Field Marshal Erieh von Ludendorff, "brains of the German Army in the World War," and Adolf Hitler, an Austrian citizen, are on trial for their lives in Munich on charges of high treason. Charles S. Whitcomb, former Governor of New York State, is being hoisted by friends for the Republican nomination for the Vice-Presidency. Major-General R. L. Bullard, who commanded an American field army in the World War, now commander of the First Corps Area, with headquarters at Governors Island, New York Harbor, declares indignantly that the army by Congress is forcing men in his command to sleep in stables and go to bed to keep warm. Miss Blanche Knox, of Erie, Pa., who spent two years with the Near East Relief, has been awarded the Cleveland Dodge medal for heroic service there. M. Samuels, newly-appointed Premier of Latvia, also acts as Foreign Minister and as Minister of Justice.

Palmer Flatly Denies Assertions in Telegrams Before the Committee

Declares He Did Not Ask Underwood Or Anybody Else to Bring Pressure to Bear Upon Walsh to Keep McLean From Stand

Washington, Feb. 29.—Several sensational assertions made in telegrams sent to Edward B. McLean in Florida by employees here were flatly denied today by testimony before the Senate oil committee.

A. Mitchell Palmer, former Democratic Attorney General, who later acted as counsel for the publisher, testified that he was not a partner to J. V. Zevely, attorney for Harry F. Sinclair, and that he was not looking after the interests of Albert B. Fall and that he did not, as stated in the telegrams, ask Senator Underwood or anybody else to bring pressure to bear upon Senator Walsh to keep McLean off the stand. He declared that he was not at present employed by any oil interest.

A. Mitchell Palmer, Attorney General under the Wilson administration, testified today before the Senate oil committee the circumstances of his retention as attorney for Edward B. McLean, publisher of the Washington Post, in connection with the oil inquiry.

He denied that J. W. Zevely, counsel for Harry F. Sinclair, is his law partner as suggested in the McLean telegrams. He added, however, that Zevely was an old friend of his and that about two months ago he (Zevely) had outlined the salient facts in the oil inquiry to him. He asked me if it was my opinion that Sinclair and Fall could be impeached by the committee to answer all questions and I told him that I thought so, said Mr. Palmer.

Palmer declared that he had not seen Fall for years and denied to have been looking after the interest of the man at Wardman Park" as Joseph Major had said in a telegram to McLean at Palm Beach.

He also denied that he had discussed the matter with any Senators except Senator Walsh and Senator Lepropt. "I did not have a living soul working on Senator Walsh, Palmer said when questioned regarding another of Major's telegrams to McLean.

He testified that he had never represented E. L. Doheny. "I rather regret that I have not considering the size of the fees he paid, he said.

"I did not take the matter up with Senator Underwood," Palmer said when asked about the report to McLean that he had done so.

Mr. Palmer said that so far as he knew no suggestion had been made to McLean as to what to say in explanation that he did not make the loan to Fall.

Charges Conspiracy.
Carl C. Schuyler, Denver lawyer, said before the Senate oil committee today that the claim of Leo Stalcup which pressed with Harry F. Sinclair was based upon the theory of a conspiracy between the Sinclair interests and the Pioneer Oil Company.

"There at least was a prima facie conspiracy," he said, "that the Pioneer company had joined Sinclair in helping him to get the lease."

Senate Demands Income Tax Returns Sinclair and Others

Washington, Feb. 29.—The Senate today asked that the income tax returns of a number of individuals and corporations prominent in the oil inquiry be thrown open to inspection by the oil committee.

The resolution on the subject offered by Senator McKellar, Democrat, Tennessee, adopted this afternoon without debate, respectfully requests the president to exercise the authority of the government under the law and turn over the reports to the oil committee of Harry F. Sinclair and the oil companies with which he is connected, E. L. Doheny and E. L. Doheny, Jr., and the companies of the Doheny interests. Albert B. Fall, former secretary of Interior and the Security Investment Corporation.

These records will be examined by the committee in effort to gain further evidence of payments made to Albert B. Fall.

