

Cooperative Association Received Jolt Supreme Court During Yesterday

RALEIGH, N. C., March 6.—Invoking the principle that he who comes into equity must do so with clean hands" the North Carolina Supreme Court held yesterday that the Tobacco Growers' Co-operative Association cannot obtain an injunction to enforce delivery of a member's crop when it has not settled with the member for the preceding year and when the member needs the money from his crop to buy necessary supplies.

Opinions handed down yesterday included two victories for the Co-ops but the defeat looms much larger and is regarded as the most important opinion affecting the association since the original decision the law under which the association is chartered to be valid and its contract with members to be binding.

The case in which the association received its severe jolt by a unanimous decision of the court was that against J. L. Bland, of Craven county. At the hearing below it developed that the defendant had delivered all of his 1922 crop and two-thirds of his 1923 crop to the association, it further developed that the value of the 1922 crop on the open market would have been about \$1,500 and that at the time of the hearing the defendant had received only about \$800. There was also evidence that the association had deducted \$36.80 from advances to plaintiff on account of failure to deliver tobacco of his tenants. The Supreme court has already held that this deduction was illegal and that a member is not responsible for delivery of tobacco of his tenants and this deduction was made the basis of the action of Judge J. Lloyd Horton in dissolving the injunction.

The Supreme court in its opinion yesterday, which was written by Justice W. A. Hoke holds that this breach of the contract was not material and in view of the association's tender of a refund does not constitute ground for dissolving the injunction.

The contract of the association with its members does not specify when payments are to be made but leaves that matter to the discretion of the directors. Judge Horton based his order entirely on the deduction of the \$36.80 but the Supreme court takes a contrary view. "While we are of the opinion as stated that the facts as now presented would not uphold a finding of bad faith on the part of the association and its management, it does not at all follow that on this record the court should continue an injunction to the hearing in aid of the plaintiff's suit," declares the opinion, which holds that the failure to settle while preventing an injunction "is not of sufficient proportionate importance to justify an entire severance of the contract relation."

After setting forth the facts, Judge Hoke has the following to say in regard to the association's position. "True, plaintiff has made denial as to the amount due on the crop of 1922 or that there is anything due, but considering the fact that plaintiff kept or should have kept proper entries showing what has been done with the crop of 1922 and that plaintiff or its officers and agents had access to its books, its statements as to the disposition of the crop of 1922 and its denial of the amount due are entirely too general for a court to look with favor or to act on them."

The action in dissolving the injunction is justified as follows: "It is recognized that one who invokes in this way the equitable powers of the court for the protection of his rights must not by his own breach of duty have caused the injuries or threat of them, of which he complains, a position to some extent embodied in the more familiar maxim 'that he who comes into equity must do so with clean hands.' Judge Hoke distinguishes between the case at bar and those in which restraining orders were continued by declaring that in those cases the defendants were intransigent to the association while the defendant Bland had done all in his power to perform the contract.

Such a situation was presented in one of the cases decided yesterday, in which Judge Horton dissolved an injunction against Pete Spikes, of Craven county, on the ground that

Epidemic of Measles Now Under Control In Forsyth County

Winston-Salem, March 6.—The epidemic of measles which started drying December last in Forsyth county has about run its course and is now well under control, according to information given out at the office of the county health department here. Only a few counties are said to be still in the midst of the epidemic. The announcement stated that a total of 1095 cases of measles had been reported in Forsyth county since the epidemic started. Two hundred cases were reported in January while in February the number dropped to 427 and the daily reports have decreased in number of cases since the beginning of this month. These cases were handled exclusively by the county health department and do not include any cases that might have been in Winston-Salem.

The fact as to the execution of the contract was in dispute. Judge Horton is reversed in a brief opinion written by Judge Hoke.

The association also won a victory by approval of its verdict against G. H. Pittman, which was won after a long fight before a Pitt county jury last August.

Pittman attacked the contract on these grounds, alleged failure of the association to secure the necessary sign-up, fraud in procuring his signature and mismanagement of the association. A jury found for the association on the fraud issue, and the judge set aside an adverse verdict on the sign-up issue on a question of law agreement issue to the jury.

