

New Sensations Are
Disclosed In Telegrams
Read By Committee

A. Mitchell Palmer to
Be Called Before
Committee; Exami-
nation of Tax Return
Sinclair and Doheny
Urged In Resolution

Washington, Feb. 28.—While the oil committee was uncovering several new elements of mystery in the affairs of Edwards B. McLean, groundwork was laid in the Senate today for further excursions into the operations of E. L. Doheny, Harry F. Sinclair and others.

The committee listened to the reading of another batch of telegrams exchanged between McLean in Florida and his employees in Washington and decided to summon before it A. Mitchell Palmer, who was Attorney General under Wilson and who acted for McLean in the oil inquiry. Many of the telegrams contained code words and studious references to unidentified persons who moved behind the scenes relating to the interests of McLean.

Names mentioned were "Underwood" and Willis. "Senator Walsh immediately told the committee that Senator Underwood, candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination, had never sought to use his influence on behalf of McLean and Senator Willis, Ohio, issued a statement saying that he had no idea of the identity of the man mentioned in the telegrams as "Willis."

On the Senate floor, meantime, Senator McKellar, Democrat, Tennessee, introduced a resolution asking President Coolidge to forward to the oil committee income tax returns of Doheny and Sinclair for examination as to possible further payments to Albert B. All. The action went over.

A Mitchell Palmer, Attorney General in the Wilson administration, will be called before the Senate oil committee.

The committee so determined today before resuming the reading of additional telegrams to Edward B. McLean, publisher of the Washington Post, at Palm Beach, Fla., concerning the oil industry.

Senator Dill, Democrat, Washington, insisted that Mr. Palmer be called, saying that he had been the between in delivering McLeans messages to the committee.

In telegrams read today, John Major, employee of McLean, reported that he was "busy with Underwood Curtis and Zev."

"Zev" was understood by committeemen to refer to J. W. Zevlev; personal counsel to Harry F. Sinclair. Ira Bennett, editor of the Washington Post, telegraphed McLean on January 3 that he and Major "saw Curtis who promised to see Lenroot. Curtis advised us," the telegram said, "that he had seen Underwood." "We saw Underwood who promised to speak to Walsh but hinted that it would not do any good."

In placing the telegrams in the records the committee members made no announcement as to the identity of the persons referred to leaving the public to draw its own conclusions.

A telegram signed "Johns" sent to McLean said "Willis saw party this morning." Willis reported party in friendly mood," said the message, adding "Harry is out of city."

"Before proceeding," interrupted Senator Walsh, Democrat, Montana, "I desire to say that Senator Underwood called me a few minutes ago over the telephone and said that he read something in the newspapers this morning that he had endeavored to dissuade me from my purpose to subject McLean to examination, a conclusion drawn from some of the telegrams read yesterday."

"Senator Underwood never attempted to influence my conduct in the matter in any way. I have no recollection of Senator Underwood speaking to me on the subject except one morning in the Senate chamber he asked me if I had any objections to having inserted into the Congressional Record a letter to me by Palmer and I said that I had not."

"Senator Underwood, in his conversation with me this morning said further, that at the request of Bennett he had said something to me about whether we were going to ask the appearance of McLean and that I told him it was already arranged that I was going to Palm Beach and take the testimony of Mr. McLean. Senator Underwood having said that the conversation had taken place I suppose it did but I have no recollection of it."

MONORAIL LINE REPLACES
BURRO IN MOHAVE DESERT

San Bernardino, Cal.—The passing of the burro, which has been the best means of transportation on the Mohave desert, is predicted by miners since the advent of a monorail line, recently laid across the sands in San Bernardino county.

The line, one of the few oerated in this country, extends from Trona to a bed of salt deposits on the southeastern edge of Death Valley, a distance of 28 miles. Like the humble burro, the monorail car carries its load swung on either side. It is drawn by a gasoline propelled engine.

Miners are interested in the operation of this road, believing it the forerunner of scientific transportation in desert mining regions.

"Helpings" of Meat
In America in '23
Largest in 15 Years

Raleigh, Feb. 28.—The "helpings" of meat on American tables were larger in 1923 than in any other year of the past 15 years, according to an estimate of the Bureau of Animal Industry of the United States Department of Agriculture received here today. The greatest increase was in the use of pork, which was a bumper crop, but there was some increase in the consumption of all other kinds of meat, says the report. Foreign particularly Germany, despite financial troubles, helped to dispose of the enormous supply of pork. The production and the consumption of meat for the year was the greatest in our history, though the consumption per head of the population was exceeded only once before in 1908, when the figures 170.9 pounds as compared with 67.

