Sensational Disclosures Daugherty Investigation By Gaston Means Today

Former Department of Justice Agent Says He Has Investigated For Four Governments; Declares \$100,000 Was Paid In Effort to Stop Investigation of Aircraft Scandal; Was Paid to Get Secretary Mellon; Says Harding Behind Inquiries

Washington, March 14.—"Asking no quarters and giving none" Gaston B. Means, former Department of Justice secret agent, today testified before the Senate committee investigating Attorney General Daugherty, that in February 1922 in the old Bellevue hotel in Washington that he received from a Jap, representing Mitsui and Company 100 one thousand dollar bills to stop the government prosecution of the Standard Aircraft case and that he turned the money over to the late Jesse Smith Attorney General Daugherty's "bump" and friend.

Smith told him the source of the \$100,000 in the fall of 1922, Means said. "After he became apprehensive about the election of progressive," asked Senator Moses, and Means replied in the affirmative.

Senator Moses referred to a correspondence between him and Means on the Bosch Magneto case and Means said that Smith had feared that he (Means) was telling Senator Moses something about the \$100,000 transaction.

Secretary Mellon's name was brought into the Daugherty investigation by Means who said that for President Harding he investigated matters in connection with certain permits having to do with violations of the Volstead Act.

"Jesse Smith wanted us to catch Secretary Mellon and we caught him," said Means. "President Harding wanted the information. The first time he slipped through our fingers. I gave Scaife thousands of dollars to catch him (Mellon)," Means testified. Former Department of Justice investigators were active in pressing the investigation of the aircraft scandals means testified that at President Harding's request he had investigated Senator Carroway, Democrat, Arkansas, and also Senator Lafollette after the latter had agitated investigation of the Teapot Dome scandal.

It had come to our attention that Secretary Mellon had to furnish certain permits for certain purposes, he said.

"Generally speaking, you were investigating the liquor ring in New York were you not?" asked Senator Wheeler. "Well it was into violations of the prohibition laws" was the reply.

Jesse Smith and W. T. Underwood, said Means, had given orders to investigate Senator Lafollette, learn what information he had and what to do to stop him. Smith, he said, paid his expenses. Means could not state however, that Smith was following orders of the Attorney General. Underwood he knew was representing Harding because he had seen a letter to Jess Smith from Harding authorizing an "undercover" investigation.

Senator Bruce, Maryland, was also investigated right after his election, Means declared, under orders by Jesse Smith or some of them.

During the House impeachment case against Attorney General Daugherty, Means said, he knew that the Department of Justice had agents following the witnesses about and watching the investigation.

Gaston B. Means, former Department of Justice agent and man of many connections, was the first witness called by the Senate committee investigating Attorney General Harry M. Daugherty.

Roxie Stinson, divorced wife of the late Jesse Smith, who has been telling the committee of alleged "deals" between her former husband and Daugherty, was reported sick this morning and unable to continue her testimony of yesterday.

When asked if he wanted immunity Means replied, "I waive immunity." "I ask no quarter and will give no quarter." When asked what his present business was he replied, "Answering indictments." He afterward said that his business was that of investigator.

Senator Wheeler brought up Means' indictment for the murder of Mrs. Maud King. Means said that he had done work for Henry C. Frick in 1915 or 1916 in the coke fields in Pennsylvania.

FIRST NORTH SEA TRAIN FERRY SOON WILL BE IN OPERATION

Harwich, Eng.—The first North Sea train ferry will soon be running from this port of Zeebrugge, a distance of 84 miles, in nine hours. It is planned to run three boats, each of which will accommodate 51 railway trucks standing side by side on two sets of rails.

The cost of loading and unloading each boat is estimated at four shillings per ton of merchandise, as compared with 15 to 25 shillings per ton when the contents of each individual truck have to be transferred between train and boat.

Weather Bureau Predicts Snow.

Washington, March 14.—Snow is in prospect this afternoon in the Carolinas and southern Virginia and tonight frost is probable throughout the South Atlantic states and East Gulf states with the exception of the southern part of Florida, the Weather Bureau announced today. Storm warnings were also placed on the North Carolina and Virginia coast. Higher temperatures are forecast for tomorrow.

CURTIS WILBUR IS APPOINTED SECRETARY NAVY SUCCEED DENBY

Washington, March 14.—The nomination of Curtis D. Wilbur of San Francisco as Secretary of the Navy was sent to the Senate today.

Wilbur is Chief Justice of California Supreme Court. He announced last night that he had telegraphed President Coolidge that he would arrange to come to Washington as soon as his appointment was confirmed by the Senate.

House Will Vote On Soldiers' Bonus Bill Next Tuesday

Washington, March 14.—The House will vote Tuesday on the Soldiers' Bonus bill under agreement reached today.

Speaker Gillette announced that he would entertain a motion to suspend the rules and pass the bill as approved by the House Ways and Means committee.

