Ham Denounces the Apologetic Christian

TONIGHT'S SERMON
BASED ON SAMPSON

Evangelist Criticises the Modern Christian for Compromise With the World, the Flesh and the Devil

"And Lot went out and spoke to his sons-in-law, which married his daughters, and said, Up, get you out of this place; for the Lord will destroy the city. But He seemed unto his sons-in-law as one that mocked."

This verse from Genesis 19 formed the scriptural basis for one of the greatest sermons Evangelist Ham has delivered since beginning his campaign in this city when he preached to another large audience at the tabernacle last night. The evangelist was scathing in his denunciation of the apologetic type of religion possessed by Lot and a great host of the professing Christians of modern Christendom and he dealt without gloves with many of the flimsy excuses given by modern Christians for their lives of compromise with the world, the flesh and the Devil. The evangelist's denunciation of sin is terrific, yet at no time does he deal in personalities or unapt applications. His preaching is straightforward and hews true to the line of scriptural teaching and as a result often cuts deep, but no impartial listener can misunderstand the motive that actuates the minister in his denunciation of the sins that are crippling the cause of Christ in this world.

Mr. Ramsay last night urged that the choir be on hand promptly at 7:30. At the opening hour last night the choir platform was almost empty, nevertheless the chorister opened the service as scheduled. By the middle of the song service the platform was filled and Mr. Ramsay voted the choir as to the hour of opening with the result that the service will begin as usual at 7:30 o'clock each evening. Mr. Ramsay also announced that seats which are being held for the singers who are not attending the services will be reserved only a few days longer after which they will be assigned to those who have the meeting on their hearts and are willing to render faithful and sacrificial service.

Tonight Mr. Ham is to deliver his great sermon, based upon the experience of Samson, one of the strongest and most telling messages he delivers.

In the course of his sermon last night the minister pictured the condition of Lot and endeavored to point out "what was the trouble with Lot and how he had gotten in this condition." Mr. Ham suggested that in answering these questions he might be able to show some people how they might help their own families to live better lives. "There are many men and women in the church who are living good lives, but are not able to bring their own families into the kingdom, but why?" he asked. The answer to this question is to be found in the result of the life that Lot lived.

A comparison of the lives of Abraham and Lot was made in opening. "Abraham was called by God from the land of Ur and answered God's call, which Lot could not understand. Lot was his nephew but he was led as Abraham was led. Lot walked by sight alone, while Abraham walked by faith entirely. So it is with the Christian today if he is a true Christian he walks by faith, but the lukewarm Christian and the sinner walk by sight."

"It takes a crisis to reveal character. Abraham had heard God's call and continued his march toward the land to which God had directed him, but his nephew was not well pleased with the prospects that lay before him. He had been too long in Egypt, and lived the fast life of Egypt and as a consequence he was seeking some spot that would give him the joy of which he feared he would be deprived. So while Abraham turned to the country to which God had directed him, Lot turned to the plains of the Jordan, and pitched his tent toward Sodom. Now Sodom was a wicked city and therein dwelt many wicked people. In fact it was so wicked that the scripture said the stench thereof had become obnoxious in the nostrils of the Lord. But Lot was looking for the wild life and he found it."

In Sodom living among these people. But as he looked back over the few years he saw the small regions that he had chosen for his possessions and compared them with the vast regions that had been given Abraham. God had said that he who chooses for himself gets nothing but the man that chooses God gets everything.

"Then the robber kings came and captured the people of the wicked city and plundered all that they had. Abraham heard of this and after mustering together all of the forces he could possibly command forced the robbers to return and at the same time refused to take anything as a payment from the people of the city. As a result of his kindness to the people of Sodom his nephew Lot became a famous man, overnight as it were, and was at once elevated to a position of great standing and rank. He was made judge and mayor of the city and given a position at the gate of the city."

"Lot lived in Sodom for 19 years and during this period there were four things that he forgot. He forgot God, the spiritual welfare of the people of the city, his family and his own spiritual happiness. And even as Lot so with any man today who leaves these four things out of his life. There is no change for happiness of peace in the life if these basic essentials are lacking. God is not to be despised and he should have His recognition from man. God is not unjust. He asks no more of man than is rightly His. Men are too busy with their worldly pursuits to think of their obligation to God which can never be denied."

