NAVY DEPARTMENT ANNOUNCES NEW OIL POLICY

Secretary Wilbur Will Make No Leases Except to Save Reserve

Washington, April 10.—A new naval oil policy designed to safeguard the government against any such leases as those granted under former Secretary Denby was announced by Secretary Wilbur in a letter to Senator Hale, of Maine, chairman of the Naval Committee. Wilbur declared no leases or contracts will be made by the navy department without the personal approval of the Secretary of the Navy. "No leases will be made until expressly authorized by Congress unless it appears to my satisfaction that such leases are absolutely essential to prevent draining of oil in the reserve by wells drilled adjacent thereto, and unless it further appears that such leases are fully authorized by act of Congress and in that event leases will be made only after competitive bidding."

Industry in South Reported Satisfactory

Washington, April 10.—Industrial activity in Southern states continues on general satisfactory scale with unemployment largely centering in textile and cotton mill centers although common labor is reported in surplus in the iron and steel centers the employment bureau Department of Labor reported today.

Except for curtailed textile mills operations general conditions are summarized as healthy in Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina, with prospects for increased employment of farm hands, construction and highway gangs during the spring.

COTTON LETTER

New Orleans, La., April 10.—There being no statement in the demand for spot cotton in Liverpool sales there ten thousand bales against today of which 6,800, were American and as the weather remained unfavorable in the interior rather general moderate to heavy rains market experienced another big advance at the opening today.

Extensive realizing at the advance however, was at the expense of values in early morning and as it is reported that returns to the national ginners' association point to only about 480,000 bales of lint cotton as having been consumed in the U. S. during March vs. 508,000 in February of this year against 623,000 for March of last year, make declined further.

At best the reported estimate on domestic consumption for last month is only a guess. Furthermore American mills have to curtail in order to make the small available supply provide for the remainder of the season and until the new crop moves in volume next September.

At the last of February American mills held a stock of only 1,578,000 bales against 2,021,000 last year and stocks in public storage were only 2,485,000 against 2,803,000.

Old crop deliveries will likely obtain their strength mainly from the demand for spots in Liverpool and in the south from future exports from the U. S. and American mill takings during the balance of the season.

Developments in this respect are likely to be conservative as the total supply on this side of the Atlantic outside of mills stocks is limited to less than were domestic mill takings and exports from the U. S. after this time one year ago.

Already exports thus far the season from the U. S. are about as large they were for the whole of last season of 4,641,000 against 3,973,000 to even date last year and 4,643,000 for all of last season.

The demand for spots especially for desirable grades is reported in excess of offerings in the interior and at the points due to light offerings, otherwise sales would be larger.

Meanwhile climatic conditions inland remain generally unfavorable too to permit satisfactory progress of farm work in preparation for the next crop.

The Caraway Bill would classify all dealings in futures as gambling and make them subject to the same laws and regulations, denying the mails and telegraph lines to any reports concerning such transactions.

ERECTION BEGINS ON NEW GAS PLANT

Service to Be Available Within Six Months—Mains Already Down

Preliminary work of clearing the site for the erection of the gas plant on the Lanier site, near the present Water and Light plant, was started yesterday.

Mr. J. T. Bland, who is superintendent of the plant at Washington is to have charge of operation here also and said that he expects to have service available within six months.

All mains and necessary service piping to the curb were laid in advance of payment of the streets. This equipment was said when the franchise was granted and makes possible the early date at which the company contracts to give service without the inconvenience of torn-up streets which would otherwise be necessary.

New Revenue Bill Presented to Senate By Senator Smoot

Washington, April 10.—The new revenue bill was presented to the Senate today by Senator Smoot of the finance committee, with the statement that it would be called upon next Wednesday for consideration.

"The delay in bringing it up was decided upon," Senator Smoot said, with the hope that all senators would be ready then to present their views on the few sections upon which opposition was expected."

Reparations Report Expressed Satisfactory

Paris, April 10.—After 24 hours consideration of report of the two expert Reparations Committees, spokesmen for official circles today declared no official opinion had been formed of the recommendations contained in documents. Satisfaction, however, was freely expressed that the experts had found evidence tending to confirm French attitude toward Germany.

Prince Rupert Island, B. C., April 10.—The squadron of Army fliers in the round the world flight, taxied into the air here at 9:22 this morning and winged their course for Sitka, Alaska, three hundred miles north west.

