some other state—probably back to Kansas—for an eligible vice-presidential nominee to go on the ticket with him. Senator Lenroot, upon whom the Coolidge managers had about agreed as to a teammate for the latter, according to a definite report circulated in Washington, has been eliminated. The explosion of Teapot Dome—which has all but wrecked the Coolidge administration—has made a casualty of Senator Lenroot also.

President Head of the American Bankers Association hits the bullseye when he says: "The big problem is the restoration of a normal foreign market. This is necessary for the benefit of our farmers who produce a surplus of raw materials, for the benefit of our manufacturers and laborers who produce a surplus of manufactured articles and for the benefit of all of us whose prosperity depends upon activity in industry, and commerce." The special committee of the Allied Reparations Commission, now seeking to solve the German financial problem, is the most business-like step yet taken to stabilize world conditions.

PRIVATE INSTRUCTION

One tiny match, lighted in a private garage recently, gave a \$3,000 lesson in fire prevention to a Seattle motorist. While working on his car the man dropped a tool and struck a match to look for it; and explosion and fire immediately followed in which garage and car were destroyed and the owner injured, costly tuition, certainly, but the lesson probably will not have to be repeated.

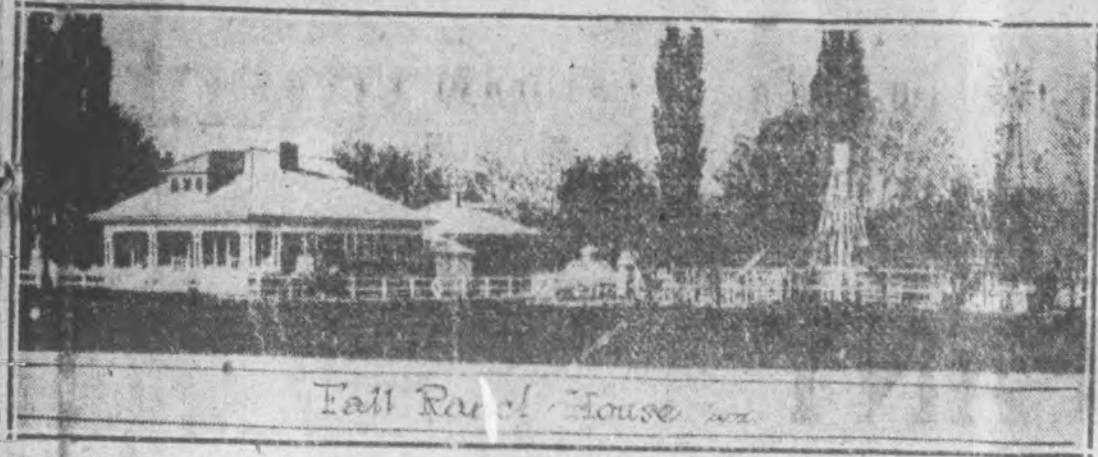

NEW AUSTRIAN COINAGE GIVEN DIGNIFIED NAME

Vienna, Feb. 24.—An issue of silver coin to be called "shillings" has been authorized by the national assembly. They are to be in denominations of one-half shilling, one and two shillings, the shilling to be equal to 10,000 present Austrian crowns. Base metal tokens of 100 and 200 crowns also will be issued. Ten thousand crowns today equals 14 cents. The term shilling has called forth much discussion. One ingenious argument in justification of the adoption of a word associated with the world over with British coinage, is that it is actually a German word. This has been defended at length, but the general belief is that the term was selected as a camouflage to lend dignity and assurance to the new money. One English writer has met the argument of the German origin of the word with the statement that shillings were in use in the England of Edward the Confessor.

Ancient Copperhead Reveals Full Value When Photographed

ANN ARBOR, Mich.—The largest and probably the oldest "copperhead" in the world, recently discovered by a Houghton county farmer, is now in possession of the University of Michigan. It is a nugget of "float" copper weighing 483 pounds. The nugget is 42 inches in height, 32 inches wide, and about three inches thick. The facial outline of an Indian has been formed along one edge of the nugget. To this likeness some one in the centuries past has added a human touch by bending back parts of the edge, in the opinion of Dean Edward B. Kraus, professor of crystallography and mineralogy. The nugget was obtained by the university at the market price of copper. It was believed at the time that it was simply an exceptionally large piece of "float" copper and it was not until it was photographed that its full value was learned. Lack of Thrift Causes Divorces, Says Judge

LOS ANGELES.—Lack of thrift has been the chief cause of recent divorces here, according to statistics prepared by Judge Ralph H. Clock of the superior court, covering about 1,000 divorce cases.

"In a number of cases," said Judge Clock, "the married couple lived together less than one day, while the greatest length of time that any couple lived together and then sought divorce was 39 years."

"Salesmen lead the comparative list of unfaithful husbands, ten percent of the defendants in such divorce actions being of that occupation. Next in order were contractors, merchants, plumbers, painters and printers, with a few barbers."

