County Commencement Here Yesterday Largely Attended And Proved Great Success

Exercises Opened With Literary Contest at the Teachers College, Sponsored by the Greenville Kiwanis Club; Track Meet Held in the Afternoon at Fair Grounds Under the Direction of the Greenville Rotary Club; Best Since Started

LITERARY CONTEST

With a clear sky and warm sunshine, conditions were most favorable for the Third Annual Pitt County School Meet which was held here yesterday. It was difficult to form an intelligent estimate of the number present, but it was conceded by those intimately connected that it was the largest attendance yet recorded.

The morning program, which was sponsored by the Greenville Kiwanis Club, was devoted to the Literary Contests, which were held in the administration building of the Teachers College.

Community singing was conducted by Rev. R. F. Pittman of Ayden. Kiwanian Lee Sadler then offered invocation.

In his opening announcements, R. G. Fitzgerald, chairman of the program, stated that these annual school meets were made possible by the two service clubs of Greenville, Kiwanis sponsoring the Literary Contests, while Rotary had charge of the Athletic program.

Appreciation was expressed because of the courtesy of the Teachers College in making possible the morning exercises.

W. H. Woolard, chairman of the Pitt County board of education, in appropriate words made the address of presentation as he delivered a beautiful watch to the retiring member of the board, Mr. A. G. Cox, of Winterville. For over a quarter of a century, Mr. Cox has rendered valuable service to the educational forces of Pitt county.

President Robert H. Wright of the Teachers College, delivered a splendid address. Mr. Wright, among other things, said: "I am glad to have you here today. This comes from the depth of my heart. The first motto of this institution was, 'To Serve.' The second motto was, 'On Time Every Time.' We then combined these two for our slogan, 'To Serve on Time Every Time.'"

"Building school houses, as important as it is (we should not retrench in this, but go forward) will not educate the children of North Carolina. The trained teacher is the one great essential. We are making enlargements here on these grounds so that we may give to North Carolina more trained teachers. I want to live to see the day come when we will have a trained teacher in every school house in North Carolina. Children (Continued on page 6)

Charlotte Man Commits Suicide

Charlotte, April 1.—Thomas B. Coleman, 35, steward and manager of a local restaurant, committed suicide early today in his room in a rooming house over the restaurant by stabbing himself with a knife. He died soon after being found by other roomers who were attracted to his room by the groans.

Coleman was standing in his room with his hand over his heart. "I did it because I didn't want to live any longer," he told the persons who found him. "The knife is there under the bath tub," he added.

He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Mary E. Coleman, of Fayetteville, three sisters, Mrs. T. H. Pogram, Fayetteville, Mrs. Charles Harper, Fida, and Mrs. Evington, Fairbluff, N. C.

Former State Auditor Dies in High Point

High Point, April 1.—William P. Wood, for 10 years until 1920 state auditor, died in a hospital here this morning at 11 o'clock. He had been a patient in the hospital since January 15.

Colonel Wood, as he was known throughout the state, served in the Confederate army ending when he was 17. He was colonel of the United Confederate Veterans, and the title was applied generally.

Had Slain Brother's Blood in Cup.

Carrying a cupful of blood, Thomas Gevelos, a Greek, was arrested outside his brother's laundry in New York City. The police later discovered the brother beaten to death with a wrench and his throat cut. Gevelos explained that he had murdered his brother in a quarrel over money. He said that in accordance with a custom in his native village in Greece he intended to bury the blood with the murder weapons alongside his brother's grave, pray for forgiveness and thus be absolved of the crime.

COOLIDGE SOON TO CHOOSE SUCCESSOR H. M. DAUGHERTY

Washington, April 1.—President Coolidge is approaching a decision with respect to a successor to Harry M. Daugherty, as Attorney General and indications given today after the executive had conferred with Senator Pepper, Republican, Pennsylvania, that the decision would be made within two days.

