RECORD AUDIENCES AT
YESTERDAY'S SERVICE

Evangelist Ham Gives
Many Instances of the
Crop to Be Expected
From Sowing Evil

No services will be held at the tabernacle today as Monday is rest day for the evangelistic party, but the meeting will continue Tuesday at the usual hours. At 10 o'clock Mr. Ham is to speak on the subject "Am I My Brother's Keeper?" a message which he urges every business man in Greenville to hear and at 6:30 Tuesday night, he will speak on "The Trial and Execution of Jesus Christ From a Legal Viewpoint," one of the most remarkable sermon-lectures the evangelist delivers and one that has elicited the strongest commendation from the press and pulpit of the south. Mr. Ham, in his early life, was trained in the law and is peculiarly fitted to discuss the subject to which he has addressed himself and the lawyers of the county are extended a special invitation to hear this message which will be of especial interest to them.

The two services at the Ham-Ramsay Tabernacle yesterday marked the high water mark in point of interest in the campaign thus far. Early Sunday morning people from the county and adjoining counties began gathering at the tabernacle under the impression that the Evangelist would preach at 11 o'clock and by 2 o'clock a steady stream of humanity was moving toward the great building in which the services are being conducted. When the service opened at 3 o'clock the large auditorium was comfortably filled, but it was a noticeable fact, as demonstrated by Mr. Ham when he called for a standing vote, that fully 80 per cent of the audience was composed of people living outside of Greenville. Mr. Ham commented upon the seriousness of the spiritual condition existing here of which yesterday afternoon's attendance was a symptom and urged that Greenville people to awake to the great responsibility that is upon them in launching this effort for the salvation of souls. The night attendance reversed the condition, by far the greater portion of the audience being local Greenville people, though good delegations were present from Bethel, Farmville and the surrounding territory. The tabernacle last night was filled with the largest crowd which has yet attended a service and for almost an hour the great audience sat without a rustle or stir as they listened intently to each word uttered by the noted speaker as they fell from his lips, clear and distinct as the crack of a rifle, yet coming with the rapidity of shots from a gatling gun. Mr. Ham's remarkable pulpit power was well in evidence at last night's service and his message on the familiar text "Be Not Deceived, God Is Not Mocked; Whatsoever a Man Soweth, that Shall He Also Reap," was gripping and effective. Before entering into his discourse, Mr. Ham sang two verses of an appropriate solo which served as a fitting introduction to his message.

The music yesterday was an outstanding feature of the services. For the first time since the campaign opened, the choir platform was filled with singers and the great choruses which Mr. Ramsay has introduced swelled out across the audience with tremendous volume. Mr. Ramsay devoted practically the entire song service to working with his choir and the audience seemed quiet content to listen to the inspiring choruses without doing much singing themselves. The obligato work of Misses Riggs, Mallison, Mrs. Durward Tucker and Mrs. Hough, is adding considerably to the attractiveness of the services and promises to develop into one of the outstanding features of the musical program. Yesterday afternoon a splendidly rendered male quartet by the Ayden Male Quartette was a much enjoyed feature of the service.

Mr. Ham's subject last night was "Sowing and Reaping." With a speed that would defy an expert court reporter he plunged into the message and ran on high for about

The following regulations are of general interest, and the attention of the public is called to them:
The registration books will open in each voting precinct at nine o'clock a. m., on Saturday, May 3. The books will remain open for the purpose of registering all qualified voters, not already registered until sunset on Saturday, May 24. All persons having a right to register, who are not registered, and desire to register, must register within those days, or they will lose the privilege of voting. Each registrar will be at his respective polling place to register voters on Saturday, May 3, May 10 and May 24, from 9 a. m., until sunset. County and Township Candidates to be voted on in the Primary of June 7, must register as such with the Chairman of the Board of Elections, F. M. Wooten, on or before Friday, May 24.
A voter must have been a bona fide resident of the state for a period of four months, but a resident of the county moving from one precinct to another in the same county does not lose his right to vote, as he may go back to his old precinct if he has not been in the precinct into which he has moved four months.

JEWELER RAIDED IN
DOWNTOWN
NEW YORK

BEATEN AND BOUND
BY MASKED BANDITS

New York, April 28.—Three bandits early today bound and gagged Charles Kresney, a manufacturing jeweler, in his office in a Nassau street building in the heart of the downtown section of the city and escaped with diamonds and platinum mountings valued at more than \$150,000.

