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## LACK OF FORESIGHTNESS

The sins of the fathers of American cities, towns and villages were municipal near-sightedness and penury. The users of streets and public buildings are the losers.

How often it is lamented today that persons responsible for the breadth of the streets and highways and for the capacity of the schools and other public buildings did not value foresight above bonded indebtedness and taxation. It is easier and cheaper to build for the future than for the future to tear down to meet the demands of the present.

Fifty years ago, when the majority of the American communities had already been planned or long established, present traffic conditions were undreamed of. The most of our present business thoroughfares were staked off for two lines of wagon traffic, with hitching posts and watering troughs at either side. A 40-foot street was a boulevard and an extravagance not to be tolerated by the tax-

payers, but to be remembered as subsequent councilmanic elections. In the same manner were public buildings erected with public funds for present needs.

There is probably no community in the United States, no matter how large or small, which is not now feeling the strangling influence of streets woefully too narrow and that has been forced, or soon will be, to enlarge or entirely rebuild one or more public buildings.

To right the traffic wrongs there have been many solutions suggested and employed. Some municipalities have expended millions in raising valuable buildings, condemning private land and slicing off business blocks to allow the widening of streets. Elevated sidewalks and roadways are being seriously contemplated in several of the larger cities.

The price we pay for the blindness of our forefathers is immeasurable, but still the generations of tomorrow have the same charge to make against the community builders and planners of today.

There will be an election in Greenville April 1 to decide on the issuance of \$200,000 bonds to supply adequate schools for the children of the community. What will our answer be?

