## NEW SENSATION IS EXPECTED IN OIL LEASE SCANDAL

### Senate Will Not Approve Appointments Strawn, Pomerene

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—Another upset in President Coolidge's plans for the prosecution of the oil lease suits seemed probable today when both Senate and oil committee resumed their investigation into the oil lease muddle.

In view of the fact that Silas H. Strawn will probably not be confirmed as the government's special counsel President Coolidge acting under advice will probably withdraw his name and put James R. Garfield, of Ohio in his place. Opposition is also developing to Atlee Pomerene and it is possible that Coolidge may have his name recalled.

On the Senate floor Senator Robinson replied to the President's recent statement regarding Secretary Denby asserting that sooner or later public opinion will drive out of office all these connected with the lease transactions.

Carl C. Schuyler, Denver attorney, telegraphed Sen. Walsh, Democrat of Montana, today that he had in his possession correspondence which he thought the Senate oil committee should have. Senator Walsh announced that Schuyler will be summoned immediately to appear before the committee.

At the same time the Montana Senator received a telegram from W. P. Stackelback of the Denver Post saying that he had good reason to believe that the correspondence in Schuyler's possession was "sensational."

### Senate Opposes Counsel.

There were further indications today of impending developments of first importance in connection with the designation of government counsel to prosecute the oil lease cases.

The question was talked over by President Coolidge, Chairman Lenroot, of the oil committee, and Senator Curtis, of Kansas, Republican whip in the Senate, and afterward there was increasing evidence that the Senate would not approve one or both of the men nominated as counsel by the president.

Meantime some of those intimately acquainted with the trend of developments believe that voluntary changes by the president in his selections will avert action by the Senate.

President Coolidge is apparently preparing to withdraw from the Senate the nomination of Silas H. Strawn as special government counsel in the oil lease cases. There is a possibility that the name of Atlee Pomerene, Mr. Strawn's colleague may also be withdrawn.

James R. Garfield, of Ohio, secretary of Interior under Roosevelt, may be chosen counsel in the place of Strawn.

Confirmation of the two men chosen by the president is opposed by some of the Democratic leaders in the Senate who have taken an active part in the oil reserves inquiry and there is a disposition on the part of Republican Senate leaders to believe that Strawn at least will fail to be confirmed. Whether Pomerene will also be denied Senate approval is more or less uncertain. The committee will probably not act until tomorrow.

### Knew Sinclair to Get Lease.

Leo J. Stack, Denver oil man, testified before the Senate oil committee today that Pioneer Oil Company officials had told him confidentially a week before Teapot Dome reserve was leased that Harry F. Sinclair was to get the lease.

### Says Public Opinion to Rule.

A prediction that public opinion will force President Coolidge to remove every official connected with the oil reserve leases was made today by Senator Robinson, of Arkansas, Democratic leader, in reply to the president's refusal to accept the Senate's advice and immediately ask for the resignation of Secretary Denby.

### Call for Records.

The Senate today adopted resolutions of Senator Dill, Democrat of Washington, calling on the State department for copies of all correspondence in connection with the Senate's ratification of the Colombian treaty.

## Expert Lifted the Lid Off Teapot Dome.

Harry Slatery, conservation expert and former colleague of Gifford Pinchot, now Governor of Pennsylvania, is said to have first lifted the lid from the scandal surrounding the leasing of the naval oil reserves in the Teapot Dome section. Mr. Slatery for ten years has been secretary of the National Conservation Association, and is attending the hearings before the Senatorial investigating committee in Washington.

## 17 Killed in Battle Between Separatists And Inhabitants

BERLIN, Feb. 13.—Fighting between Separatists, and inhabitants of Pirmasens, in the Bavarian palatinate, resulted in the killing of 17 persons and the wounding of 20 according to dispatches received here from Pirmasens this morning.

The casualties occurred during a fight for possession of the government building which was eventually set on fire. Of those killed 14 were separatists.

Accounts of the incident published here are somewhat conflicting but it appears that 40 separatists barricaded themselves in the government building from which they fired and threw bombs against the crowd. In an attempt to eject them the crowds sprayed the building with benzine for the purpose of burning it. When the lower part of the building was afire the separatists ceased shooting and begged for mercy. One report says that all the separatists who left the building were included among the slain but a later report records but 14 of those in the building as being killed.

## General Surplus of Labor, Clerical Work Throughout the State

RALEIGH, Feb. 13.—There is a general surplus of both skilled and unskilled labor and of clerical help all over the state according to the weekly report given out today at the office of M. L. Shipman, director of the Federal and State Employment service. This statement is modified by Director Shipman to the extent of placing farm labor still in demand and in a great shortage.

