10th District Federated Meeting Woman's Clubs Held Here On Thursday

Mrs. Palmer Jerman, President of the North Carolina Federation, Delivers Splendid Address; Large Number Delegates in Attendance; Mrs. R. R. Cotton Attends; Tempting Luncheon Served

The annual meeting of the Tenth District Federated Woman's Clubs of North Carolina convened in Jarvis Memorial Methodist church of this city, on Thursday, April 10 at 10:30 o'clock. The sessions were largely attended in spite of the inclement weather, and were featured by an address of welcome by Mayor D. M. Clark, response to the address by Mrs. C. M. Brown, reports of the various clubs and an address by Mrs. Palmer Jerman, of Raleigh, president of the North Carolina Federation.

Mrs. S. R. Fowle, president of the Tenth District Woman's Clubs, presided. The invocation was offered by the Rev. J. E. W. Cook, of the St. Paul's Episcopal church. This was followed by the singing of "The Old North State."

Address of Welcome.
In a most cordial manner Mayor D. M. Clark welcomed the delegates and visitors. He spoke of the splendid work being done by the Woman's Clubs and appealed to them to "carry on." He closed his remarks with a beautiful tribute to woman. Mrs. C. M. Brown, of Washington, in her usual charming manner, responded to the address of welcome. Prior to the business session, Miss Hortense Higgs delighted the audience with a beautiful solo.

Reports of Clubs.
In the absence of the secretary the minutes of last year's meeting were read by Mrs. E. W. Harvey, of Greenville. The clubs from the following towns made splendid reports, Washington, Farmville, Belhaven, Greenville, Plymouth and Panteo. The Home Council from Washington county, and the Home Demonstration from Beaufort county gave interesting reports. Mrs. J. R. Carroll, of Winterville, told of the work which is being accomplished by the Winterville Betterment Association. All the reports of the clubs showed an increase in members and in strength and were indeed encouraging.

The reports were followed by two beautiful violin solos by Miss Gorell, of the Teachers College, accompanied by Miss Bertole of the College faculty.

Mrs. Palmer's Address.
Mrs. Palmer Jerman, of Raleigh, president of the North Carolina Federation, was introduced by Mrs. Fowle and she in a most charming manner held the large audience spell bound for over an hour with her inspiring address. After extending congratulations to the delegates and the visitors for the splendid attendance, Mrs. Jerman confined her remarks, for a short while to club problems and appealed to the members to make their clubs democratic and to go out beyond their own narrow circles and almost compel new members to come in. The speaker spoke interestingly on the child labor law and divorce laws, showing how necessary it is that these be changed in order to bring about better international relationship. She told of the two kinds of club members, optimistic and pessimistic, and appealed to the club members not to become depressed but always remember that there is a great work to be accomplished and that it is a woman's work. Mrs. Jerman then lectured the members of the clubs for their failure in supporting their officers, after electing them. "It is your duty," she declared, "to see that after placing them in the honored position of officers that they do their duty." She further declared that every member should co-operate in making a club a success and not leave the work to two or three members.

Mrs. Jerman told of the Endowment Fund and the Sallie Southall Cotten Loan Fund. She told of how eleven young ladies are being educated in the colleges of North Carolina on the Loan Fund. Never since the

HOUSE BONUS BILL GOES TO SENATE

Washington, April 12.—The soldiers Bonus bill passed by the house was agreed to by the Senate finance committee with minor changes and ordered to the Senate. It provides for cash to veterans not entitled to more than fifty dollars and twenty-year endowment life insurance policies to the others.

Senator Simmons of North Carolina ranking democrat on the committee announced that he would present an amendment on the floor of the Senate making full cash optional.

Chairman Smoot said he would report the measure to the Senate Monday. No formal vote was taken, Smoot announced, the report being by acclamation.

Immediately after Mrs. Jerman's address the delegates and visitors were invited to the basement of the church where a most tempting luncheon was served in cafeteria style. The menu consisted of chicken salad, saltines, pickles, sandwiches, Pitt county ham, stuffed eggs, fried chicken, cake and black coffee.

Miss Annie Perkins, of Farmville, gave a most beautiful toast to Mrs. Cotton. She praised her for her wonderful influence during her club life showing how she had "mothered" the clubs from their infancy, and appealed to "Father Time" to deal with her gently. She is needed more and more as her children grow in strength and wisdom and her presence at all times encourages and promotes the best there is in the club women of the state. The toast was given in a most charming manner and expressed the sentiments of each club member. It was a toast of love and appreciation to the most beloved club woman of the state.