PROPOSAL TO ABOLISH WIGS
AND GOWNS STIRS IRISH BAR

Dublin, Feb.—The bill which proposes to abolish in the Free State the traditional legal system of centuries and set up in its place a more modern system, has passed through the Dail and now is in the Senate. In the latter body much of the preliminary discussion of the bill had to do with the question whether wigs and gowns shall continue to be worn. The bill provides that the decision as to whether the judges and members of the bar shall wear any special costume and what that costumes shall be shall rest with the minister for home affairs acting with a committee representing the legal interests.

The legal profession is strongly attached to its wigs and gowns and the subject is likely to lead to heated discussion because the government is in favor of some dignified costume that will impress upon the popular mind the realization of the change from British control of all law to the control of the Irish people. The power proposed to be given to the minister for home affairs is challenging as an under interference with the independence of the judiciary. It is expected that the Senate will make several amendments to the bill.

Members Will Seek
To Legalize 2.75 pct.
Alcoholic Beverages

Washington, Feb. 28.—Forty members of the House joined today in announcing that next week they would each introduce a bill making legal the manufacture and sale of beverages with alcohol contents of 2.75 per cent by volume.

Stock Exchange

New York, Feb. 28.—The expulsion of John Farson, of the firm of Farson and Company, was announced today from the rostrum of the stock exchange.

TURKISH GUIDES TO SHOW
VISITORS CONSTANTINOPLE

Constantinople.—The tourist companies having announced that many American travelers are due to visit Constantinople this spring, the local Turkish authorities gave shrewd consideration to the impressions these foreigners might carry away of Turkey and the Turks.

As a result, it has been decided to provide the Americans with Turkish guides to the city, thus breaking an old precedent. Never in the past have Turks acted in this capacity; the work always has been done by non-Muslims. The guide service is to be without cost, so it is said, and as only Turks will be employed, there will be no danger of aliens spreading unfavorable reports of the country and the people.

It is estimated that some 3,000 Americans will visit the Turkish capital this spring, on the many tourist steamers that have placed Constantinople on their itinerary.

KAISER'S BIRTHDAY
REMEMBERED BUT CELEBRATION IS TAME EVENT

Potsdam, Feb. 28.—The former kaiser still is remembered by relatives and friends on his birthday and according to government telegraph officials, many telegrams were sent to the former emperor at Doorn on the occasion of his 65th birthday anniversary in January.

In contrast with former years when the occasion was made a "national holiday," the principal birthday celebration in Potsdam was at the home of former prince August William, the youngest son of the ex-kaiser. The principal guest were the sons of the ex-kaiser and Jeld Marshal Hindenburg.

The unbeaten team of Troop Two meets Wilson Scouts on tomorrow night at the Star warehouse at 7:30 in the first bout of a double-header, as Greenville High Girls play New Bern immediately after the first game.

The Greenville boys have a record of which they may well be proud as they have won all of the six games played having defeated by a wide margin Wilson, Washington, Ayden and Farmville teams. They have almost doubled their opponents' score in every game.

On Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock Greenville Scouts close this season of basketball with a double-header with Washington Scouts. In the first game, the Troop Two Tots will take on a diminutive team of Washington Scouts, while in the last game Washington Scouts will try to defeat the first Troop Two team and get revenge for the defeat given them in Washington several weeks ago.

Fleet 1,335 Vessels

Washington, Feb. 28.—Bids on the entire Shipping Board's fleet of 1,335 vessels under slightly changed contract terms were asked for the board. Offers received on or before March 14 will be considered and no awards will be made before that date. The action was through the Emergency Fleet Corporation.

RUMANIA FORSEES END
OF OIL EXPORT INDUSTRY

Bucharest, Feb.—The days are gone when gasoline could be purchased in Rumania for the equivalent of ten cents a gallon, a price that prevailed all through the year 1923. The new petroleum law permits local oil companies to charge world market prices for oil sold to the domestic trade; the old law compelled them to sell much under these quotations. The purpose of the change is to bring to the oil companies sufficient profits to permit them to extend their operations to new and unproved fields.

The production of crude oil in Rumania is increasing. Last year it was 10,500,000 barrels of 42 gallon each, as against 9,500,000 barrels in 1922, and 8,000,000 in 1921. Back in 1913 the total was 1,300,000 barrels. The export of refined oil products (crude oil may not be sent out of the country) was 3,000,000 barrels in 1923, as against 7,000,000 in 1913. The local market for refined products is increasing steadily, and if this condition continues, Rumania, in a few years, may cease to be an oil exporting country.

