

## American Standards Must Be Maintained --President Coolidge

### Endorses Permanent Court of International Justice

New York, April 22. — President Coolidge announced in an address at the annual luncheon here today of The Associated Press that with firm establishment of a settlement of the German reparations question, he would favor steps looking toward the calling of another world conference to consider further limitation of armaments and the codification of international law.

Disclaiming any ability to announce a formula that would guarantee the peace of the world, the President declared there were, however, certain definite things which should be done to relieve the world "of much of the burden of military armaments and diminish the probability of military operations."

"The Washington conference did a great deal to restore harmony and good will among the nations," the President said, "Another purpose of conference is the further limitation of competitive armaments. Much remains to be accomplished in that direction."

"It would appear to be impractical to attempt action under present conditions, but with a certain and definite settlement of German reparations firmly established, I should favor the calling of a similar conference. To achieve such limitations of armaments and initiate plans for a codification of international law, should preliminary inquiries disclose that such a proposal would meet with a sympathetic response."

"The United States, the President said, stands by the principle of the lead in such an additional move toward world peace because America holds the respect of other nations and "our position is such that we are trusted and our business institutions and government considered to be worthy of confidence."

Mr. Coolidge hailed the work of the Dawes Commission as unsurpassed in importance by anything that had transpired since the Armistice and declared there appeared "to be every reason to hope that the report offers a basis for a practical solution of the reparations problem."

"I trust that it may commend itself to all the European governments interested as a method by which, through mutual concessions, they can arrive at a stable adjustment of the intricate and vexatious problem of reparations, and that such an outcome will provide for the restoration of Germany and the largest possible payments to other countries," he added.

Pointing out that the plan proposed by General Dawes and his associates contemplates an immediate loan to Germany for pressing needs and for financing of a bank, he expressed the hope that private American capital would be willing to participate in the making of such a loan.

"Sound business reasons exist why we should participate in the fencing of works of peace in Europe, though we have repeatedly asserted that we were not in favor of advancing funds for any military purpose he continued. "It would benefit our trade and commerce, and we especially hope that it will provide a larger market for our agricultural production. \* \* \* Besides this, there is the humanitarian requirement, which carries such a strong appeal, and the knowledge that out of our abundance it is our duty to help where help will be used for meeting just requirements and the promotion of a peaceful purpose."

The President devoted his address, delivered to the leading newspaper publishers and editors of the country, to the country's foreign relations in the main although he reminded those who heard him that "our first duty is to ourselves" and that "American standards must be maintained. American institutions must be preserved."

The whole address was based on the general theme of service—the service that the American government might render to the people and the service, the American nation might give to the world. He drew the theme from the work of The Associated Press.

The President, in alluding to this danger, mentioned that the world war caused many of the old standards to be suspended or cast aside and asserted that although war conditions passed away they left "A trail of vicious and criminal selfishness."

## AUDITOR DENIES JAKE HAMON GAVE MILLION DOLLARS

### SENATE OIL COMMITTEE TRAILS CAMPAIGN FUNDS

Tulsa, Oklahoma, April 22.—Fredrick L. Thornton, a certified public accountant who made audits of the estate of Jake L. Hamon both before and after his death, denied that Hamon had contributed one million dollars toward the nomination of Warren G. Harding, in 1920, as has been charged in testimony before the Senate oil investigating committee. Thornton said that Hamon's campaign contributions in 1920 did not exceed \$100,000.

The accountant left last night for Washington in response to a request from the Senate public lands committee who want further information regarding "the business and political ventures" of Hamon.

Thornton took with him all the data concerning the audits he had made of the Hamon interests.

## ROCKY MOUNT IS CHOSEN FOR SCHOOL SITE

### Eastern Carolina Industrial School to Occupy 128 Acres in Edgecombe County

Goldsboro, April 22.—Rocky Mount, Edgecombe county, today was selected by the Board of Trustees as the location for the Eastern Carolina Industrial School which was authorized by an act of the last General Assembly. A number of cities and towns throughout the Eastern part of the State, including Kinston, Goldsboro, New Bern and Vanceboro.