The association contended that Pittman should have read his contract and in support of this position Chief Justice Clark says: "There is not necessity of going over the well settled law in a case where the plaintiff had the fullest opportunity to read the paper before signing and where there is no evidence that there was fraud or device to prevent him from reading the same."

FORBES PLEADS NOT GUILTY OF CHARGES

Placed Under Bond of \$10,000 for Appearance Federal Court

Washington, March 6.—Charles R. Forbes, former director of the Veterans Bureau plead not guilty before the United States commissioner to charges of fraud, conspiracy and bribery handed down by Chicago grand jury. A bond was fixed at ten thousand dollars for his appearance in federal court at Chicago, March 17.

R. H. Thomas Now Pursuing Course to Get M. A. Degree

Raleigh, March 6.—Roy H. Thomas Supervisor of District Agricultural Education for the State of North Carolina is now in the Agricultural School at Cornell University where he is pursuing a course leading to the securing of his M. A. degree. Mr. Thomas will remain at Cornell until June when he receives his degree from the Graduate School.

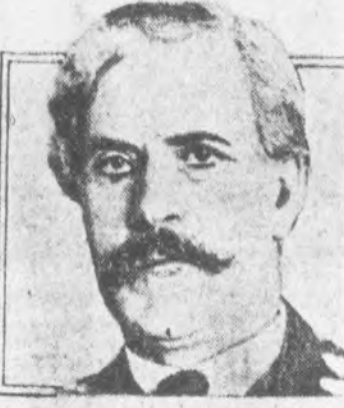

Morrison Paroled Land, Sentenced 10 Months on Roads

Raleigh, March 6.—Governor Cameron Morrison, has paroled B. N. Land who was convicted of violating the prohibition laws at September term of the McDowell Superior court, and was sentenced to serve 10 months in the county roads. On February 26, the Governor granted the prisoner a 30 day parole in order that he could visit his sick child. Since then it has been brought to the attention of the executive that the prisoner has only 19 more days to serve. Governor Morrison has paroled the defendant for the remainder of his term on the grounds that the time over the 30 days parole is very short.

Upon the recommendation of Solicitor B. L. Huffman, and a number of medical men, Governor Morrison has granted a further respite to T. E. Lippard who is under bond, in order that he may continue to receive treatment until April 1, 1924. Lippard is from Catawba county.

North Carolina's Plan Teaching Agriculture Great Favor at Cornell

Raleigh, Mar. 6.—The plan of teaching agriculture in the district high schools that is now in use in North Carolina is in great favor at the Agricultural College at Cornell University, according to a letter received by T. E. Brown, Director of Vocational Education for the State of North Carolina, from Roy H. Thomas, District Supervisor of Agricultural Education, who is now at Cornell University completing his work for his M. A. degree.

Mr. Thomas writes that the Agricultural School at Cornell has endorsed the plan now in use in North Carolina for teaching agriculture in the district high schools and that representatives from all parts of the United States have expressed their approval of the plan and that many of the representatives have stated that their respective states were in hearty accord with the present system. He states further that many other states were planning to inaugurate the same system as that which is now used in North Carolina.

Washington, March 6.—Agreement to report a soldier bonus bill was voted sixteen to three by the House Ways and Means committee today.

Trial of Suit for \$100,000 Against Candler Began Today

Decatur, Ga., March 6.—The trial of the suit for \$100,000 against Walter T. Candler, son of the Atlanta millionaire soft drink manufacturer, was called in superior court here today.

Mrs. Byfield's suit arose out of a European trip taken by a party including Mrs. Byfield, her husband, Clyde F. Byfield, the defendant and his two children.

The plaintiff charges in her petition that while aboard the steamer enroute to Europe that on July 17, 1922 she had been attacked by the defendant in her state room. Her screams, the petition sets out, brought her husband to her aid. The two men then engaged, the petition stated, in a fist fight.

Washington, March 6.—Cancellation of government oil leases to Doheny and Sinclair interests will be sought in bills of equity to be filed by the government oil counsel next week. The bill will ask for the return of naval reserves to the government on grounds that "fraud and illegality" were involved.