"But God was not pleased with Sodom and determined to destroy the city. As the messengers of the Lord started to perform their task they went by the abode of Abraham and told him of their intentions, and Abraham was much grieved, questioning if the just and the unjust were to suffer alike. He asked that if even 50 were found in the city who were righteous the city would be spared. Then he asked that if even 40, 30, 20, or even 10 were found would the city be spared, and he was assured by the Lord that it would. So the messengers went on and Abraham went back into his tent."

"The angels of the Lord were received with open arms by Judge Lot and welcomed to the city. They were entertained at his home after persuasion had caused them to consent to even enter his home. But when they were assembled the people of the city rose up and demanded from Lot that the strangers in their midst must be thrown out. But Lot refused and even offered his daughters in their stead and they would have even taken Lot himself had not the angels rescued him and struck the whole mob blind. They announced their mission to the city and as Lot searched long for the professed Christians they were not to be found. But he went around stirring up his son-in-laws but they laughed at him. What did he know about the power of the Lord. He had not communion with the Savior. What right had he called the Lord his Lord? "He seemed as one that mocked." But the city was destroyed."

"As the morning came on the day of destruction, the angel of the Lord directed Lot to take his wife and his two unmarried daughters and flee for their lives, never looking behind. They were taken by the hand and led out of the city. But as they were going up the mountain Lot's wife looked back and her form was immediately made salt because she had disobeyed. But the father and the two daughters were saved."

"Lot did not save all of his household. And the question is asked, why? He had not lived before God and before them the life of a Christian should live, and is was only through the mercy of God that his own life was spared. Lot did not take part in the basest of mean things in the city of Sodom but he did not try to prevent it. Because it would have meant his downfall as a leader in the city. So it is with leaders in this city and the churches of this and other cities throughout the country—they do not approve of everything that is going on but they are afraid to say anything because of their own positions."

"A revival is all that will prevent a present day calamity. The back to God movement is the only hope of a lost world and until the Christians buckle on more closely the armor of God's cause and get out of the failing; they lack Christ."

BANK HAD INFORMANT IN TREASURER'S OFFICE

McAdoo "Amazed At Conditions in Treasury Department"—Forced to "Clean House"

Sacramento, Calif., April 24.—William Gibbs McAdoo, speaking in the interests of his candidacy for nomination for president, asserted that Wall Street wants to retain control of the Government because it desires to use the funds of the Federal Treasury.

"The bankers would rather control the treasury than any other department of the government," he said. "The National City Bank of New York had a clerk in the office of the Comptroller of the Currency copying off confidential information when I took charge of the Treasury Department."

"I was amazed by what I found when I took over the department and one of the first things I did was to throw the clerk out."

Berne, Switzerland, April 24.—Dr. Carl Helfferich, eminent German financial authority and his aunt were among those killed in the collision between the Zurich and Milan expresses near Bellinzona yesterday.

Dr. Helfferich and his aunt were in the German car from Italy.

This car was demolished and burned and the half consumed bodies were only identified this morning.

A telegram from Berlin says "The report that Dr. Hjalmar Schacht, president of the Reichsbank, was killed in the wreck near Bellinzona is unfounded. Dr. Schacht is in Berlin."

Lexington, April 24.—National Councillor Joseph D. STATE LABOR LAWS TO PROTECT WOMEN IN BUSINESS LIFE

Four Million Workers Affected by Legislation on Wages, Hours and Conditions

Buffalo, April 24.—Every state in this country except Florida has enacted at least one law covering only women and insuring to those who work outside the home some measure of standardization of the conditions under which they work. Miss Mary Anderson, director of the woman's bureau of the United States Department of Labor, told the conference on women in industry, which is being held here in connection with the convention of the National League of Women Voters.

Miss Anderson said that about 4,000,000 women are covered by such laws, the most numerous of which are those that govern the hours of woman labor. This limitation varied from eight to 11 hours a day and 15 states prohibit the employment of women at night in certain occupations. Forty-one states have laws that women shall be furnished seats at their work and 13 states have minimum woman wage laws.

