

COMMITTEE RECALLS JOHN F. MAJOR AT TODAY'S HEARING

McLean's Confidential Man Gives Further In- formation as to Identity of Persons Referred to in Code Messages

Washington, March 11. — Under pressure of hard hitting cross examination, John F. Major, confidential man of Edward B. McLean exposed to the oil committee today more of the mysteries in connection with the McLean telegrams.

One of these he said referred to C. Bascom Slem, with whom he had returned from Florida and upon whom he had called several times since, always at Slem's invitation. When pressed as to the nature of the visits he declared that they were purely social.

The code word "eyed" referred, he said to E. Y. Rochester, who is attached to the office of the Attorney General. Major said that on one occasion Rochester had asked him to come to the department and had indicated that something was expected soon but was hazy as to details.

The mysterious "Willis" referred to repeatedly in the telegrams as looking after McLean's interests was finally identified by Major as Wilton J. Lambert, McLean's personal attorney.

"Absolutely none" Major said when asked if there was any hesitation on McLean's part to come to Washington to testify. McLean has been eager to appear before the committee Major said, and sent over 200 telegrams to his agents telling them that he was coming to Washington irrespective of their advice.

The oil committee held an executive session today to examine the Three Rivers, New Mexico, telegrams before calling additional witnesses before the committee.

These messages were brought in under a dragnet subpoena calling for all telegrams received or sent by Albert B. Fall, Harry F. Sinclair, J. W. Zevely, Robert Stewart, of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana, and H. M. Blackmer, of the Mid West Refining Company, between January 1, 1921 and March 1, 1924.

After an hour and a half examination of the telegrams from Three Rivers, New Mexico, the oil committee resumed its public hearings by recalling to the stand John F. Major, one of Edward B. McLean's agents.

Major said that McLean had not told him about the conference which the Washington publisher had had with Albert B. Fall, at Atlantic City, in mid December before Fall wrote the committee that he got the \$100,000 from McLean.

Witnesses testified last Saturday that it was at this conference that McLean and Fall discussed the testimony that Fall was to give before the oil committee.

"Willis" who is mentioned in some of the code telegrams was identified today by Major as Wilton J. Lambert, McLean's personal attorney. The witness stated that he thought that the code word "eyed" is one of the messages referred to E. Y. Rochester who is attached to the office of Attorney General Daugherty.

GOVERNMENT COUNSEL EN ROUTE TO CHEYENNE TO PRESS OIL SUITS

Chicago, March 11.—Owen J. Roberts and Atlee Pomerene, special government counsel in the Teapot Dome matter, passed through Chicago today en route to Cheyenne, Wyoming, where on Thursday they will file bill for an injunction, charging fraud, to restrain further work on the Teapot Dome leases.

72 Hour Armistice Arranged on Account Gutierrez's Death

Washington, March 11. — The death of Lopez Gutierrez, defactor president of Honduras, was reported to the State Department in a telegram today. The message said that Gutierrez died at 10:30 o'clock yesterday morning but did not give the cause of his death.

An armistice of 72 hours has been arranged between the factions in the three cornered revolution.

THREE MEN HELD FOR KIDNAPPING

Asheville, March 11. — Charged with kidnapping Gertrude Jenkins, resident of Spartanburg, South Carolina, and keeping her a captive for two days part of the time being spent in a school house in Forest City, N. C., warrants were served by Deputy United States Marshall W. F. Swann at Rutherfordton yesterday on Sid Cossey, Pink Bright, (alias Funny Gossey) and Ed English for alleged violation of the Mann Act. The three men are held in jail at Rutherfordton in lieu of \$1,500 bail each.

The Marshall's office has a warrant for another man who is also said to have been a member of the kidnapping party.

Miss Jenkins, 19, told officers that she had been grossly mistreated, seriously injured and had to go to a hospital for an operation. The alleged attack, according to the young woman's story told to the police, took place on October 15, 1923. She said that she was at the Southern Railway station at Spartanburg about to board a train to go to Rutherfordton, North Carolina. At the station she said a man asked her where she was going and when she replied he told her that he was driving to Rutherfordton and asked her to let him carry her over. When they had driven only a short distance, she declared, the man stopped the car and picked up three other men. They then drove to Forest City, N. C., where she was held prisoner in a school house for one night being mistreated by all four men. She was kept prisoner for two days, she said, being taken from one place to another until her condition forced them to let her go to a hospital.