The president has ascertained which of those under consideration would accept the place if it was offered them and is now engaged in choosing among them.

The list of eligibles, it is understood, contains only names who have been mentioned in newspaper dispatches since Daugherty resigned last Friday at the president's request.

President Coolidge also consulted today with Senator Curtis, Kansas, Republican whip in the Senate, and Senator Cummins, Republican, Iowa, president pro tem of the Senate. Cummins urged the selection of Federal Judge William S. Kenyon.

Peck Says Daugherty Stopped Prosecution of Land Fraud Case

Washington, April 1.—Harry M. Daugherty's part in stopping the trial of Miller Brothers' Indian land fraud case in Oklahoma in the spring of 1921 was described to the Senate Daugherty investigating committee today by H. M. Peck, former United States attorney for the western district of Oklahoma.

The case involved 10,000 acres of land valued at \$450 an acre, Peck said.

When we were ready for trial at Guthrie in May 1921, Peck added, a "personal" letter from Attorney General Daugherty directed a continuance to be taken until the fall term of court.

MRS. OUTLAND FATHER DIES IN RICHMOND, VA.

Dr. C. L. Outland has returned from Richmond where he and Mrs. Outland were called on account of the death of Mrs. Outland's father, Mr. M. S. Sadler. The interment took place in Richmond Sunday afternoon. Mrs. Outland will remain in Richmond several days.

One Franco-German Gap Closed

Paris.—French and German bicycle riders have signed to ride in the countries of each other for the first time since 1914. Karl Wittig will ride at the Buffalo Velodrome March 23, while Jules Miquel is booked for Berlin March 23 and 24; at Dresden April and Leipzig April 13.

MORE TESTIMONY ABOUT ACTIVITIES LATE JAKE HAMON

After Hearing Two Witnesses the Oil Committee Adjourned Until Tomorrow

Washington, April 1.—Political activities of Jake Hamon, Republican National committeeman of Oklahoma were under scrutiny of the oil committee again today in an avowed effort of the committee's chief prosecutor, Senator Walsh, to establish a conspiracy as far back as 1920 to select a complacent Secretary of Interior.

Under the Montana Senator's insistent questioning J. E. Dyche, who managed Hamon's campaign for the place of National committeeman, testified that the fight had cost Hamon \$105,000 but insisted that he never desired to have a place in the cabinet.

The witness ridiculed the testimony of Al Jennings that Hamon had told him of large money payments to the late Senator Penrose, of Pennsylvania, and others to secure the nomination of Warren G. Harding and of the indiscriminate use of money among the Oklahoma delegation to the Chicago convention. As a matter of fact, Dyche said, Hamon did not spend a dime to influence the delegation of his state to vote for Harding but on the contrary advised them to vote for Lowden on two ballots after they were ready to get on the Harding band wagon.

R. H. Wilson, formerly Oklahoma Superintendent of Public Instruction, was also questioned by the committee today. He said that Hamon had boasted to him about putting over Harding's nomination and had told him of contributions of \$25,000 to Harry M. Daugherty, Harding's pre-convention manager, for campaign expenses.

The committee adjourned its hearing until tomorrow but there will be no session held at that time unless William Boyce Thompson, formerly connected with the Republican National committee, reaches Washington in the meantime. A new subpoena for his appearance forthwith has been issued but process serves have been unable to serve it.

Resuming its inquiry into the story of an "oil deal" in the Chicago Republican National convention of 1920, the oil committee was today told by R. H. Wilson, former Superintendent of Public Instruction of Oklahoma, of boasts by Jake Hamon, oil operator serving that state as Republican National committeeman, that he put over the nomination of Warren G. Harding.

Hamon was quoted as saying that he had given \$25,000 to Harry M. Daugherty for the Harding campaign. In the early days of the campaign, the witness said, Hamon had appeared friendly to the candidacy of Leonard Wood.