Edgecombe county gave 128 acres in fee simply for the location of the school and grounds.

This school will be designed to do for the boys of the eastern part of the State what the Stonewall Jackson Training school has been doing for the boys of the State. The two schools will divide the reformatory work between them.

The large attendance which is characterizing the morning services even this early in the campaign is evidence of the realization of the fact that Mr. Ham's morning sermons are equally as interesting and helpful, if not more so, than his night sermons to the larger, popular audiences. Mr. Ham's morning sermons are addressed almost entirely to the church and professing Christians and are recognized generally as unusually helpful to the Christian in scriptural interpretation.

This morning Mr. Ham delivered another of his gripping addresses in which he cast aside the attitude and style of the professional pulpiteer and engaged in a delightful personal chat with his audience talking with them in a simple, direct manner of problems they meet every day in their various walks of life, and throwing upon them the light of God's revealed word in a most helpful manner.

The theme of Mr. Ham's discussion was "Converts," and he pointed out that the Bible recognized three types of converts, all of which are in evidence in our churches today.

The first type mentioned was that convert of whom the Jew was an example. He turned from idols but had not turned in his heart to God. The Jew religiously in our churches today was labeled by Mr. Ham as the ritualist and formalist, the Pharisee who makes great boast of his upright life and his many works, but who in his heart knows not God.

The second type of Biblical convert was typified by the Samaritan who had turned outwardly to God, but had not turned from their idols. They had turned to God merely because he was the God of the land in which they were then dwelling and they feared that if they did not worship Him, they would suffer persecution. Mr. Ham stated that we have many Samaritans today who outwardly profess to know God, because it is considered the correct thing to do, yet who have never turned from their idols of business, pleasure and worldly interests and given their hearts and lives wholly to God.

The third type of convert mentioned in the scripture is the "Christian." Mr. Ham pointed out that the Christian has turned in his heart to God and also has turned from his idols. He is characterized by Paul as having performed the "work of faith" or "turning unto God from idols" as "laboring in love" or "serving the living and true God" and as having the "patience of hope" or "waiting for His Son from heaven." Mr. Ham dwelt at length on each of these classes and pointed out how far present day Christendom has wandered from the true type of Christian convert. He stated that it was his purpose to so conduct the campaign as to win real "Christian converts" and plead earnestly for the professing Christians to yield themselves to the will of the Master.

## Sensation Created At Insanity Trial

### GIRL ROBBER REACHES N. Y. UNDER ARREST

#### CONFESSES SHOOTING OF NATHAN MAZZIO

### Spectacular Career of 'Bobbied Hair Bandit' Comes to End in Jacksonville; To Face Fifteen Charges

New York, April 22.—Her spectacular career at an end, Mrs. Celia Cooney said to be the Brooklyn "bobbied hair bandit" and her husband, Eddie Cooney, arrived late last night from Jacksonville, Florida, where they were arrested yesterday.

They may be arraigned in police court before night and may be indicted by a Kings county grand jury without delay.

Inspector Coughlin, head of the detective bureau, said the pair would have to face charges of assault and robbery. They are thought to have been involved in the robbery of more than 15 chain stores.

The most serious charge against the pair is the shooting of Nathan Mazzio, a clerk in the employ of the National Biscuit Company.

Besides admitting her identity as the "bobbied hair bandit" Mrs. Cooney confesses that she, and not her husband, fired on Mazzio.

Police department doctors will be on hand when the couple arrives in case the wife, who only ten days ago gave birth to a child which died, needs aid after the long train journey.

Strangely enough it was the birth and subsequent death of their child that led to the apprehension of the Cooneys. The child, a girl, was born on April 1, and died eight days later. The birth of the child occurred just ten days after the hold-up of the National Biscuit Company plant in Brooklyn on April 1, which Mrs. Cooney said was the date of her twentieth birthday.

