'HE THAT LOSES LIFE WILL GAIN IT' SUBJECT SERMON LAST NIGHT

Evangelist Ham Tells of the Three Temptations of Christ by the Devil; Many Timely Facts Brought Out Showing That the Devil is Always Busy Trying to Tempt People—Subject Tonight Will Be 'Worldliness'

The third service of the great Evangelistic Campaign which is being conducted in the Brick Tabernacle by the Ram-Ramsey party was attended by a large crowd last night and Mr. Ham preached a strong and forceful sermon on the three temptations to which the Devil subjected Jesus Christ.

Prior to the sermon Mr. Ham sang, "Some Day, It Won't Be Long." The choir also rendered several selections being led by Mr. Rogers, the pianist, who is leading the singing in the absence of Mr. Ramsey who is expected to arrive during this week.

In developing his sermon Mr. Ramsey told how since the beginning of time the devil has tempted man. Neglect of the word of God leads to every trouble of today. Departure from the word of God caused the first man to die. The devil first tempted Jesus by telling him to turn the stones into bread. Mr. Ham then told of Jesus' answer when he said that man can not live by bread alone but by every word of God. Sometimes God uses the most humble people to serve his purpose. He led the children into the wilderness and allowed them to face starvation so he could teach them that man was dependent on Jehovah and not bread alone. We have been given the moral law, (the ten commandments), the law of the Kingdom, the law of the Christian but if we do anything against the will of God, we sin. The Christian who is trying to live like Jesus is a fanatic. Man can only live as Jesus lives through him. Jesus has an infinite number of lives to live through each of his children. And Jesus after he had fasted for forty days and was afterward hungered, was tempted by the devil who said unto him, "If thou be the son of God, command this stone that it be made bread." And Jesus won his victory over the devil when he said, "It is written, That man shall not live by bread alone but by every word of God."

And the devil, taking him up into an high mountain, shewed unto him all the kingdoms of the world in a moment of time. And the devil said unto him, "All this power will I give thee, and the glory of them: for that is delivered unto me if thou wilt worship me." God overrules the world but the devil rules the world declared Mr. Ham. God gives every man a chance to choose between the devil and God. If man desires to live in pomp and fine things forgetting God and following worldly things that is his privilege. If man wants to live apart from the world and live a Christian life then that is his privilege. The devil is always working to make man worship him. Mr. Ham further stated that he wasn't going to try to make any man give up his sins, he is only going to give him the great Bible truths and he can choose between the straight and narrow way that leads to everlasting life or he can choose the broad way that leads to destruction. And Jesus said "Get thee behind me, Satan; for it is written, Thou shalt worship the Lord thy God, and him only shalt thou serve."

The evangelist appealed to his large audience to beware of compromises and of wanting the beauties of life for whosoever shall save his life will lose the next life. The only way for a sinner to retrace his steps is by the way of the cross. Man can't follow Jesus if he attempts to save self. Material things will never give happiness. The Satan was responsible for the cross, he was instrumental in having Jesus crucified and then when he begged him to save self, Jesus gave the devil a crushing blow when he refused to obey him. Jesus made a sacrifice and saved others. Eve saved self and in so doing lost self. Obedience to God crushes the devil.

And he brought him to Jerusalem and set him on a pinnacle of the temple and said unto him, "If thou be the Son of God, cast thyself down. Mr. Ham then enumerated the things that man will do to convince people

RUMORED JAPAN WILL WITHDRAW AMBASSADOR

Tokio Newspaper Declares Foreign Minister Will Also Resign

Tokio, Japan, April 17.—Ambassador Hanihara at Washington is to be recalled by the Japanese government the newspaper Yomiuri declared today.

The publication added that the foreign minister Matsui will resign in order to appease the storm that is expected at the coming session of the Imperial Diet over immigration problems.

Both reports are officially denied.

Representative Stout Called As Witness In Wheeler Trial

Washington, April 17.—Former Representative Thomas Stout of Montana was called today as the first witness before the special senate investigating committee who are investigating the indictment of Senator B. K. Wheeler, special prosecutor of the committee investigating Former Attorney General Daugherty's administration of the Department of Justice.

Stout testified that he had been the editor and publisher of the Daily News of Lewiston for 19 years and had known Senator Wheeler "quite intimately" for a number of years.

He also said that he had talked with Gordon Campbell in December 1922 about Campbell employing Senator Wheeler.