Wilson, under questioning said that Hamon had made no reference in his talks with him to naval oil lands or leases.

Warrant Issued for G. B. Means Vacated

New York, April 1.—Federal Judge Garvin today vacated the warrant issued yesterday for Gaston B. Means and his secretary, Elmer Jarecke, when they failed to appear for trial on indictment of conspiracy to violate the Volstead law by wholesale withdrawals of liquor from government warehouses.

The court also remitted the \$15,000 bail each ordered forfeited yesterday.

Violent Explosion Occurs in Crater of Volcano Stromboli

Rome, April 1.—A violent explosion occurred in the crater of the volcano Stromboli on the coast of Sicily March 28 and was announced in a communique at the Royal bureau here today. Windows in the vicinity were shattered by the shock and 15 persons were injured.

Not Single Candidate For State Offices Filed With Board

Raleigh, April 1.—Though candidates for the past three months have been speech-making over the State in the interests of their aspirations to State offices, and though many have announced for the several State offices which must be filled at the June primaries, today it was announced at the State Board of Elections that so far not a single candidate for any office has filed with the board as required by the law. The primary will be held on June 7, just a little more than two months in the future.

Though there have been no candidacies placed on official record so far as the election board is concerned, still there are several in the field, definitely committed to certain policies and outstanding among these are the two candidates for the Governorship, Angus Wilton McLean of Lumberton and Joseph William Bailey of Raleigh. That these two men will tour, and are touring, the State appealing for the votes of the electorate is an established fact.

Both Mr. McLean and Mr. Bailey have had considerable political experience in the past and both have been prominently connected with the Democratic party for a number of years. Mr. Bailey was the first to officially enter the field his candidacy and platform being announced just after the first of the year. Mr. McLean got into the race about two weeks ago.

The successful candidate of the primary will be opposed at the general election in November by Isaac M. Meekins of Elizabeth City, who likewise has promised an active campaign.

GOOD PROSPECTS FOR DEMOCRATS IN NORTHWEST

Testimony that Senator LaFollette has a very large following in the Northwestern states was given to President Coolidge by a former Republican Senator who was called to the White House a few days ago to confer about an important appointment. This former Senator told some of his friends in Washington that LaFollette and not Johnson or any other single individual in the Republican party is the man the President has to fear.

It was not meant that LaFollette could be elected to the presidency, but that as an independent Republican candidate he would be sure to take so many votes from Mr. Coolidge that these States would be carried by the Democratic nominee. This outcome seems all the more likely, this Senator said, because many Republicans will turn to the Democratic party as the easiest, quickest and most certain way to bring about a change.

Democrats are not afraid that LaFollette can do their party any damage in the Northwest. The practical impossibility of LaFollette's election is everywhere understood. Republicans who want to defeat Coolidge can not hope to accomplish that by supporting LaFollette. They realize that if LaFollette carried the Northwestern States that would in all probability throw the election into the House of Representatives, where he could not hope to win no matter who else lost.

The whole trend and tenor of sentiment in the Northwest favors the Democrats. There is no want of admiration for Senator LaFollette in that section. Indeed, his popularity there is greater than ever before, but even those who most esteem him are conscious that he can not be elected and that the only certainty of improving conditions is the success of the Democratic candidate.

ENGLISH MAY ATTAIN WORLD-WIDE USAGE AVERS RADIO EXPERT

New York.—There is a least one industrial leader in America courageous enough to believe that the wizardry of radio, already arousing the curiosity of the human race to a high pitch, eventually may bring about a universal tongue.

Mr. E. Tripp, president and chairman of the board of the Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing Company, recently expressed this opinion at a dinner of the St. Louis Society of New York, preferring to believe, however, that instead of having to construct an artificial language for the purpose, English would be the new world tongue.

