

Committee Questions McLean's Employees As To Private Wire

Department of Justice Code Was Used To Communicate With McLean; Department Officials To Be Questioned By Committee

John Spurgeon, managing editor of the Washington Post, was the first employee of Edward B. McLean, questioned by the Senate oil committee today about the private wire the publisher had between his office here and Palm Beach. Spurgeon could throw little light on the matter telling the committee that he had nothing to do with installing the wire and nothing to do with the subject.

John Major, made famous by the telegrams read during the past few days, was next questioned by the committee. Copies of the messages sent over the private wire, said Major, were destroyed each night as they were strictly private and dealt with Mr. McLean's private affairs. The purpose of the wire he said was to keep McLean in daily touch with events in this country and Europe. When asked why the leased wire had been installed he replied that it was because it was cheaper to use it in view of the heavy volume of the traffic. "To the best of my recollection, no," he replied when asked if Albert B. Fall had ever sent or received any message over the private wire. Major said that he had shown Lenroot a telegram from Fall relating to McLean's appearance before the oil committee.

Major was then excused temporarily while the committee went into executive session to examine additional records and long distance telephone calls.

Government Code Used.
William J. Burns, chief of the Department of Justice investigation bureau will be summoned by the committee to explain whether the code messages sent to McLean in Florida were in the cipher used by the department's secret agents. He will also be asked whether McLean himself is not carried on the books of the department as a secret agent at a nominal salary.

Mary Duckstein, who was once secretary to Burns and now one of the Department of Justice secret agents will also be called by the committee and asked whether she signed the code message sent to Florida over the signature of "Mary." One code message so signed was placed before the oil committee addressed to W. O. Duckstein an employee of McLean. He is the husband of Mary Duckstein.

Burns said today that he understood that the code in the messages was used at one time by the Department of Justice agents. He denied, however, that he ever had any communication with McLean in Florida and said he did not know the basis of the message from Mary Duckstein to W. O. Duckstein that has been deciphered mentioned Burns as interested himself in McLean's affairs. The message sent February 2 was endorsed in red "charge Post for W. O. D." with the initials A. D. M. Arthur D. Marks is business manager of the Post.

Committee members would not discuss this situation today further than to say that Burns and Mary Duckstein would be questioned.

The list of the Department of Justice agents is never revealed to the public but Burns declined to deny the report that McLean was among them. It is known that in the

REVENUE BILL WAS PASSED BY HOUSE FRIDAY AFTERNOON

Garner Rates Defeated When Regulars, Insurgents Get Together

Washington, March 1.—By a vote of 408 to 8, the revenue bill was passed late yesterday by the House. As sent to the Senate, the measure carries an income tax schedule offered by Representative Longworth, the Republican leader, as a substitute for the Democratic rates. This was adopted 216 to 199 after the House had refused, by a vote of 261 to 153, to reinsert in the bill the original Mellon schedule.

The Longworth substitute, which was supported by Republican insurgents who previously had thrown their lot with the Democrats, provides for a normal tax reduction to two per cent on incomes below \$4,000, to five per cent on incomes between \$4,000 and \$8,000 and to six per cent above \$8,000. It also would cut by one-fourth the present surtax rates, making the maximum 37 and one-half per cent on incomes exceeding \$200,000. No increase in existing personal tax exemptions would be allowed.

The House also approved a proposal for a flat reduction of 25 per cent on all personal income taxes payable this year. Two unsuccessful efforts were made to eliminate this provision.

Specific rate changes carried in the bill will not become effective until tax payments are made next year on income and profits of 1924, except those made in the excise levies which would go into effect 30 days after enactment of the law.

Babe Ruth Suffers Attack of Influenza

Hot Springs, Ark., March 1.—Babe Ruth, battling against an attack of influenza, spent a restless night at his hotel here but his general condition was described as "very satisfactory" by physicians this morning.

Past a number of persons have been enrolled as agents of the department at the nominal salary of \$1 per month but it was understood that they should not devote all their time to the work of the department. Such employees were supplied with badges, pistols and a copy of the code. Burns declared a perfect willingness to go before the committee to tell all he knew. The Department of Justice never had anything to do with the oil scandal and the leasing of Teapot Dome he said. I never gave any tips to McLean. The only telegram to McLean that I know anything about was all right. It contained no tips of any kind.

When questioned further about the code used in the McLean telegrams, Burns said, that it might still be used by some of the agents of the department in some parts of the country, but that it was not now the "official code."

While the oil committee was examining some of the McLean employees regarding the mysterious Washington-Palm Beach messages, W. O. Duckstein and Mary Duckstein were among the spectators in the committee room.