Campbell did not know Senator Wheeler and he (Stout) had volunteered to see the Senator about his being retained by Campbell in a receivership matter in a state court.

Wheeler advised him that he could not represent Campbell except before a state court.

Stout said that he had no further connection with the matter but knew that Senator Wheeler had appeared for Campbell.

Texas Governor Fights for Uninstructed Delegates to Convention

Dallas, Tex., April 17.—Governor Pat M. Neff continued his campaign in Texas for an uninstructed delegation to the National Democratic convention in New York.

"The chaotic condition of politics at the present time," said Governor Neff, "makes it undesirable to tie Texas to any one candidate. The candidate selected today may be under indictment tomorrow—such is the uncertainty of this investigation age."

Governor Neff insists that he has nothing personal against either McAdoo or Underwood but believes that the delegates should go to the convention uninstructed.

Postoffice Bandits Escape With \$50,000

St. Paul, Minn., April 17.—\$50,000 in currency was included in the loot obtained by three bandits who held up two postoffice employees in south St. Paul today and escaped with five pouches which contained a large quantity of registered mail.

Anglo-Russian Parley Will Probably Affect American Attitude

Washington, April 17.—Progress of the Anglo-Russian negotiations in London over the question of recognition of the Soviet Government by the British Empire is being watched with great interest by the United States, it was disclosed today in high Administration circles. The terms upon which Great Britain would consider the recognition of Soviet Russia, it was explained, are very similar to the principles laid down by this country as the basis for a more friendly attitude toward the Soviet.

Great Britain is demanding the recognition of property rights and the liquidation of British claims by the Soviet which it is felt is directly in line with American ideas of what would constitute pledges of Russian good faith. The outcome of the negotiations with the British, it was stated, will indicate whether Russia has changed her attitude toward the economic principles regarded by this country essential to the establishment of a basis for international contact.

The Anglo-Russian conference today resulted in little progress being made, although only minor political problems were discussed. All the old treaties between the Czarist regime and Great Britain were resurrected, laid upon the conference table and then handed over to a sub-committee for preliminary examination.

Prime Minister MacDonald presided at the opening session. Later Arthur Ponsonby, Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs, took the chair,

Jap Exclusion Act "Spits in Our Faces"

Tokio, Japan, April 17.—"If the Japanese exclusion clause is included in the immigration bill and enacted into law, we Japanese will feel that the Americans have spat in our faces," declared Sadatsuchi Uchida, former Ambassador from Japan to Turkey at a luncheon of the Pan Pacific Club here today.

Another speaker, an eminent financier, said "The action of Congress had tempted him to revert to the Americanophobia of his youth." In explanation he recalled the wave of anti-foreign sentiment which swept Japan seventy years ago on the occasion of Commodore Peary's visit.

Shipman Announces His Candidacy

Raleigh, April 17.—M. L. Shipman, Commissioner Labor and Printing, tonight made formal announcement of his candidacy for re-election. In his announcement Mr. Shipman outlined the work of the department under his administration; explained the increased duties of the office since his occupancy; and pointed to the economic management of the office as his first duty, according to his state-

The man, who says that he is 19 years old, was arrested by the police in the railroad yards when he was found riding on the "blind-baggage" of a train. He was dressed in striped overalls, which gave him the appearance of an employee of the railroad. His position on the train however betrayed him and he was immediately placed under arrest.

He is said to have confessed that he was a deserter from the U. S. Ship Wyoming.

STATE DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION OPENED TODAY IN RALEIGH

Raleigh, April 17.—With the big auditorium crowded with delegates the State Democratic Convention settled down to business and, after the reading of reports Chairman Dawson presented the temporary chairman and the keynote speaker, Secretary of State W. N. Everett.

Late in getting underway, the Democratic state convention was called to order by State Chairman J. G. Dawson at 12:25 today, with an invocation by Rev. W. A. Stansbury.

The city auditorium was packed with delegates long before the opening and as each Democratic leader entered the auditorium and was recognized he was greeted with lusty cheering.

After the opening the first business was reading of reports of the district conventions by Mark Squires, secretary of the convention.

National Democratic convention in New York will name the next Chief Magistrate of the United States, declared Secretary of State W. N. Everett, speaking before the Democratic State Convention here today. Secretary Everett delivered a thirty page prepared address in which he outlined and compared the successful and constructive policies and administration of Woodrow Wilson with that of his successor. He related how the government had been run for the people while the Democratic administration was in power and called scorn upon the "corrupt and malicious" practices in government for "the favored few" by the Republicans now in power.