Strange to say, the list includes no attorneys—in fact, few professional men and women.

"If the idea of thrift and home-owning is to be inculcated in the minds of the American people it should be taught in the schools. Then there will be less inclination to rush to the divorce court on the slightest pretext."

Says North Pole Has Nice Summer Climate

SEATTLE, Wash. — The airship Shenandoah, on the United States navy's expedition to the North Pole next summer, will not find temperatures as low as those this winter on the Atlantic seaboard, is the belief of M. B. Summers, weather observer here, who established the government meteorological station at Point Barrow where Alaska juts farthest north into the Arctic Ocean. Mr. Summers was transferred to Seattle from Juneau, Alaska, several months ago.

Mr. Summers said that the coldest June day recorded at Point Barrow which is 1,117 miles from the pole, was 12 degrees above zero and the coldest July day 26 above. The range last June was from 23 degrees above to 56 above. In this month only two days were classified as clear.

The Shenandoah is more likely to encounter rain than snow, in the opinion of Mr. Summers. "Toward the Pole it will naturally be colder than at Barrow," he said, "considerably so, if there is no large body of land between Alaska and the pole. If there is an Arctic continent or a large island, radiation from the sun's rays will make it warmer and more nearly the temperature of Barrow. But in any event I do not believe that there will be zero temperatures at the pole in July or late June."

FOUR AMERICAN INDUSTRIES HAVE LAID OFF EMPLOYEES

GENEVA, Feb. — Figures showing the world unemployment situation published by the International Labor Review, indicates that during September and October last no important change occurred in general unemployment conditions except in Germany.

In Germany unemployment reached proportions hitherto unknown in that country. About ten per cent of the five million workers covered by the returns were reported to be without work, and nearly forty per cent of the total at work were cited as laboring on short hours. In contrast to the experience in Germany, a decrease in unemployment has been taking place in Czechoslovakia, Austria and Poland.

The report continues: "In the United States a small contraction in employment has taken place. This decrease was shown particularly in the carriage and wagon industry and in the manufacture of rubber, boots and shoes, automobile tires and agricultural implements."

CHEAP RIVER CARGO

RESULTS GROWTH OF SHIPBUILDING NOW

PITTSBURGH, Pa. — Oil has united with steel for greater use of the inland waters as a means of transportation, and to this can be traced the interesting fact that shipbuilding in the Mississippi basin last year was more than one-third the total tonnage of the United States, including ocean ports and the Great Lakes.

The figures, compiled by industrial authorities in Pittsburgh, show that approximately 400 steel barges with freight capacity of approximately 1,000 freight cars; 15 steam towboats, and ten packets were added to the existing fleet of several thousand barges and several hundred boats. Much of this river craft is used in carrying coal to mills and furnaces in the district, but a considerable proportion is allotted to the steel carrying trade from Pittsburgh to rail distributing points along the lower Ohio and Mississippi rivers.

Two years ago, during a period of railroad congestion, steel manufacturers sought the Ohio River as a means of getting their products to southwestern consuming points. So gratifying was the success of the experiment that it has grown into an expanding industry. It was not, however, until later that the oil industry, attracted by lower transportation costs and time saving, turned its attention to the inland waters. Tank barges, holding from 3,000 to 10,000 barrels of crude and refined oil and gasoline, are beginning to appear in squadrons, taking the place of tank car service on the railroads for long distance hauls, but trucks and railroad tanks at river terminals for back country distribution.

The Standard Oil Company of Louisiana, which two years ago set up a large delivery service between Baton Rouge and New Orleans, extended the line to Memphis from which place final distribution was made inland. Early this year it pushed the service to Louisville, some 1,200 miles from New Orleans. Two steamboats have been assigned to the task, one for oil and gasoline barges to Cairo, the mouth of the Ohio, and a smaller one to take the barges to Louisville.

The Pan American Petroleum & Transport company, which recently absorbed the Mexican Petroleum company, investigated river transportation, and placed a contract with a Pittsburgh shipyard for a fleet of tank barges. Some of the barges have been launched, and the Pan American will shortly begin barging oil and gasoline from its ocean going tankers in New Orleans to Pittsburgh and intermediate cities for local service stations. This all water haul will be more than 5,000 miles.

The Inland Waterways company of Louisville has established semi-monthly large movements between Louisville and Pittsburgh. This gives a new outlet for oil from the Kentucky fields, while a return haul is provided the towboats in steel laden barges from the Pittsburgh and Wheeling mills.

The United States Steel Corporation, through its subsidiary the Carnegie Steel company, sent some 800 freight car loads of steel down the Ohio by boat, while the Jones and Laughlin Steel company, the pioneer in the movement added largely to its total. The National Tube company and American Steel & Wire company, other corporation subsidiaries, also were represented in the shipments. In similar manner the Tennessee Coal and Iron company, the southern subsidiary of the corporation, in using the Warrior River division of the Federal barge line between its mills and the Gulf of Mexico for carrying heavy steel products and the corporation mills in Gary, Ind., as well as other mills in the Chicago district, are shipping steel to St. Louis by rail and thence to the southwest by river.