Score Killed; Hundred Injured By Explosion

New Brunswick, N. J., March 1.—Eight persons are known to have been killed and 12 more are believed to have lost their lives, and more than 100 injured, by an explosion that destroyed the storage building of the Amintule Company on the property of the Nixon Nitration Works at Kilitan here today.

One entire family of five, living near the building, was wiped out by the force of the blast. The building contained a million gallons of ammonia nitrate in storage in 75 tank cars that held 90,000 gallons each ammonia nitrate, which was in the process of crystallization. The cause of the explosion is not known.

10 Added to List to Secure Modification In Volstead Acts

Washington, March 1.—10 more members in the House have been added to the committee of 40 formed to obtain modifications in the Volstead Acts by permitting 2.75 per cent alcoholic content beverages it has been announced by Representative Hill, Republican, Maryland, leader in the movement.

Additional members, Representative Hill said, include Black, Bloom, Carew, Cleary, Cullen Griffin, Lind, O'Connell and Quayle, Democrats, of the New York delegation, and Fagan, Democrat of New Jersey.

Four Persons Held Material Witnesses Murder of John Ford

Gastonia, March 1.—Warrants charging four persons including two women and a man arrested here last night held as "material witnesses" with the murder of John Ford of Lincoln county on November 7, 1920, have been sworn out by F. B. Ford, father of the dead man it was announced here today.

The fourth person named in the indictment is Joe Orr, of Charlotte, son of a former chief of police of Gastonia.

Sheriff G. R. Rhyme, of Gaston county, left for Charlotte this morning to arrest Orr and took with him Ransom Killian, of Lincoln county who with Elsie Grice, of King's Mountain and Elsie Beattie of Gastonia was arrested here last night.

Rhyme's attorney today secured a writ of Habeas Corpus from Judge Stack in Charlotte in an effort to have Killian released. The arrest was brought about by the alleged confession of Arthur Crowder who was arrested in Decatur, Ala., and brought to this city yesterday.

Killian and the two women were in an auto with Ford when he was killed and they claimed that two negroes had held up and robbed them and had attacked the girls.

Charlotte, March 1.—Joe Orr, wanted in Gaston county, charged with implicitly in the murder of John Ford, of Lincoln county was arrested here today.

Orr and Ransom Killian, the man arrested in Gastonia last night, were today released under bond of \$10,000 each.

FORBES NAMED IN FOUR INDICTMENTS BY FEDERAL JURY

Charges of Bribery and Conspiracy Are Made Against Two Men

Chicago, March 1.—Charles R. Forbes, former director of the United States Veterans' Bureau, and John W. Thompson, contractor of Chicago and St. Louis, were named in four indictments returned yesterday by the Federal grand jury which has spent a month investigating charges of waste, graft and debauchery in connection with Forbes' administration.

Forbes and Thompson were named jointly in two indictments charging conspiracy to commit bribery and offenses against the government, and conspiracy to defraud the United States government. Forbes was named alone in a third indictment on a charge of accepting a bribe, and Thompson in a fourth charging that he had indirectly given a bribe.

Wednesday Indictments.

Washington, March 1.—Charles R. Forbes, former director of the Veterans' Bureau, in a statement today declared that he welcomed the indictments returned against him yesterday in Chicago.

He said he looked upon them with "a clear conscience" because they will permit me to present my case before a fair court of justice and a jury of my peers.

Forbes characterized the accusations against him as a "hell engendered conspiracy against my honor and integrity."

He said that he would interpose no technical objections to the trial but on the contrary would go to Chicago, "the first step in my complete vindication."

The former Veterans' Bureau chief added that he was not going to Florida despite the fact that "other men now charged with public crimes against the government are reported to be hiding behind screens of ill health."

Attorneys today planned to summon about 40 witnesses for the defense including Carolina Votaw, sister of the late President Harding. There has been no indication as to what evidence is sought from her.

Appropriations Are Recommended For Ending Fiscal Year

Washington, March 1.—Appropriations of \$153,696,567 were recommended by the House Appropriations committee today to enable the various government departments to wind up the fiscal year without a deficit.

Individual items include \$13,850,622 to enable the Coast Guard to recon-dition 20 destroyers and buy 323 fast motor boats for use against rum runners.

Negro Deck Hand Charged With Murder

Elizabeth City, March 1.—Elwell Overton, 33, negro deck hand on the tug, Kling Farman, is held in jail here today charged with having thrown William R. Balance, 41, white deck hand, overboard from the tug last night. Balance was drowned but his body had not been recovered today.

Overton is charged with attacking Balance as the tug was leaving the harbor here last night and after knocking him against the rail of the boat, he pitched him overboard. Preliminary hearing will be delayed pending the finding of the body.