ATTORNEY GENERAL BECOMES SUBJECT OF BITTER DEBATE

Washington, Feb. 29.—Attorney General Daugherty today became the center of the severest criticism and debate in the Senate in recent years.

When the resolution for inquiry into the Department of Justice was brought up for discussion, Democratic Senators let loose against the Attorney General with blistering accusations against his personal and official acts since he entered the cabinet.

Single handed, Senator Willis, of Ohio, the Attorney General's home state, attempted to stem the tide while Republican leaders looked on in silence.

Senator Willis discussed the make up of the committee to conduct the inquiry. Charges of efforts to select a "packed jury" flew back and forth across the chamber as the debate over the make up of the committee progressed and the galleries were stirred to repeated demonstrations despite reiterated warnings from the chair.

Daugherty Will Be Delegate At Large From Ohio

Washington, Feb. 29.—Attorney General Harry M. Daugherty will be retained upon the list of Coolidge's delegates at large from Ohio at the Republican National Convention regardless of the fight being made against him by the Senate and regardless of whether or not he remains in the cabinet.

This decision was reached at conferences concluded here today with Hoke Donithan, manager of the Coolidge campaign in Ohio, with William M. Butler and other Coolidge leaders expressing belief that Daugherty's candidacy was a personal matter upon which Ohio voters should be permitted to pass in the primary if Attorney General Daugherty desires it. The period for filing candidacy for delegates expires today.

Disappearance of High School Girl Remains Mystery

Binghamton, N. Y., Feb. 29.—The mysterious disappearance of Eleanor Aylesworth, 16 years old high school girl and ward of Harry Harkness, secretary of the Binghamton automobile club, remained unsolved today after police, firemen and state troopers had searched Susquehanna river during the night under the glare of searchlights.

A citizen passing over one of the city's bridges noticed an object floating in the river and Boy Scouts found a handkerchief, footprints and small blood spot on the river bank near the bridge.

After the search police doubted if the girl had ended her life by drowning or that she was the victim of an attack.

The girl disappeared last Tuesday on her way to school. She had lived with the Harkness family since the death of her mother. Her father of Forkville is aiding in the search. The girl has been apparently happy in her new home and is said to have cared little for society or boy friends. She had made no preparations to leave.

WOMAN CONTRACTOR TAKES LARGE CONSTRUCTION JOBS

Oakland, Cal.—Mrs. E. E. O'Brien does work almost, if not quite, unique for a woman. She is a contractor who bids on large jobs, and recently she has completed several such projects.

Negro Assistant U. S. Attorney Purchases Apartment House

New York, Feb. 29.—James C. Thomas, negro assistant United States attorney, was unable to rent an apartment in the part of the city where he desired to live with his wife and infant son so he has purchased a \$200,000 seven story apartment house, he announced today.

The house is occupied by white families and is at least three blocks from the nearest section of the Harlem black belt.

He will make no changes in the tenant list leaving the future occupation entirely in the hands of the families now living in the house, he said.

North Carolina Leads Counties Freed From Tuberculosis Cattle

Raleigh, Feb. 29.—North Carolina leads all other states in the Union in the number of counties that have been freed of tuberculosis among the cattle and since starting the campaign in 1917 more than 8,000,000 heads have been tested, according to Dr. A. J. DeFossett, inspector in charge of Tuberculosis Eradication in the State of North Carolina, who will have an article in the next issue of the Extension Farm News, the free bulletin distributed by the Agricultural Extension Service of the State College of Agriculture and Engineering and the State Department of Agriculture.

League of Women Voters Will Meet in Durham Tuesday

Durham, Feb. 29.—The League of Women Voters of the State of North Carolina will meet here on Tuesday next. A program of League business and a number of addresses has been arranged. Some of the speakers will be from other states and some that are connected with the national organization. A number of officials of various organizations of North Carolina will also be present as will officers of several State Departments.

Carolina Auto Show To Open in Charlotte On Next Monday

Charlotte, N. C., Feb. 29.—The fourth annual Carolinas Auto Show will open here Monday and continue through the week, which will be marked by the holding, in connection with the show, of the annual conventions of the Carolinas Division, National Automobile Dealers' Association, March 5, and of the Carolinas Motor Club, March 6; Auto Show officials expect this trade event, the only one of its kind held in the Carolinas, will draw an attendance of more than 15,000 persons.

