

A NICKNAME TO GLORY IN

CalLED CHRISTIANS FIRST AT ANTIOCH

Evangelist Ham Defines Christian as One Who Gives Christ First Place in All His Dealings

9:30 A. M.—Sunday School in the various churches as usual.
11 A. M.—Preaching by the pastors as usual in the respective churches.
3:00 A. M.—Mass meeting at the Tabernacle for everybody—Subject "The Signs of the Times."
7:30 P. M.—Regular night service—Subject "Why I Believe There is a God; Why I Believe the Bible is His Book; Why I Believe Christ is His Son."

Despite the inclemency of the weather, Evangelist Ham spoke before the largest audience last night that has attended any of his meetings so far in Greenville.

In answer to his own question, "What is a Christian?" the evangelist, in his usual earnest and forceful manner held an interested audience through his analysis and answer to this question.

To sum up the evangelist's definition of Christian, would be to say, briefly; one who is intellectually, emotionally and volitionally wrapped up in Christ; one who gives the Christ first place in his life and dealings with his fellows; one who will suffer reproach for the sake of Christ and the religion he stood for.

To begin with the speaker searched out the origin of the word "Christian." It was, he said, first given to the Disciples—and by their enemies. It was a nickname; nothing more. It was not suggested by any creed or sect, as "Methodist," "Presbyterian" or any of the other many sects we know today, he asserted.

The Disciples had but one object, Christ, and for him and by him they lived every day. Their love for him, and for one another, came to identify them among their enemies; they were always speaking of Christ, and so it was "Christians" they were dubbed. And so, the preacher declared it was soon that the type of men were that won the name. "In short," he said, "these men were desperately in love with Christ."

"How many of you before me can lay claim to the name Christian," he continued. "How many of you place Christ first in your lives? Why many of the children in this city do not know their parents are Christians. Why? Because their lives do not exemplify the richness of love and loyalty that the word stands for."

Illustrating by Paul's example the third quality of the "Christian," Mr. Ham pointed to his so-called defense before Agrippa. "In all his speech," the evangelist said, "Paul did not once intercede for himself. It was for Christ that he made his stand. Self did not enter into his impassioned defense." And it was this willingness to suffer reproach for Christ that gave Paul the name of Christian.

A resume of the sermon follows: What is a Christian?
I am not sure I could answer that question by coming to your city and studying the lives of your church members," he continued.

"Nor could I find an example by selecting some of your church officers and I have even known preachers and evangelists who never were converted. And it is true that a large portion of the church membership in Greenville never will see God. It is sad but mighty true that there are hundreds of professed Christians that never have been converted."

"Being enthusiastic about your work and about your Christ are entirely different things. Often you find a preacher terribly enthusiastic about his new, successful church. You find the Sunday school superintendent obsessed with new plans and systems and you find many of the singers enthusiastic about the music. You are full of your works. He wants you to be filled with Christ. How few of your church members can sit down and discuss Christ. His made Him the subject of their talk, suffering, His death and His seconding and preaching, and in practice

coming.

In Acts 11:26 we have this statement: "And the disciples were called Christians first at Antioch."

The use of the word Christian gives us still another phase of the hallmarks of a Christian. In Peter 4:16 17 we have these words: "If any man suffer as a Christian, let him not be ashamed; but let him glorify God on his behalf. For the time is coming when judgment must begin at the house of God; and if it first begin at us, what shall the end be of them that obey not the gospel of God?"

"Then a Christian is one who suffers persecution for Christ's sake, and is able to glorify in it."

A Christian will not indulge in worldly amusements in the false hope of holding on to the young people and win them to Christ. It doesn't win them. The more amusement of that kind they get the more they want and the less of Christ. The appetite for liquor, grows with its indulgence. Your body grows on what you feed it; so does your spirit.

To sum it all up then, we conclude that Christian is:

First—One who loves Christ, serves Christ, reminds everybody of Christ because his entire being, intellectual, emotional and volitional is wrapped up in Him.