"It has not been the experience of the bureau that these laws have kept women from obtaining employment or from advancing in their chosen field," she said. "On the contrary the census of 1920 shows that the number of gainfully employed women in all occupations is increasing and that the number of women employed in the higher paid occupations shows a much larger percent of increase over 1910 than do all classes combined."

Daugherty Evidence Stolen From Witness

Washington, April 24.—Gaston B. Means, formerly an investigator for the department of justice and the star witness before the Senate Daugherty investigating committee, reported to the committee members that an extensive collection of diaries and documents has disappeared from his custody.

Means said that a man wearing the badge of sergeant-at-arms of the Senate obtained possession of the documents, or part of them, at his (Means') home in Washington yesterday.

Capture "King of Rum Runners" in Florida

Jacksonville, Fla., April 24.—Don Paxton, called the King of Florida Rum Runners together with Albert Free and Jake Saunders were taken into custody today.

Ninety-nine cases of imported whiskey valued at more than \$10,000 were confiscated in a sensational raid by prohibition officers, according to H. L. Duncan, Florida prohibition chief.

NORTH CAROLINA IS VITALLY CONCERNED

Will Require Power From Outside Sources Within Six Years—Should Be Under Federal Power Act

Washington, April 24.—Joseph Hyde Pratt, of Asheville, president of the Western North Carolina Development Association, was the first witness before the Senate Agriculture committee on Muscle Shoals in today's hearing.

Mr. Pratt asserted that the best interests of the country would be conserved only by the development of Muscle Shoals in accordance with the federal water power act.

"The Muscle Shoals power project is of particular importance to the Southern States, of which North Carolina is one, because it will become an essential factor in maintaining the industrial position the south-eastern has attained," Mr. Pratt said.

"North Carolina manufacturing interests are demanding more power each year and the power of the state will be taxed to capacity in six years at the present rate of growth."

Continuing, Mr. Pratt said: "In all water power projects the primary power represents the rating of the development, but the secondary power, available part of the time is vastly more important and valuable if the power development is interconnected with other power stations."

"The Muscle Shoals project is estimated to have primary power of ninety thousand horse power and secondary power of from five hundred thousand to eight hundred thousand horse power. This secondary power, thus, it seems to me, that this secondary power can be utilized most efficiently by having the Shoals interconnected with the other hydro-electric power systems of the south-eastern states."

"At times of low water and depleted storage at power plants east of the Blue Ridge mountains excess secondary power at Muscle Shoals which would reduce the use of steam power 'stand-by' plants in times of drought to a minimum percentage."

"Mr. Pratt went on to explain that there was in North Carolina a system with interconnected transmission lines capable of relaying power one thousand miles and that this prevents the shutting down of mills with the consequent loss to labor."

"This system is at present," he said, "connected in North and South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, and Tennessee but will later be extended to connect with lines in Virginia, West Virginia, Louisiana, Mississippi and Arkansas."

"One result of co-operation of these power companies in the south-east, has been the lease of the government steam power plant at Sheffield, Ala., as an auxiliary steam plant to supplement the hydro-electric plants in time of low water."

"The industrial life of the south-east," Mr. Pratt said, "are not only interested in, but are partly dependent on the development at Muscle Shoals."

Raleigh, April 24.—Members from all over the state are gathered here for the annual convention of the North Carolina Travelers Protective Association, which will open tonight and continue through Saturday noon. A wide scope of business and social affairs will be the features of the meeting.

Among the subjects of business importance to be discussed at this convention are "garage storage privileges" and "the T. P. A." and the national convention of the Association to be held in Grand Rapids, Mich.

FIND NO EVIDENCE AGAINST WHEELER

Wanted Client to Get a Square Deal

Washington, April 24.—Further direct testimony hearing on the actions here of Senator B. K. Wheeler, of Montana, in connection with land cases was heard today by the Senate committee investigating the senator's indictment in Montana on charges of receiving money for appearing before the interior department.

Commissioner Spry of the land office, testified that Senator Wheeler came to his office on one occasion and told him that he was interested in seeing that Gordon Campbell, his client in litigation in Montana state courts 'get a square deal' from the federal government, in regard to land deals.

Spry said that Wheeler had talked to him as any other member of the House or Senate might have done. The only other witness at today's session was William Seeley, a Washington attorney, who testified that he had handled Campbell's land matters before the Department of the Interior.