ONE DEAD AND THREE
IN SERIOUS CONDITION
FROM POISON LIQUOR

Asheville, Feb. 28.—One man is dead and three are in a serious condition today as a result of drinking poison liquor according to diagnosis by attending physicians.

James F. Quinn, 45, plumber, died in a local hospital this morning from pneumonia following acute poisoning. Lindsey Campbell, V. S. Mardock and Ed DeKey are suffering from similar cases of poisoning according to physicians.

The physician who attended Quinn said that he pumped out the stomach of the stricken man and found in the contents a liquid that appeared to be composed of red lye and wood alcohol.

The four men composed a drinking party at Campbell's plumbing shop yesterday afternoon. About 6 minutes after they had drunk some of the whiskey all were suffering severely and physicians were called in. Quinn who appeared to be suffering most was taken to a local hospital where he lapsed into unconsciousness and pneumonia developed quickly. The body was shipped to Columbia, S. C., where the widow of Quinn resides.

Seeks Further Facts
As To Fall Payments

Washington, Feb. 28.—Inquiry by the oil committee into the income tax returns of E. L. Doheny and Harry F. Sinclair and their oil companies was proposed in a resolution today by Senator McKellar, Democrat, Tennessee.

The resolution would request the president to have the tax returns of the two oil operators, also that of E. L. Doheny, Jr., turned over to the oil committee for examination for additional information regarding payments to former secretary Fall. Immediate consideration was blocked by Senator Moses, Republican, New Hampshire, who said he desired to include other names in the resolution.

Meeting To Be Held
In Raleigh To Discuss
Student Problems

Raleigh, Feb. 27.—Students representing some thirty Colleges of North Carolina, South Carolina, Virginia, Maryland, and the District of Columbia will gather in this city on Friday evening next to begin a three day conference on student problems. Questions to be discussed by the students, leading educators, and young people's workers are: "A World Mission Outlook," "A Definite Campus Program," and "World Student Sympathies." The meeting is the last of three scheduled to cover the territory embraced by the Southern Baptist convention.

Wake Forest College will send 130 delegates to the meeting, it was stated. Frank H. Leverall, of Nashville an executive secretary, will be present and also Miss Louise Foreman, who the travelling secretary. In charge of the program are: Dr. J. E. Love, of Richmond, secretary of the Foreign Mission board; Dr. W. A. Alexander, Miss Jessie Burall, of Stephens College, Columbia, Missouri; and Dr. W. J. McClinton, president of Furman University.

AUSTRALIAN BOY PROVES
MARVEL AS A SWIMMER

New York.—Australia is grooming Andrew Charlton, a 16-year-old college student for swimmer honors and many believe he will prove the greatest middle-distance swimmer since the discovery of Johnny Weissmuller the Chicago star, a few years ago. Charlton will represent Australia in the 400 and 1,500 meters free style swimming events in connection with the Olympic games at Paris.

Recently at Sydney, competing against Arne Borg, the Swedish champion, he swam the 880-yard event in the world's record time of 10:51 4-5. Using the American crawl stroke, Charlton has amazed the water experts of the Antipodes. e stands more than six feet, weighs more than 200 pounds and has an ideal build for swimming. He has broad shoulders, a tapering body and his greatest asset is his judge of pace. Charlton's rise to fame marks the return of Australia to a prominent place in the aquatic world, which it held years ago. He joins the ranks of Cavil, Champion, Hardwick the late Cecil Healy and Longworth, originators of the Australian crawl.

DAUGHERTY SAYS
HE WILL REMAIN
IN THE CABINET

Attorney General has
Left Capital For Trip
To Chicago And Miami,
Florida

Washington, Feb. 28.—Attorney General Daugherty will remain for the present a member of President Coolidge's cabinet, but he will be expected to retire to private life as soon as the Senate has completed its inquiry into his administration of the Department of Justice.

His determination not to resign without a hearing on the charges against him was reaffirmed today in the face of growing pressure for his removal. He even refused to promise that he would vacate his post upon termination of the Senate inquiry, but it was apparent in other quarters that any plan for his retention beyond that time had been abandoned.