A number of cities reported that business was expected to increase considerably in the building line as soon as the warmer weather set in. Wilmington business is better and a slight increase in the demand for clerical help.

For the week ending Saturday, February 9 there were a total of 751 registrations of which 608 were men and 143 were women. The total number of placements was 548 of which 117 were skilled workers, 310 unskilled workers, 63 domestic, 53 clerical and professional, and 5 were industrial workers. There were 593 requests for help of which 491 were for men and 102 were for women. The service referred 634 cases of which 507 were men and 127 women.

Wilmington led the list during the past week with a total number of placements of 129 of which 14 were women and 115 were men. Charlotte was second with placements of 108 men and 12 women or a total of 120. Asheville dropped to third place last week placing 90 men and 21 women, a total of 111. Winston-Salem placed 67 men, and 17 women, a total of 84; Raleigh totaled 60 with 35 men and 25 women and took first place in the placement of women. Greensboro placed 39 men and 5 women or a total of 44.

## AVAILABILITY AS CANDIDATE LEFT TO STATE LEADERS

### McAdoo Wants Conference to Decide Great Issue At Once

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—William G. McAdoo announced last night that he would leave to the leaders of his movement in each state the question of whether his employment as counsel by the E. L. Doheny oil company had made him unavailable as a candidate for the democratic presidential nomination.

A request that a conference of such leaders—men and women—be called in Chicago as soon as possible is made by Mr. McAdoo in a letter to David L. Rockwell of Ohio, his campaign manager, in charge of national headquarters at Chicago. The letter was made public here tonight by Mr. McAdoo.

"I want this conference to consider and determine," the former treasury secretary wrote, "whether or not the fact that an honorable professional service rendered by me to a client, but having no relation whatever to the oil leases now under investigation by the senate committee, is prejudicial to my leadership in the cause of progressive democracy."

"If they think I am unavailable," he added, "I shall gladly withdraw and fight as a private in the ranks; if they think I should lead I will do so with all the power that is in me. I will do anything that they think is right and best for the service of the party and the country."

The former secretary also asked that there be invited to the conference "representatives of progressive outside the democratic party, representatives of labor, representatives of the farmer and any other you think advisable in order that we may get as far as possible a true index of public opinion."

## Confederate Veteran Married In Lexington

LEXINGTON, Feb. 13.—Milbia Hill, a Confederate veteran of Denton, near here, and a well known citizen of this county, was married to Miss Vina Harden, also of Denton, in the office of the register of deeds, the other day. Dr. C. A. Owens of the First Baptist church performed the ceremony. The groom was 82 years of age and his bride was 46, it was stated.

## University School Education Proving Aid Public Schools

RALEIGH, Feb. 13.—According to a report given out today, by Dean N. W. Walker of the University School of Education, the public schools of the state have utilized to a larger extent than ever before the services of that institution.

Over 1,800 registration by teachers and others were made in summer school of which Dean Walker is director, and 500 teachers were assisted in securing positions by the Teachers' Bureau, the report says. The High School now has a mailing list of 800 names, mostly public school officials and teachers. In the matter of extension teaching, Professor Walker reports, that the school of education in co-operation with the Extension Division conducted ten correspondence course with a registration during the year of 150. This year, extension classes in many cities of the state have been a feature of the work of the school. Dr. E. R. Mosher, former acting president of the Montana State Normal College, was secured for this work with the rank of Professor of Education.

For the eight extension classes conducted during the fall semester, 202 teachers were registered. The classes were held in the following cities: Reidsville, Sanford, Gastonia, Roanoke Rapids, Lexington, Salisbury, Concord and Shelby.

Other extramural activities of the School of Education, explains the report, include lectures and addresses, co-operation with the State department of Education, surveys of several county and city school systems, supplying reams of educational test material and answering hundreds of letters dealing with public problems.

## Denies He Said McAdoo Doubtful As a Candidate

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Feb. 13.—W. H. Johnston, president of the International Machinists Association, today denied responsibility for the published statement purported to come from him to the effect that Mr. McAdoo's availability as a candidate for presidential nomination was doubtful owing to his connection with the Doheny oil interests.

Mr. Johnston is president of the National Conference of Progressive Political Action that has been in session here.