A foreman on coming to work found the jeweler and Josephine Selfran, a charwoman bound and gagged. The woman on the floor of the office and the other in a passageway, where he had been thrown after being beaten by the thieves. Kresney who was only semi-conscious was taken to a hospital.

Kresney was in the habit of coming to the office early and opening three safes, one in the office of the Fulton Jewelry Company and two in his own office. The charwoman told that when she came in she met three young men who ordered her to put up her hands, after which they bound and gagged her as she was found.

One of the wallets stolen contained diamonds worth \$75,000. One hundred ounces of platinum valued at \$108 and ounce was also taken.

The office in which the robbery occurred is on the seventh floor of an office building in the heart of the wholesale jewelry business.

Morrison Paroles
Case; Was Serving
Four-Year Term

Raleigh, April 28 Governor Morrison has paroled Milas H. Case, who was convicted in the March term of 1922 in the Henderson County Superior Court, of assault and sentenced to four years on the county roads. The prisoner, it was said, has served more than two years of his term with good behavior, and his parole was recommended by the judge who heard his case, the prosecuting attorney, and the man whom he assaulted.

Southern to Shorten
Haul From Coal Field

Asheville, April 28.—To facilitate the movement of coal from South-west Virginia fields through Asheville for consumption in Carolina territory and for export the Southern Railway has begun the construction of a 17-mile cut-off line, extending from Bulls Gap, Tenn., to Leadvale, Tenn.

The distance traversed by coal moving from Bulls Gap to Asheville will be shortened 11.5 miles by the construction of the cut-off which will have a maximum grade of five tenths of one percent in the direction of heavy traffic and maximum curvature of four percent. All bridges and culverts will be constructed of concrete and steel.

The cut-off will follow the valley of White Horn creek for two miles south from Bulls Gap, will run thence six miles along Bent creek, and thence nine miles along the Nolichucky river to Leadvale near the confluence of the Nolichucky and French Broad rivers.

Employment Service
Placed in 548 in Jobs

Raleigh, April 28.—The employment situation over the state is improved in general according reports from the various parts of the state made to M. L. Shipman, director of the State-Federal Employment Service.

During the week ended April 19, it was announced, the State-Federal Employment Service accepted 680 applicants of which 521 were men and 159 were women while there were 707 requests for workers of various kinds of which 549 were for men and 158 for women.

The Service referred 454 men and 171 women or 625 in all and succeeded in placing 414 men and 134 women, or 548 placements in all.

According to the list compiled by the Service the placements were classified as follows: Unskilled 283; skilled, 111; domestic, 105; clerical and professional, 43; and industrial

MINE EXPLOSION
TRAPS 100 MEN

FLAMES AND GAS
LEAVE LITTLE HOPE

All Passages Blocked—
Rescuers Unable to
Clean Away Debris
After Four Hours

Wheeling, W. Va., April 28.—More than 100 miners are entombed in the Benwood Mine, near here, as a result of an explosion early this morning, which blocked all entries to the mine with falling dirt and rock. The explosion occurred about three miles from the drift mouth.

Four hours after the blast, volunteer rescuers, hurriedly assembled, had been unable to gain entrance to the passages.

Little hope is entertained for the imprisoned miners as the mine is on fire and choked with deadly gases.

The combined mine rescue power of the government and of the state of West Virginia have been rushed to the aid of the stricken community.

At the office of the mining company it was stated that 125 men went to work in the mine this morning and that none escaped, but at the State Bureau of Mines at Charleston it was given out that 107 miners were entombed.

Norfolk Man Injured
In Unique Accident

Norfolk, Va., April 28.—William Mattox was the victim of an accident here Saturday which local doctors say is unique in many features.

Mattox had volunteered to help take four negroes, who had been injured in an auto collision, to the hospital. He was standing on the running board of a sedan supporting a woman's head.

In this position he was struck by a jitney and the door handle of his own car forced into his leg so deeply that it was necessary for it to be released surgically from the muscles of his thigh.

Game Law Violators
and Guides Are Fined

Washington, N. C., April 28.—Six men were fined \$50 and cost each in Federal Court here for violation of the Federal game laws and their guides were fined \$5 and cost. Chief Federal Game Warden, George A. Lawyer, of Washington, D. C., was the main witness against the men.