The trail led through 13 states, according to detective Gray and Wm. G. Casey of New York, who made the arrest in Jacksonville. It was through the undertaker who had charge of funeral arrangements for the child that the address of the rooming house at which the couple was staying was obtained.

New York police said they obtained the "tip" that the Cooneys were in Jacksonville through a message for money that Cooney was said to have sent his mother in New York. The money, it was said, was used to pay the hospital bill. Police said the couple was without funds when arrested.

## 38th District Rotary Meet In Pinehurst

Pinehurst, April 22. — With approximately a thousand members in attendance the Thirty-eighth Rotary District, which covers Western North Carolina and all of South Carolina, opened its annual two day conference here this morning.

Prominent Rotarians and honorary Rotarians from other parts of the country and Canada were present. The meeting was called to order by District Governor Paul Schenck, of Greensboro and Reverend Ellis A. Fuller, of Greenville, S. C., pronounced the invocation.

The address of welcome was made by Alfred M. Scales, of Greensboro, N. C. and the response by George W. Cromer of Newberry, S. C.

The guests of honor at the morning session were Mrs. Kate Waller Barrett, an honorary Rotarian, who is president of the National Florence Crittenton Mission; E. Leslie Pidgeon, of Winniepeg, Canada, and Past President of the Rotary International Anthony W. Smith, director Rotary International and past District governor.

Much interest, it was stated, has been manifested in the coming election and the enthusiasm of the supporters of the various Rotarians is high.

### Makes Speech to Reporters as Court Recesses and Tells Crowd He Wants to Talk to Them

Philadelphia, April 22.—Just as the Harry K. Thaw insanity trial recessed for luncheon today, Thaw rushed to the press table and burst into an excited speech in denunciation of William Gray who had been addressing the jury in opposition to Thaw's release.

When he calmed down he said he had not been excited because of Gray's speech but was nervous because of danger of losing the jurors if certain records were introduced.

Under common law, Thaw told those around the press table, a jury might be withdrawn. He talked loudly and rapidly and attracted the attention of persons walking out of the court room.

"Wait a minute! Wait a minute!" he said, "Thaw wants to talk to you, too." During this excitement Thaw's mother sat calmly and gave no indication that she intended to have any part in this new move on Thaw's part. She seemed puzzled at her son's unexpected activity.

John M. Patterson, counsel for Thaw, who had not at first noticed him, came to where Thaw was addressing those around him and protested against "unreasonable questioning" calling out angrily, "Let Mr. Thaw alone—he is entitled to the same privacy as any other American citizen." When told that Thaw had volunteered some information, Mr. Patterson appeared non-plussed.

But he cleared the court room and Thaw was still talking when the last spectators, including the jurors left the place.

During the address of Mr. Gray Thaw sat calmly listening.

Raleigh, April 22.—Maxwell Gorman, editor of the (Raleigh-)Union-Herald died at his home here today after being ill for about a week with influenza. Mr. Gorman was sixty years old.

He was engaged in newspaper work in this state for thirty years as editor managing editor and correspondent for several papers. He had also done newspaper work in Washington. He is survived by a widow and one daughter.

## No Settlement In Webb Salary Dispute

Rocky Mount, April 22.—Up to the present time Mark Webb, pitcher for the Rocky Mount team, who left here Thursday for his home after a disagreement with Manager Walker over the amount stipulated in his salary contract, has not communicated with officials of the club, it was stated at the manager's office.

Webb, it was said, attended the game at Wilson Thursday but watched the game from the grandstand. Walker stated that he was not ready to make a definite announcement now but that he had several men under consideration.

## Durham Man Murdered In New Hampshire

Durham, April 22.—It is reported here that Norwood Minns, of this city, was clubbed to death in a particularly brutal murder in Meredith, New Hampshire.

No details of the crime have reached this city yet.

