

# DENBY RESIGNS TODAY

## Notifies President He Is Ready to Step Out; Roosevelt Not to Quit

Washington, Feb. 18.—Edwin B. Denby has resigned as Secretary of the Navy and his resignation has been accepted. He will retire from office on March 10.

After repeated declarations that he would never quit the cabinet under the fire of those who have criticized his part in the oil leasing program, the secretary notified President Coolidge this morning that he was ready to step out.

His decision followed a telephone consultation between the President and Mr. Denby in which all the latest aspects of the situation were talked over in the light of information that had been passed on to the White House by Republican leaders in the Senate.

Mr. Denby informed the president that owing to his views in connection with the oil leases that he did not desire to further embarrass the administration by remaining a member of it. President Coolidge in a letter accepting the resignation, praised the official record of his retiring Navy Secretary and acceded his request with regret.

Recently a number of the secretary's friends have also been consulted by President Coolidge and are understood to have advised the president that they fully understood the embarrassment that might result in retaining Mr. Denby in the cabinet with the oil annulment suits in progress.

He was not only a party to the oil leases, by having affixed his signature along with that of Albert B. Fall's, but has repeatedly defended his part in the procedure and declared publicly since the present controversy arose that he believed the contracts legal and that he would be willing to pursue the same course of action.

It had been pointed out to the president that it might appear inconsistent to have a member of the administration holding these views and remain in office while the administration itself through its special counsel was moving in court to annul the leases on the ground that they were made without authority of law.

The first step in these legal proceedings to institute injunctions and prevent further work on the Teapot Dome and California reserves is expected as soon as the Senate approves the appointments of the special counsel which will probably be today.

### Others May Resign

For the same reasons there have been reports that Theodore Roosevelt may also retire as assistant secretary under Denby. Roosevelt also had a part in framing the oil leases. The retirement of the navy secretary has also revived the rumors that the resignation of Attorney-General Daugherty will follow in a few days.

A resolution relating to Daugherty, somewhat similar to that adopted by the Senate sometime ago asking for the resignation of Denby, is pending in the Senate and its sponsors are pressing for quick action on it.

The resolution in which the president was advised to ask Secretary Denby to leave the Cabinet was adopted in the Senate on February 11 with the Republican organization leaders opposing it but with ten Republican voting in its support. The vote on the resolution was 47-34.

Immediately after it was sent to the White House President Coolidge issued a statement declaring that such questions lay wholly within the province of the chief executive adding that "the president is responsible to the people for his conduct relative to the retention or dismissal of public officials. I assume that responsibility and the people may rest assured that as soon as I can be advised so that I can act in justice to all parties connected I shall act. I do not propose to sacrifice any innocent man for my own welfare or do I propose to retain in office any unfit man for my own welfare. I shall try to maintain the functions of the government and act upon the evidence and the law as I find it and deal firmly with every kind of wrong doing."

Secretary Denby's retirement makes the first break in the Harding official family which Coolidge took over intact from the Harding administration.

Denby was a member of the original Harding cabinet having taken office March 4, 1921.

### Roosevelt Will Not Resign

Assisted Secretary of Navy Roosevelt, after a conference with Secretary Denby, went to the White House today to confer with President Coolidge.

Mr. Roosevelt after a conference of half hour with President Coolidge announced that he would not resign as a result of the retirement of the Secretary of Navy Denby.

"I have just been to see the president and I am not resigning" he declared.

## REV. J. E. W. COOK DELIVERS SPLENDID SERMON ON "FEAR"

### Differentiates Between the Noble and Ignoble Uses of the Word

(By The Rev. James E. W. Cook, St. Paul's Church.)

Taking as his text, 2nd Timothy 1st chapter, verse seven: "For God hath not given us the spirit of fear; but of power, and of love and of a sound mind." Rev. James E. W. Cook, of St. Paul's Episcopal Church delivered a remarkable sermon last evening.

Differentiating between the noble and the ignoble uses of the word "fear" as found in the scriptures, he said that the Apostle was writing here of the "fear" which is the damnablest demon this side of Hades, and possibly on the other side too. "Fear," properly so called, has always stood in the way of human progress. It has always parted man from his Maker, and man from his brother man. This "Fear" was not given us by God. Whence, then, did it come?