Washington, March 6.—A telegram from President Coolidge to Edward B. McLean in Florida was read into the oil committee records today.

The message sent on January 12 said: "Prescott is away. Advise Slemph with whom I shall confer." Signed - CALVIN COOLIDGE.

Slemph was at that time in Palm Beach. Members of the committee declared that they did not know the identity of "Prescott" referred to.

A short time before the committee heard the reading of this telegram a message from chief doorkeeper McGeener advising McLean on December 22 that Slemph would leave that night for the south, had been read.

The exchange of messages read showed that Albert B. Fall on Jan. 10 had wired Chairman Lenroot from Palm Beach asking to know "has Walsh the authority to subpoena me to testify?" and he got a response saying that he had not.

Senator Walsh had gone to Florida to question McLean but the committee records show that he was not asked to summon such witnesses as he might desire.

More telegrams were read by the oil committee today in its public hearing. Another of the "Mary" messages in code was read and like the former was addressed to W. O. Duckstein, confidential man of McLean at Palm Beach. The telegram said, "Burns states lawyer friendly to the department said inquiry on foot to ascertain whether McLean regularly appointed dollar a year man. Asked him to find out. Department lawyer came to Burns and inquired. Burns said Attorney General only person who could give information regarding such appointment. Evidently preparing for mudslinging. Burns states impossible say when can get away. Being kept here for some hearing. Department liable be called to prepare some cases."

Says Republicans Are Trying to Undermine Confidence in Com.

Washington, March 6.—A deliberate campaign by the Republican party to undermine public confidence in committee which will investigate the department of justice was charged in Senate by Harrison, Democrat, of Mississippi.

Committee to Seek Joint Resolution In Reduction of Taxes

Washington, March 6.—Senate finance committee has decided to seek immediate enactment of a joint resolution provided for 25 per cent. reduction in personal income taxes payable this year so that it may apply on installments due March 15.

Declines to Give Tax Returns Those In Oil Investigation

Washington, March 6.—President Coolidge has declined to turn over to the oil committee the tax returns of individuals and corporations prominently mentioned in the oil investigation. Replying to the Senate resolution making the request, the President said he had been advised by acting attorney general that he was without authority to comply.

Manila Cigar Exports Increase.

Manila.—There were 219,702,339 cigars, valued at \$5,500,000 exported to the United States during 1923. In 1922 experts totaled 174,186,263 cigars valued at \$4,000,000.

OUR ONLY HOPE

Viewing the present Congressional campaign the Elizabeth City Independent in an editorial commenting upon the chances of the various candidates declares that so long as Pitt county remains a part of the First Congressional District just so long will the impossibility to elect a candidate from the North of Albemarle section of the District be an impossibility.

The comment in part says:
"The First Congressional District of North Carolina will elect a Congressman from the North side of Albemarle Sound when Pitt

County is taken out of the First Congressional District and placed in the Second District where it properly belongs. Pitt County might as well be as remote from Pasquotank, Camden, Currituck, Perquimans, Chowan and Gates as Brunswick, Guilford and Rowan are. The people of Pitt and these upper counties are just as much strangers to one another as are the people of Currituck in the extreme East and Cherokee in the extreme West. They have no local interests in common, no commercial, financial or social ties whatsoever. There has been little intercourse between the people of Pitt and these upper counties because of heretofore insurmountable physical barriers, or, more properly speaking impassable bridges.

But of the 21,461 votes cast by the fourteen counties in the First Congressional district in the general election of 1920. Pitt polled 4,156, or one-fifth of the total poll of the entire district of fourteen counties. And Pitt lies next door to Beaufort with its vote of 3,559 polls. The two counties are next door neighbors, their interests are mutual, they know and understand one another, and they pull together.

The eight counties North of Albemarle Sound polled only 7,618 votes in the election of 1920; that is less than the votes polled by the counties of Pitt and Beaufort alone. Here are great determining political facts.