The music programs of each afternoon and evening will include the appearance of Pat Conway's famous military band, Miss Vera Verba soloist, the Carolina Concert Club and the Goodfellows' Club octette, organizations of singers.

Thirty lines of motor cars, in addition to exhibits by a number of accessories dealers, will be on display. More than 135 new models will be displayed in the course of the week. The show will be held in the great Carolinas Exposition Building, which has just been redecorated by the Auto Show management.

The outstanding social event of Auto Show week will be the banquet next Wednesday evening at New Charlotte Hotel, when the members of the Carolinas' dealers' organization will hear addresses by several distinguished speakers, including A. W. McLean, of Lumberton, N. C., prominent in state banking and political circles, C. A. Vane, of St. Louis, president of the National Automobile Dealers' Association; Chairman Dawson, of the state Democratic executive committee, of Winston, Secretary of State Everett, Revenue Commissioner Doughton and other state officials, of Raleigh; and J. D. Knox, of Cleveland, Ohio, wealthy, automobile dealer, Lee A. Folger, of Charlotte, is president of the Carolinas dealers.

Several thousand dealers and members of their families are expected to attend the show next Wednesday, which has been designated Dealers' Day.

The show management has set aside Thursday, March 6, as Caners' Day, the date of the Carolina Motor Club's convention. This organization's convention program includes discussion of important taxation, traffic and highway development matters.

The Charlotte Automotive Merchants' Association is sponsoring the Auto Show, which has been planned on a much more elaborate and extensive scale this year than was the case for either previous show.

667 KILLED IN LONDON IN 1923

London, Feb. 29.—The annual police report shows that 667 persons were killed in the streets of London during 1923. The number in 1922 was 684. The report shows more people injured in 1923 than in 1922. Accidents average 204 daily.

MCKENZIE BILL TO COME UP TUESDAY

Authorizes the Acceptance of Ford's Offer For Muscle Shoals

Washington, Feb. 29.—The McKenzie bill which authorizes acceptance of Henry Ford's offer for Muscle Shoals will be taken up Tuesday by the House under agreement reached today.

The Rules committee reported a resolution giving the measure priority over other general legislation after disposal of the tax bill.

Chairman Snell announced that the general debate limited to 10 hours would get under way Tuesday afternoon.

Representative McKenzie, Republican, Illinois, author of the bill, predicts a final vote before the end of next week. He is confident that the measure will be passed without material change.

The Rules committee decided that half the debating time should be controlled by Representative McKenzie and the remainder by Representative Morine, Republican, Pennsylvania who is opposed to the proposition.

INSURGENTS WILL JOIN REPUBLICANS ON REVENUE BILL

Practically 17 Will Support Substitute to the Garner Plan

Washington, Feb. 29.—House Republican insurgents formally agreed at a meeting today to support the Republican compromise for the Democratic income tax rates in the revenue bill.

Representative Nelson, Republican, Wisconsin, leader of the group, said that practically all the 17 Republicans who voted for the Garner plan would support the substitute to be offered by Representative Longworth, Republican leader.

Reunion of the Republican forces, leaders said, would force rejection of the Garner rates on the final vote which will probably be this afternoon.

M'ADOO WILL NOT TOUR HOME STATE OF SENATOR REED

Kansas City, Mo., Feb. 29.—Announcement that William G. McAdoo will not come to Missouri to answer charges made by Senator James A. Reed, his opponent for the Democratic presidential nomination, is the latest development in the hot campaign that is now being waged in this state.

Senator Reed, in a speech last night challenged Mr. McAdoo to meet him on the platform in Missouri to discuss the oil lease disclosures.

McAdoo headquarters at Saint Louis announced that Mr. McAdoo would not make a personal campaign in the Senator's home state and declared that the friends of McAdoo would assume responsibility for his campaign in the state.

