

Virginia Corporation Commission Calls Off Its Freight Rate Fight

Withdraws Complaint That North Carolina Rates Discriminatory Against Va. Shippers

Raleigh, March 5.—The North Carolina Corporation Commission was today officially notified that the complaint made by the Virginia Corporation Commission asking for a reduction in rates from Virginia cities to North Carolina points or an increase in the North Carolina intra state rates has been withdrawn. While the complaint was never docketed before the commission it has been before the federal body for several months and Governor Morrison had employed W. T. Bynum, of Greensboro, and P. W. McMullan, of Elizabeth City, to appear with the commission in defense of the state's interests.

The letter was received early today and soon thereafter was read by Chairman Lee to Governor Morrison over the telephone.

"Bully" was the governor's comment.

Washington, March 5.—Correspondence laid before the Interstate Commerce Commission contending that the intra state rates in North Carolina were discriminatory against Virginia shippers was withdrawn today. The action while the complaint had been laid before the commission had never formally been started.

Recent Bad Weather Affects Employment

Raleigh, March 5.—Bad weather of the past week affected greatly the employment on conditions of the state according to the reports of the various offices throughout the state which were made to M. L. Shipman, North Carolina director of the State-Federal Employment Service. Anticipation had been that the week would result in the continued upward progress of the employment service in the number of placements made and in their classification, however according to the reports, the week was a complete surprise and disappointment to the various offices, due to the general prevention of outdoor work by the bad weather, but an upward trend looked from immediately.

Employment placements fell below the previous by approximately 100. All classes of labor with the exception of industrial fell below the previous week's registration and placements and the industrial had only an increase of one applicant.

Unskilled labor seems to be the greatest surplus while skilled labor is also plentiful at present and clerical workers still are more numerous than can be placed, according to the district superintendents' reports.

A number of the employment station look for better conditions this week and in the near future. They also prophesy that good weather and the new building programs that are now planned will greatly alleviate the depressed labor conditions that are now prevailing.

Charlotte and Wilmington had a close race for first place in the number of placements during the week ended March 1. Wilmington winning by only one placement with 113 placements while Charlotte had 112. However Charlotte placed 15 women to Wilmington's fourteen. Asheville was third with a total of 101 placements of which 78 were men and 23 were women. Winston-Salem came fourth with 59 men and 33 women making a total of 92 placements. Raleigh led all other cities in the placement of women with 36 women placed and 41 men placed, a total of 77 giving Raleigh fifth place in the line for total number of placements. Greensboro dropped to sixth place this week with a total number of placements of 49 of which 36 were men and 13 were women.

Registrations totaled 774, there being 558 men applicants and 216 women; while the requests for help numbered 640 of which 465 were men and 175 were women. The total number of placements was 544 against 636 for the week previous. Of the placements during the week ended March 3, there were 410 men and 134 women. Oil Com. Examines More Telegrams

Effort Being Made To Establish Identity of "Principal" Mentioned in Telegrams

Washington, March 5.—While the committee obtained more important information in the investigation of telegrams today opposition developed to the confirmation of Samuel Knight as special government counsel in litigation to recover California oil lands from the Standard Oil Company of California.

Senator Walsh of Montana, announced that he was reliably informed that Knight was counsel for the Equitable Trust Company, of New York, a Rockefeller bank. According to this information, Walsh said, Knight is now engaged in litigations in California for the trust company. He added that if the story proved correct that it would be a basis of opposition to Knight's confirmation by the Senate.

Knight was selected by President Coolidge to bring action under the resolution offered by Walsh unanimously adopted by the House and Senate. Walsh was not consulted in the selection.

Foregoing the usual public hearings the committee examined telegrams sent here from Palm Beach and found further reference to the "Principal" mentioned in one of the McLean telegrams previously read into the record. Some of the committee members said that these telegrams may contain information of great importance. Every effort is being made to establish identity to the "principal" mentioned in the messages.