He stated that when he was here in January he caught the six men shooting ducks after dark, which is against the law.

Those convicted and fined were Eugene M. Yont, Larney A. Thompson, William Westmoreland, William L. Pope, William B. Crawford and David B. Moore, all of Statesville, and Alonzo L. Carawan, of New Holland was the guide.

WINDSHIELD CUTS
HEAD FROM BODY
IN AUTO WRECK

CAR SKIDS INTO
SIDE OF BRIDGE

Winston-Salem, April 28.—N. A. Warren, 17 year old youth of Rural Hall, near here was instantly killed late last evening about two miles north of his home when an automobile in which he was riding crashed into the side wall of a bridge spanning Muddy Creek.

Warren was thrown through the windshield and his head was almost severed from his body.

It is said the accident was caused by the car skidding on a sharp curve at the approach to the bridge.

Good Showing Made in
Reducing Fire Losses

Raleigh, April 28.—According to the March summary issued by State Commissioner of Insurance Stacey Wade there were 207 fires in the state during the month of March, with a total loss of \$406,266, a reduction of more than \$138,000 from the losses of the corresponding month last year.

Seventeen fires, in which the loss was more than \$5,000 each, accounted for \$278,000, leaving only \$128,000 loss for the other 190 fires. The chief losses came from two dwellings at Clarkson and Gibson, with combined losses of \$80,500.

A tobacco prizey at Oxford, \$44,000, Garage and autos at Kinston, \$26,000, business block at Marion, \$19,275, business building at Belmont, \$14,000, three dwellings at Belmont, \$14,000, Ice and Coal plant at Charlotte, \$18,000, and factory at Wilmington, \$12,500.

President Predicts the
Dawn of New Day in
Science in Dedication
Speech

Washington, April 28.—Setting anew the government's "stamp of approval" on the work of the National Academy of Sciences, President Coolidge, speaking at the dedication of the new home of the organization, predicted the "coming of a new day in science."

"Science and the American Government have always gone hand-in-hand," said the President and declared, "if there is one thing in which America is pre-eminent it is the disposition to follow the truth."

Demonstrates Control
of the Boll Weevil

Raleigh, April 28.—A field station for boll weevil demonstration and the growing of cotton under boll weevil conditions, has been established at Tarboro, under the direction of Bruce Mabe, extension entomologist.

"The purpose of this field station," is to give aid and suggestions to the cotton growers of Eastern North Carolina in their fight against the cotton boll weevil this year.

The establishment of this station says Mr. Sherman, chief of the division of Entomology of the state College of Agriculture is in line with the policy of his division to get accurate data right in the field under local conditions, so that the farmers of Eastern Carolina will be in a position to study the handling of the boll weevil in their immediate section.

Seeks Records Of
Confederate Sailors

Raleigh, April 28.—Admiral A. O. Wright, Commander of the Navy Department of the United States Confederate Veterans, is conducting a campaign throughout the southern states to secure the records of the men who served the Confederacy as sailors.

Questionnaires have been sent to the various states, according to the Admiral, and the individual state bears the expense of its own search. Money for this work has been provided in various ways. As there was no fund for this work in North Carolina, a tag day was observed here Saturday, the proceeds from which will be applied to gathering and perpetuating these records.

Fire Warden Cited as
Peculiarly Efficient

Chapel Hill, April 28.—The observance of Forest Protection Week has brought to the forefront the record of Fire Warden S. D. Nestor, of Avery County and he is classed as "peculiarly efficient" by State Forester J. S. Holmes.

"Seventeen fires started in Warden Nestor's district in 1923," said Mr. Holmes, "but only 35 acres were burned. This man and his assistants stopped every fire in its tracks. The loss was small, as was the cost of prevention; yet the loss might have run into the thousands of dollars."

"The success of one man's vigilance in combating forest fires may be contrasted with the heedlessness of other men who start them. The great majority of fires in the woods originate in human carelessness. Whereas Warden Nestor held 17 fires harmless, other men in four different counties caused a veritable conflagration of flames, because they chose dry and windy days on which to burn brush."