## Corelli and Duse Die on Same Day

Two of the world's most famous women, Eleanora Duse, Italian tragedienne, and Marie Corelli, English novelist died yesterday.

Duse died from influenza as the result of exposure to a rain storm a few days ago, while seeing the sights of Pittsburg, accompanied only by her chauffeur. The body will be taken to New York and will later be sent to her home in Italy.

Her reappearance this season after a retirement from the stage for more than fifteen years has been the occasion for a triumph wherever she has been. Her tour of this country was to end May 12th, next, when she expected to return to Italy.

Duse came of a family of theatrical people and was born in a wagon in 1859 at Vigevano, Parva, a small village on the outskirts of Venice.

Marie Corelli died of heart trouble from which she had long been suffering at her home at Stratford-on-Avon, England.

She was a novelist of international fame and the author of a number of popular romantic novels.

Corelli was born in 1864 of an Italian father and Scotch mother and was educated in a French convent. A

musical career was planned for her but the publication of a number of poems led to the adoption of literature instead.

She was an opponent of woman suffrage, maintaining that members of her sex were unfitted to exercise the franchise.

Mrs. Robbins was in the car at the time but no one was hurt.

## DAUGHERTY LET PROCEEDINGS DIE

Washington, April 22.—Chairman Houston Thompson of the Federal Trade Commission laid before the Daugherty investigation committee further evidence that anti-trust cases were not properly prosecuted under former Attorney-General Daugherty after facts warranting legal action had been developed by the commission and turned over to the Department of Justice.

Turning from conditions in the tobacco industry which he described at length, the chairman related how he and his colleagues had uncovered "price fixing and coercive methods" among the lumber producers beginning in 1919.

The result of this investigation was laid before the Department of Justice before Daugherty took office.

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## WITH THE VOTERS' O. K.

Collier's Weekly relates that the estate of Jacob Schiff, the banker, amounting to \$35,000,000, was nearly all in tax-free bonds—Congress has failed to pass legislation making possible taxation of income from such securities.

According to the Country Gentleman, one out of every 12 persons in United States over 16 years old and gainfully employed is on the public payroll. That means not only that the rest of us provide the salaries for the job holders, but that we also pay the income tax that they ought to pay on their salaries. Even notaries public are exempt from income tax on their fees.

Commenting on the tax question, the San Francisco Bulletin says:

"There are two large classes of favorites in this country that are exempt from income tax; the holders of political places and the holders of public bonds. The bonds are exempt also from all other taxes."

The more political places we create and the more tax-free bonds we issue, the heavier becomes the tax load on those who do not hold political jobs or public bonds.

These are matters to keep in mind when we are asked by urgent politicians to borrow millions on the taxpayers' credit for the purpose of investing in enterprises that will employ large numbers of tax-free politicians. We feel a righteous indignation when we read how kings of France, before the revolution, exempted favored classes from taxation, but have we not gone farther than any king of France dared go?

## BUTTER, HONEY AND FLAX BRING MANITOBA WEALTH

Winnipeg, Man.—Mixed farming in Manitoba has made unusual progress in recent years, according to Premier John Bracken, in an address to the provincial legislature on agricultural conditions.

"Although wheat is commonly regarded as Manitoba's most important crop," said Mr. Bracken, "its value in 1923 was only twice as great as dairy and allied products. The wheat crop last year was valued at \$23,000,000 as compared with \$99,000,000 in 1918.

"Production of creamery and dairy butter made remarkable strides last year. Since 1913 the value of creamery butter in Manitoba has grown from \$4,000,000 to \$11,000,000. Dairy butter in the same period increased in value from \$4,000,000 to \$9,000,000. In two years Manitoba has developed from an importer to an exporter of dairy products.

"The output of spring rye is rapidly increasing, the flax crop of 1923 was the most valuable ever grown, and the production of honey has jumped 2,500,000 pounds in four years."