Until the counties North of Albemarle Sound can poll a vote as big as the combined vote of Pitt and Beaufort, these counties will be unable to elect a Congressman against the united opposition of those larger counties. And, as with the growth of Beaufort and Pitt keeps pace with the growth of the counties of this Northern region, about the only hope of this Northern region electing a Congressman would be in the elimination of Pitt from the district.

That is why I see no immediate hope for the nomination and election of an Elizabeth City or Edenton man, so long as Beaufort and Pitt are united on a candidate of their own. And there is no discounting the fact that Beaufort and Pitt are united in the present campaign on the candidacy of Lindsay C. Warren of Beaufort. It means that Warren will get the nomination."

Norway Village to Sell Reminder Kaisers Visit

Christiania.—One by one the many reminders of his imperial presence which the former German kaiser distributed in the many places he visited, are disappearing. Those fortunate enough to escape the wrath of the kaiser during the war are succumbing now to other causes. The latest will probably be the statue presented by the ex-Kaiser to the little village of Balestrand in the famous Sogne Fjord.

When the ex-emperor visited Balestrand near which the scenes in the Fridtjof Saga are laid, he presented the village with a statue of the Norwegian legendary hero, Fridtjof.

The statue was unveiled in the presence of the donor and the king of Norway, but when the draperies fell they revealed a very Germanic conception of the hero, massive in proportion and clumsy in posture. Much criticism has been directed against it and now a Balestrand councilman has come forward with the suggestion that it be sold and the proceeds given to some charitable institution now work to relieve the distress in Germany.

HOUSING PROBLEM IN LONDON CAUSED BY INSECTS

London.—Dr. C. J. Gahan, of the Natural History Museum here, is faced with a grave housing problem because he has not enough room in his department for all the insects which people keep sending him.

There are more than three million insects accommodated in his department and now he has been placed in a quandary because he cannot find accommodation for an additional batch of 17,000 beetles which has just been sent him.

To people who doubt that there are so many beetles in existence, Dr. Gahan points out that there are roughly 200,000 species, of which the museum has on an average ten specimens of each.

"Some of the beetles are 150 years old—or 150 dead," said Dr. Gahan. "They appear to be as good as ever and look as if they will last for another 150 years, although we use no preservative."

Declares Senseless Rules May Divert The Turkish Trade

London.—What is said to be the declining importance of Constantinople as the centre of the transit trade for the Near East has been engaging the serious attention of all sections of the commercial community in that port, says The European Commercial, and Turkish merchants have begun to realize the evil effects of the present policy of the Angora government on the trade of the country. The journal continues:

"It is the unanimous opinion of shipping and mercantile circles in Turkey that, if no amelioration takes place in the present situation brought by a constant stream of vexatious and often senseless restrictions and regulations, the importance of Constantinople as a transit and coaling centre will be ruined."

"Owing to the domination of trade with Russia and Anatolia, the commercial importance of Constantinople was necessarily adversely affected in any event; but the Turkish government is now faced with the mortifying spectacle of the remaining trade of the port being diverted to Greece and Port Said, where every encouragement is given to coaling and transit trade."

France May Fertilize Her Own Wheat Field

Havre.—The ministry of agriculture is concerned about the heavy buying of nitrate in Chili by the United States.

Before the war the European countries were the big buyers of Chilean nitrates, and the American market then was unimportant. Later the Americans have become large purchasers on account of the intense development of their agriculture. Last August the importation of nitrates into the United States reached 150,000 tons, according to the ministry, where in the corresponding month of 1922 it was only 42,000 tons. France, owing to the lack of nourishing compounds in the land, is obliged to import every year some millions of tons of grain. Each ton of nitrate sent to the United States represents about three tons of wheat which eventually will be sold to France, so that it would be preferable for the latter to buy the corresponding amount of nitrate.

President exchange rates favor American buyers, and if French farmers are to hold their own against serious American competition they will have to employ a larger quantity of fertilizers in order to turn out bigger crops, and by this means reduce the high cost of living.

CHILD health centers and medical clinics are co-operating in a nation-wide movement to induce parents to have their children Schick Tested. The object of the campaign is to 44 the country of the diphtheria scourge. The Schick reaction is an accurate method of determining whether a child is susceptible to the disease. Over 150,000 pupils in New York schools have been tested, and those found not immune were protected by toxin-antitoxin treatments against the diphtheria germ.

