

COMMITTEE TOLD OF OIL IN CHICAGO CONVENTION 1920

Story Says That Woods
Was Offered Oil Dele-
gates in Return for In-
terior Secretary Ap-
pointment

Washington, D. C., March 19. — The atmosphere at the Chicago Republican convention in 1920 was surcharged with stories of oil deals the Senate oil committee was told today by Tiffin Gilmore, deputy Secretary of State of Ohio, who was at the Chicago convention as a Wood supporter.

With James G. Darden, one of the mystery men in the oil and Daugherty inquiries, waiting to tell his story, the oil committee put on the stand as its first witness Tiffin Gilmore.

He was called by that part of the committee's inquiry into stories of oil deals in the Republican campaign of 1920 and Gilmore was asked as to his connection with that campaign. He said that he had attended the Chicago convention as a worker for General Wood. "We were almost 'hostile camps' declared Gilmore.

"Who?" asked Senator Walsh, the committee's chief prosecutor. "We had a bitter primary as between Senator Harding and General Wood," replied the witness, and added that it was carried over to the convention.

Gilmore said that he had had a conference with Carmi Thompson, a Harding supporter, on the sleeper between Chicago and Washington and quoted Thompson as saying, "Tiffin, you need not worry that ever now."

"I said you are damned right you do," the witness continued. "One story was, Gilmore said, that oil operators had proposed to throw delegates to Wood if he would permit them to name the Secretary of Interior. He knew nothing, he said, but it was common talk that a deal had been consummated between the oil operators and the possible nominee.

"Who were the operators?" he was asked. "I do not know except that they were big operators in the western district," he replied.

"Who made the proposition," was asked.

"I do not know nor can I say," replied Gilmore, "the proposition made to Wood."

In the convention Carmi Thompson, Ohio Republican leader, had some discussion over a land claim in which he was interested, said the witness.

"What land were you referring to when you asked Thompson if he had the land?" asked Senator Bursum, New Mexico.

"The whole air was so surcharged that I cannot tell. I think it was some land adjacent to Baker's Field, California. I had not heard of Teapot Dome at that time," declared the witness.

"Did you gather that Hamon had anything to do with it?" he was asked.

"I do not know what oil companies there were in it but I remember that a young man by the name of Moulter told me that Hamon was mixed up in it," he replied.

James G. Darden, friend of President Harding and man farflung interest testifying about the Teapot claim in which he was interested along with John F. Champion and others said that they made claim to 109 acres without a fence or a scratch upon it and that he had been promised some sort of adjustment on it by Secretary Payne in the Wilson administration but that they never had applied for a lease.

Darden declared that he had learned through gossip two months in advance that Sinclair was to get the lease. Arrangements were made with the Mutual Oil Company, Darden's lawyer told the committee, to develop the claim but that before work could be begun it was learned that the Sinclair lease had been consummated. Darden had hoped to test the legality of Sinclair's contract he said, but when he took the matter up with President Harding and other officials he found that Secretary Fall had prepared to clear the reservation forthwith by force.

SUBMARINE 43, JAPANESE NAVY, AT SEA BOTTOM

Sasebo, Japan, March 19. — The 800-ton submarine 43, of the Japanese Navy, collided today with the battleship Tatsuha during minor maneuvers and sank with four officers and 10 men 10 miles outside Sasebo harbor.

Several hours later the navy department ascertained that every effort to rescue the men was being made, but that there was little hope that there would be any survivors.

Chicago, March 19. — John W. Thompson, Saint Louis and Chicago contractor, indicted jointly with Col. Charles R. Forbes, former director of the Veterans' Bureau charged today in a sworn statement in federal district court that the indictments had been obtained through subterfuge, misrepresentations, false pretense and threats. The statement was in connection with motion by Thompson's counsel to have the indictment against him quashed. They also sought to restrain the court from the use of books and papers belonging to Thompson against him.

Raleigh, March 19. — I. M. Meekins, Elizabeth City, was today nominated as candidate for Governor of North Carolina by the Republican State convention in session here. His nomination was by acclamation there being no other candidate offered.

In his speech of thanks, Mr. Meekins, declared his platform for honest government, economical administration for the preservation of our traditions and promulgation of the highest national possibilities.

Raleigh, March 19. — The Republican State Convention met here at noon today. A. A. Whitener, of Hickory, temporary chairman was made permanent chairman of the convention and Charles A. Green was made secretary and W. H. Bickley, assistant secretary.