"The fight to overcome fires in the forests rests on as slight a thing as an instant's restraint of individual

TELEGRAM TO LIEBOLD
SUBMITTED COMMUTTEE

Coolidge Requests Ford
Not to Do Anything to
Make Delivery Difficult

Washington, April 28.—The most sensational testimony so far submitted before the Senate hearing on Muscle Shoals was given this morning when a telegram was submitted that quoted President Coolidge as having intentions to "deliver" the Shoals to Henry Ford.

The telegram was from James Martin Miller and was addressed to "Dr. William J. Cameron or Earnest G. Liebhold, care of the Dearborn Independent, Dearborn, Michigan," dated October 12, 1923, and said, in part: "In a private interview with President Coolidge this morning he said, 'I am friendly to Mr. Ford, but wish someone would convey to him that it is my wish that Mr. Ford will not say or do anything that will make it difficult for me to deliver Muscle Shoals to him as I am trying to do.'"

The telegram was one of those subpoenaed by the Senate committee on Saturday.

The Mr. Liebhold to whom the telegram is addressed is Mr. Ford's personal secretary.

Secretary Weeks was on the stand when the telegram was presented but said that he did not know Mr. Miller.

30 Quarts of Liquor
Buried Between the
House and Kitchen

Alonzo Tripp, white man, residing about one half mile from Greenville, was given a hearing in police court today for possessing thirty quarts of whiskey and was placed under a \$500 bond for his appearance in County Court.

The home of Tripp was raided Sunday afternoon about dark. It had been reported for several weeks that Tripp was a notorious bootlegger and the officers have raided his home many times but have been unable to locate the liquor.

On yesterday J. L. Whichard and Chief of Police Lester Jones, went out with the determination to find the "hiding place" of the liquor. After a diligent search thirty quarts of corn whiskey were found buried between his house and kitchen.

Tripp is regarded by the officers as being very cunning and he has evidently considered it quite an "accomplishment" to hide the liquor and evade the officers.

Rutherfordton Ships
Chickens by Carload

Rutherfordton, April 28.—A car load of live chickens weighing 19,379 pounds selling for more than \$4,000 at a co-operative sale has just been shipped from here to Philadelphia. The sale was conducted by V. W. Lewis, livestock marketing specialist for State College of Agriculture, at the request of County Farm Agent F. E. Patton and Home Agent Miss Hattie Niell.

Up to the time of the sale there had existed in Rutherford county a surplus of poultry, it was stated, and good live hens were selling at 18 cents per pound while it was almost impossible to sell old roosters.

The sale resulted, it was claimed, in a clearing of the surplus of poultry in the county and an increase of three and one half cents per pound for poultry on foot.

"This was the first shipment of such size that Rutherford county has ever witnessed," declared Mr. Lewis, "and from the interest expressed, it is felt that this is only a beginning of what will finally be a great industry in the county. The farmers now know that they can make their own sales of poultry and they realize that good markets are available when a car load lot is sold through co-operative action. Interest in this method of sale is growing over the state."

The home and farm agents of Beaufort county are planning to ship a car load from Washington today, and the farm agent of Lenoir plans to ship early in May. Two car loads have recently been shipped from Macon county.

WHY NOT "CUSTOMER OWNERSHIP"

"Directly violating the law of the land which forbids the granting of the water power rights to any one beyond 50 years, the House of Representatives votes to give Mr. Ford the control of Muscle Shoals for 100 years.

Under no consideration should this great power be granted for 100 years to Mr. Ford or to any one else; under no consideration should Congress violate our own law on the subject; and under no consideration should this property be leased except on a basis somewhat commensurate with its value."

The ideal way to operate Muscle Shoals would be through a public utility company whose stocks and bonds were offered to the people of this nation and particularly to the people of the territory served. Thus, "customer ownership" would establish a community interest and assure that the Muscle Shoals project would furnish power at a reasonable cost allowing for a fair profit.

Our most successful utilities today are operated on this basis and represent true public ownership of a democratic character.

The burden of protecting the public interest in the leasing of this property now rests with the Senate.

Let it consider the matter thoroughly.

COTTON LETTER

New Orleans, La., April 28.—Lower cables than due and further disposition to liquidate influenced market to a lower level today.

Rains in the southwest, especially in Texas particularly in the western part of the state were made much of as being highly beneficial to new crop prospects.

This feature is only a temporary influence, and while the plains and uplands were undoubtedly benefited by the rains, low lands have probably suffered because of the numerous heavy to excessive rains the past few days west of the Mississippi river.