Replying to statements made by Reed in a speech at St. Joseph Wednesday night, Breckenridge Long, defeated by Reed for the Senate in 1920, who is associated with C. C. Oliver at McAdoo headquarters here, issued a statement today referring to Reed's opposition to the food control bill in 1917 stating that Reed was the legal representative of J. Ogden Armour interests and stating that the Armour interests opposed the passage of the food control bill.

Bill Extending The Franchise to Women Passes 2nd Reading

London, Feb. 29.—The House of Commons today passed the second reading of the bill to extend the franchise to all women at the age of 21. The vote was 288 to 72.

A SYMBOL OF DEMOCRACY

Press dispatches from Berlin reporting progress being made by the committee appointed by the Allied Reparations Commission to investigate German finances, report an ultra-official dinner given by Ambassador Houghton at which all the important diplomats and officials gathered to meet the American commissioners—General Dawes, O. D. Young and Henry Robinson.

As a symbol of the democracy which this country stands for and the business-like procedure which it expects in settling the reparations controversy, General Dawes, calmly lit up his old briar pipe just after the "fish course." In other words, pomp and ceremony mean nothing to Dawes. Neither are they part of this nation's calculation.

We want action looking toward real world peace, and Dawes and the American members on his committee mean to get action or know the reason why. Red-tape diplomacy, delays and evasions have been carried on for five years. Dawes, smoking his briar pipe at the end of the fish course, is typical of his abhorrence of useless delay such as surrounded past negotiations.

Enemies of plans for settlement of reparations question can take their cue from Dawes and his pipe—his committee means business and there is no use trying to fool them.

THAT INCOME TAX

The first installment of the income tax will be due March 15, when Uncle Sam will probably be the richer by half a billion dollars. Regularly thereafter, at quarterly periods, equal sums will be paid on personal incomes and profits. Two billions of dollars—and enough more to build two battleships—were received by the national treasury from these sources in the last fiscal year. Even more may be expected in 1923.

A great army of more than 7,000,000 wage earners are walking up to Uncle Sam's window to pay their assessed share toward the expenses of government. That is more than one in every six of all gainfully employed persons more than 10 years of age. Five millions of them will be paying taxes on incomes between \$1,000 and \$3,000, and nearly another million on incomes between \$3,000 and \$10,000.

Millions more are exempted from making a report to the government by law. Single men with a net income, after lawful deductions, of less than \$1,000, and married men with a net income, after deductions, of less than \$2,000 are not required to go through the formality. Thus the number of persons filing income tax reports is by no means a measure of the number receiving gross incomes of more than \$1,000 or \$2,000. It is safe to assume that the proportion of workers in the United States who receive such incomes is much more than one in six. The number whose incomes fall in that twilight zone exempted from necessity of reporting because of deductions must be large.

That the government's revenue is depleted by evasions, however, has been repeatedly stated on high authority, even by the secretary of the treasury, and energetic efforts have been put forth to round up the slackers. Year by year the number who evade may be expected to be diminished by the improved operation of the great system necessary to care for the accounting and by the aroused sense of obligation on the part of the citizenship.