Encouraged by this demonstration, the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, through its sixteen thousand managers and agents in the field, is distributing all over the United States and Canada, millions of pamphlets describing the tests, calling attention to the high mortality rate from diphtheria and urging help in routing childhood's most dangerous enemy by having

children immunized by the toxin-antitoxin treatments. The test itself is described as a simple injection in the skin of the arm. If, after a few days, a red spot appears where the injection was made, the child is susceptible to diphtheria. Such children are then protected by the toxin-antitoxin injections. The above photograph shows a line-up of boys undergoing the experiment in a New York clinic.

The tests, conducted in Manhattan and Brooklyn by the city health department, established the fact that not all children are susceptible to the disease. It was definitely proved that some children were protected by nature and could never contract diphtheria, while others were susceptible to it. In this latter class, the test was followed by toxin-antitoxin treatment, consisting of three injections, one each week, for three weeks.

Statistics show that diphtheria is foremost among the fatal diseases

in children from 3 to 5, and ranks third among the fatal illnesses of babies from 1 to 3. Annually more than 200,000 cases are reported and about 20,000 die of the disease.

Except in New York and Chicago where physicians have conducted the Schick demonstrations on a large scale, diphtheria occupies a foremost place among the communicable diseases. Yet in a recent report on the subject, it is made plain that science possesses a more complete power over it than in the case of any other contagious disease.

No diphtheria has developed among Schick Tested New York school children, figures show. The value of the injections is revealed by the fact that five times as many cases of suspected diphtheria have developed among those who were not tested as among those in the same schools who were tested, and when necessary inoculated following the test with toxin-antitoxin.

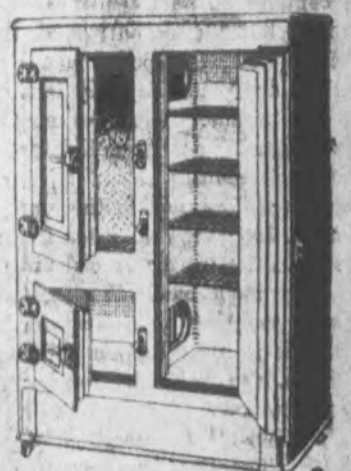

Standardized Layettes Assure Modern Baby Correct Wardrobe; Health Agency Gives Patterns



STANDARDIZED layettes assure the baby of 1924 that he will be as well, and as comfortably dressed on the day he makes his advent into the world, as he will at 21, when tailors and haberdashers cater to his sartorial needs.

Health authorities agree that the modern infant's wardrobe is an important feature of the plans made for his arrival. Consequently, it is no surprise to learn that many visiting nurses include a full course of sewing instructions in their program of prenatal service.

Among other health agencies, the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company is carrying on an intensive campaign of education for the expectant mother. Visiting nurses in 4,033 cities and towns in this country and Canada are giving prenatal and post-natal care. The company's nursing service handled over 100,000 maternity cases last year.

French Canada was foremost among the territories having a large percentage of maternal cases last year, 60 per cent. of the nursing visits being of that kind. Nurses, working directly for the company, or under arrangements with local nursing associations, expect to develop the prenatal work on even broader lines during the coming year than has been possible in the past.

One of the objects of this work is to assist mothers during the trying prenatal period, not only by looking after their physical needs, but by advice and encouragement regarding preparations for the new baby. The making of layettes is an example of this feature of the service. Patterns for baby clothes may be had on request.

This help is especially appreciated by foreign-born mothers in crowded industrial centers. Modern welfare programs carried out by public health nurses, are gradually eliminating the dread with which mothers formerly viewed the advent of a new baby.

The Metropolitan nursing service was maintained during 1923 at a cost of \$1,759,151. The company has 1,403 nursing centers, 379 being in the New England States.