Inasmuch as showery weather continues to the east of the river, where dry, warm weather is needed in fact dry warmer weather is wanted in all sections of the belt, now, the weather of late can hardly be considered favorable as whole.

Now that all districts of the belt have received all the moisture desired except perhaps in the lower Rio Grand Valley, there is the possibility of too much rain, as planting and plowing is in full swing now and the best of climate conditions are necessary during may to permit completion of planting and chopping of the crop to a stand a wet May would be considered very unfavorable for new crop prospects.

On the other hand, a dry May would probably be what is generally desired to permit satisfactory farm work and progress of the new crop. However much rain usually falls during May and this year may be no exception to the general rule.

Meanwhile liquidation of the May position by notices or otherwise has to be reckoned with. MMay has more tenders tomorrow or in the near future especially in New York. The certificated stock in New York is probably now less than 77,000 bales as the warehouse stock there is down to 77,651 bales and the certificated stock here has been reduced to only 18,159 bales. The certificated stock compared with last season, exports from the U. S. today were 11,000, against 6,000 since Friday 23,000 against this far this season 4,834,000 against 4,083,000.

Be Not Deceived, God Is Not Mocked, Is Ham's Subject

fifty minutes without a stop. A portion of the sermon is as follows:

There may be people in this audience tonight who do not believe there is a God; but you will admit the truth of our text: "Be not deceived; God is not mocked; for whatsoever a man soweth that shall he also reap." You may refuse to admit that we have any revelation of God, but you will admit that this truth remains the same.

It is common experience of mankind as applied to material things and that is the only kind of things there are according to the atheists. Men do not sow oats and expect to reap beans; nor sow thistles and expect to reap wheat. I would call your attention to the fact that the text is applicable to both saint and sinner. Indeed it was addressed to Christian people, those who had made a profession of faith in Christ and had afterward gone off into the armchair of life.

Under the operation of this law some of the most trifling things have the most terrible results. We are told that we may sow a thought and reap an act; sow an act and reap a character; sow a character and reap a destiny. While walking on his roof David looked at a beautiful woman bathing; of that look so carelessly sown he reaped a horrible crop of sins, including adultery and murder and in turn of these he reaped in his own family just what he had sown in the family of another man.

David's case calls to mind another phase of this awful law. While you may repent as David did and get God's pardon you cannot avoid the legitimate harvest of the seed you have sown. Paul was converted and forgiven for his persecution of Christ's disciples, but in turn he suffered more persecution than almost any man who ever lived. Jacob sowed deception, repented and was forgiven, but he reaped such a crop of deception as has fallen to the lot of no other man of whom we have any record. Many of you now have been regenerated by the blood of Christ and have abandoned your sins of dissipation; but you have never gotten back the purity nor health that were wasted in the sowing of wild oats. You will continue to reap this crop through all your life. You see the mistake now; you have experienced the awful truth of this text, but it is too late to make amends and undo the past.

The Bible and history are full of notable instances of the inexorable operation of this law. Haman was hanged on the very gallows he erected for Mordcaai. Those who threw the three Hebrew children into the fiery furnace were licked up and consumed by the very flames they had kindled for their victims. Nebuchadnezzar's mother murdered all the heirs to the throne except her own son, and was in turn murdered by him. Governor Goebel of Kentucky shot a man down on the sidewalk and fifteen years afterwards he was himself shot down on the sidewalk. The dogs it ked up the blood of Ahab and Jehoram on the very spot where they had licked up the blood of their victim, Naboth.

Your ignorance will not relieve you of the harvest of your sowing. The man who sowed thistle seeds by mistake, supposing them to be lettuce seed, will reap a crop of thistles just the same if he had sown them intentionally.

We threw up our hands at the atrocities committed in little Belgium when the German army marched through leaving destruction in its wake. But we had forgotten the unnumbered crimes committed by Belgian officers among the rubber planters in Belgian Congo when the savages were tortured and slaughtered just for amusement. For every child that was torn from its mother's loving heart and taken to another plantation in the days of slavery our own fair south gave her choice sons on the battlefield in an awful bloody reaping. God is no respecter of persons; whether nations, city, family or individual this great unchangeable law works to the very same end.