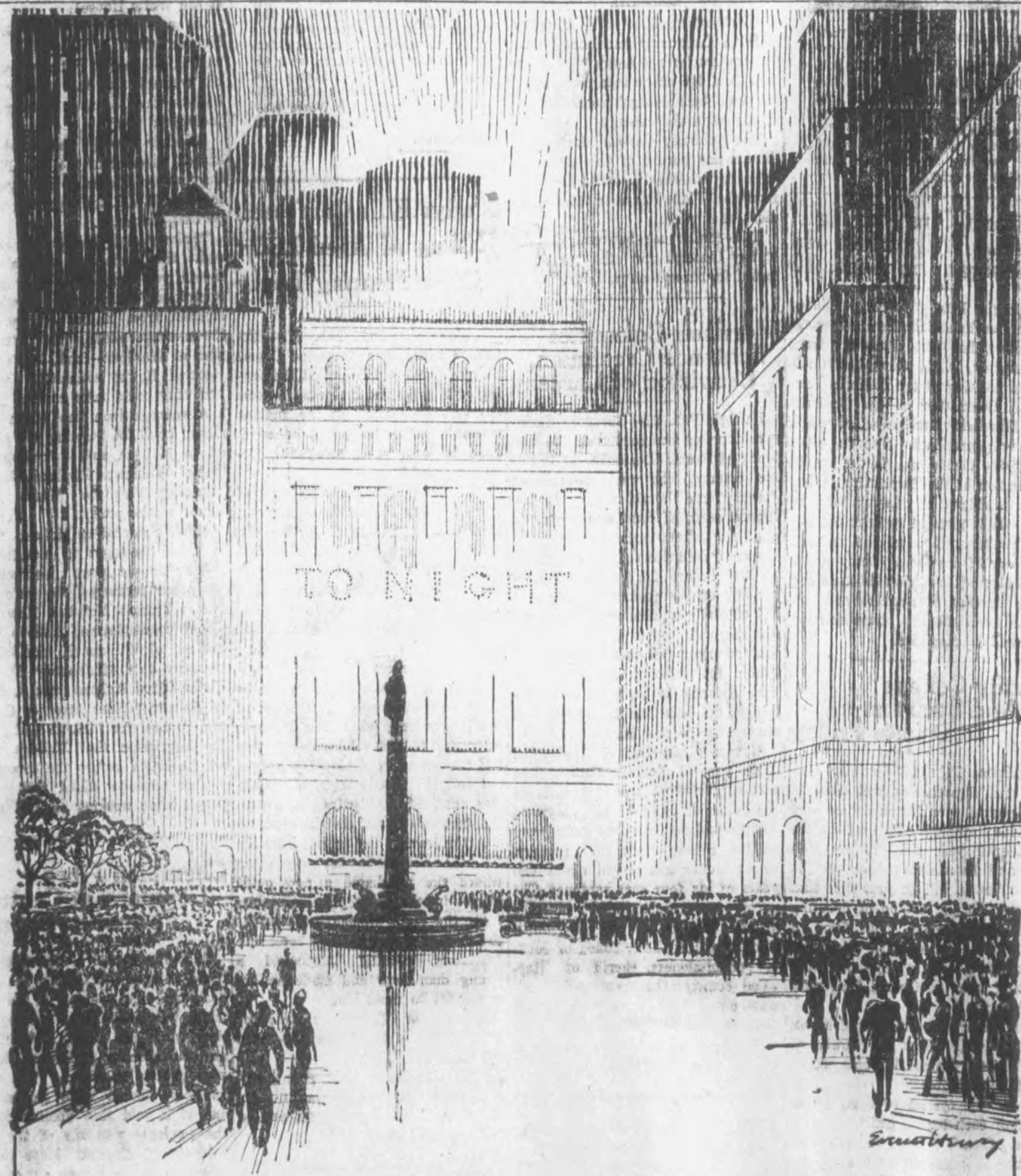

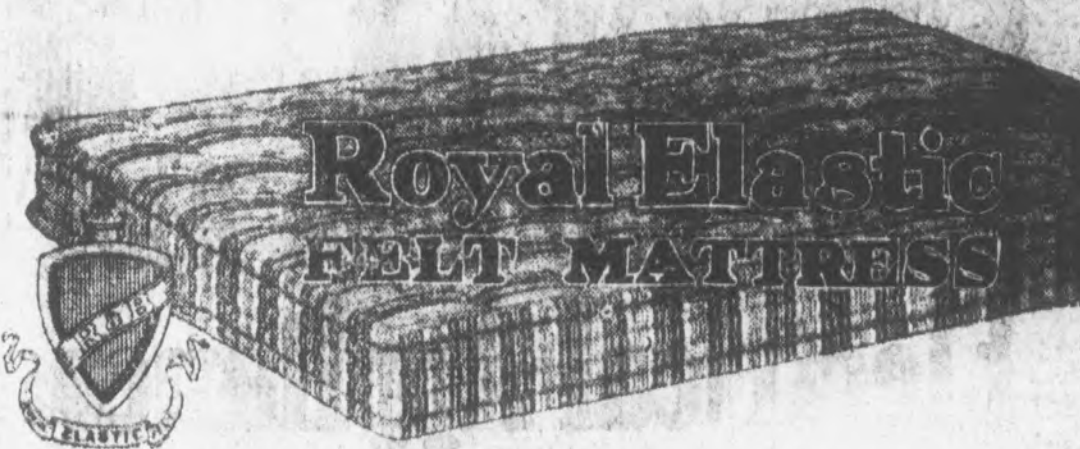

# ELECTRICITY MAY UNCOVER MILLIONS IN ALASKAN GOLD

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Jan.—The use of electricity, generated from coal slack in the sub-bituminous mines of the Healy field, is one of the plans under consideration as a means of uncovering the estimated \$200,000,000 in placer gold believed to lie in the

gravels of the Tanana valley around Fairbanks, Chitana and adjoining points. The proposal is being investigated by Professor Charles E. Bunnell, president of the Fairbanks agricultural college and school of mines. Experts have expressed the opinion the electricity will solve a problem that has been baffling. With the exhaustion of the shallow ground in Tanana valley, placer operation have been confined to hydraulic, dredge and shaft work, entailing heavy expense and many hazards in prospecting. To sink shafts requires a thawing outfit and high priced fuel even with mines near by. In the frozen creeks beds there is

no trouble from water and pumping is obviated. Yet in other places it often happens that "live" water is encountered just when the prospector is ready for sampling, and elaborate pumping operations are required. Electrical thawing is said to be feasible, while pumping when necessary would be reduced greatly in cost by the use of electric pumps. If electricity is employed, it will be transmitted a distance of approximately 110 miles to Fairbanks and distributed over an area of 50 square miles. Lack of capital has retarded the development of this region. It is held that the cheapness of the electricity would remove this obstacle. One mine operator of the district reported that last year he took out more than \$100,000, but made a profit of only \$2,000, owing to the overhead cost. With seemingly inexhaustible coal fields supplying fuel for winter generation, and the released water power of summer producing electricity during the open months, it is predicted that the next decade will see electricity supplanting all other power in Alaska and supplying the medium through which the mining of precious metal especially gold, will become a conservative commercial venture instead of a romance with attending hazards.

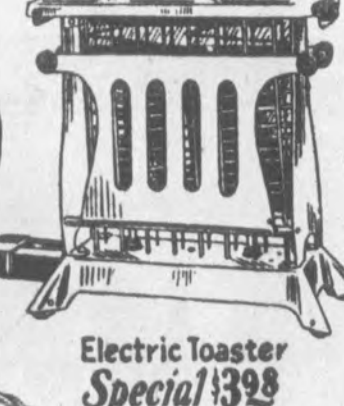
