SITUATION IN OIL INQUIRY REMAINS UNCHANGED TODAY

Harry F. Sinclair Back From Europe; Expected to Testify

Washington, Feb. 21.—Official and unofficial Washington, keyed to anticipate the unexpected in the inquiry and the numerous ramifications, found no new sensations in prospect today but kept constant watch on the White House and Senate where the fight to force Attorney-General Daugherty out of office is being waged.

After hearing Harry P. Whitney, of New York, for a short time yesterday the committee adjourned with no indication that it will meet again until it resumes its hearings on next Monday. Its work is being carried forward today by accountants assigned to examine the books of Whitney and a number of stock brokers in an effort to determine the extent and character of dealings in oil shares by public officials just before and for the period immediately after the leasing of the naval reserves.

The committee, informed unofficially today that Harry F. Sinclair had arrived from Europe, gave no indication whether or not a subpoena would be issued for his appearance although it is assumed that he would take the first opportunity to testify.

Little likelihood of court proceedings in the oil cases for some days was indicated by Atlee Pomerene and Owen J. Roberts, the government's special counsel, who are proceeding as rapidly as possible with the mass of preliminary work found necessary.

English Dock Strike Be Settled Shortly

London, Feb. 21.—England awoke this morning to find the apparently hopeless deadlock in the dock strike broken. Representatives of the dock workers and employers meeting at the Ministry of Labor arrived at terms of agreement in the early hours of the morning. The terms of the agreement will be submitted to conference of dock workers delegates from all sections of the country at the Ministry tonight and should they meet with approval work will be resumed immediately relieving the congestion that has prevailed at the ports for the last few days. Indications are that the terms will be approved.

W. A. Fair Leases Gastonia Times

Gastonia, Feb. 21.—W. A. Fair, of Lenoir, has leased the Gastonia Times from F. A. Slate and his associates, it was announced here today. He will operate the paper as independent in politics. Fair and Milton Tiddy own the Shelby Highlander.

Owners of Star to Sue F. A. Vanderlip

New York, Feb. 21.—Roy D. Moore and Louis H. Brush, joint owners of the Marion (Ohio) Star, yesterday filed suit in Federal Court against Frank A. Vanderlip, retired banker, for \$600,000 damages, alleging slander and libel as the result of the banker's purported utterances in an address at Ossining on February 12. Three separate causes of action asking \$200,000 damages each were cited in the papers served on Mr. Vanderlip. The action was taken, according to the papers, on account of Mr. Vanderlip's alleged statements in which he "implicated the sale of the Marion Star in the oil scandal."

Committee Recommend Unseating of Bloom

Washington, Feb. 21.—Unseating of Sol Bloom, Democrat, as a member of the House from the 19th district of New York was recommended today by the elections committee that has been investigating the charges of fraud in connection with his election.

Denver Church Holds Combination Prize Fight-Prayer Meet

Denver, Col., Feb. 21.—Seven boxing contests that formed a feature of a combination smoker-prayer meeting in the Merritt Memorial Methodist church last night was declared to be the first time in local ecclesiastical history that a church has put on a boxing match immediately after devotional exercises.

Rev. B. B. Kassler conducted the religious services and then upon announcement he and his congregation adjourned to the basement of the church where a regulation ring had been set up. There were seven bouts all to a referee's decision.

Theatre Attendant Dies From Laughing

Reading, Pa., Feb. 21.—A hearty laugh resulted in the death of Emmett Crowell, 64, in a theatre here last night. With a friend Crowell was enjoying a comedy and laughed uproariously. Suddenly he slumped in his seat and was carried to a hospital where physicians pronounced him dead.

Miss Everett Is Appointed Sponsor For Legion Meeting

Raleigh, Feb. 21.—Miss Mary Louise Everett, daughter of W. N. Everett, secretary of state of North Carolina, has been appointed by Governor Cameron Morrison, as sponsor to represent the State of North Carolina at the meeting of the American Legion in Winston-Salem February 22, when John R. Quinn, national commander of the American Legion will be the principal speaker.

La. Representative Dies In Washington

Washington, Feb. 21.—Representative Henry Garland Dupre, of Louisiana, died early today at his home here. A stroke of apoplexy suffered about 10 days ago was the cause of death. Dupre rallied shortly after the stroke but his improvement was of only short duration.

