ATTY-GENERAL DAUGHERTY RESIGNS

Resignation Promptly Accepted by Coolidge

Surrounded by Storm of Criticism and at President's Request Harry M. Daugherty Resigns From Cabinet; Leaves For Rest In Atlantic City

Washington, March 28.—At the request of President Coolidge Attorney General Daugherty today submitted his resignation effective at once.

The president's decision was made because of the belief that Mr. Daugherty could not give his disinterested attention to official duties while under the stress of an inquiry into his conduct.

While disclaiming any intention of prejudging the issues raised by the investigation, the president wrote Daugherty that his continuance in office must "inevitably be a source of ever increasing embarrassment."

In a letter of three terse sentences the Attorney General replied that he was resigning "solely out of deference to your request."

The correspondence was made public at the White House without comment but at the Department of Justice Daugherty immediately prepared a statement setting forth again his side of the question. This statement took the form of a second letter to the president in which the retiring Attorney General declared that the ground on which his retirement was forced seemed untenable. Any suggestion that he could not function as Attorney General and defend himself against these charges at the same time said the letter, was hardly warranted by the facts. Daugherty recalled that twice had he offered to retire since Coolidge became president but had been requested to remain. He said he was aware that argument of party expediency had been used to secure his retirement and added that cowardice and surrender of principles was never expected. He declared that the attack upon him was merely a part of a definite program to discredit the administration as a whole and declared that the country was confronted by a grave crisis which must determine whether the country would be governed by law and order or by slander, terrorism and fear.

Immediately after signing the last letter Daugherty left Washington for a brief rest in Atlantic City.

Washington, March 28.—Attorney General Daugherty has resigned. Surrounded by an ever growing storm of criticism and under pressure of many of his ranking party leaders he consented to follow Secretary Denby into retirement.

His resignation which was promptly accepted by President Coolidge, clears the administration of the last of those cabinet members who have become storm centers in the oil scandal.

The factor that had the greatest weight in bringing the question of Daugherty's status to an issue was the conviction on the part of the President that under the present conditions public business was not receiving the attention it merited by the Department of Justice.

Since the Daugherty investigation began March 12, President Coolidge has seen it plainly indicated that some of the department officials were giving a large part of their attention to the defense of Attorney General Daugherty to the apparent detriment of their regular pursuits. There is no doubt also that the repeated charges made before the Senate committee, leading directly to the door of the Attorney General's office altho they did not involve him directly, had their influence in finally determining his fate.

Besides the Daugherty committee disclosures, testimony has been given before the oil committee that the Attorney General has dealt in Sinclair oil stocks since he entered the cabinet, that he and others of the Department of Justice were seeking to shield Edward B. McLean by trying to keep him from appearing on the witness stand in the oil investigation and that McLean, himself, was a secret agent of the department.

Daugherty had insisted that he be permitted to remain in office until given an opportunity to answer fully all charges made before the investigating committee. As testimony has developed, however, it has become apparent that if he was to vindicate the department would become necessary for him to disprove also the charges against Jess Smith and others closely associated with him.

In deciding favorably on another break in the cabinet President Coolidge followed the almost unanimous advice of Republican Senators, among them Senator Borah, of Idaho. They have been urging for weeks that Daugherty had lost the confidence of the country.

The resignation was submitted at the request of the president and in according Daugherty said that he desired it effective forthwith. Daugherty and he tendered it "solely out of deference to your request and in compliance therewith."

President Coolidge's letter requesting the resignation based the request upon the Attorney General's refusal to comply with the summons of the Senate investigation committee for certain papers relating to gun running on the Mexican border. "This incident," the president's letter said only illustrates the difficulties which are certain to occur with ever increasing embarrassment and your inability to perform satisfactorily the duties of Attorney General under present conditions.

SEARCH FOR ESCAPED CONVICTS RESULTS IN FINDING OF WHISKEY

Officers Arrest Two Negroes at "Jubilee" In Bethel Township

Lottie Williams and Lenson Williams, negroes, residing in the Bethel township are in the Pitt County jail charged with having liquor in their possession. Their capture was the result of a search made by Sheriff Jackson, Chief of Police, Hamilton, of Washington and his assistant, in an effort to locate two negroes who had escaped from the chain gang in Beaufort County.

