LEGAL ACTION IN GOV'T. OIL CASES BEGINS THURSDAY

Committee to Resume Hearings Tomorrow; McLean to Appear On the Stand

Washington, March 10.—The new week in the oil inquiry found the Senate investigating committee still digging into the pile of telegrams it has subpoenaed but planning soon to broach new supplies of evidence. These include the findings of the auditors assigned to study the books of brokerage firms to determine the extent of dealings of government officials in oil stocks before and after the leasing of the naval oil reserves and the possible influence of oil upon the Republican nomination in 1920.

In addition the new week marks the initial court proceedings growing out of the oil inquiry which will begin Thursday in district federal court at Cheyenne, Wyoming on the application by the special government counsel for temporary injunction to restrain the Mammoth Oil Company from further extraction of oil from the Teapot Dome reserve. This company was formed by Harry F. Sinclair to take over the lease negotiated by him with Albert B. Fall, as Secretary of Interior, and signed by Edwin Denby, as Secretary of Navy. Like action will follow in Southern California against the Pan American Petroleum Company for which Edward L. Doheny obtained a lease of Naval Reserve Number 1 in that state.

Public hearings by the committee will not be resumed until tomorrow but orders have been given to the telegraph companies for all telegrams to and from Washington, Palm Beach, New Orleans and Three Rivers, N. M., sent or received by Edward B. McLean, Albert B. Fall, Edward L. Doheny, Harry F. Sinclair, Robert Stewart, Blackwell and J. W. Zevely.

McLean's presence at tomorrow's hearings will be required by the committee but it is understood that several other of McLean's employees will be questioned before he takes the stand.

"These brazen agents of corruption are trying to debauch and debase every Senator and public man who refuses to turn his back upon his country and surrender his convictions and obey the behest of the selfish, sordid, contemptible and corrupt dollar aristocracy," he declared. "Having become slaves of conscience less, predatory interests they have then tried to besmirch and belittle every public man who has refused to do as they have done—prove himself unworthy of bearing the name of a citizen of the United States, and betray his country to the enemies of his country."

SINCLAIR AND COUNSEL LEAVE FOR CHEYENNE

Chicago, March 10.—Harry F. Sinclair and six attorneys departed today for Cheyenne, Wyoming, to protest against the government's action to cancel the Teapot Dome oil leases. Mr. Sinclair stated that he expected ultimate victory and vindication. According to J. W. Zevely, chief counsel and the five attorneys they are prepared to oppose the government action.

In refusing to make a statement regarding the case, Mr. Sinclair declared, that he proposed to try his case in the courts and not in the newspapers of the country but he stated that he fully expected success in the courts.

MEMEL TO RESUME RAILROAD SERVICE OUTSIDE WORLD

Memel.—The territory of Memel involved in controversy between Poland and Lithuania for more than five years soon will have railroad connection with the outside world again. Freight and passenger service will be resumed under an agreement recently signed between Memel and Koenigsberg under an agreement recently signed with the East Prussian authorities.

Beauty Contest Winner Loses \$100,000 Suit

Decatur, Ga., March 10.—A jury early today awarded a verdict in favor of Walter T. Candler, Atlanta capitalist, growing out of the \$100,000 suit brought against him by Mrs. Clyde K. Byfield, beauty contest prize winner. Following announcement of the verdict Mrs. Byfield was led from the court room sobbing hysterically.

The case was given to the jury early Saturday night following a three day's trial. At midnight the jury reported that they were unable to agree and asked for a recharge. The court ordered that the jury be locked up until early today.

A recharge was delivered at 8:17 o'clock this morning and the jury deliberated only an hour before reaching a verdict.

Mrs. Byfield in the suit charged that Candler had attempted a physical attack upon her in July 1922 while they were aboard a liner en route to Europe. Mrs. Byfield was a member of the Candler party which also included her husband.

Evidence was brought out that Byfield fighting with Candler in his wife's darkened state room had demanded Candler to pay him \$25,000. Candler in denying the alleged attack stated that he gave Byfield a check for \$25,000 to keep his mouth shut. Later, according to the evidence, Candler gave Byfield \$2,000 Bay course March 7 and 8. Among exchange for the check and a signed statement exonerating him of the attack charges.