Because President Coolidge ousted David W. Davis, a Harding appointee, and named Elwood Mead, of California, a noted reclamation engineer, to head the Reclamation Bureau in the Interior Department, many in Washington believed Dr. Hubert Work would resign as Secretary of the Interior. U. S. Senator John W. Harrell, Republican, of Oklahoma, testified before the Senate Committee investigating the Department of Justice that ex-Attorney-General Harry M. Daugherty's former law partner, John Todd, had been counsel for the Miller interests, and that land he said was fraudulently held is still held by the ranchmen. The Cabinet of the Union of South Africa, headed by General Jan Christian Smuts, has resigned. The Supreme Court of the United States has ruled that Sergeant Roland R. Porter, indicted for the murder of Major A. P. Cronkite at Camp Lewis, Wash., on October 25, 1918, must be returned to that State for trial. It is understood that Captain Robert Rosenbluth, whose friends call him "the American Dreyfus," also must go on trial. Major Cronkite was killed during a pistol target shoot on a practice march, and the cause of death was reported as "accidental shooting." Porter is said later to have confessed he killed Major Cronkite at Captain Rosenbluth's instigation, but later recanted the confession.

BONUS BILL NOW IN COMMITTEE

Washington, April 10.—Consideration of the Soldiers Bonus Bill was put over by the Senate Finance Committee until Saturday morning.

Senator Smoot predicts that at that time there will be agreement on a bill similar to that which passed the House.

Washington, April 10.—The soldiers Bonus Bill, as approved by the House, is under consideration today by the Senate Finance committee.

Agreement was reached yesterday by Republican members of the Senate finance committee to support the soldier bonus bill passed by the house. The committee, having disposed of the tax reduction measure, took up the bonus bill and it was predicted by some of the majority members that the measure would be ordered reported immediately.

Such action will place both the revenue and bonus bills before the Senate.

While no action is expected to be taken by the Senate on either bill before next week, it is considered likely by some of the leaders that the bonus will be called up first.

Democrats are expected to support generally a proposal for a full cash payment option in the bonus bill, the House measure providing for cash payments only to those not entitled to more than \$50 in adjusted service credit and for 20-year endowment life insurance policies to others. Republicans, however, will have sufficient majority in committee to override any such move there and a report of the bill by tomorrow night is anticipated.

Haynes Enlists Women In Prohibition Crusade

Washington, April 10.—The Women of America were called upon "To enter upon a second crusade for prohibition" by Roy A. Haynes, federal prohibition commissioner at the opening session today of the conference here of Women's National Committee for Law Enforcement.

Addresses by government officials and others, a message urging respect for all laws from Secretary Hughes, and a reception of the delegation at the White House marked the conference program for today.

Simmons Presents Democratic Substitute For Mellon Tax Rate

Washington, April 10.—A Democratic substitute for the Mellon tax rate in Revenue bill was presented to the Senate today by Senator Simmons, of North Carolina, ranking Democratic on the Finance committee.

The rates proposed are substantially lower in the smaller "brackets" than those approved by the committee and are about on a parity with the rates in the Longworth compromise which the House approved and the finance committee rejected.

Berlin Says Dawes Report Is Basis For Negotiation

Berlin, April 10.—The bulk of editorial comment published in Berlin newspapers today inclines the opinion that the report of Brigadier General Dawes' report reparations committee constitutes a basis for negotiations. Only in the isolated instances of the nationalistic organs is opposition to the recommendations voiced and even there the familiar cry of "unacceptable" which has greeted every past plan is wholly lacking.

Work on Camp Site Started Wrightsville

Wilmington, April 10.—Work on the new camp site for tourists has been begun about a quarter of a mile from Wrightsville. The city and county are co-operating in the construction of the camp and the work is being done under the supervision of the City Engineer.

Burns Investigates For P. O. Dept.

Washington, April 10.—Senator Borah, Republican, of Idaho, was named today as chairman of a special committee which will investigate the circumstances surrounding the indictment by grand jury in Montana of Senator B. K. Wheeler of that state.

Washington, April 10.—In an interim between testimony about Miller Brothers land fraud cases in Oklahoma and the old Hickory Powder Plant litigation in Tennessee the Daugherty Committee dipped its finger into the controversy which has arisen over indictment of the committee's prosecutor, Senator Wheeler by a grand jury in Montana.

Two witnesses were questioned briefly about charges of Senator Wheeler and various circumstances that attend or followed his indictment.

Wm. J. Burns, chief of the Department of Justice Secret Agents, testified that he had sent seven men into Montana on the Wheeler case—the first three or four weeks ago at the request of Postoffice Department. He had talked to former Attorney General Daugherty about the case, he said, but replied in negative to questions as to whether Daugherty had said he wanted to get something on Wheeler.