He was serving his sixth term in the House the New Orleans district. He was a Democrat and was born in Louisiana July 28, 1873. He practiced law in New Orleans and served as assistant city attorney. He had served as a member and speaker of the Louisiana House of Representatives and was chairman of the state Democratic convention in 1908. In his services in the House Dupre devoted a large part of his efforts to rivers and harbors legislation.

Morrison to Speak Morehead City Tonight

Morehead City, Feb. 21.—Governor Cameron Morrison will deliver the principal address at a meeting here tonight of citizens of Morehead City and surrounding cities and towns in the interest of the development terminal and port facilities in Eastern North Carolina. The meeting is being held under the auspices of the Morehead City of Chamber of Commerce and delegates are expected to attend from Kinston, Goldsboro, New Bern, and other cities in the vicinity of Morehead City.

LEPERS APPEAL FOR GUITARS TO LESSEN ISLAND MONOTONY

Manila.—Musical instruments are among the things asked for as presents by many of the lepers in the colony of 5,000 on Culion Island. The monotony of life in the colony and the depressing effect of the surroundings tend to decrease the value of the medical treatment, the lepers say, and for this reason they want music to help infuse an optimistic spirit into their lives.

In the shipment last Christmas of nearly 100 huge boxes filled with presents collected by clubs, schools and societies of Manila, there were included several banjos and guitars.

PROFITS ON STOCKS TAKE INCOME TAX RATE

Washington, Feb. 21.—Provisions of the revenue bill relating to profits on corporation stocks were further tightened today in the House with adoption of an amendment subjecting the earnings from stocks received by the corporations in liquidation proceedings to the regular income rates rather than to the 12 1/2 per cent capital gain tax. An amendment to make farmers and mutual insurance companies immune was also adopted.

SLIGHT IMPROVEMENT IN SENATOR GREENE'S CONDITION TODAY

Washington, Feb. 21.—Slight improvement was shown in the condition of Senator Frank L. Greene, of Vermont, at noon today it was said by his nurse at the hospital. The report said that he had taken some little nourishment.

Central Carolina Cities Emerging From Grip of Storm

Charlotte, Feb. 21.—Central North Carolina and southern Virginia today are slowly emerging from isolation caused Tuesday night by the heaviest sleet storm in several years which resulted in the death of at least one person and numerous more or less serious injuries.

Telephone, telegraph and power companies had today repaired their wires to some extent but communication is still slow uncertain. O. G. Crinshaw, Reidsville electrician was killed yesterday by contact with a high voltage power line.

Winston-Salem, on yesterday completely isolated with not a single telephone or telegraph wire in operation, was reconnected shortly before midnight last night.

High Point and Danville were connected with the outside world by means of uncertain telegraph wires but the facilities were still badly crippled. Other points in the storm area are still cut off.

Twin City Recovering.

Winston-Salem, Feb. 21.—Winston Salem is today recovering from the worst sleet storm in its history but it will be days before the Southern Public Utilities Company and the Bell Telephone Company will be able to restore full service.

It is estimated that fully one third of the telephones of the city are out of order while all the street lights were dark last night as were residences in the southern section of the city. Wires are still down on many of the principal streets. Broken trees are on every hand. The city was entirely without wire communication from last Tuesday night until about 6 o'clock yesterday evening.

Parker Appointed Solicitor to Succeed Garland Midyette

Raleigh, Feb. 21.—Governor Cameron Morrison today appointed R. Hunter Parker, of Enfield, to be solicitor of the third judicial district.

Mr. Parker, if he accepts the appointment, will succeed Garland E. Midyette, who Governor Morrison yesterday appointed judge of the district to succeed Judge Thomas M. Pittman who recently resigned.

Miss Mercereau May Referee Wrestling Bout at Danville

Greensboro, Feb. 21.—Virginia Mercereau, the woman wrestler who is now in this city, is now considering an offer to referee a wrestling bout in Danville Virginia, it has been announced. The offer was made to Miss Mercereau by L. L. Moody, athletic promoter of Danville, through her manager.

Miss Mercereau has achieved a reputation within the past 20 months as a wrestler, having grappled with Joe Shinkus, and John Kilonis. She has expressed her willingness to meet anyone within her weight which 160 pounds. She is said to be very powerful. No mention however, was made of Miss Mercereau's appearance in Danville as a wrestler. So far the arrangements have only been contemplated as being to referee the bout.

Sentence of Shivers Commutd by Gov.