Mr. Johnston's statement was as follows:

"When discussing the question as to whether or not the conference would endorse any candidate for the presidency and vice-presidency my reply was that it was my opinion that there would be no endorsement of any candidate and that I considered such action premature. I did say that McAdoo had the support of a very considerable portion of labor organizations and with reference to his possible nomination said that no doubt his enemies would use the fact that he had been counsel for Doheny as an excuse in seeking to prevent him from securing the nomination. Personally I have a high regard for Mr. McAdoo and nothing has taken place to lessen my regard in him or question his integrity."

## Sues Railroad For \$30,000 For Husband Killed Near Station

THOMASVILLE, Feb. 13.—Mrs. Hattie Clodfelter, widow of Policeman D. H. Clodfelter has brought suit for \$30,000 against the North Carolina Railroad Company for the death of her husband which occurred near the passenger station here last year. The case is expected to come up for trial at the next term of the Davidson superior court.

## Rev. W. A. Lambeth Called to Washington

DURHAM, Feb. 13.—Rev. W. A. Lambeth, of the Trinity College class of 1901 and now pastor of the Main Street Methodist church of Gastonia, has been called to occupy the pulpit of the Mount Vernon Place Methodist Episcopal church of Washington, D. C. He goes to succeed Dr. Clevis Chappell, another Trinity graduate of the class of 1905. This new pulpit to which Dr. Lambeth has been called is considered to be a very important one.

## TUT-ANKH-AMEN'S TOMB CLOSED ON ACCOUNT EGYPTIAN DISCOURTESY

LUXOR, Egypt, Feb. 13.—Owing to what he characterized as "discourtesy" on the part of the Egyptian Public Works Department, Howard Carter, head of the excavation work closed the tomb of Tut-Ankh-Amen today and abandoned operations.

It is understood that the crisis was precipitated by refusal of the Egyptian government to permit the wives of the excavators to visit the tomb this morning.

The following notice was posted in the hall of the Winter Palace Hotel this afternoon.

LUXOR, Feb. 13.—"Owing to impossible restraint and discourtesy on the part of the Public Works Department and its antiquity sections, and my collaborators in protest have refused any further scientific investigation into the discovery of the tomb of Tut-Ankh-Amen. I am therefore obliged to make known to the public that immediately after the press view of the tomb between 10 a. m. and noon that the tomb will be closed and no further work will be carried out."

## YES, WE WILL SOON HAVE NO COFFEE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—Hudson Maxim, scientist and inventor, believes tea and coffee to be intoxicants within the meaning of the Volstead Act and threatens to bring about suit to close cafes in which these beverages are served unless enforcement authorities do something about it.

He told the Free Thinkers Society at a banquet here last night that he would first ask the Federal authorities to take action against teas and coffees. "Should they fail to do so I will bring action such as I have a right to do against a saloon that authorities had not raided and closed," said Mr. Maxim. "I have consulted many of the most eminent legal authorities in the country and I speak their authority when I tell you that if all manner of alcoholic liquors were served at this dinner that the provisions of the Eighteenth Amendment would not be violated and disrespected more than they have been violated by the serving of this coffee," he declared.

## United States And Honduras Severs Diplomatic Relations

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—Diplomatic relations between the United States and the government of Honduras have been severed by the State Department. The step was taken because of the failure of political factions in Honduras to reach an agreement under which a constitutional government can be restored by peaceable means.

## Declares Lieut.-Gov. Had No Knowledge Of Transactions

WILMINGTON, Feb. 13.—Thomas E. Cooper, who with the former Lieutenant Governor W. B. Cooper, is on trial in United States District court here on charges of conspiracy to defraud in connection with the failure of the Commercial National Bank, today took all the responsibility for the transactions upon which the government based the alleged fraud.

Testifying as the first witness for the defense, he declared that as chairman of the board of directors his brother, W. B. Cooper, had no knowledge of the transactions. He denied the testimony that he and his brother had conspired together in an effort to defraud and asserted that he had never attempted to defraud the bank either by misapplying funds or making false entries with intent to deceive.

The younger Cooper took the stand late yesterday and it is expected that his testimony will consume most of today's session. The lieutenant governor will be the next to take the stand.

Cooper today reiterated his belief that the bank was solvent prior to the time it was closed and that if time had been given it could have been saved. In his bitter reference to the Richmond Federal Reserve bank he charged that the Richmond institution oppressed the Wilmington bank and did everything to break it.

## COOLIDGE SAYS HE WILL PROSECUTE OIL SCANDAL CASES

### Says Being Republican Will Not Affect Handling of Situation

NEW YORK, Feb. 13.—President Coolidge, speaking here last night before the National Republican Club, promised immediate and unshrinking prosecution of the oil and lease cases appealed for national and bi-partisan support for the Mellon tax bill, called for assistance for agriculture from all resources of the country, and defended the sale of arms to Mexico.