This conclusion is one of the most difficult problems with which Mr. Coolidge has had to deal since he entered the White House. Followed an almost continuous succession of conferences in the midst of which the Attorney General himself suddenly left Washington. It was announced after his departure that he had been called to Florida, where Mrs. Daugherty is ill, and would go by way of Chicago to attend to public business there.

Last night his determination to remain Attorney General pending the Senate inquiry was announced to the country in this terse statement, prepared before his departure and issued from the Department of Justice:

"It is not my purpose to even consider tendering my resignation as Attorney General until after a fair hearing on charges preferred against me."

Previously he had made the same determined declaration to President Coolidge, after the President had laid before him in a conference of more than an hour the conclusions reached by the administration after a re-examination of the whole case. The White House refrained from any public statement, but it was evident that until Mr. Daugherty had announced definitely his refusal to retire under fire the belief in some administration quarters had been that his resignation was imminent.

Daugherty in Chicago.

Chicago, Feb. 28.—Harry M. Daugherty, Attorney General of the United States arrived here today ostensibly in connection with the Federal Grand Jury's investigation of the Veteran's Bureau. He refused to add to his previous statement relating to the oil inquiry at Washington.

The Attorney General said he had no public statement to make and did not know that he would have any before noon or late in the day.

That he expects to continue to hold his place in the cabinet was indicated when he stated that he was here on government business and expected to remain until that business was completed.

What he might say later, Mr. Daugherty indicated, probably would be in connection with the government's action in the Veterans' Bureau case. But he indicated that what the Senate oil committee might do or announce would have some bearing on what he might have to say himself.

He said that he hoped to complete the government business promptly so he could go direct to Miami, Fla., to join his wife who is there for her health.

Man Shot When
Garment Workers
Clash Dress Makers

Chicago, Feb. 28.—One man was shot and several benten today in a clash between alleged striking garment workers and employees of a dressmaking factory.

According to reports to the police who rushed riot squads to the plant, William Goldstein, owner of the factory, was shot through the right leg when strike sympathizers stormed the shops.

Bailey and the Machine

BY SETH E. HIGH.

Former Secretary to the late Claude Kitchen EDITOR THE TIMES:

Sir: With much interest I have read the platform announced by Mr. J. W. Bailey. I take it that public discussion of his position is both fit and proper, and I therefore, venture to comment upon one of the planks in his platform.

Mr. Bailey takes his stand against a political machine, defined by him as "an organization of politicians holding office and controlling patronage." According to the Roxboro Courier, which I presume speaks with authority, the controlling members of this organization are Senator F. M. Simmons, Governor Morrison and A. D. Watts. Let us now examine this organization and see what relation, if any, Mr. Bailey has borne towards it, and ascertain if his hands assisted in building and driving it; and thus test the sincerity of his utterances and his reason therefor.

In 1919 Kitchen and Craig fought a memorable battle for the Governorship—Senator Simmons, Governor Morrison, A. D. Watts, and J. W. Bailey supported Craig and opposed Governor Kitchen.

In 1912, Governor W. W. Kitchen opposed Senator F. M. Simmons for the Senate and made a dramatic and powerful fight against the organization, then headed by Senator Simmons and now called by Mr. Bailey "The Machine." Where were Bailey's sympathies then, and what action did he take? He took the stump for Simmons, lauding him to the skies, preaching Simmons and White Supremacy, and defending him against the very charges that Mr. Bailey now so violently makes.

Senator Simmons was elected by a great majority. Two lucrative Federal positions were open for the supporters of Senator Simmons, the Federal tax collector for Western and Eastern North Carolina. A. D. Watts was named as tax collector for Western North Carolina, and J. W. Bailey was named as tax collector for Eastern North Carolina. From that time until the Democrats went out of power in 1920 Bailey belonged to that group of politicians holding office and controlling patronage. Master of that numerous body of Internal Revenue officers and attaches who from time to time are designated and described as "chief workers under The Machine."

The next Democratic campaign, in which the charge that the organization was opposed to a candidate, was made in the powerful battle between Morrison and Gardner in 1920. Then it was that Gardner's friends charged that the workers under the Revenue Department were going about the State and using their influence against him, and the claim was made that the organization was responsible for this activity. J. W. Bailey was then the head of this Revenue Department, holding office and controlling its patronage and directing the work of its agents. Bailey in that campaign supported Morrison and opposed Gardner.

