POLITICS URGED AS GOOD FIELD FOR MEDICAL MEN

COPELAND MAKES FEATURE SPEECH

President McGowan Wants Doctors to Fight Quacks Through Leg- islative Activity

Raleigh, April 16.—With one more than 500 doctors and surgeons in attendance the two day session of the Seventy-first Annual session of the North Carolina Medical Society opened today.

Last night the doctors heard Dr. Royal S. Copeland, United States Senator from New York, in an address in which he defined the doctors particular fitness for public life.

President J. Vance McGowan urged legislative activity to protect the profession from quacks and those who would damage the high standing and impair the usefulness of the craft to humanity.

This morning was taken up with a business meeting of the society, while tonight the annual election of officers will be held.

The doctor is one of the best qualified men in the country to be a leader in politics and to serve his nation in governmental affairs, declared Dr. Royal S. Copeland, United States Senator from New York, in speaking to the North Carolina Medical Society in its annual convention here last night. It is apparent, he said, that when the conditions are really considered and the purpose of government thought of rightly, that the most vital problems have to do with things with which a physician is most familiar.

Dr. Copeland explained what he thought was the real idea of government and compared the capabilities of the lawyer to the doctor as they were each fitted for political service to state and nation.

The growth of the nation and its cities was related and the social and health condition arising from the industrial centers was explained. It was pointed out that the physical surroundings of these places had much to do with the development of the country, and that these created real problems. "They can not be solved without intimate knowledge of the underlying causes of social distress," Dr. Copeland said. "Government, like a wonderful mother, must devise ways and means to guard her children, the citizens of the country."

The Senator stated that the physician visited the homes of the poor and had opportunity to see the suffering that went on in the world and the lack of food and nourishment of the children. He said that it was the physician that heard the sad story of the mother and that in consequence, it was the physician who was stirred to serve for social justice.

The farmer and the doctor have talks and confide in each other. Senator Copeland asserted, and it is heard that he learns that the surplus grain can not be sold because of the lack of markets. He expressed the opinion that the doctor above all other persons recognized the fact that the buying power of the world must be guaranteed so that the American producer would have an outlet for his crops.

"I could go on indefinitely pointing out why the doctor is fitted for politics; but the medical man is devoted to his profession and hesitates to leave it to take on the larger work of helping to heal the ills of a nation."

"The doctor can point out the human reason why a coal strike is an unthinkable thing; why the transportation system, carrying the necessities of life must never be hampered, why the large banking and financial systems of the country must be aided so they can further the plans of a better community; and he can point out the effect of bad government upon the human welfare of our country."

BUDDY L. G. COOPER ENTERTAINS THE LEGIONNAIRES

State Commander Rod- man Asks Aid of the Legion in Americaniz- ing Foreigners

A beautiful afternoon, an enthusiastic gathering, more than enough of the best to eat and not too much speech-making made the fish-fry at Proctor Seine Beach, near Grimesland, yesterday afternoon, at which part of the First North Carolina District of the American Legion was guest of Buddy L. G. Cooper, an event to be long remembered.

The Posts from Beaufort County Farmville, and Bellhaven joined with Pitt County Post in the meeting.

Colonel Wiley C. Rodman, of Washington, State Commander of the Legion, made the principal address.

W. H. Rogers, post commander of Pitt County Post opened the meeting and welcomed the visiting posts, explaining that it had become a custom in Pitt County Post for various individual members to entertain the post from time to time and that on this occasion the post was the guest of L. G. Cooper.

In response Herbert Bonner, of Beaufort County Post spoke for the visitors and also described activities in which his post had interested themselves. These include the maintenance of a community house with a rest room and facilities for out of town visitors, particularly for ladies from the county.

This was followed by a short talk by past-commander of Pitt County Post, J. H. Waldrop, urging all ex-service men who were not already members to avail themselves of their privileges not only because of advantages to themselves but because of their duty to their buddies, able or disabled.

Next—CHOW—lots of it and awfully good.

State Commander of the Legion, Colonel Wiley C. Rodman, was next introduced and spoke of the duty of the legionnaire to his disabled comrade, who needed help now as he had never needed it before.

