

MANY WITNESSES
ARE HEARD TODAY
BY OIL COMMITTEE

Committee Rushing Its
Investigation to a Finish; Preparation Being
Made for Sinclair to Face Court for Refusal
to Submit to Further
Questioning

Washington, March 24.—Odds and ends of testimony bearing upon widely separated aspects of the inquiry went into the records of the Senate oil committee today while members perfected plans to hail Harry F. Sinclair into court because he refused to submit himself to further questioning.

As if the committeemen had determined to push their task of investigating to a quick conclusion witnesses succeeded one another rapidly at the big committee table most of them dismissed after only a scant semblance of cross examination.

Armi Thompson, of Cleveland, one of President Coolidge's campaign managers and close friend of the late President Harding testified that he had no knowledge of "oil deals" at the Republican National Convention of 1920.

Harold Vivian, reporter on the New York Times, told the committee he had received confirmation from the New York office of William H. Hayes that Hayes would testify before the committee of stock transactions by which Sinclair helped wipe out the Republican National Committee's deficit after the 1920 campaign. He said that the story was told him by Joseph O'Neill, Hayes' publicity director, but O'Neill in a telegram read to the committee denied the statement.

The next witness was Martin J. Powers, of Philadelphia, who denied the story that he was interested in any way in Teapot Dome and then he branded as "ignominious lies, various other stories that he said had been circulated about him.

Succeeding Powers to the stand was Michael Cirdelli, also of Philadelphia, who in turn denied some of the testimony of Powers.

C. C. Chase, son-in-law of Albert B. Fall, declined to answer any questions put to him by the committee, on the grounds that answers that he might give would tend to incriminate him. Price McKinney, of Cleveland, had testified that Chase had visited him at his home and asked him to say that he had made the famous \$100,000 loan to Fall.

Diamonds Valued At
\$12,000 Stolen Today

Cleveland, March 24.—Diamonds valued at \$12,000 were snatched from the hands of Samuel Reser, New York jewelry salesman here at noon today. The man grabbed the case in which the jewels were carried and made his escape before the alarm could be given; the police were told. The case was snatched from Reser's hands, he said, as he alighted from a street car to call on a customer.

Galbraith Placed
Charge of Veterans
Bureau in Charlotte

Charlotte, March 24.—John R. Galbraith, of Atlanta, has been placed in temporary charge of the sub-district office in this city of the fifth district of the veterans bureau, by the fifth district manager, M. Bryson. Mr. Galbraith has arrived here and will assume immediate charge.

J. P. Watters, manager of the Charlotte office and V. J. Bradley, his assistant have been relieved from duty here pending the outcome of the efforts that are now being made to retain them the office.

General Frank T. Hines, director of the veterans bureau had ordered the two men discharged or transferred but they resisted the order and demanded a hearing, saying that they had been faithful in the performance of their duty. They were supported by leading legionnaires of this city and by Major R. C. Cherry of Gastonia, state service officer of the American Legion.

POSTPONE INQUIRY
UNTIL WEDNESDAY

Will Complete Stinson
Testimony When Hear-
ing Is Resumed

Washington, March 24.—Further hearings in the Senate's investigation of Attorney General Daugherty were today postponed until Wednesday. Postponement was due to the illness of Senator Wheeler, Democrat, Montana, the committee's chief prosecutor, and to conflicting engagements of other members of the committee.

Senator Wheeler is confined to his bed with a severe cold. Another member of the committee, Senator Moses, Republican, New Hampshire, was engaged in the opening of a new investigation into the Rio Grande land transactions while Senator Jones, Republican, Washington, another member of the committee, was called out of the city.

Chairman Brookhart said today that the Daugherty inquiry would proceed Wednesday even if Senator Wheeler was unable to return to the committee. The Montana Senator has been suffering from a cold for several days.

When the committee Wednesday it hopes to include the testimony and cross examination of Miss Roxie Stinson divorced wife of Jesse Smith, the dead friend of Attorney General Daugherty.

New Secretary Of
Navy, Wilbur, Begins
His Duties Today

Washington, March 24.—Curtis D. Wilbur, of California, new Secretary of Navy, arrived in Washington today, conferred with President Coolidge, and then was installed at a desk in the Navy Department.

The new Secretary and Mrs. Wilbur were met at the station by two naval aides in one of the White House automobiles. Wilbur went directly to the White House, where he spent three quarters of an hour with the president in a general discussion of his new work.