Second—A Christian is one who is so zealous for Christ that he subordinates his own interests to the glory of Christ, and at all times, and in all places and under all circumstances tries to win others to Christ.

Third—A Christian is one who suffers reproach for the sake of Christ and is so true and steadfast that Christ can rebuke the world through him.

From these scriptures it is plain that the term Christian was first applied to the disciples of Christ as a nickname. They didn't call themselves Christians. Now a nickname is aptly descriptive. Other names are not. Mr. Black is usually white, as is Mr. Green. But a man nicknamed Red is always correctly described by his nickname.

When we call a fellow Baldy we expect to see a baldheaded fellow.

GOVERNOR LIFTS EMBARGO AGAINST CALIFORNIA

Issues Emergency Permit to Relieve Suffering Tourists Held By Quarantine

Phoenix, Ariz., April 19.—Governor Hunt lifted the foot-and-mouth blockade at Yuma this morning in order to permit the passage into the state 800 motorists, reported to be in a pitiful condition as a result of being held on the California side of the border without camping equipment or sufficient food.

In a telegram to Dr. E. L. Stam in charge of the quarantine at Yuma, the Governor said that he thought it would be safer to have these people pass on through the state after thorough inspection and fumigation than to have them rush the guard.

Last night the vanguard of motorists from California, barred from entry under the embargo against vehicular traffic, swept past some of the guards on the Colorado river bridge, but retreated when a cordon was formed on the Yuma side and fire hose brought up to play streams of water on the mob.

No one was hurt in the rush. There was no shooting, guards having been disarmed as a measure to prevent bloodshed.

Quarantine was laid against California products and all traffic from that state to protect Arizona against the spread of the disease. The Governor of Nevada has similarly laid an embargo against California traffic and has taken steps to enforce it at the borders of that state.

modeled their lives after His. The scripture cited tells us they were zealous, loyal and faithful, liberal, compassionate and spiritual, for they were full of the Holy Ghost.

From this use of them then we are safe in answering the question of our text by saying a Christian is a lover of Christ, a follower of Christ, a faithful servant of Christ, and obedient, zealous and faithful and loyal in His duties as His disciples.

You did not have to ask those disciples if they were Christians. Their conduct showed it so plainly that outsiders nicknamed them Christians. And they didn't have a religion; they had a Christ. Just as I am married to a woman; not to a treatise on matrimony.

Be sure that unless the world recognizes from your life that you are a Christian, you are not entitled to the name. Too much of the zeal of present day church members is for their doctrines and the enterprises of their churches rather than for their Christ. For a Christian is not one who does certain special things; but one who does everything in a special way, a way to glorify his Christ.

Christianity was no mere doctrine with Paul; it was life. Whether assailed by a mob seeking his life in Jerusalem or in Ephesus or Athens or on a wrecked vessel at sea, or a prisoner chained to two guards in Rome, or standing before the judgment seat of the king, or in the jail at Philippi. Paul preached Christ to those within the sound of his voice.

U. S. MUST BEAR RESPONSIBILITY DECLARES JAPAN

Tokio Paper Urges Congress of Colored Races to Protect Interests

Tokio, Japan, April 19.—Editorials in the Japanese papers of this morning ranged from very conservative to the utmost in jingoism.

Midway between the extreme radical and the conservative expressions, one prominent paper declared, "America must bear the responsibility for virtually nullifying the four-power pact and for its hindrance to the growing tendency toward world peace."

Another journal said "It is a challenge, not only to Japan, but to all the colored races," and goes on to urge a congress of all the colored races to be held in Tokio "not necessarily with military aims but in order that they may afford themselves economic protection."

WARRANT SERVED ON SEN. WHEELER BY U. S. MARSHALL

Oil Committee Prosecutor Arrested for Montana Courts

Washington, April 19.—Senator Wheeler appeared before U. S. Commissioner McDonald here today and furnished bond for \$1000 for his appearance May 5th at Great Falls, Montana.