PRES. R. H. WRIGHT DELIVERS ADDRESS EDUCATIONAL MEET

Department of Superintendents of Education Asso. Meets Chicago

Chicago, March 1.—Several North Carolina school men have appeared on the program at the meetings of the Department of Superintendents of the National Education Association here this week. State Superintendent Allen is attending the first time in his present capacity and has made a strong impression. He spoke yesterday on Teacher Training and Certification. Before becoming State Superintendent, Mr. Allen was in charge of this division of the work and has come to be an authority on the subject. It is generally conceded that North Carolina has the best system of certification of any state in the Union.

Dr. George Howard of North Carolina's educational department spoke on problems involved in the administration of State Aid for Transportation, while Dr. J. Henry Highsmith explained "The North Carolina Plan of Inspection" to the Association of High School Inspectors and supervisors.

President Robert H. Wright of East Carolina Teachers College at Greenville spoke today on Training in Character and for Citizenship. Mr. Wright took the same position that he took in a series of addresses in North Carolina—that character and citizenship are not to be developed by making them special subjects in the curriculum, but that every subject that is taught and every school relationship should be regarded as an opportunity for specific contributions to character and citizenship. It is not so much the knowledge the child gets as it is the spirit which the school puts into his life.

To really contribute to character and citizenship development, President Wright said that the teacher must have faith in her children; must make herself a real companion to them; must have a real love for them, and must realize that the child is not being prepared for life, but is living his life and forming his permanent habits and ideals.

Demonstrations In First Aid and Life Saving in Gastonia

Gastonia, N. C., March 1.—Commodore W. E. Longfellow, assistant director of the First Aid and Life Saving Department of the American Red Cross, will be in Gastonia Friday for the purpose of giving demonstrations in first aid and life saving. Commodore Longfellow has just concluded a visit of several weeks to Charlotte, where interested many persons in the work that he is doing.

The Commodore will give demonstrations at the aquatic carnival, "The Arrival of King Neptune," which will be given here on that day. There will be about 18 swimmers in the event some coming from Rock Hill and some from Gastonia.

NEGRO FOUND GUILTY OF KILLING DEPUTY SHERIFF TO BE ELECTROCUTED

Charlotte, March 1.—Alex Rodman, negro, charged with killing a deputy sheriff here in February was found guilty in court today and sentenced to be electrocuted on April 16.

WHENEVER MR. COOLIDGE DECIDES

In commenting upon the retention of Attorney General Daugherty in the Cabinet the New York World passes the buck to President Coolidge asserting that when he refuses to accept further orders from the Attorney General and dismisses him from the Cabinet he will go and not before.

"A President of the United States, says the World, 'who wants to make a change in his Cabinet can do so in short order. In his official family he is master. His word is law.' He has only to make known his wishes to have them take effect at once. There is nothing to prevent him from reaching a decision on his own responsibility or enforcing it at will."

"There have been Presidents who, in the situation where Mr. Coolidge finds himself, would have got rid of Mr. Daugherty without painful hesitation. They would have given him to understand plainly that it was time for him to go. They would have left him no choice. Under provocation they would not have beaten about the bush or stood unduly on punctilio. And Mr. Daugherty, if not voluntarily, at least under compulsion, would have quit the Cabinet."

"Mr. Coolidge is a man of silence and mystery. His poise and reserve form a screen behind which his mind works noiselessly. No-

body to this day knows for certain what stand, if any, he has taken in regard to his Attorney General's retirement. The Senate, Chairman Adams of the Republican National Committee, all Washington, have been talking at the top of their lungs about Mr. Daugherty, but the President utters not a sound. He is pictured as holding prolonged sessions at the White House, where Mr. Daugherty is faced with his critics; as conferring with Senate and then with the Attorney General; as leading to one and then to the other; and absolutely nothing comes of it. Nothing is changed, nothing is done, to relieve the high nervous strain. And the country watches the spectacle with amazement.

All the while Mr. Daugherty knows exactly what he intends to do. He stands on his rights. He refuses to budge under fire. He dictates his own terms and refuses to alter them for anybody's convenience. He is an injured man and entitled to a vindication before stepping out. From the fourth or fifth session at the White House in two days he emerges with the declaration, 'It is not my purpose to even consider tendering my resignation as Attorney General until after a fair hearing on charges preferred against me'—a statement aimed as straight at the White House as at his assailants in the Senate.

"In other words, if Mr. Coolidge wants to be rid of Mr. Daugherty within a reasonable time, it can be accomplished not by persuasion or polite invitation but only by his removal from office."

"So in the end it comes round to the Attorney General telling Mr. Coolidge what shall and shall not be done. To be sure, Mr. Coolidge did not pick out Harry M. Daugherty of Ohio for his Attorney General. He inherited him, with others, from President Harding. At the time it was a very doubtful legacy. He made the best of it and has had nothing but trouble for his patience. Some day soon he must start house-cleaning with a will, but every day that Mr. Daugherty hangs on at the head of the Department of Justice the country must know that it is with Mr. Coolidge's acquiescence.