### NEW TYPE OF RIFLE PERFECTED TO REARM FRENCH INFANTRYMEN

Paris.—The minister of war has recently approved a new type of machine rifle for the French army. It was designed by a French artillery officer and is said to be very simple in its working, a recruit endowed with average intelligence being supposed to master it within a few weeks. This proved to be the deciding factor in the choice of the ministry from among the numerous types submitted, owing to the shorter term of military service and ever increasing amount of mater placed before the soldiers for instruction.

The type still in use is the one adopted in 1915, which appeared on the battlefields of the Somme for the first time in 1916, when it caused much surprise among the enemy. It had been hurriedly made under the pressure of war, and since the armistice it has been felt that more carefully perfected arm should be supplied to the infantry.

**Garden Lovers Going Abroad.**  
New York.—A group of American garden lovers and students of landscape architecture will study many of the most important gardens, villas and estates of England, France and Italy this summer according to the Institute of International Education which has arranged the trip.

The leader of the group, which will leave this country in July, will be Edward Lawson, first Fellow in Landscape Architecture at the American Academy in Rome, and now assistant Professor of Landscape Architecture at Cornell University.

New York.—Hundreds of applications from scholars, research students and the idly curious for permission to visit the magnificent Pierpont Morgan Library in East 36th St., have deluged the staff since Mr. Morgan on February 16, as a memorial to his father, turned the library and its contents over to a board of trustees for the use in perpetuity of scholars.

The waiting list already is so long that no further applications, no matter how meritorious, can be considered until late summer, according to Miss Belle da Costa Greene, the director. Nearly every section of the nation is represented in the list which is the result of careful elimination of sight-seeing curiosity seekers and of granting of applications to those intent upon serious utilization of the resources offered by the books and manuscripts of the \$7,000,000 collection.

decorations make it impossible to admit many persons at a time, while general visitors must be barred entirely to save the treasure from possible accidental injury.

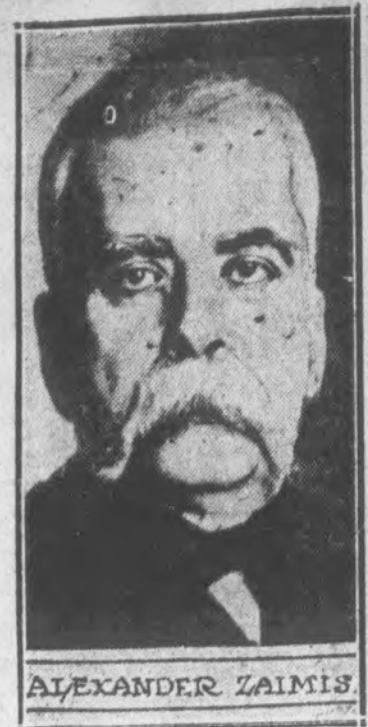

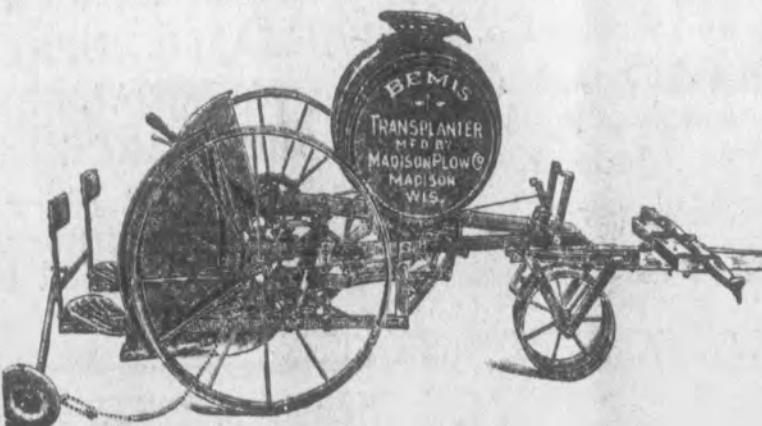