Washington, April 19.—B. K. Wheeler, Democratic Senator from Montana, and special prosecutor for the Senate oil investigating committee was notified by the United States marshal's office of the District of Columbia that it held a warrant for his arrest under the terms of the indictment recently returned against the senator in his home state.

The senator was asked to go through the formality of accepting service at his leisure and replied, it is said, that he might do so today. It was said that Senator Wheeler would not be required to put up bond for his appearance but would be permitted to give his own recognition.

ITALIANS PROTEST IMMIGRATION BILL

Claims Measure Unjust to Southern Europe

Rome, April 19.—The "Corriere d'Italia" one of the most responsible papers in Italy, declares editorially that the movement to reduce immigration to America is "the result of a crisis from which the whole world is suffering and which is being felt in America perhaps more than in many European countries."

After an analysis of the various bills that have been proposed it goes on to describe the legislation as "unjust, one-sided, and advantageous to the Anglo-Saxon, German and Scandinavian immigrant to the injury of Slavs and Italians and to the yellow and negro races."

These "curious national theories" it asserts are due to "a group of pure Anglo-Saxons and intransigent Americans mixed with puritanic, theosophic, vegetarian, and anti-alcoholic elements" and results in a hostility which it is hoped is more noisy than real.

This, the newspaper concludes, constitutes a grave problem which the Italians must combine to solve in their favor.

ATTERBURY WOULD MAKE LIGHT ALLOY AT MUSCLE SHOALS

SAME METAL USED IN GERMAN ZEPPELINS

Hugh MacRae of Wilmington Says Hooker-White-Atterbury Bid for Muscle Shoals Was Accepted He Planned to Produce an Alloy of Aluminum and Magnesium for the Manufacture of Railroad Cars

Washington, April 19.—W. W. Atterbury, vice president in charge of operation of the Pennsylvania railroad, told the Senate Agriculture Committee today that if the Hooker-White-Atterbury bid for Muscle Shoals was accepted he planned to produce an alloy of aluminum and magnesium for the manufacture of railroad cars.

He claims that with this strong light material, fifty percent heavier loads could be transported in freight cars and thirty percent more in passenger cars.

This material was used by the Germans in the construction of Zeppelins, he stated.

Hugh MacRae, of Wilmington, N. C., known throughout the South for his work in land reclamation and modern rural community development by means of diversified and intensive farming methods, told the Senate agriculture committee that the Hooker-White-Atterbury proposal for Muscle Shoals is better than the Alabama Power Company, or Mr. Ford's or any other proposition so far submitted for Muscle Shoals.

"The offer made by Messrs. Hooker, White, and Atterbury does not violate the waterpower policy which has been adopted after thorough consideration by Congress. It does not require the government to part with its title to any part of the property which it has constructed at such a great cost and now owns."

"It leaves to the government the advantage for which this great expenditure was made, namely, a going plant suitable for manufacturing vast supplies of nitrate for war purposes, if needed."

"It associates with the government three of the ablest and most experienced men in America, on an equitable basis of partnership, while establishing a wise and continuing policy of development of peace time industries for the utilization of a vast amount of power which would otherwise go to waste."

Jap Ambassador To Explain Phrase

Tokio, Japan, April 19.—Japanese Ambassador Hanihara, at Washington will shortly address a new note to Secretary Hughes in an effort to clarify the Japanese attitude toward American Immigration legislation and to expressly explain his use of the words "grave consequences" in his previous note, and to disclaim any intention or desire to interfere with American domestic affairs.

The new note, it is known here, has been authorized and it is said that instructions have been forwarded the ambassador.

It was also given out on high authority, that the recall of the ambassador from Washington had not been even seriously considered.

Eight Firemen Hurt In Incendiary Blaze

Chicago, April 19.—Samuel Moore and Lee Unell, owners of a sporting goods and novelty concern are in custody for questioning in connection with a fire in their place in which eight firemen and one civilian were more or less seriously injured.

Sam Polinski, who has had insurance dealings with Moore and Unell was declared by the police to have had insurance policies aggregating \$32,000 issued to them, in his possession.