"Mr. Daugherty will go any day he is notified to go. So far, however, instead of Mr. Coolidge forcing Mr. Daugherty to quit, Mr. Daugherty has forced the President to keep him."

State Suffers Large Number of Fires During January

Raleigh, March 1.—A total loss of \$668,553 was sustained as the result of fires in the state during the month of January 1924 which was \$200,000 less than the loss during January of 1923, according to the State Fire report of Fire Commissioner Stacy Wade, which has just been issued. The loss by fires during the month of January last for the whole of the United States and Canada was given at \$1,243,600 which is said to be an increase of \$7,000,000 over January 1923.

The State report shows the largest number of fires ever reported for one month, the total being 276 as compared with 203 for the month of January 1923. The values of property at risk was estimated to be \$3,378,830 with a total insurance of \$2,720,980. While in January 1923 the value was set at \$3,878,875 and the insurance was \$2,382,356.

According to the report there were 26 fires where the loss was \$5,000 or more. The aggregate of these was given as \$553,350, leaving as total for the entire other 150 fires \$115,203. The dwelling fires reached 166 with a loss of \$271,224. The value of these properties was \$970,550 and was insured for \$556,450. The dwelling are losses are abnormal, due to the burning of a single residence in the course of construction at Belmont, where the loss was \$135,000, says the report.

NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION IN THE GREENVILLE GRADED SCHOOL DISTRICT.

An Ordinance Ordering Special Election in the Greenville Graded School District Upon the Question of the Issuance of \$200,000 School Building Bonds of Said District.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Greenville:

Section 1. That under and by virtue of Article 22, Chapter 136 Public Laws 1923, and pursuant to petition duly filed with this Board and signed by a majority of the members of the Board of Trustees of the Greenville Graded School District, an election is hereby ordered to be held in the said Greenville Graded School District on the 1st day of April, 1924, for the purpose of sub-

mitting to the qualified voters of said district the question of the issuance of \$200,000 bonds for the purpose of erecting and equipping school buildings and the purchase of sites therefor, and the levy of a tax for the payment thereof.

Section 2. That the territory within which the said election shall be held, being all of the territory embraced within the following boundaries and being and constituting the Greenville Graded School District, is as follows:

"That the boundaries of said graded school district shall begin on Tar River at the mouth of Smith's Run; thence Southwardly up the various courses of said run to the bridge across the same near the residence of L. C. Arthur, thence westwardly with the various courses of Town Branch under the railroad trestle to the Kingston Road; thence northwardly along the Kingston road to the old Plank road; thence northwardly a straight course to the junction of the Stantonsburg and Fair Grounds roads; thence northwardly along Stantonsburg road to the River road; thence northeastwardly across the ravine; thence down the ravine to Tar River, and thence down Tar River to the beginning."

Section 3. That for said election a new registration of the voters of said district is hereby ordered, and for such purpose the registration books for said new registration shall be kept open between the hours of nine o'clock a. m. and sunset each day (Sunday excepted) from the 3rd day of March 1924, to the 22nd day of March, 1924, both inclusive. On each Saturday during the period of new registration above set forth the registrar shall attend with his registration book at the polling place hereinafter set forth for the registration of voters.

Section 4. That for said new registration and election Mr. Luther Bowling is hereby designated and appointed registrar and Mrs. J. E. Winslow and Mr. Gay Smith judges and the polling place for said district is designated as the court house in the Town of Greenville.

Section 5. That a copy of this ordinance, signed by the Mayor and Clerk of this board, shall be published as a notice of said new registration at least once, not later than February 20th, 1924, and at least three times as a notice of said election, the first publication to be not later than February 29th, 1924. That the said publications of new registration and election shall be made in The Daily Reflector, a newspaper published in the Town of Greenville and circulating in the said district.

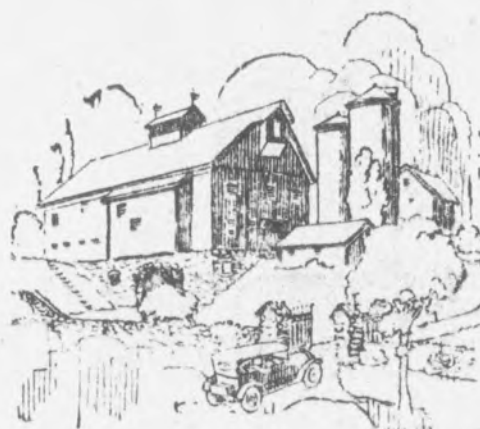