"I have no preconception of the ideas as to naval policies," the secretary said. "I am taking for granted that the naval establishment is well organized and will be able to run along while I gather up the threads. Asked if he could be considered a "big navy man" he said, "Well, I am for a pretty good sized navy." The new secretary, although coming from California, said that he had no definite opinion with respect to the Alameda naval base controversy.

Anderson Sentenced
Two Years Sing Sing

New York March 24.—William H. Anderson, resigned state superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League of New York, recently convicted on a charge of forgery, must go to Sing Sing prison for a term of from one to two years, Supreme Court Justice Wagner ruled today in denying the former dry leader appeal for a certificate of reasonable doubt.

Anderson will leave tomorrow for Sing Sing to begin his term, according to announcement made by C. P. Williams, one of his counsel, today.

CAPT. L. C. ARTHUR JR.
DIED THIS MORNING
IN PITTSBURGH, PA.

Interment Will Take
Place in Arlington
Cemetery Wed.

Captain Louis Chesterfield Arthur, U. S. A., 28, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. C. Arthur, of this city, died at 9:15 o'clock this morning in Pittsburgh, Pa., where he has been stationed for the past year. Death was the result of an attack of pneumonia. Though he had been ill for several days physicians reported his condition favorable until Thursday when it took a turn for the worse. In response to a telegram conveying his critical condition his mother, Mrs. L. C. Arthur, left Thursday for Pittsburgh and was at the bedside when the end came. Interment will take place in Arlington cemetery Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Captain Arthur, born January 19, 1896, was the second son of Mr. and Mrs. L. C. Arthur. He graduated from the Greenville High School in 1913 and after a year of preparation in Washington and West Point he was commissioned under a presidential appointment in the United States Army.

He saw service on the border and as an officer in the Seventh Field Artillery was among the first to leave for overseas after the United States entered the World War. It was the battery of the Seventh artillery, of which he was an officer, that fired the first volley from American guns "over there."

Since his return from overseas Captain Arthur has served as artillery instructor in several posts in various parts of the country, his last assignment being that of Instructor and Inspector of Artillery of the National Guard of Pennsylvania with his headquarters in Pittsburgh. In January of this year he was married to Miss Henrietta Hill of Washington, D. C.

The deceased is survived by his widow; his parents; two brothers, Messrs. J. Ficklen and Robert B. Arthur, and three sisters, Misses Douglas and Virginia Arthur, of this city and Mrs. W. M. Poindexter, Jr., of Winston-Salem. He is also survived by a number of close relatives in this city and Virginia.

Mr. L. C. Arthur father of the deceased, and Messrs. Ficklen and Robert Arthur, Miss Virginia Arthur, and Mrs. E. B. Ficklen, aunt of the deceased, will leave tomorrow for Washington to attend the funeral services. They will be joined enroute by Miss Douglas Arthur and Mrs. Poindexter.

ARCHBISHOPS NEW
YORK AND CHICAGO
MADE CARDINALS

Hayes and Mundelein
Are Elevated in Sol-
emn Ceremony Held
in Vatican in Rome
Today

Rome, March 24.—Monsieur Patrick J. Hayes, Archbishop of New York, and Monsigneur George W. Mundelein, Archbishop of Chicago, were today made Cardinals of the Roman Catholic church in a secret consistory in the historic home of the ceremony carried out in conformity to the centuries old ritual was performed with majestic solemnity and amid a setting of colorful splendor.

The two American prelates thus raised to the dignity of Princess of the church were not present but awaited notification of their elevation at their temporary places of residence in Rome according to the custom.

The multiplicity of duties involved in looking after the religious welfare of the most populous archdiocese in the world and directing the business administration of it ordinarily would be sufficient to tax the capacity of the ablest of men, but Archbishop Hayes of New York, in addition to those duties, has found it possible to perform other important civic, religious and charitable works which have made him one of the outstanding prelates of the Roman Catholic church. During the five years he has been head of the New York archdiocese his work has constantly attracted the attention of the Vatican and on several occasions he has been commended by the present pontiff, Pope Pius XI, and his predecessor, Pope Benedict XV.