NEGRESS HELD FOR DEATH OF THREE CHILDREN

Coroner's Jury Charges Criminal Neglect

Greensboro, April 12.—Bessie Dunbar, a negress, is held in jail here today for the grand jury under orders of the county coroner as the result of the burning to death of her three children ages five, six and nine years old, in her home in the eastern part of the city last night.

The children were found in a pantry from which there was no door leading to the outside of the house and the bodies were burned beyond recognition. When firemen found the bodies, that of the eldest child was lying across those of the two younger children as though to give what protection it could. A coroner's jury, hastily empanelled, held the mother guilty of criminal negligence in leaving the children alone in the home. She had left the house leaving a fire in the kitchen about five o'clock and it is believed that the fire started in that part of the house.

The fire was beyond control when the firemen arrived.

Approval of Report Grows in Germany

New York, April 12.—Cables to banking houses here from Berlin indicated that approval of the terms of the report of the expert committees to the Reparation commission is increasing as they are better understood.

A prominent German financier is said to have remarked that the report is the most constructive plan that has been advanced and that it should be possible for Germany to completely rehabilitate herself under it.

Arrest Greek Officers As Revolutionists

Athens, Greece, April 12.—Eighteen ranking military and Naval officers, suspected of complicity in a projected royalist outbreak, have been placed under arrest. The minister of the interior says that a considerable quantity of ammunition and large number of revolvers were brought in to Athens recently by the reactionaries.

MOTHER OF 18 AS BIGAMIST

Marries Banker to Pay Blackmailers

Philadelphia, April 12.—The wife of a carpenter in the day time and bride of a wealthy banker at night, Mrs. Samuel E. Boswick, is today waiting a hearing on charges of forgery which in an alleged confession given to the police she claims she was forced to commit to obtain money for blackmailers.

Apparently neither Boswick by whom she said she had eighteen children, nor William C. Martin, whom she declared she married last February and from whom she said she had taken at least \$55,000 to pay blackmailers to prevent them from disclosing the fact of her dual life, knew of the situation.

Four Men Arrested While Repairing Still Near Falkland

Roger Williams, white man of Falkland township and three negroes, Vitcher Webster, Walter Mann, and Will Tyson are under bond for their appearance here at next term of court to answer to a charge of possessing a still for the manufacturing of liquor.

Officer Whitehurst accompanied by Officer Pierce visited Falkland township, Thursday afternoon, for the purpose of capturing the still which was supposed to be in operation. Upon reaching the site the still could not be found. Believing it to have been moved the officers started out in another direction when Officer Whitehurst heard a blow torch. Upon investigation all four men were found in a house near by repairing the still. They were arrested, brought to Greenville and given a preliminary hearing. The fourth man gave bond today.

Provide Agencies For Handling Farm Products

Washington, April 12.—Two farm measures of widespread interest were reported to the Senate today by the Senate Agricultural committee. One provides for a government agency for the export of farm products and the other for the general sale of such products.

IMMIGRATION BILL DEVELOPES SERIOUS COMPLICATIONS

Japan Objects to Being Denied Quota—Ambassador Warns

Washington, April 12.—An international issue of the gravest importance confronts the Senate and House today in the immigration bill in its handling of the Japanese question. After disposing of a number of minor amendments.

The crisis has arisen from the objection of the so-called 'gentlemen's agreement' which was entered into under Roosevelt in 1907, as having no basis in law, as not having been entered into in the manner that the Constitution provides for the formation of international agreements.

The immigration bill would specifically omit Japan from the list of nations granted a quota of permissible immigrants.

The Japanese Ambassador Hanihara, in letters to Secretary of State Hughes has insisted that the 'gentlemen's agreement' has been scrupulously observed by Japan and warns him of the 'grave consequences' to be expected from more drastic exclusion legislation.

Ship Workers In Lock-Out in Britain

Liverpool, Eng. April 12.—More than 100,000 ship workers throughout the United Kingdom are locked out today because of the failure of the striking members of their unions in Southampton to resume work yesterday in conformity with the ultimatum of the shipbuilding employers' federations.

No Hearings Held In Daugherty Case

Washington, April 12.—The Daugherty investigating committee which encountered new legal obstacles yesterday in Ohio, spent today drawing up plans for its future procedure. No public hearings were held.

