

THOMASVILLE CHIEF IS ARRESTED ON THE CHARGE OF MURDER

Woman Found Dead in His Room Identified as the Wife of Another

High Point, March 15.—L. C. Jenkins, chief of police of Thomasville, who is charged with the murder of Mrs. Elizabeth Jones, of Appalachia, Va., whose body was found in Jenkins's room yesterday, was arrested when he returned to Thomasville early today. Jenkins was taken to Lexington and placed in the Davidson county jail.

The body of the woman was found yesterday after she had not been seen for more than a day. The body was lying on the bed in a pool of blood. Her 5 year old daughter was in the room and attempted to prevent anyone from entering, telling them to go away each time that they knocked. The woman was believed to have been Jenkins's wife until a telegram was received last night from Greenville, South Carolina, signed by a woman who says that she is the wife of Jenkins. The body was later tentatively identified as a result of a telephone message from Asheville stating that the woman was Mrs. Jones.

Jenkins had left Thomasville Thursday, shortly after midnight, having informed the desk official at the police department that he was on the trail of bootleggers. He returned this morning and was immediately taken into custody. The coroner's jury yesterday held him responsible for the killing.

According to police statements, Jenkins said today that the woman fired the shot that caused her death. The girl who was present when the killing occurred was questioned by the coroner but did not say who did the killing.

Lexington, March 15.—Charged with the murder of a woman whose body was found in his room in Thomasville, L. C. Jenkins, chief of police of that city, is in the county jail here awaiting preliminary hearing.

He was placed there this morning in Sheriff R. L. Talbert's care by City Manager R. W. Cookly, of Thomasville.

The date of the preliminary hearing has not been set but it is thought that he will be arraigned in recorder's court within the next few days.

His whereabouts was a mystery since Wednesday morning until he arrived in Thomasville about 3 o'clock this morning and upon going to a cafe he made inquiry about a little girl of the woman who was found in his room. He was told that the girl was all right. He then gave himself up to authorities.

He was in a very nervous condition when interviewed in his cell. He talked to Sheriff Talbert but gave little information as to the killing. He said that the woman who was first known in Thomasville as his wife and later as Mrs. Elizabeth Jones of Appalachia, Va., he said that the woman shot herself and when asked how she managed to shoot herself through her left shoulder the bullet ranging downward toward her heart he made no reply.

"Why did you leave town if you knew she committed suicide?" he was asked and his only reply was "that's it."

"Why should you have to go for assistance when there is a telephone in your room?" asked the sheriff. "That's it," he answered again. "I must have been crazy," he said.

Jenkins admitted that the woman was not his wife and that his wife was in Greenville, South Carolina. In explanation of his absence since Wednesday he said that he drove to High Point in an auto belonging to the police department of Thomasville and there boarded a train for Greenville South Carolina to visit relatives. He returned at 3 o'clock this morning and gave himself up.

The time of the killing has been fixed by authorities as about midnight Wednesday but the body was not found until 3:30 Friday morning. During this time the woman's body had lay in the room with her 5 year old daughter the only companion. Several callers at the room had been told "Daddy is not home and you can't see Mamma."

At 9:30 Friday morning some of the callers gained entrance to the

WALSH'S ILLNESS CAUSES HALT IN INVESTIGATION

Washington, March 15.—Investigation of pending leads in the oil inquiry has been put off until next week due to the illness of Senator Walsh, Democrat, Montana, who has been advised by his physicians to rest for several days because of slight bronchial complications developing from a cold from which he has been suffering for some time. The committee decided yesterday to recess until Tuesday and no effort will be made to work out a program until Senator Walsh is able to return to the Capitol.

Watchman Hollywood Studio Found Wounded Near the Gate Today

Los Angeles, March 15.—Jensen, watchman, at the Hollywood studio of Warner Brothers Motion Picture Studios, was found fatally wounded near the studio gates early today by Frank Ferguson who motored past, saw Jensen stumble out of the gate and heard him gasp, "I've been shot" and then fall to the ground unconscious. Jensen died while Ferguson was hurrying him to a hospital.

Detectives found at the studio an auto registered as belonging to H. M. Warner, the engine still warm but with no one about. Police learned that Everett Miller, chauffeur for H. M. Warner, had visited the studio about 15 minutes before the shooting. Miller was relieved after he insisted that he knew nothing about the affair.

Charges Made Against Anti-Saloon Leagues of Metropolitan District

New York, March 15.—Having been dismissed as superintendent of the Anti-Saloon Leagues Metropolitan district, Dr. Samuel L. Hamilton, made charges that salaries were kept from employees of the league in some cases for three months because funds subscribed for prohibition work were converted to a gift to W. H. Anderson not to exceed \$7,500. Anderson was convicted for forgery and resigned as state superintendent of the league recently.

The cause given by League officials for Hamilton's discharge was hostility to the policies of the league.

Simultaneously the league reacted yesterday's statement criticising District Attorney Banton.