He sketched the various legislative accomplishments of the Legion in the matter of relief and other bills that had been either sponsored or supported by them, and emphasized the sacred duty to God and Country that had been the underlying motive of the legionnaires original service and that now demanded his service again in defending that country against the foreigner at the gates or already in the country who has not an appreciation of what Americanization and American ideals mean. He lauded the man of foreign birth who really assimilates these ideals but warned against the man who transplants "red" and "bolshie" ideas and doctrines from his former country. He wound up with an urge to every man eligible to the legion to make himself one with it.

Thanks were then voted the host for the entertainment he had given the Post, to which Mr. Cooper responded with a short talk.

Burris Will Fight Barnbrook Thurs.

Fort Brag, April 16.—Boxing fans of North Carolina will watch with interest the result of the main bout to be staged here Thursday, April 17, when a Tar Heel pugilist will tackle the best welterweight boxer in the United States Army. Ken Burris, of Wilmington, is to go ten rounds with Eddie Barnbrook, of Camp Holabird. Burris is well known throughout the state. It was said and has a record which includes wins over such good men as Cole Miller, Battling Budd, Bobby Woods, Chick Branch, and Jack White.

Barnbrook has won 26 bouts in the last two years of which 23 were by knockouts, army officials say. He is considered by some sport writers of the North, it was stated, as a possible contender for the welterweight championship, which is now held by Micky Walker, of Elizabeth City New Jersey.

In the semi-wind up Bobby Mariotti, middleweight champion of the army will meet Sailor Ritchie of Hampton Roads. There will be three preliminary bouts.

FORBES INDICTED FOR SALE OF ARMY STORES

Former Head of Veter- ans' Bureau Charged With Selling \$3,000- 000 Worth for \$600,000

Washington, April 16.—Charles Forbes, former chief of the Veterans Bureau was indicted today by a federal grand jury here today at the close of investigation into the sale of Army supplies alleged to be worth \$3,000,000 to Thompson-Kelly Co., of New York and Boston, for a price said to be \$600,000.

Henderson Bank Is Closed by Examiner

Henderson, April 16.—The Farmers and Merchants Bank failed to open its doors this morning. A statement on the door of the bank, signed by Clarence Latham, state bank examiner, stated that the bank was in the hands of the Corporation Commission.

"Gradual withdrawal of deposits faster than the bank could realize on loans made it necessary for the bank to suspend," said Mr. Latham.

Depositors will probably be paid in full.

WEEKLY WEATHER AND CROP REPORT

Washington, April 16.—Preparation of cotton land advanced actively over the northern portion of the belt, though heavy rains interfered with field working in some central and eastern districts. Planting cotton begun in scattered places in Southern Oklahoma, most sections of Arkansas, parts of Tennessee and on coastal plains in North Carolina.

Germination retarded in Louisiana, while heavy rains unfavorable for germination in parts of the Southeast. Condition of early planted cotton in Texas rather poor to only fair, and stands fairly good.

Plead Unwritten Law, Draws Long Sentence

Raleigh, April 16.—Florence Gatliff, slayer of his wife and a former business associate Owen Stevens, today began a 33 year sentence in the state penitentiary, imposed late yesterday afternoon, by Judge Henry Grady in Superior court.

The sentence followed a five hour hearing of Gatliff's defense, in which he pleaded nolo contendere in regard to the slaying of his wife and guilty of the slaying of Stevens. He pleaded unwritten law and justification of his killing of Stevens, alleging that he found Stevens in a compromising situation with regard to Mrs. Gatliff.

Club Endorses Wilson Policies

New York, April 16.—A movement has been lost by the Democrats who were close to President Wilson "to fasten the Woodrow Wilson traditions on the party" at the forthcoming national convention.

At a banquet of the Woodrow Wilson Democratic Club it was resolved to maintain headquarters during the convention here and to incite action in other cities to urge the insertion of a plank in the Democratic platform declaring for American participation in the League of Nations, with or without reservations.

CONVENTION WILL OPEN THURSDAY IN STATE CAPITAL

No Fight Expected— Delegates at Large to Be Chosen and Plat- form Formed

Raleigh, April 16.—In what promises to be a rather tame session the state democratic convention will meet here tomorrow to name four delegates at large to attend the National Democratic convention and frame the party platform.