Immediately after convening, Whitener announced the various committees. The platform committee is composed of J. T. Tucker, W. R. Chambers, Mrs. Fred K. W. Meekins, R. H. Shupert, Dean By Tucker, I. J. Hayes, H. S. Williams, C. M. Reynolds and W. E. Byrd.

Inspection of Cavalry Troops to Start On Thursday Afternoon

Raleigh, March 19. — The annual inspection of the cavalry troops of the North Carolina National Guard will be started on Thursday afternoon next, has been announced. The first inspection will be of the Troop E, 109th Cavalry stationed at Asheville. This will be followed by inspections of Troop D, stationed at Andrews; on March 22; Troop E, at Lincolnton on March 25; Troop G, at Hickory on March 28; the Signal Corps at Canton on March 29; and the 195 Veterinary Corps, with an enlisted personnel of 20 men, at the same time. The inspection will be conducted by Captain C. A. Pierce, instructor and inspector in chief of the Tennessee National Guard, who will conduct the inspection.

The cavalry unit, which is being inspected, has been following the program of instruction outlined by Major S. M. Williams, inspection and instruction officer of the North Carolina National Guard, who made considerable improvement in the past year.

General J. Van Metts, adjutant general of North Carolina, and Major Wade Bowman, commanding officer of the Second Squadron, 190 Cavalry, will probably accompany the inspecting officer.

Chapel Hill, March 19. — Charles G. Vardell, Jr., a member of the faculty of Salem College, has been named winner this year of the Shirley Cup, which is given annually by Dean H. A. ILLNESS WHEELER CAUSES A LULL IN DAUGHERTY PROBE

Failure of Department
to Suppress Lotteries
Charged by Witnesses

The Daugherty investigation committee diverted from film and whiskey deals when it resumed taking testimony this morning by continuing to hear Macon Stewart, Galveston, Texas lawyer, who alleged that the Department of Justice has failed to prosecute the Standard Home Builders Company, of Birmingham, Alabama, a contracting and loan concern of the type termed by Stewart as a lottery.

Examination of important witnesses today was postponed because of the illness of Senator Wheeler, Democrat, Montana, chief prosecutor for the committee. It is planned today to touch only on uncompleted lines of testimony.

Stewart admitted that there had been some indictments but said that they could not be convicted.

Highland, counsel for the Attorney General, in cross examining the witness attempted to show a series of indictments the department had made. These, however, failed to charge lottery.

"Do you understand that all these fraud charges are prepared by the Post Office Department and that the Department of Justice has nothing to do with it until called upon by the Post Office Department?" asked Highland.

"I understand that," Stewart replied.

"Is there no difference of opinion in the courts as to whether or not these companies are lotteries," asked Highland.

"No there is no difference," was the reply.

T. D. Dawkins, Texas post office inspector, followed Stewart on the stand to testify in connection with the contract loans or alleged lottery company operations.

LET THERE BE LIGHTS

During the last General Assembly of North Carolina there was presented a bill which would have required every vehicle traveling a public highway at night to carry a light, but the majority of the lawmakers, blinded by the fear of the loss of a few votes of those

who would oppose such a law because it would mean the outlay of a dollar for a lantern, refused to realize the value of a human life and see the need of such legislation and it is upon their shoulders that the responsibility of accidents caused by unlighted vehicles since that time should rest.

Many of the states have such a law and in most cases the cost of carrying out the law is nil as compared to the great saving in personal injury and property damage.

Realizing that our highways are for the use of all and that everyone regardless of their mode of travel is entitled to protection, it is to be hoped that the voters will insist that those who represent us in the next legislature pledge themselves to support the measure requiring all vehicles upon the public roads at night to display a light.

Too much oil will often foul the plugs of the car that led in the beginning of the race and cause it to be in last position before the home stretch is reached. No doubt the G. O. P., suffering from too much oil, will be in a similar position before the end of the present race is reached in November.

