FIRE DESTROYS 15 STORES, OFFICES WYTHEVILLE, VA.

Wytheville, Va., Mar. 8.—More than 15 stores and offices including the First National Bank building and two mercantile establishments were destroyed by fire that started in the heart of the Wytheville business district today and was still beyond control several hours later.

The flames which started on the north side of Main Street, fanned by high winds enveloped structure after structure and then spread to the south side of the street. The section of town in which the flames are raging is composed mostly of frame structures although intermingled are several brick buildings put up in recent years.

Supporters of Ford Proposal Hold Whip Hand House Today

Washington, March 8.—Supporters of Henry Ford's Muscle Shoals proposal held the whip hand in the House today as consideration of the McKenize bill providing for acceptance of the Ford bid continued.

By a decisive margin the amendment offered by Representative Barton, Republican, Ohio, opponent of the Ford offer, was rejected. The amendment would require Ford to pay all repaid charges to dam number 2 and gates and locks and for maintenance instead of \$35,000 per year as proposed in the bill.

The bill was the first one of importance voted on today as leaders drove the House toward a final vote on the McKenize bill which is expected before night.

The Burton amendment was defeated by a vote of 82 to 48. Another proposed change similar to the Burton amendment was also rejected the vote being 81 to 38.

Winston Wants Holiday For School Children On Charles Aycock Day

Raleigh, March 8.—Judge Francis D. Winston, has declared that the children of North Carolina should be given an opportunity to pay tribute to the man who made it possible for them to have such fine schools today and urges that a holiday be from the schools be declared on Aycock day when the monument to the former governor and educator will be unveiled on the Capitol Square. Judge Winston said that at least 25,000 children should be present at the ceremonies. He also stated that he would ask the state school superintendent to declare a holiday so that these plans could be carried out.

175 Men Entombed Utah Mine Explosion

Castlegate, Utah., Mar. 8.—175 men employed on the city shift of Utah fuel mine number 2 were entombed in the main by an explosion at 9 o'clock this morning.

The explosion is believed to have been caused by dust. Smoke and dust are pouring from the mouth of the shaft and it cannot be determined whether or not the interior is afire. Details are lacking, according to Joseph Carnley, chief clerk, and it is not known whether there are any survivors. Rescue workers are now endeavoring to enter the mine, according to reports from company officials.

Refunds to be Made to North Carolinians By Revenue Dept.

Durham, March 8.—Out of the many thousands of dollars that have been erroneously collected by the United States Internal Revenue Department, much of the money will be returned to North Carolina and an exceptionally large portion in comparison will be returned to taxpayer citizens of this city. There are to be made refunds of many thousands of dollars on the 1922-23 report, says the Ways and Means committee of the Lower House of Congress. On the official list for returns to the North Carolina taxpayers appears the names of four parties within the city of Durham that aggregate a refund of more than \$25,000. They are Mrs. J. S. Carr, Jr., refund of \$17,345; Chatham Mills, \$1,833; and Perry-Horton Co., \$1,285 and First National Bank, \$5,000.

Reed Defeated In Missouri Primaries

St. Louis, Mo., March 8.—Ed A. Glenn, state manager for United States Senator James A. Reed, today stated that reports from yesterday's township and ward managers showed that the Senator was defeated in all parts of the state except Kansas City and St. Louis. So far as he is concerned, stated Glenn, he is ready to throw up the sponge. Senator Reed has declined to comment upon the results of yesterday's meetings.

Names Mentioned Grand Jury Report Not Be Disclosed

Washington, March 8.—On notice from the Department of Justice today that the names of the two representatives named in the Chicago grand jury report would not be disclosed at present at least, the House instructed its Judiciary committee to immediately recommend a course of action.