What was expected to be a rather hot convention has been toned down considerably by the filing in the primary last week of the name of William Gibbs McAdoo as a presidential aspirant.

A bitter fight for the endorsement of the convention and the pledges of its delegates for their favorites had been looked for from the supporters of Josephus Daniels, Oscar Underwood and McAdoo's filing will automatically bind the delegates, under state law, to vote for the selection of the primary at the national convention.

It was believed, however, that the convention tomorrow night will go on record as favoring some party candidate, although this will have no effect on their actions in New York.

The convention will open promptly at noon.

W. N. Everett, secretary of state will make the key-note speech and former lieutenant governor O. Max Gardner will probably be permanent chairman.

The four delegates to the National convention, to be chosen at large from the State by the convention may be stretched to eight. A number of names have been suggested. They include Senators Simmons and Overman, Governor Cameron Morrison, Josephus Daniels, O. Max Gardner, Mrs. J. G. Fearning of Elizabeth City; Miss May Jones, of Asheville, private secretary to Governor Craig, and John Dawson, State Chairman.

Questions of endorsement of Josephus Daniels as a suitable nominee for the Democratic presidential choice, will undoubtedly come before the convention. Many counties, in the county conventions held over the State last Saturday, endorsed the former Secretary of the Navy. A. M. Scales, of Greensboro, in a warm statement, has urged such action upon the convention, and leaders in the party generally, including R. A. Doughton, commissioner or Revenue, and member of the executive committee of the Raleigh Daniels-for-President club, have indicated that such action should be taken.

Germany Postpones Her General Election

London, Eng., April 16.—German elections are postponed from May 4 to May 11th, says a Reuter Dispatch from Berlin today. This is considered favorable as its object is that the French elections should not be influenced as they would be if the elections were held on date originally fixed. French elections are set for May 11th.

Army Plane Searches For Destroyers and Lost Steamers

Cordova, Alaska, April 16.—Fred L. Martin, commander of the U. S. Army flight squadron left Seaward, Alaska, yesterday morning in an air plane to search in the vicinity of Kialjivik Bay, northeast of Chignik on the southwest tip of Kodiak Island for the U. S. Destroyers Corry and Hull and the steamship Starr.

Ditch in Third Street Improved With Tile

Terra-cotta pipe or drain tile has been installed in the open ditch along west Third street to get rid of standing water which has made this a prolific breeding place for mosquitoes.

The work has been done as a result of the activity of City Manager Lanier, Mayor Clark and G. A. Clark, chairman of the street committee. It is thought this improvement will do much to reduce the chances of malaria in this section of the city. It will also prove a saving to the city in paying the necessity for treatment with crude oil as has been done until now.

BURTON OPPOSES MUSCLE SHOALS BID OF FORD

MAIN ISSUES HID UNDER SCREEN

Says Proposal is With- out Precedent in Scope and Power

Washington, April 16.—At opening today of public hearings by the Senate Agriculture Committee on Muscle Shoals, Representative Burton Republican, of Ohio, issued a statement opposing the Ford bid.

Describing the Ford proposition as an "unprecedented monopoly" Burton declared he had never heard of a proposal in which the privileges granted to a corporation or individual was so free from restrictions, so broad and comprehensive and so in the interest of the grantee as the so-called Ford bid.

The main issues, he went on to say, are completely masked behind the smoke screen of "doing something for the farmer."

A certain trade journal that recently came to our attention seemed to have adopted the above as a sort of slogan, as this phrase was played on throughout its pages in a number of variations.

Of course it referred to advertising, the particular product and service that the journal represented but it is applicable with even more force in regard to your attitude toward your town and your county and your state.

Do you believe in Greenville? Do you believe in Pitt County? Or in Carolina? Then you'll want to sell all three to every good fellow you meet, and to sell 'em you'll have to tell 'em—and tell 'em—and tell 'em.

THE PHYSICIAN IN PUBLIC LIFE

In an address that was the feature of the public meeting that was held last night as part of the Seventy-first Annual Convention of the North Carolina Medical Society, Dr. Royal S. Copeland, who is United States Senator from New York and who has attained sufficient national prominence to be spoken of as a presidential possibility, laid great stress on the value and desirability of the doctor in public life, particularly as a member of a law-making body.