Mr. Tripp, whose energies in developing radio have accomplished astonishing results, and who may be described as a "practical dreamer," foresees the day when Europe, Asia, Africa and America will be enmeshed in radio waves bearing incessant chatter in hushed and confusing tongues, with the resultant human curiosity to learn what is being said one to the other over vast expanses of land and water. Hence his belief that one language alone can satisfy when this time arrives.

Thousands of years ago, so we are told, all people spoke the same tongue. Mr. Tripp said, "but time has brought a confusion of tongues, and every one who has traveled outside of his country knows what a terrible curse this is. Men who cannot speak the same language are separated by black walls. They cannot join together; they cannot have common interests and they can hardly keep peace among themselves. But now, at last, there is hope that the age-old blight of lack of understandings have been wonderfully things. The latest wonder is an arrangement whereby broadcasts from America are heard clearly and distinctly in Europe every Saturday night. Short radio waves possessing peculiar carrying power are transmitted by the American station, picked up by an English broadcasting station, amplified, and then rebroadcast by the English station on its standard wave to its regular audience. The system is still in an experimental stage, but it is quite probable that it soon will be extended so that all European countries will be receiving messages from us, and we in turn shall be hearing regularly from London, Paris, Rome, Berlin, and other important foreign cities. "Thus all barriers to international communications will be broken down. This will mean many things to the people of the world, too many for any one to attempt to foresee. "But one thing may be predicted with comparative safety; that is, the establishing of a universal language. Were radio broadcasts confined to musical selections, the necessity for such a language would not arise, but speeches are certain to be transmitted, and every radio listener will want to know what they are about. He needs there will be a greater and more

New York.—Intensive discussion in a big way of American trade problems will characterize the National Foreign Trade Convention to be held at Boston, June 4, 5 and 6, it was stated yesterday, when the preliminary program of the convention was made public.

A special report from the National Foreign Trade Council, the organizer of the convention, on the important phases and trends of American foreign trade, and the most promising markets for this year, will be a feature of the convention. Special

emphasis will be laid on non-European markets. While the primary object of the convention is to bring business men together and provide a medium of exchange of views and information, a further object is to educate the American public to the knowledge that the prosperity of every man, woman and child is concerned in the maintenance and development of foreign trade.

WESTERN ORANGES GROW WELL IN LATITUDE OF PHILADELPHIA

San Francisco, March.—"Fartherest north" for the commercial production of oranges in the United States is at Orland, Glenn county, California, 200 miles north of San Francisco and at virtually the latitude of Philadelphia, according to figures on the production of citrus fruits in America. In this district, just south of the

fortieth parallel, the first California's orange crop is harvested. In the Orland orange district, 20 miles south of Orland, the oranges are harvested each year early in November, as just about the beginning of real winter in the territory beginning east of the Sierra Nevada mountains and ending at Philadelphia.

Cleveland.—Plans have been virtually completed for a parade of thousands of women down Euclid Avenue in a mammoth peace parade on Easter Sunday afternoon, April 20.

Mrs. Malcolm McBride, who carried the banner of suffrage in a parade years ago and who later led the same group of women down Euclid Avenue in Liberty loan drives, will be one of the leading figures in the parade program. Every woman of Cleveland, whether affiliated with one of the 28 organizations embraced in the council or not, will be asked to take her place in the line of march.

FAMOUS PREACHERS WILL CARRY GOSPEL TO AMERICAN PEOPLE

Washington.—Based on the conviction that if the people will not go to church the church must go to the people, a great religious movement is being organized by the National Cathedral Foundation. A college of preachers is to be established at the National Cathedral here, for which a country-wide fund of \$10,000,000 is being assembled, and from this a religious revival akin to that of Peter the Hermit, the Cowley Fathers and General Booth is to be directed.