The Chief Executive also reiterated his opposition to soldier bonus legislation, declared there was some promise of a European settlement, and asserted the United States stood ready to join with other nations in further limiting armament whenever there appears to be reasonable prospect of agreement.

The address, which was made at the Lincoln Birthday dinner of the Club, was the first Mr. Coolidge has made outside of Washington since he became President. In many respects it was an elaboration of his message to Congress.

The President devoted much attention to taxation and agriculture, but in concluding, turned to the sensation of the present time—the oil land lease investigation.

"Lately there have been most startling revelations concerning the leasing of government oil lands," he said, "at the revelation of greed making its subtle approaches to public officers, of the prostitution of high place to private profit, we are filled with scorn and indignation. We have a deep sense of humiliation at such gross betrayal of trust, and we lament the undermining of public confidence in official integrity. But we cannot rest with righteous wrath; still less can we permit ourselves to give way to cynicism."

"We propose to follow the clear, open path of justice. There will be immediate, adequate, unshrinking prosecution, criminal and civil, to punish the guilty and to protect every national interest. In this effort there will be no politics, no partisanship. It will be speedy. It will be just. I am a Republican, but I cannot on that account shield anyone because he is a Republican, I am a Republican, but I cannot on that account prosecute anyone because he is a Democrat."

"I want no hue and cry, no mingling of innocent and guilty in unthinking condemnation, no confusion of mere questions of law with questions of fraud and corruption. It is at such a time that the qualities of our citizenry is tested—unrelenting toward evil, fair-minded and intent upon the requirements of due process, the shield of the innocent and the safeguard of society itself. I ask the support of our people as chief magistrate intent on the enforcement of our laws without fear or favor, no matter who is hurt or what the consequences."

## DENBY MUST GO

"I have no intention of quitting," Secretary Denby keeps on repeating. But intention or no intention, he must go.

It is not a question of Mr. Denby's personal integrity. He proved himself to be wholly untrustworthy as Secretary of the Navy in connection with the oil lease to Sinclair and Doheny. Whether he knew what he was doing, whether he was misled, whether he was a puppet in Fall's hands, he has been revealed as not a safe custodian of the Government's interests.

Congress has manifested its loss of faith in Mr. Denby as Secretary of the Navy. The policy behind the leasing of the navy oil reserves, the manner in which the oil leases were put through without the knowledge of Congress or the public, his close association with Fall in these transactions, have been unsparingly condemned. And still he defiantly proclaims that he would do the same thing over again.

If President Coolidge were not a marvel of patience he would have shown Denby the door before now. As it is, he has appointed special counsel to examine into the official acts of Mr. Denby and to consider means for the cancellation of the oil leases to Sinclair and Doheny. It is an amazing situation. The President orders an investigation into the official conduct of Mr. Denby and still tolerates his presence as one of his Cabinet advisers. He purposely refrains from saying that he has confidence in Mr. Denby, but he takes measures to demonstrate that the charges against Denby are justified by facts of record, and he still retains him as Secretary of the Navy!

It is true, as has been said in the Senate, that a Cabinet officer cannot be impeached for stupidity. On that score Mr. Denby may escape impeachment. But even so, he will not be cleared of responsibility for the oil leases to Sinclair and Doheny. For he not only does not deny it, he boasts of it.

Because Mr. Denby is responsible for the oil leases to Sinclair and Doheny he must go, however reluctant Mr. Coolidge may appear to part with him. How can the President permit him to continue as Secretary of the Navy when his first desire must be to oppose the Government in the cancellation of the oil leases and to assure to Sinclair and Doheny the retention of the naval oil reserves that he turned over to them?—N. ## THE TARIFF NEXT

From a rather unexpected source comes a suggestion that Congress should investigate the Tariff Commission, which is of Teapot Dome would permit anything else to be heard, would resound throughout the land. The hint about the necessity of a Congressional inquiry at the Commission originates with the Washington correspondent of the Boston Transcript, which nowadays preaches a gospel according to Calvin Coolidge.

The Transcript's correspondent—William E. Brigham, one of the ancients of the Washington corps—puts his request for the inquiry upon the ground that the Commission is unable to function because of a controversy among members are ranged in opposite factions because one of their number insists upon "sitting in a hearing, that relative to the sugar duties," though his wife own shares in a Louisiana sugar company. Mr. Brigham says, "it can do no harm to Congress to look into conditions within the Commission and decide whether or not some resignations should be requested."

