## Roxie Stinson Hints Thirty Three Million Made In Oil Deals

Washington, March 26.—A hint of an oil deal in which five men made \$33,000,000 in the fall of 1922 was brought before the Senate Daugherty investigating committee today by Roxie Stinson, divorced wife of the Attorney General's close friend and political lieutenant, Jess W. Smith.

The witness said that Smith had told her of such a transaction and she had understood that it had to do with stocks of the Sinclair interests which on April 7, 1922 leased Teapot Dome.

She added that Smith said that he and Daugherty were sore because the men who made the money were friends of theirs but that they had not let them in on the deal. She could not name the men. The sitting reference to the \$33,000,000 affair was made in the midst of a session which otherwise lacked much of the momentum that accompanied Miss Stinson's previous appearance as a star witness in the inquiry.

Senator Wheeler, Montana, the committee's chief prosecutor, was kept at home today by a cold and for the most part the prosecution proceeded quite peacefully.

Roxie Stinson, divorced wife of Harry M. Daugherty's friend, Jess Smith, continued today before the Daugherty investigating committee her story of Smith's relations to Attorney General Daugherty and the Department of Justice. The session lacked some of the thrills as those connected with her previous testimony, however, because Senator Wheeler, Montana, the committee's prosecutor is sick in bed.

Before questioning of the witness began Senator Ashurst, Democrat, Arizona, read into the record a transcription of testimony before the oil committee having to do with stock purchases of Daugherty and Smith. The stock transactions were in the name of W. W. Spaid of the stock brokerage firm of Hibbs and Company and one of them was identified as a joint account of Attorney General Daugherty and Smith, which accountants said might have resulted in a loss of \$24,000.

Miss Stinson began her testimony by declaring that despite suspicion to the contrary she believed Smith had committed suicide. She reaffirmed the belief that Attorney General Daugherty was morally responsible for the death of Smith who was found dead about a year ago in the apartments occupied by him and Daugherty. Smith had "put his house in order very carefully" just before his death, she declared, and based her judgment that he took his own life on that circumstance.

### Daugherty and Lodge Confer With Coolidge

Washington, March 26.—Attorney General Daugherty and Senator Lodge, Republican leader, conferred with President Coolidge today but White House officials said that the conferences were separate and that the Republican leader's conference did not concern Attorney General Daugherty's situation.

Daugherty said that his conference was about "routine matters."

### Braswell Released Under \$1,000 Bond

A. H. Braswell, principal of the Bell Arthur School, was arrested Monday night for alleged attack on an 18 year old girl student of the Bell Arthur school early last December.

At a preliminary hearing before Judge Frank A. Daniels here yesterday afternoon, Braswell denied the charge and witnesses testified as to the good character and reputation of the defendant while that of the plaintiff was said to be an absolute contrast.

Judge Daniels ordered the defendant released from custody under bond of \$1,000 pending action by the grand jury. The hearing is scheduled for April 21.

Braswell resumed charge of the school's court on the charges of carrying concealed weapons.

## FRENCH MINISTRY RESIGNED TODAY

### Poincare Advises Newspaper Men His Resignation is Final

Paris, March 26.—The Poincare ministry fell today. Premier Raymond Poincare today after being advised of the vote in the Chamber of Deputies handed the resignation of his cabinet to President Millerand who accepted it.

The premier announced that he had decided irrevocably to give up power.

"Gentlemen," said Poincare, as he left the palace this afternoon after the cabinet meeting with the president at which time the resignations were presented, "my resignation is final." He raised his hat, entered his car and drove off homeward.

The measure, acceptance of which made the question of confidence by the Finance Minister in the absence of Premier Poincare, was rejected by a vote of 271 to 264.

Premier Poincare was before the foreign affairs committee asking a favorable recommendation of the treaty of Lausanne when word of the defeat came. He immediately called the members of the cabinet together in one of the committee rooms adjoining the chamber and after a hasty consultation decision to resign was reached.

Indications are that President Millerand will ask Poincare to form another ministry but the premier's attitude is regarded as doubtful as he has repeatedly declared that if a part of his cabinet went down he would go down with them.

