## COMMITTEE TOLD DELAYS, FAILURES DEPT. OF JUSTICE

### H. L. Scaife, Former Secret Agent Appears On Stand for the Third Time

Washington, April 2. — More charges of delay and failures in the Department of Justice were laid before the Daugherty investigating committee today by H. L. Scaife, former secret agent of the Department of Justice.

Taking the stand for the third time Scaife continued his long drawn out story about the obstacles he encountered in his efforts to institute proceedings against airplane manufacturing concerns charged with receiving overpayments from the government during the war. Captain Luke McNamee, head of the Navy Intelligence service, was quoted by Scaife as saying that the Mitsui Company, a Japanese concern by their ownership of the Standard Aircraft Corporation, had obtained plans and built experimentally almost every type of military plane.

Scaife also repeated charges that the government had sold the Bosch Magneto property, seized from German owners during the war, to Martin Kerns for a "grossly inadequate consideration." He said that Mitchell W. Palmer, first Alien Property Custodian and later Attorney General, had been employed as a lawyer by Kerns. George W. Wickersham, as attorney for the Mitsui Company, got special favors and exercised undue influence over the Department of Justice, Scaife asserted. He put in a copy of a letter from Wickersham to James Beck now acting Attorney General asking him to assist in having the Supreme court set down a motion for argument. The letter showed the closeness of relationship and operation of what I call invisible government, he declared.

### 17 Year Old Mother Is Held On Charge of Poisoning Baby

Cleveland, Tenn., April 2. — Mrs. Wesley Davis, held in court here yesterday charged with the death of her 13 months old child by poisoning is still in jail here today not having been successful in making bond of \$5,000. Sheriff J. L. Boyd and county physician, R. D. Sullivan plan to leave here today for Ellijay, Ga., for the purpose of having the body of the child disinterred for the purpose of a post mortem examination.

Mrs. Davis has agreed to the post mortem examination. The accused mother is about 17 years old.

### Detachment From Fort Bragg Leave For Tour of State

Fayetteville, April 2. — Two detachments from Fort Bragg left the army post today on a recruiting tour of the state.

The first detachment of two officers and 25 men started southward with a platoon of 75 guns and the other consisting of two officers and 24 men started for the north and east with similar equipment. The detachments will visit among other places Rocky Mount, Wilson and Kenly.

The first detachment will be out 60 days and the second 30 days.

### Officer Williams and Heber Savage Capture Two Stills

Yesterday afternoon officers Williams and Savage visited Belvoir township and captured a hundred gallon capacity copper still. The still was located near the same place in which two operators were captured last week.

This morning Officers Williams and Savage captured a one hundred and twenty gallon still on the left hand side of the Greenville-Falkland road about 4 miles from Greenville. They poured out 150 gallons of corn liquor beer. Mr. Williams stated that the still had evidently been in operation for a number of months and had made large quantities of whiskey.

## \$200,000 BOND ISSUE FOR GREENVILLE SCHOOLS CARRIED HERE YESTERDAY

The \$200,000 School Bonds issue was carried in yesterday's election by more than a two to one vote. Of the 897 registrations 696 votes were cast in favor of the issue and 74 opposing it, the remaining 227 not voting.

The proceeds of the issue will go for the paying of the present floating indebtedness of the schools including the Vines House and the new colored school, totalling approximately \$85,000. The remaining \$115,000 will be used for the purchase of new sites and erection and equipment of new buildings or additions to the present buildings.

The present enrollment of the Greenville schools, including the colored schools, is slightly above 2,000. Of these, between 1,200 and 1,400 are enrolled in the white schools. A careful estimate shows that there will be more than 125 more children of this city that will reach the school age and be eligible for enrollment prior to the next fall term.

## Surprise Promised At Close Saturday

Naturally, there are some difference in standings, but there is not one candidate on the list who has not a good chance for victory if they finish this week and the next two with the proper spirit. There is not one person now remaining on the list of candidates who could not take hold of their campaign with energy right now and go through and win the big Buick which is the first prize.

## STONE MAY BE NEXT ATTORNEY GENERAL

Washington, April 2. — Harlan Fiske Stone, of New York, until recently Dean Columbia University law school, appeared today to be leading the field of those under consideration by President Coolidge for appointment as Attorney General.

Stone was a breakfast guest at the White House today and President Coolidge presented him to the group of Senators called to the White House to discuss the legislative situation.

Though there was no direct statement by the president the guests left the White House expecting announcement of the appointment momentarily.

Since his retirement from Columbia University, Stone has been associated with the New York law firm of Satterlee, Canfield and Stone. Like President Coolidge he is a native of New Hampshire and graduated from Amherst. He is 51 years old.