President Coolidge has not moved to remove Commissioner Glassie from the Commission or to urge him to disqualify himself during the determination of the effect of the tariff on sugar. Mr. Glassie not only doesn't withdraw from the Commission or the investigation, but hotly contends for his right to remain on the job until the case is heard and decided. Mr. Glassie is a Republican.

An attack on the Commission may be expected at any moment. It is only the Senate's preoccupation with the naval oil scandals that prevents a probe of the Tariff Commission. While there is no charge of wrongdoing against any Commissioner, there is a serious question of the propriety of permitting certain of them to participate in findings affecting industries in which they now have or have had a financial interest.

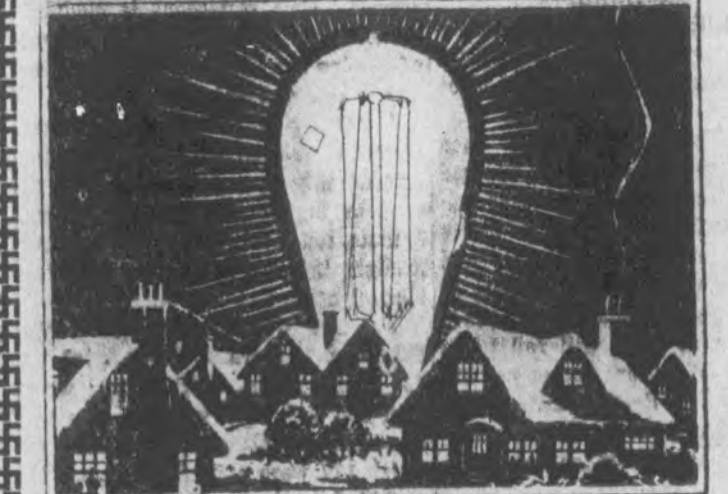

## GERMANY IS BUYING PRIVATE MEMORIES OF WILLIAM'S COURT

BERLIN, Feb.—Count Robert Zedlitz, whose memoirs lay bare the inner history of the Hohenzollern court for the 12 years served William II as court marshal, will probably go into history as one of the world's greatest diarists, and the royalists must read the book to find out how they and their friends

ized the Count, and the denunciation heaped upon him by the officers' unions and other societies connected with the old court has inspired democratic Germany to read his book and send its circulation up to a point which may well make William II and the former crown prince extremely cautious. Their memoirs were forgotten a few weeks after they had left the press. But Count Zedlitz has been far more frank, and has given a picture of the childish antics, selfishness and egotism of the imperial family, especially of the ex-kaiser, which is regarded here as probably true. At least the democratic masses of central Europe believe it is true, and the royalists must read the book to find out how they and their friends

and relatives have fared at the hands of the unusual diarist.

Count Zedlitz shows the ex-kaiser to have been about as stupid as the late emperor of Russia, whose published diary caused all the world to gasp and wonder whether he and the late empress ever thought of the welfare of Russia and the Russian people. William's own memoirs, which his publishers insist he wrote himself, brew little light on the domestic life of the court. Count Zedlitz has filled in the gaps and supplemented the ex-kaiser's work in a way that has delighted the exiler emperor's enemies.

But in a measure one may forgive the former emperor some of his rudeness and eccentricity after reading 'ount Zedlitz' pictures of the dull life of the Potsdam imperial family and the awful monotony with which the Hohenzollerns attempted from day to day to stage their pomp and grandeur. The late empress was a faithful mother and doubtless had many womanly virtues, but one cannot possibly glean from Count Zedlitz' book that she was companionable or entertaining in the slightest degree. Pictures he gives of evenings in the great palace at Potsdam show them to have been so dull that apologetics for William II will find much material to use in his defence.

The late empress permitted her husband to smoke a cigar or cigarette after dinner, but she seldom allowed any guest to smoke in her presence. She and the women dinner guests accompanied the men into the billiard room after dinner, and sat here until retiring time. The former emperor frequently read telegrams and messages aloud to the company. Jeantime his wife did needlework. Sometimes members of the party selected magazines or books and read in silence.

Count Zedlitz says frankly that the evenings were tedious and trying, and everyone watched the empress to announce it was bedtime. She usually did this about half past ten to the great relief of the guests. On one occasion when the former emperor had read to himself the whole evening, and the silence had been appalling, he suddenly exclaimed: "Are you going to stay here all night?"

The empress replied: "No, William, but I did not want to disturb you; you have been so busy reading." William retorted: "What else could I do when it is so unbelievably dull here?"

