

COMMITTEE GOES
OVER TELEGRAMS
FALL AND McLEAN

Examination Takes
Place Behind Closed
Doors

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26.—Presented with a sheaf of telegrams sent from Washington to Albert B. Fall and Edward B. McLean, publisher of the Washington Post, at Palm Beach, Fla., the Senate oil committee suddenly went into executive session today to examine them.

In ordering the hearing room cleared, Chairman Lenroot said that if any of the telegrams were found to be relevant to the inquiry that they would be read in public.

The telegrams were presented by division superintendents of the Western Union and Postal companies and apparently numbered several score. Some contained more than a hundred words.

Wilton L. Lambert, counsel for Fall, and J. B. McLean, counsel for McLean, at the reopening of public hearings at the invitation of Senator Walsh who had sought a conference with him. The purpose of the invitation was not disclosed but it has been stated that the time of the examination of Mr. McLean by the committee is still undetermined.

A subpoena was issued today for W. G. Wallberg, former private secretary to Harry F. Sinclair. He will be questioned as to the identity of the "Mr. Hayes" to whom he testified that he delivered \$25,000 in liberty bonds. At the time of his testimony committee members thought that the reference was to an employee of the Sinclair interests but since that time there have been reports that it was another Mr. Hayes.

In this connection Senator Walsh announced today that there is no present intention of summoning Will Hayes, former Postmaster-General.

Senator Walsh also said that the committee did not plan now to summon Attorney-General Daugherty for questioning as to statements in his letter yesterday to Senator Willis, Republican, Ohio, that he had dealt in Sinclair oil stocks after the leasing of Teapot Dome to Sinclair.

Chairman Lenroot said that in any event, Daugherty would not be called until after the expert accountants had finished their examination of brokerage books showing those transactions.

H. F. Taff, Washington superintendent of the Western Union company was called as the first witness when today's hearing began. Senator Walsh received the records submitted by the witness. While Senator Smoot, Republican, Utah, read them over the shoulder of his associate.

Chairman Lenroot went into the whispered conference that followed over the messages and then announced the decision to convene in executive session. The committee desires to find out which of the messages were relevant to the case the chairman explained. The others will be eliminated and those important to this inquiry will be read, said the chairman. Thomas D. Dowd, manager of the Postal company likewise produced messages that were taken into the executive session.

The purpose of the examination of the telegrams was to determine if any individual member of the oil committee or any administration officer had communicated with Fall or McLean while at the Florida resort or while the former secretary was in New Orleans just before he returned to Washington in response to a summons to appear before the committee.

Later the committee will examine long distance telephone records for a similar purpose. Subpoenas for the records have been issued but it will require a day or two to compile them for presentation.

After remaining behind closed doors for two hours the committee adjourned until tomorrow. It was explained that examination of the telegrams had not been completed.

DEFINITE ACTION
ON DAUGHERTY IS
EXPECTED SOON

Consideration Wheeler
Resolution Is Halted
Pending Development

Washington, Feb. 26.—During the truce in open hostilities administration officials negotiated today to settle the row over the resignation of Attorney-General Daugherty in the Cabinet. Another succession of conferences including a cabinet meeting resulted in no surface developments but gave indications that some definite decision would be announced in the near future.

White House officials insisted after the adjournment of today's cabinet meeting that the subject of Mr. Daugherty's resignation had not come up for general discussion at the meeting and that the president had no statement to make.

Previously however, the president had talked the situation over with Senator Curtis one of the leaders, and Paul Howland, of Cleveland, the Attorney-General's counsel during last year's impeachment proceedings.

Meanwhile in the Senate, Republican organization leaders staved off consideration of the Wheeler resolution for an immediate investigation into the administration of the Department of Justice. The purpose of this delay was not explained but it is apparent that Republican leaders believe that there will soon be developments that will make further action by the Senate unnecessary.

It was Senator Lodge, party floor leader who had informed the president that Mr. Daugherty should resign, who objected to the request for unanimous consent to bring the Wheeler resolution up for debate. Because of the Memorial service tomorrow to President Harding, action on the resolution will go over until Thursday at least.