Under that procedure a two-thirds vote would be required for passage. Only one day will be devoted to debate and it will be impossible for any member to offer any amendment.

Eastern Carolina Exposition Com. Holds Meeting

The Exposition Committee met Monday afternoon in the offices of the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce and decided among other things to let the Restaurant Concession and the Bottled Drink Concession during the week of the Exposition out on a competitive basis. Any organization in the territory will be entitled to bid on one or both of these concessions. The concessions will be let separately, however. The concession carries the exclusive for bottled drinks and restaurant privileges. This is the plan that the committee followed last year and it proved very satisfactory to all concerned and the committee this year felt that a similar plan would be equally as satisfactory. The ice cream, chewing gum, peanuts, popcorn and fruits will not be exclusive. Anybody who buys space may sell any or all of these items.

May Have Moving Picture Contest.

The committee also discussed plans for holding a moving picture contest, different from anything attempted in this section, so far as the members of the committee recall. The plan is to have the young ladies of Eastern Carolina, either single or married, to enter the contest. MCADOO OPENS HIS CAMPAIGN IN GEORGIA TODAY

Declares Progressive Democratic Rule Or Corrupt Republican Misrule Is Issue

McADOO OPENS

Marietta, Ga., March 14.—"Progressive Democratic rule or reactionary and corrupt Republican misrule will be the choice of the American electorates in the presidential election," William G. McAdoo, former Secretary of Treasury, declared today in his first address in his Georgia tour. "The record of the Wilson Administration and the Harding-Coolidge administration will be before the people for decision in November," the candidate said.

He spoke to a large audience in the city of his birth. He reviewed the Wilson administration and his own services in the cabinet and pointed to the tariff reform, Federal Reserve System, establishment of the Federal Land Banks and the enlightened policy of the government railroad administration as evidences of the progressive principles of his party.

"Contrast this progressive Democratic record with what has gone on in Washington during the past three years of Republican reactionary rule. There has been an orgy of privilege and corruption. The Ford-McCumber tariff bill was passed to benefit the privileged classes and reward them for the large sums furnished to the campaign fund in 1920. The railroads were favored with and the people punished by excessive freight and passenger rates. In revision of the internal revenue laws men of great incomes were favored at the expense of those who earned small incomes."

Mr. McAdoo is contesting in the Georgia primary with Senator Oscar W. Underwood, of Alabama.

High Point, March 14.—Guarded by her five year old daughter who sought to prevent anyone entering the room, Mrs. L. C. Jenkins, wife of the chief of police of Thomasville, was found dead in her room in the Jenkins home in Thomasville today. The body was lying in a pool of blood.

Efforts are being made to locate Chief of Police Jenkins, who left about 1 o'clock yesterday morning in the department's auto after telling the desk man at police headquarters that he was on the trail of bootleggers.

Charlotte, March 14.—L. C. Jenkins, whose wife was found dead this morning at Thomasville was a former patrolman on the Charlotte police force. He left here about six months ago to become chief of police at Thomasville.

THE TAX REDUCTION PROBLEM

Powerful pressure will be exerted by President Coolidge, it is foreseen, to have the Senate reverse the verdict and action of the House of Representatives in respect to the Mellon tax plan. There is a general expectation that the bestowal or denial of patronage and other favors will be the means by which the Administration will attempt to influence the attitude of Republican Senators who are suspected of an intention of supporting the bill already adopted in the House.

Persons familiar with the affairs of Congress predict that attempts to sway Western Republican Senators in favor of the Mellon plan will be fruitless. The advantages of the Garner (Democratic) bill in comparison with Secretary Mellon's proposal have been advertised in all parts of the country and the voters have begun to show unmistakable preference for the former. The political consequences of reducing the higher surtaxes on incomes of hundreds of thousands and millions while the smaller taxpayers are only slightly benefitted are too plain to these western Republicans to be ignored.

The Senate's action is already taken for granted. It is regarded as morally certain that the Republican Senators from the West, with few exceptions, will vote with the Democrats to make the substitute measure which passed the House more nearly resemble the original Garner plan.

The only two points of substantial difference between the Democratic and the Longworth-LaFollette substitute which passed are, first, that the Democratic proposal raises exemptions from \$1,000 and \$2,500 for single and married persons respectively, to \$2,000 and \$3,000, thereby releasing about 800,000 persons, from making any returns and releasing from further taxes nearly 1,646,000 persons whose average taxes are under \$12.00 each. The Longworth-LaFollette measure gives no relief as to these exemptions, although these millions of persons are already paying most grinding tariff taxes.