The part that North Carolina played in national governmental affairs during the last Democratic administration was pointed to and the destinies of the State under her own policies were prophesied. A constructive plan for the economic development of the state and its resources was submitted by Mr. Everett, as well as detail matter of finance and revenue.

In sounding the "keynote" of the convention, Mr. Everett said, "All signs point victory in November—not merely for success to the immortal party to which we belong, but a verdict for return to our government from the hands of Privileges and Corruption; The record of the national administration has shamed the American people and they will go to the polls this fall and punish the party whose selected agents have prostituted it to selfish and base needs."

"Teapot Dome," he said, "has loomed large in recent events. It was due to a North Carolinian, Josephus Daniels, then Secretary of the Navy, that this increase in the Naval oil reserves was provided and due to him that as long as he was in office these reserves were scarcely held 'for the exclusive use of the Navy.'"

Bringing his speech to a discussion of strictly state matters the Secretary of State declared that the people of North Carolina are bent upon building a great state on the basis of public education; public highways and public health.

"The people want better public schools and are willing to be taxed for them. The proof lies in the fact that they have been willing to vote county and city school bonds amounting to twenty million dollars during the last five years, and to borrow from the State Treasury another ten million."

"The people want better highways, they demand the best type of construction and are willing to pay the price. At present we are building five miles of improved highway every work-day of the week at an average cost of twenty million dollars a year. In addition the state is spending \$3,000,000 a year to care for her Confederate soldiers, the insane, the deaf, the blind, the crippled, the blind and the wayward boys and girls of both races."

"Such are the facts plainly and candidly stated. And I state then plainly and candidly because the voters of the state are entitled to know the status of the state in its public finances. I do so in full confidence that the people of North Carolina will rise to the occasion with fervor that patriotism prompts and loyalty demands—not loyalty to party but loyalty to the Commonwealth."

"The way out concerns plans and policies to increase the powers of the state to produce greater wealth, (2) to solve our market problems both state and interstate, and thereby retain a larger share of the wealth that we create, (3) if possible to find new sources of tax revenue, to distribute the burdens of the state

taxation with due regard to mental equities, and leave undisturbed the owners of general property and the exemptions of small property owners and income.

"The state must be started on a reforestation policy; greater emphasis laid on industrial education; county agents used to lead in co-operative commodity enterprises and find advantageous markets; develop a food industries; develop pottery industries, and establish cotton and tobacco production on a bread and meat basis."

The further plan is the authentication and installation of the machinery of an operative executive system and stressing the importance of such a system in the county house offices, and a business administration of a governor with great vision.

"Securing freight rates that put our farmers and manufacturers and merchants upon a common parity with our sister states is necessary to pursue this purpose. The ends recommended so ably by shipping commission."

"To lay no ad valorem tax on general property for state purposes to increase no tax burdens upon property owners or income earners who are already over-burdened to lay before the legislature in early a plan to increase our state fund from \$10,000,000 in 1923 to 15 million in 1925-27."

"I am submitting this candidament to you because like Clara Poe, I believe in North Carolina her limitless potentialities, in glory of her destiny: I believe whatever of good or beauty or nobleness men in any other land have wrought, we, men and women of North Carolina today and tomorrow, in the Providence of God, and now achieve."

Important Conference On Lumber Standards

Important Virginia and North Carolina lumber organizations have invited to take part in a conference of the industry on April 22 in Division of Simplified Practice, Department of Commerce.

The purpose of the meeting is to consider recommendations made by the Central and Consulting Comtees on Lumber Standards which spent the last few months in an intensive study of such problems as grade marking, specific grading rules, short and odd lengths, and rough dimensions.

E. A. Frink, of Norfolk, Va., the Seaboard Air Line is a representative of the railroad group in Consulting Committee.

Organizations invited include North Carolina Pine Association, headquarters at Norfolk, the National Council of Furniture Association, the Southern Furniture Manufacturers Association, with offices in High Point, N. C., and the Air Dried North Carolina Pine Club, with headquarters in Raleigh.

"Secretary Hoover directs," writes William A. Durgin, chief of Division of Simplified Practice, "request your association to send or more delegates officially authorized to present the association's views and to pledge your earnest cooperation in those measures which majority of the conference decide to the best good of the industry, to the lasting benefit to the nation."