## PRESIDENT HOLDS A BREAKFAST CONFAB

Washington, April 2.—Means of speeding up legislation in the Senate were considered at a White House breakfast conference today attended by a dozen Republican Senators. President Coolidge went over with his guests the entire situation endeavoring to map out a program for the remainder of the session similar to that agreed upon last week by the executive and Republican leaders of the House.

Senators attending the conference included Lodge, Massachusetts, Republican leader in the Senate; Curtis, Kansas, assistant Republican leader; Borah, Idaho; Moses, New Hampshire; Brandegee, Connecticut; Willis, Ohio, and Watson, Indiana.

While the conference confined itself primarily to legislative matters the president is also understood to have sought advice with respect to the appointment of a new Attorney General. After the conference it was learned that this appointment might be announced at any moment.

The conference today was the first of its kind held by the president although from the time to time he has invited individual Senators to confer with him on particular measures before the Senate.

The organization meeting of the Greenville Chamber of Commerce, which was held in the court house last night, was a great success. Undoubtedly it was one of the most interesting Chamber of Commerce gatherings that has been in Greenville in a long time.

W. H. Dail, Jr., chairman of the organization committee, presided.

Mr. Dail, in his opening remarks, paid tribute to the faithful service of the membership solicitation committee. "I have never seen a committee work more faithfully," said Mr. Dail. ## WELL DONE

The action of the citizens of Greenville on yesterday in voting a \$200,000 bond issue for improvement of city schools shows to the world that we have not lost faith in the future and our future citizens.

Though our school system is far above the average and we are justly proud of the work that is being accomplished, it is an understood fact that our buildings and equipment are inadequate to accommodate the more than 1,200 white children enrolled in our schools and in voting the bond issue to provide more buildings and better equipment the citizens of Greenville performed well a duty to the community and the citizens of tomorrow.

## A STEP TOWARD PROGRESS

The significance of last night's meeting at the courthouse cannot be easily estimated. In fact, it would be a difficult matter.

The large crowd of representative citizens came together for one sole purpose and lingered for over two hours discussing a greater Greenville and Pitt County through the Greenville Chamber of Commerce.

It was clearly pointed out that individualism must go to the rubbish yards of the past and be supplanted by a co-ordinated effort; that our common good must take the precedence over petty jealousies; that unanimity must sweep away selfishness; that the knocker with his knocking must be driven into the fold of the booster with his wholesome boosting; that confidence in the wonderful resources that lie about us, mostly in their potential value, shall come to full fruition; that it is for Greenville to set a pace for Eastern Carolina towns; that it is the duty to realize that steady, daily, constant effort is what is needed to get results; that no one should expect accomplishments to focus immediately; that the membership should speak of the Greenville Chamber of Commerce as "OUR CHAMBER OF COMMERCE AND US" instead of "YOUR CHAMBER OF COMMERCE AND YOU FELLOWS;" that Greenville should set for herself a task of selling Greenville and adjacent territory, first to our own citizens, then to the State and Nation; that a town cannot become an intelligent booster of that with which it is not acquainted.

# STATE SOLICITS HELP OF ELDERLY INDIANS BOUNDARY DISPUTE

Austin, Texas.—In the dimmed memories of nine aged Indians and Mexicans, last reminders of the pioneer west, the state of New Mexico has sought the solution of a boundary dispute with Texas, involving 20,000 acres of rich land.

The line between the two states where they meet near the northern boundary of old Mexico was established along the channel of the Rio Grande river in 1850. Since then, however, the channel of the river has shifted, carving out of New Mexico 20,000 acres of land and placing it in Texas, according to contentions of the former state.

In the days before the fifties, Indians and Mexicans traveled back and forth from Mexico to the United States, using the trails that followed the meandering river. A number of these Indians and Mexicans, who were then boys, are still living and the state of New Mexico has sought their aid to establish the old channel of the river, which the state alleges is 5,000 feet east of the present channel. Testimony of these men has been used in a suit brought by New Mexico, pending in the United States Supreme court.

Traveling back along the paths of memory almost four score years, the old men have attempted to trace for the New Mexico engineers the course of the fickle Rio Grande as it existed in 1850. On the banks of the river these Indians and Mexicans fished and hunted and followed the trails when going with their fathers to the frontier settlements. With true Indian instinct, they knew each tree, each bend of the river, each trail through mountain and forest.

And now they have retraced the steps of their youth, returning over the roads where the forgotten trails once lay, to point out what lingering recollection still tells them was the old channel of the shifting stream. Many of the old marks by which they were guided in their travels 75 years ago have vanished utterly, but the unchanging mountains and the friendly trees remain as guides.

In a voluminous brief, just prepared by the state of Texas, it is contended the evidence offered by these old men is too vague and uncertain to establish definitely the course of the river in 1850. New Mexico argues that, taken together with old surveys and treaties, this evidence fixes beyond a doubt the true river channel.