Attorney General Daugherty, called upon the House for the information, replied that he would not make public the names until evidence was in his possession pointing to the guilt of the members of Congress. Immediately after Daugherty's communication was read to the House Representative Zihlman, Republican from Sixth Maryland District, told the House that he had been informed by John W. H. Crim, government counsel in the Chicago grand jury investigation, that his name had been given to someone as one of the members involved. Zihlman emphatically denied that he was guilty of any wrong doing and called upon his colleagues to investigate the charges. He was applauded by the House as he concluded.

Browne Declares Cotton is King In North Carolina

Raleigh, March 7.—"Cotton is king in North Carolina," declared T. E. Browne, Director of Vocational Education in North Carolina, here today in explaining the undertaking of the present and the future plans of the School of Agriculture of the State College and the extension service to the agricultural high schools. "Not only is it the most valuable farm crop grown in the state," says Mr. Browne, "but it furnishes raw material for North Carolina's industrial development. Great emphasis is being put upon the best methods of growing cotton under boll weevil conditions, and the agricultural forces of the state feel justified in giving to cotton production a good portion of their interest. It is more and more becoming a fact that cotton growing is the business of the intelligent farmer, and no longer can we hope for results from the old combination of a man, a mule, and 25 acres of land and a few bags of fertilizer." The agricultural high schools, the extension force as well as the school of agriculture at State College are recognizing the need of trained men to handle the production of cotton and are devoting a large part of their energies to meeting its demand.

M'LEAN ANNOUNCES CANDIDACY FOR GOV.

Bailey Will Open Campaign With Speech in Raleigh

Raleigh, March 8.—In a brief statement here this morning A. W. McLean, of Lumberton, formally announced his candidacy for governor of North Carolina subject to the action of the Democratic primary and named W. J. Brogden, of Durham, as his campaign manager.

"I hereby announce my candidacy for governor of North Carolina," subject to the action of the Democratic primaries to be held June 7. Mr. Willis J. Brogden, of Durham, has agreed to manage my state campaign and will open headquarters in Raleigh at an early date. I will make a statement with respect to my position on the issues involved within the next week."

McLean, who was director of the War Finance Corporation for several years, is Democratic National Committeeman from North Carolina. He is a farmer, banker, lawyer, manufacturer and former president of the Virginia, Carolina and Southern railroads. He was born in Roberson county in 1870. McLean first entered politics when he was 21 years old being elected chairman of the Roberson county Democratic executive committee. He was a delegate at large at the National Democratic Convention of 1904 and was a member of the committee on rules. He was also delegate at large at the convention in Baltimore in 1912. He has been a member of the Democratic National Committee since 1916.

Willis J. Brogden, his campaign manager is a member of the law firm of Brogden, Reid and Bryant, of Durham, and is well known in political circles of the state.

With the announcement of McLean, two Democrats are now in the race for gubernatorial nomination, Josiah W. Bailey, of Raleigh, former Internal Revenue collector for the eastern district having announced his candidacy several weeks ago. Bailey will open his campaign in a speech here Monday night.

Committee Decides to Limit Bonus Paid Up Life Insurance

Washington, March 8.—Proposal to make full cash payment optional in the soldiers' bonus bill was voted down by the House Ways and Means committee which today decided to limit the payment of a bonus to paid up life insurance.

The vote was 13 against and 12 for the motion for cash option. The 11 Democrats on the committee supported the motion.

SEN. CURTIS DENIES PART TESTIMONY OF IRA BENNETT TODAY

Declares That He Is Not
"Principal" Referred
to in Telegrams to Ed-
ward D. McLean

Senator Curtis, Kansas, assistant Republican leader in the Senate, came voluntarily before the oil committee today to refute the testimony of Ira E. Bennett, that he is the person referred to in the celebrated "principal" telegram.

The Kansas Senator, the first member of the Senate to take the stand, was sworn and immediately began his oral statement similar to that issued yesterday in denial of several of the features of Bennett's testimony.