Raleigh, Feb. 21.—Governor Cameron Morrison has commuted the sentence of Clarence E. Shivers, of Forsyth county who was convicted in the October term of the Superior court on a charge of larceny of an automobile and sentenced by Judge Walter Berch to serve three years in the state prison.

Judge Brock and Rev. George L. Lee, of Winston-Salem, have recommended the commutation, the statement said. The sentence was commuted to an indeterminate one of from 20 months to three years, allowing him credit for time gained by good behavior.

The oil scandal is still attracting international attention, with the calling to the witness stand of E. B. McLean, multi-millionaire Washington and Cincinnati publisher; Harry Payne Whitney, millionaire New York sportsman and oil magnate, close personal friend of Harry F. Sinclair; E. E. Smathers, New York capitalist, who was one of the back-

ers of the Presidential aspirations of General Leonard Wood, and J. Philip Denard, New York broker. At the same time United States Senator Irvine L. Lenroot, of Wisconsin, of the investigating committee, launched a plea for secret session, in order to digest the testimony before letting it get to the public.

Senate May Force Daugherty to Resign

Washington, Feb. 21.—A report before the country in a public inquiry information and charges that have reached the ears of the Senators and make ever clearer the belief of Republican leaders in the Senate that the attorney general should no longer be permitted to sit in the cabinet.

It was revealed today that much of the material collected by those opposed to Mr. Daugherty had been withheld in the hope that the President would voluntarily clear the administration of those who have recently been attacked in Congress. Now it expects to make public this information with the view of forcing Daugherty out of office.

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Mellon Denies Charges of Quinn

Washington, Feb. 21.—Secretary Mellon, replying to charges made in an address here last night by John R. Quinn, National Commander of the American Legion, said that he knew nothing of any activities of a corporation known as the "Mellon Interests" engaged in a campaign against the soldiers' bonus. He added that he had not contributed a penny to such activities.

Quinn declared in his speech, that he supposed that Mellon had technically severed his connections with all private enterprises but asserted that the business associates of secretary had coerced the employee to oppose the bonus and that it was through these channels that the Mellon fortunes were used in part to promote paid propaganda against adjusted compensation legislation.

BRITISH SOLDIER STILL WANTS ACTION IN HIS LITERATURE

London.—The old-time British soldier who scorned reading is fast disappearing, and there is a growing demand for good books and magazines in army libraries.

Recently the war office ordered the classics made available for enlisted men. Blood and thunder literature, however, still holds first place with Tommy Atkins. Among recognized works those of Dickens held first place 50 years ago; then Kipling became the vogue, with Shaw and Wells receiving some attention. Poetry does not seem to be popular with the soldier, although the song has had its place in army literature.

Low Temperatures Tonight.

Washington, Feb. 21.—Temperatures will be lower in Virginia and the Carolinas tonight with frost probable as far south as the interior of southern Florida, the Weather Bureau predicted today.

Confesses Killing Parents and Sisters

St. Petersburg, Fla., Feb. 21.—The burning to death of his two sisters last year to atone for "blasphemy against the Holy Ghost" when he was twelve years old, and the murder of his father and mother Tuesday night as a sacrificial penance for killing his sisters, Frank McDowell, 19 years old, and his weird tale of "hazy spells" during which he believed his family aligned with an "anti-Christ," stood forth today as belated details of one of the most brutal murders in the history of southern crime.

McDowell, who is held in the county jail at Clearwater, awaiting trial on the charge of the murder of his parents who he shot through the head while they slept Tuesday night, talked readily. He confessed the shooting of his father and mother and further revealed that he had started the fire which had burned to death his two sisters locked in their room of the McDowell home in Decatur, Ga., on February 19, 1923. After his sisters had perished in the flames, McDowell said, his mind again became clear and he realized the seriousness of his crime. On last Tuesday, February 19, the anniversary of his sin he felt that he must kill his parents as a sacrifice for the murder of his sisters he said.

FREIGHT RATES DISCUSSED IN GOLDSBORO MEET

Many Prominent Men Address Session on Important Topic.

For the purpose of discussing the freight rate situation, a problem with which business interests will ever and anon have to deal, several Chambers of Commerce of eastern North Carolina were represented in Goldsboro yesterday, according to a statement by Secretary Smith of the local Chamber of Commerce who attended the gathering.