Paris, March 26.—President Millerand asked M. Poincare to continue as premier when he received him at the palace for a conference this afternoon.

### Unfavorable Report On Nomination Knight Been Decided Upon

Washington, March 26.—An unfavorable report has been decided upon by the oil committee on the nomination of Samuel Knight, San Francisco, to be special government counsel in suits looking to recovery of sections 16 and 36 within the boundary of California Naval reserves number 2.

### Bolles to Deliver Address to Raleigh Post of Legion

Raleigh, March 26.—Colonel Lemuel Bolles, of New York City, who has been the executive head of the American Legion for nearly five years will be the principal speaker at a meeting of the Raleigh Post of the American Legion, on April 2 it was announced by the post officers while in Raleigh, Colonel Bolles will be the guest of Josephus Daniels, past commander of the local post, and also of the Lions Club and Major Gordon Smith, assistant adjutant of North Carolina Colonel Bolles will speak to the public at Wake county court house in the evening.

### Nine Negroes Arrested In Connection With An Attack on Upchurch

Wake Forest, March 26.—Nine negroes were arrested and charged with carrying concealed weapons here following the attack upon John Upchurch, of this city, which placed him in the hospital. Upchurch is now at his home in a serious condition according to attending physicians. The arrests of the nine negroes were made while the police were searching for a negro said to be named John Hare who it is alleged struck Upchurch in the temple with a blunt instrument. The negroes will be arraigned in the morning on charges of carrying concealed weapons.

## CAPT. LOUIS ARTHUR BURIED TODAY WITH MILITARY HONORS

### Former Greenville Boy Interred in Arlington National Cemetery

Washington, March 26.—Captain L. C. Arthur, U. S. A. veteran of the World War was buried in Arlington National Cemetery here today with full military honors. He died in Pittsburgh on Monday as a result of pneumonia.

Captain Arthur son of Mr. and Mrs. L. C. Arthur of Greenville, North Carolina, was born January 19, 1890 entered the army in 1913, saw service on the border and was one of the first officers sent overseas during the World War. Since the war he had served as artillery instructor in numerous institutions and at the time of his death was instructor and inspector of the Pennsylvania National Guard.

### Enterprise Bank of Walhalla Robbed

Anderson, S. C., March 26.—Three unknown men bound and gagged Policeman Guy Grant at midnight last night and robbed the Enterprise Bank of Walhalla, S. C., according to reports received today from Walhalla.

The bank vault was entered after a hole big enough for a man to pass through had been melted thru the door. The robbers obtained from \$600 to \$800 in small change the report stated. No trace of them had been found early today.

## STOCKHOLDERS OF COUNTRY CLUB IN ANNUAL MEETING

The stockholders of the Greenville Country Club held their annual meeting last night at the City Hall and unanimously re-elected Mr. H. A. White, president, R. M. Garrett, vice-president and the three outgoing members of the Board of Governors, Mr. W. H. Dail, Dr. L. C. Skinner and Mr. J. S. Ficklen.

The meeting was well attended and much enthusiastic interest was evinced on the part of the members as to the past and future success of the club. President White opened the meeting and gave a brief resume of the constructive work that had been accomplished during the past year. ## COOLIDGE STILL IN LEAD IN SOUTH DAKOTA PRIMARY

Sioux Falls, S. D., March 26.—President Coolidge held his majority of 2,000 votes over Senator Hiram W. Johnson for Republican presidential preference in the first additional returns received here today from the state-wide primary in S. Dakota Tuesday.

When 634 precincts had reported out of the revised total of approximately 1,825 in the state the president had a lead of 2,079.

The count was Coolidge 24,867 and Johnson 22,788.

## Unknown American Steamship in Distress

Wick, Scotland, March 26.—An intercepted radio message from Wilhelmshaven states that an unknown American steamship is in distress at 58.51 North 7.27 East in the North Sea. The vessel had apparently lost both its screw and rudder and was otherwise badly damaged.

## CONTEMPT CASE SINCLAIR WILL BE PRESENTED JURY

Washington, March 26.—The contempt case of Harry F. Sinclair, who refused to answer questions of the Senate oil committee, will be presented to the District of Columbia grand jury tomorrow under plans announced today by District Attorney Tylton Gordon.