The jury, it is understood at the court house stood 10 to 2 in favor of Candler when they failed to reach a verdict Saturday night.

'BAD NEGRO' PLACED IN THE COUNTY JAIL

Wanted for Murder in North Carolina and Virginia

Granville Plummer, negro, alias Walter Smith, Henry Allen, High Pocket, wanted in North Carolina and Virginia on charges of murder, highway robbery and other crimes, was arrested in Durham last week, brought to Greenville and placed in the Pitt county jail for trial during the April term of criminal court.

The negro who is quite a notorious character, was during August 1916, convicted in Wake county of highway robbery and sentenced to five years in the penitentiary. He served one week of his sentence and succeeded in escaping. Since that time he has killed a negro woman in Norfolk, Va., and made good his getaway. He was wanted in Pitt county for the murder of a negro man, whom it is charged he killed while working for Porter and Peck during the construction of the Farmville road. He managed to escape following this murder and was not heard from until last week when his partner "squealed" on him following a fight in which he was victor.

Plummer has been a "wholly terror" in the Durham community and was known among his race as Durham's bad negro. He is black as ink and is almost a giant in size being six feet three inches tall. When he was arrested Sheriff Jackson was warned by Durham officials that he had a "wild man" and consequently Plummer had the pleasure of entering Greenville with hands behind him.

Without a dissenting vote the House adopted a motion by Representative McKenzie, of Illinois, that it resume consideration of his bill providing for the acceptance of the Ford offer.

Those in charge of the measure are confident of a final vote before the end of the day.

Deaths of 2 Women Baffle Members Of Detective Bureau

Washington, March 10.—The unexplained deaths of two young women here within the last 24 hours today engaged the efforts of all available men of the detective bureau.

The body of Miss Eva Long, 26, was found last night, at the edge of the tidal basin around which winds the city speedway which is always crowded with automobiles, with a pistol nearby but there was no sign of a gun wound on the body though the head was bruised.

In another part of the city Mrs. Alice Boteler, 23, was found dead in her apartment. Detectives, who were called to the scene, said that a gas jet was open but no gas could be detected in the room and that canary birds nearby were unaffected. The man who reported the death is held pending an investigation.

AUTHORITIES TO STAMP OUT GAMBLING GLASGOW CHILDREN

London.—Gambling and betting among school children in Glasgow has become so prevalent that the board of education has decided to use stringent measures to stop it. The board has already sent letters to all parents and teachers demanding that they use their authority to overcome this evil.

The pupils not only bet among themselves on trivial contests but many of them make regular bets with unscrupulous bookmakers on horse races and football games. It has been stated that in one school of 800 pupils bookmakers take as much as \$75 a day in bets.

DENBY RETIRES FROM NAVY TODAY

Naming of Successor by President Coolidge Is Expected Early Date

Washington, March 10.—Secretary Denby's resignation became effective today amid a deluge of tributes from his associates in the Navy Department.

"I am trying," said the retiring secretary, "to die with my face toward the enemy."

Mr. Denby's retirement is the first break in the cabinet during President Coolidge's administration and his successor has not been selected though the field from which he is to be chosen had narrowed considerably during the last few days.

Until appointment of a new secretary is made, Assistant Secretary Roosevelt will be in charge of the department as acting secretary.

The list of eligibles mentioned as successors has dwindled to Governor Dixon, of Montana, James E. Davidson, Republican National Committeeman from Michigan and former Representative Fess, of Illinois. President Coolidge is expected momentarily to make selection of the new secretary.

The retiring secretary devoted his time today to business pending in the department that required his personal attention and taking the oath of major in the Marine Corps reserve the commission which he surrendered to enter the cabinet. His last minutes of work were interrupted by those who had served under him for the past three years who came to say farewell.

At a farewell dinner last night Denby told 300 navy and marine officials that he had served in three wars, the war with Spain, the world war and the war that revolved about the oil investigation. He declared that the third was more bitter than either of the other two.

\$150,000 Suit of Evans vs. Simmons Dismissed Today

Little Rock, Ark., March 10.—The \$150,000 suit of W. H. Evans, Imperial Wizard of the Ku Klux Klan, against Joseph Simmons, former emperor of the clan for libel was dismissed in Pulaski court today on motion of the plaintiff. The plaintiff paid the cost in the action.