The other witness was Arthur Lamkins, an official of telephone company here, who told the committee that George D. Lockwood, Secretary of the Republican National Committee talked yesterday from Washington to Blair Cohen at Great Falls, Montana, where the indictment against Wheeler was returned Tuesday. Burns later identified Cohen as an employee of the Republican National Committee.

The purpose of introducing Lamkins' testimony was not revealed by Senator Wheeler, but told by leagues in a senate speech yesterday that he had received word indirect through the Republican National Headquarters here a long time ago that he was under investigation.

Washington, April 10.—In executive session Senate Daugherty committee decided today to speed up its investigation of the books of the Midland Bank, at Washington Court House, Ohio. Senator Wheeler the committee's prosecutor will leave for Ohio tonight to begin work.

Senator Moses, Republican, New Hampshire, who was named as a subcommittee member to make the Ohio inquiry with Wheeler vigorously opposed prosecutors plans and later withdrew from the sub committee. Chairman Brookhart taking place.

Statesville, April 10.—City and county officials, business firms, banks, and manufacturing plants will open their doors to the youth of the community and give them full sway and access to the complete organization here on April 29 when the school boys of the section start on what they have termed "Boys Day." They will visit the various city and county officials office, and business firms as well as manufacturing plants and will have the entire workings of each organization explained to them in detail. The boys plan in this way to get some idea what line of business that they like best, and to become acquainted with the men of affairs in their community.

The business men are co-operating fully and say that they will be glad to come in close contact with boys again. Seventeen different kinds of business or occupations will be visited.

THE WHINE ON THE RHINE

Dispatches yesterday announced Germany had received news of what the Dawes report to the Reparations Commission consisted of, with a gasp of dismay, and that she

declared the conditions imposed by that report to exceed her worst fears.
 To anyone who has followed the course Germany has taken throughout all previous negotiations, this will be no news, as her stock preliminary move has consistently been a whine.
 Speculation on the "state of the German mind" have lately come to be a popular newspaper diversion. The interest was of course, confined to the probable effect of that so-called state of mind upon the chances for acceptance of the Dawes proposals by the German people. In pursuing the sport of prophesying, however, it is quite possible to forget that a good many states of mind, not one great overwhelming, monotonous national consciousness, have to be considered. Certainly the state of mind of the Germans who are not reactionary nor inclined toward communism should not be neglected.
 There is undoubtedly a great group of moderates who believe that a policy of submission to all economically possible demands is the only alternative to national disintegration.
 In the opinion of the moderate elements in the German State the victory of the reactionary groups will mean the downfall not only of the republic but it will mean the repudiation of international obligations. That will involve in their opinion a further penetration of German territory by former enemy powers. To avoid that they are prepared to make concessions to the limit of the possible, and they hold this prospect constantly before the voters, whom they want to pledge to a policy of fulfillment as a guarantee against worse evils.
 It has to be remembered, therefore, whatever the outcome of the elections, that a powerful body of German opinion stands aloof from those whose "state of mind" dictates rebellion, no compromise and repudiation of the Treaty of Versailles.

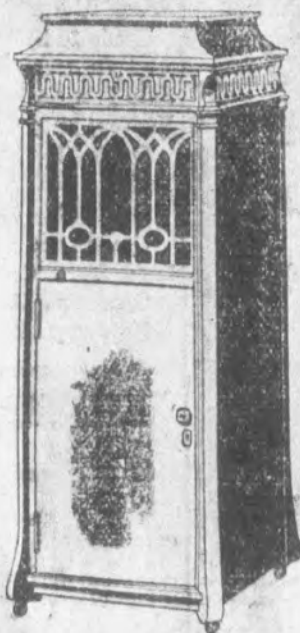

New Bern Paper Interprets the Great Work of M. F. Ham

The following interesting editorials which appeared in the New Bernian during the Ham-Ramsey campaign in New Bern, N. C. are indicative of the type and character of the work done by Evangelist M. F. Ham, who comes to Greenville next Tuesday to conduct a union evangelistic effort at the Forbes & Merton warehouse.

In an editorial entitled "False Rumors" the New Bernian said in part:

"There is nothing that can cause more confusion, annoyance or scandal than false rumors and gossip.

"Evangelists and pastors especially seem to be the target for this line of attack and there are few men who occupy the pulpit that are not made the victims of idle talk and derogatory comment.