He went on to particularize the many and varied contacts that the profession of physician have with life as it is necessarily lived, and with the woes produced by economic maladjustment, and compared the intimacy of the insight thus gained with the more or less abstract knowledge of such things to be had by men of other professions.

All of which is very true as far as it goes. But is the physician the only man in a

position to have this information? Able law-makers have been drawn from almost any walk in life that can be named and from every profession and trade.

Given average intelligence and a certain ability of political accomplishment any man who has a genuine desire to serve his fellow-man will make good laws.

PROGRESS

It is very gratifying to note the stability and permanence of construction progress in the southern states during the past five years, when all previous records for total building have been shattered and new high figures have been piled on top of each other year after year.

The most impressive conclusion drawn from a comparison of the south's program with that of the rest of the country is that the south is maintaining a much more consistent building movement than other sections. While volume for the country as a whole fluctuates violently both above and below normal building in the south has been much more even and uniform.

Coming out of the inactivity of war years, the country at large entered upon a sudden building spurt in 1919, which carried its totals as much as fifty per cent above normal. The south approached its building problems less violently during this period, reaching normal in August, 1919, and maintaining this position until October, 1920, several months after other sections had swung down to sixty per cent of normal. When the southern volume of building broke under the stress of business conditions, it did not drop so low as the rest of the country and was back to one hundred per cent as soon.

One reason ascribed for the greater stability of southern building is that conditions affecting the building trades is much less liable to disturbance than in other sections. Material prices have been steadier, and the abnormal wage situation which has had such a disastrous effect upon much of the northern construction during the past year have not been duplicated further south.

Another and equally important reason is that the upward movement of southern progress in many lines and the ever increasing pressure of expanding business and industry have made a consistent volume of new construction, averaging well above normal, imperative during the last two years especially. The opening up of great stretches of undeveloped territory and industrial possibilities, on a large scale, the astounding growth of the winter tourist business, the greater investing capacity of the south are all responsible for the present basis.

Voicing the suspicion of dirt farmers of the Northwest, the Pomona Grange of Idaho has charged that Federal aid, intended for farmers in that section in the hard times of 1921, chiefly benefited banks and large cattlemen, including U. S. Senators Frank R. Gooding, of Idaho, and Robert N. Stanfield, of Oregon. Beginning as a messenger boy on the Erie, Patrick Edward Crowley, vice-president of the New York Central Railroad, has been elected president, succeeding the late A. H. Smith, who was killed by a fall from his horse in New York City. Francis J. Heney, famous California graft investigator, has been retained to assist the Senate committee investigating the Internal Revenue Bureau.

Albino Deer Not So Rare.
Weaverville, Cal.—The recent report of a white or albino deer, seen near here, has brought statements from sportsmen that albino deer were not so rare as people generally believe.
Indians on the Hopa reservation have a considerable accumulation of white deer skins. They pay large sums to acquire these skins for use as ceremonial robes. This is said to have provided an unfortunate incentive for the destruction of the unusual deer in this region of northern California.