The Right Rev. James E. Freeman, D. D., Episcopal Bishop of Washington, is now preparing with other church leaders to launch the evangelical enterprise this summer, with the first sessions of the College of Preachers. This embodiment of the church militant in a vigorous campaign for Christ through preaching, publicity and organization, will typify spiritually to America what the Washington Cathedral itself, where Woodrow Wilson lies buried, will mean materially as a great religious shrine and, in fact, an American Westminster Abbey, where the nation's honored dead will sleep.

In the forefront of the nation wide preaching renaissance to carry real religion to the man in the street, and to meet the challenge that Christianity has failed, is Monell Sayre, trustee of the Church Pension Fund and pension adviser of the Church of England, whose brochure, made public today, outlines the argument for the preaching mission.

Mr. Sayre's indictment of Christianity's failure to influence average men and women is summed up in his opening paragraph thus:

"Christianity has lost its hold on the masses of the people. The industrial classes have ceased to be influenced by it. It has shrunk into a concern of the so-called middle and upper classes. This is a condition which, if allowed to continue, means that Christianity in America will soon enter definitely into the status of a decaying religion."

To counteract this decay and bring a natural and healthy religious growth to the everyday American, Mr. Sayre proposes a movement to carry it to "the spiritual nature of the average man. He warns against the deceptive appearances of apparent material prosperity in the churches, and points out that the "danger of the practical overthrow of Christianity is the produce of many causes, operating through many years." Among these he lists "insistence that some favorite theory is essential to a following of Christ; emphasis on the relatively unimportant instead of on Christ Himself; emphasis on the material side of conduct instead of on an elevation of our spiritual strength; and the inability of the church today to exhibit and maintain those high standards of Christian morality of which it is the

guardian and trustee." The parish church is "the only instrumentality of Christianity seriously and effectively at work today," Mr. Sayre maintains. A revival of preaching is not needed in the parish church, he points out, but must be planned "solely to reach those who cannot otherwise be won."

The presentation of the Christ alone to the people, wherever they may be assembled, devoid of the pomp and power of the pulpit and ceremony, is the nucleus of the program. High intelligence, training, and the power to sway vast multitudes are requisites of the men who are to be on the firing line with "a Twentieth Century message" and able to handle debate. An up-to-date Saint Francis, with his band of preachers "fired with the spirit of evangelism, gifted with the power of speech, and trained in all the arts of persuasion" would endeavor to Christianize America at mass meetings, conferences, gatherings of all sorts, in theatres, halls, in university stadia, in the highways and byways of great cities, and anywhere and everywhere that men and women can be assembled to listen, under the preaching revival. These preachers would renew their own strength at the National Cathedral, where teachers capable of "adding new fire to their zeal" would preside and the hope is expressed that preachers of churches other than the Episcopal will be enlisted in the cause.

As a first step, a union of reputation, who have won renown in Europe and America for their scholarship and ability to preach, will be secured, and as rapidly as possible the permanent organization of the college of preachers will be perfected.

More Than 5,000,000 Farms Produce Eggs Annually In U. S.

Raleigh, March 31.—More than 5,000,000 farms in the United States produce eggs annually valued at more than half a billion dollars, according to a report of the United States Department of Agriculture received here. There are many specialized egg farms along the Atlantic and Pacific coasts and scattered to a less extent throughout the country, but the great bulk of market eggs used on the large Eastern markets comes from the Middle-Western States where eggs are produced mainly as a side line on general farms.

In the ordinary course of marketing eggs pass through a number of hands and must undergo a journey of a thousand miles or so before they pass across the counter from the retailer to the consumer, the department says. More than 47,000 cars of eggs alone are annually transported by rail. New York City is the largest consuming market, followed by Chicago, Boston, Philadelphia, and San Francisco.

Egg production is uneven throughout the year, being heavy in the Spring and summer and light in the fall and winter. To fir the supply of eggs to the demand which is constant throughout the year, it is necessary to hold about 12 per cent of the eggs in storage, it was pointed out.