Later, the position of Tax Commissioner was created by the Legislature, and the Governor was called upon to make the appointment. Mr. Bailey, as Federal Tax Collector for Eastern North Carolina, holding office and dispensing patronage, had become well acquainted with the ability, diligence and faithful service of that other Federal Tax Collector, A. D. Watts. So, in a strong and powerful letter to the Governor, Mr. Bailey urged that Watts be appointed to this new position, and Watts was appointed.

So, Senator Simmons' chief aids in the conduct of the organization, called by Mr. Bailey, "The Machine," were Mr. Watts and Mr. Bailey. When Mr. Morrison was a candidate, it was Mr. Watts and Mr. Bailey who were charged with operating "The Machine." When Watts was appointed Tax Collector by Governor Morrison, it was Bailey who urged and demanded that the Governor appoint Bailey's co-worker, Mr. Watts, the man who took turns about with Mr. Bailey in pulling the throttle on "The Machine," and the Governor made the appointment of Watts.

What has caused this great change in the political ideas of Mr. Bailey? Must we believe that, as long as he held down the sinure, as he terms it, and drew forty-five hundred dollars a year as Federal Tax Collector, holding office and dispensing patronage and, at the same time, engaging in his practice of law in the city of Raleigh, he was content to roll along with his co-workers in this organization he calls "The Machine?" Is this fear of "The Machine" sincere with Mr. Bailey? Did Mr. Bailey have any compunctions of conscience in accepting the sinure given him?

In conclusion, I want to say that I have never been affiliated with "The Machine," as Mr. Bailey calls it, and Mr. Bailey should know what to call it if anybody in North Carolina does. I voted for Governor Kitchen in both his State contests, and supported Mr. Gardner for Governor last time. It is amusing then, to me to say the least, to see Mr. Bailey, machine man par excellence, do the "bout face" and stand up and give thanks that he is not as other men.

Poland Takes Over American Red Cross

Warsaw, Poland—One of the romances of American welfare work abroad has just reached its climax in the formal transfer of the Y. M. C. A. in Poland from American to Polish administration. This action means that only five years after its introduction into Poland as a welfare service for the Polish army, Y. M. C. A. work here has grown into the permanent form so familiar to the people of America.

The formal transfer, which took place in the Warsaw Y. M. C. A. building, was the occasion for a ceremony attended by the president of Poland and many other of its notable citizens. Paul Super, National Y. M. C. A. Secretary for Poland, says: "After the Great War the American Y. M. C. A. conducted work for the Polish Army at nearly 100 points employing in this work 52 American secretaries and extending \$1,700,000. All this war work has, of course, been discontinued and the enterprise now is on a civilian basis, officered and directed by Poles. It begins its new status with some 7,500 members in 17 cities and many thousands of friends in government, university, civil and military circles. Seven American Y. M. C. A. secretaries remain in Poland as technical advisers and instructors in the work of the association, loaned as an expression of the co-operation of the American Y. M. C. A. with the Polish movement."

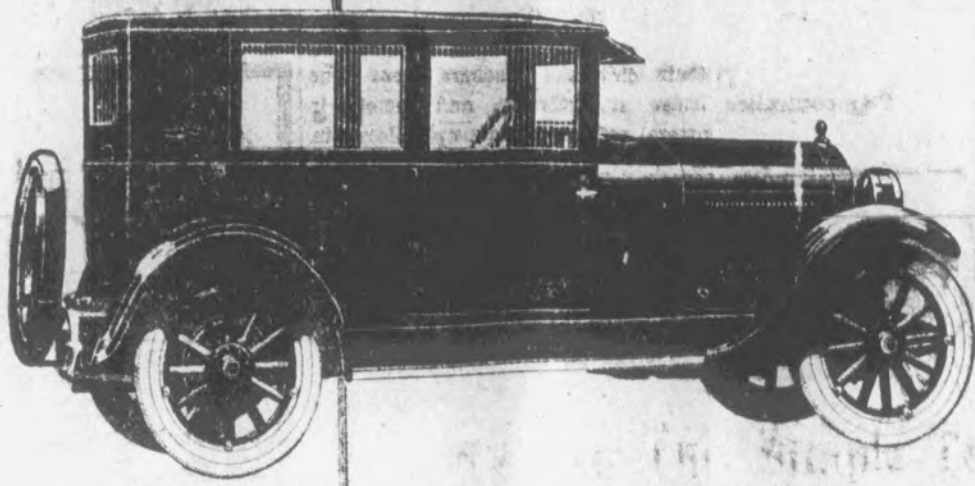
American Flyers Excel in Hanging No Records, Said

Paris.—United States fliers hold 36 of the 49 air records ratified by the International Aeronautic Federation in its recent meeting at Paris. France has eight, Great Britain four and Italy one. In a short time, when the Federation has decided to place the records of performances accomplished by refueling in flight in a separate category from the others, the United States will possess 42 of the 55 air records in existence.