The undertaking represents the biggest step forward since Mr. Hoover, soon after becoming Secretary of Commerce, organized the movement to eliminate waste in industry; the successful development of a program will be of far reaching importance to American industry.

Suicide Caused By Jazz Spirit of Times

New York, April 17.—Placing deaths by suicide in the United States last year as between fifteen and sixteen thousand, Dr. Harry Warren, president of the Save-a-Life League, attributed the large number to the jazz spirit of the times and to the failure of parents and teachers to impress upon children the sanctity of human life.

Statistics gathered by the league show that there were among the cases of suicide during the past year: 6 physicians, 48 lawyers and judges, 14 ministers, 64 bankers, 72 brokers, 43 actors, 26 editors and writers, and 110 presidents and owners of large business concerns.

REPEL THE INVASION

Congress is about to vote finally on a bill to protect the United States from submersion by hordes of foreigners.

There need be no misunderstanding of the average physical, mental, and moral efficiency of the immigrants who are arriving today contributes today directly to the lowering of the American physical, mental, and moral standards.

The introduction of these people in vast numbers for the past twenty years has appallingly increased the perplexities of the national government and of American society. So long as the old American element and people of strains were in a large majority, they were able to absorb limited numbers of the newcomers. Today these stable elements, custodians of the principles of democracy, strength and cleanliness upon which this country was founded, find themselves close upon the borderline of minority. In fact in certain sections of the country they are already in minority.

Americans must and will protect themselves and their doing so will be not only in their own interest but equally in the interest of the immigrant who comes to them because of what America and American ideal, as they have been maintained, hold out to him.

This is not in prejudice against the Latin people, against the Slav nor against the Jew here was never any prejudice against any of these until they came in unassimilable numbers and horded in 'quarters' and 'ghettos' in an insoluble mass that it was impossible to digest.

A TRIBUTE TO SCIENCE

When you buy a furnace and have to worry about getting your coal you realize how necessary the coal industry is to your comfort. When you buy a car you are apt to take it for granted that there will be gasoline everywhere and give little thought to the oil industry which has had to put it there. That is because the industry has been so efficiently organized that you have never had any difficulty getting "gas."

A recent issue of Oil and Gas Journal, from which these notes are taken, points out that despite the handicaps of an unknown and uncertain supply of raw material, crude oil, the production of which is only three times what it was in 1913, gasoline is being served regularly to nearly twelve times as many motor vehicles.

Six times as much gasoline is being manufactured. In other words, improved processes are getting twice as much gasoline per gallon. Improvements in motors and carburetors, imports of gasoline, etc., are making our gasoline supply go farther. In spite of the tremendous extra demands which were made by the armies in Europe, the oil industry always managed somehow to keep enough gasoline at the filling stations to supply all comers.

Without the improved methods of drilling, the invention and perfection of drilling equipment, new processes for the greater extraction of refined products from the crude and improvements in all the departments of producing, refining and marketing of petroleum, the manufacture and use of motor vehicles would before now have been checked by lack of fuel.

The achievement of keeping up with this enormous growth in demand and yet selling highly refined gasoline at around 3 1/2 cents per pound today as against 8 cents for bread or 10 cents for sugar is one on which the chemists of the oil industry are to be congratulated.

WHY MAKE FORD A PRESENT?

Commenting on the Muscle Shoals situation, the Mining Congress Journal says that this property should be given to no individual or corporation for \$5,000,000 when the scrap value of the property is worth at least \$11,000,000, and that to lease Muscle Shoals under any other terms or conditions than those of the Federal Water Act, which governs the distribution of power, would be unfair to those now operating under its provisions elsewhere.