"New Bern had a fairly good idea of what Rev. M. F. Ham was before he came to this city. We had heard that he caused interdenominational strife, that he attacked the Catholics and Jews, that he was a sensationalist and loved nothing better than 'muck-raking,' that he caused wrangling and dissension and unpleasantness of every description.

"New Bern has found out however, that he does not live up to the reputation which was established for him. Our people are beginning to appreciate him as the greatest evangelist in the country today.

Another editorial which appeared in the same publication under the lead "Talking Religion," read as follows:

"There is more discussion about religious topics on the streets and in the homes and places of business of New Bern today than there probably ever has been before in the history of the city.

"The cause—Rev. M. F. Ham, the evangelist who is conducting the series of meetings at the tabernacle on East Front street.

"Last week the world series baseball championship games were in progress. A rabid Giant fan might walk along the street and see a group of men gathered close together and evidently engaged in a warm argument. Naturally he would surmise that they were arguing about the respective merits of the Giants and the Yankees. And the probabilities would be that as he drew near enough to hear what they were saying, he'd catch the words.

"The point that I didn't understand was when he defined that particular phase of salvation."

"Well, let me explain it to you. Here's my conception of it—"

"No, that wasn't what he said at all."

"And by that time, the rabid Giant fan would either turn away with disgust and think sadly upon the way that the world was deteriorating, or else he would stay and join in the

discussions. The odds are that he would stay.

"That is really one of the most impressive facts about the Ham-Ramsey campaign in New Bern. There have been other evangelists here and they have many professions of faith. Mr. Ham already has brought scores into the church since coming here and he has had hundreds of Christians to pledge themselves to a new consecration but even though not a single person had made profession of faith, his meeting here would still be a tremendous success. 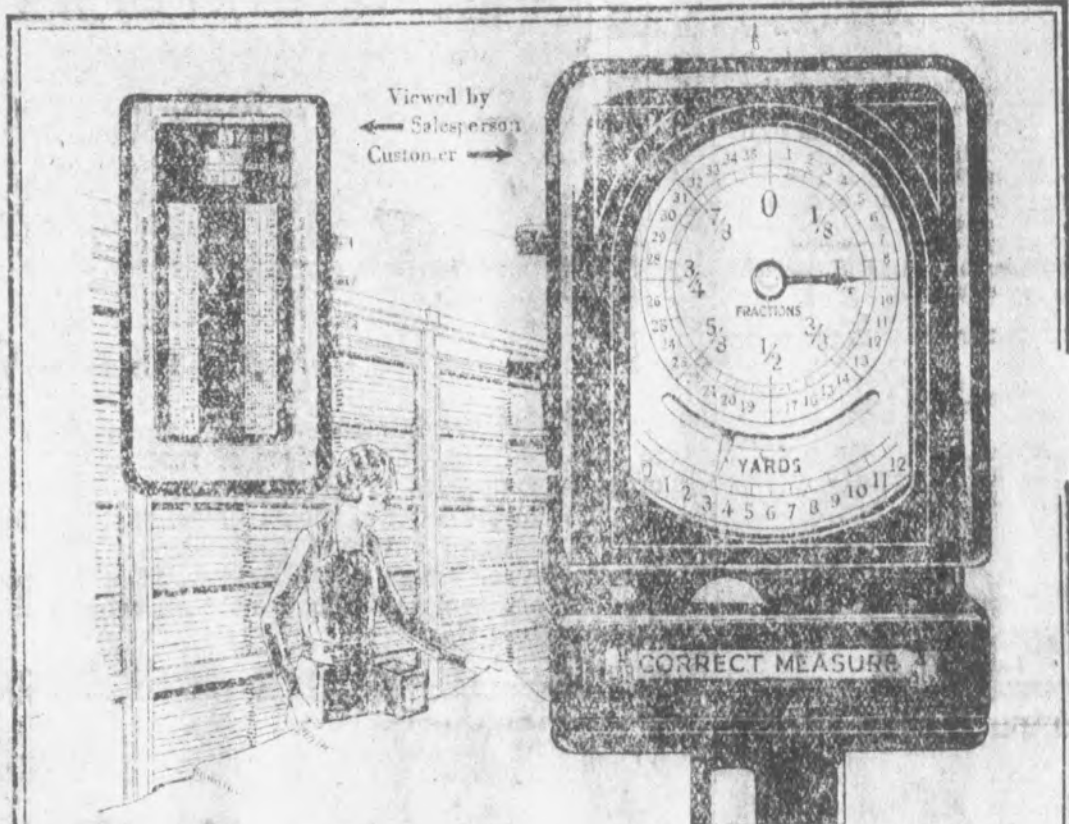
England Seeks Cotton Fields

BRAZIL BELIEVES IN BENEFITTING FROM FOREIGN GUIDANCE

Foreign missions have become the fashion in Brazil. A French army mission under the command of General Gamelin has been here for about three years, assisting in the reorganization of the Brazilian army. An American naval mission commanded by Rear Admiral Carl Vogelgesang has been working here for a year introducing modern methods in the Brazilian navy. A British financial and commercial mission arrived in Rio de Janeiro Dec. 31 at the invitation of the Brazilian government.