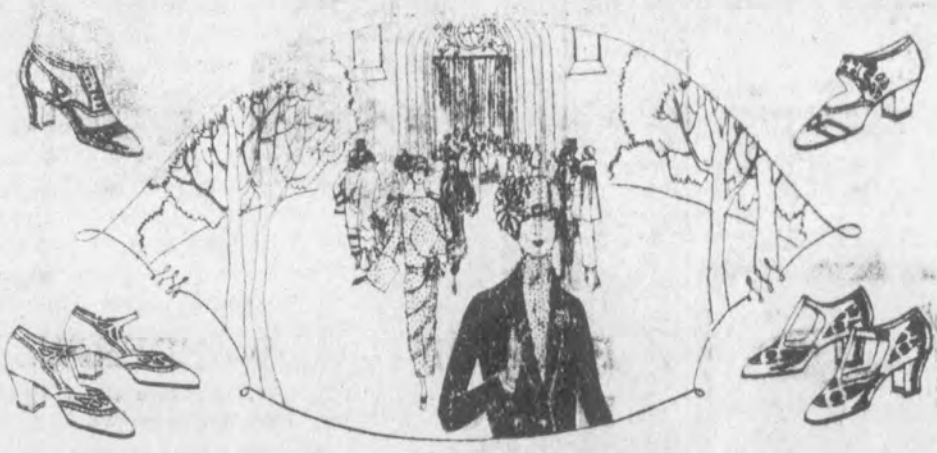

## PILGRIMS VISIT DAILY MEMORIAL TO WIFE ERECTED BY PREMIER

London.—The achievement of Ramsay MacDonald in rising from an envelope-licking clerk to the highest political position in Great Britain is tinged with tragedy in the thought that his wife, who labored with him in his struggles to improve the position of the poor, died before great honors came to him.

A memorial erected by Mr. MacDonald and her friends to Mrs. MacDonald in front of their former home in Lincoln's Inn Fields has, with Labor's advent to power, changed from an unsung marble group and wooden bench to a center of public pilgrimage. Daily hundreds leave the rumbling traffic of Fleet Street and the Strand to stroll through the quiet little park near which the memorial—with the woman's arms outstretched to welcome a host of little children—identifies itself thus: "This seat was placed here in memory of Margaret Ethel MacDonald, who spent her life in helping others."

Mrs. MacDonald died in 1911, leaving five children, none of them grown at the time, to the care of their father. Her death must have saddened many other children, for all her life she had devoted time, thought and work to improving the lot of little ones in poverty. As a school girl she worked at a small boys' club in Kensington, and later education claimed her keen interest. To the grown-up poor, as well as their offsprings, she lent a hand of help, one of her principal aims being to improve the working conditions of barmaids and charwomen.

Mrs. MacDonald's interest were political, as well as humanitarian, but perhaps the former was but a means of attaining her ambitions in the latter respect. She was the daughter of Dr. J. H. Gladstone, a scientist of some repute, and she first met Mr. MacDonald in 1895. Later, for years, their home was crowded, once every three weeks, with men and women busy in the service of the Labor Party. But her home was not a political saloon, as are the drawing rooms of many of the wealthy wives of politicians. Mostly it was a place where friends were always welcome.

Paris to Honor First Movie.  
Paris.—On the building that is replacing one of the famous cafes of the Boulevard des Capucines the Paris City Council is to place a bronze plaque to mark the place where the first public "movie" was shown.

It was on December 28, 1895, that the Lumiere brothers projected their first film before an audience. The screen was stretched in the basement of the Grand Cafe, for generations a favorite haunt of Boulevardiers, now in course of destruction to make room for a bank.

Germans Keen for Fine Books.  
London.—Art dealers are said to be puzzled just now at a sudden invasion of Germans, anxious to buy expensive art books and pictures in London. The buyers are most insistent for impressionist and post-impressionist works, and apparently do not mind what they pay for them.

## BRITISH LABOR DISPUTES COST HUGE TOTAL IN LOST DAYS

London.—The number of working days lost by trade disputes, as reported to the Ministry of Labor, in Great Britain and northern Ireland in 1920, 1921, 1922 and 1923 were approximately 26,000,000, 86,000,000, 20,000,000 and 10,500,000 respectively.

These figures, given in a parliamentary reply by the minister of labor, relate only to days lost at the establishments where the disputes occurred. No figures are available as to days lost at establishments other than those directly affected.

Janitors Favor Higher Rents.  
Berlin.—There are 10,000 apartment houses in Berlin without porters, according to the Porters' Union, which contends that the former caretakers quit their jobs because the house owners were not able to pay for their services.

Berlin has 50,000 apartment houses, say the porters, who have come out strongly in favor of the government permitting an increase in rents. The government has promised relief.