The preacher traced the origin of "Fear" to our weakness, ignorance and sinfulness.

Physical fear leads us back to the jungle. The mighty elephant still trembles at the sight of a tiny mouse, because years ago, the little rodent would crawl into the trunk of the sleeping giant, causing exquisite annoyance. Fear of their forest foes developed swiftness in the antelope, cunning in the fox, agility in the ape, bristles for the hedge-hog, the ability to change color for the chameleon and lizard, and all those protective coverings for the scaly monsters of the slime and bog.

Mental fear he traced back to the child-age of the world, and showed how, through the long ages of cannibalism, slavery and serfdom man has had to struggle against debilitating, enervating fears which are only false shadows and illusions which are only false lights. Spiritual fear was compared to a gigantic Upas tree spreading gloom, poison and death over all existence since we learned to know right from wrong. Very young children do not suffer from it. Its roots lie back in memory and conscience. It is associated with our sense of shortcoming and sin. The earliest reference to this fear in the Bible is found in the confession of Adam to God: "I heard Thy Voice in the Garden and I was afraid, because I was naked, and I did myself." Thus, as Shakespeare's Hamlet says: "Thus conscience doth make cowards of us all."

After this we find man cowering before God. The result of this fear is a network of sacrifices and observances in which the chief motive is to please, placate, and alter His attitude towards us.

Looking back we do not wonder that men crept to the feet of God with crushed and cringing spirits, and lost sight of the Father whom all should love. Jesus never laid the burden of fear on the people. It is incredible how out of the teachings of Jesus men could ever have built up a doctrine of fear. It is the lowest appeal that can be made to the hearts of men. When you have converted a soul through fear, you have gained a coward, not a man; and a coward is of little use in the Kingdom of God.

Mr. Cook evolved the meaning of the God-given spirit as power; and of Love, because power without love becomes tyranny; and of a "sound mind" or judgment, to show us when to be strong and when to be gentle. He applied his subject to international relations and asserted that fear is the greatest provocative of war; and to our industrial conditions Workmen fear the master's power to throw them out of employment. Capitalists fear the workers may rise and destroy their possessions. There is just as much danger in one class fearing another as in despising another; indeed the two sentiments are closely associated. If the "spirit of love" was shed abroad strikes and lockouts would cease.

## WOMAN'S CLUB MAKING SUCCESS OF PUBLIC LIBRARY

### City Library Boasts of 1017 Patrons; Open Six Days in Week

The Woman's Club has accomplished a great deal since becoming sponsors for the Greenville Public Library.

The library is free to the public, and the sponsors hope that everyone will feel free to use it.

There are one thousand seventeen patrons, as shown from the last report of the librarian.

The Woman's Club pledged themselves to pay the librarian's salary this year, so as to have the money from all other sources for books and general up-keep.

On December first it was found advisable to open the library six days in the week, rather than three, as had been the custom for years. This forward step met with remarkable success, and in two months' time the circulation of books has been more than doubled.

If you should go up to the library some afternoon, and stay from three to five-thirty and see the librarian giving out books to seventy people, you would feel that all the organizations, that are contributing to the support of the library, so that it may be free to all people, are getting big returns for the money invested.

The library committee works hard to keep new books coming in all the time, but the amount it has to spend is limited, and the cost of books have advanced as has everything else.

If anyone feels that the library means anything to the town, any member of his family, or to himself personally, and would care to take part in its growth and development he or she might express this feeling by a contribution to be used for more books. This contribution should be made to Mrs. E. B. Ficklen, treasurer of Greenville Public Library.

The library is serving in another field this winter, having established a story-telling hour for children on Saturday from four to five. This will continue until the middle of March. The stories are being told by a group of college girls, under the supervision of Miss Agnes White-side. The number of children hearing these stories range from seventy to two hundred.

## Harding Selected League Commissioner

Geneva, Feb. 18.—W. P. G. Harding, former governor of the United States Federal Reserve Board, has been unofficially selected as high commissioner of the league of nations to Hungary to control finances under the league's loan plan. Mr. Harding has informed the league that he will accept if officially designated. It is said in league circles that the selection of Mr. Harding has been approved by all the interested parties.