Mr. M. R. Beaman, secretary of the Wilson Chamber of Commerce, stated the object of the get-together and showed what the proposed increases of the carriers, if let alone, would mean to the business interests of eastern North Carolina.

Mr. A. J. Maxwell of the Corporation Commission then spoke and in his remarks stated that it would ever be the purpose of the commission to work along the lines of general rate structure as it had any bearing on the state as a whole, and in regard to the immediate hearings that his office was now busy compiling data.

It was pointed out that central and western North Carolina had 14 distinct and separate traffic organizations working for the several outstanding interests of that section and that, in view of the proposed rate increases into Eastern Carolina and the other things that arise from time to time, some kind of a body was necessary through which to function.

As a means of having machinery with which to work in the Atlanta hearing during the early days of March and as an initial step of what may develop into a permanent body, the following were elected:

President, W. H. Beaman, of Kinston; John H. Hawley, of Goldsboro, treasurer and M. R. Beaman, of Wilson, secretary.

Also Mr. Beaman was authorized to compile the data and present the claims of the case at the Atlanta hearing, which has to do with one of the proposed increases by the carriers.

At 6:30 p. m. the visiting representatives met at the Kenon Hotel where they were guest of the Goldsboro Chamber of Commerce.

At this luncheon the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce was openly discussed by the secretaries and others present and there was a unanimous sentiment in regard to the place of the organization for the development of eastern North Carolina and all pledged more support during the next year.

The towns represented: Greenville, Rocky Mount, Wilson, Morehead City, Kinston, New Bern, Wilmington.

Curtis is Elected Vice Pres. Southern Cattlemen's Asso.

Raleigh, Feb. 21.—P. S. Curtis of the Animal Industry Division of the North Carolina Experiment Station, was elected vice-president of the Southern Cattlemen's Association at the annual meeting of the association held recently in Bainbridge Georgia.

Mr. Curtis is the official representative of the State of North Carolina in this organization. He was officially notified of his election to the office of the vice-presidency of the association by Milton P. Jarnagin, of Athens, Georgia, who is the president of the association. The next annual meeting of Southern Cattlemen's association will be held in Montgomery, Ala.

Scouts to Have Summer Camp Near Smithfield

Smithfield, Feb. 21.—Several hundred Boy Scouts of Smithfield, Goldsboro, Kinston, Pikeville and the nearby towns will have their summer camp near Smithfield. A wooded spot about four miles from here has been under consideration for a good while.

The troops of Lenoir, Greene, Duplin, Johnson, and Wayne counties have been enrolling new members. Civic and Patriotic organizations and church are sponsoring many troops.

NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION IN THE GREENVILLE GRADED SCHOOL DISTRICT.

An Ordinance Ordering Special Election in the Greenville Graded School District Upon the Question of the Issuance of \$200,000 School Building Bonds of Said District.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Greenville:

Section 1. That under and by virtue of Article 22, Chapter 136 Public Laws 1923, and pursuant to petition duly filed with this Board and signed by a majority of the members of the Board of Trustees of the Greenville Graded School District, an election is hereby ordered to be held in the said Greenville Graded School District on the 1st day of April, 1924, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of said district the question of the issuance of \$200,000 bonds for the purpose of erecting and equipping school buildings and the purchase of sites therefor, and the levy of a tax for the payment thereof.

Section 2. That the territory within which the said election shall be held, being all of the territory embraced within the following boundaries and being constituting the Greenville Graded School District, is as follows:

"That the boundaries of said graded school district shall begin on Tar River at the mouth of Smith's Run, thence Southwardly up the various courses of said run to the bridge across the same near the residence of L. C. Arthur, thence westwardly with the various courses of Town Branch under the railroad trestle to the Kingston Road; thence northwardly along the Kingston road to the old Plank road; thence north-