Washington, March 5.—The special Senate committee appointed to investigate Attorney General Daugherty called into private conference today John W. H. Crim who was in charge of the recent Veterans' Bureau hearings in Chicago.

Mr. Crim's advice was sought as to proceedings toward procuring evidence regarding the Attorney General from the Department of Justice. The committee also wants information as to the two House members who are charged with taking money to secure pardons for federal prisoners. The evidence developed by the grand jury hearings in Chicago it was thought could throw some light as to why Attorney General Daugherty appeared before the grand jury before it made its report.

Two House Members Charged With Accepting Money to Secure Pardons

Washington, March 5.—Not only charges against two members of Congress but evidence relating to other suggestions of wrong doing by officials in Washington as well will be laid before the federal grand jury here immediately.

White House officials said today that all phases of evidence adduced by the recent Chicago jury but which was not passed upon because of lack of jurisdiction will be gone into by the grand jury here.

The subjects supposed to come under the inquiry are investigation of charges that one or more officials have used official information for the purpose of speculation; that liquor permits have been wrongfully secured by the use of money and that paroles by federal prisoners were obtained through bribery.

For the present no officials will discuss the details of these charges or disclosed in what direction the inquiry might lead.

The developments have created a stir in official circles secondly only to that caused by the first announcement of the oil disclosures.

President Coolidge announced last night that the charges that two members of Congress had accepted bribes to obtain release of federal prisoners would be investigated immediately by a grand jury. Prior to that announcement the Senate Veterans' committee had held two sessions to consider the charges and a resolution for immediate investigation had been introduced in the House.

John W. H. Crim had conferred with members of both the Senate and House regarding the findings of the Chicago jury but declined to furnish the names of the two members against whom the charges are made or to give any further details taking the position that the evidence required further development before anything could be divulged.

The developments were the outcome of the federal grand jury Veterans' Bureau investigation in Chicago which resulted incidentally in the indictment against Charles R. Forbes former director of the Veterans' Bureau.

Crim has reported the matter to the White House leaving it up to the president to take whatever action he deems necessary.

It was indicated today that the chief executive was prepared to demand a complete sifting of the evidence regardless of who might be involved.

Says Time Not Yet Come For Philippines Separate From U. S.

Washington, March 5.—President Coolidge informed the Philippine Independence Mission today that in his opinion the time has not yet come for separation of the Philippines from the United States.

In a letter to Manuel Roxas, chairman of the mission, he also declared that the United States government has full confidence in the ability, good intentions, fairness and sincerity of Governor General Wood. In the present state of world relationship, the letter said, the American government owes an obligation of continued protection to the people of these islands.

AMERICANS GIVE GENEROUSLY TO AID FRENCH WAR ORPHANS

Paris.—Americans have aided 286,000 French war orphans during the nine years work of the Fraternal Franco-American, it was reported at the annual meeting of the society recently. Feference was made to the splendid work started in America in 1916 by two English women, Miss Schofield and Miss Fall, resulting in nearly 200 committees being formed in the United States.

The American organization of "Fatherless Children of France" was disbanded five years ago and its work was taken over by the Fraternal Franco-American. Since then it has received from the United States 7,500,000 francs and an equal sum direct from the American god-parents of their proteges.

THE FLAG ON OUR POSTOFFICE

A suggestion has been made that we start a campaign to raise funds to aid the government in purchasing a new flag for the local postoffice.

The flag that now flies over our postoffice has faded and is so dirty and ragged that it can hardly be recognized as the Stars and Stripes. To fly such a flag is a disgrace to the city, the building over which it flies and the great government that it represents and the department should be urged to furnish a new flag for the building or authorize the local custodian to fly no flag at all.

PROVIDE A PLACE FOR RECREATION

Wilmington has recently adopted a plan of setting aside certain sections of some of its streets at certain hours to be used by the children of the city for skating. During these hours officers see that no vehicular traffic enters the recreation zone and no skaters are allowed outside the zone. This measure was decided upon in an effort to eliminate the accidents that frequently occur as a result of children skating among the traffic on the streets and is proving to be very effective.