Morrison Suffering From Severe Cold in Asheville Hotel

Asheville, March 11. — Governor Cameron Morrison is confined to his room in a hotel here with a severe cold. Attending physicians said that he may be able to return to Raleigh Wednesday.

Zihlman Demands Investigation of The Charges Agnst. Him

Washington, March 11.—Representative Zihlman, Republican, Maryland, today renewed his demand that the House authorize a searching investigation of the report that criminal evidence had developed against him and one other member of the House before the Chicago grand jury.

Protesting that he was guilty of no wrong doing, he protested on the floor of the House the recommendation of the Judiciary committee that the matter be left to the Department of Justice for investigation.

The fight over the report was precipitated in the House when Representative Dominick, South Carolina, Democratic member of the committee offered the minority recommendation that the House insist upon Daugherty to disclose the names of the two members to the House.

South in Grip Freezing Weather

Atlanta, Ga., March 11.—An icy blast from the west today held the south in a tight grip with temperatures below freezing in many sections.

Extreme cold is reported from Virginia and North Carolina while weather bulletins say that the freezing mark was reached in Georgia as far south as the Florida line.

High winds and low temperatures are reported from Alabama, Louisiana and Mississippi.

The local thermometer at 7 o'clock this morning recorded 32 degrees. Government reports from the Georgia peach belt stated that the cold wave, while it may slightly retard, would not appreciably affect the peach crop.

OPPORTUNITY IS NOW KNOCKING AT GREENVILLE'S DOOR

Several Inquiries Re- ceived by Secretary of Chamber Commerce Concerning City

Opportunity is now knocking at Greenville's door and it is but for the citizens to open the door and let her in. H. L. Smith secretary of the local Chamber of Commerce stated this morning that the following definite inquiries had been received during recent few days:

A man in Consular Service at a Canadian point requests definite information as to cost of building a home in Greenville, at the same time stating that he was going to leave the service and he wanted to locate in the south.

A letter from a woman in Florida indicates she is anxious to locate here in Greenville and asks for cost of building a home. A professional man in Pennsylvania writes for information and states he has practically made up his mind to come to Greenville, however before so doing he is awaiting certain data pertaining to the town.

Another writes for information which looks forward to the locating of a Cement Products Plant here. The initial investment would represent a minimum of \$25,000.

An eastern representative is now in eastern North Carolina looking over sites and having in view locating in one of the Eastern Carolina towns for the purpose of manufacturing suits, trousers, etc. This plant would employ, in keeping with the information obtained, 200 girls. Secretary Smith stated that he had the promise of this representative that he would visit Greenville during this week and see just how much interested they were and what they had to offer.

A southern representative, of an outstanding industrial engineering firm, phoned the Chamber of Commerce March 8th, and advised that he would be in Greenville in the immediate future to ascertain if Greenville really wanted industries and what she had to offer in the way of raw products, transportation facilities, inducements, etc. In other words this well-known engineering company wants to assemble data on Greenville and at the same time see if the people here will really put their shoulders to the wheel and help bring about some of the things to which reference are frequently made.

Greenville has an opportunity of going forward and taking her rightful place among the progressive cities of the State. What will be her answer?

Castlegate, Utah, March 11.—At 6:15 this morning 95 bodies remained in mine number 2 of the Utah Fuel Company. 16 bodies were brought from the interior of the mine between 2 and 6 o'clock this morning making a total of 78 that have been recovered.

Attempting to Recover \$7,000,000 Excessively Spent on Camp Meade

Baltimore, March 11.—Charging fraud, graft and fraudulent misuse of government funds, Amos Woodcock, United States District Attorney of Maryland, today filed suit in local United States District court against Smith, Hauser and McIsaacs Incorporated, of New York, to recover \$7,000,000 alleged to have been expended on the construction of Camp Meade.

Some Facts You Should Know---

In view of the proposed \$200,000 bond issue for the city schools of Greenville the following questions have been asked and the answers prepared in order that the public might familiarize itself with the exact school situation:

1. Q.—How many children in Greenville High School outside of our taxing territory?
A.—46.
2. Q.—Does Greenville have to take them?
A.—Yes.
3. Q.—Why?
A.—The law of North Carolina now forces them to do it.
4. Q.—Are the Greenville Schools reimbursed for them?
A.—Yes.
5. Q.—How?
A.—The county makes an appropriation for them.
6. Q.—How much?
A.—Approximately \$2000.
7. Q.—Are there any tuition children in school in Greenville?
A.—Yes.
8. Q.—How many?
A.—18.
9. Q.—What do they pay?
A.—Primary, \$12. Grammar grades, \$36; High School, \$45.
10. Q.—Where does this money go?
A.—Into the hands of the town treasurer.
11. Q.—Are there any children in the Greenville Schools below the eighth grade whose parents live out beyond the original 1905 School District?
A.—Yes.
12. Q.—Where do they live?
A.—In what was formerly known as the Allen School District, and in another small district just across the river.
13. Q.—What school tax rates are these districts paying?
A.—50 cents, the same as that prevailing in Greenville. The tax books in the County Auditor's office show this.
14. Q.—Who collects this money?
A.—The Sheriff. He turns it over to the County Treasurer who turns it over to the Town Treasurer.
15. Q.—How many of these children are there?
A.—109.
16. Q.—How many different class rooms are they placed in?
A.—25.
17. Q.—How many does that average to the room?
A.—A fraction over four.
18. Q.—Does the presence of these children hurt the Greenville Schools?
A.—No, but rather helps them. The children are distributed throughout all the different rooms, thus preventing congestion, and at the same time the revenue from the 50 cents tax is very helpful to the Greenville Schools.
19. Q.—If all these children were taken out of school would there still be a need for a new building?
A.—Yes.
20. Q.—Why?
A.—Because there are now 694 pupils enrolled in the Evans Street School. There are 98 of these out of town children in that building. If they were all taken out there would still be approximately 600 left. That building was built for about 300 children. Certainly it should not contain more than 400. So it is easy to see that the presence of these children, whose parents are paying the school taxes, does not enter at all into the discussion of whether or not Greenville needs a new building.
21. Q.—Do other towns take children into their schools beyond their corporate limits?
A.—Yes. Practically every town does, and what is more, most of the towns now bring country children into their schools by means of trucks.
22. Q.—Why has the Greenville School Board allowed country children to come to the Greenville Schools?
A.—First, because in every instance the cost is met, either by the means of tuition or taxes equal to Greenville's rate or by an appropriation by the County Board of Education.
23. Q.—Is there any other reason why the country children should come to Greenville?
A.—Yes, they bring business to Greenville, for parents will always go to the place where their children attend school.
24. Q.—If Greenville does not take care of these children what will become of them?
A.—The County Board of Education will send them to other neighboring towns.
25. Q.—How many school Bonds have been issued for Greenville Schools?
A.—40,000. (\$10,000 in 1923 and \$30,000 in 1915.)
26. Q.—How much money is now in Sinking Fund for retirement of these bonds?
A.—\$9,000.
27. Q.—What is the net Bonded indebtedness of the Greenville Graded School District?
A.—\$31,000.
28. Q.—How much is the proposed Bond issue?
A.—\$200,000.
29. Q.—After this money is voted the total Bonded indebtedness of the Greenville Schools will be \$231,000. How does this amount compare with the Bond issue of other towns?
A.—Very favorably indeed. Farmville has voted \$250,000; Kingston \$350,000; Washington \$300,000; Wilson \$500,000.

ROTARIANS DISCUSS SCHOOL BOND ISSUE MEETING LAST NIGHT INTENSE INTEREST BEING DISPLAYED IN CIRCULATION DRIVE

Judges Appointed For Preliminary Track Meets to Be Held On Friday and Monday

Last night's regular business meeting of the Greenville Rotary Club was featured by several short talks, final arrangements for the preliminaries of the Pitt County Track Meet and a round table discussion of the proposed bond issue for improvement of city schools.

Following the dinner D. L. Turnage made a talk on the history of Rotary, reviewing briefly the early life of Paul Harris, the founder of the first Rotary Club. His talk covered the several periods of Rotary showing its remarkable growth and accomplishments.

The next talk was by S. B. Underwood who told the club of his recent visit to the Chicago Rotary Club "Old Number 1" the club founded by Harris and the beginning of an international organization of over a hundred thousand members.

That all might ever keep before them the principles upon which the organization is founded, President R. H. Wright called on various members to quote different articles from the Rotary code of ethics.

J. H. Rose chairman of the committee in charge of the annual Pitt County Track Meet reported that final arrangements for the preliminary meets had been made and committees to act as judges at the various preliminaries throughout the county were appointed. The Bethel school will hold its meet on Friday afternoon March 14 and the other schools of the county will hold meets on Monday afternoon March 17.