FRANCE RESERVES COMMENT REPORT

Awaits German Action Before Committing Herself

Paris, April 12.—The French government will bide its time awaiting the German action on the report of the reparations commission before commenting on the unanimous approval of the commission.

Moreover, Premier Poincare is anxious to have the Chamber of Deputies off his hands before he starts negotiations with the allies to bring the experts work to full fruition.

Once the Senate and Chamber have adjourned it is expected that he will lose no time in scolding out London, Brussels and Rome with a view of speeding up the settlement, as it would be a trump card in his electoral campaign.

DAUGHERTY'S BRO. IS TO BE CITED FOR CONTEMPT

PROBE TO LAST SIX MORE WEEKS

New Leads Being Developed in the Department of Justice Inquiry

Washington, April 12.—Senator declared today that there were many additional leads to be developed in the Senate's inquiry into the administration of the Department of Justice under Daugherty, and that the investigation will continue for at least six weeks despite the official opposition confronting the committee.

Chairman Brookhart returned to Washington and conferred with his colleagues regarding the court stay that nullified all his efforts to get at records at Washington Court House, Ohio.

This stay was which prevented the examination of the books and records of the Midlands National Bank was granted by a probate judge who was formerly a law partner of Harry M. Daugherty.

Senator Wheeler, prosecutor for the committee says he will bring this court action before the whole senate for action. He also declared that a brother of the former attorney general is to be cited for contempt.

The building is being constructed on the open storage plan which is considered the best plan for this section of the state.

The storage house will be in sections and according to a statement made by Mr. Ficklen, the whole block will be utilized for storage purposes as the market demands. All modern improvements are being used in the construction and it is being erected so as to carry the lowest insurance rate possible.

The E. B. Ficklen Tobacco Company is one of the largest "boosters" of the Greenville Tobacco market, and is interested in those things which help toward the promotion of better conditions for the farmer and warehousemen.

Not only is this company interested in conditions locally but they are vitally concerned with conditions in foreign countries and make from two to three trips abroad each year. In this way they keep in touch with outside conditions which enables them to give the people of this section better service.

The Greenville Tobacco market is making greater preparations than ever before for a better market and the warehousemen expects to sell at least 60,000,000 pounds of tobacco during the '24 and '25 season.

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Germany because there is still a German reluctance to admit the debt, or its possibility of payment. Yet the plan makes it clear that Germany can pay the debt within fifty years and make complete economic recovery at the same time. Therefore, France should be content, because the plan insures the collection of the reparations in full. Germany should not object, because it rids her of foreign interference in her industries, restores her finances, re-establishes her credit, provides for the discharge of her documentary obligations, revives her foreign trade and lays the foundations for the reconstruction of her national honor. However, it is expected that the Dawes plan will win the approval of all concerned, and that the economic progress of Europe, so long repressed, may resume its forward march. The whole world hopes that such will be the case.

IN DEFENSE—ATTACK

The news that an indictment has been found against Senator Wheeler because of the alleged acceptance of a fee from oil interests after he became a member of the Senat will not arouse very much interest in and of itself. Senator Wheeler is practically unknown to the country at large and such notoriety as he has obtained during the present investigation has hardly been beneficial to his general standing. If, as he alleges, the indictments are a "frame-up" he will no doubt be able to show that such is the case and to put his critics to rout. But if it should turn out that the indictment is well founded it will still be true that the action taken has nothing to do with what has been going on in Washington. Moreover, the action taken is a piece of sheer folly just as this moment. Whatever may be now done or left undone, there will always be the suspicion in many minds that the inquiry was "shut off." From the "frame-up" standpoint the moment could not have been more ill-chosen.

It is an old expedient in Federal politics to try to discredit those who are conducting investigations or who are making trouble and thus to impair their standing or authority with the public. That is undoubtedly what is being sought in this case, regardless of whether the charges against Senator Wheeler are well or ill founded.

EMPEROR ISSUES ORDERS TO REBUILD WINTER HOME
Tokio.—Two million yen has been set aside for the re-construction of the imperial villa at Hayama, on the coast 30 miles southwest of Yokohama, which, before it was damaged by the September earthquake, was the favorite winter residence of the emperor. Hayama was in the center of the earthquake zone, and the imperial residence suffered badly. Part of the ground within the villa enclosure sank about 5 feet in the earthquake. Because the Hayama villa cannot be occupied this winter, the emperor and empress are wintering at Numazu.