The second point of chief difference is in the higher-surtax brackets due to the flat 25 per cent reduction of each surtax rate under the Longworth-LaFollette plan. Under the operation of this flat 25 per cent reduction method, the Longworth plan would affect substantially larger reductions of the taxes of between 15,000 and 20,000 of the biggest individual income taxpayers with incomes in excess of \$46,000 and upward, than the Garner (Democratic) plan. The application of a flat 25 per cent reduction of all graduated rates is obviously both arbitrary and unscientific, because the chief reduction benefits go to those with the large incomes and subject to the higher rates. The higher the rate, in other words, the greater and the more disproportionate are the reduction benefits as compared with a like 25 per cent reduction of the smaller surtax rates.

This condition could be no more clearly illustrated than by the fact that the Democratic tax proposal affords larger surtax reductions on incomes up to \$46,000 than the Longworth-LaFollette proposal, and hence when these two proposals are applied to the rates on the higher incomes, the Longworth-LaFollette reductions increase much more rapidly than the Garner (Democratic) reduction of taxes. The latter scale of rates is based somewhat on the usual method of graduation, while the former makes arbitrary departures therefrom. For illustration the Longworth-LaFollette plan gives a reduction of \$24,000 on an income of \$250,000, but only \$75 on an income of \$15,000.

Local Methodists' Quota \$400 On The Endowment Fund

Next Sunday morning every charge in Southern Methodism is asked to take an offering for what is known as our Superannuate Endowment Fund. The purpose of this fund is to provide support for our superannuate ministers and the widows and orphans of ministers deceased.

There are at present 877 of these old veterans, who having given their lives to the church, are now, because of age and physical disability, no longer able to serve in the active ranks. Beside these there are 1361 widows and 300 orphans who are without means for the necessities of life.

All Methodist preachers keep a record of their work from year to year, and compiling these records from the ministry of these 877 superannuates, some very interesting facts have been gathered. Their average term of service has been thirty-five years. Their average yearly salary has been \$425. The records show a total salary deficit of about three million dollars.

These 877 men during the years of their active ministry built 4,000 churches at a total cost of \$8,000,000. They repaired 5,000 more at a cost of \$2,000,000. They built 1500 parsonages and repaired 2,000 more at a cost of \$3,500,000. In addition they secured other property for the church valued at not less than \$2,000,000. Thus we see that by virtue of the faithful service of these men, \$15,500,000 worth of property has been added to our material wealth.

While it is by no means so easy to tabulate spiritual results, yet the following facts are not without interest. These men of God have united in marriage 263,000 couples; they have conducted 410,000 funerals; they have baptized 322,000 babies; organized 25,000 Sunday schools; 9,000 women's missionary societies; and 7,000 Epworth Leagues. They have received into the church approximately 1,000,000 members, or more than one third of our present total membership.

Furthermore, from their parsonage homes 234 sons have entered the ministry and 93 daughters have become wives of ministers. From these homes forty-eight sons and daughters have gone as foreign missionaries; three hundred and three have become teachers in our church schools and thirty-nine have made editors of church papers.

One fact more before we pass on, under the preaching and personal influence of these 877 men approximately 4,000 young men have heard and answered the call to the ministry. This is more than one half the entire number of active preachers in all conferences today.

Now let us look for a moment at the present status of these old warriors, servants of God and the church. The average age is 67 years. About four hundred of them have very bad sight or hearing, being practically blind or deaf. A large number are invalids, being confined to their homes, crutches, wheel-chairs or beds. One hundred and seventy have each an invalid member of the family to support. Most of them live in humble rented cottages, some of them live in homes which they claim to own but in almost every case they are under heavy mortgage. Some live in cheap rooming houses; some with their children; some roam around and rarely one of them is able to do any kind of work.

With an average annual salary

of considerably less than \$500, it is not surprising that they have been unable to lay-by anything for old age. How then do they manage to live when the days of their active ministry comes to a close and salary ceases to be. This is a question which only the All-wise God can fully answer. In many cases, be it said to the shame of our great and rich church, they have been supported very largely as objects of charity in those communities where they spend their latter years. This writer knows of one instance where an aged minister, who gave sixty years of service to the church, is now in his middle nineties clothed by a Jewish merchant in the town where he lives.

True they have been receiving a small pension from their respective conferences, but this does not amount to enough to pay the rent of an humble cottage on a back street.

Now the church is undertaking to rid herself of this shame and reproach by raising an endowment

fund of not less than ten millions of dollars. The interest from this fund will be distributed on a equitable basis each year for the relief of these needy claimants. In the effort to raise this ten million dollars, each charge is asked to contribute as a minimum offering the amount which was paid last year for pastor's and Presiding Elder's salary. On this basis Jarvis Memorial is expected to give approximately four thousand dollars. And since we are allowed five years in which to raise this amount we are asking you for at least eight hundred dollars next Sunday, March 16th, all of which must be paid as soon as possible, and not later than September 1st. It is confidently expected that our great church will do her full duty as respects this most pressing and worthy cause.