Atlee Pomerene and Owen J. Roberts, special government oil counsel, will be asked by Gordon to participate in the case and to this end he will ask the Department of Justice to designate them as special assistants.

By rushing presentation of the case Mr. Gordon hopes to get action before the life of the present grand jury expires next Monday.

## GREENVILLE IN MIDST OF GREAT BUILDING BOOM

### Ten Stores, Apartments and Many Residences Under Construction

That Greenville is entering into a spring building boom is evident on every hand. Besides construction work already under way on twenty odd residences, there are soon to be added 10 stores and several apartments to the Dickerson Avenue business section of the city.

The Wilson Investment Company, holding company of the Young Mercantile Co., has purchased the Tyson lot, 200 by 175 feet on the corner of Dickerson Avenue and Greene street and work will be begun immediately upon the erection of five stores above which will be several modern and up-to-date apartments. The apartments are to have entrance from Greene street. The total cost of the construction will be approximately \$50,000.

Another addition to the Dickerson Avenue section is the erection of five brick stores by Moye and Lassiter on the property adjoining the Centre Brick warehouse. Excavation work has already begun on this property and the buildings will be ready for occupancy sometime during the summer.

## Favorable Report On Child Labor Resolution Ordered by the House

Washington, March 26.—A favorable report on the resolution proposing a child labor amendment to the Constitution was ordered by the House Judiciary committee today.

The committee approved without change the resolution introduced by Representative Foster, Republican, Ohio. Republican leaders have given assurance that the House will have opportunity to vote on the question at an early date.

## 25 Persons Arrested Wayne County For Killing Robbins

Goldsboro, March 26.—The authorities here plan a stricter enforcement of the law regarding the game in this community. During the past week 25 persons have been arrested and fined \$6.50 for killing robins. If the practice keeps up those found guilty will be given the full limit of the law, it was said.

Washington, March 26.—A new estimate of the cost of the Soldiers' Bonus bill passed by the House—\$3,300,000,000—was presented to the Senate Finance Committee today by the actuary of the American Legion, Herbert Hess.

## Rear Admiral Edwin Anderson To Retire Mar. 31

Wilmington, March 26.—Rear Admiral Edwin A. Anderson, a native of Wilmington, and now commander of the Charleston Navy Yards, will be retired on March 31 next, it has been officially announced by the Navy Department. The Admiral has served for 45 years in the navy. (He took command of the Charleston Navy Yards last September, after having command of the Asiatic Fleet. The retirement was made at the request of the Admiral.)

The old Anderson home on Greenville Sound, just out side of Wilmington will be occupied by Admiral Anderson upon his retirement.

## 12,000,000 Pounds Tobacco Sold on the Durham Market

Durham, March 26.—Final statements of the local tobacco market which closed here last week show that the sales of tobacco for the past season on this market were 12,000,000 pounds which brought \$2,500,000. This year's total was about 3,700,000 greater than that of last year according to the local agents. The average price per hundred pounds was quoted as \$21.09. The exact figures on the year's sales were given as follows \$2,632,501.82 for 12,031,621 pounds of tobacco; while those of last year were about \$3,300,000 pounds.

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## IN UNION THERE IS STRENGTH

Republican factionalism in Congress was revealed in its true significance during the passage of the tax bill through the House. The smallest faction was that which supported the Mellon plan, the pet project of the Administration in this Congress.

Western Republicans were unwilling to take the consequences of giving their votes to the Mellon scheme for cutting the surtaxes on the incomes of millionaires, and they sought escape from the necessity of making an outright choice between following the Administration, or favoring their own constituents.

Chairman Green, Republican chairman of the Ways and Means Committee, saved the faces of a large number of Republicans by his numerous warnings to President Coolidge that the Mellon plan could not be enacted as it was submitted by the Secretary of the Treasury. Green was really notifying the country that the Mellon plan was dead, though his statements on the subject were directed to individuals.

In the last stages of the tax bill's consideration in the House there were at least three distinct factions of Republicans. They were those fully and unreservedly committed to the Mellon scheme. These were relatively few. In another category were those who favored a compromise such as was finally accepted. The progressive Republicans constituted the radical wing, but finally surrendered to the wiles of Leader Longworth.