Serving his entire ecclesiastical career in New York, the city of his birth, Archbishop Hayes was peculiarly fitted to assume the responsibilities of his office, which are, perhaps, more arduous than those of any other see in the world. A review of his life would make it appear that the archbishopric of New York had been his goal from boyhood because, beginning with his early religious training in St. Andrew's parish, City Hall Place, he has gone through every station in the service of his church that led to that goal. He was a curate, parish priest or pastor, secretary to a bishop, chancellor of the diocese, auxiliary bishop and finally archbishop. In all those positions, in addition to his success as the religious leader of his charges, he has shown extraordinary ability as a business administrator and organizer.

If there is one trait of Archbishop Hayes that stands out more than any other it is charity. His work along those lines has been closely followed by Vatican authorities and since the death of Cardinal Gibbons of Baltimore has caused him to be prominently mentioned at every papal consistory as a possible candidate for elevation to the College of Cardinals.

The Most Reverend George William Mundelein, head of the archdiocese of Chicago, one of the most cosmopolitan dioceses in the world, has devoted his life to the upbuilding of humanity by what his parishioners describe as throwing the bonds of love lightly around the younger generation. He has been declared the youngest bishop ever entrusted with an archdiocese of the importance of the Chicago district.

After his installation as Archbishop of Chicago, February 9, 1916 as a successor to Archbishop James E. Quigley, who died in 1916, as a successor to Archbishop James E. Quigley, who died in 1915, he set about strengthening the organization of the parochial schools. He unified the methods of teaching and the text books, and by an episcopal order required the branches included in the curriculum to be taught in English in every school.

As a memorial to Archbishop Quigley, he instituted the erection of Quigley Memorial Seminary, for the education of Roman Catholic candidates for the priesthood.

Reactionary Republican Senators are telling President Coolidge that the Mellon bill, which died in the House, can not be revived in the Senate. They are warning him that far from expecting the Senate to turn back to the Mellon plan, the President must reconcile himself to a closed approach to the Garner (Democratic) bill.

Senator Watson (Ind.) is one Republican Senator who has been trying to prepare the President's mind for what is morally certain to happen in the Senate. Watson is a hierophant of the reactionaries, but he forsores the course tax legislation is about to take in the Senate. He has informed the President that "the supporters of higher surtaxes have the votes to increase the rates over those in the bill passed by the House." That means an increase to a point above 37 1/2 per cent, and it may be as high as 44 per cent.

Democratic and progressive Republican votes are necessary to the adoption of any bill. To the extent that a measure has the support of Democrats and Progressives it will

be a departure from the Mellon plan and an approach to the Garner bill, which means that it will benefit chiefly the smaller taxpayers. If President Coolidge vetoes that sort of tax reduction, say the Democrats, he will get his answer at the polls next November.

Evidence that President Coolidge's retention of Attorney General Daugherty in the Cabinet is adding to the heavy damage already done to Republican chances in November is to be found even in Republican newspapers. In fact, it is pointed out, much of the damage is traceable to the denunciations of Daugherty in such Republican papers as the Boston-Transcript, the Springfield, (Mass.) Republican, the Chicago Tribune, the Portland Oregonian, the San Francisco Argonaut, and the New York Herald.

"Recent developments in Washington, they (Republican leaders) believe," says a special political writer in the Springfield Republican, "have led thousands of voters to the determination to seek a new deal, and to vote against every one now in office, whether or not there be even a suspicion that he has been involved in any seeming irregularity. That this intent exists there is no doubt. The only uncertainty is as to its extent.

Hundreds of letters are coming daily to Democratic Senators and Congressmen from Republican voters who volunteer the information that they intend to support Democratic instead of Republican candidates next November. Senator Walsh of Montana alone has received scores of such letters from Republican men and women in various parts of the country.

Republican leaders know that there is a steady and serious defection from the ranks of their party because of the scandals that have stained the Harding-Coolidge administration almost from the beginning. There is no sign that President Coolidge has been able to stop or retrieve this loss of public confidence in the Republican regime. The White House has been figuring too conspicuously and too unpleasantly in the investigation of the Teapot Dome scandal to justify the belief that the President can win back popular faith in his party.

Harry Daugherty, it is contended, typifies the condition which the people resent and have resolved to correct and Daugherty remains an official of the Administration and is to be a delegate at large from Ohio to the Republican national convention, with the special approval of President Coolidge and the general managers of his campaign, William Butler and Frank Stearns of Massachusetts.