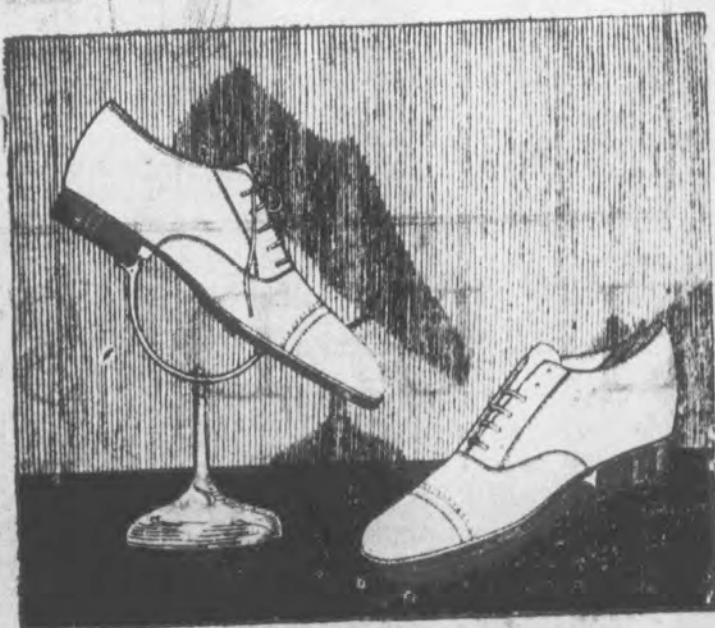
Section 3. That for said election a new registration of the voters of said district is hereby ordered, and for such purpose the registration books for said new registration shall be kept open between the hours of nine o'clock a. m. and sunset each day (Sunday excepted) from the 3rd day of March 1924, to the 22nd day of March, 1924, both inclusive. On each Saturday during the period of new registration above set forth the registrar shall attend with his registration book at the polling place hereinafter set forth for the registration of voters.

Section 4. That for said new registration and election Mr. Luther Bowling is hereby designated and appointed registrar and Mrs. J. E. Winslow and Mr. Guy Smith judges, and the polling place for said district is designated as the court house in the Town of Greenville.

Section 5. That a copy of this ordinance, signed by the Mayor and Clerk of this board, shall be published as a notice of said new registration at least once, not later than February 20th, 1924, and at least three times as a notice of said election, the first publication to be not later than February 29th, 1924. That the said publications of new registration and election shall be made in The Daily Reflector, a newspaper published in the Town of Greenville and circulating in the said district.

ORANGES ADD TO WEIGHT OF UNDERNOURISHED YOUNGSTER

Oakland, Cal.—Experiments made with 109 children in a local school have proved oranges to be a weight-builder for undernourished youngsters, according to Mrs. A. F. Morgan, professor of household science at the University of California.

For two separate periods of eight weeks each the children of one group were given half a pint of milk a day; those of another group one orange daily, others half a pint of milk and an orange and others a quarter of a pint of orangeade. Mrs. Morgan said that oranges proved the most efficacious in putting on weight. Milk produced favorable increases, but to less extent than the oranges. Orange juice was found slightly less effective than raw oranges. Milk and oranges together stimulated nourishment at a level a little higher than milk or orangeade, but not as well as the raw oranges.

The Fifth District Dental Society Will Meet on Thursday

Rocky Mount, Feb. 19.—The annual meeting of the Fifth District Dental Society of North Carolina will be held on February 21 in the Fick Hotel of this city, it has been announced by Dr. A. C. Bone, secretary-treasurer of the society. The fifth district is composed of 31 counties of Eastern Carolina.

The meeting is expected to prove one of the most interesting that has ever been held by the Fifth District Society. A number of prominent doctors will speak on subjects of much interest at this time.

Election of officers will be held and the selection of the place for the next annual meeting are among the things to be taken up at the meeting.

Alaska to Have Fast Train.

Anchorage, Alaska.—The government's Alaska Railroad next summer will operate a train faster than the regular ones, calling it the "McKinley Park Limited," the management announces. The train will run from Seward, the tidewater terminal, to McKinley Station, where Mount McKinley may be viewed.

Extra sleeping cars are to be attached to all through trains on the railroad, which has been designated "The McKinley Park Route." Stop overs will be optional, instead of compulsory as heretofore.

SWARMS OF ALASKA GNATS SMOTHERS DOGS TO DEATH

Anchorage, Alaska.—Gnats, even the curse of life to prospectors in some of the gold regions of Alaska in the hot season, came so thickly last summer in the Odirat and Flat districts, in the interior, that they smothered dogs to death. The tale of the affliction laid by these insects was brought here by Herbert Riley, who has a dog transportation system along the Yukon river.

"Before we realized what had happened many of our dogs had been smothered to death," he related. "Some of the dogs fought the insects and saved themselves, but others gave up and were dead in a few minutes. We found that by keeping the dogs in sheds or caves where it was dark we could protect them. The men wore gloves all the time. Over our heads we had silks cloths. We burned insect powder continually."