A few days ago Sheriff Jackson was notified by Beaufort County authorities that the negroes had escaped and was advised to be on the look out. Bethel authorities in turn were notified by Sheriff Jackson, and on yesterday advised the sheriff that they believed that the men were in Bethel.

Upon reaching Bethel the officers were directed to the house in which the escaped convicts had taken refuge. A "jubilee" was in progress and the officers decided that they would investigate matters. Their reward was the finding of one gallon of monkey rum. One of the convicts took advantage of the search and escaped through the back door. The other was taken in custody by officer Hamilton and returned to Beaufort county.

SENATE CONTINUES DAUGHERTY PROBE

Former Valet Tells Of Life In Apartment of Attorney General

Washington, March 28.—The Daugherty investigating committee was thrown out of step momentarily today by the resignation of Attorney General Daugherty but when the excitement caused by the announcement had subsided it plodded along in its task of gathering evidence against the Attorney General.

Life in the Daugherty apartments where Jess Smith, the Attorney General's friend, who committed suicide lived was gone into through the medium of Walter Miller former valet who told of whiskey being brought to the apartment and kept there. He told of many visitors to the apartment including Albert B. Fall, Harry Sinclair, Will Hayes, Howard Manning, Will A. Orr and a host of others and some "social games" in which some of the visitors engaged.

He had often heard, Miller said, conferences between Smith and Daugherty on qualifications of prospective federal employees. Many seeking government appointments called at Daugherty's apartments, he said. Richard Washburn Child was a caller, he said and added that he knew of Child's appointment to Ambassadorship to Rome before it came out in the papers.

Former Representative J. Van Vechten Cleot, of New York City, was called before the committee to tell of a conversation he had with a visitor in his office in which he was told that he would be expected to pay \$10,000 when his name was sent into the Senate for a federal judgeship.

Cleot said his visitor's name was "Mayne Wilson" and he believed he was with the National Surety Company. "Neither directly or indirectly did he tell me that he represented anybody in the Department of Justice," Cleot said.

Hawaii Suffers Aviation Accident

Honolulu, H. I. March 28.—Three army airmen were killed and two others injured one seriously yesterday in what army officials said was Hawaii's worst aviation accident.

First Lieutenant W. G. Moore of Nelsonville, Ohio and Isear Monthan, native of Devonshire, England and Private Getsinger, of Ashville North Carolina were killed and Private Baltus and Corres were injured.

The five started aloft in a Martin bomber at Luke field near here. The plane struck a backdrop on a base ball diamond and crashed to the ground in flames.

INO. WALSH APPEARS BEFORE SENATE OIL COMMITTEE TODAY

Another Wrangle Developed Between Walsh and Spencer; Walsh Declares Effort Being Made to Discredit Him

Washington, March 28.—John Walsh, Washington lawyer, brother of the prosecutor of the Senate Oil committee, was called before the committee today and questioned at length by Senator Spencer, Republican, Missouri, regarding his activities and connections.

The witness said he had never been connected directly with an oil company, but that he was general counsel for a holding company. He denied that this company had any interests in Wyoming or any other Northwestern state.

The examination developed another row between Senator Walsh and Senator Spencer during which the former had been called in an "effort to cast some suspicion on me." Both the Senator and witness urged Spencer to press his questioning further, but he replied that if he had any more questions to ask he would ask them later.

The committee also heard F. W. Sarsden, Minneapolis geologist who described the oil properties of Teapot Dome but the committee adjourned until Tuesday without calling to the stand William Boyce Thompson, formerly connected with the Republican National committee.

W. H. Hayes, former chairman of the Republican National committee will be recalled before the Senate oil committee. Request for his subpoena was made by Senator Walsh, the committee's chief prosecutor, whose brother, John Walsh, Washington attorney, was called at today's hearing as the first witness.

Senator Walsh wants to question Hayes regarding a telegram he sent from Sullivan, Ind., which Chairman Ladd read into the committee record.

The telegram said, "Never at any time for any purpose did I receive from Jake Hamon \$25,000 or any other sum directly or indirectly personally or in behalf of the Republican National committee or otherwise."

The plaintiffs charged that Duke had assaulted them on the highway to Winston-Salem and then had maliciously arrested them. The defendant appealed his case.