French aviation experts find no place in the opinion that individual records do not prove collective superiority. "Record achievement in aviation is merely a sign of the superiority of a certain type of machine, but not a proof that a country in general leads in that line," writes the Auto, the largest publication dealing with sports in France. "Because the United States possess three or four planes capable of doing better than 400 kilometers an hour, it does not follow that they have four hundred machines that can travel at 300. France has. However, a well organized nation like the United States would require very little time to build machines of the standard type of that with which Lieutenant A. J. Williams flew at 429 kilometers. The United States could wrest the supremacy of the air from any other nation once it made up its mind to do so, but for the time being, despite records and all, France leads in aviation."

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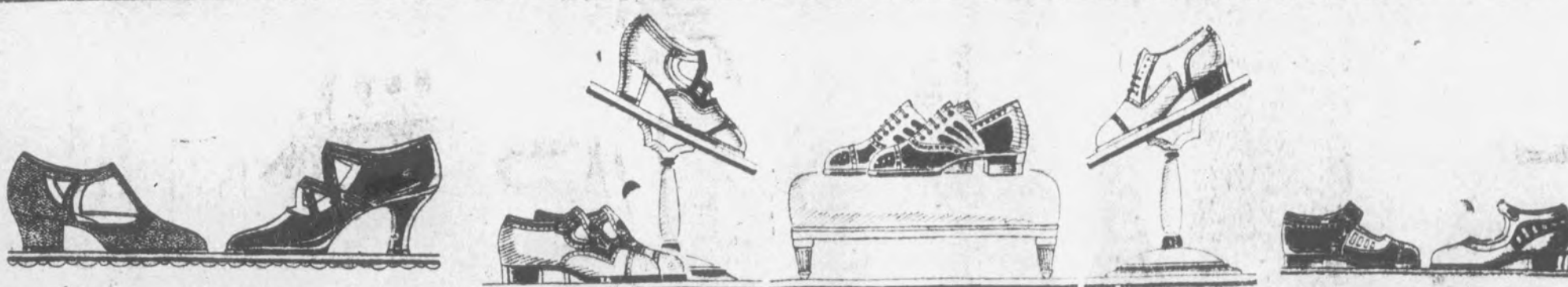

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MEN OF CHUNKING SCALE CITY WALLS AND KILL INVADERS

Shanghai.—A siege wherein the inhabitants of a city were reduced almost to actual starvation and which ended with a frontal attack against the walls, recalling vividly the romances of the middle ages, has just been completed at Chungking, recaptured not long ago from General Yang Sen, one of Wu Pei-fu's henchmen. The attackers were Szechwanese, some of them natives of the city itself.

Not more than 900 men participated in the attack, but such was their intrepidity that they effected a landing, under gunfire, from boats and scaled the walls without other cover-

ing fire than the minor fissiles of two small pieces of artillery.

Yang had held possession of the city for several months, though his line of communications on the Yangtze river had been cut and all supplies shut off. Living conditions within the town were terrible. There was barely enough rice to keep life in the inhabitants' bodies. What there was had reached a price four times that normally charged. People without funds and even some who had money were near the point of death at the time of the attack.

Chungking is built on a hill and its walls proper are little more than platforms on which the defenders may stand and be sheltered by parapets. Nine gates pierce these walls and it was against one of these, facing a stream which flows alongside the city, that the preliminary attack was made. When this had assumed considerable proportions, about 20 large sampans or junks, loaded with men, rushed off from the further side of the Yangtze, which flows along the other side of

the city. As these approached the shore the attackers massed in their bows and sprang for the land. Gunfire dropped some but the others kept on and, the defenders being in large part occupied in stemming the attack on the gate on the other side of the city, scaled the wall and met the defenders hand to hand on its top.

Within two hours they controlled the city.

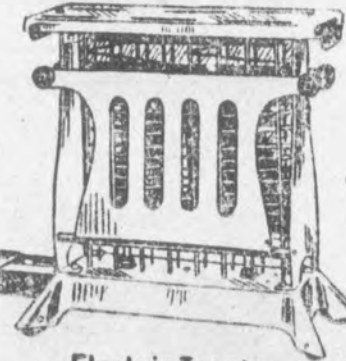