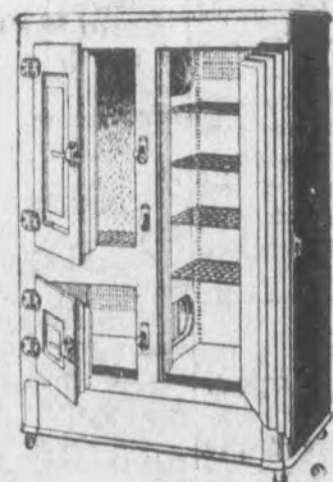

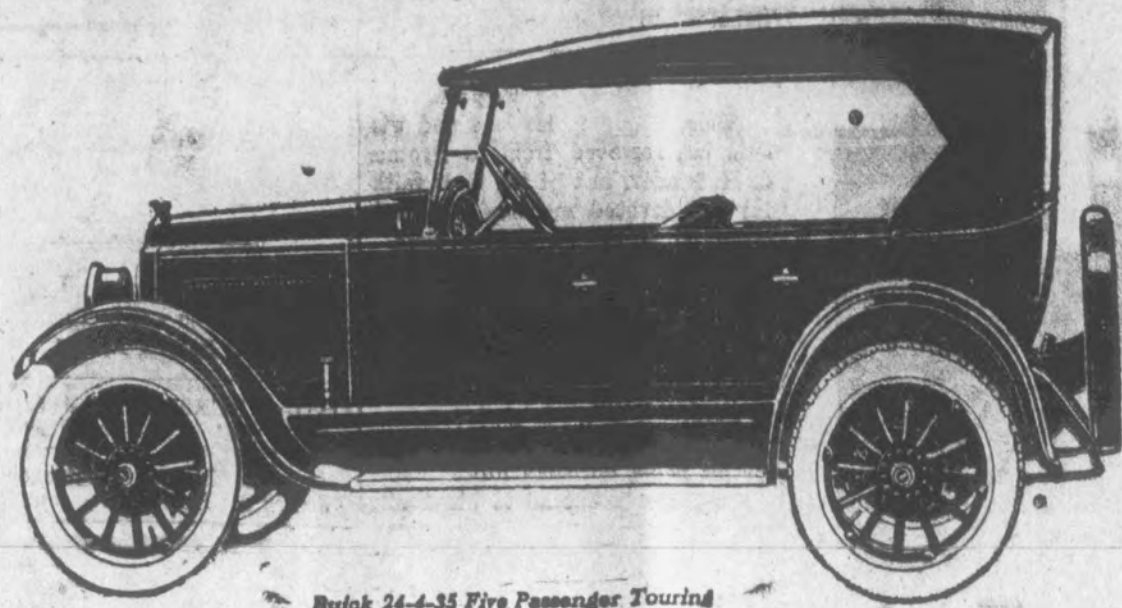

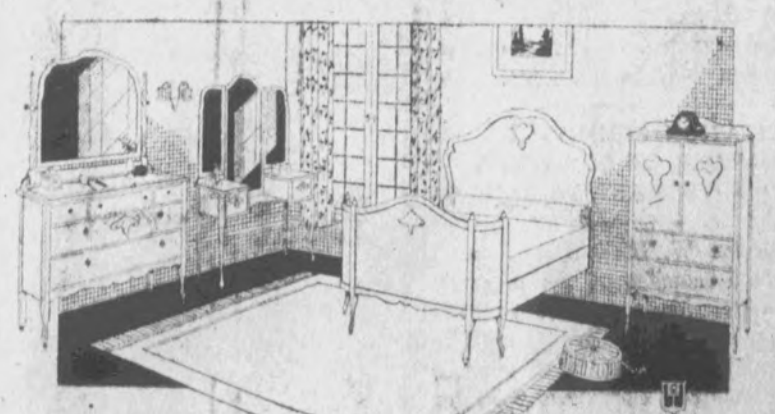

REPUBLICAN FIGHT WILL BE FEATURE OF NEBRASKA PRIMARY

Omaha, Neb., March 19.—A clear-cut state presidential preferential contest between President Calvin Coolidge and United States Senator Hiram Johnson has developed in this state during the last two months and the issue will be decided, probably without the injection of other candidates, in the primary here on April 8. Supporters of each have been at work for some time and both sides express confidence in the outcome.

The Democratic contest for presidential preference, however, is somewhat clouded. The contestants have up until a few days before the primary in which to file as candidates. William G. McAdoo, who was Governor of California, has announced that he would not contest this state with Bryan, who was at that time mentioned as a presidential possibility. However, since then Governor Bryan has announced he would be a candidate for renomination as governor and would not enter the presidential lists. No other Democratic candidates have put in an appearance thus far.