This telegram sent by Bennett on January 29 to his employer, Edward B. McLean, publisher of the Washington Post and central figure in the oil disclosures, said that Bennett had seen the "principal" and added that he had said there would be no reckoning of the boat and no resignations but that a reaction was expected from the unwarranted political attacks.

Senator Curtis testified that early in January Bennett had introduced him to John F. Major, another of McLean's employees, who had asked him to see Senator Walsh and find out if the committee would not take a statement from the publisher instead of calling him here to testify. Senator Curtis continued, that he suggested that they ask some Democratic Senator, either Underwood or Robinson about the matter, adding that he said he could speak to Chairman Lenroot. "Later in the day I saw Senator Underwood and was informed that a subpoena for McLean had been issued," said Curtis. So far as he could recall, Senator Curtis said, he had not seen Bennett again until the day after yesterday.

Norris, Republican, Nebraska, made a speech in the Senate mentioning a member of McLean's family. This was on January 30, he said, the day after the "principal" telegram was sent. He further stated that on the day of Senator Norris's address Bennett came to him with reference to having Senator Norris withdraw his remarks. Before he saw Bennett, Curtis testified, he had already suggested that Senator Norris's remarks be stricken from the records. He later saw Bennett, he said, and told him that the remarks had been withdrawn. Senator Curtis flatly denied that Bennett had delivered any message to him from McLean. He also declared that he had not talked with Bennett about the political aspects of the oil inquiry.

Bennett was then recalled and asked if he wished to make any further statement. "Certainly" was the answer to the question. "Senator Curtis apparently has forgotten one and probably two additional conversations I had with him," he said. Bennett said that he did not want to relate the conversations as they were somewhat personal. Pressed as to the conversations he said that he would not answer unless compelled to do so as he did not want to "spread scandal."

"I hope we won't have any mystery about it," said Senator Walsh. "Go on and tell us about it." Bennett again refused unless compelled to do so and the committee voted unanimously for him to answer.

The witness testified that Senator Curtis was asked for advice as to what the policy of the Post should be with regard to publishing matters concerning the oil inquiry. Later Bennett testified that Senator Curtis had advised President Coolidge immediately after he came into office to ask Attorney General Daugherty to resign.

Senator Curtis again taking the stand said that in December he had told President Coolidge that "I thought he would have to look for a new Attorney General in a few months as Daugherty was sick." "The Kansas Senator" declared emphatically, however, that he had never talked to Bennett as to the conduct of the Post in the oil cases either directly or indirectly.

Francis T. Homer, of Baltimore, took the stand and denied the statement in one of the McLean telegrams that he had suggested a direct wire

Parents should be informed about these things so the child will not be handicapped. The

Central Calif. Decides Start Planting Cotton

Merced, Cal.—Central California has joined the extreme southern part of the state in bidding for cotton production. Cotton is becoming a major crop in the San Joaquin Valley which stretches for more than 250 miles east and south of San Francisco.

During 1924, it was announced here during the recent visit of W. B. Camp of the United States department of agriculture, more than \$50,000 acres will be planted to cotton in this section. Land in the San Joaquin Valley, he said, produces an average of a bale of cotton for each acre planted. In 1923 10,000 acres were planted in Kern county, producing 12,000 bales.

The boll weevil, which is reducing cotton production in many sections of the country, does not thrive in the irrigated sections of the San Joaquin Valley, according to local experts, and the quality of the cotton is declared to be above the average.

Theatre Man's Promise Involves Mim in Lawsuit

Budapest.—The Hungarian courts have been asked to pass upon a breach of promise case involving a costly fur coat, the property of Miss Jeanne Marnae, an actress. The coat was stolen while she was appearing at a Budapest theatre and she held the theatre directors responsible because he had neglected to safeguard her effects while she was on the stage.