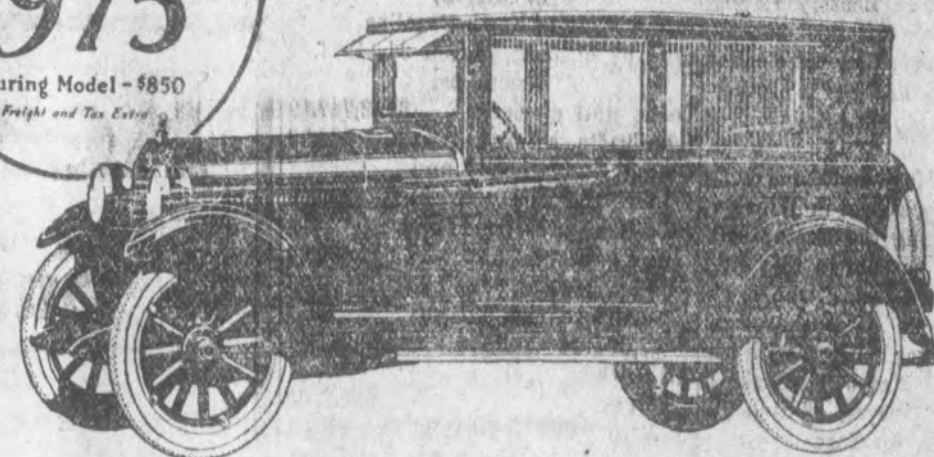

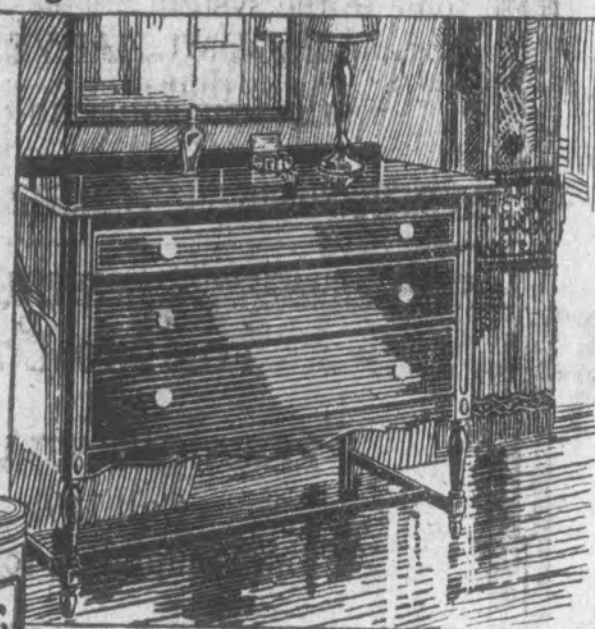

WILD CARIBOU MEETING WITH REINDEER IN ALASKA

Cantwell, Alaska.—Wild caribou bulls are invading the reindeer herds of Broad Pass, and the results are beginning to manifest themselves in the number of long-legged, long-necked calves grazing in the herds. Aside from these traits, together with the solid color of the caribou, there is little difference between pure-blooded domesticated reindeer and the caribou.

It is believed that eventually the reindeer will be taught to eat grain, and thus become a better beast of burden. In experiments reindeer have been taught to eat oats, but they still demand moss as a roughage. It is hoped gradually to accustom the animal to other forage until it will accept other roughage, and therefore be able to travel long distance. At present a reindeer is good for but five days as a sled animal. After that it must be released to recover its lost fat on moss.

Truck Crop Delayed
By the Cold Weather

State Agricultural Statistician Reports 10,000 Acres of Field Truck—Fruit Crop Outlook Good

Raleigh, April 16.—The truck crops of North Carolina are late on account of the cool and rainy weather of March, but at this date are in fairly good conditions, declared Frank Parker, State Agricultural Statistician. There was not the average of truck that might otherwise have been planted, he said. "However, the last month's cool weather did not materially damage, but only delayed the truck. In the farm census of 1923, made through the Tax Listers, there were reported for the state approximately 100,000 acres of field truck crops exclusive of sweet and Irish potatoes in North Carolina. The commercial acreage of truck on which car lot shipments are reported, amount to only a small part of this large acreage. This means that the farmers are putting into local markets a much larger quantity of truck than is generally recognized by the public. Truck crops have values of \$100 to \$1000 per acre, but if the average for the state is put at only \$100 per acre, the field truck crops for this state would have a total minimum of \$10,000,000. This state is increasing its acreage of truck.

"One of the most popular features of farming in North Carolina, at this time, is that of poultry. Through the poultry clubs of the state not only the boys and girls but the farmers themselves are learning how to cultivate for larger egg production. Many people do not realize that most of our hens are decidedly unprofitable and that it would cost very little more to be growing hens that produce eggs for long periods instead of those that furnish very few, yet have to eat 12 months in the year.

"The United States has just passed the peak in hog production. This corresponds to the low point in prices. If we think of this in wave curves, we have just passed the peak and are starting downward in production. The prices are in the trough and starting upward. To the man who thinks ahead, now is the time to grow hogs for sale next winter.