Vote For The Bond Issue And Insure The Future Of The Community

When the School Bond Election registration books closed on Saturday at sunset, there were 944 voters of the Greenville Graded School District registered. This is a very large registration, and shows that the voting public is taking a great deal of interest in the proposition. The matter of the Bond Issue has been brought up in the meetings of the various

civic organizations of the town, and the sentiment in all of these organizations was and is that the issue is necessary and must carry. The Kiwanis Club passed the resolution unanimously and also appointed a committee to lend active assistance in the matter. In the meeting of the Rotary Club, it was very evident that every member present was

behind the movement. In the American Legion meeting, one member after another expressed himself as being in favor of the proposition and the remarks of each one thus speaking was greeted with applause. There was not one to speak against the proposition. The Woman's Club took the matter up in two of their meetings, and they

went so far as to place a half page advertisement in The Reflector. This advertisement, supporting the Bond Issue was signed by 80 ladies. The Parent-Teachers Associations of the school have gone on record as being for the proposition, and also declaring that they will wage an active fight in its behalf. Fifty of the leading citizens of the town, large

taxpayers in a full page advertisement, went on record as favoring the proposition, and endorsing the past record of the School Board. The Board of Aldermen and the Mayor of the city have also given publicity to the fact that they are behind the matter to a man. And the School Board itself, composed of Business and Professional men, large

taxpayers themselves are unanimously and actively supporting the proposition. The consensus of opinion around the streets is that the issue will carry, provided the advocates of the measure will continue to work, and to give publicity to all matters pertaining to the proposition. The School Board has shown a willingness and a desire to inform the pub-

lic along every line, and if the voting public can be informed as to the real conditions, it seems that the vote will be largely affirmative. The polls open at sunrise on Tuesday morning, April 1, and will close at sunset. The judges of the election are Mrs. J. E. Winslow, Mr. Guy V. Smith, and the registrar, Mr. Luther Bowling.

No insurance company was ever ruined by scarcity of fires but many have been crippled by an epidemic of fires.