When asked if Wheeler had anything to do with the handling of these cases he replied, "absolutely nothing."

No date has been fixed for the next hearing.

Helium Gas to Make Dirigible Fire-Proof

Washington, April 24.—Helium would have prevented the burning of the Dixmude, ZR-2 and the Roma, Dr. Richard E. Moore of New York City formerly chief chemist of the United States Bureau of Mines, declared today in an address on "Recent Developments in the Recovery of Helium from Natural Gas" before the petroleum chemistry division of the American Society.

"In other words, the last three big disasters have all been accompanied by fire and have been primarily due to fire. In addition, a number of small blimps have also burned and it is time for the facts to be thoroughly known and appreciated."

Dr. Moore said that the expert of helium should be forbidden by federal legislation, as the United States possesses a practical monopoly of this gas.

"With helium, it would be impossible to destroy an airship with a single incendiary bullet; it would be necessary to rip the bags to pieces by means of a large bomb or shell before the airship could be brought to the ground."

"It is not difficult to appreciate what a fleet of such airships could do to a city like New York, London or Paris. 5,000,000 cubic foot ships each one carrying six airplanes and 20 tons of bombs would do immense damage to any city and would be well protected by the fighting planes that the ships would carry."

The cost of helium is being cut so rapidly that within a year or two it will be virtually as cheap as hydrogen."

SPINNING SPINDLES

The steady march toward the southern states of the cotton spinning industry is very impressively illustrated in a report just published by the Department of Commerce, covering March, 1924, from which the following figures are taken.

New England still leads in the number of spindles, having nearly 19 million against nearly 17 million spindles in the cotton growing states but the southern spindles were 'spinning' a total of 4 billion 316 million hours during the month of March against 2 billion 434 million hours in the New England States, the home of cotton spinning in this country.

To put it in another way, each spindle in the south averaged 225 hour activity against 129 hours in New England.

There were 26 working days in March. On a ten-hour-a-day basis this would mean that the southern spindles were working to 86 per cent full capacity for a single shift compared with 50 per cent for New England.

Of the cotton growing states, North Carolina leads in the number of spindles installed and in the total number of hours of activity. It is very significant that with slightly less than half as many spindles as Massachusetts (11,954,340 against 5,741,906), North Carolina not only exceeded Massachusetts in average hours of activity (2566 against 120), but also in the TOTAL number of hours of activity, (1 billion 468 million compared with 1 billion 435 million for the northern state.)

Until recent years cotton cloth could not successfully be spun except in localities where the air was sufficient humid. This was the basic factor in the development of the industry in Massachusetts and Rhode Island as well as in the north-eastern counties in England. The invention and perfection of humidifying processes and apparatus cancelled this natural advantage with the above result.

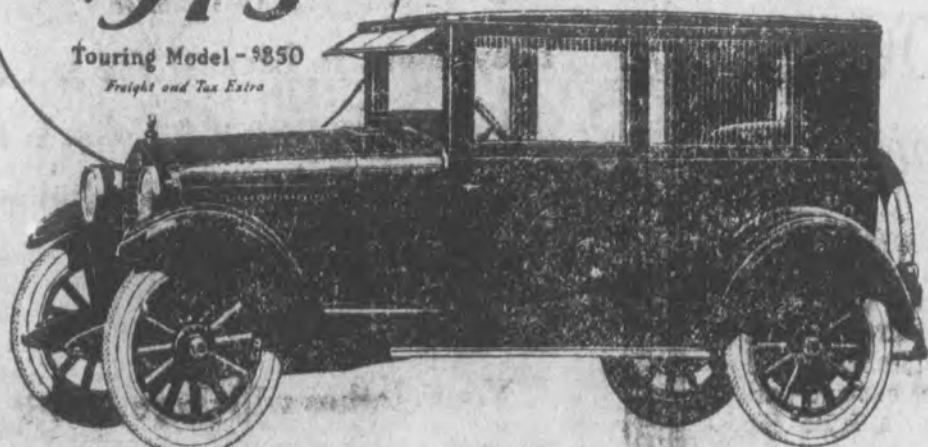

COTTON LETTER

New Orleans, April 24.—Under-tone of market was steadier today in consequence of encouraging cables, the continuance of free exports from the United States and prospects for less favorable weather in the western half of the cotton region.