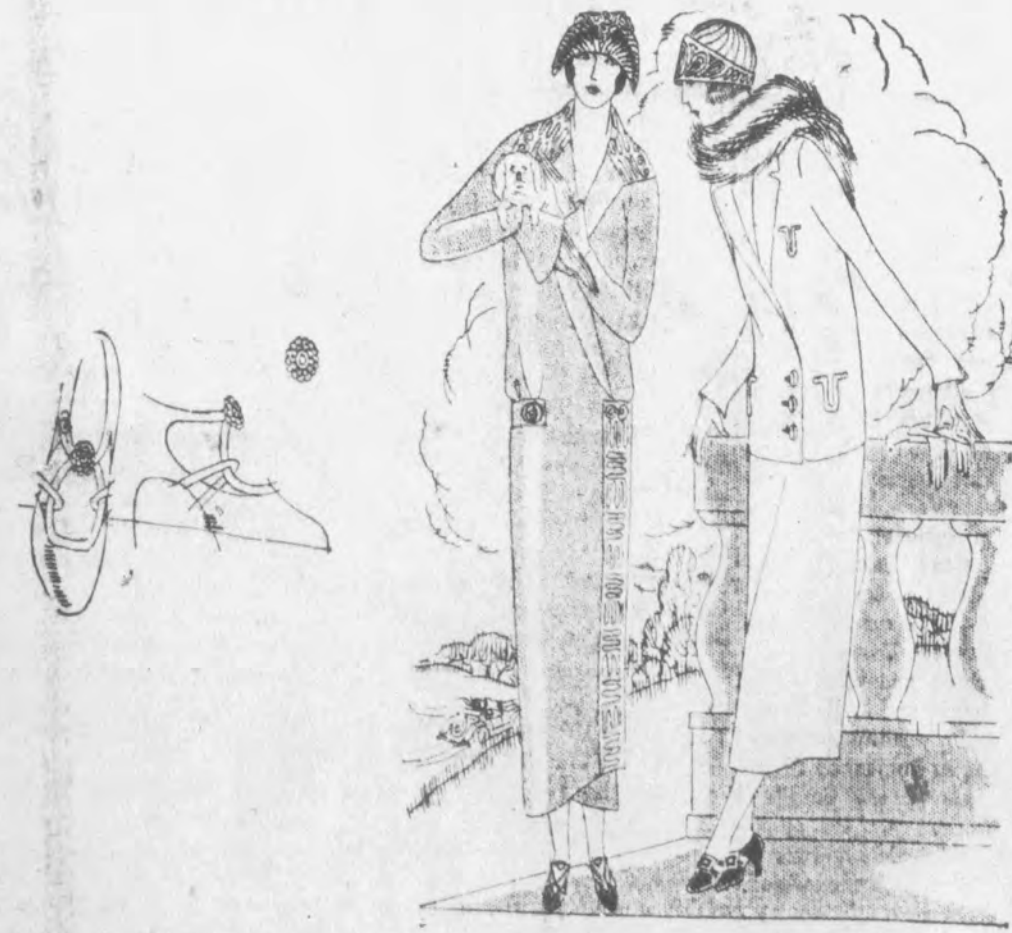

BLIND INDIAN IS GUIDE TO RUINS OF 1807 TRADING POSTS

Missoula, Mont.—The site of a trading post which, 500 miles inland from the Pacific ocean, was founded in 1807, at virtually the same time that John Jacob Astor was establishing his post at the mouth of the Columbia river, has been located by Duncan McDonald, of Dixon, Mont., on of an early Hudson Bay Company factor. A blind Indian was McDonald's guide.

The heap of stones and wood ashes on the shore of Lake Pend Oreille in northern Idaho. They are all that are left of the log barricades and cabins which were built by David Thompson in 1807.

Thompson was an employee of the Hudson Bay Company in eastern Canada when Astor determined to send an expedition by boat around Cape Horn. Offered employment by Astor, Thompson decided instead to head an expedition of his own to cross the continent and establish a post at the mouth of the Columbia before Astor's could round the Horn.

But, Thompson's expedition was forced by hostile Indians to camp for a winter north of what is now, the city of Spokane, and the Thompson party arrived at the mouth of the Columbia to find Astor's men building their cabins. Thompson returned to the Rocky Mountain region and built his fur-trading posts on Lake Pend Oreille in what has become northern Idaho, on Flathead Lake, in what is now western Montana, and near the present site of the city of Missoula.

The recent expedition which found the site of the Lake Pend Oreille post designated by Thompson in his diary as Kullyspell House, was led by McDonald, accompanied by the blind Indian from the Flathead reservation known as Old Aleck, who, in his boyhood, had seen standing the old stone chimney of Kullyspell House. By the location of a "bear's paw" rock, which Old Aleck remembered, the party found nearly two heaps of stone of uniform size, beneath which as disintegrated gray dust, the remains of the hearth fires of the fur traders of 117 years ago.