To serve as practical guide to pro-

ducers, shippers, and egg industry in general, the department of agriculture has published a bulletin on the marketing of eggs. It deals with all phases of the industry, transportation, function of cold storage, marketing methods, candling, and grading. The bulletin is for distribution.

Confederate Veteran Dies in Chapel Hill

Chapel Hill, March 31.—"Judge" John Brockwell 94, the only white person who has resided in this community since before the days of the war between the states, died here in his little frame cottage where he had lived since the burning of his cabin of Pine Prospect Road about two years ago. The end came peacefully which was in perfect accord with the life which he led.

With five other companions, Will Tankersley, Will Roberson, D. Sparrow, and Dr. Charles Mangum, "Judge" constituted the only white settlement at this place in the year 1875. He also served the Confederacy during the war and his father served in the war of 1812. He had been a grave digger for a great part of his life in the cemetery back of Emerson Field, and knew the graves of many persons without reference to the markers. He also planted about 50 percent of the trees that are now more than 30 years old that line the streets of the village.

"Judge" was known to several generations of students who attended college here and revered by them. When they return to their Alma Mater, it was their custom to look up "Judge" and talk over old times. He knew them all by face if not by name and it was his habit to sit in front of a local automobile establishment, from noon until late evening and speak to all who passed by.

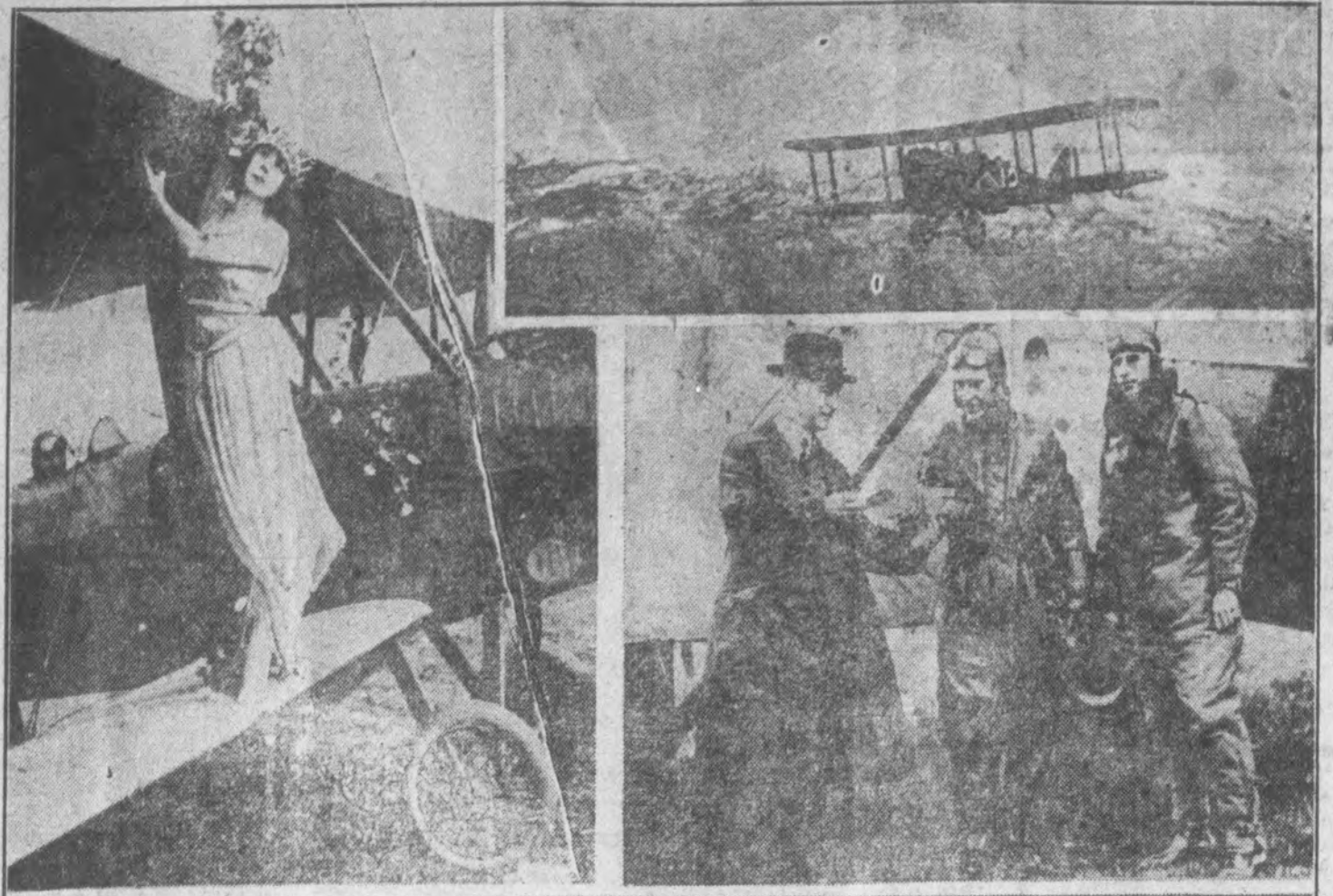
Plans Being Made to Hold Short Course For Club Boys