"Non Stop" Motorists
Say "Morning" Judge

Charlotte, Feb. 26.—Seventeen Mecklenburg county motorists will "Stop, Look, Listen" before crossing railroad tracks by obeying the state stop law hereafter, and they didn't get hit by a train either.

The 17 appeared yesterday before circuit Judge A. M. Stack and said "Good morning Judge." The Judge retaliated his greetings ranging from "\$5 and costs and a sojourn in jail if you drive a car within 60 days" to "\$10 and costs and a sojourn in jail if you drive a car in 90 days." The officers are busy gathering up the non-stop motorists and the judge is backing them up in his inimitable style in their efforts to enforce the stop law.

Wake Forest, Feb. 26.—Several meetings of the various county Alumni Associations of Wake Forest have been announced by J. A. McMillian, Alumni Secretary. At Winston-Salem the mid-year banquet of the Forsyth county Alumni Association will be held. President W. L. Pottent will be the guest of honor and Mr. McMillian will represent the college. The Alumni Association of Harnett county will meet at Lillington on Saturday evening. The quartet of Wake Forest College will be present at this meeting along with McMillian and will sing at the banquet.

On March 6 the Alumni of the eastern part of the state will meet with the Alumni of the eastern part of Tennessee at Asheville for a "Jolification day." This is considered one of the biggest events in the program of the Alumni meetings for this year and several members of Alumni Association are expected to be present. At this meeting Mr. McMillian will tell of the plan to have an attendance of 2000 at the Commencement exercises at Wake Forest on June 4. He will also outline the plan to erect a library to the memory of the late Dr. Charles E. Taylor, who was for many years president of Wake Forest College.

PAGEANT "EASTERN CAROLINA IN
ACTION" TO HAVE HISTORICAL BACK
GROUND; 13 COUNTIES REPRESENTED

The Pageant "Eastern Carolina in Action" which will be presented on the night of April 11th during the Eastern Carolina Exposition, will have a historical background in which each of the thirteen counties that are members of the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce will be featured individually in an historical episode showing an outstanding historical event of the county.

The World War will be represented by members from the American Legion, the Red Cross, Y. M. C. A. Boy Scouts and Salvation Army from each county.

The second part of the pageant will show Eastern Carolina, her present and future, typified in her great agricultural and industrial achievements, her civic, religious and educational advancement, represented by all the counties.

The pageant will open with a prologue which shows the spirit of Eastern Carolina attracted by the natural beauties of the place, typified in the butterflies, flowers, woods and streams.

Following the prologue will come the Indian episode. The first by Bertie county, representing the treaty between Gov. Eden and the Tuscarora Indians. This will show the signing of the treaty, the burying of the hatchet of warfare, and the peace pipe ceremonial. The second episode in the Indian period will be represented by Greene county. This will show an Indian village, the Indians engaged in different industries and some of the Indian dances. The arrival of an Indian scout announcing the capture of some pale faces causes great excitement. The paleface captives, John Lawson, a surveyor, Degraffenreid, a Swiss nobleman, and a negro were brought in and tried by the Indian chiefs. All are condemned to death, but Degraffenreid's life is spared, because he claims to be the King of the Swiss.

The earlier settler or pioneer period will be represented by Duplin county. This will show the finding of some nuggets of gold by Barbara Gaston in Duplin county, and the excitement created among the townspeople. The further search does not reveal more gold, but a wonderful spring of clear pure water. The location of this spring was the cause of the removal of the present site of the court house at Kenansville to this spot. Barbara Gaston on this occasion meets her future husband, John Beverette, a sea captain. This episode will show the costumes of the earlier settlers.

In the Colonial period the first episode will be represented by Pitt county, showing the States Rights Convention and the Declaration of State's Rights. Prominent men of Pitt county at that time will be impersonated by present residents of Pitt county and the women and children will also be shown in an interesting picture. The second episode will be represented by Wayne county. This will be shown in two scenes. The first will show the departure of Capt. Slocumb from Wayne county to join Col. Caswell in an attack on the British and Tories at Moore's Creek. The second will show Mary Slocumb's arrival at the Battle of Moore's Creek after a ride of 75 miles through the country to aid her husband, having dreamed that he was seriously injured.

