SENATE COMMITTEE HEARS MORE ABOUT \$100,000 DEALS

Witness Testifies That Mitsui Aircraft Investigation Blocked By A. F. Myers, Assistant Attorney General

Washington, March 29.—Taking only a passing notice of Harry M. Daugherty's disappearance from public life, the Senate Daugherty investigating committee tried today to piece out details of one \$100,000 deal and heard hints of another.

H. L. Scaife, former Department of Justice agent told the committee that investigation into the Mitsui aircraft case, in connection with which Gaston B. Means testified that Jess Smith had received \$100,000, had been blocked by A. F. Myers, special assistant to the Attorney General after it was discovered that the company owed the government many millions. Scaife said he was told by Guy D. Morse, second assistant Attorney General that Myers received his appointment from the former Attorney General George B. Wickersham a member of a law firm that was retained by the Mitsui Company.

Reference to the second \$100,000 deal was made by Nicholas Cimino, New York restaurant man, who testified that he had overheard a conversation in a hotel here about a whiskey deal in which Mortimer got \$100,000 from a party in Pittsburgh. He knew none of the details and when committee members put him through a course of questioning in an effort to refresh his memory he could not even remember whether or not he was ever prosecuted in New York for liquor law violation.

There was a disposition to apply the breaks to its public disclosures when the Senate Daugherty investigating committee today resumed inquiry into the official acts of the former Attorney General. Instead of examining in public the confidential files of the Justice Department as planned the committee decided to examine them in secret session. The files relate to alleged activities in this country in behalf of the Mexican revolution in lower California and had figured in the correspondence between President Coolidge and Attorney General Daugherty resulting in the latter's retirement.

W. J. Burns, chief of the department's investigation bureau had been summoned to lay the files before the committee but instead of questioning him the committee put on the stand Nicholas Cimino, of New York, who testified regarding Daugherty's relations with Howard Mannington and others. Will Orr, the witness said, he had met at the "Green House on K street." Mannington lived at the "Green House" he said. He told of interceding with Mannington to obtain an appointment as Commissioner of Immigration for Philip Giordano, also of New York, and of being taken to see Daugherty.

Chairman Brookhart who questioned the witness in the absence of the committee's chief prosecutor, Senator Wheeler, asked him if Mannington had asked for money. The witness replied that there had been nothing mentioned about any money whatever. He acted in behalf of Giordano both as a candidate for immigration commissioner and for Commissioner of General Immigration, the witness said. He said that he had also sought thru Daugherty stenographic contracts in the New York federal courts for two stenographers named Price and Moore.

Cimino said that Moore and Price had paid him \$1,000 and \$1,500 and that they had gotten some of the stenographic contracts.

Chairman Brookhart next took up the bootleg conspiracies. Cimino said that he had complained to Mannington because everybody seemed to get something out of it. "He told me to go to New York and see what I could do," said Cimino.

Foreign Imports, Exports Expand

Washington, March 29.—American foreign trade continued to expand in February both imports and exports being larger than for the corresponding month last year. The totals were exports \$308,135,415 against \$306,957,410 last year and imports \$333,500,444 an increase of \$50,000,000 over February last year.

3 Towns Are Wiped Out By Heavy Storms

Nine Killed and Property Damage Heavy In Northwest

Cairo, Ill., March 29.—Three little towns in McCracken county, Kentucky, have been wiped out by the wind storm that is still sweeping down from the northwest according to meagre reports reaching here over the only telephone wire into that county still intact. The towns destroyed are Heath, Maxon and Lamonte with a total population of less than 1,000.

Chicago, March 29.—Nine persons are dead, property damage heavy and a score of towns and cities in the Northwest and Central West and the Mississippi valley are virtually isolated as a result of tornadoes, blizzards and storms which began yesterday.

Heavy rainfalls accompanied by gales struck points in Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas later yesterday causing eight deaths and injuring more than 70 persons at Swane, Oklahoma. A boy was killed by lightning in Kansas and four persons were injured at Vernon, Texas.

Damage to crops was feared in some sections of South Dakota and Minnesota where the temperature dropped 16 degrees to below freezing, followed by a raging blizzard that brought snow, blocked roads and hampered transportation. Trains were delayed.

SAY OTHER CABINET MEMBERS MAY GO

Washington, March 29.—While the drive to force the retirement of another member of the cabinet—Secretary Mellon—is getting under way in the Senate, the resignation of Attorney General Daugherty has cast some doubt as to the future course of the special inquiry into his conduct.