Raleigh, March 31.—Plans are now being made to hold a short course for club boys at the State College sometime during the summer school, it was announced at the office of the Extension Service of the State College and Department of Agriculture. It is thought likely that the course will be held at the same time that the short course is held for the girls. This course last one week. The work to be done during the short course, it was stated, will be of a practical nature and designed to fit those club boys, who attend, for leadership in their respective home clubs.

It is the expressed hope of the those in charge of the boys' club work in the state, that each club will send at least one representative. Where there is an agent in a county, the combined clubs of that are expected to send between two and ten representatives.

The requirements for entrance to this course, it was explained, are that the representative must have been a member since April 1, and have kept a record of his work to the time of entering the classes to be held under the course.

dren in the remote districts of Eastern Carolina should have just as good advantages as those children who live in the towns. Some will say, "We cannot afford it." I have observed that we can afford anything we want. As a matter of fact we cannot afford not to do this very thing. The school does not take the place of the home. The church, the home the school and entire community are necessary for the highest development of the child.

Music was furnished by the College orchestra, with Miss Lois Gorrill, director.

W. E. Hooker, president of the Greenville Kiwanis Club, in a fitting speech, introduced the main speaker of the morning, Mr. Frank Page, chairman of the State Highway Commission.

Mr. Page landed right into his subject and dwelt on the road construction program in North Carolina.

"In 1917 the State legislature created a Highway Commission, but provided no funds.

"In 1920 \$50,000,000 was voted to prosecute this stupendous program. In 1923, an additional \$15,000,000 was voted. This sum has been added by Federal Aid and by county bond issues until we had around \$80,000,000 for road construction in North Carolina. When this entire amount is expended, we will have 4,600 miles of paved highways and 1,500 miles of improved roads.

"Three years ago, I was in Louisville, Ky., and overheard a conversation taking place about North Carolina. This is what one of the men said: "Did you know that Pitt county, North Carolina is one of the poorest counties in the country today?"

"Speaking of the tax brought about by the road program, the man who does not own an automobile does not pay one penny extra by hard surface roads. License and gasoline taxes care for this work. Notwithstanding the increased travel in 1923 over 1920, there was a saving of approximately \$18.00 per car for tax. In speaking of the standing of North Carolina, Mr. Page said: "North Carolina paid more income tax last year than any five southern states combined. Georgia was once the Empire state of the South, but no more. Virginia was once the state of nobility, but no more. It is for North Carolina to lay claim to both of these at the moment. In speaking of rural community development: "Our rural communities should be so developed that the very highest citizenship will continue to come from these sections. Every rural high school should have a library.

"What you think you are, What you read you think."