The third episode in the Colonial Period will show the Battle of Moore's Creek by Pender county. This will also show the Women of the Community making soap to use on the logs of the bridge to keep the British and Tories from crossing.

The fourth episode in the Colonial Period will be represented by Halifax county, and will show the first Provincial Congress framing the State Constitution.

Lenoir county will be shown in a colonial ball during the administration of Richard Caswell, the first Governor of North Carolina and an outstanding state and national figure at that time. A feature of this episode will be the dance of the stately minuet.

Edgecombe county will feature the banquet that was given to George Washington when he visited Tarboro on his trip through the South in 1791. The descendant of the toastmaster on that occasion will act as toastmaster at the banquet, represented in this episode and the guest at the banquet will also be represented by their descendants of the present time.

The Confederate Period will be represented by an episode by Johnston county and also by an episode by Nash county showing the social life at that time and the dances, the schottische, the heel-and-toe polka and the Virginia Reel.

Sampson county will be shown in a panorama of their progress beginning with the first Judge and court in the county and coming through to the time of their agricultural development.

From the above summary of the Pageant, it will readily be seen that it is going to be the "Biggest Event of its Kind" in the South. There will be about 1,000 to take part in this big in-door show on April 11 during the week of the Exposition in Kinston. Miss Olive B. Jackson, the director of this Pageant, says that nothing of this kind has been staged in this country, where the

URGES EARLY VOTE
ON MUSCLE SHOALS

Washington, Feb. 26.—Attempt will be made to bring the McKenzie bill authorizing acceptance of Henry Ford's offer for Muscle Shoals, to a vote in the House next week.

Representative McKenzie, Republican, Illinois, author of the bill, said to have asked the rules committee to give the measure priority with general debate limited to six hours instead of 10 hours originally requested. He said that with the tax bill out of the way he was confident that time could be allotted to the Muscle Shoals question during the week.

Chairman Snell, of the Rules committee said that no decision as to giving priority to the Muscle Shoals legislation would be reached until after the House voted upon the revenue bill which would probably be the latter part of the week.

There is no serious opposition in the committee to early consideration of the question but the committee has indicated that it might be decided to give the naval appropriations bill right of way with the Muscle Shoals question the next general legislation to be considered.

Wilson Tobacco Market
Will Not Close Until
Wednesday, March 15

Wilson, Feb. 26.—Decision to hold the Wilson tobacco market open until March 5 was reached here today at a meeting of the tobacco board of trade. The market was to have closed February 28 but owing to unfavorable weather conditions farmers were unable to bring in all their crop.

70,000,000 pounds of tobacco have been sold on the Wilson market this season for more than \$15,000,000 or at an average of \$22.22 per hundred pounds. This is said to be the heaviest sale ever made in a single season on any one market.

Says Fall Planned
to Have Forests Turned
Over to Dept. Interior

New York, Feb. 26.—Former Secretary Fall, of the Interior Department, with the consent of President Harding, planned to have the national forests of the United States turned over to the department of Interior as were the naval oil reserves, Governor Pinchot, of Pennsylvania, declared in an address here last night before the survey association. Mr. Harding declared he thought it wrong for the former chief forester to oppose Fall's plans, said the governor. The conservation policy of President Roosevelt was a great contribution to the American people, according to the Pennsylvania executive. Those who had attempted to scrap this policy had met with universal execration, he said.

Governor Pinchot said that it was of primary importance that the naval oil reserves be recovered by the navy no matter what the result of the present investigation should be as to the fate of delinquent individuals. "However pleasant it would be to see certain men in jail, and to none would it be more pleasant than to me, to put them there and let the grabbers continue to get the navy's oil would be utter failure."

TAX BILL AND VETO THREATS

In the progress of the Tax Bill through the House of Representatives we see nothing to justify the expectation of a veto by the President, which is threatened by some of his rash journalistic advisers. Presumably, President Coolidge wants what the country wants—and that is a Tax Bill financially sane and politically strong enough to secure enactment in a narrowly divided House and Senate. Such a bill is in prospect.