### Hawaiian Farmers Prosperous

HONOLULU.—Hawaiian farmers, unlike their fellow workers on the mainland, apparently are in a highly prosperous condition, according to Walter Coombs, executive secretary of the territorial farm loan board.

He bases his statement on the fact that he has been unable for six months to obtain borrowers for \$32,000 available for loans to farmers at a small rate of interest.

### Irish Population Shows Gain.

DUBLIN.—An official return puts the estimated population of the Free State at the middle of 1923 at 3,165,000. These figures are approximate, but they show an increase in the population in ten years of more than 30,000.

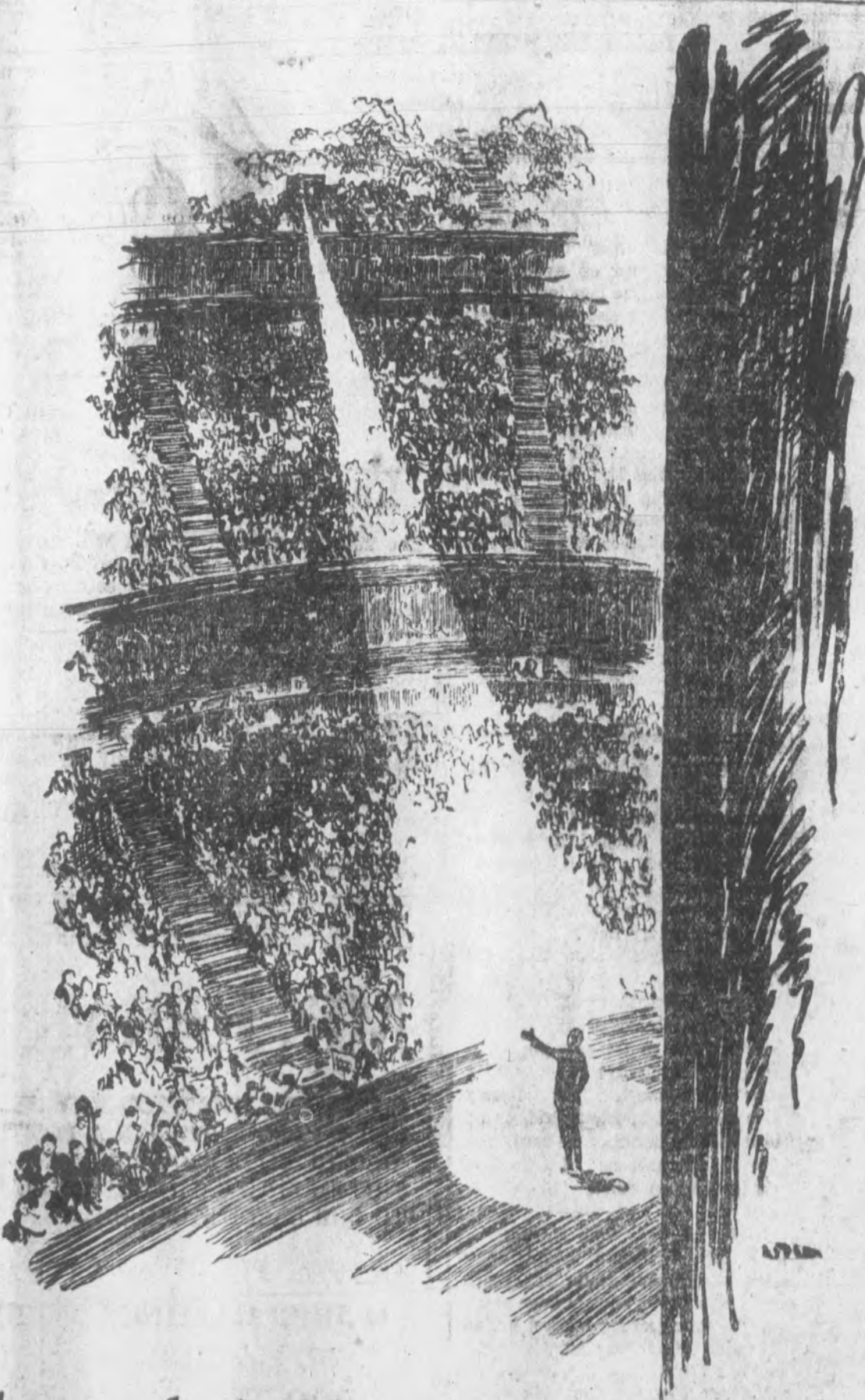

### SUNFLOWERS SEED STOCK ON COLD CLIMATE FARMS

DURHAM, New Hampshire, Feb.—If the climate is too cold for corn, try sunflowers. The agricultural experts at the University of New Hampshire have received reports from county agent D. A. O'Brien of Coos county, the northernmost New Hampshire county, indicating that the substitution works well there from the standpoint of both the farmer and the cow.