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Minnesota Representative Jailed On Serious Charge

Washington, March 10.—A man arrested late last night on the outskirts of Washington was identified in police court in Arlington, Va., today as Representative Harold Knutson, of Minnesota, and is held without bail on a serious charge.

Leroy M. Hull, 29 years old, who described himself as a War Department clerk, was arrested with him and is also held in the Arlington jail. Virginia highway police who made the arrest found the two men in an auto parked beside the road.

When arranged in court they asked that they be permitted to employ counsel before pleading to the charges against them and the case was continued until tomorrow.

Meantime they are locked in a cell with 30 other prisoners charged with various crimes.

The district attorney said that the question of bail might be taken up this afternoon but that bonds for at least \$5,000 each would be required. Knutson is serving his fourth term in the House. Last session he served as Republican whip and is at present chairman of the Pensions committee. He is 40 years old.

Honduran Factions Reject Overtures of Cen. American Rep.

Washington, March 10.—Honduran revolutionists have rejected overtures made by several Central American republics to restore peace in that country. This development reported to the State Department by its representatives in Honduras has caused department officials to take even more pessimistic views of the Honduran situation and to abandon hope that early adjustment of differences between the factions supporting the two candidates for the presidency of the country can be effected.

Greensboro Council Approves Action Of Gov. Smith, of N. Y.

Greensboro, March 10.—Approval of the action of Gov. Al Smith and members of the New York legislature to eliminate the so-called civil war discrimination against southern bonds and securities was voiced in a resolution passed today at a special meeting of the city council.

The bill is to come up before the New York legislature tomorrow for action and in event of its passage new fields for the sale of southern securities will be opened.

At the present time it is illegal in New York for savings banks and trust companies to buy southern bonds.

EIGHTEEN BODIES MINERS BROUGHT UP EARLY TODAY

Castlegate, Utah, March 10.—Eighteen bodies of miners killed Saturday, in the serious explosion which virtually destroyed mine number 2 of the Utah Fuel Company and entombed 175 men, were brought out early today. Every available truck has been placed in service following reports that many more bodies had been found and would be brought to the surface. Indications were that none of the miners in the workings had escaped.

Seventeen rescue crews made rapid progress during the night and following their reports all hope by company officials that any of the entombed men will be found alive has been virtually abandoned.

Last night rescue crews reached the 2300 feet portal from which all rescue work is being carried on and succeeded in extinguishing a smoldering fire that had been burning all day. With announcement of the extinguishing of this fire was a report that there was no sign of any additional fires within the mine.

Coolidge's reply to the Senate on the adoption of the resolution calling for Secretary Denby's resignation.

Mr. Coolidge is a stern mortalist. He has laid down rules of official conduct that are inflexible. He has taught the country to have confidence in him as a man who will not be swerved from his duty by any personal considerations. He does nothing on hasty impulse or through recklessness. In the circumstances it is strange that he should have permitted himself to hold private communication for any political purpose with a person in McLean's position.

For Edward B. McLean has figured very conspicuously in the oil scandal. He is the Washington newspaper publisher who was represented as making a loan of \$100,000 to former Secretary Fall for the purchase of a ranch in New Mexico. On Dec. 26, 1923, Fall wrote to the Senate committee, after previously refusing to reveal where the money came from, that "the gentleman from whom I obtained it and who furnished me the cash was Hon. Edward B. McLean of Washington, D. C." McLean, through counsel, confirmed Fall's written explanation. It was a deliberately false statement, made by both of them with the purpose of deceiving the Senate committee.

Barely two weeks later—on Jan. 11, 1924—McLean, when placed under oath by Senator Walsh at Palm Beach, testified that the checks he had given Fall were returned unused, and Fall admitted the facts were as McLean when placed under oath, and stated them. Fall was then McLean's guest at Palm Beach. C. Bascom Slemp, secretary to the president, was at Palm Beach, where he met Fall in McLean's house and "urged him to make a clean showing of everything to the committee." He has testified that during his stay at the Florida resort he was in confidential communication with the White House.