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## WILL NOT BE REALIZED

All of official Republicanism in Washington except that the the White House is strongly persuaded that the legislative program thus far evolved by the Administration cannot be realized as proposed. It is expected that the White House will acquire a like conviction before many days have passed.

There will be tax reduction, but not according to the Mellon pattern. There doubtless will be additional relief for agriculture, but it will be of a more liberal and substantial character than the President recommended in his first message. There is not likely to be adhesion to the World Court, because it is clear that the President's suggestion for American concurrence was merely a gesture and is understood by the Republican "irreconcilables" to have been nothing else.

Tax Reduction will come on Democratic lines, no matter what name the Republicans may undertake to give it. The Mellon plan is dead and will shortly be buried. The open opposition of Chairman Green of the House Ways and Means Committee and Republican floor leader Longworth to the chief feature of the Mellon plan is strong confirmation of this statement. Republicans who favor the Mellon plan are too few to force its adoption even in substance. Western Republicans never risked their safety by giving it even a promise of support. The Democrats have remain-

ed a practical unit for the Garner plan, which they will enact in all its essentials with the assistance of Republican votes. And there is at least a moral certainty that President Coolidge will accept and sign it.

Unlike the President, the Democrats in Congress have all along seen the necessity for further help to agriculture. He seemed to regard his suggestion for "diversification of crops" as a sufficient contribution from the Administration toward the relief of the 2,000,000 bankrupts and the other millions of insolvent and suffering people on the farms. He has supplemented his previous recommendations to Congress by proposing an extension of the War Finance Corporation's existence and functions and by other financial accommodations for farmers, particularly wheat growers, but these are evidently afterthoughts.

DO not condemn folks in your trade territory for patronizing mail order houses if you do not advertise in the home paper that covers your trade territory.

Secretary Denby has advised President Coolidge that he is ready to step out. If all rumors are true, the stepping out has just begun and there will be many vacant chairs in officialdom before the oil scandal is settled.

Someone is responsible for the absence of lights at night at the two bridges on the Greenville-Bethel highway that are still under construction. These two bridges when unlighted furnish a great danger to travelers and failure to display proper warning signals there is criminal negligence.

The officers of the city will do well to give more attention to the bright light auto drivers. Our city streets are well lighted and there is no necessity for auto drivers to display glaring headlights.

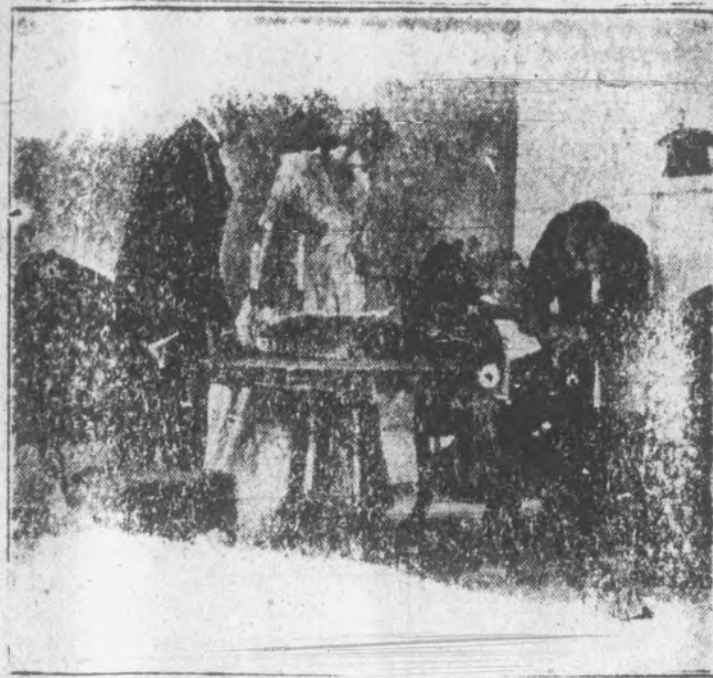