After saying for some time that he would not be a candidate to succeed himself, Senator George W. Norris has finally come out for renomination and it now looks as though this contest may be confined to the senator, former Congressman Charles H. Sloan, whose platform indicates he is an administration man, and Lieutenant Governor Fred Johnson of Hastings. Sloan has come out for virtually all of the leading Coolidge policies, except he promises support of the soldiers' bonus. On the Democratic side Trennor Cone, a business man of Valley, Neb., is the only candidate for U. S. Senator that has thus far filed.

Three candidates are in the field for the Republican gubernatorial nomination while Governor Bryan is the only Democratic candidate to file to date. The Republican candidates are C. H. Gustafson of Lincoln; A. N. Mathers of Gering and Adam McMullen of Beatrice. Gustafson was formerly connected with the Farmers' Union and at one time president of the United States Grain Growers, Inc. McMullen was a candidate at the last gubernatorial primary and was only beaten by the Republican nominee, Charles Randall of Randolph, about 500 votes in one of the closest and most sensational contests Nebraska ever experienced.

Coyotes Exterminated From Island in Great Salt Lake, Report

Salt Lake City.—Government predatory animal hunters, after two years' hard work with trap and gun, have successfully exterminated every coyote on Antelope Island in Great Salt Lake and now sheep, cattle and buffalo herds may roam about without danger according to official announcement.

Antelope Island, which is 15 miles long and seven miles wide, rises like a jewel in Utah's "Dead Sea." With all the coyotes gone it is a virtual paradise for the stockman and it is considered highly improbable that any of the animals will get to the island from the mainland.

The buffalo herd on the island is one of the last on the continent. The animals belong to a private corporation and are occasionally used in connection with motion picture enterprises and frequently hunters, by paying a stipulated sum of money, are allowed to slay one of the "Monarchs of the Plains."

Homes of Nation Must Be First, Leaders Urge as Communities Mobilize for Better Homes Drive

That the homes of a nation are and must continue to be a thing of greatest importance to the women of that nation is maintained by some of the best-known women of the United States, who are devoting their time and energies to home improvement, under the auspices of Better Homes in America.

Among the national leaders on the board of directors of this organization is Miss Grace Abbott, Chief of the United States Children's Bureau. Miss Abbott points out the urgency of better homes in America from the standpoint of the children of the country. Another earnest advocate of home betterment is Mrs. Thomas G. Winter, president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, and a member of the advisory council of Better Homes in America.

The Better Homes in America movement grew out of a resolution of the late President Harding at the White House, Ohio in 1923, who declared that "the soundness of our country system and stability of our country are greatly enhanced by the development of a home that can be loved." The organization so

proved its educational value for the home-makers and prospective home-makers of the country that it was recently incorporated as a national educational institution, with Herbert Hoover, Secretary of Commerce, as president, and James Ford, national housing specialist, as executive director.

Communities throughout the United States are already being mobilized for Better Homes demonstrations, which will take place during Better Homes Week, from May 11 to May 18. In former years these demonstrations have been held in communities all the way from the Gulf Stream to beyond the Arctic circle; there were approximately 1000 such demonstrations in 1923 alone. The number will probably be materially increased this year, as the educational value of the demonstrations along home-making lines has been thoroughly established. WOMEN WILL SPEAK FOR BOTH PARTIES IN KENTUCKY CAMPAIGN

Louisville, Ky., March 19.—No less than 22 Kentucky women, 13 Republicans and nine Democrats, none of whom is a candidate for office, will take the stump in support of their political views during the presidential campaign this year.

Some of the widely known women are Mrs. Christine Bradley South, of Frankfort, daughter of late Senator Bradley, and a member of the Republican national committee; Miss Laura Clay, of Lexington, a pioneer in the women's suffrage movement, whose tenets are strongly Democratic; Mrs. Alvin T. Hart, widow of "Tobe" Hart, for years Republican national committeeman from Kentucky, and Mrs. J. Campbell Cantrell, widow of the Democratic nominee for governor last year who died after being nominated.

The Republican state convention not only instructed the delegation to the National Convention to vote for President Coolidge for president but also instructed that the vote for vice-president be cast for United States Senator Richard P. Ernst, of Covington.

Up to the present time only one candidate has been mentioned among the Democrats, William G. McAdoo. The Democratic state convention, which will meet in May will decide upon Kentucky's choice at the National Convention.

Kentucky this year will elect a congressman from each of the 11 districts and a United States senator.

Congressional incumbents, nine Democrats and two Republicans, are understood to be candidates for renomination. United States Senator A. O. Stanley, Democrat, is believed to be certain to seek the Democratic