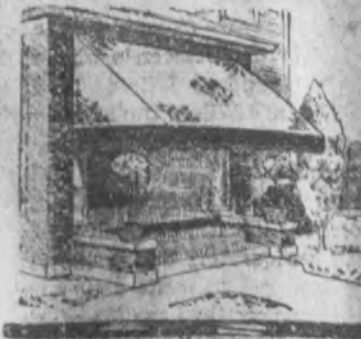

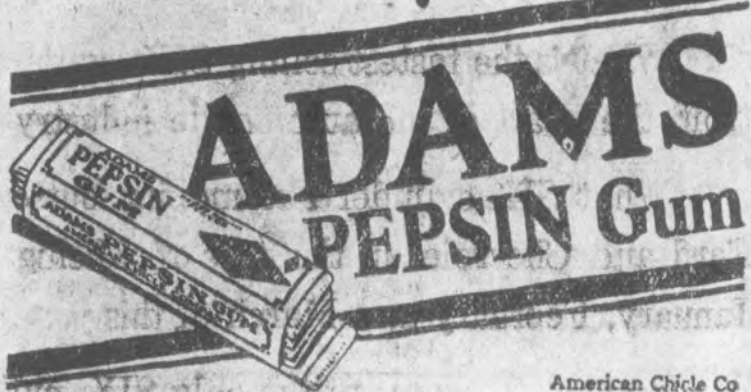

Tales of Dixie Land Revived By Passing of Celebrated Bank

New Orleans, April—The passing of a famous southern banking institution, through consolidation, has drawn attention again to the origin of the term "Dixie" as applied to the southland. The claim that the word came from the name of a man who once lived in New York seems to be set at rest by the records of this institution, the Citizens Bank and Trust Company, which has been merged, after 91 years of continuous operation, with the Canal Commercial Trust and Savings Bank.

Some authorities have attributed "Dixie" to the name of one Dixie, a large landholder and kind-hearted slave owner who resided on Manhattan Island during the latter part of the eighteenth century, but in New Orleans they take no stock in such a story and point to old chronicles of the Mississippi Valley, and to the records of the bank, to disprove it.

In the thirties America was flooded with "wild-cat" money, and counterfeiting was so common that suspicion became fixed on almost all paper mon-

ey. Through it all, however, the bank notes of the Citizens, commanded the respect of the whole of the Mississippi Valley and the remainder of the country as well. In the days before the Civil War the Citizens' notes were printed in French as well as English. The most common denomination was the ten dollar note, and it bore the Roman numeral "X" and the Arabic numerals "10." But, also, in the middle of the back was printed the French word "Dix" amidst other lettering in French.

The Mississippi River then was the great highway of traffic between New Orleans and the north and, in the argot of the river, when a man was headed down south into Louisiana on a trading expedition he was going to "come back with a pocket full of Dixies." From "Dixies" to "Dixie" was an easy step. And the south, particularly Louisiana, became known as the "land of Dixies," or, more briefly, as "Dixie Land."