The growing season in this county is too short for the successful production of ensilage corn. Since 1920 a number of farmers have been experimenting with sunflowers, and Mr. O'Brien believes that the crop has

proved worth while. The stalks grow rapidly and show good resistance to frost. When cut up for storage in the silos they are turned into a feed of high quality for dairy herds.

The hairy or winter vetch also is coming into popular use in Coos county as a nutritious hay. The plant grows wild in that section and also has been cultivated. As it is a legume it is valuable both for feed and soil improvement.

## TOURISTS NEVER TIRE STUDENT EXPLORES SEEING CHINESE RUN MYSTERIOUS GULCH PHONE EXCHANGE FRENCH MOUNTAIN

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb.—San Francisco's "Tower of Babel" is a telephone exchange set in the midst of its world famous Chinatown. This exchange is the only one in America devoted exclusively to Chinese patrons.

The exchange has 1,663 lines to serve the 10,000 Chinese inhabitants of the district. The operators are Chinese girls, 13 in number. All must speak, read and write English, but more important, they are familiar with several native Chinese dialects, for China as a nation is a great unwieldy empire that is a babel of tongues.

The 13 girls handle an average of 11,000 calls daily, nearly all inter-Chinatown service. The girls must remember names, numbers and addresses, because the bulk of the calls are made by name and not by number. All the girls are graduates of San Francisco schools. Lou Kuni Shoo, the manager, was graduated from the University of California.

Another peculiarity of the service is that there are absolutely no party lines in Chinatown. Though recognized as scrupulously honest, the Chinese is very secretive by nature and demands an individual line.

The telephone exchange building is one of the finest specimens of Chinese architecture to be found anywhere, even in China itself, with its pagoda-like tower and prow-like balconies. But the architecture is dictated by precedent. The several roofs were not added for ostentation, but because the Chinese consider that the dignity and social position of the inmates of a house are in direct proportion to the number of roofs sheltering them.

The retronous balconies are designed to shoot rain from the building and shelter it from direct rays of the sun. Supporting columns have no capitals or bases and are as round and red as giant firecrackers. Even concrete foundations correspond to the stone foundations upon which Chinese construct buildings as protection from dampness.

The Chinese telephone exchange is one of the district's great attractions for tourists. Several thousand visitors enter it every month of the year.

PARIS, Feb.—Some interesting and thrilling stories are told in connection with the feats of some of the successful candidates for the Grand Prix of the Academy des Sports, but they are overshadowed by the publicity given the feat of the winner. The prize for 1923 recently awarded to Alatu Gerbault, a noted tennis player, went to him only after a spirited debate of the jury, some of whose members favored Norbert Casteret, a student at the University of Toulouse.

The prize is awarded annually to the man or men accomplishing a sporting exploit in France by French or foreigner, or abroad by a Frenchman alone, likely to result in a material, scientific or moral progress for humanity. Gerbault won the prize by making a trip across the Atlantic in a 30-foot sloop.

In the region of St. Martory, Department of the Haute Garonne, a brook enters the north side of a mountain 1,500 feet in altitude, runs through a gulch regarded as impenetrable, and emerges on the southern slope of the mountain. On August 23, 1923, Casteret, a strong swimmer and expert diver, decided to explore the brook. Before taking the leap into the unknown, Casteret made his will. Then armed only with candles, adequately protected from the water, to dispel the darkness of the subterranean cavern, the young student dived in.

The distance between the spot where the water disappears into the mountain to its outlet on the other side measures three-quarters of a mile. For three hours friends awaited in anxiety at the mouth of the grotto.

Suddenly, dripping with muddy water, dishevelled and haggard, but with the grim smile of victory on his features, the student was shot out of the mountain into the arms of his exuberant friends.

### Condor Seen In California

Visalia, Cal., Feb. — For the first time in many years a condor, the giant bird that lives in the Andes mountains of South America but is almost extinct in North America, has been seen in San Joaquin valley of the Sierra Nevada mountains of California. The bird which has a wing spread of at least ten feet, arrived recently from "the great somewhere" to visit the Sequoia National Park. attracted, it is thought, by the carcass of a dead burro on which it was found feasting.