In contrast with these Republican cleavages was the Democratic solidarity. This regime.

concession on the part of the Democrats is expected to be seen in the Senate also. It is taken to argue the existence of a high morale and a general harmony in Democratic ranks on the eve of a historic campaign.

## SENATE GALLERIES THE JURY

If public feeling in the country at large is even approximately reflected in the sentiments expressed by the men and women who daily crowd the Senate galleries during the debate on the Teapot Dome scandal, the Republican Administration is facing an overwhelming defeat at the polls next November. Republican Senators on the floor of the Senate may utter now and then a feeble defense of the corruptionists involved in this infamy; the folks in the galleries show only signs of disgust and indignation.

This jury of men and women hearing testimony and arguments in the case of the people against the Plunderers is unquestionably representative of the nation. Politically, socially, and geographically, these galleries are a cross-section of the American public. They are cleverly from all parts of the country, of all the different political divisions, and from every walk of life. Their collective sentiment and opinions undoubtedly are typical of those to be found in any average community in the United States.

And what is remarkable about this jury of average Americans? In the first place its unmistakable sense and signs of shock at the disclosures of the corruption, dishonor and betrayal of which their sworn officials are being proved guilty; in the second place, the spontaneousness and sincerity with which it voices its condemnation of the betrayers and applauds their accusers. This it does, sometimes, in disregard of the rules which would compel hearers of this story of scandal to remain silent during its recital. There is a breach of the Senate's rules when the galleries show what is in their hearts, but by the same token they interpret the soul of America.

Not once have the Senate galleries revealed by any sign their sympathy with the men and the methods involved in this Teapot Dome scandal. Not once have they failed to demonstrate their approval of all that was said in denunciation and their scorn for all that was uttered in defense of these men and methods. Beholding these galleries react to the evidence, one can only believe that the American people, as a vastly bigger gallery, is responding in the same way and to the same purpose.

And that means the end of the present regime.

### A HUMAN INCIDENT IN CONNECTION WITH TYPHOID FEVER EPIDEMIC, LINCOLN MEMORIAL UNIVERSITY

Eighty-nine mountain children at Lincoln Memorial University, near Cumberland Gap, Tennessee, have been stricken with typhoid fever. The Red Cross is assisting the University in the care of these children. Miss Jane Van De Vrede, Director of the Nursing Service of the Southern Division, who is now at the University directing the expenditures of the Red Cross Funds, cites an unusual and touching incident in her last report:

"One woman came into the hospital who had one girl there and another at home—(She had been one of the students who had been frightened and gone home before Dr. Matthews returned and since came down with the fever.) She said to Dr. Matthews, 'Doctor, I am a widow with four children, and I have worked hard for years to keep them in school. I haven't any money and can't pay you a cent now, but if you will let me, when these children get well, I'll come up here and work it out.'

"Another, whose little daughter died, sat by her bedside. There were two other patients in the room and knowing her child had breathed her last, without a tear in her eye or a sign of emotion, she said to the nurse: 'Would you mind if I moved my little girl down stairs?' And the little girls beside the daughter did not know that she had gone. Can one imagine greater thoughtfulness for others in the midst of her own sorrow or a more keen appreciation of the finest sensibilities of life? No one had cautioned her, no one had thought, but she knew intuitively the right thing to do to protect the other patients."

### Lee Appoints Staff and Committee For Confederate Union

Richmond, March 25.—Many prominent Americans are included in the staff and committee appointed by Colonel McDonald Lee, commander-in-chief of the Sons of the Confederate Veterans, for the annual convention of the organization in Memphis, on June 3 to 6.

The appointments were made public last night and they comprise a complete roster of general officers, staff officers, department commanders, division commanders and committees. Colonel Lee stated that the complete program for the convention would be announced at an early date.

Among those on the roster are, Joseph Daniels, Raleigh, former secretary of the navy; General J. A. Lejeune, Washington; William G. McAdoo, Los Angeles; C. Bascom Sless, secretary to the President, Senator Pat Harrison, Mississippi, former Governor Manning of South Carolina; Governor Lee Trinkle, Virginia, and Bernard Baruch, New York.