The Jones & Laughlin Steel company, in addition to enlargements of its fleet with a new type "box barge" and gondola barges, designed especially for heavy river duty, has acquired new towboats and bought land on the Mississippi at Memphis upon which it will erect a steel warehouse with river and rail connections for supplying its trade in the south and southwest. It already has shipped some 70,000 tons of steel south by water.

The Wheeling Steel corporation, which has been creating a formidable fleet of towboats and steel barges for transporting coal and steel among its plants along the Ohio in Ohio and West Virginia, has installed modern river terminals and expects in the early spring to inaugurate a down-river distribution system similar to that operated out of Pittsburgh.

FIVE CLEVELANDERS

NOW PLAYING BALL WITH BOSTON CLUB

CLVELAND. — The trading of one unassisted triple play hero for another and the passing of Catcher Steve O'Neill, the last surviving member of the Cleveland Indians of 1911, were features of the seven-player trade made by the Cleveland and Boston American League clubs. It was the largest baseball deal in which Cleveland has figured since 1916, and strangely enough that trade was made between the same two clubs.

The trading of William Wambans, second baseman, who has the distinction of making the only unassisted triple play in a world's series game, for George Burns, first baseman, who pulled the same stunt in a game against Cleveland last season came as no surprise. This deal has been "in the air" since early in the fall.

Incidentally, Wambans almost figured in the deal which brought Tris Speaker to Cleveland. At that time Boston was to have the pick of an infielder, and Lee Fohl, then manager of the Indians but now holding a similar position with the Red Sox, kept him on the bench and used Fred Thomas during the training season. Boston is thought to have Allen for the bait and selected Thomas, who failed to last, while "Wambie" remained the star of the Indians.

Besides strengthening the Indians at their weakest position, first base, the deal will give Cleveland the great wrecking crew it ever had, with six sluggers who last season batted better than .300 leading off. These are: Charlie Jamieson, lf, .345; Homer Summa, rf, .328; Speaker, cf, .380; Joe Sewell, ss, .353; Riggs Stephenson, 2b, .19; and Burns, 1b, .328.

The trading of O'Neill created a sensation among the local fans, with whom he is a favorite. He had given Cleveland some of the best catching it has ever had. His passing, it is believed, will put the burden of the receiving in 1924 on Luke Sewall and Glenn Myatt, with chances favoring the former.

With Lee Fohl the Boston Red Sox now have five players who are residents of Cleveland on its roster. The others are O'Neill, Wambans, Charles Darnkott, a semi-pro pitcher, and Harold Rosenback, an amateur outfielder.

LONDON. — Drummond's Bank, the most aristocratic of London's many aristocratic private banks, declared by legend to have lent money to the pretender in 1745 and reputed to handle the accounts of half the peers of Great Britain has been absorbed by the Royal Bank of Scotland.

land, a comparatively new bank in the city's financial circles. The famous old bank building with its Jacobite appearance and traditions which hides under the splendor of the new Admiralty Arch will remain as the oldest banking house still functioning in London. The partners of the bank, all members of the Drummond family, will remain with the bank which will be a branch of the larger institution.

Drummond's has always been regarded as the "die hard" of English banks and it was only last year they published a statement of their liabilities and assets. The capital of the bank was \$2,000,000 and the deposits \$18,376,350. The Bank of Scotland has a capital of \$10,000,000 with deposits of \$189,402,500.

Only two of the many famous old private banks of London that were often known to finance a war or come to the aid of the throne in times of financial distress, remain in their original status. The oldest, child and Company of Fleet Street was founded in 1599 and Hoare and Company was founded in 1873.

Two Battleships Enter Harbor Be Diamantled

OAKLAND, Cal. — To the dirge of a chorus of "steam whistles," two American battleships, the Nebraska and the Vermont, arrived here recently from their last voyage, a sail of 25 miles from the Mare Island navy yard. They were the largest vessels ever to enter the inner harbor here.

They are consigned to the scrap heap. It will require a year and a payroll of about \$1,000,000 to dismantle them. The scrap metal from the men-of-war will be sent to eastern steel works.

The Nebraska, with a length of 435 feet and a displacement of 14,948 tons, was a training ship during the world war. The Vermont, 450 feet long, with a tonnage of 16,000, was in company with the Nebraska on the cruise around the world in 1908. The Vermont was in Vera Cruz harbor when the Americans captured it in 1914. In the world war she was a troop-ship.

Firpo himself has declared that on several occasions he was asked, while in the United States, if he arrayed himself in feathers when he was at home and if it was true that raw meat was the staple article of diet of Argentina's millions. Questions such as if he had taken part in many

battles with Indians, whether bands of bloodthirsty bandits roamed around the city of Buenos Aires, and if travellers herded together for mutual protection when setting forth upon long journeys, were fired at Argentina's boxing champion by enterprising American newspapermen.

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