Dr. Hamilton said that he was not hostile to the league's policies but to those of a little group whom he considered jointly responsible with Anderson for the League's difficulties. The little league allowed Anderson to continue to have desk and office room in our headquarters after he had been convicted of forgery and six weeks after he had resigned, said Hamilton.

ZANGWILL FOUND NO MEN IN THE U. S. ON TRIAL

Plymouth.—Israel Zangwill who arrived here recently said democracy is on trial in America, because there are no more great men in America. It was nothing more or less than politicians playing down to a crowd which was ill-informed on most subjects and knew nothing at all about Europe, he said.

"There is more justice, sense of honor, and more efficiency in England than in America," he said, before proceeding to describe Americans as being, the "kindest hearted and most charitable people in the world."

room and found the body lying in a pool of blood with a wound in the left shoulder coming out close to the heart. The bullet was found lodged in the wall. Blood stains on the door and on a water pitcher led to the belief that the woman had moved about the room before she fell upon the bed.

In the room was also found a small quantity of whisky in a fruit jar upon the table and celery and cherries and other articles of food indicating that a party had evidently been held.

The gun, a .38 caliber, with one empty cartridge was found in the room. The weapon was of a cheap make and was identified by the sheriff as belonging to Jenkins.

Sheriff Talbert, of Lexington, was notified and a coroner's jury Friday evening charged Jenkins with the murder.

The woman was identified as the wife of Thomas Jones, of Appalachia, Va. She was a blond, weighing about 180 pounds and was apparently about 28 years of age.

Cables from Paris indicate that the Allied Commission, headed by Brigadier-General Charles G. Dawes, of Chicago, has reached a reparations agreement that is acceptable to both France and Germany. Fearing a military coupe d'etat in France, M. Maginot, Minister of War, is said to have issued secret orders to division commanders in the Paris district as to steps they are to take if a stage of siege is ordered. A resolution calling for the investigation of the Bureau of Internal Revenue, under Secretary of the Treasury Andrew Mellon, has been passed by the Senate after being introduced by Senator James Couzens, Republican, of Michigan. Albert Hall Harris, vice-president in charge of corporate relations of the New York Central Railroad, is said to be slated for the presidency, made vacant by the death of Alfred H. Smith. The divorced wife of Jesse Smith, intimate friend of Attorney-General Harry M. Daugherty, in whose Washington apartment Smith killed himself, swore before the Senate investigating committee that her husband and Daugherty were involved in many stock transactions and that he told her "they" had received stock for which they paid nothing.

MAYOR D. M. CLARK CLOSES DEAL FOR LOCAL GAS PLANT

Check for Mains Accepted by P. L. Clodfelter and Are Turned Over to the City

Mayor D. M. Clark received a check today from Judge Bragaw, attorney for R. A. Blackwood, in payment for Greenville's gas mains. Mr. Clark immediately turned the check over to Mr. P. L. Clodfelter, chairman of the finance committee for his acceptance. Mr. Clodfelter accepted same and has given it to the town treasurer. With the acceptance of this check Greenville is assured a gas plant.

The gas mains were installed prior to the laying of the pavement in 1917. Since that time they have never been utilized although it was believed that at some future date Greenville people would enjoy the advantages of gas. At a recent meeting of the board an application from Mr. Blackwood was presented asking that the town sell to him the gas pipes, with his object being the installation of a plant for \$26,801.52 the actual cost of the pipes plus 6 per cent interest from the time of the installation of the mains.

Mayor Clark received the proposition favorably as did the aldermen and the issue passed its second reading by an unanimous vote. Mr. Clark has been most enthusiastic over the proposition from its conception and has worked diligently in his efforts to make it a reality. He has had the undivided support of the aldermen who have also had their part in securing for the city the gas plant.

MORE WITNESSES HEARD TODAY IN DAUGHERTY PROBE

Witness Says He Was Informed That Showing of the Carpentier- Dempsey Fight Films Would Not Be Bothered By Department of Justice

Washington, March 15.—Turning aside from the sensational testimony of Roxie Stinson and Gaston B. Means, the Senate committee investigating the department of Justice today began to delve into allegations that the exhibition of the Carpentier-Dempsey fight films had been carried on through arrangements with Jesse W. Smith, Attorney General Daugherty's friend, and his associates.

F. C. Quinby, who described himself as a New York motion picture producer, maker of the films, testified that the arrangements, as he understood it, for rights of showing the fight films, interstate transportation of which is prohibited by law, were to be let out to exhibitors of various states and that local expenses, and attorney fees were to be borne out of a fund provided by the owners of the films. Quinby said he understood that Smith, Jap Muma, Will Orr and Ike Martin had arranged the plan to display the fight films and that Tex Richard had told him of this plan. He said that he had been told to go ahead showing the films and that he would not be bothered by the Department of Justice.

A sudden shift was made today in the Daugherty investigation, Gaston B. Means nor Roxie Stinson neither being recalled to the stand.