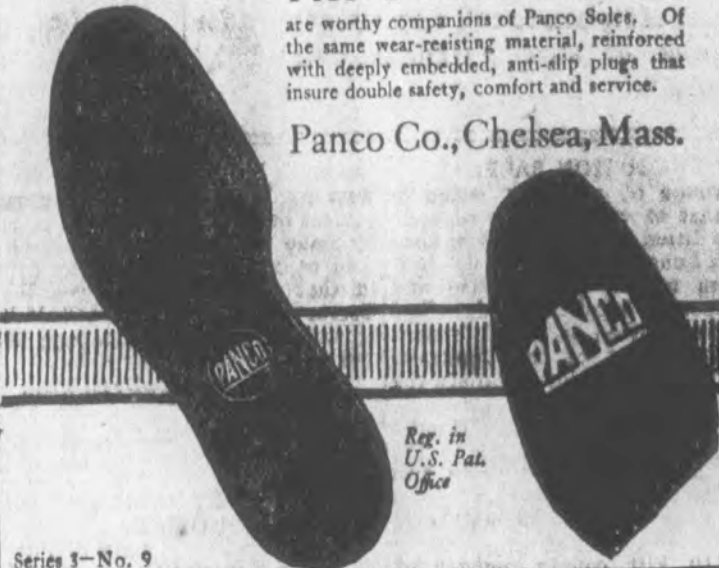

TO OUR REPRESENTATIVES

The only permanent solution of the freight rate problem is the establishment of water transportation. No less an authority than Governor Morrison expresses this view.

In our opinion the Governor has sounded the keynote to the situation. Eastern Carolina has suffered and is engaged now in a struggle to save itself from increased rates that would further hamper its business operations.

That the establishment of water transportation, for which Eastern Carolina's water frontage offers rare opportunity, will be the salvation of the tidewater section and a great help to the entire state, is the conclusion that our people have reached, if expressions we hear are to be taken as accurate indications.

There seems to be no question that the special legislative ship commission is going to have something to report that will be favorable to water transportation. Those in touch with the administration are apparently confident of this.

If the report is favorable we may expect Governor Morrison to call a special session for the purpose of "striking while the iron is hot," so to speak.

It is hoped that representatives of this section of the state will sense the sentiment of their constituency and stand by them when they have the opportunity of registering a blow for the establishment of water transportation for North Carolina.—Newbernian.

REPUBLICAN HOPES DIMINISHING

Republican politicians are without any hope that the public will have had time to forget the Teapot Dome oil scandal before the presidential campaign gets under way, following the conventions of the two big parties in June. The developments likely to come in the ordinary course of the Senatorial inquiry and of the activities of the Government's special counsel, it is foreseen, will be constant reminders of the mess between now and next November.

No one in Washington believes that the Senate Committee on Lands can complete its investigation of the oil leases and make its report earlier than March 15. It is thought more probable that the report will not be ready before April 1. The information and findings of the Committee, it is taken for granted, will be the subject of further debate and discussion in Congress and of additional publicity in the press.

The Coolidge Administration, it seems inevitable now, will be haunted by Teapot Dome before and during and after their convention. The one task of dealing with the scandal in the Republican platform, politicians feel, will test the ingenuity of the "best minds" left in the Republican party.

Gloom Rules in Liverpool Over Shipping Conditions

Liverpool.—From the point of view of shipping, 1923 was about the worst year Liverpool can remember; there are, however, signs of improvement, for since January 1 there has been a greater demand for tonnage in many directions. This was a statement in an address made recently by Sir R. Burton Chadwick, president of the Liverpool Shipping Staff's Association.

Continuing his remarks the speaker said shipowners should endeavor to cheapen operating costs and increase efficiency rather than except high freight and passenger rates. One of the greatest hindrances of the shipowner today was the extraordinary delay in turning round his ship, combined with the high port charges. Both those factors were not the result of high wages, but of poor work for that wage.

The question of carrying British cargoes in foreign ships was dealt with on the same occasion by J. H. Sharrock, a former director of one of the big steamship lines. He deplored the fact that some British shippers were sending cargoes in foreign ships and paying their freights to foreign shipowners, while many British seamen were walked the streets.