All of these missions have attracted public interest both within and outside the country. The army and navy missions have been the cause of comment and criticism in the other South American countries. Now the British financial and commercial mission is focusing the attention of the commercial representatives of other countries.

In a statement to The Associated Press, Sir Edwin S. Montagu, chief of the British mission, said that the Brazilian government wished to carry out without delay a general plan of financial restoration and to give the greatest economic, national development, especially to cotton, iron, petroleum, coal and other products, and banking organization from the point of view of exchange. For this reason it had secured a visit to Brazil on the part of men eminent in the world of industry, finance and economics in order that their direct knowledge of the affairs of the country, and its great productive capacity, may result in freer application of English capital to the prosperity of Brazil. Members of the mission said they expected to remain here about three months.

Both the Brazilian government and the British mission have avoided making any statement concerning possible loans to Brazil, but it is rumored that British capitalists have suggested the formation of a syndicate to take over and consolidate all Brazilian indebtedness to other countries, and to advance further sums for Brazilian necessities in the near future.

Raleigh Men Attend Anti-Saloon League Meeting Indianapolis

Raleigh, April 9.—M. L. Shipman, state commissioner of Printing and Labor, and Reverend R. L. Davis, superintendent of Anti-Saloon League of North Carolina, both members of the National Board of Directors of the Anti-Saloon League of America, left Monday for Indianapolis, Indiana, where they will attend a special meeting of the league today. The meeting was called last week by Dr. P. A. Baker, for 20 years general superintendent of the league, a few days before his sudden and unexpected death, in Westerville, Ohio, where he lived.

Mr. Shipman and Reverend Davis went in response to a telegram from Thomas Nicholson, president of the league, urging them to attend and explaining that matters of importance would be discussed and acted upon at this meeting.

Besides Commissioner Shipman and Reverend Davis, both of Raleigh, there are two other North Carolinians on the National Board of directors of the Anti-Saloon League of America. They are Mrs. T. W. Bickett, of Raleigh, and W. T. Shaw, of Weldon.

Federal Inspector Of This State Is Transferred Ohio

Raleigh, April 9.—Dr. A. J. DeFossett, Federal Inspector in charge of tuberculosis eradication and hog cholera control in North Carolina, has been transferred to Ohio, where Monday he takes charge of similar work in that state. Dr. DeFossett has been in North Carolina about one year, having succeeded Dr. Paul Vaughn. During his short stay here he has been of great assistance to authorities of the State College and Department of Agriculture in placing the work of tuberculosis eradication before the people and in making considerable progress along that line, it was stated. North Carolina is now making greater progress than any other state in the Union in cleaning up its infected dairy herds, it is claimed.

Dr. DeFossett will go to Ohio where he will endeavor to place the work there on the same basis as in this state. He will be succeeded here by Dr. W. C. Dendinger, who was appointed by the Bureau of Animal Industry at Washington with the approval of State Veterinarian, Dr. William Moore. Dr. Dendinger will begin his new work immediately.

While a guest in the White House Governor J. A. O. Preus, of Minnesota, told President Coolidge the greatest danger to the Republican Party in the Northwest is a third party movement, headed by Senator Robert M. La Follette. Such a party, he said, would carry several States. Rt. Rev. William Montgomery Brown, retired Protestant Episcopal Bishop of Arkansas, living in Gallon, O., will be placed on trial on a charge of heresy in Trinity Cathedral Hall, Cleveland, O., on May 27. The presentment grows out of 23 alleged heresies contained in his book, "Christianism and Communism," which has been printed in eight languages. Sebastian Rondi, a Sicilian lawyer living in Milan, Italy, has sent a challenge to a duel to Maurice Materlinck, Belgian poet and playwright, for alleged defamatory articles recently published concerning the poet's Sicilian trip. Mrs. Lidwina Garbarino, mother of sixteen children, whose ages range from 5 to 33 years, has just won a Detroit, Mich., divorce on the grounds of desertion. Many of the children, she alleges, were driven from home by her husband.