Condors are protected by law against hunters, and this one has the further protection of the national park. It has been the guest of the park for some days, though few persons have had a glimpse of it. Park officials hope it will remain there.

## SERBS WARN SOKOLSKI NOT HOODWINK THEM

BELGRADE.—Cyril Sokolski, according to his Bulgarian passport, spruce, young and fur-coated, passed through Belgrade in December on the Simplon express, bound for Sofia. The local police looked him over, as they do all travellers, and let him go on. Now they learn he is a "Cuburger," a son of former King Ferdinand of Bulgaria, heir to the throne so long as his brother, King Boris, remains unmarried, and that under no circumstances should he have been allowed to travel through Serbia.

So Cyril is now where he would be on Bulgarian soil, and it is not believed that he has any intention of going back to Coburg, where dwells his father. "If he does," say the Serbian police menacingly, "he had better not try to pass through Belgrade."

## GERMAN CHRISTIANS SEEK SPIRITUAL REGENERATION

BLANKENBURG, Thuringia, Feb. Three thousand evangelical Christians, Baptists, Methodists, Lutherans and members of various other denominations, attended the annual Bible Conference held recently in Blankenburg.

The delegates to this conference are moved by the desire to get at the basic truths of Christianity and apply them to the present upset condition of the world. There was no talk of the Versailles treaty or the responsibility of governments.

The conference went on record as being of the opinion that Germany can expect no relief from mankind in its present distress, but must turn to God if it desires to be freed from trouble. Sincere penitence and return to God were pointed out as the sure remedies for the unhappy state into which the German people have fallen. One speaker said God might lead Germany to a spiritual awakening through hard trials, and thus permit the country to render service to the entire world.

The resolutions adopted set forth much the same views that have been voiced by Count Keyserling, the philosophical leader, who is constantly telling the German public that spiritual regeneration would do far more to cure Europe's present ills than all sorts of proposed economic and financial remedies.

RANGOON, India.—Miss Megan Lloyd George, daughter of the former British premier who accompanied her father on his recent tour of the United States, is now in India as the guest of the viceroy and Lady Reading.

The viceroy and his wife have been accorded a warm welcome in Rangoon and Burma. Among other things they visited the Royal Lakes, illuminated for the occasion by 150,000 lamps, and have been entertained by horse and boat races, fireworks displays and garden parties. Miss Lloyd George was of the party.

## New Ocean Liner Launched

BELFAST.—The liner Minnetonka of the Atlantic Transport Company to be placed in service between London and New York, was launched recently. She is 625 feet in length and will have accommodations for 322 first class passengers.

## Morrison Paroles Pryor, Serving 18 Months On Roads

RALEIGH, Feb. 13. — Governor Cameron Morrison has paroled Homer Pryor, who was convicted in the superior court of Henderson county of violating the Prohibition laws, at the October term, and sentenced to serve 18 months on the county chain-gang.

Governor Morrison stated that he paroled the prisoner because reputable physicians had testified that his health was such that he was able to do the work required of him, being an active tuberculosis victim, that the paroled was recommended by the solicitor who prosecuted him and the judge who tried him.

The Governor made the customary reserves of rights to revoke the parole should the paroled fail to abide by the laws and behave as a good citizen.

## GERMANS UNEARTH VALUABLE SEQUESTERED DURING WAR

COLOGNE. — Many valuable objects of art and historical interest which were hidden in cities along the Rhine in the latter days of the world war when word was passed that the "Yanks and Tommies are coming," have begun to reappear. One of these is a portrait of Louise, Queen of Prussia, by Gustav Richter which again hangs in the Wallraf-Richartz museum here.

Queen Louise fled to Memel in 1808 after she had been accused by Napoleon with blocking the Franco-Prussian peace plans. So many inquiries had been made by visitors as to what had become of the portrait that the curator finally decided to rehang it.

## KOREANS SHOW INTEREST IN MUNICIPAL AFFAIRS

SEOUL, Korea, Feb.—For the first time since municipal governments were established in Korea, the Koreans have taken an interest in the elections to the municipal councils.

Previous to 1922 the Korean members of the councils were appointed and in every case those known to be pro-Japanese were selected. In the first election the Koreans refused to take part, with the result that the whole proceedings were a fizzle. This year, however, they nominated their own candidates and in Seoul succeeded in electing 15 of the 30 councilmen, the other 15 being Japanese.

In three other towns they did equally well and in two cases, Songdo and Hamhung, secured a majority in the council, but in places such as Fusan, Kimsan, and Chemudpo, where Japanese predominate, they were in the minority.