The Liverpool Underwriters Association also met in conference a few days ago, and the president, Samuel Barker, made a pessimistic report. The only cheerful feature in the cargo business, he said, was that there had been a considerable reduction in the amount of loss suffered through theft and pilferage. It was as yet impossible to form an accurate estimate of losses to marine underwriters through the Japanese earthquake.

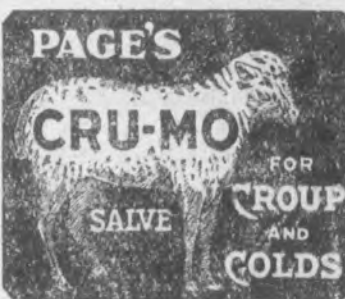

Migratory Workers On Farms Will Be Guided in Travels

Sacramento, Cal.—Migratory farm workers of California, an army numbering more than 125,000, moving in a desultory way from one harvest to another, are to be guided in their ramblings by a co-operative farm labor exchange, launched here by farmers of northern and central California.

Organization of the Farm Labor Exchange is being perfected. Its chief purpose will be to stabilize labor and equalize the supply in all counties.

J. A. Teagarden, of Auburn, Cal., elected head of the exchange, said the question of labor was perhaps the most important one facing the American farmer. The farmers themselves must solve this difficulty, he contended. The new organization plans to study the labor situation and fix a wage scale for farm hands. Through the activities of the exchange it is hoped that farmers will be kept from bidding against one another for labor. Thus, it is pointed out, farm workers will have a more stable and permanent form of employment.

"We must have standard wages," said Dallas H. Gray, representative of one of the counties. "The farmers cannot afford to be bidding against themselves. Justice must be done the working man and he must be kept from shifting constantly about every time he hears a rumor of higher wages in another section. We will have offices throughout the state and they will direct laborers as they are needed in the various districts. The exchange also will assist in keeping workers constantly employed by knowing in advance the dates when harvesting begins in the different sections."

It was said that fixing a wage scale was not intended to force down the pay of farm labor below the cost of living, but rather was to prevent labor "thefts." The exchange also will investigate and report on better housing and better working conditions for the farm employees.

"It is the greatest co-operative effort ever launched by American farmers," in the belief of Mr. Teagarden.

Says College Students Disregard Literature

Iowa City, Ia.—A movement for a national professional forensic fraternity, composed of representative men from literary societies and debating clubs to counteract a decline in number and strength of these activities, is being fostered throughout the country, according to announcement by William O. Moore, of the University of Iowa, national chairman of the committee on national-

ization. After a survey of student forensic organizations in more than 150 colleges and universities in the United States, the committee has found a definite decline in the number and strength of student literary societies and debating clubs which, with very few exceptions, is universal. "Prominent faculty men have admitted and expressed regret at the situation," said Mr. Moore. "While many colleges and universities can boast of a rapid expansion in enrollment, their athletic prowess, and of the gigantic stadiums they have erected, very few can boast of a corresponding advancement of student forensic and literary activities."

The aim of the organization is to place the premium upon the local literary societies and the emphasis on collegiate forensics. Mr. Moore said the first national convention will be held in June at a place to be determined. At that time all petitions that have been informally accepted will be granted formal charters.

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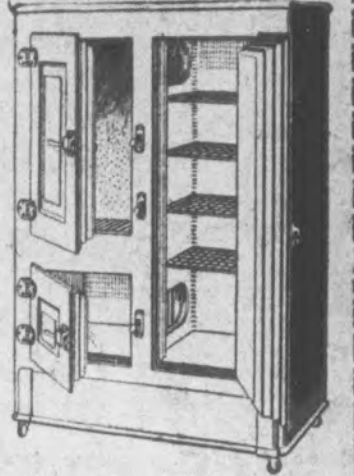