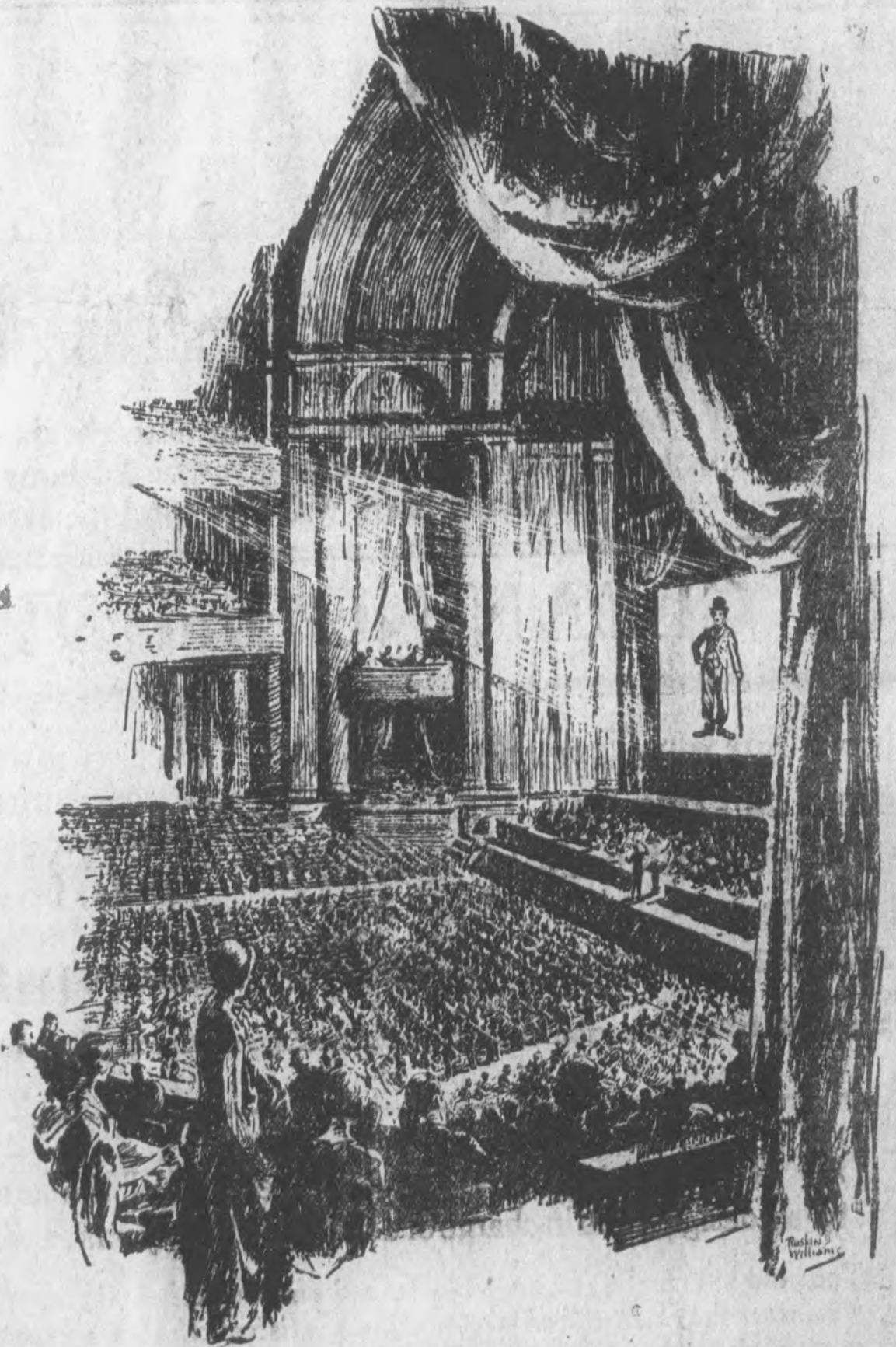

COTTON LETTER

R. J. McCarley and Co.
New Orleans, April 16.—The trend of values was to higher levels today as result of unfavorable weather progress in the interior, the continuance of free exports from the United States and improved European reports on reparations and forecast for continued unsettled weather in Eastern and Central Belts with possibility of frost in Oklahoma, where warm weather is needed.

Compared with last year, exports from the United States since August total 4,691,000 bales against 4,012,000 to even date last year or 48,000 bales larger already this season than they were for the whole of last season.

That exports from U. S. are to continue free is indicated by the fact that there is twice as much cotton on shipboard here for export than there was on this date last year, 32,000 against 16,000 and there is three times as much on shipboard at Cal-

veston today than on even date one year ago 35,000 against 11,000 and New York has begun to ship out of its stock therefore prospects are that exports during the last half of April will be comparatively large.

It is becoming increasingly difficult to buy cotton in quantity in the south even at the ports owing to the scarcity of the staple especially of desirable grades and any demand of consequence would likely be reflected in a higher market, particularly if climatic conditions remain unfavorable. H. & B. BEER.

Raleigh, April 16.—The employment situation throughout the state is improving and the prospects are very good for those seeking work as well as those seeking workers, except in the case of the employer who is desirous of farm laborers, accord-

ing to the weekly report of M. L. Shuman, director of the State-Federal Employment service. The various employment stations of the Service over the state report, as a whole, a shortage of unskilled labor with other lines running fairly equal to applicants and requests.

lines running fairly equal to applicants and requests. All stations reported that it was hard to procure farm labor. At Greensboro, it was reported that the bad weather the week just ended had affected the labor situation considerably but that good weather would bring a bright outlook for conditions. During the week ended April 12, according to the report, there were 550 requests for help, 695 being for men and 140 for women, while there were 619 applicants of which 514 were men and 105 were women. The department referred 562 men and 162 women, a total of 724 and succeeded in placing 521 men and 117 women, a total of 638.

Winston-Salem went from second place which it held last week and 122 placements to first place this week with 145 placements. Of these 130 were men and 15 were women. Wilmington was second with 115 placements, of which the men numbered 101 and the women 14. Charlotte made a close third with 115 placements, locating 87 men and 28 women. This was the highest number of women placed in the state.

Charlotte placed 88 men and 14 women, a total of 102. Greensboro and Raleigh placed 83 and 79 persons respectively, the former locating 60 men and 23 women while the latter located 55 men and 24 women.

According to the report the classification of placements follows: Unskilled, 466; skilled, 50; domestic, 41; clerical and professional, 30; and industrial, 3.