During the coming year, in co-operation with other health organizations, and with the full approval of the medical fraternity, the Metropolitan will increase its efforts to reduce the maternal death rate in this country. In the past the average has been 20,000 deaths a year. Visiting nurses will see the expectant mother once a month from the time a case is reported until confinement. Following the birth of a child, both mother and baby will be cared for daily for eight days. If complications develop, the nurse is privileged to extend the period.

Exposition Committee Meets in Goldsboro

The Exposition Committee met in Goldsboro Tuesday of this week and disposal of some very important matters incident to the Second Annual Show, which will be held in Kinston, the week of April 7th. The Secretary reported splendid progress being made on the program and stated that every indication pointed to a real big success, provided the weather is suitable.

Cash Prizes Offered for Parades

The committee agreed to offer the following cash prizes for the best floats in the parades. The parade on Monday April 7th will be open to any organization, institution, individual or firm in the territory covered by the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce. The first prize will be \$100.00; second \$75.00 third \$50.00. These prizes will certainly attract a good aggregation of floats for this parade.

School Parade, Friday April 11

The school parade last year proved one of the biggest events of the whole Exposition. It was estimated that there were about 10,000 school children in the parade. "For the grade in the city system of Kinston that puts on the best parade will be given \$25.00 cash; second \$15.00; third \$10.00. For the school in Lenoir county bringing the largest percentage of the enrollment to the parade, \$50.00; second \$25.00 third \$15.00; for the school outside of Lenoir county bringing the largest percentage of its attendance to the parade, \$50.00; second \$25.00, third, \$15.00. This of course means that the children must actually take part in the parade. With the excellent roads leading out from Kinston, the adjoining counties should have good large representation in this parade.

Special Program Friday for Children

In addition to the special program by Cervone's band, the committee is now working on a program that will take in several of the children in Kinston, for a special feature Friday afternoon.

The executive committee of the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce met in Goldsboro Tuesday afternoon for its regular monthly meeting. Mr. Geo. C. Royall of Goldsboro was present and presided over the meeting.

Bell Weevil Campaign Stressed

One very important matter handled was a contract made with the American Cotton Association, with headquarters at St. Matthews, S. C. Mr. J. S. Wanamaker, Pres. whereby the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce will get the benefit of the field men sent out by this organization to carry on field tests in the boll weevil counties. The Eastern Chamber took over a minimum of thirty stations in the 46 counties covered by this organization and will have a maximum of 230 for the territory. These tests call for a 10 acre plot to be cultivated, and poisoned under the direction of American Cotton Association, and the Eastern Chamber. The American Cotton Association has been the recipient of

Public Health Organizations Promote Nation-wide Movement For Fewer Deaths, Longer Life

WHY die at 55, the average span accredited to man by life insurance companies, when it is possible to live to be 65 with not one bit more knowledge of medicine than we now have?

This is the question health authorities are putting squarely up to the American citizen. In 1910, the average man could safely count on living to be 51 years old. Since then, science has succeeded in adding four years to the average life and doctors, apparently, are working on the theory that the present average can be considerably lengthened before another ten years have rolled around.

One of the steps in this direction is the prevention of deaths which result from post-natal or avoidable causes. Statistics of the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company show that entirely too many people die before their time.

Automobile accidents increase each year. Reports further show a large number of railroad accidents, deaths from accidental drowning, and about 13,000 deaths from falls. Burns cause approximately 6,000 deaths a year, while poison from food, drugs and gas carry off at least 4,000 persons.

The medical fraternity is not only endeavoring to improve conditions which are subject to control by modern public health procedures, but in their efforts to prolong life they are fostering a nation-wide movement for periodical examination. Organizations throughout the country are co-operating in this campaign.

Other activities in an extensive program of health education the Metropolitan is endeavoring to reduce the excessive maternal mortality rate in this country. Deaths from childbirth averaging 20,000 a year. Public health nurses, maintained in 4,033 cities and towns, either by special arrangement with local nursing associations, or as direct representatives of the company, furnish the necessary prenatal service in cases



of this kind, and also take care of the mother and child after confinement.

In its life conservation campaign, the company emphasizes the necessity of yearly medical examination, widespread education regarding communicable diseases, and a safety first program to prevent accidents of all kinds.