It was the very day after McLean and Fall were caught in a lie by Senator Walsh, the very day after they admitted lying about the McLean payment to Fall, that Mr. Coolidge over his own name telegraphed to McLean in regard to a political matter. The whole country then knew how McLean had been mixed up in the business of shielding Fall from exposure; it knew that he had been forced to confess to supporting Fall in false statements, yet it was to McLean Mr. Coolidge then turned for confidential advice on a political question affecting the Government of the District of Columbia.

Mr. Coolidge is ordinarily too level-headed and cautious a man to be betrayed into so embarrassing an indiscretion. In the circumstances he should have known better than to continue on terms of intimacy, even private, with a man of McLean's record in the Fall transaction. "Easy and quick access" to the White House becomes less of a mystery.

DEMOCRATIC PROTECTION NECESSARY

Democratic leaders in Congress are already giving thought to additional legislation for the protection and preservation of national resources, which it has been shown by the revelations in the Teapot Dome scandal are not sufficiently safeguarded. It is intended that these new laws on the subject shall supplement the legislation enacted during the eight years of Democratic administration from 1913 to 1921.

This will be the constructive side of the Democratic fight against the dissipation of this national wealth—forests, minerals, oil, water power, and public lands. It will be the sequel to the present Democratic battle against the transference of the naval oil reserves to private interests. It will continue the Democratic tradition of conserving and recovering for the public welfare the vast patrimony which Nature has given to the American people.

It is recognized, due to the enlightenment the public is receiving with respect to the work of the Cleveland and Wilson administrations, that a Democratic President and Congress are necessary to the further protection of national resources, which include vast stores of coal in Alaska.

MR. COOLIDGE'S INDISCRETION

President Coolidge has wisely deemed it necessary to explain to the public how he happened to be exchanging telegrams with Edward B. McLean at Palm Beach during the course of the Senate oil investigation. Two messages which he had recently sent to McLean in Florida were given out yesterday by the Senate committee. As interpreted at the White House, they have no special significance. One related to the District Commissionership of the District of Columbia, about which Mr. Coolidge wanted to consult with the Republican City Chairman; the other was in reply to a message of congratulation on Mr.

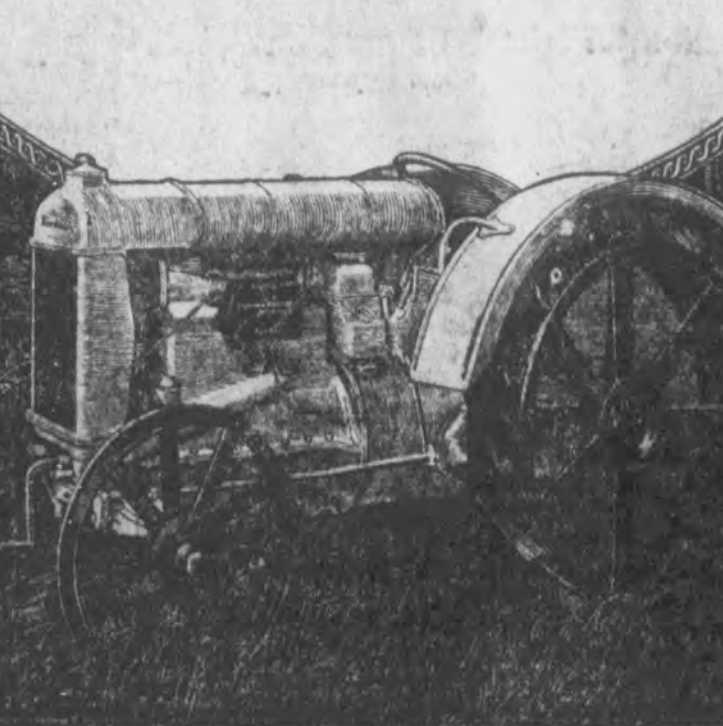

HEAVENLY TWINS TRY OUT PARACHUTES FOR AIRMEN U. S. NAVY

Philadelphia.—Leaping 1,000 feet or more to earth at the end of a swaying parachute that may be either good or defective, is the perilous business of "Lucy" and "Filbert," the heavenly twins of the naval air service.

The twins claim a certain portion of the naval aircraft factory at the Philadelphia navy yard as their birthplace. For them life is not only a series of ups and downs, but full of many striking incidents, especially when parachutes fail to open.