He also was questioned and he and Adolph are being held as witnesses.

Dead Airdale Honored by Owners.

Long Beach, Cal.—When "Royal," an Airdale dog belonging to Dr. and Mrs. J. E. Stubbett, died at their home here, the body was taken to Los Gatos, 450 miles north, for burial. Dr. and Mrs. Stubbett explained that as the dog had been their companion for many years and had accompanied them on three European and Asiatic voyages, they wished to bury him on the ground where he had spent the greater part of his life.

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OF SUCH IS PROGRESS MADE

A HEAVY TOLL

Today 50 cents of the consumer's dollar is required to pay the cost of getting the finished product from the factory to the consumer. Transportation costs under the present methods are a heavy toll on business.

There is at the present time no adequate measure of markets; so a manufacturer in a certain community has no way of knowing how big an area he must cover to dispose of his output, and many times to get volume he extends his selling into remote areas, where the distribution cost for him is abnormally high. Information on all these points would benefit producer, distributor, and consumer.

AUTHORIZED INVASION

It is well within the facts to say that were it not for our present quota law there would be the greatest exodus of mankind from vari-

ous parts of Europe that has ever occurred in history.

Does that mean anything to the future welfare of this country? Let us reflect that this country was founded by immigrants who were pioneers, who left the homelands ready to face the dangers and endure the sacrifices incident to residence in the New World with the hope of building there a great nation dedicated to liberty and freedom.

They were the strong in their communities, the daring and the enterprising. They were attracted to come to these shores because of attracted to come to these shores because this new land existed as a challenge to their enterprise their initiative and their daring. The horde that now threatens us with its invasion actuated by the very reverse of that which brought the old-time immigrants here. To come to America, to hundreds of thousands of those people, means a way of escape from hard conditions into a land that is, in their opinion, flowing with milk and honey—rich with an easy reward.

We are therefore driven to the conclusion that immigration into this country must be drastically restricted.

We must not approach the question in a spirit of malice, bigotry, or with the desire to injure the people of any race. But with the sole desire to protect America, so far as we are able, maintain the standards and ideals which are the real basis of a free America.

Leading Player In
"The Rendezvous"

First Ambition of Noted Screen Star Was to Be An Architect.

All actors do not start out in life to be actors. Sometimes it is mere chance which throws them on the stage, or scene; sometimes determination; and sometimes influences.

Conrad Nagel, who plays the leading role in Marshall Neilan's Russian picture "The Rendezvous," coming to White's theatre on Monday for one day, started out to be an architect. Born in the small town of Keokuk, Iowa, on March 10, 1897, at the age of thirteen he had figured out the only profession in the world for him would be to design and construct buildings. He decided to start from the ground up and got a job of helping to lay bricks at \$1 per day during summer vacation.

No soon had the young, aspiring architect started his labors than the long arm of the Union reached out and demanded that he sign up as an apprentice. The embryo architect immediately resigned. His next position, was key clerk and telephone operator in a hotel. But the architectural urge took first hand again when Conrad enrolled in the Liberal Arts course in Highland Park College, Des Moines, Iowa.

Being possessed of a fine voice, inherited from his mother, a concert singer, and a keen interpretation of music from his father, Dr. Frank Nagel, noted pianist and composer, the young artist-architect was drafted into the ranks of the college Glee Club. Soon after college theatricals claimed him. Encouraged by his mother, young Nagel changed his course in his second year and graduated with the degree of Bachelor of Oratory.

Thereafter, he spent a season with the Redpath Lyceum Bureau as reader. Next he joined the Princess Stock Company in Des Moines where he enacted leading roles for a year, and from then on his services as an actor were in constant demand. He toured in vaudeville for a time; then appeared on the New York stage in "The Natural Law." This was followed by his memorable portrayal of "Youth" in "Experience," a leading part in "The Man Who Came Back," after which he played opposite Alice Brady in "Forever After." Romance entered his screen career when Ruth Helms, pretty representative of Photoplay, was sent to interview him. They were married in 1919. Little Ruth Helms Nagel now graces their household, and it is expected she will have inherited her mother's talent in singing. In February, 1923, Nagel signed a long-term contract with Goldwyn Pictures Corporation.