Colonel Lee has twice been chosen the commander of the Sons of Confederate Veterans, once at Richmond two years ago and again at New Orleans at the last re-union.

### Masonic Lodges To Meet in Durham On Next Friday

Durham, March 25.—Dr. J. H. Apperson, district deputy grand master of the Twenty-first Masonic district, has called a meeting of the lodges of this section of the state to be held in this city on Friday next. Worshipful masters, wardens and secretaries of the 12 lodges in the district will be the representatives of their respective lodges.

These 12 lodges include Hillsboro, Mebane, Graham, Eno, Chapel Hill, Woodside, Durham, Elan College, Roxboro, Bahama, and Carrboro.

W. C. Wicker, educational field secretary of the grand lodge of North Carolina, will address the meeting. Mr. Wicker has visited many parts of the state since he was chosen to occupy this office and through his effort a better idea of the things for which the order stands has been gained by members through out the state, it was said.

### North Carolina Ranks Fourth Tax Burden Per Inhabitant Now

Chapel Hill, March 25.—The State of North Carolina ranks 44th among the other states in the Union in the tax burden per inhabitant for state, county and local assessments, according to Professor H. S. Hobbs, of the University of North Carolina, who has just completed an extensive study of the tax rates of the different states of the United States. North Carolina's rate per inhabitant is given as \$18.01; Nevada is the highest with a rate of \$82.90 per inhabitant and Alabama is the lowest with a rate of \$12.82.

Alabama is followed in order by Arkansas with a rate of \$13.91; South Carolina, \$14.25; Georgia \$14.39; N. Carolina, \$18.01; Tennessee \$18.57; Kentucky, \$19.40; and Virginia with \$19.78.

### Bailey and McLean Invited to Deliver Addresses Charlotte

Charlotte, March 25.—The two candidates for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination have accepted an invitation to address the voters of Mecklenburg county here on Saturday next. Mr. Bailey, according to Miss Julia Anderson, secretary of the Tax Inquiry, Inc., has definitely accepted while Mr. McLean has accepted tentatively. The invitations were extended by the Tax Inquiry, Inc., an organization which was formed here several years ago for the purpose of fostering independent politics. The organization expects to have other speakers come here in the near future to discuss matters of timely import.

### Gibbons to Give Exhibition Bout In Asheville, Apr. 18

Asheville, N. C., March 25.—Tommy Gibbons, who upset the sporting dope by remaining in the ring with Jack Dempsey for 15 rounds last July in Shelby, Montana, will be in this city on April 18 and give and exhibition boxing bout with his sparring partners, under the auspices of the Kiffin Rockwell Post of the American Legion. Gibbons is one of the contenders for the championship of heavy-weight boxers and will demonstrate his defensive work.

### Local Young Men's Christian Association Endorsed Statesville

Statesville, March 24.—The establishment of a local Young Men's Christian Association was endorsed here this week by a group of leading citizens at a banquet held at a local hotel. A number of workers in social and educational fields were present and addressed the meeting on the necessity of training boys and young men in physical and moral life as well as educational affairs. Dr. J. Martin, president of Davidson College and J. Wilson Smith State Secretary of the Y. M. C. A. were principal speakers.

The plan for the new Y. M. C. A. as outlined by J. T. Fesperman, State Secretary of boys' work, is to have several of the surrounding towns co-operate with Statesville and support a union Y. M. C. A. with a full time paid secretary. A committee composed of 14 citizens was appointed to further the plans of the proposed organization.

### Morrison Revokes Parole Nancy Parks

Raleigh, March 21.—Governor Morrison has revoked the parole of Nancy Parks, who was convicted of second degree murder in February 1917 in Rowan county and sentenced to serve ten years in the State's prison, and who in 1921 was granted a conditional parole. Information has reached the Governor to the effect that the paroled woman is now serving a term for manslaughter and that her sentence for this offense expires on March 25 next.

In revoking the parole the Executive said that in view of the fact that the paroled woman had broken the conditions of her parole he therefore authorized the superintendent of the State's prison to cause her to serve the remainder of her original sentence at the expiration of her present one and to allow her no credit for the time that elapsed while she was out on parole.