Named by the sailors, the twins are singularly unattractive in appearance. Their chances for winning a beauty contest are nil, for their countenances, ashen gray from birth, are kept that way by the hazardous nature of their duties.

Made in the semblance of human form, "Lucy" and "Filbert" weigh respectively 180 and 300 each. They work in the summer flying costume of the air force, but their constitution is said by the sailors to consist mainly of coiled rope covered with canvas, with enough buckshot in their chests to bring them to the specified weights required for parachute-testing dummies.

Leather boots and gloves, and a picturesque loop knot on top of their heads complete their costumes. The loop is their sole means of support from the parachute.

As soon as the aircraft factory completes a new "Lucy" or "Filbert," the newcomer in aviation is shipped to one of the naval flying stations. A number of them are at work at Lakehurst, N. J., where the big dirigible Shenandoah is being groomed for the polar flight. They test the parachutes provided for the quick descent of the crew of the airship in case of accident in the clouds. The tests vary. "Lucy" or "Filbert" may be assigned to hurdle downward from a lazily swaying kite balloon, or they may be shoved off the wing of an airplane speeding at 125 miles an hour. Despite their many hard knocks and terrific falls, their friends, the sailors, say they have never failed to report for work the next day.

Swiss Revenues Increase

Berne.—Switzerland's customs revenues for 1923 amounted to 182,060,000 francs. This is an increase of 19,000,000 francs over 1922.

HUNGARY BANS AMERICAN BARS

Budapest.—In consequence of a government decree promulgated recently, "American bars" have disappeared from Budapest. However, the staff sold in the places flows as freely as before. The decree directed all places of amusement, cafes, and other public resorts bearing French, English or German names to put out signs in the Magyar language. The American bar has become an "ivocarnal."

Germany Lacks Sailors.

Hamburg.—Sixty thousand German sailors and officers had to find other jobs when the German fleet was dismantled under the Versailles treaty. The mercantile navy today has recovered half of its pre-war tonnage, and there are not enough sailors to man the ships. This is because the old-time marine men have mostly gone into other work and, as a majority of them were capable, have obtained positions which they

JAPAN SOON TO ENJOY BROADCASTING BY RADIO

Tokio.—Radio broadcasting is to be commenced next month in Japan, where hitherto communications have been strictly limited by the government. Like commercial radio, the broadcasting will be under stringent government regulations.

At first the department of communications will undertake the activity on a limited scale from stations in Tokio and Osaka only. Some months later, it is believed, the first independent station will be established here.

Receiving instruments will not be permitted to be carried about, as is often done in America, though they may be attached permanently to vehicles or boats. During the day hours music and entertainment features will not be permitted in the air. The rule, however, may be relaxed on Sundays and national holidays.

Santa Barbara, Cal.—The engine used in a Blériot monoplane to carry the first aerial mail in the United States has been presented to the Smithsonian Institution by Earle Ovington, a Santa Barbara aviator, who, in 1911 was sworn in as the first aerial postman.

The official document, bearing the signatures of Postmaster-General Hitchcock and Chief Inspector Mor-

gan of New York also will be presented to the institution, together with a sample of mail carried on the first trip and a photograph of the plane.

CARS BUILT IN GERMANY CARRY AMERICAN NAMES

Hamburg.—The word "Pullman" to designate sleeping cars is making its way into several of the languages of Europe. The Germans for instance, call them "pullman-wagens;" build them in their own shops, and export

them to foreign countries.

Breslau recently completed 47 such cars on an order from Chile, and these are now on their way to South American countries.

SWEEDISH SCHOOL CHILDREN TAKE READILY TO SWIMMING

Stockholm.—The nation-wide drive in Sweden, which aims to make every school child a good swimmer, has scored notable results in the city of Stockholm, according to official reports.

Systematic competitions have been held jointly by state, municipal, and private schools, and the records show that in some institutions 81 per cent of the pupils can swim more than 300

feet under test conditions. In the high schools the average is 30 per cent for the 100 meter distance, while in the grade schools 32 per cent of the children can swim at least 80 feet. Nearly 8,000 pupils passed the rigid tests.