The attack upon Secretary Mellon as described by some of the organization Republicans and others in the cloak rooms—where gossip is frequently illuminating—is merely one step in a well defined plan attributed to Democrats and radical Republicans for disintegrating the cabinet one member at a time. Secretary Denby and Mr. Daugherty have left the cabinet within a few weeks as the outgrowth of sensational investigations and gossip has it that Secretaries Wallace and Hoover are the next in line after Secretary Mellon for the same kind of treatment.

Truck Overturns and Earl Whitner Is Instantly Killed

Hickory, March 29.—Earl Whitner, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. P. Whitner, of this city, was instantly killed near here on the road to Connelly Springs, when the truck which he was driving left the road at a sharp turn and overturned. Young Whitner was 19 years of age and was a student at the local high school. According to witnesses of the accident, he was driving the truck at a rapid rate of speed and could not make the turn quick enough. He was brought here immediately. Arrangements for the funeral have been made for today.

Senator Henry Cabot Lodge, of Massachusetts, is said to have visited President Coolidge with a request that he demand the resignation of Attorney General Daugherty. Because he insisted on continuing ritualistic dances in the famous St. Mark's-in-the-Bowery Church in New York City, Rev. Dr. William Norman Guthrie has been notified by Bishop William T. Manning that his church has been cut off from Episcopal visitation and ministrations. Governor Warren T. McCray, of Indiana, has been placed on trial in Indianapolis on charges of larceny and embezzlement of \$155,000 of State Board of Agriculture funds. Senator Hiram Johnson ran a neck-and-neck race with President Coolidge in the Republican Presidential primary in South Dakota. Because of his arrest of Mrs. Asa G. Candler, second wife of Atlanta's coca cola king, whom he charged with being in a "dive," Chief of Police James L. Beavers has been suspended and will be tried "for making an arrest that may result in divorce proceedings."

EXPOSITION WILL TAKE PLACE IN BIG WAREHOUSE

Kinston, N. C., March 29.—Knott Bros. tobacco warehouse, occupying a large part of a square in the center of this city, will be converted into a gigantic exhibition hall for the second annual Eastern Carolina Exposition, to be staged here the week of April 7 under the auspices of the sectional Chamber of Commerce and many business concerns, manufacturers, etc., co-operating with the commercial organization people to make the show the success that the promoters have promised it shall be. This warehouse is one of the largest in the bright belt. It has a floor space of nearly 50,000 feet. One side of the big building will be given up to exhibits. Space is going rapidly.

A big temporary stage will be erected. Before this will be auditorium space for thousands of people. The whole structure will be converted into a fairland for the exposition. A week before the opening date the city will take on its holiday attire. The balmy spring will have come, and April in Pineland is all that could be desired in the way of climate.

Music will be a feature of the exposition entertainments, which will be varied. Besides a brass band and orchestra, Miss Anna Case will sing on Monday night, the 7th. Cervone, noted Pittsburgh conductor, will bring his band here for the week. Cervone has been heard at a number of state fairs and other big events.

THE DOLLAR OR THE CHILD

Don't forget Tuesday is the day on which the people of Greenville must decide on the school bond issue. If the children of the community are to have a fair chance in life 500 registered voters must vote in favor of the issue. If Greenville defeats the bond issue it is an admission that the dollar means more to the community than the child. Not only is it your duty to vote for the measure, but urge other registered voters to do likewise.

WHAT THE BOND ISSUE IS FOR

The question having been raised as to what the proceeds from the proposed Bond Issue will be used for, we thought it wise to get some information pertaining thereto. Accordingly, the school authorities were asked what it proposed to be done with this money? In other words the public wanted to know whether or not this Bond Issue has anything to do with the current maintenance expense for the schools of the city; that is whether or not any of this money could be used to increase the salary of anyone connected with the school, or could be expended for any current expense whatsoever. The answer to this question put to the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Mr. J. L. Little, is that not one cent of this money can be used to increase any of the items named above. Under the law, this money must be used to pay off the debts acquired by the school in the purchase of sites and the erection and repairing of buildings; and to purchase sites, erect new buildings, repair old ones and equip the new buildings. The School Board plans to pay off the present indebtedness, and then to enlarge the equipment of the schools in the most efficient and economical manner possible. Up to the present time the board has not formulated any plans as to what new buildings will be put nor where. But if the Bond Issue is carried, then the School Board will use their best judgment, and as far as possible meet the wishes of the people.