McDonald said the chimneys probably collapsed some time after 1855, but before the early white settlements began in the sixties. He added that the principal importance of the discovery of Kullyspell

2 HUNDRED SKATERS RESCUED FROM ICE BLOWN OUT TO SEA
Copenhagen.—The remarkable rescue of 200 persons who, while skating, were carried out to sea on a huge ice floe, is reported from a small town near here. While the skaters were enjoying the sport the wind loosened a large mass of ice from the fast pack. The floe began to drift rapidly seaward with the helpless skaters.

While all harbor authorities were notified a steamship was dispatched and a number of fishing craft put out to sea. The steamship caught up with the floe several miles from shore and took off 100 of the skaters while the others were rescued by fishing craft.

Newport, Ky.—In Memoriam, chief color-bearer of the racing stable of Carl Wiedemann, Newport owner, is being prepared for what is expected to be his greatest season. He will be pitted against the best thoroughbreds in this country, and will be a contestant for speed honors with Epimard, when the French champion comes to Latonia to meet horses of his age.

This gallant son of McGee, who defeated Zev at Latonia and ran the Raceocas star to a nose finish at Churchill Downs, probably will make his first start of the 1924 season in the Clark Handicap, opening day feature at Churchill Downs, according to Bob Gilmore, trainer of the Wiedemann horses. If the colt takes to the early training and rounds into form he may be sent to Maryland to start in the big stakes at Havre de Grace and Pimlico. The trainer said also that in Memoriam would not sidestep any race this season, and that he hoped a meeting could be arranged between the Wiedemann horse and Grey Lag before the season ends.

GERMANS BUILD SPACIOUS LINER FOR AMERICAN PASSENGER TRADE

Bremerhaven.—The Columbus, the new steamer of the North German Lloyd Line which will make her maiden trip to New York next spring is said to have a larger passenger capacity than any ship afloat, close to 1,800. She is built especially with the idea of accommodating passengers, and little space has been provided for cargo.

Cabins extend into the very bow and stern of the ship, and every effort has been made to provide adequate recreation space for passengers on all decks. The gross tonnage of the ship is 32,000. She is 850 feet long, 32 feet wide, and has a draught of 32 feet.

AMERICA, FRANCE UNITE TO VENERATE G. E. N. LAFAYETTE

New York.—A memorial in France to the Marquis de Lafayette, to perpetuate the memory of this famous Frenchman through good works, is the accomplishment in a period of four years of an American society known as The Lafayette Memorial, which has the support and co-operation of a large number of prominent French and American men and women. The memorial today is not a project, but a going concern, taking the form of a school and orphanage; a pre-tubercular sanitarium and finally a museum.

It is the purpose of the society to maintain the Chateau Lafayette, in central France as a permanent memorial to the marquis and to the memory of the allied heroes who were killed in the world war. It should become, members of the society say, an American national memorial like Mt. Vernon on the Potomac, the birthplace of George Washington.

The memorial is located in the old Lafayette chateau, at Chavagnac, 250 miles south of Paris, where the marquis was born in 1757. This property, consisting of various buildings and 175 acres of land, has been acquired by the society. The chateau was the home of Lafayette's ancestors for centuries, and here the French hero of American independence grew up to early manhood. The building has been restored, where necessary, and made sound and solid throughout. New structures have been added to the group, and everything has been provided, in the way of modern improvements, for the health, comfort and proper education of the children cared for by the memorial. A modern water supply has been installed, and modern plumbing and sanitary equipment have been established in all the buildings, which are served by a modern sewage disposal plant. Electric light and central heating have been put in, and a modern dairy with a fine herd has been established to furnish the best milk and butter. Part of the domain has been modernized and extended so as to afford the finest of farm products. A cobbler's shop has been created to make boots for the children, and there is a carpenter shop for estate repairs. Modern fire protection has been installed. There are baseball and football fields, tennis courts and a swimming pool.

In the school and preventorium, which house today a total of 250 children, war refugees and war orphans, the outdoor training of an American school is given. The youngsters are taught boxing, baseball, etc., and also receive a first-class training for the French baccalaureate examination. When they are old enough these boys will be sent out to receive training in the big business of America, such as the United States Steel Co., General Electric Company, etc. Forty of the boys in the school are French, 25 Russian, 25 Polish and ten Italian.