In the absence of places of recreation for our children, Greenville would do well to follow the example of Wilmington by zoning its streets to provide a place for the children. Ordinances should then be passed prohibiting skating on streets other than those included in the recreation zones. In this way the number of accidents could be cut down and the constant danger to life of the children removed.

BUREAUCRACY, LABOR'S ENEMY

According to recently published statements, Samuel Gompers, now and for more than forty years head of the American Federation of Labor, recently sounded a warning against political control and manipulation of industry.

"I greatly fear a political bureaucracy," he said. "The portent of such a great machine is alarming."

"Our government, which, as an institution, I regard as the best in the world, is thoroughly competent in the realm of political affairs and it is just as thoroughly incompetent outside of that realm."

"Any effort to reconcile the political machine with varied industrial divisions and requirements of the country can result only in most hopeless complication and conflict."

"I have said repeatedly, and I believe I voice the overwhelming sentiment of the organized wage earners, that political government is incompetent to direct industry."

"It is my belief that if the masses of our people were fully conscious of what is taking place there would be less clamor for governmental domination of industry."

NEED OF LEADERSHIP

The party politicians have pretty thoroughly stripped the voter of his independence of his courage.

Glenn Frank has conceived the ideal President and describes him in "The Man Who Should be President" in the January Century.

He says: "The next President should be a man of courage, should live intellectually and morally enough above the battle of politics to enable him to think and to act with the requisite realism and courage."

"The service such a President could render would help us to break the paralysis that has fallen upon American politics. He would help us reinvest the political process with reality. There is nothing more certain than that representative government is doomed unless we do away with the anonymous blackmail which our democracy practices on its political leadership, with the result that courage gives way to cowardice and the statesman turns politician."

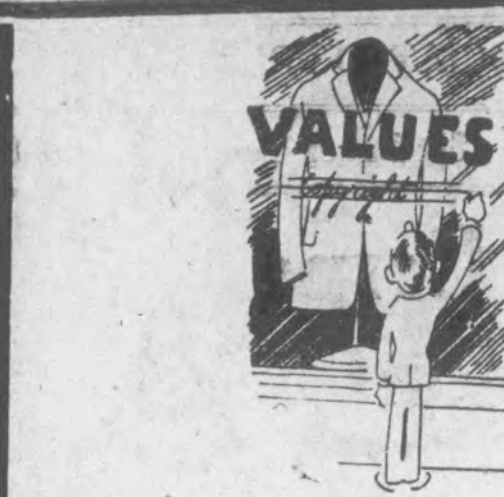

A Visit to The Poultry Farm of Mr. James Hines

For some time the writer has wanted to visit the poultry farm of Mr. Jas. M. Hines, which is located on the farm of Mr. Hines on the north side of Tar river. Leaving the Greenville-Bethel had surface road at V. C. Fleming & Company's Store and driving in a westerly direction, the place was reached within a few minutes time.

Custom Hatching and Baby Chicks

Some weeks ago Mr. Hines purchased a 9,000 capacity Newton Incubator, triple deck. On February

9th, 3,000 eggs were placed in this mammoth incubator; 3,000 set on February 16th and 3,000 on February 23rd. Mr. Hines is doing a custom hatching business as well as setting eggs from his farm and selling chicks. This incubator is installed in a brick house 16 x 40 feet, which is two stories in height, the first floor, which is a cellar, is where the incubator is placed and a feed room above. Orders are coming fast said Mr. Hines.

Brooder House.

Adjoining the incubator house is a brooder house 16 x 20 feet and a capacity of 7,000. This house, which is nearing completion, is modern in every sense of the word and doubtless represents a larger investment than any other equipment in eastern North Carolina. With cement floors and well ventilated, the building stands as a result of a vision of the poultry game in this section of the state. It was built in keeping with plans furnished by the poultry department of the State College of Agriculture at Raleigh.

Breeding Pens.

There are 12 breeding pens, 20 x 200 feet—double yards. These pens or yards will be kept in grain of