Frank A. Vandevelp, New York financier, who appeared in the Teapot Dome hearings, was seated near the committee table as the session opened.

Although scheduled to begin at 10 o'clock the committee was half hour late getting under way because of confusion caused by the great crowds of spectators who insisted on forcing their way into the committee rooms.

F. C. Quinby, New York moving picture man who made the films of the Carpentier-Dempsey prize fight, was today's first witness.

Quinby told of his acquaintance with William Orr and Jap Muma, identified yesterday by Gaston B. Means as part owners of the Carpentier-Dempsey fight films, but said he did not know Jesse Smith. Quinby identified himself as a New York motion picture producer and head of the Quinby Film Company.

"You took pictures of the Dempsey-Carpentier fight?" asked Senator Wheeler.

"I was the producer" was the reply.

"Are you acquainted with Jack Kearns, Dempsey's manager?" Senator Wheeler proceeded.

"Yes."

"With Tex Richard?"

"Yes."

Quinby said that he made a contract with Richard in 1921 to produce and sell films of the fight.

W. P. MUNFORD DIED YESTERDAY AFTERNOON

TOO MUCH "DIPLOMACY"

The Berkley, California, Daily Gazette says: "General Dawes' inaugural address as chairman of the German committee, according to the Paris Midi, 'turned the oratorical customs and diplomatic prejudices of old Europe upside down.' The Dawes idea was to hold three sessions of the committee, morning, afternoon and night, seven days in the week, until the job was done. 'Like a good American' remarks the Paris newspaper, 'he was unable to understand why what could be done today should be postponed until tomorrow.' 'His plan was admirable. But he failed to take into account 'the impossibility of officials doing without their week-end rest and Saturday golfing,' also the desire of every European expert to sit on every committee, thus preventing efficient distribution of tasks. As a result, the committee is getting done in a week, what the American members consider about half a week's work. 'To an American mind, there can be no question about the value of the typical American trait of taking hold of a job in an emergency and sparing no effort until it is done. The Europeans on that committee do not seem to recognize an emergency. And that is one of the main troubles of Europe.'"

MUSCLE SHOALS

The magic of Henry Ford's name seems to have had more to do with making converts to

the proposal that the Government turn over to him Muscle Shoals than the actual terms of his offer. For two years his plan has been under steady criticism from many quarters, official, political and industrial, yet when it came to the final test in the House he won easily over all opposition. No arguments, no attacks, were of the least avail in overcoming the extraordinary enthusiasm manifested for the Detroit man as the prospective power magnate of the Tennessee Valley. No existing company or combination of interests could hope for the same generous treatment at the hands of Congress or benefit by the same widespread unquestioning faith in the power to work miracles.

The weak point in the Ford lease from the Government's standpoint, must be that it runs for 100 years. This is in direct violation of the Federal Water-Power Act, which imposes a limit of fifty years in all leases. The objection to this long-term concession to Ford must be as obvious as in the case of any others elsewhere in dealing with similar privileges. It is impossible to foresee so far ahead whether the lease in the long future would be fair and reasonable in operation as against the public. There is no way of estimating how fifty or seventy-five years from now control of this immense water-power by a single interest will work in practice.

But apparently all rules are off when Henry Ford is a favored competitor. If Muscle Shoals is finally awarded to him on his conditions, it will be defiance of principles that have been generally accepted as inviolable.

A check has been received by city authorities in payment for the gas lines that have been buried beneath our streets for more than six years. Under the agreement of the franchise the company to whom these lines were sold must begin at once upon the erection of a gas plant in the city. After a long period of gassing we are now to have real gas.

cookies than their food value justifies, is made by workers of the state farm extension service. These workers, with the aid of charts kept by representative farmers' wives, have figured that the average farm woman in this state performs nearly 4,000 hours of labor a year, in effect giving her an eleven-hour day, including Sundays and holidays.

The extension workers are trying to work out some means of reducing this burden. A campaign for better food selection is being made, in view of the fact that the charts show an average of four hours a day spent in food preparation. The inconvenient arrangement of kitchens and poor equipment is found to be an important factor in the situation. The time spent on sewing, the workers say, can be reduced by education in equipment and methods. Better washing equipment will help in laundry work.

The extension service heard of a farmer who was forced to do the family washing because his wife was ill. She had done her laundry work for 27 years with inadequate equipment, but at the end of two weeks the farmer bought a washing machine.

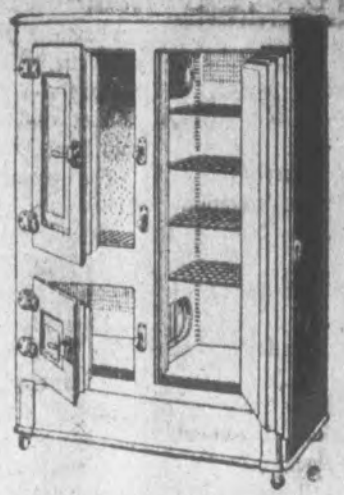