The head of the school is an experienced Anglo-Saxon master assisted by an able staff. It can safely be said that nowhere in France is there a group of boys of similar ages, from 8 to 16 years, receiving a better education than the boys in the Lafayette School.

The preventorium is run on the lines employed by Dr. Rollier in Switzerland, and in co-operation with the department of public hygiene of the French government. Here some 200 delicate children, from 5 to 12 years old, threatened with tuberculosis, are given sunlight, good food, and careful attention. When their health permits they are given elementary education, and later they may pass on to the advanced school

Business Girls of Carroll Club Find Substitute for Palm Beach In Own New York Swimming Pool



THE Florida east coast may have its attractions for society misses and matrons when the snow flurries in the North, but the business and professional young women of the Carroll Club of New York, whose work keeps them at their desks, have found that their swimming pool affords them an excellent substitute for the beaches of the South.

The Carroll Club was founded several years ago by Mrs. Nicholas F. Brady, prominent New York society leader, for business girls whose limited incomes denied them the opportunity of joining one of the expensive women's social clubs of the city. In dedicating the club to the memory of her mother, Mrs. Mary Carroll Garvan, Mrs. Brady provided for certain definite cultural and educational aims in the charter of the Carroll Club, as well as for the usual social and recreative advantages.

The growth of the club has been steady and its popularity is attested by an active membership of more than 1500 enthusiastic girls. In the field of social and educational development among New York's feminine working classes, the Carroll Club has achieved the distinction of being the pioneer.

Here is the building formerly occupied by New York's famous Colony Club, once the center of the social whirlpool, the Carroll Club is one of the few remaining monuments to the craft of Stanford White, the architect to whom New York owes the Pennsylvania Terminal and the Public Library. It is pure Colonial in style and looks oddly out of place in the midst of a seething commercial neighborhood, hemmed in by towering mercantile structures.

To the girls of the Carroll Club, however, this only enhances its attraction. They troop in every afternoon and evening, tired mentally and physically after strenu-

ous hours in their downtown offices, to enjoy the quiet of the lounge or reading room, the soothing effect of the swimming pool, the excitement of basketball or gymnasium, or the diversion of mah-jong and bridge.

The swimming pool is one of the most popular of the club's attractions. Surrounded with tall French mirrors and brimming with clear, almost sparkling blue water from the Croton lakes, it is considered one of New York's most beautiful pools. The Carroll girls take to it like ducks and as an indication of their keenness for water they are rapidly developing an excellent swimming team.

In other fields formerly occupied exclusively by the opposite sex, the Carroll girls are showing aptitude and ability. They have already produced one of the best feminine basketball teams in New York; they have a number of stellar performers in handball, tennis, squash and golf, a first rate hockey team and a crack indoor baseball team.

NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION IN THE GREENVILLE GRADED SCHOOL DISTRICT.

An Ordinance Ordering Special Election in the Greenville Graded School District Upon the Question of the Issuance of \$200,000 School Building Bonds of Said District.

Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Greenville:

Section 1. That under and by virtue of Article 22, Chapter 136 Public Laws 1923, and pursuant to petition duly filed with this Board and signed by a majority of the members of the Board of Trustees of the Greenville Graded School District, an election is hereby ordered to be held in the said Greenville Graded School District on the 1st day of April, 1924, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of the said district the question of the issuance of \$200,000 bonds for the purpose of erecting and equipping school buildings and the purchase of

land therefor, and the levy of a tax for the payment thereof.

Section 2. That the territory within which the said election shall be held, being all of the territory embraced within the following boundaries and being and constituting the Greenville Graded School District, is as follows:

That the boundaries of said graded school district shall begin on Tar River at the mouth of Smith's Run; thence Southwardly up the various courses of said run to the bridge across the same near the residence of L. C. Arthur, thence westwardly with the various courses of Town Branch under the railroad trestle to the Kingston Road; thence northwardly along said road; thence northwardly a straight course to the junction of the Stantonburg and Fair Grounds roads; thence northwardly along Stantonburg road to the River; thence northeastwardly along the River road to the bridge across the ravine; thence down the ravine to Tar River, and thence down Tar

River to the beginning.