Sheets containing questions and answers as to the need of the proposed \$200,000 bond issue for city schools were then distributed and J. E. Winslow, member of the school board explained in detail the pressing need for more room and better facilities in our city schools. He told of the rapid growth of our schools explaining that nearly 700 children were now attending the Evans Street school built originally to accommodate 300 pupils. His talk was supplemented by remarks from J. H. Rose who explained further the growing need of greater facilities to take care of the situation. He stated that there are more than 125 children in our city who will reach the school age of 6 years prior to the opening of the next term and that unless the schools are enlarged before that time that there will be no place in our already crowded buildings to take care of them. Many other members added remarks on the subject and all voiced a conviction that immediate action is necessary if the children are to receive the education to which they are entitled.

OUR OBLIGATION

Everyone realizes that our citizens of tomorrow are our children of today and that as citizens we owe it to our community, state and nation to qualify these future citizens for the duties that sooner or later they must assume. Every child is entitled to an education, and under good health conditions, but Greenville with its lack of suitable school facilities is falling far short of fulfilling its obligation.

On April 1 the citizens of the Greenville Graded School district are to decide at the polls whether or not we will continue to shirk our duty by voting for or against the proposed \$200,000 bond issue for city schools.

Many are opposing the issue, we believe, as a result of misinformation and it is for their benefit that we offer this information as to the situation that exists in our city schools.

There are at present over 1,300 children attending our city schools in buildings that were erected to accommodate several hundred less. The Evans Street School was erected in 1903

to accommodate around 300 children and, although the building has not been enlarged, records show that there are now 700 children occupying the class rooms in this building. As a result of cutting up the original rooms of the buildings in order to provide a greater number of class rooms many are very poorly ventilated and so poorly lighted that in some instances artificial light is necessary throughout the day. Such conditions are injurious to the health of those housed in the building and should not be allowed to exist.

The argument has been raised that the attendance of children in our schools who reside outside of the city is responsible for the congested conditions and in order to clear up this misunderstanding questions and answers on the subject have been prepared and appear in another part of this issue. As shown by this report the out of town children are not responsible for the congestion in our schools and the taxpayers of this city pay no more because of their attendance.

We pride ourselves on the rapid growth of our city but if we wish it to continue to grow we cannot afford to let this need of our children pass unnoticed. A man who refuses to meet his financial obligations is considered dishonest but refusal to meet this obligation to the children upon whom the future welfare of our country depends is refusing to pay an obligation that we owe to humanity, society and our country.

It is to be hoped that the citizens of Greenville will prove themselves worthy of such a name by going to the polls on April 1 showing to the world that they believe in meeting their obligations to their children.

Large Attendance Expected at Eastern Carolina Exposition

Kinston, N. C., March 10. — The attendance at the 1924 sectional exposition here, to be staged the week of April 7, will be greatly increased over that of last year, it was predicted by officials today. The show is to be officially known as the Eastern Carolina Exposition and Auto Show, and will be held under the auspices of the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce. Newell G. Bartlett, secretary-manager of the commercial organization, is executive for the exposition. Its territory embraces the 46 counties recognized as "Eastern Carolina."

Bartlett today said the big object of the show, which has the enthusiastic backing of many business men and farmers, is to draw the attention of outside industrialists and home-seekers to the possibilities of these more than two-score counties, needing twice their present population to be comfortably peopled. The agricultural possibilities are "amazing," the commercial organization expert declared. The climatic conditions are nearly perfect, even to a 55-inch annual rainfall equitably distributed throughout the four seasons. The industrial advantages of Eastern Carolina have been neglected, comparatively speaking. "Thousands of canneries, wood-working plants, dairies, packing houses and other establishments will be operated in the Eastern Carolina of the fu-

ture," Bartlett stated. "We are seeking to speed up this industrial development."

Though the surface has not been skimmed, so to speak, it will require a monster building to house the exhibits at the second annual exposition sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce. This structure, now being put in readiness for the installation of exhibits, has a floor space of between 40,000 and 50,000 square feet. A large part of this floor area has been engaged. Musical, spectacular and fun feature will be offered in two daily programs during the week. Anna Case will be the headliner on opening day. Cervone's band will be offered in a series of concerts.

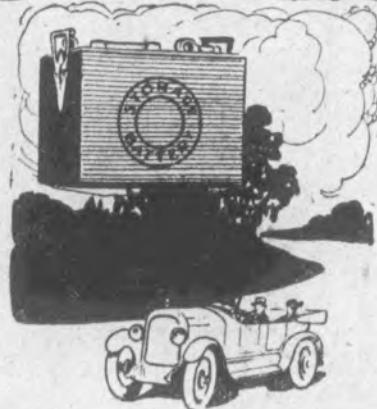