"The fruit crop outlook is good. The March and April cold periods

did not do much harm.

"In the Sand-Hill reach region, there is reported a 10 to 20 per cent loss, but in view of the abundant fruit buds, this may amount to only a thinning. It is going to be important for peach growers to thin the crops in order to get the size and quality. Spraying is necessary for color and quality, aside from the fact that it is a protection against curculio. The borers are responsible for the destruction of more fruit trees than all other agencies combined.

"It is one thing to grow but another thing to sell to advantage. The many hazards that the farmer contends with such as weather, insects, weed pest, diseases, accidents and such as well as nondependable labor make his business very trying. Many of them have the same capital invested that the business man does,

yet his income from the farm is not sufficient to afford the comforts of life, much less to enlarge the business interests and to provide the pleasures of higher education for the farm children such as their fellow townsmen have."

COTTON LETTER

New Orleans, April 17.—The continuance of unsatisfactory weather in the cotton region, especially to the east of the Mississippi river, large exports and encouraging reparations news were the sustaining features of market the past week and while climatic developments for the future are uncertain, prospects are for the continuance of free exports from the United States.

Considering the long holiday period, market ruled remarkably steady today, realizing having been absorbed in a satisfactory manner, denoting confidence in the near future of the market.

Indications are for clearing weather in the western half of the belt, but frost is predicted for the northern portion of the southwest and in west Tennessee and more rain is likely in the Eastern half of the belt. Inasmuch as the American cotton markets will be closed until next Monday, there is no telling the character of the weather that will be experienced at the opening of next week.

Latest advices from Paris are to effect that the reparation committee has decided to act on the Dawes report and to immediately refer same to the interested governments.

While it is possible for good weather to prevail for awhile there is no assurance of better weather lasting long enough to permit satisfactory progress in preparing for the next crop and there is the possibility of more bad weather instead.

The weather at this time of the year seldom becomes settled until after June first and there remains the danger of frost scares until after the first week in May, therefore so far as the weather is concerned, farmers are not out of the woods yet, and unless they are favored with better weather during the next two weeks they are apt to find themselves handicapped all the more in the month of May when rains are usually frequent and heavy, often torrential in localities.

Meanwhile cotton continues to leave this country on a scale which if continued would result in depleting stocks next summer, compared with last season exports from the United States since August first total 4,726,000 bales against 4,039,000 of which 80,000 were shipped thus far this

Remarkable Growth of Baptist Church in Southern States

Raleigh, April 17.—There were 195,864 white persons baptised in Baptist churches of the Southern States during the year 1923, according to Dr. C. E. Maddry, secretary of the North Carolina Mission Board with headquarters in this city, of which 17,887 were by Baptist churches of North Carolina.

These entries into the Baptist church by baptism bring the total white membership of that denomination in the Southern States to 3,494,189 and that of North Carolina to 337,447.

Other items given in the general summary of the formation concerning resources of Southern Baptists as a whole, include 983 district associations; 27,003 local churches; 19,580 ordained preachers; 20,601 Sunday schools; 13,249 Young People's Unions with a membership of 333,

991; 1,591 Woman's Missionary Union organizations; 19,411 houses of worship; and 2,910 pastors' homes. The valuation of local church property was estimated at \$127,121,099. Contributions by the churches for local objects, during 1923, it was shown amounted to \$25,045,189.09, and to missions and benevolences \$9,392,617.83, making the total contribution for the year to all objects, \$34,439,135.92.

Corresponding figures for the State of North Carolina show that within the state there are 65 district associations; 2,275 local churches; 1,300 ordained ministers; 2,171 Sunday schools with an enrollment of 274,405 members; 1,378 Young People's Unions whose memberships total 48,389; Woman's Missionary Union organizations number 2,237; homes 280.

Baptist church property in the state is given as \$13,067,423. During the year 1923 the Baptist churches of the state expended \$2,647,687.34 on local objects and contributions \$898,771.46 to all objects, of \$3,546,458.80.

HARRY THAW ON STAND TODAY IN OWN BEHALF Philadelphia, April 17.—Harry K. Thaw, flushed and confident, testified for a brief period in his own behalf in his insanity trial today, then his lawyer turned him over to the other side for cross-examination.

His counsel asked Thaw only five questions.