By a substantial majority the House has voted to allow the Ways and Means Committee, the Senate Finance Committee or any special committee of Congress to have access to the income-tax returns of corporations and individuals. An accepted amendment would slightly broaden the present law by permitting the proper authorities of any State, whether that State itself imposes an income tax or not, to have access to the returns of corporations, not of individuals.

In the debate and vote upon these details the Democrats in the House wisely served notice that they are not in all respects at the beck and call of the insurgent rump of the Republicans. Mr. Frear's desire to make all income-tax returns public for inspection by any one was defeated by a vote of practically two to one.

A somewhat similar line of cleavage appeared in the refusal of the House to consent to

the reimposition of excess-profits taxes, as proposed in another Frear amendment. This proposal to reimpose taxes in a bill supposed to be devoted to tax reduction was defeated by 165 to 80, both parties being divided in the count. It was good leadership on the part of Mr. Garrett and Mr. Garner to cut loose from the radical Republicans upon a suitable occasion; good tactics for Democratic Representatives to follow them. It is not good party politics any more than it is good citizenship to load a tax-reduction bill which has been promised to the people, and which they demand, with provisions which would defeat in part the purpose of its enactment and perhaps prevent any action at all.

In a letter to Representative La Guardia, Secretary Mellon reiterates that the estimated surplus on the present basis of taxation would be, for 1925, \$395,000,000, while he sets the annual reduction of tax income under the Garner bill at \$620,000,000 to sustain the contention that the Democratic bill would merely legislate a deficit. Estimates can never be exactly fulfilled; tax reduction upon a more liberal scale than the Administration desires might so stimulate industry as to yield a larger tax income than dead reckoning now might promise. It is less likely, but possible, that even the lavish hands of Congress might be somewhat checked in the process of appropriation by narrowed receipts. Notoriously, surpluses encourage extravagance; once in a million years the reverse might prove true.

Representative Garner, who is managing the Democratic bill on the floor of the House, promises that it shall contain nothing to give President Coolidge reason to veto it. He is justified in doubting whether "the public would stand for a veto of the bill as it stands." The people have heard promises of tax reduction. They expect tax reduction. It will go ill with any one who disappoints them.—New York World.

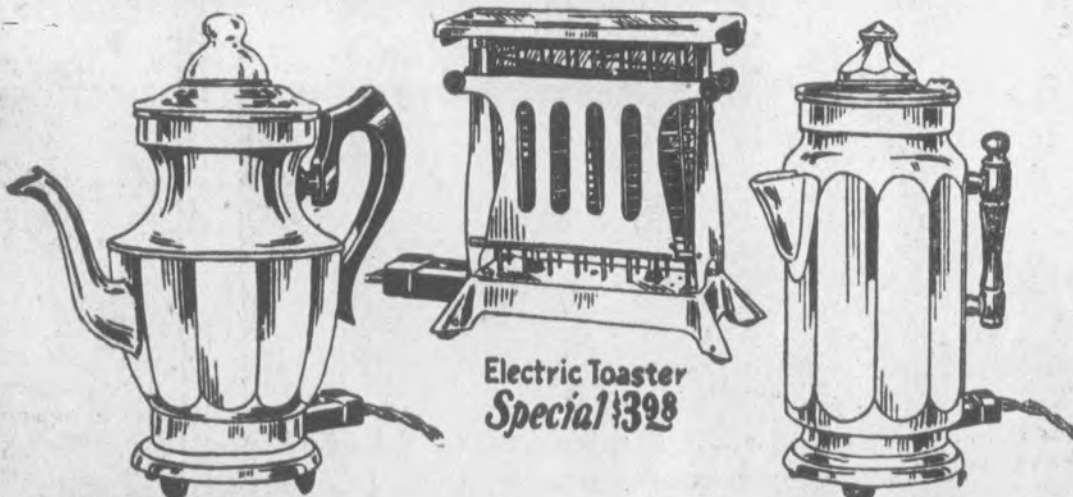