DAUGHERTY GETS OUT

It is hardly proper to say that Harry Daugherty has resigned as Attorney General of the United States. He abdicated the functions of that high office months ago. Indeed, it is hardly proper to say that he ever assumed them.

At the request of the President of the United

States, Daugherty gets out of the cabinet. The country will welcome the change, but the people will regret that the President could not see his way clear to make out a better case of unfitness for office than simply Daugherty's failure to furnish a Senate committee with records that it requested.

President Coolidge was under no obligation to keep Daugherty in office. That is he was under no other obligation than that of making sure that he could land the support of the Ohio delegation in the next national convention. Daugherty was supposed to wield considerable political influence in the Buckeye state. Certainly he was all powerful in that state following the nomination of Harding for the presidency.

It is popularly supposed that the President feared that the influence of Daugherty used against him might prevent his getting the support of that state. Hence his reluctance in getting rid of him. After the recent revelations concerning the associates of the Attorney General, it is not probable that he will be able to continue as much of a political power in that state. If so, the Republican party in that state is in a bad way.

The country expects and has the right to expect a great lawyer at the head of the Department of Justice. Not even Harry Daugherty's closest friends ever claimed that for him. He lacks every element of true greatness, even when weighed in most kindly scales. There have been many Attorney Generals of the United States but not one of them ever felt it necessary to have a "bumper" like Jess Smith. Speaking of the manifest unfitness of Daugherty for the position he held, the Springfield Republican declares that not one of his predecessors "would ever have been driven to defend himself against an accusing woman, who had been the former wife and never-discarded confidant and intimate of one of his nearest friends, by publicly blackening her character." Such conduct as that is not only unworthy of an Attorney General, it is unworthy of any self-respecting American citizen.

Even these things did not move President Coolidge to call for his resignation until the country became so sick of the noxious influences surrounding the Department of Justice that there was danger of a complete loss of confidence in the government. Let us be thankful that the President did eventually see the light and that he did eventually act. It is better late than never.

The President broke into the national limelight as a champion of "law and order." The country pictured him as a man who championed the right at any cost. Its appraisal of him must be revised in the light of recent happenings. His irresolution in dealing with such cases as that presented by Daugherty do not show him in that light. Instead, he waits until every avenue of escape from action is cut off before he acts. That is not the kind of President this country should have.

The Republican party as the champion of such men in high office as Harry Daugherty must take the responsibility for what has happened in the last three years. The people of this country do not want that kind of government. They must put into power men who can act promptly in blocking scandal.—News and Observer.

A National Park May Be Located in Western Carolina

Asheville, March 29.—The probability of the locating of a national park in the western part of North Carolina, it is believed by many, is indicated in the fact that J. S. Holmes of this city has gone to Washington to discuss the matter with Congressman Zebulon Weaver and government officials in charge of the national parks. A special com-

mittee has been appointed by the Department of the Interior to visit the various parts of the eastern section of the United States and to select a site for such a park. It is said that the committee will visit the western part of this state and will consider the Linville George section, which is said to be favored by the state geological survey as the most desirable place for a national park. Mitchell county civic organizations are also making an effort to have the committee come to that community and inspect the Roan Mountain sec-

tion with a view to placing the park there.

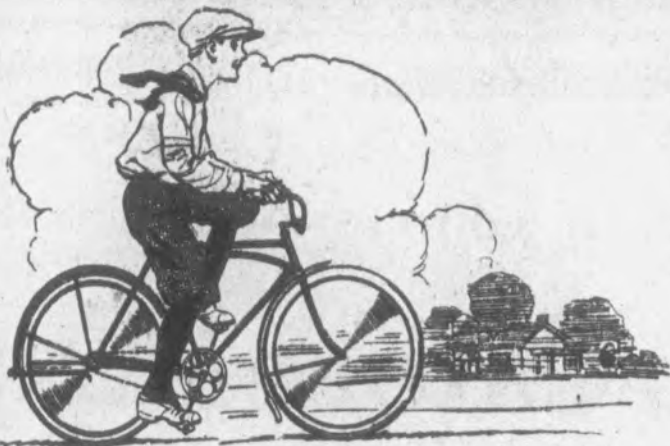