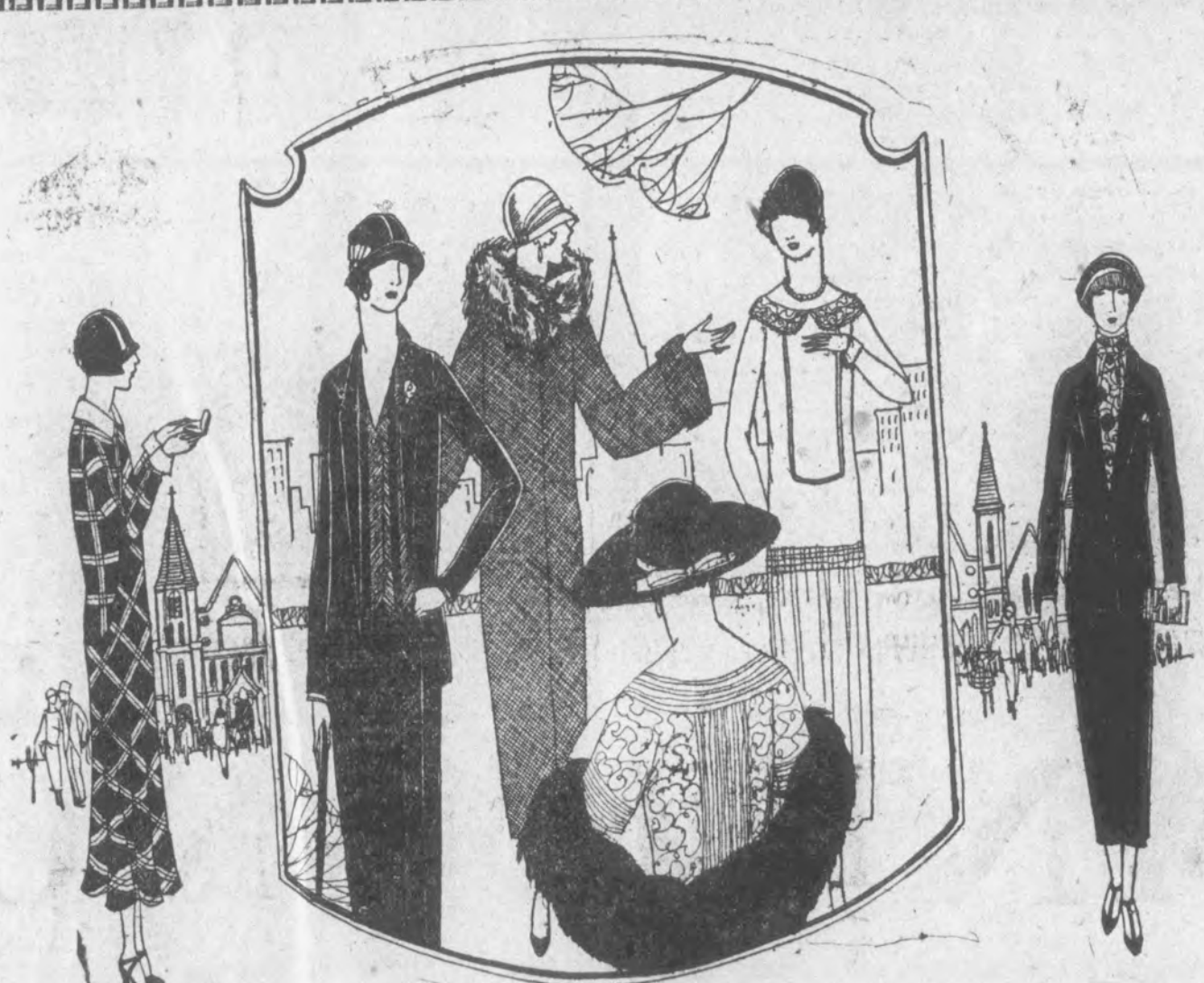

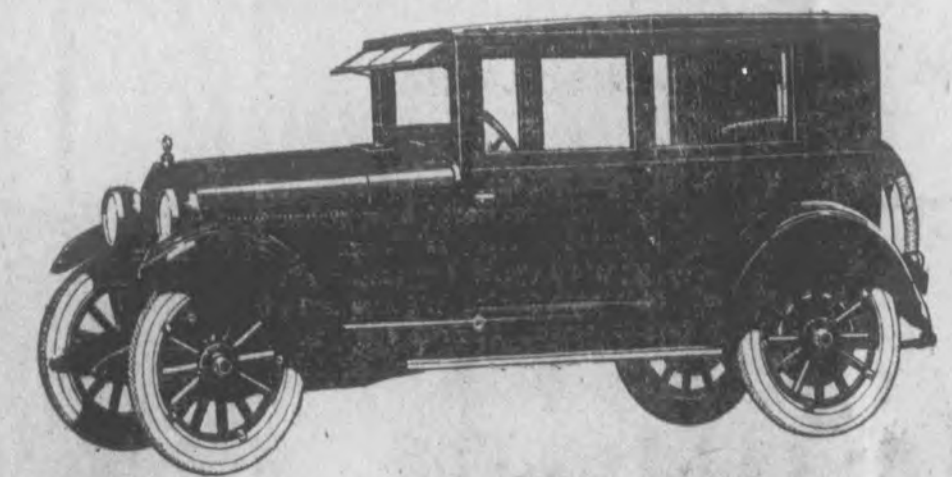

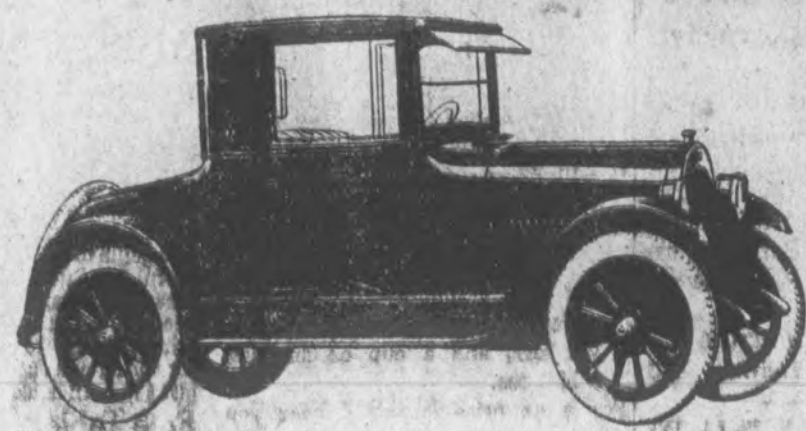