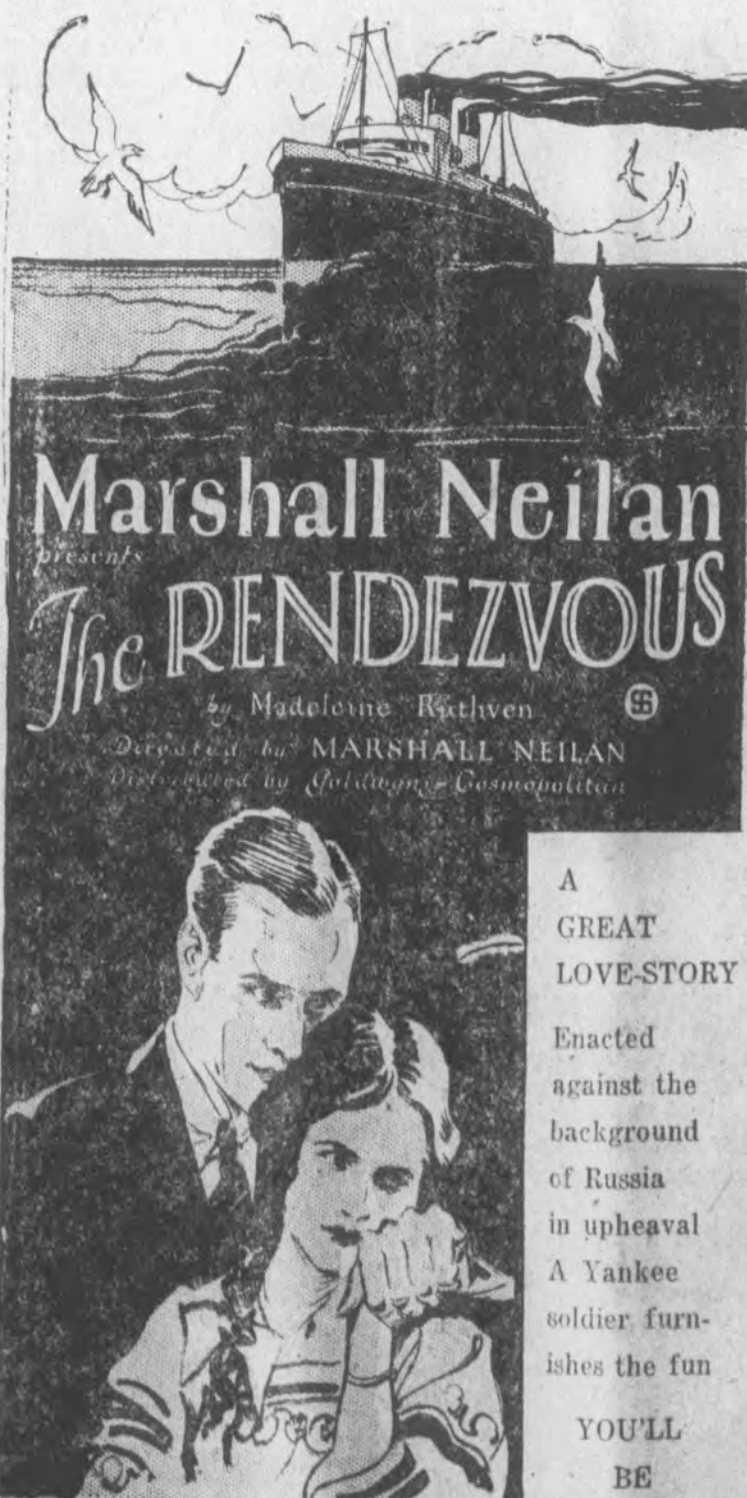