Section 3. That for said election a new registration of the voters of said district is hereby ordered, and for such purpose the registration books for said new registration shall be kept open between the hours of nine o'clock a. m. and sunset each day (Sunday excepted) from the 3rd day of March 1924, to the 22nd day of March, 1924, both inclusive. On each Saturday during the period of new registration above set forth the registrar shall attend with his registration book at the polling place hereinafter set forth for the registration of voters.

Section 4. That for said new registration and election Mr. Luther Dowling is hereby designated and appointed registrar and Mrs. J. E. Winslow and Mr. Guy Smith judges, and the polling place for said district is designated as the court house in the Town of Greenville.

Section 5. That a copy of this ordinance, signed by the Mayor and Clerk of this board, shall be published as a notice of said new registration at least once, not later than February 20th, 1924, and at least three times as a notice of said election, the first publication to be not later than February 29th, 1924. That the said publications of new registration and election shall be made in The Daily Reflector, a newspaper published in the Town of Greenville and circulating in the said district.

SLEW FAMILY TO ATONE FOR "BLASPHEMY."

One of the most horrible crimes in American annals has been cleared by the confession of Frank McDowell, 19, that, while living in Decatur, Ga., he burned to death his two sisters, Willmette and Marion, and one year later, to the day, while living in St. Petersburg, Fla., he shot to death his mother and father. The crimes were committed, he declares, on the anniversary of the day when, as a child, he "blasphemed against the Holy Ghost," and he was seeking atonement by fire and blood.

LARGEST CALIFORNIA BANK WILL BE UNDER EMPLOYEES DIRECTION

San Francisco.—Control of the Bank of Italy, California's largest bank in financial resources and still ranking financial institution in the United States, gradually is to be passed to its employees. It was announced recently by A. P. Giannini, the president. This step, he said, would be epoch making in bank management. Giannini started the bank 20 years ago as a small one-room affair. Today this San Francisco bank has 75 branches through California, with deposits exceeding \$300,000,000. The bank has 485,000 individual depositors.

The Bank of Italy has more than 2,000 employees, most of whom now own stock, according to Giannini, but his plan will assist every employee in obtaining additional stock holdings with the definite aim of eventual control passing to these workers. This is declared to be the first time a large banking institution has endeavored to turn over its affairs to employees.

Giannini was the first man in America to develop state-wide branch banking to a great success. He will retire from the presidency of the bank October 17 next, when he will become chairman of the executive board. His resignation, he said, was to relieve him from banking detail, to "give the younger fellows a chance" and to allow him time to work out the profit-sharing ownership plan.

"I am convinced," he explained, "that the day has come when those who create and uphold an enterprise should own it. My plan is not for the benefit of big executives. It is all for our workers. My plan is for every office boy and junior clerk entering this institution to know it is possible for him to share in all the profits of the bank and for himself to reach the presidency by his own efforts and ability."

In the last year Giannini has given seven of his employees places on the board of directors.

"The worker in a bank more often than not makes a better director than an outside business man," he added. "The worker is in constant touch with the banking situation."

Giannini is 51 years old. He started as a poor boy in California, working his way up from laborer to the ownership of a small commission business. When he was 31 he retired with a fortune, having built up the largest commission house handling

produce on the Pacific Coast. He turned over the commission to the workers who had been associated with him; they were permitted to buy the business through its profits. But the young commission broker did not remain idle for long. Some friends suggested that he start a bank.

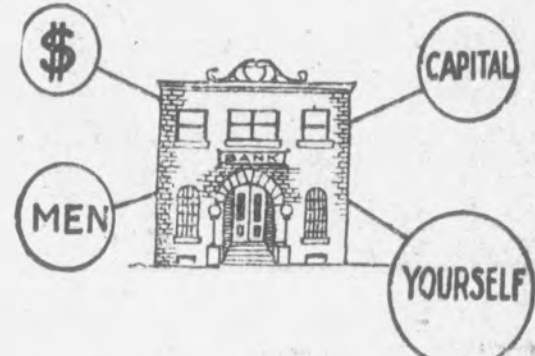