Some of you people are going to avoid this place; some are going to wilfully absent themselves from these services where God's truths are preached because they do not want to have their conscience aroused and bear their sins disclosed. But, brother, because you do not see the results of your sin now, because you are not buoyant. Short interest in stock

may be able for a time to cover them you need not think you will escape the final reaping; the things that you sow now are those that are going to sprout, take root and bear a sixty-fold harvest. You liars and deceivers may expect to reap lies and deceptions all of your days.

The evangelist cited numerous incidents happening under his own ministry which proved the truth of the text he was using and emphasized the warning which he was very zealously giving forth.

He closed the discourse with a very strong argument in the comparison of the descendants of two men of opposite moral character. From one, Max Jukes, born in New York, 1720, came a line of criminals, paupers, notorious women, thieves and convicts, costing the state over a million dollars.

From the other, Jonathan Edwards, the great Presbyterian preacher of New England, came judges, university presidents, physicians, clergymen, missionaries, army and navy officers, governors, farmers and ambassadors.

From these contrasted records the preacher urged parents to erect a family altar, begin sowing to the spirit, teach the family with them to church, teach the Bible daily and prepare the soil for a reaping of moral strength and spiritual fruit instead of sin, sorrow, and degradation.

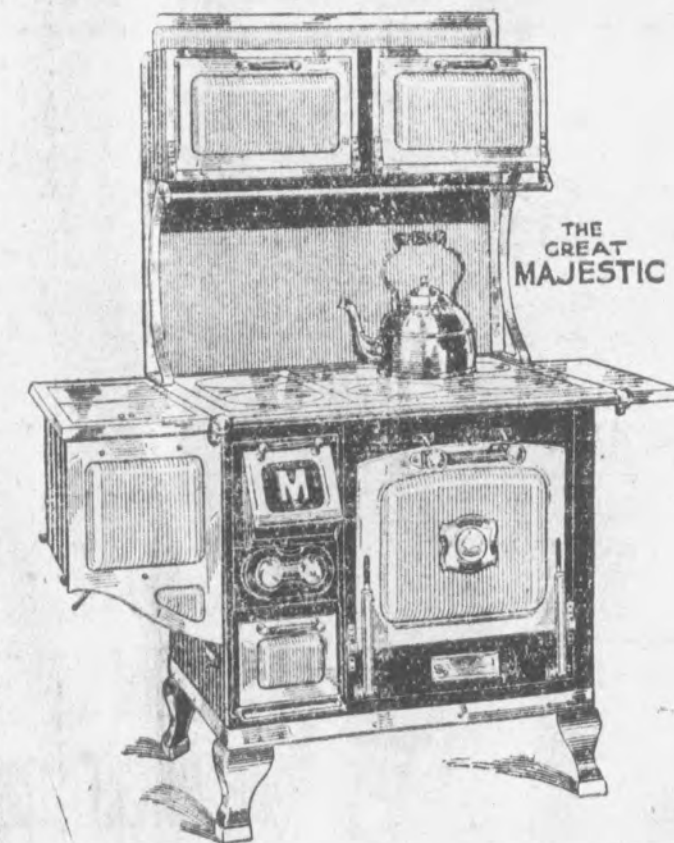

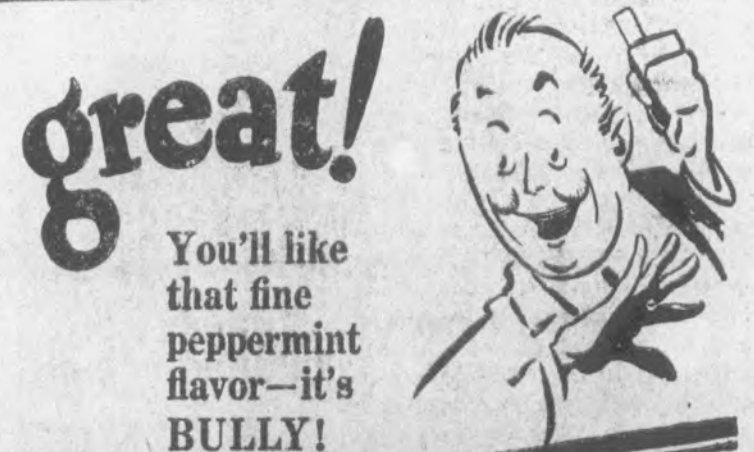