The local certificated stock of raw cotton is being rapidly reduced now only 14,402 bales and it is rumored that further shipments of several thousand bales will be made in the near future.

Prospects are for rather unsettled weather probably showers and cooler for the southwest, perhaps becoming colder by end of this week, but fair weather is indicated for the southeast. New York reports the cotton goods market as steadier, worth street having sold 100,000 pieces yesterday, which is some improvement in the demand of the recent past.

The passage of the soldier bonus bill providing insurance for veterans of the world war but no cash payment was without effect on the markets.

Next in order will be consideration of the tax reduction measure which will be constructive. Passage of the important measure is expected within a fortnight.

Manchester officials advised today that yarns were quiet and firm and that there is a good inquiry for cloths. Liverpool cabled "Considerable export demand. Unsold stock

being here small, desirable cotton is getting scarce."
 Compared with last year, exports from the United States today were 12,000 bales against 3,000 thus far this week 64,000 against 30,000; since August first 4,799,000 against 4,066,000.
 Prospects are for the continuance of free exports from America as the stock shipboard here awaiting to be exported is 32,000 against 16,000 last year at Galveston 18,000 against 15,000 and there is 8,000 on ship-board at Houston.
 Tomorrow will be first May notice day in New York and New Orleans. There effect on market will depend on the extent and disposition to be made of the notices.

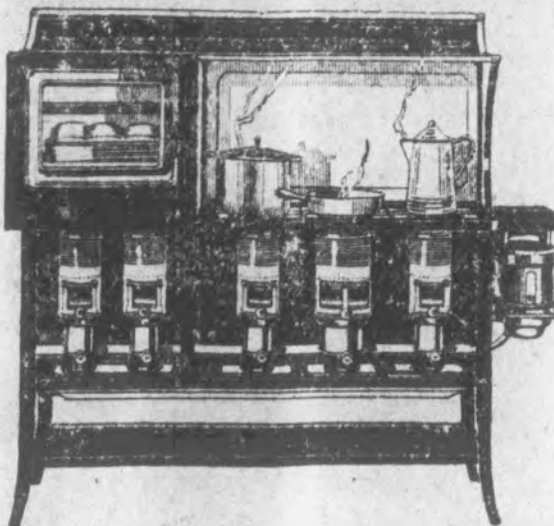

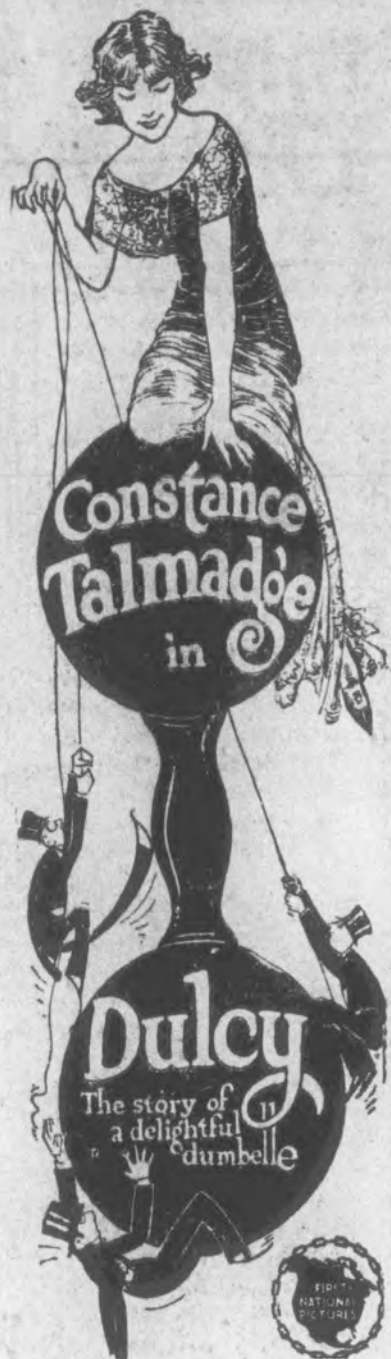
